HISTORICAL SESSIONS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES

Rio Grande Conference

El ministerio de La Iglesia Metodista Unida a través de la Conferencia Río Grande, tuvo sus precursores ya desde 1815, tanto en ministros de las fronteras como en los Colporteros de las Sociedades Bíblicas y en algunas de las comunidades de fe de los Colonos de Texas. Los esfuerzos ya más instituidos, empero, trazan su historial a dos de los ramos del metodismo: La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal y La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal del Sur.

La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal principia en 1850 con nombramientos a Nuevo México, a través de la Conferencia de Oregón y California y de la Sociedad Misionera, y posteriormente, a través de varias otras Conferencias. Estos primeros esfuerzos, si bien terminan en 1856, darán como fruto una Misión en Peralta. Dicha Misión continuaría por sí misma, bajo liderazgo fiel de algunos laicos, hasta 1871 que es cuando se prosigue ya en forma de un Distrito parte de la Conferencia de Colorado. En 1876 este Distrito, bilingüe por cierto, se constituye en la Misión de Nuevo México la cual continúa siendo parte, hasta 1884, de la Conferencia de Colorado. La obra toma nuevo curso, manteniendo aún su relación con la Conferencia de Colorado hasta 1891, pero reorganizándose en 1885 para dar lugar a la Misión Española de Nuevo México la cual posteriormente, al verse fortalecida se convierte, en 1892, en Conferencia Misionera Española de Nuevo México. En 1915 y hasta 1924, las obras de habla española y habla inglesa se vuelven a unir, formándose la bilingüe Conferencia de Nuevo México. En 1924 otra reorganización se hace necesaria y de ella nos viene la Misión Española del Suroeste la cual, en 1932, se hace Misión Latino Americana, continuando así hasta 1936. Finalmente, de 1937 a 1939, la obra se organiza como Misión de Nuevo México. Durante este periodo la mayoría de los obreros mantienen su membresía clerical en la Conferencia de Nuevo México de 1924 a 1927, en la Conferencia Misionera de Nuevo México en 1928 y en varias otras Conferencias, hasta la unificación de los metodismos de 1939.

La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal del Sur, por su parte, principia en 1859 con nombramientos a El Paso y a San Antonio, a través de la Conferencia Misionera del Río Grande, los que durarían uno y dos años respectivamente. En 1871 se reanudan los esfuerzos con un nombramiento a Corpus Christi, a través de la Conferencia del Oeste de Texas, que da como fruto un Distrito. La obra crece y en 1885 se establece como Conferencia Fronteriza Misionera Mexicana. En 1890 dicha Conferencia se divide en dos, naciendo la Conferencia Noroeste Misionera Mexicana. En los años 1914-1915 se da la primera reorganización en base a obra en Estados Unidos y obra en México, por lo que se forma la Misión Mexicana de Texas en 1914 y al Conferencia Fronteriza Mexicana en 1915. La Misión Mexicana de Texas, sin embargo, mantiene la mayoría de su membresía clerical en México en la Conferencia Fronteriza Misionera Mexicana en 1914 y en la Conferencia Fronteriza Mexicana hasta 1918. Por otro lado, en 1918 se da la reorganización de la obra occidental y se forma, con ello, la Conferencia Mexicana y la Misión Mexicana del Occidente Es así que a partir de 1918 y hasta 1930 la Misión Mexicana de Texas y la Misión Mexicana del Occidente mantiene la mayoría de su membresía clerical en la Conferencia Mexicana. En 1930 se da la separación definitiva de la obra mexicana y estadounidense y ambas Misiones pasan a ser Conferencia Mexicana de Texas y Conferencia Mexicana del Occidente, respectivamente, continuando así hasta la mencionada unificación del 1939.

En 1939, con la formación de La Iglesia Metodista, se dio también la unificación de la Misión de Nuevo México, la Conferencia Mexicana de Texas y la Conferencia Mexicana del Occidente, formándose la Conferencia Mexicana del Suroeste, la cual cambia de nombre en 1947 a Conferencia del Río Grande.

El Primero de Enero del 2015, La Conferencia Río Grande de la Iglesia Unida Metodista y La Conferencia Southwest Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida se unificaron para formar un sola conferencia; La Conferencia Rio Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

SOUTHWEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

The History of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference began in 1858, when the Rio Grande Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South was organized. This became the Rio Grande Annual Conference in 1864, and the name was changed to the West Texas Conference in 1866. In 1918, the German Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South (all except three charges in East Bernard and Houston) merged with the West Texas Conference. The German Mission Conference had been organized in 1874, when the German Charges, which had been at one time or another in the Louisiana, Texas and Rio Grande Conference, were organized into a Conference.

In 1874, the Southern German Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized, and this became the Southern Conference (German) in 1918. The Gulf Mission, which held its first session in 1893, became the Gulf Mission Conference in 1897, and the Gulf Annual Conference in 1904. In 1912, the Southern Swedish Mission Conference was organized. In 1926, the three Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Gulf Annual Conference, the Southern Swedish Mission Conference, and the Southern Conference (German), were united in the Southern Conference.

In 1939, the Southwest Texas Conference boundaries were established and all of the charges of the former West Texas Conference and of the Southern Conference within its boundaries were united into the Southwest Texas Conference.

On May 27, 1970, a certain portion of the West Texas Conference of the former Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church and the Southwest Texas Conference merged into one new conference now know as the Southwest Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church.

On January 1, 2015, The Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church and The Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church unified into one conference to become The Rio Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Other ministries like Journey UMC, Austin New Church, The Rock UMC, Windsong Church, and La Cabana in San Antonio have also made great strides in their ministry, and we are happy to hear all of the great works each of these congregations are doing.

New People, New Place grants has awarded over \$85,000 in grants for new and innovative outreach ministries in campuses, historically African American churches as well as Hispanic churches; cohorts will continue over the summer months for On Boarding and Fresh Expressions as well as simplified accountable structures trainings.

The SBC21 (Strengthening Black Churches for the 21st Century) has been renamed to Rio Texas Black Church Development Team and has been diligently working, providing grants, coaching support, plans and prayers.

Campus ministries are thriving, even after so much time unable to meet in person. We have 10 ministries in 9 campuses that continue to reach students and provide internship opportunities, discipleship and encouraging fellowship.

 15 Vision: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, and Transforming
 16 Communities. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams are responsible for focusing on the
 17 Mission Field. The membership of the Uniting Table shall be: the Bishop (ex officio without vote);
 18 the dean of the cabinet; the lay leader; the chairpersons of the Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing
 19 Congregations, Developing Leaders and Transforming Communities Vision Teams; the
 20 chairperson or a representative of each administrative agency in Rule #6; one representative
 21 each from the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on the Episcopacy, and the Council on
 22 Children's Ministries; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the
 23 Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; and the chairperson. There shall
 24 also be seven (7) members at large and a Mission Field Advocate, nominated by the Committee
 25 on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. All references in the Book of Discipline
 26 to a conference council on ministries will be fulfilled by the Uniting Table. The Uniting Table is
 27 accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
 28 a. There shall be a Mission Field Advocate whose responsibility is to help the Uniting Table
 29 and the Vision Teams remain focused on the mission field by advocating for the people who
 30 are not in our churches, including those who are in poverty, those who are young, those who
 31 are marginalized, and those who are disempowered by our culture and society.
 32 b. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams will be expected to recruit and engage lay
 33 and clergy persons across the conference to serve on task forces to assist in their
 34 responsibilities.
 35 c. Each Vision Team will have funding through the Annual Conference budget. Meetings of
 36 the Team will be funded through the amount budgeted to that Team. Appointed task forces
 37 also will be funded through the amount provided in the Annual Conference budget assigned to
 38 that Team.
 39 d. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference shall elect, the
 40 chairpersons of the Uniting Table and each of the four Vision Teams. None of these
 41 chairpersons shall have any other specific ministry responsibilities on the Uniting Table or any
 42 of the Vision Teams, nor shall they be chairperson of any other conference agency.
 43 e. The Constitutions for United Methodist Women (§ 647) and United Methodist Men (§ 648)
 44 are included in

1 the 2016 Book of Discipline. United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men are
 2 independent organizations which nominate and elect their own leaders. Each of these
 3 organizations is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various
 4 agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. United Methodist Women
 5 relates to the national organization of United Methodist Women. United Methodist Men relates
 6 to the General Commission on United Methodist Men.

9 **Uniting Peoples Vision Team**

10 2. There shall be a Uniting Peoples Vision Team whose function is to facilitate unity, witness,
 11 communication and justice, and to work toward intercultural competency in all areas of
 12 conference life. The membership of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team shall be: two persons
 13 whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, two persons
 14 whose specific responsibility is Religion and Race, two persons whose specific responsibility is
 15 the Status and Role of Women, two persons whose specific responsibility is Communications,
 16 two persons whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, and a chairperson; all nominated
 17 by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The entire Vision
 18 Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The
 19 Uniting Peoples Vision Team relates to the Council of Bishops, the General Commission on
 20 Religion and Race, the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the
 21 Uniting Table. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual
 22 Conference.

23 a. There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships (the
 24 commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 642 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The
 25 membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference
 26 whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, plus all the
 27 other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Council of
 28 Bishops, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the
 29 Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 30 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

31 b. There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race (the commission) whose function is
 32 defined in ¶ 643 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be
 33 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Religion
 34 and Race, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission
 35 relates to the General Commission on Religion and Race, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision
 36 Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual
 37 Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

38 c. There shall be a Commission on the Status and Role of Women (the commission) whose
 39 function is defined in ¶ 644 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 40 commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 41 responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, plus all the other members of the Uniting
 42 Peoples Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women.
 43 The chairperson of this commission shall be a woman, and a majority of its members shall be
 44 women. The commission relates to the General Commission on the Status and Role of
 45 Women, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the
 46 Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 47 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

48 d. There shall be a Commission on Communications (the commission) whose function is
 49 defined in ¶ 646 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be
 50 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
 51 Communications, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The
 52 commission relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to
 53 the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the
 54 Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

55 e. There shall be a Committee on Disability Concerns (the committee) whose function is
 56 defined in ¶ 653 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be

1 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Disability
 2 Concerns, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. Membership shall
 3 include persons with physical disabilities and persons with mental disabilities. The committee
 4 relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Uniting
 5 Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 6 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

8 **Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team**

9 3. There shall be a Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team whose function is to discern, develop
 10 and deploy

11 resources pertinent to the fulfillment of the mission and purpose of the local church, and to
 12 support the restoring of vitality to the local church. The membership of the Vitalizing
 13 Congregations Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Discipleship,
 14 two persons whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development & Revitalization, two
 15 persons whose specific responsibility is Ethnic Local Church Concerns, two persons whose
 16 specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, two persons whose specific
 17 responsibility is the Small Membership Church, two persons whose specific responsibility is New
 18 Church Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is Children's Ministries, two
 19 persons whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, two persons whose specific
 20 responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on
 21 Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents
 22 or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council,
 23 and the Young Adult Ministry Council. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each
 24 of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team
 25 relates to the General Board of Discipleship, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the
 26 Uniting Table. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the
 27 Annual Conference.

28
 29 a. There shall be a Board of Discipleship (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 630 of the
 30 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by
 31 the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, plus all the other
 32 members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board relates to the General
 33 Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board is
 34 accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and
 35 is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

36 b. There shall be a Committee on Congregational Development and Revitalization (the
 37 committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5e of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The
 38 membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference
 39 whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development and Revitalization, plus all the
 40 other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the
 41 General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
 42 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
 43 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 44 budget.

45 c. There shall be a Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns (the committee) whose
 46 function is defined in ¶ 632 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee
 47 shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
 48 Ethnic Local Church Concerns, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations
 49 Vision Team. The committee relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
 50 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
 51 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 52 budget.

53 d. There shall be a Committee on Parish and Community Development (the committee)
 54 whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 55 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 56 responsibility is Parish and Community Development, plus all the other members of the

- 1 Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global
2 Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to
3 the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
4 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 5 e. There shall be a Commission on the Small Membership Church (the commission) whose
6 function is defined in ¶ 645 and ¶ 633.5i of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of
7 the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
8 responsibility is the Small Membership Church, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing
9 Congregations Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Board of Global
10 Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The commission is accountable to
11 the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
12 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 13 f. There shall be a Committee on New Church Development (the committee) whose function
14 is defined in ¶ 633.5e-h and ¶ 630.3 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
15 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
16 responsibility is New Church Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing
17 Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries,
18 the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
19 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
20 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
21 budget.
- 22 g. There shall be a Council on Children’s Ministries (the council) whose function is to plan,
23 vision and advocate for children within the conference. The membership of the council shall
24 be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
25 Children’s Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team.
26 The council relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council is accountable
27 to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
28 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 29 h. There shall be a Council on Older Adult Ministries (the council) whose function is defined in
30 ¶ 651 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the council shall be the two persons
31 elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, plus
32 all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the
33 General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council
34 is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference,
35 and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 36
- 37 i. There shall be a Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries (the committee) whose function is
38 defined in ¶ 655 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be
39 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
40 Hispanic/Latino Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision
41 Team. At least one-third of the members shall be Hispanic/Latino persons. The committee is
42 accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and
43 is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 44 j. There shall be a Youth Ministries Council (the council), whose function is defined in ¶ 649 of
45 the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the
46 Council on Youth Ministries. The council will support, encourage and equip youth leaders in
47 the church. The council will consist of 3-5 youth from each district, and will represent the
48 diversity of the conference. No more than one-third of the members of the council will be
49 adults. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on
50 various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates
51 to the General Board of Discipleship’s Division on Ministries with Young People. The council
52 is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations
53 Vision Team portion of the budget.
- 54 k. There shall be a Young Adult Ministry Council (the council) whose function is defined in
55 ¶ 650 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of
56 Discipline to the Council on Young Adult Ministries. The council will provide voice and support

1 for all young adults in the conference. The council will be a group of diverse young adults
 2 called to ministry and service as modeled by Jesus Christ. The council is represented by the
 3 president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference,
 4 including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's
 5 Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual
 6 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 7 budget.

8 **Developing Leaders Vision Team**

9 4. There shall be a Developing Leaders Vision Team whose function is to call and equip both lay
 10 and clergy leaders for the mission field, and to especially encourage younger leaders. The
 11 membership of the Developing Leaders Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific
 12 responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and a chairperson; all nominated by the
 13 Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be
 14 the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth
 15 Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; two representatives from the Board of
 16 Ordained Ministry; the conference lay leader and the seven (7) district lay leaders. The entire
 17 Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members,
 18 unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. The Developing Leaders Vision Team
 19 relates to the General Board of Higher
 20 Education and Ministry and its Division of Higher Education, the General Board of Discipleship,
 21 and to the Uniting Table. The Developing Leaders Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by,
 22 the Annual Conference.

23 a. There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (the board) whose
 24 function is defined in ¶ 634 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall
 25 be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Higher
 26 Education and Campus Ministry, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision
 27 Team. The board relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and its
 28 Division of Higher Education, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board is
 29 accountable to the Developing Leaders Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is
 30 funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

31 b. There shall be a Board of Ordained Ministry (the board) whose function, membership and
 32 organization are defined in ¶ 635 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the board
 33 shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. The board shall
 34 relate to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. The board is accountable to
 35 and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision
 36 Team portion of the budget.

37 c. There shall be a Lay Leadership Team whose function is defined in ¶ 631 of the 2016 Book
 38 of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Board of Laity.
 39 The membership of the Lay Leadership Team shall be the conference lay leader as
 40 chairperson and the district lay leaders, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders
 41 Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is represented by one or more of its members on
 42 various agencies of the Annual Conference. The Lay Leadership Team relates to the General
 43 Board of Discipleship, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership
 44 Team is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the
 45 Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

46 **Transforming Communities Vision Team**

47 5. There shall be a Transforming Communities Vision Team whose function is to equip, educate
 48 and support congregations around the areas of mission and The Advance, specific ethnic
 49 concerns, and justice issues. The membership of the Transforming Communities Vision Team
 50 shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, two persons whose
 51 specific responsibility is Global Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Native
 52 American Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is The Advance Program, two
 53 persons whose specific responsibility is the Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, the Secretary
 54 of Global Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and
 55 elected by the Annual Conference. The Peace with Justice Coordinator shall also be a member.
 56

1 The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its
 2 members. The Transforming Communities Vision Team relates to the General Board of Church
 3 and Society, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Transforming
 4 Communities Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

5
 6 a. There shall be a Board of Church and Society (the board) whose function is defined in
 7 ¶ 629 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons
 8 elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, plus all
 9 the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, plus a member named by
 10 the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Church
 11 and Society, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to
 12 the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
 13 through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget. The board shall
 14 name the Peace with Justice Coordinator.

15 b. There shall be a Board of Global Ministries (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 633
 16 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected
 17 by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, plus all the other
 18 members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, including the Secretary of Global
 19 Ministries, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board
 20 relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Transforming Communities Vision
 21 Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the
 22 Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team
 23 portion of the budget.

24 c. There shall be a Committee on Native American Ministries (the committee) whose function
 25 is defined in ¶ 654 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be
 26 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Native
 27 American Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision
 28 Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee
 29 is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual
 30 Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the
 31 budget.

32 d. There shall be a Committee on The Advance (the committee) whose function is defined in
 33 ¶ 656 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two
 34 persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is The Advance, plus
 35 all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates
 36 to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the
 37 Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through
 38 the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.

39 e. There shall be a Committee on Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries (the committee)
 40 whose function is defined in ¶ 657 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 41 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 42 responsibility is Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, plus all the other members of the
 43 Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming
 44 Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Transforming Communities
 45 Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming
 46 Communities Vision Team portion of the budget

47 **Administrative Agencies**

48 6. There shall be Administrative Agencies whose functions are to provide ongoing administrative
 49 support to the conference. Each of these functions will be carried out by a separate and
 50 independent agency whose members are nominated by the Committee on Nominations and
 51 elected by the Annual Conference, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of
 52 these agencies is directly accountable to the Annual Conference, reports to the Annual
 53 Conference, and is funded through the budget of the Annual Conference, unless otherwise
 54 specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies shall have one representative on the
 55 Uniting Table for support of the missional emphases of the Uniting Table and Vision Teams.

- 1 a. There shall be a Finance Table whose function is defined in ¶¶ 611-628 of the 2016 Book
2 of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on
3 Finance and Administration. The Finance Table will also fulfill all references in the Book of
4 Discipline to the Commission on Equitable Compensation, whose function is defined in ¶ 625
5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Finance Table.
6 The Finance Table relates to the General Council on Finance and Administration. There shall
7 also be a Personnel Committee to carry out those functions of the Finance Table in ¶ 613.13
8 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be four (4) members of the Personnel Committee
9 plus a representative of the Finance Table and a district superintendent.
- 10 b. There shall be a Board of Trustees whose function is defined in ¶ 2512 of the 2016 Book of
11 Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Board of Trustees, who will be elected
12 in four classes of three members each. The first Board of Trustees will have three persons
13 elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2015, three persons
14 elected by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2016, three persons elected
15 by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2017, and three persons elected by
16 the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2018. The members of the Board
17 of Trustees are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas
18 Conference Board of Trustees corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the
19 Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation.
- 20
- 21 c. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules whose function is to oversee the rules of
22 the Annual Conference, as permitted in ¶ 604.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be
23 six (6) members of the Committee on Standing Rules.
- 24 d. There shall be an Agenda and Worship Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 605.2 of
25 the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the Agenda and Worship Committee shall be
26 the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; the
27 presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry
28 Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; the conference treasurer;
29 the conference secretary; the chairperson of the Uniting Table; and a Worship Team
30 Coordinator recruited by the committee.
- 31 e. There shall be a Committee on the Episcopacy whose function is defined in ¶ 637 of the
32 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Committee on the
33 Episcopacy.
- 34 f. There shall be an Episcopal Residence Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 638 of the
35 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Episcopal Residence
36 Committee.
- 37 g. There shall be a Board of Pensions whose function is defined in ¶ 639 of the 2016 Book of
38 Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Board of Pensions who will serve
39 eight-year staggered terms, with four members being elected every other year. The first
40 Board of Pensions will have four persons whose terms end in June 2016, four persons whose
41 terms end in June 2018, four persons whose terms end in June 2020, and four persons
42 whose terms end in June 2022 in order to establish the staggered terms. The 2014
43 conferences will each elect two persons for each class to make up the first Board of
44 Pensions. The members of the Board of Pensions are also members of the Board of
45 Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Pensions corporation, and
46 their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that
47 corporation. The Board of Pensions relates to the General Board of Pensions and Health
48 Benefits.
- 49
- 50 h. There shall be a Commission on Archives and History whose function is defined in ¶ 641 of
51 the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be eight (8) members of the Commission on Archives
52 and History. The Commission on Archives and History relates to the General Commission on
53 Archives and History.
- 54 i. There shall be a Committee on Nominations (the committee) whose function is to identify
55 nominees for each elected leadership position for which the Book of Discipline does not
56 specify another method of nomination. The members of the committee shall be the Bishop

1 and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; one person from
 2 each parent conference representing United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the
 3 Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; and
 4 six (6) at large members nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the
 5 Annual Conference to ensure equal representation on the committee from each of the parent
 6 conferences. At least through 2024 the Committee on Nominations will consist of an equal
 7 number of members from each of the parent conferences.

8
 9
 10 7. There shall be an Administrative Review Committee (the committee) whose function and
 11 membership are defined in ¶ 636 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be three (3)
 12 members of the committee and two (2) alternates, nominated by the Bishop and elected by the
 13 clergy session of the Annual Conference. The committee is accountable to the clergy session of
 14 the Annual Conference.

15 **Applying to All Agencies**

16 8. The Committee on Nominations shall work toward the goals of inclusiveness as set forth in
 17 ¶ 610.5 in the 2016 Book of Discipline which states: "...special attention shall be given to the
 18 inclusion of clergywomen, youth (¶ 256.3), young adults, older adults, persons from churches with
 19 small memberships, people with disabilities, and racial and ethnic persons, in keeping with
 20 policies for general Church agencies. It is further recommended that the membership of such
 21 agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry, include one-third clergy, one-third
 22 laywomen, and one-third laymen, who are professing members of local churches." The
 23 Committee on Nominations shall also strive for equal representation from the districts; and, to the
 24 extent possible, the diversity of those nominated should reflect the diversity of the Mission Field.
 25 It will be important at least through 2020 that both the parent conferences be equally represented
 26 on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Pensions, and that both be well represented on the
 27 Uniting Table and the Vision Teams.

28 9. The term of membership in any conference agency is quadrennial, except where the Book of
 29 Discipline stipulates otherwise. The maximum that a person can serve in an agency is two full
 30 terms, except where the
 31 Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise, or when he/she is filling a vacancy during the
 32 quadrennium. Filling a vacancy of an unexpired term of more than two years is considered to be
 33 a full term and shall count the same as four years.

34 10. Any elected position on a conference agency which is vacant at the end of the Annual
 35 Conference session or which becomes vacant during the conference year may be filled by the
 36 Committee on Nominations, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline.

37 11. Ex-officio members of an agency, including members of General and Jurisdictional Agencies
 38 who reside within the bounds of the conference, are in addition to the agency members named
 39 above.

40 12. Chairpersons of conference agencies should be sensitive to the work schedules of laity when
 41 setting meetings.

42 13. When a person is absent without notice from two consecutive conference agency meetings
 43 of which he/she is a member, such person shall be considered to have resigned such
 44 membership, and the Committee on Nominations shall be notified that another person can be
 45 nominated for the remainder of the term.

46 14. No district superintendent or conference staff person shall be eligible to serve as an elective
 47 member of any conference agency. If a member at the time of appointment or hire, he/she shall
 48 be considered to have resigned such membership.

49 **Conference Staff and Resources**

50 15. There shall be an Administrative Services Center whose function is to manage the financial
 51 resources of the conference, and to develop alternative sources of funding for the conference.
 52 The Administrative Services Center will encourage collaboration and partnership among all
 53 program, administrative and financial entities of the conference. The Administrative Services
 54 Center relates to and supports the work of the Finance Table and the Commission on Equitable
 55

1 Compensation, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, the conference treasurer, and the
 2 office of New Resource Development, as well as the other non-program agencies as needed.
 3 The Administrative Services Center shall be accountable to the Finance Table and to the Annual
 4 Conference, and shall be funded by the Annual Conference. There shall be a director or
 5 equivalent position to oversee the functions of the Administrative Services Center, filled by
 6 appointment or otherwise at the Bishop's discretion.

7 16. There shall be an Assistant to the Episcopal Office who will provide assistance with the
 8 administrative tasks of the Episcopal Office. This position may be filled, by appointment or
 9 otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

10 17. There shall be Directors who assist and coordinate with the ministries of the Vision Teams as
 11 determined by the Personnel Committee in consultation with the Bishop. These positions may be
 12 filled, by appointment or otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

13 **MEMBERSHIP OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

14 18. The lay membership of the Annual Conference shall be:

15 **Lay Members Defined by the Book of Discipline**

16 a. A professing member elected by each charge, as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book
 17 of Discipline;

18 b. An additional lay member assigned to each charge for each additional clergy member who
 19 is appointed to the charge as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;

20 c. Diaconal ministers, active deaconesses, home missionaries under episcopal appointment
 21 within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the conference president of United Methodist
 22 Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district
 23 lay leaders, the conference director of lay servant ministries, conference secretary of global
 24 ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult
 25 organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the Annual
 26 Conference college student organization, one young person between the ages of twelve (12)
 27 and seventeen (17) and one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30)
 28 from each district to be selected in such a manner as may be determined by the Annual
 29 Conference, as provided in ¶ 602.4 and ¶ 32 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;

30 (The method for selecting the youth, college and young adult representatives to
 31 Annual Conference will be as follows: the conference youth organization will
 32 select one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17)
 33 from each district; the conference young adult organization will select one young
 34 person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district. In
 35 the absence of a college student organization, the Board of Higher Education
 36 and Campus Ministry will select the college student to serve as a Lay Member of
 37 the Annual Conference. Each of the agencies is responsible for providing the
 38 names and contact information for these persons to the conference secretary no
 39 later than January 15 each year.)
 40

41 **Lay Members Defined by Annual Conference**

42 d. An additional lay member assigned to each church that does not have a lay member as
 43 provided for in 18a and 18b above; and

44 e. Other members as defined by the Annual Conference to include: an additional
 45 representative of the executive committees of the conference organizations of United
 46 Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, youth, and young adults; the president and one
 47 additional representative of the executive committees of the district organizations of United
 48 Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, youth, and young adults; the chancellor, the
 49 conference emmaus lay director (if any), the conference scouting coordinator (if any),
 50 conference associate lay leaders (if any), conference elected executive personnel (if any), the
 51 chairperson of any conference agency or standing committee that reports directly to the
 52 Annual Conference; lay members of the Uniting Table and Finance Table; and one lay
 53 member for each unchartered new church start elected by the district in which the new church
 54 start is located.
 55
 56

3 f. Additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy membership shall be assigned
4 to each district based upon district membership. The conference secretary shall notify each
5 district superintendent of the number of additional lay members to be elected no later than
6 sixty (60) days following Annual Conference. Each district will determine the method of
7 election.

8 g. Through 2024 the additional lay members elected shall include members of both parent
9 conferences.

10 h. At least 10% of these additional lay members shall be age 30 or under at the time of
11 election.

12 19. In accordance with ¶ 659 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, the District Conferences will be
13 composed of all members of Annual Conference as set forth in the Standing Rules who are
14 related to churches within the bounds of their respective districts and currently elected to office.
15 In addition, it shall include the chairperson of each district agency.
16

17 CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

18 20. Proposals and reports from conference agencies shall be compiled in a Pre-Conference
19 Report that shall be made available as an electronic document or in printed form to all conference
20 members at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Conference session. Each report shall be
21 marked "For Conference Action" or "For Information Only."
22

23 21. The Annual Conference shall make available English and Spanish editions of all official
24 correspondence, including but not limited to the contents of the Pre-Conference Report and the
25 Conference Journal. The Annual Conference shall also provide oral translation between Spanish
26 and English, and support for hearing and vision impaired persons, during the sessions of the
27 Annual Conference.

28 22. Resolutions shall reach the floor of the conference only after consideration and action of the
29 appropriate conference agency.

30 23. The conference procedures will be governed by the following in order of precedence: the
31 Book of Discipline, the Standing Rules, any special rules adopted by the Annual Conference, and
32 the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.

33 24. The conference secretary shall establish the bar of the conference. The conference
34 secretary shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, the persons needed to assist in the
35 proceedings of the conference. These include the timekeeper, tellers, associate secretaries, and
36 the minutes committee.

37 25. Speakers should identify themselves, giving their name and church, and whether they are a
38 clergy or lay member of the conference.

39 26. Each speech from the floor for or against a motion will be limited to three minutes. The
40 timekeeper will inform the Bishop when the time has expired.

41 27. Consent Agenda 1 consists of reports from conference agencies which are not for action, but
42 are "For Information Only." The conference acts only to receive these reports and print them in
43 the journal. Consent Agenda 2 consists of action reports about which there is believed to be little
44 or no dissent. The items included in Consent Agenda 2 are determined by a task force
45 composed of members of the Agenda and Worship Committee. Any member of the Annual
46 Conference may move the deletion of any of the items from Consent Agendas. With a second,
47 and a one-minute explanation by the maker of the motion, it will be voted on by the conference
48 without debate. If 20% of the members vote that the item be removed, it will be removed and
49 brought to the floor as a non-consent item at a time to be determined by the Agenda and Worship
50 Committee.
51

52 28. The Committee on Standing Rules shall report to the Annual Conference during the first
53 business session of each Annual Conference. Revisions or amendments must be adopted by a
54 two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference, and become effective immediately upon their
55 adoption, unless otherwise stated in the enabling legislation. The Standing Rules may be
56 suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference.

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3 29. The preliminary report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented early in the agenda
4 of the Annual Conference proceedings, including the process for nominations from the floor. The
5 final report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented and acted upon at a later session
6 of that Annual Conference.

7 30. Any report or resolution requiring action of the conference must be in the hands of the
8 conference secretary early enough to allow for printing and distribution to the conference twenty-
9 four (24) hours before the report is considered by the conference. Motions made from the floor
10 must be presented in writing to the presiding officer and the conference secretary at the time the
11 motion is made.

12 31. The conference lay leader will chair the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesies, and will
13 be responsible for appointing additional persons to assist in preparation of the report.

14 32. The only materials that are allowed to be placed on the tables of the conference floor are
15 those official materials distributed by the conference secretary and his/her staff.

16 33. The minutes shall be available online no later than sixty days after the closing of the Annual
17 Conference session.

18 **OTHER**

19 34. The Local Church Report to the Annual Conference (Annual Statistical Report) required by
20 the general church will be completed and filed with the conference no later than January 30, as
21 stated in ¶ 606.7 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. This can be done using the method determined
22 by the conference statistician to be the easiest and most effective manner.

23 35. There will be a Policy Manual containing policies adopted by the Annual Conference.
24 Changes in these policies must be approved by the Annual Conference. The conference
25 secretary will make these available as an electronic document and in printed form.

26
27 36. Any minister of the Annual Conference who conducts the funeral or memorial service of a
28 fellow minister or a minister's spouse shall provide the conference secretary with a memorial for
29 that person within one month, in accordance with the Guidelines on Memoirs to be furnished by
30 the conference secretary.

38 The Finance Table (CF&A) is recommending that the salary and benefits for the Río Texas Conference District

42 Clergy Retirement Security Plan, Comprehensive Protection Plan, Health Benefits, and utilities shall vary
43 according to their actual cost.

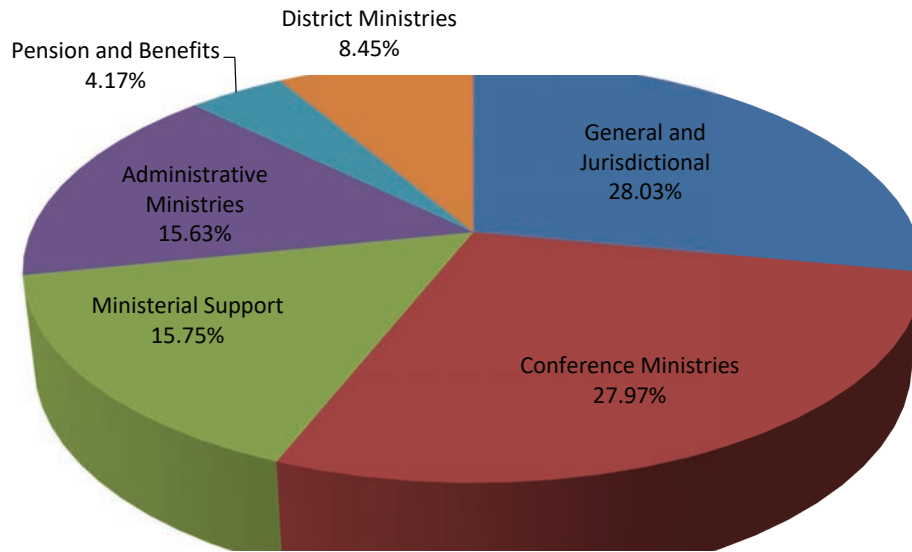

REPORT V FINANCE TABLE (CF&A) OPERATIONS
FOR INFORMATION ONLY

1 The purpose of the Finance Table (CF&A) is “to develop, maintain, and administer a comprehensive and
 2 coordinated plan of fiscal and administrative policies, procedures, and management services for the Annual
 3 Conference” (§612.1 2016 *Book of Discipline*).

4 In keeping with the Disciplinary purpose, the Finance Table (CF&A) sees itself as an integral part of the mission
 5 and ministry of the Conference. We are working to improve communications with the other agencies of the
 6 Conference to ensure that our work is supportive of the ministries and goals of the Uniting Table and the Mission
 7 Field Ministries Office.

8 Receipts on all funds for 2021 by the Río Texas Conference were \$8,166,417, or 88.35% of the apportioned
 9 amount. The Finance Table (CF&A) is proposing the budget for 2023. The overall apportioned budget for all
 10 funds totals \$8,282,133.

11 The Finance Table (CF&A) sees itself as joining with the local church in the work of the financial ministry of the
 12 Annual Conference. We commend the 2023 budget to the Conference. It represents the uniqueness and depth
 13 of ministries and missions provided by our church and economic realities of our Conference. The Finance Table
 14 (CF&A), along with the Conference Treasurer, has been monitoring membership and economic trends within the
 15 Conference, the Global Church, and society at large. As the goals and direction of the Conference become clearer,
 16 we will be working with the Bishop, the Uniting Table, and Mission Field Ministries to ensure that the budget and
 17 apportionments accurately reflect those goals and support those ministries. At the same time, we will continue
 18 to work with our Conference Treasurer and other Conference leaders to improve communications, systems and
 19 efficiency.
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 21
 22
 23

24 **Operating Policies of the Finance Table (CF&A):**

- 25 1. Following is the list of approved funds of the Río Texas Conference. These funds will be allocated to each
 26 mission or chartered church/charge according to the formulas that follow.
 27

28 General and Jurisdictional
 29 Conference Ministries (formerly Conference Benevolences)
 30 Ministerial Support
 31 Administrative Ministries (formerly Conference Administration)
 32 Pension and Benefits
 33 District Missions
 34

35 The decimal formula for apportionment calculation shall be based on the two year average of local church
 36 operating expenses divided by two years of conference-wide local church operating expenses times each
 37 apportioned fund. Operating expenses include only these line items from the Local Church Report to the
 38 Annual Conference:

39 Line 41 – Pastor(s) Compensation
 40 Line 42 – Utilities and Housing Paid to Pastor(s)
 41 Line 43 – Accountable Reimbursement Paid to Pastor(s)
 42 Line 44 – Non-Accountable Cash Allowances Paid to Pastor(s)
 43 Line 45 – Staff & Diaconal Ministers Salary
 44 Line 46 – Program Expenses
 45 Line 47 – Current Operating Expenses other than Program

2 Years of Conference-Wide Local Church Operating Expenses Apportioned |

51 If there are separate district apportionments determined by each district, they will be allocated according to the
 52 following formula.

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2 years of Local Church Operating Expenses	Each District Apportioned Fund
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2. At the beginning of the calendar year, the Finance Table (CF&A) shall determine which portions of the Conference Ministries and Administrative Ministries are “fixed costs” (salaries, benefits, etc.) and shall thus be authorized to be paid at 100% of the approved budget. On the basis of prior-year receipts to these funds, the Finance Table (CF&A) shall then determine a percentage of the approved budget to be authorized for expenditures in the remaining items of each budget, so that expenditures shall not exceed income.
 - a. Each church is expected to support all funds at 100% of the apportioned amount. (§247.14 2016 *Book of Discipline*)
 - b. The churches are requested to make payments thereon aggregately, with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will allocate such payments according to the appropriate percentage due the fund according to the Conference Budget.

3. An Unrestricted Fund Balance Account will be maintained by the Annual Conference at a minimum level of 20% of the current total of the Conference Funds. Any undesignated interest income will be transferred to the undesignated fund balance at the end of the fiscal year.
4. All apportioned funds, pension and health benefits costs both receipts and disbursements, will be managed through the office of the Conference Treasurer. All boards, agencies, committees, and commissions shall use the Conference Treasurer as the fiscal agent.
5. The compensation (including housing and utilities) for District Superintendents shall be recommended to the Annual Conference by the Finance Table (CF&A), using a guideline formula adopted in 2017 of 1.85 times the Conference Average Compensation (CAC). The purpose of the formula is to relate DS Compensation to Full Time Clergy Compensation. We recommend that the salary computation should also be applied to other clergy appointed to the conference staff at Cabinet level. For the year 2022, the Cabinet has requested that this formula be set aside leaving their salaries frozen at the lower 2020/2021 rate.
6. All agencies receiving funds from the Conference budget shall affirm that funds will not be expended for uses not consistent with ¶613.18-19 2016 *Book of Discipline*.
7. The amount of compensation designated as housing allowance for ordained staff members and district superintendents of the Conference will be set by an annual resolution of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A) after consideration of a statement of amounts to be used during the year.
8. The governing boards of United Methodist related entities must apply to the Finance Table (CF&A) to be granted the privilege of soliciting and receiving funds from churches, individuals, and other sources (but not from conference-wide offerings except as indicated in the list which follows) in keeping with ¶262 2016 *Book of Discipline*; no capital campaigns have been approved for 2021; and the following, and only the following, conference-wide offerings are approved for 2022:

9. The Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A), the Chairperson of the Audit Committee, the Chairperson of Equitable Compensation and the Conference Treasurer/Director of Administrative Ministries constitute the executive committee of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A).
10. The Finance Table (CF&A) is authorized to appoint a Conference auditor.

- 1 11. A Conference Fund will not be permitted to carry over unobligated budget allocations from one conference
 2 year to another unless specifically authorized by the Finance Table (CF&A). Agencies receiving funds from
 3 sources other than apportioned funds may carry over such unspent funds into the next year. Any unobligated
 4 budget allocations not authorized for carryover will be added to the undesignated Fund Balance of the Annual
 5 Conference.
 6 12. Each year, the Conference Comptroller shall set a cutoff date for all apportionment payments to the
 7 Conference Treasurer to be applied to the preceding year. The cutoff date will be communicated to the local
 8 churches no later than December 1 each year.
 9 13. Each Conference board, agency, or institution receiving or disbursing funds not managed by the Conference
 10 Treasurer shall maintain adequate financial records and prepare and submit annual audit reports to the
 11 Conference Treasurer and the Finance Table (CF&A). All treasurers shall be properly bonded.
 12
 13 14. The Conference fiscal year shall begin on January 1 each year, and end on December 31 each year.
 14 15. The Conference Finance Table (CF&A) is responsible for designating depositories for Conference funds.
 15
 16 16. The Conference will include in each annual budget an appropriate line for each “shall” ministry as defined
 17 by The Book of Discipline

REPORT VI
EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICIES
FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

18 The Río Texas Conference Equitable Compensation Policy was adopted at the Special Session of the Southwest
 19 Texas and Rio Grande Conferences, February 8, 2014. The Commission on Equitable Compensation is proposing
 20 several updates to these policies.

21
 22

EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICIES

23 The group assigned the responsibility for these policies in ¶625.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline of The
 24 United Methodist Church is called the Commission in this report.

25 **MINIMUM SUPPORT POLICIES**

- 26 **A. Minimum Compensation** is understood to be the Salary paid by the Church as listed on part two,
 27 line ten of the 2023 Pastor Compensation Form. The following minimum compensation levels for
 28 2023 shall be:
 29 1. For a Full or Probationary member \$44,200.
 30 2. For an Associate member \$41,100.
 31 3. For an Approved Local Pastor or member of another denomination \$37,700.
 32 **B. Adjustments to Minimum Compensation Base:** Total Minimum Compensation equals
 33 minimum base compensation plus allowance for years of service, plus allowance for number of
 34 churches served in a charge.
 35 • The allowance for years of service equals \$75 per year and shall be added to the compensation
 36 for each year of service under Episcopal appointment in The United Methodist Church,
 37 beginning with the second year of service through the twentieth year for a maximum of
 38 \$1,425.
 39 • The allowance for number of churches equals an additional \$200 per year to be paid for the
 40 second church, and an additional \$100 per year for every other church served by the pastor.
 41 • A participant shall not receive more than 30% of the approved total minimum compensation
 42 support from the Commission. That amount shall be reduced by the percent of World
 43 Service/General Church apportionments not paid for the immediate prior year.
 44 **C. Associate Pastor:** In order to advance the specific mission for growth of the Church and provide
 45 for the most effective use of compensation support, the Commission will consider (but is not
 46 required to) funding an associate pastor, if the following conditions are met:
 47 • All requirements listed above for Equitable Compensation are met.

- 1 • There must be an indication that the local church will be able to sustain this position after three
- 2 conference years. Initiative may come from either the local church or the district
- 3 superintendents. In a letter of request the local church must state its mission/ministry needs.
- 4 Procedures follow the Commission's regular process.
- 5 • The 30% rule - no more than 30% of minimum compensation will be granted. (See rule #B)
- 6 • These are start-up funds only and should be requested for a first associate pastor at the charge.
- 7 Funds would be available for three years on the following scale:
- 8
- 9 ➤ 1st Year - 30% of pastoral compensation
- 10 ➤ 2nd Year - 20% of pastoral compensation
- 11 ➤ 3rd Year - 10% of pastoral compensation
- 12 • No more than 20% of the total minimum compensation support budget for the Commission's
- 13 Funds can be used for Associate Pastors.
- 14 • Priority will be given to churches with growth potential with guidelines from the Office of
- 15 New Church Development and Transformation being the resource.
- 16 • All requests must come to the Commission from the Cabinet after their endorsement.
- 17 • Support will be considered only for churches that are paying their apportionments fully.

18

19

20 **D. Transition Support:** Occasionally, the Commission on Equitable Compensation is faced

21 with unusual requests for transition support for Conference members who are severing their

22 relationship with the Annual Conference. In such a circumstance transition support associated with

23 the termination may be granted as shown below.

- 24 ▪ Full Members: The equivalent of two months of minimum compensation and \$100 for each
- 25 year of service in this Conference or each legacy conference.
- 26 ▪ Provisionals: The equivalent of one month of minimum compensation.
- 27 ▪ Local Pastor: \$500. Must have at least three continuous years of service in this Annual
- 28 Conference or each legacy conference.

29 The support is not automatic and the Cabinet must request the specific amount.

30 **MINIMUM SALARY REQUIREMENTS OF PASTORS**

- 31 A. A Conference member or approved Local Pastor who is in good standing and who is appointed to
- 32 full time service shall have a claim upon the Equitable Compensation Fund. (See ¶342.1 and
- 33 ¶625.12 of the 2016 Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church)
- 34 B. A Conference member may be considered for a pro rata Equitable Compensation claim for part
- 35 time service as stipulated under ¶342.2 and 645.12 of the 2016 Book of Discipline.
- 36 C. Retired pastors or certified lay ministers shall not have a claim for benefits from the Equitable
- 37 Compensation Fund. (See ¶268.6 and ¶357.6 of the 2016 Book of Discipline).
- 38 D. Special appointments and any other appointments outside the bounds of the Annual Conference
- 39 shall not be eligible for support from the Commission. No appointment except a local
- 40 church/charge will be eligible for support.

41

42

43 **MINIMUM SALARY REQUIREMENTS OF CHURCHES AND CHARGES**

- 44 A. To be eligible for participation each charge must must show signs of viability including but not
- 45 limited to:
- 46 • An average worship attendance of at least 45 is recommended. For churches with lower
- 47 attendance the district superintendent will submit in writing his/her understanding of the
- 48 reasons for the charge's viability.
- 49 • Conduct an every member stewardship program each year.
- 50 • Increase the amount the local church is paying toward the pastor's compensation by at least
- 51 10% each year.
- 52 • Adopt an accountable reimbursement plan for a pastor's professional expenses which is at
- 53 least 13% of total compensation.

- 1 • Every church is expected to pay World Service/Conference apportionments in full. Any
2 church paying less than 100% will be expected to increase the amount of World
3 Service/Conference apportionments by not less than 10% per year while receiving assistance.
4 • Pay the Pastor's health insurance and pension direct billing per the policy of the Annual
5 Conference.
6 • Failure to comply with any of these conditions must be explained in writing by the district
7 superintendent.
- 8 B. Support from the Equitable Compensation Commission shall not exceed 50% of the approved
9 Minimum Compensation amount. This maximum funding shall be reduced by the percent of
10 World Service/General Church apportionments not paid by the charge for the immediate prior
11 year.
- 12 C. Requests for equitable compensation must be submitted in accordance with the following
13 standardized format set by the Commission:
- 14 • A cover letter from the district superintendent, which shall explain any extenuating
15 circumstances, especially for requests beyond the 3 year maximum policy and/or for charges
16 that are declining in membership. The cover letter shall have four (4) attachments:
- 17 ○ Request form initialed by the PPRC Chair(s) and signed by the Finance Chair(s),
18 pastor and DS.
- 19 ○ A copy of the charge's previous year's financial statement to include revenue and
20 expenses and all funds on hand at the end of the year.
- 21 ○ A brief summary of the charge's vision or goals for the forthcoming year.
- 22 ○ A copy of the upcoming year's budget.
- 23 • Requests that are not submitted in accordance with the above instructions will be returned for
24 proper completion.
- 25
- 26 D. Support in the amount scheduled or a lesser amount may be granted to a charge that fails to
27 comply with any of the above only when approved by two thirds of the Commission at a regular
28 meeting.
- 29

30 ACCOUNTABLE REIMBURSEMENT PLAN

31 The Accountable Reimbursement Plan is the preferred method by which the expenses that the United
32 Methodist Pastor incurs in providing ministerial services are reimbursed. Every United Methodist Church in
33 the conference is urged to include an amount in its annual budget of at least 13% of compensation (line 10
34 on the 2023 compensation form), as a budget item for these expenses. The actual amount adopted should
35 be recommended to the charge conference by the Pastor/Staff Parish Relations Committee after review of
36 the need. The amount may be higher than 13% of compensation. The amount budgeted should be included
37 on the compensation form on line 25.

38 When this compensation form is adopted at charge conference, the policies relating to the accountable
39 reimbursement plan in this report are being adopted for the pastor.

40 The church pastor whose compensation and expenses are adopted on the Pastor Compensation Form by
41 the charge or church conference, will be reimbursed for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred
42 in the performance of their responsibilities when they substantiate the amount, business purpose, date,
43 and place of the expense. This substantiation must be provided to the chair of the pastor parish relations
44 committee (or church treasurer) within sixty (60) days of incurring the expense. The individual must return
45 to the church any amounts received in excess of the substantiated expenses within one hundred twenty
46 (120) days of receipt.

47 The scope of the ministerial duties included in this policy involve all the duties described in the 2016 Book
48 of Discipline and the policies of the Annual Conference, including participation in the Connectional
49 Ministries of The United Methodist Church.

50 Expenses that are normally considered to be reasonable and necessary for a United Methodist Pastor include:

- 51 • Travel expenses reimbursed at the standard federal mileage rate, parking and tolls
52 • Office supplies and postage
53 • Office equipment, computer and software

- 1 • Books, subscriptions and periodicals such as journals
- 2 • Professional dues
- 3 • Religious materials, vestments and business gifts
- 4 • Continuing education and seminars
- 5 • Entertainment required for church business
- 6 • Travel fares, lodging, and meals while on business for the church (including annual conference
- 7 and other connectional meetings)
- 8 • Mobile telephone to the extent that it is used for business purposes
- 9 • Other reasonable and customary business expenses (as approved by the committee on staff
- 10 parish relations and/or committee on finance)

11

12 Property purchased under an accountable reimbursement plan is the property of the church that provided
 13 the reimbursement. This is not an issue for most items because they are either of negligible value after
 14 utilization, or of such a personal nature such as robes that the item is not appropriate to be left at the
 15 church when the pastor moves. The one item which becomes an issue is a computer purchased under an
 16 accountable reimbursement plan for the business usage of the pastor. When a pastor moves from one
 17 appointment to another, the church will give the pastor the option of purchasing the computer at its current
 18 fair market value. If the church gives the computer to the pastor, then the gift is a taxable event and the
 19 fair market value should be reported by the pastor as taxable income.

20 No pastor should be reimbursed more than ½ of the total amount budgeted prior to annual conference
 21 each year.

22 Any reimbursement of expenses from other sources should be reported by the pastor and reduce the
 23 amount of the expense subject to reimbursement. In no case should the pastor receive total reimbursement
 24 for all sources that exceeds the actual cost and/or the IRS approved rate for reimbursement of mileage.

25 The expenses of attendance at annual conference for a pastor who is moving should be reimbursed from
 26 the Accountable Reimbursement Plan of the Charge to which the pastor is appointed prior to the annual
 27 conference session.

28 In order to maintain confidentiality of pastoral calls, it is permissible for the pastor to report a pastoral call
 29 in general terms without mentioning the name of the person or persons called upon, or the nature of the
 30 call.

31 The church will not report any properly substantiated reimbursement payments as income on any Form W-
 32 2.

33 This policy is applicable to clergy members of the annual conference. Churches with lay employees should
 34 consider adopting a policy that is applicable to lay staff.

35

36 VACATION AND CONTINUING EDUCATION

37 A. The Annual Conference recommends that each minister in the Conference be allowed the
 38 following minimum vacation time: (all weeks include Sundays)

39 0-7 years under Episcopal appointment

40 (exclusive of time spent in school): two weeks

41 8-12 years of service: three weeks

42 13+ years of service: four weeks

43 The Commission recommends that each local church and pastor take seriously the continuing education
 44 policies adopted by the General Conference which are set forth in ¶1350 of the 2016 Book of Discipline and
 45 are printed below for the convenience of the Annual Conference.

46 ¶ 350. “*Continuing Education and Spiritual Growth*—1. Throughout their careers, clergy
 47 shall engage in continuing education for ministry, professional development, and spiritual
 48 formation and growth in order to lead the church in fulfilling the mission of making disciples
 49 for Jesus Christ. This shall include carefully developed personal programs of study
 50 augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational and spiritual growth
 51 activities.”

- 1 B. In most cases, the clergy member's continuing formation and spiritual growth program should
 2 allow for such leaves at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each
 3 quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacations and shall be
 4 planned in consultation with their charges or other agencies to which they are appointed, as well as
 5 the Bishop, district superintendent, and annual conference Continuing Education Committee.
 6

7 ARREARAGE POLICIES

- 8 1. In the event that the local church treasurer becomes aware that the church will be unable to
 9 provide to the pastor full payment of a regularly scheduled payroll or housing allowance
 10 installment, or to remit to the Conference Treasurer full payment for regular direct billed benefit
 11 payments such as pension and health care, the church treasurer shall immediately notify both
 12 verbally (within 24 hours) and in writing (within 3 days) the Pastor, the Lay Leader, and the
 13 Chairs of S/PPRC, Finance, Trustees, and the Administrative/Church Council of the impending
 14 arrearage. Upon receipt of such notice, the Chair of S/PPRC and/or the Pastor shall immediately
 15 (within 3 days) notify the district superintendent of the impending arrearage. It is the pastor's
 16 responsibility to keep copies of all such written notifications, and to provide additional written
 17 confirmation to the district superintendent when an arrearage has taken place. Failure to document
 18 salary or benefit arrearages may result in a loss of compensation and/or forfeiture of pension and
 19 benefits.
 20
 21 2. Upon receipt of notice of a pending arrearage, the Chair of S/PPRC shall immediately (within 24
 22 hours) call a meeting of the Pastor, Lay Leader, and Chairs of Finance, Trustees, and the
 23 Administrative/Church Council to discuss the financial situation and seek remedies to prevent an
 24 arrearage from occurring.

25 Such remedies might include:

- 26 a. drawing from invested funds, including short-term borrowing from designated funds,
 27 b. an emergency appeal for special giving from the congregation,
 28 c. emergency grants or loans from the district or conference.

29 According to the 2016 Book of Discipline ¶624, such remedies cannot include a reduction in the Pastor's
 30 compensation until the beginning of the next Conference year.

- 31 3. If, after consultation among the Lay Leader and Chairs of S/PPRC, Finance, Trustees, and the
 32 Administrative/Church Council, it becomes apparent that the church may be facing a long term
 33 financial crisis, the Chair of S/PPRC shall notify in writing the pastor and superintendent that:
 34 a. an Equitable Compensation Subsidy Grant may be necessary to maintain compensation
 35 for the remainder of the Conference year, or
 36 b. a change in pastoral compensation or appointment may be necessary at the beginning of
 37 the following Conference year.
 38
 39 4. If the local church becomes delinquent in the pastor's compensation (i.e. more than 30 days
 40 delinquent), then the district superintendent shall notify the Commission on Equitable
 41 Compensation (CEC), which on its own initiative may do any or all of the following, but not
 42 limited to:
 43 a. sending a representative from CEC to meet with the local church and pastor to seek
 44 resolution of the issue,
 45 b. developing with the local church a payment plan so that the pastor receives full payment
 46 of compensation by the end of the conference year. The district superintendent shall be
 47 invited to participate in this process.
 48 5. If a pastor appointed to a local church is already receiving a subsidy grant from the Commission
 49 on Equitable Compensation, the Commission may also:
 50 a. examine the original subsidy grant application to determine if the amount requested to
 51 meet minimum compensation was reduced,
 52 b. require an outside audit of all church funds in compliance with GCFA Guidelines,
 53 c. notify the district superintendent of its findings and recommendations in writing.
 54

6. If a local church becomes delinquent in the payment of the pastor's direct billed pension and benefits (i.e. more than 30 days delinquent), then the Conference Treasurer shall notify the Conference Benefits Officer, the district superintendent, and the Commission on Equitable Compensation. On behalf of the conference the benefits officer and/or district superintendent shall develop a written payment plan with the local church so that the conference receives full payment of pension and benefits by the end of the conference year.
 7. ¶2543.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline makes clear that no real property on which a church building or parsonage is located shall be mortgaged to pay for the current or budgeted expenses of a local church (including arrearages), nor shall the principal proceeds of a sale of any such property be so used. This provision shall apply alike to unincorporated and incorporated local churches.
 8. In extreme and unresolved circumstances, the local church and/or pastor may petition a session of the annual conference, following proper procedures, for assistance in payment of the arrearage not to exceed the minimum conference compensation standards. However, it is the responsibility of the local church to provide a minimum compensation for its appointed clergy.
 9. It is the responsibility of the pastor to provide evidence of an arrearage by providing documentation such as: Treasurer's Reports, Charge Conference reports of adopted salary and compensation, check stubs, W-2 forms, and a Certification of Payment Form signed by the Pastor, S/PRC Chair, Trustee Chair, Treasurer, and Administrative/Church Council Chair.
 10. The statute of limitations for filing a claim for funds from the Annual Conference (i.e. notification to the district superintendent of the arrearage) for any salary arrearage is one year from the date of the initial arrearage.
- Once an appointment ends, the pastor no longer has claim on the local church for compensation funds.
11. An administrative complaint may be filed against a pastor who fails to report an arrearage according to the time lines established in this policy.

HOUSING STANDARDS

The itinerant system remains today as central to Methodism as it was in the days of the circuit riders. However, alongside itinerancy, the Church demands that clergy assume traditional roles as well, such as becoming resident pastors and responsible citizens in the community in which they serve. With the expectation of residency has come the need to provide adequate housing for clergy and their families.

In order to meet these felt needs, and to call men and women to a dedicated ministry, the church must provide living conditions that establish an adequate base from which to operate; this is to be done through a parsonage or a housing allowance. It is the privilege and responsibility of the members of the congregation to make every effort to provide the physical setting which will give the pastor and family the maximum comfort and convenience. This enables that the energies of the pastor may be more concentrated on their task and willing service in the Church of God. Because the parsonage, when provided, like the church buildings reflects upon the congregation and the pastor, it should be in such condition that all concerned can be justifiably proud. Housing standards for the Annual Conference are as follows:

STANDARDS

- A. Location:** Housing should be located in a setting that will afford the pastor's family comfort, safety and convenience. Consideration should be given to the area in which the congregation resides. If a parsonage is provided, reasonable privacy can best be obtained by placing it in an area other than adjacent to the church.
- B. Parsonage Structure:** No less than the following will be required.
 1. Three (3) bedrooms with adequate closet space
 2. Two (2) baths
 3. Living area
 4. Dining area

- 1 5. Kitchen to include a 4 element range & oven, refrigerator with freezer compartment
- 2 6. Storage space well distributed throughout the house
- 3 7. Laundry area with washer and dryer
- 4 8. Garage or carport space for two cars
- 5 9. Safe outdoor play area for children
- 6 10. Water heater
- 7 11. Central air and heat
- 8 12. Window coverings
- 9 13. Floor coverings
- 10 **C. Parsonage Furnishings:** The pastor is responsible for providing all furnishings other than those
- 11 set out in (B) Structure.

- 12
- 13 **D. Gifts:**
- 14 1. A gift of furniture or furnishings by a member of the charge shall be clearly designated as a
- 15 gift to the clergy family or a gift for use in the parsonage.
- 16
- 17 2. Whether a clergy family will use any past or present gifts (furnishings) designated for use in
- 18 the parsonage shall be entirely at the discretion of the clergy person or family.
- 19
- 20 3. Any furniture or furnishings donated for use in parsonage and not used by the clergy family
- 21 occupying the parsonage shall be stored or disposed of at the expense of the church.
- 22
- 23 4. All gifts to the parsonage must be approved by the parsonage committee.
- 24

- 25 **E. Housing Allowances:** When the housing allowance option is taken by a charge, the housing
- 26 allowance shall be at least equal to the fair market rental value of the community for a house that
- 27 meets the minimum housing standards.

- 28 **F. Safety:** The home shall be equipped with the following safety features:
- 29 1. Fire extinguisher in kitchen with yearly inspection
- 30 2. Outdoor lighting
- 31 3. Deadbolt locks
- 32 4. Smoke and/or heat detectors
- 33 5. Carbon Monoxide detectors

- 34 **G. Accessibility:** ¶2544 of the 2016 Book of Discipline states that all newly acquired or remodeled
- 35 parsonage facilities shall:
- 36 1. Comply with local building, fire and accessibility codes.
- 37 2. Provide on the ground-floor level:
 - 38 a. One room that can be used as a bedroom by a person with a disability;
 - 39 b. A fully accessible bathroom.

40 It is understood that existing parsonages that are not rented facilities are grandfathered regarding full

41 accessibility. Each church shall make reasonable efforts to provide access and safety in those parsonages that

42 will not be involved in major remodeling. This will help enable open itinerancy of all pastors and the comfort

43 of parsonage families.

- 44 **H. Utilities:** The local church shall pay for the cost of all utilities. (IRS defines utilities as: gas, electric,
- 45 water, heating oil, garbage collection, residential telephone service, cell phone service, cable
- 46 television, and Internet service.) Rio Texas Conference considers cell phone service as an
- 47 Accountable Reimbursement Plan item and not a utility

- 48 **I. Parsonage Maintenance:**
- 49 1. Upkeep and repair is Church's responsibility:
 - 50 a. The church should annually include in the budget an amount for parsonage repairs. An annual
 - 51 budget item will enable the Trustees and Parsonage Committee to have a consistent, rather
 - 52 than a haphazard, program of maintenance and improvement that will be less costly in the
 - 53 long run.

- 1 b. Painting of inside and outside of parsonage should be done as often as necessary.
 2 c. All appliances and equipment should be checked and adjusted regularly.
 3 2. Parsonage families are responsible for repairs as needed for damages done by members of
 4 parsonage family or pets.
 5 3. Decoration: The church should keep both the interior and exterior of the parsonage in such
 6 state of decoration as to preserve its physical condition and aesthetic value. Decorating should
 7 be scheduled with the pastor to provide for the convenience of the family.
 8 4. Privacy: The parsonage is the pastor's home. All inspections and repairs should be scheduled
 9 with the pastor to provide for the convenience of the family, including the annual review of
 10 the parsonage.

11 **J. Parsonage Insurance:**

- 12 1. The parsonage will be covered under the conference insurance plan.
 13 2. It is the responsibility of the pastor to insure personal property belonging to the pastor or family.
 14

15 **K. Records of parsonage warranties and repairs:** The parsonage should have a book or folder, which
 16 contains all warranties and instruction books for appliances and equipment owned by the church.
 17 The folder should also contain a log of purchases and repairs.
 18

19 **L. Ownership of Parsonage:**

- 20 1. May be owned by a local church, charge or district, and the deed must include an appropriate trust
 21 clause as set forth in ¶2503 of *the* 2016 Book of Discipline.
 22 2. May be leased or rented by a church, charge or district.

23 **M. Clergy Couples:** General Conference Action provides housing is not compensation for pastors
 24 appointed to churches in The United Methodist Church. When two pastors who are married to each
 25 other are appointed to neighboring charges where it is reasonable for them to live in the same
 26 parsonage, neither pastor is entitled to a housing allowance or rent from the unused parsonage.
 27 However, this situation may be considered during the setting of compensation of the pastor.
 28

29 **N. Parsonage Inventory:** The Parsonage Committee and the Trustees shall maintain an inventory of the
 30 church owned equipment and furnishings and, where possible, keep a video record. This inventory
 31 will include any gifts to the parsonage, which may or may not be used by the pastor's family. The
 32 inventory should be updated to show the disposition of these gifts when they are not used in the
 33 parsonage. The inventory should be reviewed annually.
 34

35 **O. Parsonage Procedures at Pastoral change:**

- 36 1. When moving from the parsonage the pastor shall contact the Parsonage Committee, (or S/PPRC
 37 or Trustees if these committees should have the task in that particular charge) to arrange a time
 38 to review the parsonage. Care should be taken at this time to insure that the parsonage is left in
 39 order as regards repair and cleanliness.
 40 2. An inventory of the church owned equipment and furnishings should be carefully checked.
 41 3. The same committee(s) shall arrange with the incoming pastor for a time to review the parsonage
 42 for cleanliness, repair and the inventory of the church owned equipment and furnishings.
 43 4. Any grievous disregard to the proper cleanliness, repair or improper inventory shall be reported
 44 immediately to the district superintendent.
 45 5. It is recommended that pastoral families move out of the former parsonage two days prior to the
 46 official moving date. The sending church should pay for two nights in a motel. This would give
 47 the sending church at least a day and a half to do any repairs, painting, etc., in the parsonage
 48 before the new pastor moves in.

49 **P. Annual Parsonage Review:** Each year a review to assure proper maintenance shall be made by the
 50 pastor with the chairperson of the appropriate committee(s) (¶258.2g(16) and 2533.4 of *the* 2016
 51 Book of Discipline). This review will be completed on a standardized form furnished by the district
 52 superintendent and will be submitted as a charge conference report.

- 1
2 **Q.** Exceptions to these policies are allowed for associate pastors, multiple point charges, and
3 part-time pastors with concurrence by all parties.
4

5 **MOVING EXPENSE POLICY**

- 6 **A. Eligibility:** Clergy moving to a full-time appointment to a conference charge and clergy moving
7 to an appointment where the salary is paid directly by the conference (district superintendents
8 and conference staff) are eligible.

9 Clergy entering the retired status or going on disability leave from appointments are eligible.
10

- 11 **B. IRS Tax Reform Act:** Effective January 1, 2018, The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act made moving
12 expenses subject to IRS income tax to the individual who is moving. Because clergy move
13 regularly to fill appointments, this change has a tangible impact.

- 14 1. Moving expense payments and reimbursement made directly from the Rio Texas Conference to a
15 moving company on your behalf or reimbursed to you must now be included in gross income,
16 creating a tax liability.
17 2. In addition, these payments are now subject to Social Security and Medicare taxes.
18 3. Clergy are responsible for reporting these taxable amounts and should plan to make additional tax
19 payments to cover the liability. This policy is expected to last through December 31, 2025.
20 4. All clergy who move after 2017, whether paid directly to the moving company or reimbursed
21 under the Conference Moving Expense Policy will receive a Form 1099-Misc from the
22 Conference the following year.

23 **C. Moving Procedures**

24 **1. General Process:**

25 Upon notification from the Bishop that a Clergy will move, they shall obtain estimates from
26 two moving companies. One estimate must come from a list of movers provided by the
27 Commission on Equitable Compensation & Moving Expenses, or with whom the Commission
28 has negotiated a contract. If two bids are not feasible, contact the Commission and an exception
29 can be made.
30

31
32 As soon as possible after notification of move, Clergy shall send estimates for review to the
33 Commission via transmittal form. Movers should be listed in order of preference. When the
34 clergy's first choice is for a mover that is the more expensive alternative, the Commission may
35 limit payment to the amount of the lower bid.
36

37 The pastor should specify to the movers that the bids should include a visual inspection, and
38 that the bid should include the words "guaranteed price not to exceed".

39 When a pastor is moving without the assistance of professional movers, an estimate of expenses
40 must be provided to the Commission at least three weeks prior to the move.

41 After a move has been completed, clergy will complete the Moving Expense Survey form and
42 send it to the Commission.

43 The Commission verifies that the move is covered by moving policies and addresses any
44 questions to the clergy.

45 The Commission will then notify the clergy of approval to proceed.

46 After the move is made, the Conference Treasurer's Office makes payment directly to the
47 moving company upon receipt of the invoice signed by the relocated pastor.

48 It is recommended that pastoral families move out of former parsonages two days prior to their
49 official moving date. The sending church would pay for two nights in a motel. This would
50 give the sending church at least a day and a half to do any repair work, painting, etc. if a new
51 pastor is to move into that parsonage.

If the receiving church needs additional time to perform repairs on their parsonage, then the receiving church is responsible for any additional moving expenses incurred, and for the lodging of the arriving clergy family until the parsonage is ready for occupancy.

The Pastor/Staff Parish Committee of each charge which is receiving a new pastor will appoint one of its members to serve as Moving Coordinator who will coordinate the move with the incoming pastor and work to facilitate the easiest and most pleasant move possible. At the introductory meeting between the Pastor/Staff Parish Relations Committee and the new pastor, the Moving Coordinator will be present in order to be introduced to the pastor.

2. Moving Categories

- a. **Local moves** - These are moves where the moving company charges an hourly rate for a move across a city or to a neighboring town. The allowance for such moves will be up to \$1,500 for the move and \$850 for packing.
 - b. **Long distance moves** – All other moves (except self-moves). The allowance for such moves is up to 14,000 pounds, 17,000 pounds for clergy couples.
 - c. **Self-Move** - If the clergy elects to move himself/herself, they must provide at least one professional estimate to the Commission. The actual cost of the move will be reimbursed, up to the amount that would be incurred if professional movers were utilized as defined above.
3. The clergy may apply for reimbursement of the purchase of packing materials, packing supplies, and/or packing services up to a limit of \$850. If using the services of a mover for packing, verify with the mover exactly what services will be provided.
 4. Change of Appointment with no change in location of home – The clergy will be reimbursed up to \$200 to pay the cost of moving professional material.

D. Limitations

1. When a move is from a point outside the annual conference boundaries, the Conference will pay under these policies with a limitation of total cost to \$5,000.
2. Clergy entering retired status, or going on disability leave, will be relocated under these policies up to a maximum of \$5,000.
3. Clergy appointed or transferring to another Conference shall look to the receiving Conference for moving expense reimbursement.
4. No reimbursement will be made except when there is a change of status or appointment that actually results in a move.
5. When either or both members of a clergy couple are involved in a move, the 14,000 pound limitation will be increased to 17,000 pounds to recognize additional professional material. The \$850 packing reimbursement limit applies to the entire move. If two houses are involved on either end of the move, each move qualifies for reimbursement independently. When a move includes more than 17,000 pounds, the amount the Conference pays will be reduced by an amount that is determined to be appropriate by the Commission.
6. In no case shall the Conference pay more than the actual documented expense of any eligible move.
7. There is no reimbursement under this policy for automobile expenses, visits to the new appointment, or food and lodging.
8. Total Payment is limited to:
 - a. Local Move - \$1,500 for moving, \$850 for packing.

- 1 **b.** Long Distance Move – 14,000 pounds, plus up to \$850 for packing materials and/or
- 2 services.
- 3 **c.** Self-Move - The actual cost of the move will be reimbursed, up to the amount that
- 4 would be incurred if professional movers were utilized plus packing materials and or
- 5 services not to exceed \$850 for packing and moving.
- 6 **d.** Charge move with no change in home location - \$200.
- 7 **9.** The Conference will provide for replacement value coverage for household items while in
- 8 transit up to a limit of \$75,000. If the value of your contents is more than \$75,000, you will
- 9 need to secure insurance independently and at your cost.
- 10
- 11 **10.** A \$1,000 deductible on the above insurance applies. If you suffer a loss, you may ask the
- 12 Commission for help with the deductible.
- 13

14 **E. Responsibility of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Moving Expenses**

- 15 **1.** The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Moving Expenses will have the
- 16 responsibility of implementing and administering this policy.
- 17 **2.** If unusual circumstances arise relating to a move, the Commission may vote to grant an
- 18 exception by a 60% majority.
- 19 **3.** The Commission will be the final arbiter of any dispute related to the implementation of this
- 20 policy.
- 21 **4.** The Commission is authorized to enter into contracts with moving companies.
- 22 **5.** The Commission will create and maintain a list of movers who have been responsive to the
- 23 needs of the Conference and the needs of Conference pastors involved in moves.

24 **REPORT VII**

25 **EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICY FOR THE USE OF HISPANIC MINISTRY FUND**

26 ***FOR CONFERENCE ACTION***

- 27 1. The Equitable Compensation Hispanic Ministry Fund shall be used for missional purposes in the
- 28 development and basic compensation of pastors and laity in pastoral leadership engaged in
- 29 Hispanic/Latino ministry within the Rio Texas Conference.
- 30 2. Priority shall be given to full-time or part-time pastors and laity in pastoral leadership engaged in
- 31 Hispanic/Latino ministry in colonias along the U.S./Mexico border and/or in the development of new
- 32 faith communities and new congregations with Hispanic/Latino focus, particularly where there is a
- 33 significant growth in the Hispanic/Latino population and potential for reaching new people for Christ.
- 34 3. Pastors or laity in pastoral leadership receiving these grants shall be administratively linked for support,
- 35 accountability, and financing to an existing, growing, missional congregation or group of local churches
- 36 or district.
- 37 4. The respective district superintendent shall need to show how funding such pastors or laity in pastoral
- 38 leadership is an integral part of the overall district missional strategy, advances specific missional
- 39 district goals, and shall list additional funding sources to support this ministry.
- 40
- 41 5. Grants shall be approved annually and may be renewed for full-time pastors and/or laity in pastoral
- 42 leadership for up to three years or those serving in part-time for up to six years. The Commission
- 43 shall expect that the "sponsoring" congregations or group of churches or district or "stakeholders" shall
- 44 gradually assume the financial support of the specific ministry.
- 45
- 46 6. The grant request shall include:
- 47 a. a ministry action plan

- 1 b. a list of representatives from the "sponsoring congregation(s)" or "stakeholders" who are
- 2 giving support, direction, accountability, and financial support
- 3 c. an annual budget and the sources of income for the ministry
- 4 d. a written recommendation and approval for the request from the district superintendent
- 5 and the district mission strategy entity
- 6
- 7 7. The amount per grant shall be determined on a case by case basis but will seek to be within the
- 8 limits set by the Commission.
- 9 8. Subsequent requests from the same ministry shall require an on time progress report, a detailed
- 10 financial report on expenditures and income, a proportionally less amount requested, the
- 11 recommendation from district superintendent and the district mission strategy committee, a clear
- 12 progress on securing other sources of funding, and other pertinent information that may help the
- 13 Commission assess the ministry.

MEETING EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT

REPORTS

15 All boards and agencies are urged to consider digital meeting options; this allows both economy of travel and
16 increased participation from across the conference. When digital connection is not possible or effective, all
17 boards and agencies are urged to schedule meetings, as far as possible, on dates and places coinciding with other
18 groups in order to affect economy in travel expenses. Travel Expense shall be paid to members going to official
19 in-conference meetings (between Annual Conference Sessions) at the rate of 40¢ per mile. The allowance for
20 meals shall be \$3.00 for breakfast; \$7.00 each for lunch and dinner necessitated by the meetings. Reimbursement
21 of 100% of lodging expenses necessitated by meetings at contracted hotels through the Annual Conference will
22 be made. Those who choose to stay elsewhere will be reimbursed at the lowest contracted rate. The Conference
23 meeting organizer will provide contracted hotel information to participants. Original lodging receipts must
24 accompany the Disbursement Request. These allowances are not to cover full cost at all times, simply to assist in
25 the additional expense of attending meetings.

26 Childcare expenses per meeting day not to exceed \$30.00 for the first child, not to exceed \$20.00 for each
27 additional child, shall be allowed and included in the meeting expense of the board or agency.

28 Travel for duly elected delegates or representatives of the Conference to meetings of other organizations or
29 connectional agencies shall be paid as stated above. However, actual air travel, lodging, and other expenses may
30 be paid if funds are available from the board or agency concerned.

31 When it is necessary to fly to a meeting, flight must be booked at least 14 days prior to the meeting. If flights are
32 not booked 14 days prior to the meeting, the member booking the flight must pay the difference in the cost of
33 the flight. This does not apply in the rare instances when the meeting is an emergency meeting that is not
34 announced prior to 14 days.

35 Each local church is encouraged to undergird the meal, transportation, and lodging expenses of Annual
36 Conference members in attending Annual Conference by adding a minimum of \$100 to the church budget for
37 each lay and clergy delegate. The district superintendents are asked to encourage such support at each Charge
38 Conference.

REPORT I PAST SERVICE RATE 2023 FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

6 The Past Service Rate for 2023 will be **\$710** per year of annuity credit for the Pre-82 Pension Plan. This
7 represents a 3% increase over 2022. This reflects an increase 1% over the 2021 Past Service Rate. The Pre-
8 82 Pension Plan, also known as Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP), is a defined
9 benefit pension plan administered by Wespeth and provides eligible clergy with a pension benefit for their
10 years of ministry with The United Methodist Church before 1982.

REPORT II RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED CLERGY PERSONS OF THE RIO TEXAS CONFERENCE FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

11
12 The Río Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church adopts the following resolutions relating to
13 rental/housing allowances for active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergypersons:
14 WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this
15 Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel
16 (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned,
17 or licensed ministers of the church ("clergy persons");
18
19 WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and this Conference was and is to provide active clergy persons with
20 a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;
21 WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to active, retired, terminated, and disabled clergy persons are
22 considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired, terminated, and disabled clergy
23 persons in consideration of previous active service; and
24 WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the
25 appropriate organization to designate a rental/housing allowance for clergy persons who are or were
26 members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;
27 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension, severance, or disability
28 payments received from plans authorized under The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church
29 (the "Discipline"), which includes all such payments from Wespeth Benefits and Investments, during the
30 years 2022 and 2023 by each active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergy person who is or was a member
31 of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each
32 such clergy person; and that the pension severance, or disability payments to which this rental/housing
33 allowance applies will be any pension, severance, or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds
34 authorized under the Discipline, including such payments from Wespeth Benefits and Investments
35 "Wespeth" and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued
36 under a Wespeth plan, pension, or fund authorized under the Discipline, that result from any service a clergy
37 person rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergy person of this
38 Conference rendered to any local church, annual conferences of the church, general agency of the church,
39 other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the church, or any other
40 employer that employed the clergy person to perform services related to the ministry of the church, or its

1 predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or
 2 fund for such active, retired, or disabled clergy person's pension or disability as part of his or her gross
 3 compensation.

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 12 NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a clergy person's gross income in any year
 13 for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations
 14 hereunder to the least of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the clergy person's
 15 employer or other appropriate body of the church (such as this Conference in the preceding resolutions)
 16 for such year; (2) the amount expended by the clergy person to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3)
 17 the fair rental value of the house, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost
 18 of utilities in such year.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT AND HEALTH BENEFITS COMMITTEE
FOR INFORMATION ONLY

The Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions is dedicated to its mission to care for those who serve in ministry with honor, support, and appreciation. We are thankful to all congregations and members of the annual conference who have remained steadfast in their commitment and support of clergy and lay participant benefits. At the top of concerns are high inflation, market volatility, "catch-up healthcare," and the impact of disaffiliation in our denomination. Current and future retirees have asked questions about the solvency of benefits in the midst of denominational restructure. Wespath is providing resources, including an FAQ and responding to these questions regarding benefits. The financial position and goal of the Board of Pensions continues to be one of overall stability regarding benefits and plan assets. The Board continues to be in strategic partnership with Wespath in the administration of pension, welfare, health and ancillary benefits to ensure our clergy, lay participants, and churches have the resources and support valued by The United Methodist Church. Moreover, Wespath continues to provide guidance in legislation, actuarial services, and denominational policy.

For 2023, a 3% increase in the Pre-82 Past Service Rate (PSR) is proposed for conference action which is the largest increase in several years. As of January 1, 2022, the *Pre-82* pension plan, the *Ministerial Pension Plan* annuities (MPP), and *Clergy Retirement Security Plan* (CRSP-DB) plan are currently fully funded with no additional liabilities expected in 2022 and 2023. We continue to monitor market volatility to maintain a long-term sustainable asset plan to meet benefit liabilities for beneficiaries. With the postponement General Conference to 2024, the proposed pension legislation by Wespath for the new *Compass* Defined Contribution (DC) plan has been delayed for consideration along with the previously anticipated potential of DC plan cost savings. If adopted in 2024, the *Compass* Plan's earliest implementation is likely 2026, which would reduce congregational pension costs from the current Defined Benefit (DB) hybrid plan.

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8 Oversight of the DB pension plan requires strategic oversight and planning decades into the future as
9 funding levels are subject to fluctuations. Several factors impact funding status including market volatility,
10 legislation, increases in the Past Service Rate, compliance, and changes in actuarial assumptions. Most
11 recently, the Board engaged a 20-year actuarial study for our pension plans to assist in the planning of Pre-
12 82 PSR increases and develop a reserve plan to maintain stability, weather economic cycles and meet any
13 future liabilities to ensure all DB benefit plans are funded for beneficiaries.
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17 ***Health Benefits***

18 HealthFlex plan participants continue to engage in the multi-plan model allowing greater flexibility in
19 choosing a plan combination that fits each participant's needs. Current concerns in healthcare include
20 higher inflation, higher utilization due to "catch-up" care, claims for long COVID, extremely high-cost genetic
21 and cellular drug therapies, and inflation in healthcare pricing. There were no significant changes to the
22 HealthFlex plans in 2022 and Wespeth does not anticipate making any plan design changes for 2023. We
23 thank all participants for taking important steps to maintain good health and using benefits appropriately.
24
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26

- 27 ■ 2021 ended with a claims ratio of 102.4% compared to 108.2% in 2020 and 82% in 2019. Historically,
28 our target is between an 80% loss ratio up to the plan/claims funding level.
- 29
- 30 ■ The 2023 rates renewal includes a 6.1% average increase across medical plans and a 6.5% average
31 increase for the dental plans which is in line with national medical plan trends. No increases were
32 announced for the vision plans.
- 33
- 34 ■ The CDHP continues to have the highest claims utilization from 2020 to 2021, ending at a 148% loss
35 ratio despite a decrease in participants. Following is the PPO at a 110% loss ratio and best performing
36 HDHP at 77%.

37 ***Behavioral Health Initiatives***

38 In response to the annual clergy survey and new challenges brought upon by the pandemic, Wespeth has
39 greatly enhanced mental health initiatives in 2022. We are supportive of our participants' mental,
40 emotional, and behavioral health as an imperative to ministry and wellbeing. This includes the expansion
41 of care with virtual visits which also enhanced access to providers in underserved geographies. These
42 initiatives include:

- 43 ■ *Mental Health First Aid* – A new virtual webinar training program open to all of the UMC intending to
44 teach attendees to identify and understand mental health challenges with empathy and without
45 judgment. In addition to learning to help others, attendees will learn how to accept and understand
46 their own mental health needs without embarrassment or shame.
- 47
- 48 ■ *EAP provided by Optum Health* - The Optum® Live and Work Well EAP can be accessed through the
49 Virgin Pulse app, phone, and in-person by participants and dependents. HealthFlex provides eight
50 free sessions per issue per family member per year
51 .
- 52 ■ *Talkspace* - Provides support from a licensed therapist via text message or video chat.

- 1 ▪ MDLive - Now includes video therapist and psychiatrist visits along with medical consults.
 2 Like so many of you, during the pandemic, we have determined how to effectively hold virtual meetings for
 3 conducting the work assigned to our Board. The staff continued to provide Board members with financial
 4 and administrative insight into their day-to-day operations. I am thankful for our members in their ability
 5 to adapt to a virtual environment as we continue to be diligent in the stewardship of funds for pensions and
 6 health insurance.

9 ***2023 PENSION PLAN CHURCH DIRECT BILLING***

10 Effective January 1, 2023, church direct invoicing by the Conference for clergy participants under
 11 appointment for current active service will include:

- 12 ▪ Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP) Defined Benefit required annual contribution of **\$6,132** for
 13 each eligible full-time clergy invoiced monthly.
 14
 15 ▪ Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP) Defined required contribution of **3%** of Plan Compensation for
 16 each eligible full-time clergy invoiced monthly.
 17 ▪ Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) required contribution **3%** Plan Compensation for each eligible
 18 full-time clergy to a maximum of two times the 2023 denominational average compensation or DAC
 19 of \$76,221 in 2023 invoiced monthly.
 20 ▪ United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP-PT) required Contribution of **9%** for each eligible
 21 part-time clergy (3/4 time appointment or less) invoiced monthly.
 22 ▪ United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) optional contributions as elected by clergy as a
 23 payroll deduction invoiced monthly.
 24 ▪ The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide contributions to eligible legacy churches for full-
 25 time clergy in the CRSP-Defined Benefit Plan, CRSP-Defined Contribution Plan, and the
 26 Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).
 27 ▪ The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide a **9%** contribution to eligible part-time clergy
 28 appointed to a legacy church in the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan UMPIP-PT.

29

30 ***PRE-82 PENSION PLAN***

31 The Pre-82 Pension Plan, also known as Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP), is
 32 a defined benefit pension plan administered by Wespeth and provides eligible clergy with a pension benefit
 33 for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church before 1982. The Pre-82 Pension Plan was
 34 replaced by the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) effective January 1, 1982. One of the responsibilities of the
 35 Board of Pensions is to recommend to the annual Conference the Past Service Rate or (PSR) to clergy for each
 36 year of eligible service in the Pre-82 Pension Plan.

37 As the need to provide adequate clergy pension benefits evolved with establishing the Pre-82 Pension Plan,
 38 contributions were insufficient to provide the benefits required for many participants during years of active
 39 service. Therefore, it became the Conference's responsibility to ensure annual contributions in an
 40 amortization schedule would provide benefit obligations required by the plan. Each Conference's goal is for
 41 the Pre-82 Pension Plan to be fully funded until all benefit obligations have been met. However, the Plan's
 42 assets are not fixed with the potential of additional liabilities due to market volatility, Wespeth policies, and
 43 the number of eligible beneficiaries. Further, any increase in the Past Service Rate (PSR) adopted by the
 44 Conference also increases the plan's liabilities. Any change in the PSR also increases the Plan's liabilities and
 45 must be funded in the year adopted if necessary in accordance with the Plan asset level and funding
 46 requirements. As of December 31, 2021, no additional Pre-82 liabilities or Advance Contribution for 2023
 47 to fund the Past Service Rate increase is due.

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MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN (MPP)

The Ministerial Pension Plan, also known as Supplement Three to the Clergy Security Retirement Plan (CRSP), provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church from 1982 through 2006. The MPP is an Internal Revenue Code Section 403(b) retirement plan. The Conference is required to fund any liability attributable to MPP annuities due to market fluctuations, mortality/demographic assumptions, and Wespath Plan policies. As of January 1, 2021, actuarial valuation for 2023, for the MPP and CRSP plan, annuities no additional contributions are required in 2021 and 2022 under Wespath's Corridor Funding methodology.

CLERGY SECURITY RETIREMENT PLAN (CRSP)

The current pension plan required for eligible full-time clergy is the Clergy Security Retirement Plan or CRSP administered by Wespath. This plan was effective January 1, 2007, and comprises both a defined contribution (DC) and defined benefit (DB) component.

Defined Contribution (DC) – Provides a defined amount deposited into an active full-time clergyperson's account with monthly contributions. This benefit distributed at retirement is the accumulated amount plus earnings (or losses) in the individual's account. The defined contribution (DC) component of CRSP is 2% of Plan Compensation with a match for participant contributions to the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) – up to 1% of Plan Compensation. Therefore, if a participant contributes at least 1% compensation to UMPIP, the CRSP DC contributions will be 3%.

Defined Benefit (DB) – Provides a specific dollar amount at retirement regardless of market conditions or investment performance. The amount is based on a formula that specifies a monthly retirement benefit to eligible clergy and 70% for eligible contingent annuitants for the remainder of their lives. The CRSP-DB provides a monthly retirement benefit using 1.25% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC) at retirement multiplied by years of service from January 1, 2007, to December 31, 2013. The multiplier is reduced to 1% for years of service beginning January 1, 2014.

Both components are direct billed to each church for eligible full-time clergy. The defined contribution (DC) billing is based on 3% of Plan Compensation. The annual defined benefit (DB) direct billing in 2022 to churches for each clergy appointed to full-time service is \$6,132. The annual defined benefit (DB) direct billing in 2023 to churches for each clergy appointed to full-time service will remain at \$6,132.

The annual DB contribution to Wespath is based on the number of eligible active full-time clergy and clergy on Medical leave with CPP benefits on the actuarial valuation provided by Wespath. The contribution amount due in 2022 for the DB component is \$1,443,250 and \$1,343,309 in 2022. Any clergy serving less than full-time not eligible for the CRSP DB are eligible to participate in the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan with a required church contribution of 9% of Plan Compensation.

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COMPREHENSIVE PROTECTION PLAN (CPP)

The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) is a welfare benefit plan administered by Wespath Benefits and Investments. The CPP includes long-term disability, death and other welfare benefits for eligible full-time clergy. The CPP plan is an Internal Revenue Code 414(e) "church plan" funded by plan sponsor contributions. The CPP required direct billing to churches is 3% of Plan Compensation for eligible full-time clergy up to two times the 2022 denominational average compensation or DAC of \$76,221 in 2023.

UNITED METHODIST PERSONAL INVESTMENT PLAN (UMPIP) FOR LAY AND CLERGY

The United Methodist Investment Plan (UMPIP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) defined contribution retirement savings plan administered by Wespath for clergy and lay employees of The United Methodist Church and affiliated organizations. Eligible participants may make personal contributions through payroll deductions for before-tax, Roth or after-tax contributions in a flat dollar amount or percentage of eligible compensation, up to Internal Revenue Code limits. Churches are encouraged to offer the UMPIP to lay employees and may contact Wespath for additional plan provisions and sponsorship.

Any clergy appointed to a church for less than full-time service is eligible to participate in the UMPIP and receive a required church contribution of 9% of Plan Compensation. Also, all active clergy are encouraged to participate in the UMPIP with personal contributions. For clergy to receive the maximum church-funded pension benefits in the CRSP (DC) Defined Contribution plan of 3%, they will need to contribute a minimum 1% match into the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP).

HEALTHFLEX BENEFITS

The Rio Texas Conference participates in the HealthFlex Plan administered by Wespath Benefits and Investments for eligible full-time clergy and Conference lay employees. The HealthFlex plan is also available to lay employees of churches who have adopted a HealthFlex Salary-Paying Unit Sub-Adoption Agreement meeting the eligibility requirements of the Plan. HealthFlex is an integrated, wellness-driven health program that supports healthier lifestyles. The HealthFlex plan is designed to provide eligible participants with a comprehensive plan including medical, prescription, and wellness benefits. HealthFlex uses incentives as part of its strategy to promote engagement in healthy behaviors and wellness programs. The 2023 strategy continues the focus on rewards both for measuring risks through Blueprint for Wellness Screening and Health Quotient (HQ), Diabetes Prevention program and for taking action toward better health and well-being. Rewards emphasize participating in programs that have shown to have a positive impact on health risk, including health coaching and the Virgin Pulse activity program. In addition, to the HealthFlex wellness benefits, the Conference also provides additional holistic wellness benefits for clergy and Conference lay employees, including spiritual, mental, emotional and physical care components funded by grants from Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas. In 2022 and 2023 the HealthFlex provider will be Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) National Network.

2022-2023 HEALTHFLEX PLAN

To align with the changing health care landscape and significant increases in healthcare costs, the Board of Pensions adopted the HealthFlex multi-plan option effective January 1, 2019. The HealthFlex multi-plan

1 option gives participants a greater choice across several HealthFlex plans with varying plan designs and the
 2 flexibility to choose the coverage that best fits the participant’s health, financial and family needs.

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5 The multi-plan approach encourages greater accountability by participants for health care costs and
 6 utilization while retaining the valued HealthFlex Benefits and wellness opportunities that participants have
 7 come to expect from Wespath.

13 **2023 HEALTHFLEX EXCHANGE INDIVIDUAL PREMIUM CREDIT (PC)**

14 *The 2022 HealthFlex Exchange design includes a non-taxable premium credit (PC) of \$950. The PC is a fixed*
 15 *dollar amount provided to each HealthFlex full-time clergy and Conference lay employee participant.*
 16 *Participants will use the allocated PC amount to select a health plan in the HealthFlex Exchange and pay for*
 17 *some or all premiums for the plan of their choice.*

18

- 19 ■ The 2023 PC amount will be \$950 per month and direct invoiced.
- 20 ■ The PC will appear as a “credit toward purchase” when choosing a HealthFlex plan from all available
 21 HealthFlex Exchange plan options.
- 22 ■ Participants who choose plans costing less than their PC credit amount will “bank” the excess. The
 23 unspent PC balance will then be credited by HealthFlex to the participant’s Health Reimbursement
 24 Account (HRA) or Health Savings Account (HSA), depending on the health plan selected or be used to
 25 offset dependent premiums. The excess annual amount (unspent PC balance) is not credited in a
 26 lump sum; rather it is available on a prorated, monthly basis over the plan year. Internal Revenue

1 Code (IRC) limits for annual HSA contributions will apply. Participants can then use HRA or HSA funds
2 for out of pocket eligible IRS health care expenses.

- 4 ▪ Participants who choose a plan costing more than the PC credit amount, including the cost to cover
5 dependents will contribute the additional amount by a payroll deduction from their church to cover
6 the cost difference between the PC amount they receive and their higher cost for monthly premiums
7 (the participant's share of the premium cost).

8 ***HEALTHFLEX DIRECT INVOICING FOR ALL FULL-TIME CLERGY***

9 To ensure the Plan is efficient and sustainable for the benefit of all participants and churches with clergy
10 appointed full-time, any church where a clergy has chosen to not participate in HealthFlex will continue to
11 be invoiced the PC through direct billing effective January 1, 2019 at the current amount as approved by
12 the Conference.

13 ***HEALTHFLEX TRANSITIONAL GRANT***

14 The Board of Pensions believes that Health Benefits should not be a hindering factor in equipping a
15 congregation with the excellent clergy it needs for ministry. The Board established a grant program in 2019
16 with funds received from churches with non HealthFlex participating clergy to help clergy transition
17 between churches. We recognize that this can be a financial burden for both the church and clergy and
18 believe this assistance will help ease the transition. Upon District Superintendent's approval, the program
19 may provide grants of up to \$5,550 in 2022 and \$5,700 for clergy assistance with six months of health care
20 coverage as part of a clergy's transition to a new church when the sending and receiving church have
21 adopted differing contributions for dependent coverage. Upon eligibility, the grant may also be considered
22 for clergy transitioning to Personal Leave, Sabbatical, Family Leave status to bridge health coverage to
23 another plan.

26 ***FAMILY HEALTH CARE ASSISTANCE GRANT FUND***

27 The Board of Pensions recognizes that affordable health care coverage is an essential component of an
28 attractive employee benefits package. In the current health care environment, it is evident that some
29 clergy's health care family coverage premium payroll deductions make up a significant portion of their
30 salaries. To assist, the Board of Pensions has established a grant fund using the 2016 HealthFlex dividend
31 to assist clergy whose salaries are near the minimum threshold and paying for a significant portion of their
32 salaries as a payroll deduction to provide healthcare for their families (P+ Family Rate). This fund will provide
33 grants to align healthcare costs for clergy with the current P+1 tier cost based on the default plan (C2000).
34 In 2022, the family grant amount is \$628 per month or \$7,536 annual (the difference of the family rate at
35 \$2,234/month and the P+1 rate of \$1,706/month). In 2023, the family grant amount is \$666 per month or
36 \$7,992 annual (the difference of the family rate at \$2,475/month and the P+1 rate of \$1,809/month). These
37 grants require a District Superintendent's approval and application grant request demonstrating need-
38 based eligibility.

41 ***2023 CHURCH HEALTH BENEFITS DIRECT BILLING***

42 In 2023 churches will continue to be invoiced for eligible active clergy participants under full-time
43 appointment and eligible enrolled lay employees:

- 44 ▪ The HealthFlex Premium Credit (PC) for each eligible full-time enrolled clergy or enrolled lay
45 employee.
- 46 ▪ The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide contributions to eligible legacy churches for full-
47 time clergy enrolled in the HealthFlex Plan (individual clergy premium).
- 48 ▪ Additional contributions will be direct invoiced for benefits including any election above the PC, the
49 cost of dependent coverage, Optional Term Life Insurance, HSA personal contributions and the
50 Flexible Benefits Plan funded by payroll deduction

Each eligible active full-time clergy will receive a monthly individual Premium Credit in the HealthFlex plan of \$950 (funded through their Rio Texas Conference church) and will choose from six HealthFlex plan options.

Participants who choose a plan costing more than the PC credit amount or who choose to cover dependents will contribute the additional amount by a payroll deduction from their church to cover the cost difference between the PC amount they receive and their higher cost for monthly premiums (the participant’s share of the premium cost). Covered dependents will be enrolled in the same plan selections chosen by the primary clergy or lay participant.

Lay employees of HealthFlex Church Plan Sponsors do not receive a premium credit, allowing churches to set the employee/employer cost-sharing. The church elects’ cost-sharing and will be billed on plan selections. A church must be a HealthFlex Plan Sponsor to offer HealthFlex to its eligible full-time lay employees. 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2023 DEFAULT PLAN

The HealthFlex exchange is a passive enrollment. Participants who are currently enrolled in the HealthFlex exchange for 2022 will automatically be enrolled in the same medical, dental and vision plans for 2023 if no elections are made during the Annual Election Period. Full-time clergy and Conference lay employees new to the Conference will be enrolled in the following default plans for all of 2023 if no elections are made. All participants are encouraged to annually evaluate their current and anticipated health care needs and enroll in the plan choices that best match their individual requirements.

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HealthFlex Flexible Spending Accounts

Eligible full-time HealthFlex participants may participate in the optional Medical Reimbursement Account (MRA) and Dependent Care Reimbursement Account (DCA) offered as a benefit funded by participant payroll deductions and administered by HealthFlex and HealthEquity.

ANCILLARY BENEFITS

Optional Term Life Insurance

The Conference provides an Optional Term Life Insurance for full-time clergy and Conference lay employees subject to the Prudential Life Insurance Company's underwriting guidelines. Eligible participants may elect group term life coverage as a payroll deduction.

Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA)

1 A Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) is provided by One Exchange for eligible retirees and
2 funded by apportionments. The HRA is based on the stipend amount received by eligible retirees before
3 December 31, 2013. As of January 1, 2022, there are 65 retirees eligible for an HRA. Eligible retirees must
4 be enrolled in a Medicare Supplement or Advantage plan through Via Benefits (formerly One Exchange) to
5 receive the HRA. To provide sustainability of the HRA benefit and not increase conference benefit plan
6 liabilities and apportionments, the HRA is a fixed amount per eligible retiree and does not increase from
7 year to year.

8

9 Per the 2014 Unification Plan policy, the HRA stipend will not be offered to any other retiree not currently
10 receiving an HRA. The HRA provides reimbursement for IRS-eligible health care expenses such as Medicare
11 Part B premiums, Medicare supplement plan premiums, and out-of-pocket expenses such as co-pay and
12 deductibles. To receive HRA funds, eligible retirees must submit a claim form to Via Benefits annually for
13 premium reimbursement or as needed for other IRS-eligible expenses.

10 This year we recommend the following candidates for commissioning as Provisional Elders: Samuel Blanco III, Philip
 11 Bland and Derrick Ouellette; and the following candidates for commissioning as Provisional Deacons: Debra Head and
 12 Rachel Latimer; and the following candidates for full membership and ordination as Deacons: Jo Kretzler, Rebecca
 13 McNitzky and Victoria Schwarz; and as Elders: Aaron Carter and Thomas Johnson.

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23 **¹¹For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give**
 24 **you hope and a future."** Jeremiah 29:11

25 Since our last Annual Conference, the world and our churches have begun to come alive again with activity and
 26 energy. And while we as human beings might long to "go back to normal", we realize that God has plans for a future
 27 that we may not be able to see. In this liminal season, our churches, pastors, students and laity have been faithful
 28 following God as God leads, continuing to be creative and innovative as they reach out to new people for the sake of
 29 Christ. Thanks be to God.

30 **Creating Congregations**

31 The world is changing, and the church needs to look beyond the "traditional" ways of reaching new people for Christ
 32 and the attractational models of only expecting people to come to them. While traditional church starts and multi-
 33 site/satellite church plants are still very important (and we need more of them), they are also expensive and clergy
 34 centric as they start. We have begun teaching and dreaming about newer, more organic and less cost prohibitive
 35 ways to connect with those not attending local congregations like Fresh Expressions, Focused Worship in the
 36 community, and we are exploring ways to train laity and others to gather people in incarnational neighborhood
 37 gatherings.

38 We did not plant a new congregation in 2021. This is the first time in 4 years that there was no appointment to a new
 39 church start. We did have 5 clergy attend the Church Planting Discernment in November with 2 expressing interest
 40 in planting in the future. Two had already begun new worship services at their churches in new spaces. All evidence
 41 of the movement of the Holy Spirit continuing to work and churches ready to reach new people. Join with me in
 42 praying for people being called to planting. Without the planters, we cannot have new churches.

43 I am excited that our 5 new church starts (since 2018) have continued to work and make new connections: **Impacto**
 44 **Comunitario** has moved many of their community ministries into Divine Grace through the partnership with the
 45 four local churches and University UMC. Pastoras : Liliana Padilla, Maribel Vazquez, Laura Dorantes, and Daisy San
 46 Jorge work together for on-line worship, in person worship, serving the community with food distribution, access to

internet and computers, guitar lessons and other enrichment programs, ESL classes, access to laundry, connection to city and community resources and more. **Valley Praise UMC Mc Allen**, under the leadership of Rev. Kevin Hardin, has continued worship online and in person while continuing to innovate, looking for a new space and new means to meet the needs of the community via a coffee shop. At the writing of this report (April 8) they are expecting wonderful Easter attendance. This is the third campus for Valley Praise UMC. Rev. Ray Altman continues to do the deep work of creating intentional faith communities with **New Wineskins** and had expanded his reach during the pandemic with a group in Leander and now creating a group in San Antonio where he and his family relocated. Rev. Altman also is leading clergy cohorts teaching others how to reach deep into their neighborhoods. This cohort work has multiplied the neighborhoods being reached. Rev. Jay Cooper and his team at **Violet Crown City Church** have completed the construction of the physical property of the former Crestview property. The energy and excitement of the worship, preschool, and other ministries and community connections are beautiful! The church officially changed their status from a church start on April 10, 2022 with a renewed charter under the new name. A beautiful legacy given and a faithful use of that gift. Finally, Austin New Church's Hispanic Community **Amor Original** continues under the leadership of Pastor Cesar Soto. Having started in April 2020 they only had on-line worship and meaningful conversations. Now Pastor Soto and his team are working on reaching new people in Austin while maintaining these important and meaningful conversations with those reached in many Central American countries.

Three other churches that are not yet chartered, **The Rock UMC** is very close to moving into their first building! They are expecting to move in by late April, with a series of soft and grand openings. The Rock is perfectly positioned to reach all the new growth at the 1604 / I-10 area. **The Journey UMC**, has moved into their more permanent space and continued to grow. Plans have been made to fully charter in the Fall of 2022. **Windsong UMC** continues to raise funds to complete a building without debt. The pandemic has affected this small but important church. They have a good connection with people in the area, but struggle to grow and meet their financial needs.

Lay and Clergy Leadership Development

Seminary internships have slowed down considerably. With campuses all but closed for much of the fall, relationships will need to be rekindled. We have, however, continued offer a seminary internship with one student from Wesley Theological Seminary, which is a joy.

In November 2021, we completed our second year-long preaching cohorts with an event led by Dr. Wes Allen of Perkins School of Theology. 43 pastors / lay speakers attended the virtual event. 21 pastors in the 2 cohorts (all English and Bilingual) completed their work.

A new Perkins preaching cohort for African American pastors began in September 2021 led by Rev. Zan Holmes and Rev. Edlen Cowley focusing on traditional black preaching and cross-racial/cross cultural preaching. Of the 21 pastors invited, 12 were able to complete the 7 month cohort.

Lay Servant Ministries

Scott Maderer is the Conference Lay Servant Ministry Director and offers this report.

During 2021 the Lay Servant Ministries (LSM) program has continued to find new and create ways to reach out to current and prospective Lay Servants. This year districts and the conference held several successful online trainings for several of the Lay Servant Ministry courses for the first time. Each has had well over 50 attendees who came together for training and to learn from and support each other in their leadership development.

The Book of Discipline recognizes that to have an effective ministry within our conference we must develop and encourage leadership from the laity, and this is the explicit goal of LSM. The current district directors and conference lay director are working together with a focus on: Increasing communication and cooperation across all districts within the conference, building effective tools that we can all utilize, identifying new classes in both online and offline methodology, and encouraging Lay Ministry both in Lay Servants and Certified Lay Ministers to be creative in identifying their own mission fields.

The District Directors continue meeting regularly now via Zoom for a quarterly update so that we can share effective methodology and information about upcoming courses and what we are all trying in our own districts. In this way we are seeing directors share information and learn best practices and encouraging and allowing experimentation and new visions to arise in each district.

Each District continues to hold their own courses including several held via zoom and some held in person. The conference is also continuing to host courses online as well. At the same time, we are looking for what the needs of

1 the laity is and identifying resources from a variety of sources that would fill those needs effectively. The focus is on
2 building effective lay leadership, rather than just getting a “certification.”

3 Within this larger picture we are anticipating an increased need for effective lay leadership within the conference. So,
4 we are attempting to proactively work with those called to unique mission fields to provide the tools and resources that
5 they need to be effective. This includes being more involved in the Certified Lay Ministry program and working closely
6 across districts to effectively use limited resources to provide the needed support, across the entire conference. In this
7 way districts don’t have to reinvent the wheel or provide resources for a limited number of laity while they can still
8 encourage the laity with support and training by working across districts within the full conference.

9 If you are interested in getting involved as a lay servant or just helping outreach out first to your district director of lay
10 servant ministries or the conference director listed below. May God continue to bless and grow the lay leadership
11 across the Rio Texas Conference.

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1 **College / Campus Ministry:**

2 Like our churches, Campus Ministry struggled during the pandemic. As students began attending classes in person,
3 God continued to move and keep our college students connected and growing as disciples of Jesus Christ. The ten
4 Campus Ministries on nine campuses are active. These campuses and leaders are: **UT Austin** – The Texas Wesley
5 (Rev. David McMinn) and University UMC Austin (Megan Otto), **UTSA** via University UMC San Antonio (Sarah Reiter),
6 **SAC and Trinity University** (SA Campus Ministry staff and a new position to be filled), **TLU** via FUMC Seguin (Rev.
7 Melissa Lind), **UTRGV** Wesley Center via FUMC Edinburg (student Interns and Rev. Michelle Vernon), **Texas State** –
8 United Campus Ministry (Rev. Todd Salmi), **U of H Victoria** via FUMC Victoria, (Rev. Amanda Banda) and **Huston-**
9 **Tillotson University** (Rev. Don Brewington).

10 We have been thrilled to offer student internships working directly with the campus ministry on their campus
11 (Huston-Tillotson, UTRGV, and Texas State), and in the summer of 2022, the Board of Ordained Ministry is funding 4
12 students from Huston-Tilltson to do Pastoral Internships at local congregations in Austin. This is yet another way to
13 encourage vocational ministry in the future, especially with students of color.

14 Rev. Lizzie Wright and Rev. Wes Cain have done good work co- coordinating the campus ministries along with Rev.
15 Karen Horan in the conference center. Rev. Wes Cain will be stepping down, and a new co-coordinator will be needed.
16 There is still a need for individual churches to connect with students and campus ministries in your area. Please
17 prayerfully consider how your church can support this important work. A video will be created and shared at Annual
18 Conference to celebrate this ministry.

19 TUMCA and Huston-Tillotson scholarships are also supported apportionments and a part of our College Ministry
20 budget.

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25 **Vitalizing Congregations:**

26 Most of the work of vitalization has been via larger learning events and some cohort work, we found that many of
27 our churches were simply needing to focus on re-opening their space and finding their feet again. While there were
28 on-line events on Fresh Expressions with Luke Bryan in the fall, as of early April, most churches are looking to the
29 summer and fall to start new ministries. New People New Places Grants continue in 2022 and we expect a larger
30 request for funds in the fall. Since July 1 2021-Dec. 2021, 14 churches were granted \$70,000 for technology and
31 outreach to reach new people for Christ. Of these 14 churches who received funds: 3 were Hispanic congregations,
32 4 were historically Black congregations and 2 were Campus Ministries.

33 What a joy to partner with this many churches as they reach new people to become more vital in their area! These
34 grants are offered 3 times a year, we pray the funds can be used to the fullest.

42 The Texas United Methodist College Association exists to advocate for our Texas Methodist college students
43 attending one of the six United Methodist institutions of higher learning in Texas. Gifts received from our Annual
44 Conference partners are passed along to deserving students through the Texas Methodist Scholarship Program.
45 During the 2021-22 year, we awarded over \$200,000 in scholarship support through this program to students at
46 Huston-Tillotson University, McMurry University, Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University, Texas
47 Wesleyan University and Wiley College. These scholarships are given on the basis of financial need and oftentimes
48 make the difference in a student attending college and persisting to graduation. The disruption caused by the

1 pandemic has put even greater financial pressure on our Methodist colleges and, especially, their students. This has
2 made the Texas Methodist Scholarship Program all the more critically important.

3 The students receiving support through the Texas Methodist Scholarship Program represent a wide range of
4 vocational interests. Attending United Methodist institutions, they have the opportunity to develop their faith and
5 find a career path leading to a life of service and contribution to the greater good. It is our hope that in supporting
6 our Methodist students at our own institutions that they will contribute to the growth of the Church, whether that
7 be as an ordained minister, in another church-related role or as active laity. By encouraging their exploration of faith,
8 we know that some will enter the ministry – whether that be a direct path out of college to seminary or as second-
9 career ministers, which is increasingly the norm.

10 On behalf of the Texas Methodist Scholarship recipients, we would like to express our appreciation to the Rio Texas

OFFICE OF CONNECTIONAL MINISTRIES

17 The Office of Connectional Ministries has continued to expand in its resource capacities for the Rio Texas Conference
18 and United Methodist connection since I began my appointment as Director of this office five years ago. As Director,
19 I have found it important to continue to listen, discern, and build relationships within our annual conference as well
20 as with our ecumenical partners and neighbors. This office continues to offer a diverse number of resources:

21 As a **Certified Simplified Accountable Board Structure (SAS) Coach**, I have had the opportunity to train and/or coach
22 many leadership boards of various size local congregations. I am committed to continuing to offer this training and
23 the resources provided on an on-going basis. In addition, several of these local congregations also wished coaching
24 on creation of their church's Vision, Mission, Critical Themes and objectives to more clearly focus their efforts.

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28 In 2018, this office acquired the supervisory oversight of the **Rio Texas Disaster/Recovery Team**. As we approach the
29 2022 Hurricane Season and the five-year anniversary of Hurricane Harvey, and although we do not wish for another
30 natural disaster of Harvey's magnitude, the Connectional Ministries office along with our conference team and
31 partners are well-prepared should another natural disaster necessitate calling the RTX Disaster/Recover team into
32 action.

33 This office strategically plans small and large-scale events that support, educate, and provide important and timely
34 resources for our clergy, laity, United Methodist organizations, local congregations, and their mission fields. **Clergy**
35 **Convocation** – Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic (CDC and local government recommendations i.e., social distancing
36 and reduced number of those who could gather) this year's in-person Convocation/Retreat was the first time many
37 of our clergy have gathered in one place for worship, fellowship and learning since 2019. This year's convocation,
38 attended by over 200 clergy, held at Mo Ranch, in Hunt, Texas, was designed to offer a time of respite, retreat and
39 recharge through various worship, fellowship, community dining, and campfire conversations as well as many
40 optional activities. The clergy convocation planning team and Mo-Ranch set the bar high! Our clergy left spiritually
41 renewed and physically/mentally rested as they entered the Lenten Season and the journey through Holy Week to
42 Easter.

43 **Annual Conference (AC) Meeting** – As with the Clergy Convocation, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, AC McAllen 2022
44 (originally scheduled to be in McAllen in 2021) will be the first fully in-person Annual Conference gathering since June
45 of 2019. The Rio Grande Valley's clergy and laity is excited and looking forward to welcoming delegates and guests
46 to the McAllen Convention Center for 2022 AC! In addition to business to be conducted, worship, reporting and
47 celebration, delegates, and guests, as way to experience the unique mission, ministries, and complexities of ministry
48 in the Valley, will have the opportunity to participate in a wide range of Learn and Serve Missional Opportunities.
49 The 2022 AC will conclude with a celebration of those who will be commissioned and ordained.

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Equity Budgeting - Assessing with this year's annual conference the idea of applying an equity lens to our expenditures. Baselining at AC McAllen 2022 how the expenditures benefit communities of color and low-income communities. Discovering, if possible, can an equity lens be applied to future expenditures.

Nominations – The Rio Texas Annual Conference is deeply committed to excellence and diversity in leadership. Therefore, the goal of the application-based Leadership Pool first introduced early in 2020, is to build a pool of qualified, spiritually grounded, committed leaders who through the conference's nomination process will be matched with all leadership needs of the annual conference. As a note, due to the postponement of the General Conference in 2020 and most recently the announcement GC postponement until 2024, many of the committees will retain the current members. If there are vacancies the protocols per BOD and Standing Rules will be followed and vacancies will be filled through RTX Committee on Nominations. In the meantime, the leadership pool nomination process, available on the conference website will remain open and will be utilized to fill any vacancies that cannot wait until 2024. Further questions on this process can be addressed to the Office of Connectional Ministries Rio Texas Conference.

When the Rio Texas Conference was formed, the unification documents stated "The new conference is organized through structure and processes to focus on the mission field. The Uniting Table will coordinate mission and ministry in the Rio Texas Conference. The Uniting Table is intended to be inclusive and collaborative, include diverse voices, and promote unity and reconciliation in the conference and the community."  17 we missed. I am inspired by the creativity, courage, and commitment of our faith formation leaders. It is a joy and an
 18 honor to serve alongside each of you as we discover ways to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of
 19 the world.

20 Listed below are the many ministries created and offered in response to consistent and intentional research and
 21 discernment. I am grateful for the teams of hardworking individuals who make these ministries possible. I do not do
 22 this work alone and I give thanks for all the leaders God has gifted who come alongside me and our conference in
 23 these efforts.

Connect

26 Recognizing the need for connection, support, prayer, and accountability Connect was born during the early
 27 pandemic. This ministry continues to change and thrive as ministry leaders seek connection, support, and resources.
 28 In 2021 I sent out over 300 e-mails to ministry leaders in our conference inviting connections through zoom calls,
 29 coffee meetings, and lunches. What a gift it was to connect, listen, and learn as ministry leaders across our conference
 30 shared their celebrations, their struggles, and their hopes. My call was renewed as I listened to stories of courage,
 31 vulnerability, and faithfulness. The Connect ministry provides monthly opportunities for leaders in faith formation to
 32 gather to connect, discuss, share best practices, and pray with and for one another. Connect also included a monthly
 33 virtual leader's book club in partnership with the Michigan conference, individual and group consulting, as well as
 34 coaching and opportunities for discernment and support. Upcoming meetings and offerings can be found at:

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Faith Formation Leadership Academy

39 Faith Formation Leadership Academy equips faith formation leaders in United Methodist Churches as they guide and
 40 support Christ's disciples in the work of loving God and loving neighbor. This digital learning space offers online
 41 courses, continuing education units, and a three-year faith formation certification. I am grateful for Rev. Jessica
 42 Petersen's leadership on the FFLA ministry team. In the last Annual Conference year, we offered: *Effective Volunteer*
 43 *Strategies*, *Ministry Across the Lifespan*, *Digital Faith Formation*, and *Ministry Planning and Administration*. We also
 44 offered our first 24-hour spiritual renewal retreat and monthly cohorts led by experienced ministry leaders within
 45 our conference. 2022 will bring our 2nd spiritual renewal retreat, our summer course, *Pathways and Playlists*, and a
 46 fall course on Christian Education Theory and Practice. Funded by the Sam Taylor Grant (Discipleship Ministries), FFLA

1 seeks to intentionally connect, train, and support faith formation leaders in the Rio Texas Conference and greater
 2 United Methodist connection. The certification includes virtual courses, monthly cohort groups, and annual spiritual
 3 retreat and renewal opportunities. This ministry offers development opportunities for new staff and volunteers as
 4 well as those seeking to continue their education. More courses including electives in various ministry areas to be
 5 offered in coming sessions. More information can be found at rtfaithacademy.com.

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8 ***Growing Together Families***

9 Growing Together Families is a ministry that curates and creates resources for faith formation leaders and families
 10 as we discover how to connect to God and each other every day. This work became even more important during
 11 the pandemic. Resources include a monthly newsletter for leaders and families, a blog, a podcast, and curated
 12 resources to help leaders and families do this important work. Growing Together Families can be found at
 13 growingtogetherumc.org.

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15 ***Launch***

16 Launch! faith formation is a series of short videos, podcasts, and curated resources to support and equip ministry
 17 leaders for the important work that God calls us to - the work of growing in love of God and neighbor for the
 18 transformation of today's world. In a time of uncertainty and change, the church needs adaptive and strategic
 19 ministry leaders who will lead with clarity and purpose as they shepherd their communities in the important work of
 20 discipleship. I am grateful to work alongside Rev. Christine Hides (UMC Deacon, Northern Illinois Conference) and
 21 Rev. Kathy Pittenger (UMC Deacon, Michigan Conference). Together we create and curate these resources to equip
 22 and support ministry leaders as a guide for the important work of growing in love of God and neighbor for the
 23 transformation of the world. Each playlist has four components: watch, explore, create, and learn more. Your time is
 24 valuable! Most of the playlist content takes less than 10 minutes to watch, create, or explore. The playlists are
 25 designed to be completed on their own, yet also can build on one another. Find us at launchfaith.com.

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29 ***#pictureadvent and #picturelent***

30 Intergenerational, spirit-filled, invitational, and reflective, #picture invites individuals, families, and faith communities
 31 to encounter God daily through Scripture, images, and reflection during the holy season of Advent and Lent. With
 32 over 2,400 subscribers, we reach people across our conference, denomination, and world. I am grateful for the many
 33 individuals in our conference who have contributed to these daily devotionals with their words, images, and prayers.
 34 Join us next time as we pictureadvent.com and picturelent.com together. #Picture is a joint ministry between the
 35 Rio Texas and the Michigan annual conferences.

36 ***Thriving Congregations***

37 The Rio Texas Conference has three churches participating in a 4-year thriving congregations project through a Lily
 38 Grant awarded to Vibrant Faith. These churches include: Colonial Hills United Methodist Church in San Antonio,
 39 Floresville United Methodist Church, and First United Methodist Church, Victoria. Each church works with their team
 40 and joins a monthly Rio Texas Cohort meeting. These churches are coached by Rev. Dr. Campen and resourced by the
 41 staff at Vibrant Faith. This last year, teams moved into their vision of what it means to thrive identifying new ministries
 42 they wanted to try during Lent of 2022. These ministry experiments include: Connecting members through small
 43 groups held in members' homes, pioneering digital spaces, and building an online community, as well as college
 44 connection efforts, revisioning worship, and offering Lenten dinners. Moving into the summer of 2022 these churches
 45 will evaluate these ministries, celebrate God at work and identify their learnings, as they continue to ask:

1 “God where are you calling us next?” I’m excited to see how God continues to work in these communities as they
2 continue to thrive.

3 ***Trusted con Confianza***

4 The Rio Texas Conference is still hard at work creating safe spaces for children, youth, and vulnerable adults as we
5 celebrate 5 years of *Trusted* ministry. We currently have over 5,000 certified adults engaged in fruitful ministry across
6 our conference. Our facilitator team includes 9 returning facilitators and 7 new facilitators trained to lead certification
7 sessions across our conference. You can find information about our facilitators at: riotexas.org/safefacilitators.

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10 We hosted our fourth facilitator training in February/March 2022. The Rev. Joy Melton, author of *Safe Sanctuaries*,
11 joined us once again as our guest speaker. In the last Annual Conference year, these facilitators have led a total of 56
12 facilitated sessions. Information on certification and recertification can be found at: riotexas.org/safesteps.

13 The Trusted Coalition’s training work team continues to receive and review all evaluations, working to update and
14 strengthen the training curriculum. Chaired by Emily Buchanan (FUMC, Austin), this team launched an updated
15 Certification curriculum in 2021. The summer of 2022 brings an updated Recertification curriculum.

16 It has been a blessing to meet and hear from leaders across our conference as they celebrate their work and gain
17 tools for safe ministry. We are grateful for the work of these ministry leaders and their commitment to the safety of
18 the children, youth, and vulnerable adults in their care. Together we are keeping all of God’s children safe.

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22 ***Youth Ministry Council (YMC)***

23 The Rio Texas Conference Youth Ministry Council equips and supports young leaders so they can lead well as they
24 work as Christ’s disciples for the transformation of the world. This diverse group of 6th-12th graders is led by Bonnie
25 Bevers, the Young Delegate Coordinator. Members of the YMC exhibit gifts for leadership and strive to live into
26 Christ’s great commandment loving God and neighbor in all they do.

27 The youth ministry council meets monthly. They continue to focus their work on supporting and equipping young
28 leaders in our conference. They gather to pray, discern, and support one another in the work God is calling them to
29 do. You can stay up to date on details and find information about joining this terrific team at riotexas.org/ymc.

30 ***Youth Ministry Leader Development***

31 Beginning in 2021, seven congregations, youth/student ministry leaders, and ministry teams committed to a 12-
32 month leadership development project with the Rio Texas Conference and Ministry Architects. Funded by the
33 conference, districts, and churches, these leaders and teams are engaging in monthly coaching and quarterly team
34 development as they imagine what relational youth and student ministry looks like in today’s world. It is amazing to
35 hear what these churches are doing to welcome and support young disciples in their communities, especially during
36 the COVID-19 pandemic. We are currently working with Ministry Architects to continue offering coaching for ministry
37 leaders in our conference as well as offering more training in 2023.

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42 ***Other ministry this year***

43 In addition to all these projects, I continue to curate resources and provide training and coaching for faith formation
44 leaders. In the past year, I offered webinars and workshops on Children’s spirituality, Family Faith Formation, Effective
45 Volunteer Ministry, and Faith formation in today’s world. I partnered with Vibrant Faith and Lifelong Faith, two

1 organizations providing resources and trainings to local church leaders. I also completed and published my first solo-
 2 authored book, *Holy Work with Children: Making meaning together*. I curate resources for important conversations
 3 in our churches and homes alongside playlists for holy seasons including Advent and Lent. All resources can be found
 4 at the intergenerational discipleship webpage: riotexas.org/ig

5 I continue to enjoy my work with faith formation leaders throughout our conference. It is humbling and inspiring to
 6 see all that God is doing in and through intergenerational discipleship in our conference. I am grateful to serve
 7 alongside each and every member of the conference and look forward to more conversations, collaboration, and
 8 fruitful ministry in the next twelve months.

5 We're planning several events for the second half of 2022.

- 7 • Mission u is scheduled for July 8-10 in San Antonio. In a change from previous years, there will be one
8 study topic for all age groups: "Who Can We Be Together? – Building Communities of Hope and Joy." The
9 curriculum focuses on Luke 13.
- 10 • The eighth Conference Annual Meeting, to be held in San Antonio October 14-15, will feature keynote
11 speaker Tara Barnes from the National Office. She is the editor of the award-winning **response** magazine.
- 12 • Leadership Development, scheduled for November 11-12 in San Antonio, will prepare district officers for
13 their work in 2023 through sessions on topics such as communications and leadership styles, and training
14 in the specific responsibilities of their offices.

- 17 As of this writing, almost three dozen women from Rio Texas are planning to join the thousands attending the
18 quadrennial Assembly in Orlando, FL, for three days of worship, fellowship, learning, and sharing with friends new
19 and old from across the country and around the world.

RIO TEXAS CONFERENCE DISASTER RESPONSE COMMITTEE

10 The mission of United Methodist Disaster Response ministry in the Rio Texas conference is to provide a caring
 11 Christian presence in the aftermath of disaster. We experienced no major disasters during the past year but there
 12 was still substantial activity. Early Response Teams assisted families devastated by a major hailstorm centered in
 13 D’Hanis in Medina County and also assisted families in Somerset, Nixon, Georgetown and Elgin. Recovery work
 14 continued in the Valley to assist families impacted by Hurricane Hanna and other flooding events during the past
 15 three years. Some work on hurricane Harvey projects continued as long-term recovery organizations wrapped up
 16 work.

17 The Disaster Response Committee has made policy changes that will impact future response to disasters. In the past,
 18 individuals could only respond during the response phase (right after the disaster) as part of an Early Response Team,
 19 which requires eight hours of training and UMCOR approval. In the future, spontaneous volunteers will be accepted
 20 on teams headed by trained Early Response volunteers. The spontaneous volunteers will be required to complete a
 21 short training that will be provided in the community where the disaster occurred. A second new initiative is plans
 22 to deploy a resource center immediately after a disaster strikes. This center will provide “how to” literature to assist
 23 families who have the resources to do their own cleanup. The center will also be used to distribute UMCOR cleaning
 24 kits and other material needed to respond to the situation in the period right after the disaster.

25 The need for volunteers is critical to the success of the disaster response ministry. Individuals or teams can enroll in
 26 an Early Response Class, so they are prepared to respond when a disaster occurs. Scheduled classes are listed on
 27 riotexasresponse.org but special classes can be arranged for groups of 10 or more. Teams are also needed for
 28 recovery work. No special training is needed for these teams but there are special requirements for youth teams. At
 29 this writing, teams are needed in D’Hanis and in the Valley, but new needs arise with each disaster. Needs are listed
 30 and registration can be completed at riotexasresponse.org. Limited volunteer opportunities are available at the
 31 Martinez Disaster Response Warehouse in Kerrville. Verification of UMCOR cleaning kits is required before they can
 32 be distributed to storm survivors. When available, this opportunity is available to groups that do not have the skill or
 33 physical endurance to volunteer for repairing homes.

METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME

FOR INFORMATION ONLY

Greetings from Methodist Children's Home (MCH) and the more than 10,000 children, youth and families we have served this year. Thank you for your continued friendship through the Rio Texas Annual Conference and for your support of our vision to empower all we serve to experience life to the fullest.

I invite each of you to visit our website at MCH.org. There you can download stories, identify resources, view a transparent listing of our financial resources and services delivered, find out how to refer a child for placement, or learn more about a call to join our ministry.

Your support provides the resources needed to offer the care, programs and talented individuals needed to positively impact the lives of those we serve through residential care on the Waco campus and Boys Ranch and through 13 MCH Family Outreach offices, including San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

We are now in our 132nd year serving children, youth and families. Here are a few highlights of the past year:

- We launched the "Together We Flourish" initiative designed to maximize and steward our resources for ministry through collective impact, generosity and support in order to achieve the MCH vision and mission in a greater way. In MCH Family Outreach office locations we invested organizational dollars in local food banks and ministries feeding youth or families in the community. This initiative will guide us as we seek out collaborations with other organizations and strengthen the cohesion between our ministry programs.
- Plans are underway to expand our ministry further by adding a 14th MCH Family Outreach office in the Permian Basin area of West Texas. We have completed thorough feasibility studies and have already begun investing in this region through Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI) trainings. We look forward to further serving children, youth and families of these communities.
- The Outdoor Education program expanded beyond just providing engaging activities for our youth. Focusing on nurturing a culture of learning, the program provides opportunities for groups outside of MCH to receive training and learning through recreation from MCH staff.
- We opened four new state-of-the-art homes on the Waco campus through the Building Hope capital campaign. These homes, situated around the Harrell Memorial Chapel, include the Tim and Susan Brown Home, the Good Shepherd Home, the Legacy Home, and the Willie Mae Lee and John Marshall Tyler Home.
- Through a partnership with One Heart Project, MCH youth in the residential and aftercare programs are receiving holistic, evidenced-based mentoring. This partnership aligns with initiatives outlined in our strategic plan to develop collaborations and create a robust mentoring program.
- We supported many MCH alumni through our Advanced Education, After Care Services and Independent Living programs as they pursued higher education or entered the workforce. We are proud of these young men and women who showed perseverance during a challenging year marked by school and work closures and other challenges of the pandemic.
- Youth in residential care and day students enjoyed a summer full of camps, field trips, community service, and personal enrichment. Summer is a great time for MCH youth to grow, serve and enjoy special events.

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- The MCH Family Outreach offices in Corpus Christi, Tyler and Dallas relocated to new, spacious facilities to accommodate the growth of community-based programs. The new offices utilize collaborative workspaces and include “huddle rooms” for private calls or meetings, open-floor concepts and playrooms.
- The MCH Bulldogs six-man football team enjoyed a strong season that saw them play in the state championship game of the Texas Christian Athletic Fellowship.
- The generosity of wonderful churches and donors allowed the Harrell Memorial Chapel on the Waco campus to receive much-needed updates and restoration. In addition, an outdoor worship space and prayer labyrinth was built adjacent to the chapel. This renovation and the addition of the labyrinth further enhances an already vibrant spiritual development program for our residents.

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GBHEM seeks to promote innovative and experiential opportunities for transformative learning, higher education, and ministry formation worldwide. The agency works with key partners, churches, and institutions in Africa, Asia Pacific, Europe, and Eurasia, Latin American and the Caribbean, and North America to offer connectional, contextual, and collaborative programs to support the Church, the Academy, and the world. Among its various activities, GBHEM is responsible for two initiatives approved by General Conference: The Methodist Global Education Fund for Leadership Development (MGEFLD) – which includes the Grants and Scholarships Program (GRASP) – and the Central Conference Theological Education Fund (CCTEF). The agency also maintains Regional Hubs for Leadership, Education and Development (LEAD Hubs) in various locations around the world, has helped create and support the International Association of Methodist Schools, Colleges, and Universities (IAMSCU), and works with regional education associations on five continents. GBHEM is currently partnering with general agencies and other organizations to support important projects on COVID-19 vaccine equity, mindfulness and wellbeing, net-zero emissions, human rights, and the promotion of a culture of generosity throughout the United Methodist worldwide connection.

In 1972, The United Methodist Church reaffirmed its support of the 11 historically black colleges and universities related to the denomination by creating the Black College Fund and this year we celebrate its 50th Anniversary. Support for the Black College Fund supports the education of world-changing leaders by investing in the hopes and dreams of students from around the world. Continued support for the Black College Fund renews the vision for the next generation of transformational leaders.

We celebrate GBHEM awarding more than 2,250 students a total of \$4,084,979 in scholarships in 2021. These future leaders range from first year freshmen to doctorate level students across the denomination. We are grateful for the support received in recognizing United Methodist Student Day, World Communion Sunday, and Native American Sunday which helps fund a portion of our scholarships. The remaining funds for these awards come from gifts, annuities, and endowments GBHEM has invested and administered for decades.

Worldwide Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Access (WIDEA) is a strategic focus area for GBHEM to align its work with the mission and ministry of congregations and constituents around the world. This renewed commitment includes

1 advanced staff development in intercultural competency, active listening, and a deeper understanding of and

 6 to clarify the role of those in ministry while assisting in the interpretation and application of relevant paragraphs
 7 within The Book of Discipline. We have supported the work of recruiting, guiding, and credentialing candidates and
 8 clergy through the development of Passage - a comprehensive registry resource - as well as a virtual onboarding
 9 module for new district and conference board members.

10 Hundreds of years before amazon.com, John Wesley stuffed the saddlebags of circuit riders with books of theology
 11 and biblical interpretation—selling them to fund the movement while spreading it literally. GBHEM continues this
 12 innovative spirit by leveraging social enterprise opportunities and creative partnerships as a way of reducing its
 13 reliance on apportionments while continuing to focus on delivering the very best services, products, and programs
 14 to United Methodist constituents around the world.

15 The same spirit of service and leadership that first inspired John Wesley lives on in each of us. Today, GBHEM looks
 16 confidently to the future taking bold and creative action, remaining good stewards, and continuing to support The
 17 United Methodist Church in innovative and meaningful ways.

20 Since 1914, **Candler School of Theology at Emory University** has lived into our mission, educating faithful and
 21 creative leaders for the church’s ministries throughout the world. This year, as we leaned into this critical work and
 22 continued to adapt to a world changed by the coronavirus pandemic, we imagined new possibilities for students
 23 who are called by God to pursue serious theological study and preparation for ministry. For some, opening avenues
 24 to graduate theological education requires moving financial obstacles, and for others, geography or family
 25 responsibilities may be the barriers. Candler is committed to assisting students in removing these barriers and
 26 opening new pathways to ministry.

27 An official seminary of The United Methodist Church, Candler holds true to the Methodist value of ecumenical
 28 openness, enthusiastically welcoming students from 43 denominations, with 45% of MDiv students coming from the
 29 Wesleyan tradition. Our student body reflects the diversity and breadth of the Christian faithful, with an enrollment
 30 of 466 from 16 countries and 38 states, 45% persons of color (U.S.), and a median age of 28 among MDivs. This
 31 diversity is a blessing, enriching our students and our larger community and providing a “learning laboratory” for
 32 ministry in the 21st century—ministry that reaches across difference, works to resolve injustice, and embodies Christ’s
 33 love in and among us.

34 Candler offers six single degrees (MDiv, MTS, MRL MRPL, ThM, DMin) and ten dual degrees. Our DMin is 90% online,
 35 so students can remain in their places of ministry while earning their degrees. Its high 87% completion rate illustrates
 36 both the quality of our students and Candler’s commitment to their success. This year, we increased online offerings
 37 in other degrees as well. Now students can complete the Master of Religion and Public Life completely online; the
 38 Master of Religious Leadership with concentrations in Youth Ministry, Justice, Peacebuilding and Conflict
 39 Transformation, or Wesleyan Leadership and Heritage in a hybrid format; and MDiv students can complete core
 40 classes online. Plus, our new Remote Teaching Parish (RTP) program allows MDiv students who have jobs in ecclesial
 41 settings far from our Atlanta campus to take core classes online and complete their contextual education
 42 requirements at their place of ministry, participating in mentor-led online groups with other RTP students.

43 Alleviating student debt through generous financial aid is a top priority. In 2020-2021, we awarded more than \$6.8
 44 million in financial aid, with 100% of MDiv and 98.5% of all students receiving support. All MDiv students who are
 45 certified candidates for ordained ministry in the UMC receive full-tuition scholarships, and all MDiv, MTS, MRL, and
 46 ThM students who are enrolled part-time or more receive a scholarship covering at least 50% of tuition for the length
 47 of their program.

48 Hundreds of laity and theology students alike have joined in classes and events offered through The Candler Foundry,
 49 our innovative program to make theological education accessible to all. Through short and semester-length courses
 50 taught by Candler faculty, videos and discussion guides to spark conversation in groups or one-on-one, and online
 51 panel discussions, those who want to delve more deeply into theology and the Bible have the chance to do just that.

1 Associate Dean of Methodist Studies the Rev. Dr. Anne Burkholder will retire from Candler at the end of the 2021-
2 22 academic year. We are grateful to God for her energetic and skillful leadership in this vital area as she strengthened
3 the connection between our students and conferences throughout the UMC, mentoring them as they discerned their
4 call and navigated the ordination process.

5 Candler's ability to fulfill our mission to provide the church with the faithful and creative leaders it needs depends

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15 In spring and fall of 2021, Drew Theological School began returning to its Madison, New Jersey, campus for some
16 classes, meetings, and worship. As with many churches, in person events were held in spaces equipped for live-
17 streaming or Zoom participation. The shift to remote learning during COVID-19 pandemic thus significantly expanded
18 our online course offerings and accessible community events. Now, a number of students in Drew's masters
19 programs will progress through their programs in U.S. and global locations far from New Jersey. This year, we
20 welcomed 150 new students, again the largest class in a decade, and have a current enrollment of 376 students.

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23 Drew cultivates pastors, preachers, deacons, activists, teachers, and thought leaders who are taking their place as
24 the next generation of faith leaders and change agents. Diversity is a hallmark of our student body, including
25 theological, vocational, age, and especially racial and national diversity both international--Asian, African, and South
26 American and U.S.--black, white, Latinx, and Asian American--students. Our student body is truly global, with 35% of
27 students from 21 different countries. For the first time in its history, Drew has an African student association,
28 initiated by Drew Theological School students from 14 African countries, that is already contributing richly to the
29 Drew community both on campus and online. We have welcomed new faculty in Latinx ministries and world
30 Christianity. We have also seen an increase in United Methodist students particularly interested in the school's
31 Gospel-inspired traditions of social justice advocacy and widely inclusive ministry. We are proud that many United
32 Methodist Global Fellows have recently chosen to continue their journey in ministry at Drew. Our UMC graduates
33 are serving in Greater New Jersey, Eastern Pennsylvania, and New York conferences as well as conferences across
34 the country.

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38 The faculty is committed to continuing to develop the curriculum in ways that take seriously the wide range of lived
39 experience and calls to ministry of the students that gather in our global classrooms. All degree programs at the
40 Theological School include interdisciplinary courses that demand out-of-the-box thinking, apprenticeship training
41 that addresses real-world issues, and modes of learning that promote adaptability and innovation. Our MDiv and
42 MATM degrees include a required gateway year, vocational pathways, and experiential learning that develops and
43 deepens adaptive leadership skills. The curriculum features a team-designed and taught interdisciplinary sequence
44 of core courses reflecting the integration of the theological disciplines and practices characteristic of the life of faith.
45 The faculty have also articulated shared values that are infused across the teaching and learning at Drew: a
46 commitment to anti-racism; gender and sexual-identity equality; eco-sustainability and environmental justice; and
47 interfaith understanding and cooperation.

We have ended the school years with the same enthusiasm, if not more, among our student body. In the past two years, amid a pandemic, all our graduated seniors are in college today.

With the support of our United Methodist churches, friends, and supporters, we have provided more scholarships for the students to keep them in school. The effect of the pandemic has been most devastating among our students and parents. For a long time, the border was closed to non-essentials, so parents could not meet with teachers, pay for their tuition or simply visit with the students. Becoming creative became essential as we introduced parents to zoom and credit cards. Providing our students, parents and our community with a site for COVID vaccines was our contribution to fight the pandemic.

I am honored that the Dr. Socorro de Anda Permanent Scholarship Endowment Fund has been established to provide scholarships for the LPI students, indefinitely. From the bottom of my heart, I wish to thank all those that contributed. Our students deserve it.

Going forward, Lydia Patterson is alive and vibrant. All left of this report is to thank all my friends of this conference and the number of Bishops that I have worked under. I offer my deep appreciation for walking with me, hand in hand, throughout my journey. Together, we have changed thousands of lives and formed many disciples of Jesus Christ. In the midst of the critical decisions facing the church, I would ask that you continue to support this ministry whose only purpose is to change the lives of the students. I would ask that whatever the direction of the church, that you see Lydia Patterson as, not only a bridge between two countries and two cities, but a bridge that connects every Methodist in ministry.

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Educating tomorrow's leaders by offering on-campus, online, and hybrid learning courses at a FLEXible schedule, Saint Paul School of Theology is a seminary of the United Methodist Church committed to the formation of people for innovative, creative ministry. Grounded in the academic study of faith and ministry, theology is practiced in a traditional classroom and a contextual curriculum.

As the global pandemic continues to bring challenges to our daily lives, Saint Paul School of Theology began the 2021-2022 academic year, again offering students an option to attend courses via Zoom or on-campus while maintaining safety protocols. Our weekly chapel service continues to be available online, allowing staff and students

1 to come together as one institution where all are invited to create a sacred atmosphere from wherever they are. In
 2 addition to faculty and staff serving as chapel speakers, we were blessed to have alumni and special guest speakers
 3 Rev. Winter Hamilton of Manchester UMC, Rev. Delesslyn Kennebrew, Rev. Dr. Carol Cook Moore, and more. Chapel
 4 recordings are available on the Saint Paul YouTube channel for those who cannot join live.

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 8 Saint Paul staff and faculty continue to contribute to the academy, church, and society. This year, we have had many
 9 faculty and staff changes. After many years of tremendous service to students and the Seminary, Dr. James Brandt
 10 and Dr. Hal Knight announced retirement plans effective at the end of the 2021-2022 academic year. In addition,
 11 Dr. Jeanne Hoeft will step down from her role as Vice President of Academic Affairs and Dean at the end of the
 12 academic year but will continue as faculty. New additions to the Seminary family include Dr. Joshua Bartholomew,
 13 Assistant Professor of Ethics, Church and Society; Dr. Tiffany Nagel Monroe, Executive Director of the Oklahoma
 14 Campus; and Rabbi Michael Zedek, Rabbi-in-Residence.

15 The faculty of Saint Paul School of Theology maintains high standards of scholarship, research, publication, and
 16 engagement. Over the past year, their many activities and publications have been so numerous that space permits
 17 only the sharing of selected highlights.

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 19 ▪ Dr. Nancy Howell, Professor of Theology and Philosophy of Religion and Oubri A. Poppele Professor of Health
 20 and Welfare Ministries, was re-elected to a second term on the Executive Committee of the International
 21 Society for Science and Religion. She also had an article published in a South African journal. With more than
 22 a decade of service, she serves on the Broader Social Impacts Committee of the National Museum of Natural
 23 History at the Smithsonian.
 24 ▪ Dr. Casey Sigmon, Assistant Professor of Preaching and Worship and Director of Contextual Education, was
 25 invited to be a writer for "Lent Another Way," an e-course, with The Plural Guild and The Many, and she
 26 offered the convocation address for Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School in Fall 2021. She also applied for
 27 and received a grant from the Wabash Center for Teaching to support my project entitled: "Resisting the
 28 Plagiarized Pulpit: Helping Students and the Professor to Find trust their voice through Artistic Instructional
 29 Design."
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 31 ▪ This January, Dr. Joshua Bartholomew, Assistant Professor of Ethics, Church and Society, was the guest
 32 speaker at a Kansas City event, "Black Theology and the Black Panthers: A Conversation with Dr. Joshua
 33 Bartholomew." In addition, he was recently interviewed by Climate Central for the article " 'A moral
 34 imperative': Monastic sisters in rural Midwest make faith-based case for climate action."

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 38 Saint Paul welcomed 45 new students for the 2021-2022 academic year. New student enrollment for the Fall
 39 semester increased by 44% (34 new students), with an overall increase for the year of 73%. With the COVID-19
 40 pandemic still in our midst, prospective students previewed the Saint Paul community and curriculum via online
 41 visits. Students joined in community worship, attended classes, and participated in online discussions with current
 42 students to discern if Saint Paul was indeed their choice for theological education. Enrollment remained strong for
 43 the Master of Divinity (MDiv) degree program with promising growth in our newly designed Master of Arts in
 44 Theological Studies (MATS) and Master of Arts in Christian Ministry (MACM) programs.

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 49 In September, Saint Paul held the 2021 Harrington Lecture online featuring Dr. Eboo Patel. His lecture, "We Need
 50 to Build: Field Notes for Diverse Democracy," expanded knowledge and built skills, helping people become the kind
 51 of leaders our diverse democracy needs. In the Spring Semester, Saint Paul Evangelical Society, led by Dr. Hal Knight,
 52 hosted a forum given by Dr. Amos Yong, Professor of Theology and Mission, and Dean of the School of Mission and
 53 Theology at Fuller Theological Seminary, on "The Holy Spirit and People of other Faiths: Relational Christian Witness
 54 in the 2020s." Later in the semester, the Evangelical Society hosted a lecture featuring Dr. Joy Moore, Professor of

1 Biblical Preaching and Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Academic Dean at Luther Seminary. And for the first
2 time, on May 13, Saint Paul held a hybrid commencement celebration via Zoom, allowing graduates to come
3 together from both the Kansas and Oklahoma Campuses with attendees viewing from around the country. We
4 honored the 2022 Distinguished Graduate Award Winner and Commencement Speaker Dr. Stan Copeland during
5 the ceremony.

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8 For the 2021-2022 fiscal year, Saint Paul Course of Study (COS) School educated 228 individual students, 49 of which
9 were new students, with approximately 550 registrations and offering a total of 50 courses. Serving 32 Conferences,
10 including 94 Districts, 121 Full Time and 106 Part-Time Licensed Local Pastors comprised these registrations. Saint
11 Paul Course of Study School welcomed new Regional Director Dr. Lucas Endicott. Dr. Endicott has been serving as
12 Associate Director for the Office of Mission, Service, and Justice at the Missouri Annual Conference and lecturing at
13 Central Methodist University. Due to the continuing pandemic, the school has continued its course offerings in both
14 asynchronous and synchronous online formats. Utilizing this online format, we reached students in 24 states. Plans
15 include an increase in the number of hybrid course offerings. This fiscal year has also ushered in the new ability of
16 online registration completed by the student and access to their student account through Populi as used by Seminary
17 students. All our students share the same benefits by integrating Course of Study School into Populi, making them
18 a more integrated part of the Saint Paul experience.

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21 Saint Paul Board of Trustees added two new members to their ranks: Ms. Debra "Debbie" Buzard, Director of
22 Outreach Ministry at First United Methodist Church of Kearney; and Rev. Martin "Tino" Herrera, Congregational Care
23 Pastor at UM Church of the Resurrection. Through a Board initiative related to diversity and inclusion, the Saint Paul
24 Board of Trustees has devoted a significant portion of the last year's meetings to church leaders with experience and
25 expertise in creating more diverse and inclusive communities and organizations. Aiding Saint Paul's trustees in better
26 understanding these issues, the Board hosted the Rev. Dr. Benjamin Boswell in April 2021. Dr. Boswell, Senior Pastor
27 of Myers Park Baptist Church in Charlotte, North Carolina, described the anti-racism work he has led in that
28 community. The City of Charlotte awarded Dr. Boswell its Martin Luther King, Jr. Medallion for his work. In July
29 2021, Congressman Emanuel Cleaver II of Kansas City shared his perspective on the racial and social justice issues
30 confronting our nation and the efforts he and his colleagues in the House of Representatives hope to undertake in
31 response. With the Board's assistance, led by Board Chair Rev. Dr. Tex Sample, the seminary focuses on its mission.
32 Our trustees continuously enhance and evaluate the strategic plans to guide us into the future.

33 As we have happily reported in years past, Saint Paul is financially sound and operates with a balanced budget. These
34 last years' changes have established a solid financial foundation for years of sustainability. As always, we continue
35 to be grateful for donations from the community that provide technology, scholarships, and evolving academic
36 programs to students. Our significant investments in technology have allowed us to maintain a hybrid educational
37 delivery model providing a safe learning environment during the continuing pandemic.

38 Our aim has always been to utilize technology as a conduit to bring faculty and students together regardless of
39 whether they are on-campus or joining remotely through Zoom. We took a hard look at the distance learning
40 landscape during the pandemic to see how we could substantially enhance the classroom experience. After
41 significant testing, we opted to replace our distance-learning classroom technology with Neat's offerings, including
42 technology still in development. All our classrooms began upgrades in Fall 2021 with offerings from Neat. Each
43 smaller classroom added a 65" neat.board, a self-contained screen that functions as a full Zoom room, as well as an
44 electronic whiteboard. Anything written or drawn on these boards is transmitted through Zoom to the screens in
45 the classroom and remote Zoom participants. This content can also be saved and emailed to all participants. We
46 implemented neat.bars in other classrooms that connect to our classrooms' existing screens. We are currently
47 implementing neat.bar pros, just released at the end of 2021, in each of our large classrooms. At Saint Paul School
48 of Theology, we have always tried to be pioneers with distance-learning technologies. We are very early in the
49 lifecycle of this stimulating and groundbreaking technology. We are thrilled to partner with Neat and Zoom in
50 revolutionizing the classroom experience.

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Saint Paul School of Theology is blessed to be your partner in ministry and help those seeking to discover more and answer the call. We are grateful for your support of our students and our seminary. May we continue to live into the call of Jesus Christ to be faithful witnesses for healing in these unsettled times and for generations to come. President Neil Blair, Saint Paul trustees, faculty, staff, alumni, and students thank you for your prayers and support.

UNITED THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY FOR INFORMATION ONLY

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For the past 150 years, United Theological Seminary has educated men and women for Christian ministry within the historic traditions of the United Brethren, Evangelical United Brethren and United Methodist churches. On October 11, 1871, United Theological Seminary, then Union Biblical Seminary, held its first classes in Dayton, Ohio. From a starting class of 11 students, the seminary has grown to 488 students in its most recent academic year,* representing 39 denominations, 11 countries, and 39 states. Today's seminary serves a diverse student body that is 53% African American.**

On October 10, 2021, the seminary celebrated its 150th anniversary and burned the mortgage on its current campus facilities, freeing up \$400,000 annually to support student scholarships.

In 2021, United received a grant of \$1 million from Lilly Endowment Inc.'s Pathways for Tomorrow Initiative to expand the seminary's Houses of Study, which offer specialized master's tracks to equip students for the unique ministry needs of the communities, movements and denominations they serve. The seminary has introduced six **Houses of Study**, currently enrolling for 2022-23:

- Fresh Expressions, directed by Dr. Michael Beck;
- Mosaix, in partnership with Mosaix Global Network and directed by Rev. Chip Freed;
- Black United Methodist, directed by Dr. Vance Ross;
- Hispanic, 100% in Spanish for Spanish-speaking leaders, directed by Dr. Jorge Ochoa;
- Global Pentecostal, directed by Dr. Mark Chironna;
- and Global Wesleyan, directed by Rev. Gregory Stover.

Because United believes so passionately in this initiative, the seminary has dedicated additional resources to offer half-tuition scholarships for inaugural students in its Houses of Study programs.

United also introduced the **Academic Dean's Scholarship**, which provides 50% tuition for the duration of a master's degree program, and the **Presidential Scholarship**, awarding up to \$5,000 per year to new students.

In honor of United's 150th anniversary year, a generous donor gifted \$2 million to help graduating students reduce their educational debt. Each graduate in the 2021-22 academic year will receive up to \$20,000 toward student debt from theological and previous academic studies.

As United looks forward to the next 150 years with gratitude and anticipation, the seminary remains committed to the preparation of faithful and fruitful Christian leaders to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

27 Another year of COVID has provided great opportunity for improvement and innovation amid a landscape of grief
28 and loss. To fully support and encourage the church leaders in this time, TMF expanded ministries, strengthened
29 relationships with those we serve, and invested in innovation.

30 Tom Stanton, TMF Senior Area Representative for the Rio Texas Conference, is the primary contact and bridge between
31 congregations (clergy and laity) and TMF. As a partner in ministry, he connects members of the Rio Texas Conference to
32 relevant resources unique to their goals for missional growth within congregations and communities.

33 TMF, headquartered in Austin, serves United Methodist individuals, churches, and agencies within the six annual
34 conferences in Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we served United
35 Methodists last year.

36

37 ***Within the Rio Texas Conference:***

38 ▪ Loans to churches in the Rio Texas Conference totaled \$51.5 million at the end of 2021.

39 ▪ Churches and agencies, not including individuals, within the Rio Texas Conference had \$47.45 million invested
40 in the Methodist Loan Fund.

41 ***Throughout Texas and New Mexico:***

42 ▪ As of December 31, 2021, **total assets** under management by TMF were \$734.9 million.

43 ▪ **Methodist Loan Fund investments** ended the year at \$273 million, and our loan portfolio at \$288 million.

44 ▪ **Total gifts** to TMF's ministries equaled \$1,070,113.51. This includes gifts to Leadership Ministry, Grants, and
45 TMF's undesignated endowment.

- 1 ▪ Total gifts to TMF for the benefit of others was nearly \$1.3 million. This includes all planned giving
2 (Endowments, Charitable Gift Annuities, Trusts, Donor Advised Funds).
3
4
- 5 ▪ In 2021, the TMF **Grants Ministry funded approximately \$2.8 million in support of 104 grant awards** to churches
6 and nonprofits. Of that total, TMF granted \$2.3 million from its restricted permanent endowment funds, and the
7 remainder from its operating budget. Also, TMF's Grants Committee awarded over \$73,000 in emergency relief
8 grants from a temporary COVID-19 Emergency Relief Fund. The Grants Committee of the TMF Board of Directors
9 determines distribution decisions for discretionary funds.
10
- 11 ▪ In 2021 the TMF Executive Committee approved special board-designated distributions. These funds were used to
12 help churches and other qualified nonprofits after Winter Storm Uri in February 2021 as well as those still struggling
13 with the COVID-19 pandemic. The TMF Board granted **\$386,750 to 80 organizations** through this initiative.
14
- 15 ▪ TMF's Leadership Ministry works to equip leaders for deep change through facilitating conversations of
16 courage, learning, and innovation. Some of these conversations take the form of on-going peer groups and
17 others as stand-alone conversations around an adaptive issue. These peer relationships offer fresh
18 perspectives, renew their sense of calling and embolden them for courageous leadership. During the past
19 year, TMF's cohorts incorporated both online and on-site gatherings, as the world began to open again. As
20 every church is facing the challenges and opportunities offered with online ministry, TMF's Leadership
21 Ministry launched a learning project to explore what online space makes possible for spiritual formation.
22 **During 2021, Leadership Ministry also launched its Igniting Imagination podcast, hosted by Lisa Greenwood,**
23 **and its Courageous Congregations Collaborative (C3) initiative, directed by Blair Thompson-White.**
24 **Conversations with leaders at every level of the church have reinforced the need for the church to exercise**
25 **five adaptive muscles in order to be fit, agile and ready for where God is leading.** Those muscles are grieving
26 well, discerning purpose, walking alongside, distributing power, and expanding imagination. Learn more about

- 34 ▪ Fueled by the desire to encourage and support, the TMF team of Area Representatives has continued to
35 remain steadfast and loyal to those they serve. As walk-beside partners in ministry, **the Area**
36 **Representative team equips and empowers faith communities as they live into their God-appointed**
37 **mission.** Though grounded by the pandemic, the eight representatives, who normally travel Texas and
38 New Mexico, making over 2500 visits, embraced flexibility and found a way to pivot. A pivot leading to
39 the nurturing of deeper relationships and the provision of much needed resources and services. All
40 within the virtual space. By providing financial best practices, cultivating legacy generosity plans, and
41 inspiring cultures of generosity the improvement work flourished. Churches who desired to nurture
42 purpose and innovation leaned on the process of discernment guided by this question, "What difference
43 is God calling us to make in this time and in this place?" Engaging both informal conversation and
44 contracted services church leadership used Holy Conversations (4-6 months with a team of 7-9) and Holy
45 Excavations (half-day workshop with 20-25 people).

1 Dear Brothers and Sisters of Christ,
2

3 I report to you on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Rio Texas Conference of the United
4 Methodist Church. As we emerge from pandemic and virtual worship, the past two years have
5 been a time of challenges for churches across the Rio Texas Conference. Despite the challenges
6 our churches have responded with resilience to continue to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the
7 transformation of the world. It is both a difficult and an exciting time to be the church.
8

9 In accordance with Section 2512 of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 2016,
10 the Conference Board of Trustees has the responsibility to receive and hold in trust for the benefit
11 of the Conference, donations, personal property and real property. In addition, the Board has the
12 power to invest, transfer or convey the properties that it holds in trust. The assets held by the
13 Board of Trustees include closed churches, unused parsonages and undeveloped land. The Board
14 works closely with the Conference staff, and with recommendations from the Districts, to oversee
15 and manage the property entrusted to it. In the event church property is no longer in use for a local
16 church and the District believes there is no future worship or missional use for the property, it may
17 be sold or leased.
18

19
20 As I have described to you in my report last year, the Trustees have multiple properties under its
21 review and management at any time during the year. These are both urban and rural and include
22 structures with material real estate value and others in substantial disrepair. Many of these
23 properties have limited value, either due to location or condition. The intervening time between
24 the Trustees taking control of the property and a sale can be months or years and the Conference
25 continues to incur substantial costs maintaining and securing property prior to sale. The Trustees
26 currently have approximately 10 properties under both short or long term leases and approximately
27 10 properties awaiting sale or other disposition.
28

29 The Board of Trustees is currently authorized to withhold 20% of each property sale, up to a
30 maximum of \$400,000 for the purpose of maintaining and securing property held by the Board.
31 This fund allows the Trustees to have sufficient funds to adequately manage the properties under
32 its control.
33

34 The Board of Trustees had expenses related to unsold properties in the amount of \$182,824 for
35 2021 and 43,036 for 2022 to date. Many expenses are reimbursed at the time of the sale of real
36 property, for 2021 the Board of Trustees had \$35,701 in expenses which were reimbursed by the
37 sale of a specific property.
38

39 At the prior Annual Conference we reported on the closures at San Diego: First UMC, El Campo:
40 St. Paul, Austwell, Rock Island UMC, Divine Grace, and Bishop: El Redentor.
41

42 This year we report the closures of, Robstown: El Redentor, Hebronville: First UMC, Donna:
43 First UMC, Raymondville: Bethel, Austin Servant Church, and Bay City: Nazareth.

1 The Board has recently transferred the closed San Angelo: Lakeview UMC property to San
2 Angelo: First UMC for their use in the community.

3
4 During 2021, Board of Trustees in conjunction with the Risk Management Committee began a
5 discussion of property insurance options for the Conference. Many Conference churches have
6 expressed difficulty caused by increasing property insurance costs throughout the Conference. We
7 understand the issue and will continue to actively seek solutions.

8
9
10 The Board of Trustees is working diligently to identify innovative options for the use of available
11 real estate. We have given attention to urban properties with potential economic value and
12 recognize that rising real estate values require new and innovative approaches to property use and
13 management. We have also worked to locate alternate missional uses for rural properties.

14
15
16 The Board, in conjunction with the Capital District, in active negotiation with a developer over the
17 former Faith UMC site in Austin, which is the current home of Austin New Church's O4 Center.
18 The current structures are in poor condition. The O4 Center is a vibrant worship and live music
19 venue and we hope can be a model for successful future redevelopment.

20
21 At the former Parker Lane United Methodist Church in Austin, the Conference has worked closely
22 with the Capital District to structure an innovative long-term lease of the Parker Lane property
23 with Foundation Communities, a major provider of affordable housing in the Austin area. This
24 proposed project closed in September 2021 and Foundation Communities is expected to break
25 ground soon on a new much needed affordable housing community in Austin. The project has
26 also provided a material financial return to the Conference and will provide the Capital District
27 with permanent offices and multiuse space in the new structure at no cost to the District.

28
29
30 The Trustees are currently working with several other locations where Congregations seek to
31 reevaluate their current facilities. We have congregations located in facilities larger than they are
32 able to support or which no longer meet their needs and the Trustees will assist those churches in
33 evaluating their options.

34
35 The Board of Trustees also continues to participate with Light on the Hill, formerly Mount Wesley
36 in Kerrville, Texas, in association with Kerrville: First United Methodist. Light on the Hill under
37 the leadership of Kerrville: FUMC, continues its extraordinary mission as Christian based
38 community resource.

39
40 The Board of Trustees recognizes the potential for churches to consider disaffiliation from the
41 denomination over issues related to human sexuality. In this regard the Board, in consultation
42 with the Bishop and Cabinet have adopted the document "Discerning Pathways: Guidelines for
43 disaffiliation under ¶2553". The intent is to provide churches considering disaffiliation a
44 thoughtful and practical guide, including a period of discernment and prayer. The document is
45 available on request to your District Superintendent.

Board of Trustees Report
Report II
For Conference Action

1 The Board of Trustees comes to the Annual Conference requesting action on Jefferson UMC this
2 year. As of February 28, 2021 Jefferson, United Methodist Church of San Antonio voted to
3 disaffiliate with the Rio Texas Conference. The Board of Trustees engaged in extended
4 negotiations with Jefferson UMC regarding the terms of its disaffiliation. These negotiations
5 resulted in an agreement to lease the existing facility to the new nondenominational Jefferson
6 Community Church beginning July 1, 2022. The lease will require Jefferson Community Church
7 to pay an annual rent, maintain the property, and keep it properly insured. The transaction also
8 includes a Mutual Release which will terminate a litigation currently pending in this matter. The
9 Board of Trustees requests that the Annual Conference approve the disaffiliation of Jefferson UMC
10 on such terms and conditions as the Board of Trustees may determine are in the best interests of
11 the Conference.
12

Conclusion

13 The Trustees continue to be committed to managing the properties entrusted to us in a prudent
14 manner. The Board of Trustees and Conference staff work diligently to minimize the costs and to
15 maximize the return to the Conference from the management of our real property. The Conference
16 Staff do an excellent job of supporting the Board of Trustees and managing the properties in
17 transition. This last year, long time staff member Tina Whitaker, moved to be closer to family in
18 Colorado and Nan Pyle has done an exemplary job taking over Tina's responsibilities. Kendall
19 Waller and Adria Gomez continue to support the Trustees and are hugely helpful. In addition,
20 Karen Horan and our District Superintendent Liaison Andy Smith were valued resources
21 throughout the year.
22

23 The Board of Trustees continues our firm commitment to be good stewards of the assets of the
24 Conference, while being innovative and creative as we plan for the challenges facing the church
25 in the future.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Rio Texas Conference United Methodist Church (the Conference), a non-profit organization, which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities (with comparative totals for 2020), functional expenses (with comparative totals for 2020), and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Conference as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Conference and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The Rio Texas Conference United Methodist Church (the Conference) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization associated with the General Council on Finance and Administration of the United Methodist Church. The mission of the Conference is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The Conference is empowered by the Holy Spirit to reach out, in the name of God, to the people of South Texas in the name of Jesus Christ. The Conference is committed to providing vital missions, vital congregations, and strong leaders to connect their churches to the people within their area. The Conference's mission field spans South Texas, with churches in large cities and small towns from Austin to McAllen, from San Angelo to Victoria, in vibrant cities, historic small towns and struggling communities.

All assets of the Conference reported in the accompanying financial statements are held in trust by the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Trustees (the Board) incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas effective January 1, 2015.

The Conference is affiliated with The United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions, The United Methodist Church Rio Texas Conference Las Misiones District, and United Methodist Mission Board of Metropolitan San Antonio. Each of these organizations is separately incorporated with its own governing board but share office space, office-related expenses, and accounting functions.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, the accounts of the Conference are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is a procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified into each fund. Each fund is established by a separate trust as designated by the donors.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The Conference is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

- *Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions* – Net assets available for use in the general operations and not subject to donor restrictions. Grants and contributions gifted for recurring programs of the Conference generally are not considered “restricted” under Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), though for internal reporting the Conference tracks grants and contributions to verify the disbursements match the intent. Assets restricted solely through the actions of the Board are reported as net assets without donor restrictions, designated.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION (continued)

- *Net Assets With Donor Restrictions* – Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that are more restrictive than the Conference’s mission and purpose. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity.

CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the statements of cash flows and the statements of financial position, the Conference considers all investments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are recorded at cost when acquired by purchase and at fair market value when acquired by gifts. The Conference capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value over \$2,500. Cost and associated reserve are written off when the asset is fully depreciated.

Furnishings and Equipment - recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation computed on a straight-line basis over 3 to 5 years.

Mt. Wesley Buildings - where historical cost or fair market value at the date of the gift was not available, the assets were recorded at 50% of their insured value as of December 31, 1985. These assets are being depreciated on a straight-line basis over 40 years.

Mt. Wesley land is recorded at the appraised value based on a 1985 appraisal by a firm of real estate appraisers.

CONTRIBUTIONS AND GRANTS

The Conference records contributions, grants, and other support in accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2018-08, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*. Contributions and other support that are restricted by the donor are recorded as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions until the restriction expires or the Conference disburses the funds in accordance with the restriction. Designated funds are internally restricted by the Conference and have no external legal restrictions.

The Conference considers all grants as contributions based upon the terms of the grant. The Conference recognizes revenue and related receivables from reimbursement grants as services are rendered and eligible expenditures are incurred. The Conference recognizes revenue and related receivables from non-reimbursement grants upon execution of the grant. The Conference considers all grant receivables to be fully collectible; therefore, no allowance is considered necessary.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

The Conference recognizes revenue related to exchange transactions in accordance with ASU 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606)*. The Conference records revenues from exchange transactions as increases in net assets without donor restrictions to the extent that the earnings process is complete. These transactions primarily include property sales and participation fees for programs and events, and are classified as other special causes support and service fee income in the statement of activities. These types of revenues are reported on an accrual basis in the period in which the sale occurs and fees are earned. Property sales amounts are variable depending on the value of the property. Participant fees are variable depending on the event. Performance obligations are satisfied when the sale, event, or program occurs, at which time the revenue is recognized. There are no amounts in excess of the benefit provided. Additionally, there were no receivables, contract assets, or contract liabilities related to these exchange transactions at December 31, 2021 and 2020.

ESTIMATES

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the reported revenues and expenses.

FUNCTIONAL EXPENSE ALLOCATION

The costs of providing the services and other activities of the Conference have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. These expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include payroll expenses which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort, as well as utilities, rent, and repairs and maintenance which are allocated on the basis of square footage or some other reasonable basis.

NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding lease accounting for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2021. A lessee will be required to recognize on the statement of financial position the assets and liabilities for leases with terms of more than twelve months. Management is currently evaluating the effect this pronouncement will have on the financial statements and related disclosures.

RECENTLY ADOPTED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-13, *Changes to the Disclosure Requirements for Fair Value Measurement*, effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2019. This pronouncement improves the effectiveness of fair value measurement disclosures in the notes to the financial statements. The Conference adopted this pronouncement effective January 1, 2020.

INCOME TAX STATUS

The Conference qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes.

NOTE 2 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE - APPORTIONMENTS AND OTHER GIVING

The accounts receivable for apportionments and other giving are adjusted to reflect the amounts actually received by the second week of January of the following year; therefore, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not required. The accounts receivable - apportionments and other giving balance was \$667,126 and \$734,679 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 3 - GRANTS RECEIVABLE

The Conference has several program-related and disaster recovery grants receivable at December 31, 2021 and 2020. These grants receivable are due from various organizations and will be distributed in the coming year. The Conference considers these receivables to be fully collectible. Therefore, no allowance for doubtful accounts is deemed necessary by management. The grants receivable balance was \$196,139 and \$291,636 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 4 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE - OTHER, NET

Accounts receivable - other, net consist of amounts due from churches and other entities related to insurance billings and other miscellaneous items. An allowance for doubtful accounts has been determined based upon a review of outstanding insurance billings and totaled \$237,910 and \$201,286 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. The accounts receivable - other, net balance was \$143,006 and \$214,574 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS

The Conference holds investments with the Texas Methodist Foundation (the TMF). These investments are measured at net asset value. There were no investment fees for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020. All dividends, interest, realized and unrealized gains and losses, and other investment income are reported in the statement of activities as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions, unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulations. Investments totaled \$388,622 and \$361,441 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. Investment income was \$27,182 and \$57,191 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 6 - OTHER ASSETS

The Conference has had numerous churches close or combine with other congregations in the last few years. The Conference has assumed responsibility for the churches' properties pending their sale. These churches were recorded at estimated fair market value on the date of receipt. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the remaining churches assumed by the Conference totaled \$11,319,007 and \$9,930,633, respectively, and are included in other assets in the statements of financial position.

NOTE 7 - NOTE RECEIVABLE

The Conference has a note receivable related to the sale of the San Antonio, TX property. The seller-financed agreement is an installment note bearing an annual interest rate of 3.5% with monthly interest and principal payments. The note receivable had a balance of \$-0- and \$32,254 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. Interest earned on this note receivable was \$95 and \$1,174 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 9 - ACCOUNTS PAYABLE - APPORTIONMENTS AND OTHER GIVING

The accounts payable for apportionments and other giving are amounts due to various agencies for the amounts received from the churches for apportionments and other giving. The Conference acts as a pass through for these items. The accounts payable - apportionments and other giving balance was \$797,330 and \$820,545 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 10 - PENSION PLAN

The Conference is responsible for pensions for two classes of persons - clergy appointed to the Conference and lay employees.

The Pension Plan for clergy appointed to the Conference is administered by the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions (the Board of Pensions). The Conference's contribution to the cost of that plan for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 was \$122,897 and \$122,922, respectively.

The Pension Plan for lay employees is funded through the purchase of annuity contracts. Employee contributions are voluntary and are made on a pre-tax basis. Employer contributions are a percentage of wages and are defined in the Master Agreement between the Conference and the Board of Pensions. The contribution for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 was \$63,115 and \$105,323, respectively.

The above plans are both “church plans” as that term is defined in section 414(e) of the Internal Revenue Code and are administered pursuant to the retirement income account provisions of section 403(b)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 11 - ACCRUED BENEFITS

The Conference entered into a settlement agreement in 2018 and made the third of three \$250,000 payments as of December 31, 2020.

NOTE 12 - FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The requirements of Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures of the *FASB Accounting Standards Codification* apply to all financial instruments and all nonfinancial assets and nonfinancial liabilities that are being measured and reported on a fair value basis. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market of the investment at the measurement date. The Conference has elected to report the fair value of certain net asset value (NAV) instruments, those included in investments, using the practical expedient. The practical expedient allows for the use of NAV, either as reported by the investee fund based upon various factors, to be used to determine fair value, under certain conditions. The fair value of the investment is based on a combination of audited financial statements of the investees and monthly or quarterly statements received by the investee. In accordance with the guidance, the Conference has categorized its assets, based on the priority of inputs to the valuation technique, which give the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs, into a three-level fair value hierarchy. These levels are as follows:

- Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and have the highest priority.
- Level 2 valuations are based on quoted prices in markets that are not active.
- Level 3 valuations are based on inputs that are unobservable and supported by little or no market activity.

The Conference’s current assets and liabilities as presented in the statements of financial position are Level 1. The Conference has no Level 2 or Level 3 assets or liabilities. The carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position approximate fair values because of the short maturities of those instruments.

NOTE 13 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY FOR UNFUNDED POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Prior to 1982, the Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church (Conference’s predecessor organizations) participated in a defined benefit program for clergy appointed to the local churches of the Conference. The financial liability for that service still exists for the Conference and will for several decades. In 2021 and 2020, the Board of Pensions had assets in excess of its liabilities, and, therefore, no unrecorded liability exists for those fiscal years. The plan is fully funded according to the terms and conditions of the program, and the Board of Pensions has fully reserved an amount greater than the current actuarial obligation.

NOTE 14 - LEASES

The Conference leases copiers and other office equipment under various operating leases. The leases vary in expiration dates from December 2022 to December 2025. In addition, the Conference has a support agreement for IT services related to equipment and software. Equipment lease expenses and IT service agreement expenses amounted to \$129,753 and \$148,428 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 15 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY ENERGY CONTRACT

In October 2020, the Conference renewed its contract to purchase a set amount of electricity at a fixed rate price from an energy company. This renewed contract was effective as of May 1, 2021 for 60 months. The Conference is contingently liable to purchase the full amount of electricity agreed to in the contract and is also contingently liable if one of the churches is unable to pay for the electricity used. It is the opinion of management that all electricity will be fully utilized and the participating churches will be able to pay their bills; therefore, no amounts have been accrued for related to this contract.

NOTE 16 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Conference maintains cash accounts at several financial institutions. The Conference also maintains multiple cash accounts and an investment account with the TMF. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (the FDIC) insures the balances in the cash accounts up to \$250,000 per bank. The funds at the TMF are not insured by the FDIC or the Securities Investor Protection Corporation. At December 2021 and 2020, the Conference had uninsured cash balances of \$14,936,748 and \$10,797,853, respectively, without consideration for reconciling items. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Conference had uninsured investment balances of \$388,622 and \$361,441, respectively, without consideration for reconciling items.

NOTE 17 - ENDOWMENT

The Conference's endowment consists of an individual fund established by the former Rio Grande Conference. The Endowment Fund (the Fund) was established to help meet the challenge to become self-sufficient in ministerial support, program, and administration; focusing on the areas of evangelism, stewardship, and leadership development. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of the Conference has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Conference classifies as net assets with restrictions (a) the original value of gifts donated to the endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the endowment, and (c) accumulations to the endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the Fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund is released when the time restriction has expired or when those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Conference in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA.

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Conference considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted funds:

1. The duration and preservation of the Fund;
2. The purpose of the Conference and the donor-restricted endowment fund;
3. General economic conditions;
4. The possible effect of inflation and deflation;
5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments;
6. Other resources of the Conference; and
7. The investment policies of the Conference.

All endowment net assets are comprised of donor funds without restrictions. Total donor endowment funds without restrictions were \$182,307 and \$181,308 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

Funds With Deficiencies

The fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Conference to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature are reported in net assets without donor restrictions. There were no such deficiencies as of December 31, 2021 and 2020.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Board has adopted investment and spending policies for the Endowment Fund assets that attempt to fulfill the purpose of the Fund and also protect the principal of the Fund.

The objectives of the Fund's investment policy are:

1. To conserve principal for the effective maintenance of purchasing power.
2. To provide regular income at a reasonable rate.
3. To expand income and principal over and above that necessary to offset rises in the cost of living.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Conference relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through current yield (interest and dividends). The Fund is designed to offer a portfolio balanced through a diversified group of quality securities.

NOTE 18 - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL RESOURCES

The following reflects the Conference's financial assets as of the statement of financial position date, reduced by amounts not available for general use because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations that are amounts set aside for operating and other reserves that could be drawn upon if the Board approves that action.

The Conference's primary sources of cash flows during the year are church remittances, insurance program income, and grants. These revenue sources provide the Conference with a consistent inflow of cash throughout the year to cover normal operating expenses.

NOTE 19 - PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM

During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Conference received a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan of \$432,100 from the Small Business Administration as part of the CARES Act passed during the year to assist small businesses and non-profits affected by measures instituted in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The amount was expended according to the time and purpose restrictions defined by the PPP. The Conference applied for forgiveness of the PPP loan in November 2020 and was approved in December 2020. Therefore, the loan was recognized as revenue in the statement of activities. The Conference did not apply for the second round of PPP funding.

NOTE 20 - DEFERRED RENTAL INCOME

In December 2021, the Conference executed a 99-year ground lease with another Texas non-profit corporation for the development of an affordable housing complex on property owned by the Conference in Austin, Texas. The Conference received a one-time rental payment of \$3,450,000. After fees for title changes, recording, and escrow, the Conference recognized deferred rental income of \$3,433,129. Deferred rental income will be earned over the 99-year life span of the lease, and the land and any structures on the land will revert back to the Conference at the end of the lease. The Conference has \$34,678 in current deferred rental income and \$3,398,451 in long-term deferred rental income at December 31, 2021 related to this lease.

NOTE 21 - TRIPLE NET LEASE AGREEMENTS

The Conference has entered into triple net lease agreements with Districts and another non-profit organization for several of the properties that the Conference has assumed due to closures (see Note 6). These leases allow the Conference, as lessor, to be relieved of the responsibility to maintain, repair, improve, alter or in any way incur expenses in connection with these properties and allows these properties to be used for ministries of the Districts and other non-profit organizations. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, there were triple net leases for eight properties.

NOTE 22 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Conference does not anticipate any significant changes in its operations due to the continuing COVID-19 protocols. The Conference office has reopened and has been able to operate as needed within the existing parameters.

The United Methodist Church has been involved in a mediation process related to the Boy Scouts of America bankruptcy filing due to claims of sexual abuse occurring since 1940, of which some are alleged to have taken place in United Methodist Chartered Boy Scout Troops and Cub Packs. The United Methodist Church has made a preliminary financial commitment, and, if accepted upon the completion of the mediation process, a portion of that commitment will be allocated to the conferences within the United Methodist Church.

The guidance requires an entity to disclose the date through which subsequent events have been evaluated, as well as whether that date is the date the financial statements were issued or the date the financial statements were available to be issued. In preparing these financial statements, the Conference has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through May 17, 2022, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions (the Board), a non-profit organization, which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities (with comparative totals for 2020), functional expenses (with comparative totals for 2020), and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Board as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

The United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions (the Board) is a Texas 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. The Board began operations as the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions on January 1, 2015, resulting from unification of the Board of Pensions of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The Board's purpose is to determine and report to the Annual Conference the names of retired ministers and the widows and children of the deceased ministers of the Rio Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference) who are entitled to annuities, pensions, or special relief; to set, subject to the approval of the Annual Conference, the appropriation necessary to be made to meet such charges; and to perform such other acts and discharge such other duties as may be prescribed by the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

The Board is not involved in the actual administration of the pension program which is the responsibility of Wespath Benefits and Investments (Wespath). The Board is responsible for collecting and remitting the pension funds to Wespath. The Board also administers other funds that have been contributed to provide income that is to be used for funding pension and health insurance benefits. The Board can direct Wespath as to which type of investment account it wants the funds invested in, but Wespath selects the individual investments to be made from each investment account. The Board has the authority to select investments outside of Wespath. As of December 31, 2021 and 2020, approximately 98% of all the Board's investment assets were placed with Wespath. Wespath maintains all members' accounts related to balances and vesting.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Board, the accounts of the Board are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into each fund; each fund being established by separate trusts as designated by the donors.

CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the statements of cash flows and the statements of financial position, the Board considers all investments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

INVESTMENTS

Investments are carried at market, and realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the statement of activities. Investments acquired by gift are valued at amounts representing estimated fair market value at the date of the gift. No investment fees were incurred for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are recorded at cost when acquired by purchase and at fair market value when acquired by gifts. The Board capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value over \$2,500. Cost and associated reserve are written off when the asset is fully depreciated.

Operating assets consist of furniture and equipment, stated at cost less allowances for depreciation. Provisions for depreciation of these fixed assets are computed on the straight-line method over five years.

The retirees house was donated to the Board in 2015 and held by the Conference until its transfer to the Board in 2017. The house is to be used by a retired minister per the donor's stipulation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over fifteen years. This house is fully depreciated as of December 31, 2020.

CONTRIBUTIONS

The Board records contributions, including apportionments, in accordance with Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2018-08, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*. The Board reports gifts of cash and other assets as donor-restricted support if they are received with donor restrictions as to period of availability or use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is fulfilled, donor-restricted net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The Board is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

- *Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions* – Net assets available for use in the general operations and not subject to donor restrictions. Contributions gifted for recurring programs of the Board generally are not considered “restricted” under GAAP, though for internal reporting the Board tracks contributions to verify the disbursements match the intent. Assets restricted solely through the actions of the Board are reported as net assets without donor restrictions, designated.
- *Net Assets With Donor Restrictions* – Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that are more restrictive than the Board's mission and purpose. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity.

ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the Board administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding lease accounting for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2021. A lessee will be required to recognize on the statement of financial position the assets and liabilities for leases with terms of more than twelve months. Management is currently evaluating the effect this pronouncement will have on the financial statements and related disclosures.

In May 2014, the FASB issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding revenue recognition, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers (ASC 606)*, effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2019. The pronouncement affects contracts with customers to transfer goods or services and contracts for the transfer of non-financial assets. The core principle of this update is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for the goods or services. Management has evaluated the new standard and determined it is not applicable to the Board based on the nature of its revenue sources.

RECENTLY ADOPTED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In 2018, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2018-13, *Changes to the Disclosure Requirements for Fair Value Measurement*, effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2019. This pronouncement improves the effectiveness of fair value measurement disclosures in the notes to the financial statements. The Board adopted this pronouncement effective January 1, 2020.

FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSE

The costs of providing the services and other activities of the Board have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. These expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include staff expenses which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort, as well as office expenses, maintenance expenses, and travel and meeting expenses which are allocated on the basis of square footage or some other reasonable basis.

INCOME TAX STATUS

The Board qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes. The Board's management believes it has no material uncertain tax positions, and, accordingly, it will not recognize any liabilities.

NOTE 3 - DESCRIPTION OF PLANS

The following description of the Board's health insurance and pension plans provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreements for a complete description of provisions. The Pension Plan is a separate entity maintained by Wespath, and the results of its financial activities are reported on by other auditors.

The Board administers the following plans provided by the Conference:

- Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) - effective January 1, 2007, and restated as of January 1, 2017, reflecting revisions approved at General Conference 2016, the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) was converted over to the CRSP plan. The plan is funded by a 3% contribution to the CRSP Defined Contribution Plan (DC) made by the Board. In addition to the 3% contribution, the Board will also fund the CRSP Defined Benefit Plan (DB). The DB contribution will equal the amount it takes to fund the employees' retirement benefit. The CRSP payment made based upon actuarial cost for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020 was \$1,559,225 and \$1,618,825, respectively.
- Defined Contribution Pension Plan - Post 1982 service, fully funded each year by deposits from employer (church) and employee to Wespath. Retirement benefits are dependent on the balance in the individual's account on date of retirement.
- Defined Benefit Pension Plan - Prior to 1982, the Conference participated in a defined benefit program for clergy appointed to the local churches of the Conference. The financial liability for that service still exists for the Conference and will for several decades. The cost of providing the defined benefits earned prior to 1982 is viewed by the Conference as an annual expense and is funded each year by the local churches through the Board.
- Health Insurance Plan - Clergy and lay employees are eligible to participate in this plan if they are regular, full-time employees of the Conference or one of the local churches of the Conference. All full-time employees must be regularly scheduled to work a minimum of 30 hours per week. Also, eligible to participate in this plan are full, probationary, associate members, and full-time local pastors.

For the year ended December 31, 2013, the retired pastors were covered under the Health Insurance Plan described above by the Board's predecessor organization, the Board of Pensions of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. This coverage was discontinued effective March 31, 2014, and the retired pastors previously in the Conference's Health Insurance Plan were transitioned to one of the health benefit plans offered by a third party, Towers Watson (Note 10).

The pension plans are considered church plans as defined in section 414(e) of the Internal Revenue Code and are administered pursuant to the retirement income account provisions of section 403(b)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 4 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Board maintains cash and investment accounts at various financial institutions and investment companies. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (the FDIC) insures the balances in the cash accounts up to \$250,000, while the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (the SIPC) insures the balances in investment accounts up to \$500,000. The Board also has investment accounts that are not insured by the FDIC or the SIPC. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Board's uninsured cash balances totaled \$1,297,487 and \$1,294,651, respectively, without regard to reconciling items. At December 31, 2021 and 2020, the Board's uninsured investment balances totaled \$18,464,418 and \$17,146,144, respectively.

NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS

At December 31, 2021 and 2020, investments consisted primarily of units in Wespath Investment Management, which are pooled investment accounts. Dividends and gains (losses) are allocated to the Board based on its interest in the unitized value of its investments on a monthly basis.

The funds had gains of \$1,399,530 and \$2,482,062 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. Dividends and interest earned and reinvested in these funds were \$20,474 and \$22,637 for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 6 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable consists primarily of amounts due from churches and individuals for pension and health insurance billings. The Board considers all of these receivables to be fully collectible; therefore, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not required. Accounts receivable was \$32,487 and \$64,955 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 7 - PRE-82 PENSION ASSET

The Pension Plan with Wespath was changed effective January 1, 1982. The Plan has separate pension assets available of \$979,123 and \$2,359,288 as of December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively, which is adequate to fully fund the past service liability. The actuary has projected that the past service liability is fully funded with a surplus of \$785,552 and \$1,942,413 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively. There were no past service funding deposits for the years ending December 31, 2021 and 2020. The fair value of the plan assets was \$1,760,670 and \$1,739,283 at December 31, 2021 and 2020, respectively.

NOTE 8 - PRE-82 POST-RETIREMENT PENSION BENEFITS

The post-retirement benefit obligation represents the actuarial present value of those estimated future benefits that are attributed to employee service rendered prior to January 1, 1982. Post-retirement benefits include future benefits expected to be paid to or for 1) currently retired employees and their spouse and 2) active employees and their spouse after retirement from service.

The actuarial present value of the expected post-retirement benefit obligation is determined by an actuary of Wespath and is the amount that results from applying actuarial assumptions to historical data to estimate the present value of future annual incurred benefits. The significant actuarial assumptions used in the valuations were:

- a) Mortality will occur in accordance with RP-2014 White Collar Mortality Table with generational projection using Scale MP-2016 for calculating impact on pension plans due to increased longevity.
- b) Contributions for increases in Past Service Rate or Contingent Annuitant % benefit increases are required to be made in advance of the increase's effective date.
- c) The actuarial reserve and accumulations before retirement will be credited with interest at the rate of 6.375%.
- d) Surviving spouses receive 70% of the ministerial pension rate.
- e) Retirement has been assumed to occur at the age of 65 or in one year, if age 65 or older.

The valuations included assume average rates of return of 5.500% for 2021 and 2020 for the pension plan and expected benefit increases of 2.00% for 2021 and 2020. The foregoing actuarial assumptions are based on the presumption the plan will continue. Were the plan to terminate, different actuarial assumptions and other factors might be applicable in determining the actuarial present value of accumulated plan benefits.

The Pre-82 Funding Plan is under review by the Actuarial Department at Wespath.

NOTE 9 - PENSION PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTIONS AND PAYMENTS

The Board is the plan sponsor for several qualified benefit plans of Wespath. These plans are the Clergy Retirement Security Program – Defined Contribution (CRSP-DC), Clergy Retirement Security Program – Defined Benefit (CRSP-DB), Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP), and United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP). The Board invoices the local churches for the cost of these plans on a monthly basis and then makes a single payment to Wespath either monthly or annually, depending upon the plan design.

NOTE 10 - POST-RETIREMENT HEALTH BENEFITS

The post-retirement health benefit plan of the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions is a closed plan. Participants in the plan are limited to those who were participating in the post-retirement health benefit plans of the Southwest Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference. No new participants can be added. The annual benefit amount is fixed at the dollar value of the annualized benefit paid during December 2014.

This benefit is only available with participation in one of the health benefit plans offered by a third party, Towers Watson. The benefit is provided in the form of funding a Health Reimbursement Account (HRA). Upon the death of the participant, the termination of the plan, or the decision of the participant to no longer continue to participate in the plan, the benefit ends. The health reimbursement benefit amount is fixed and will not increase regardless of the cost of the health benefit plan. This plan is funded by apportionments collected by the Board; as such, the plan participants do not make contributions to this plan.

NOTE 11 - LEGACY FUNDS

On January 1, 2015, the Rio Grande Conference pension assets of \$6,922,748 were transferred into the Board's investment accounts. Based on the Rio Texas Unification Plan that was approved by both the Rio Grande Conference and Southwest Texas Conference, the transferred funds which were restricted for clergy benefits of the former Rio Grande Conference will continue to be used to fund clergy benefits of legacy churches of the Rio Grande Conference. During the year ended December 31, 2021, the Board awarded \$396,981 in grants to legacy churches and incurred investment gains of \$816,257. At December 31, 2021, the legacy fund balance was \$9,877,350. During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Board awarded \$389,303 in grants to legacy churches and incurred investment gains of \$1,449,272. At December 31, 2020, the legacy fund balance was \$9,458,074.

NOTE 12 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Board is located in the building owned by the Conference. The accounting department of the Conference performs some of the accounting functions of the Board; therefore, certain expense allocations have been made for office-related expenses incurred in the normal course of business operations. For the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020, these expenses totaled \$59,843 and \$27,343, respectively.

NOTE 13 - WESPATH HOLIDAY INCOME

The Board received income of \$-0- and \$139,386 in 2021 and 2020, respectively, from Wespith attributable to a CPP Holiday due to changes in the mortality tables. The Board also received income of \$-0- and \$398,670 in 2021 and 2020, respectively, from Wespith attributable to a COVID-19 Holiday due to the 2020 pandemic. These funds are both reported separately in the statement of activities for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2020.

The Board's primary sources of cash flows during the year are participant contributions for insurance and pension. These revenue sources provide a consistent inflow of cash throughout the year to cover normal operating expenses.

NOTE 16 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Since March 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption through mandated closings of organizations within the state of Texas and across the nation. The Board continues to evaluate current economic conditions as a result of this ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. However, the related financial impact and duration cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

The Board has evaluated subsequent events through August 5, 2022, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued and determined there are no additional subsequent events requiring disclosure.

NOTE 17 - FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Board adopted the provisions of ASC 820, "*Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*" (formerly SFAS 157). ASC 820 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market, and establishes a framework for measuring fair value in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Board has elected to report the fair value of certain net asset value (NAV) instruments, primarily those included in investments and mutual funds, using the practical expedient. The practical expedient allows for the use of NAV, either as reported by the investee fund or as adjusted by the Board based on various factors, to be used to determine fair value, under certain conditions. The fair value of the investment is based on a combination of audited financial statements of the investees and monthly or quarterly statements received from the investees. In accordance with the guidance, the Board has categorized its investments based upon the priority of inputs to the valuation technique, which gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs, into a three-level fair value hierarchy.

 48 Estatutos de tal corporación. La Junta de Pensiones se relaciona con la Junta General de
 49 Pensiones y Beneficios de Salud.

50 h. Habrá una Comisión de Archivos e Historia cuya función se define en ¶ 641 del Libro de
 51 Disciplina 2016. Habrá ocho (8) miembros en la Comisión de Archivos e Historia. La Comisión
 52 de Archivos e Historia se relaciona con la Comisión General de Archivos e Historia.

53 i. Habrá un Comité de Nominaciones (el Comité), cuya función es identificar a candidatos para
 54 cada posición de líderes elegidos ya que El Libro de Disciplina no especifica otro método de

1 nominación. Los miembros del Comité serán el Obispo y el Asistente de la Oficina Episcopal;
 2 los Superintendentes de siete Distritos; una persona de cada conferencia patrocinadora que
 3 representan las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de
 4 Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud; el Líder Laico
 5 Conferencial; y seis (6) prófugos miembros designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y
 6 elegidos por la Conferencia Anual para garantizar una representación equitativa en el Comité
 7 de cada una de las conferencias patrocinadoras. Por lo menos a través de 2024 el Comité de
 8 Nominaciones constará de un número igual de miembros de cada una de las conferencias

10 7. Habrá un Comité de Revisión Administrativa (el Comité) cuya función y membresía se definen
 11 en ¶ 636 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá tres (3) miembros del Comité y dos (2) suplentes,
 12 nombrados por el Obispo y elegidos por la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual. El Comité es
 13 responsable ante la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual.

16 **Aplicante a Todas las Agencias**

17 8. El Comité de Nominaciones deberá trabajar hacia los objetivos de inclusión como dispuestos
 18 en ¶ 610.5 en el Libro de Disciplina 2016 que establece: "...atención especial debe darse a la
 19 inclusión de mujeres del clero, la juventud (¶ 256.3), jóvenes adultos, adultos mayores, personas
 20 de iglesias con membresía pequeñas, personas con discapacidad y personas de minorías raciales
 21 y étnicas, en consonancia con las políticas de las agencias generales de la Iglesia. También se
 22 recomienda que los miembros de dichas agencias, salvo la Junta de Ministerio Ordenado, incluyan
 23 un tercio de clero, un tercio laicas y un tercio laicos que profesan ser miembros de las iglesias
 24 locales." El Comité de Nominaciones también se esforzará por tener igual representación de los

34 10. Cualquier posición elegida en una agencia de la Conferencia que esté vacante al final de la
 35 sesión de la Conferencia Anual o que se convierte en vacante durante el año de la Conferencia
 36 puede ser suplido por el Comité de Nominaciones a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el
 37 Libro de Disciplina.

38 11. Ex-oficio miembros de una agencia, incluyendo a miembros de Agencias Generales o
 39 Jurisdiccionales, que residen dentro de los límites de la Conferencia, son además miembros de
 40 Agencia arriba mencionados.

41 12. Presidentes de los agencias de la Conferencia deberían ser sensibles a los horarios de trabajo
 42 de los laicos al establecer horarios de reuniones.

43 13. Cuando una persona esté ausente sin previo aviso de dos reuniones consecutivas de agencias
 44 de conferencia del cual él o ella es miembro, dicha persona se considerará que ha renunciado
 45 dicha afiliación, y la Comisión de Nombramientos se notificará que otra persona puede ser
 46 nombrada por el resto del término.

47 14. Ningún personal de la Oficina del Superintendente o conferencia de distrito será elegible para
 48 servir como miembro electivo de cualquier agencia de la Conferencia. Si fuese miembro en el
 49 momento de nombramiento o por sueldo, él o ella se considerarán haber renunciado dicha
 50 afiliación.

51 **Personal y Recursos de la Conferencia**

52 15. Habrá un Centro de Servicios Administrativos cuya función es administrar los recursos

 12 llenadas, por nombramiento o de lo contrario, a la discreción del Obispo.

16 a. Un miembro profesante elegido por cada cargo, como provisto por el ¶ 602.4 del Libro de
 17 Disciplina 2016;

18 b. Otro miembro laico adicional asignado a cada cargo para cada miembro del clero adicional
 19 que es nombrado para el cargo como previsto en ¶ 602.4 del Libro de Disciplina 2016;

20 c. Ministros Diaconales, Diaconisas activas, Misioneros Locales bajo nombramiento Episcopal
 21 dentro de los límites de la Conferencia, la Presidente de la Conferencia de las Mujeres
 22 Metodistas Unidas, el Presidente de la Conferencia de Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Líder
 23 Laico de la Conferencia, los Líderes Laicos de los Distritos, el Director de Siervos Ministeriales
 24 Laicos de la Conferencia, el Secretario de la Conferencia de Ministerios Globales (si es laico),

44 e. Otros miembros según lo definido por la Conferencia Anual que incluya: un representante
 45 adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones de la Conferencia de Hombres
 46 Metodistas Unidos, las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el Presidente
 47 y un representante adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones del distrito de las
 48 Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Hombres Metodistas Unidos, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el
 49 Canciller, el director laico a la Conferencia de Emaús (si existe), el Coordinador de

6 tarde de sesenta (60) días después de la Conferencia Anual. Cada distrito determinará el
7 método de elección.

8 g. A través de 2024 el número de miembros laicos adicionales elegidos deberá incluir a
9 miembros de ambas conferencias patrocinadoras.

10 h. Por lo menos el 10% de estos laicos adicionales será de treinta (30) años de edad o menos
11 en el momento de la elección.

12 19. De acuerdo con ¶ 659 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, las conferencias de distrito se compondrán
13 de todos los miembros de la Conferencia Anual como previsto por las reglas permanentes
14 relacionadas a las iglesias dentro de los límites de sus respectivos distritos y actualmente
15 elegidos. Además, se incluirá al Presidente de cada agencia del distrito.

16 **PROCEDIMIENTOS CONFERENCEIALES**

18 Conferencia que se hará disponible como documento electrónico o en forma impresa a todos los

22 21. La Conferencia Anual deberá hacer disponibles ediciones en inglés y en español de toda la
23 correspondencia oficial, incluyendo pero no limitado a los contenidos del Informe de Pre-
24 Conferencia y las Actas de la Conferencia. La Conferencia Anual también deberá presentar una
25 traducción oral entre el español e inglés, y también proveerá apoyo para personas con
26 discapacidades de audita y visión, durante las sesiones de la Conferencia Anual.

27 22. Las Resoluciones deberán llegar al piso de la Conferencia sólo después de consideración y
28 acción de la agencia apropiada de la Conferencia.

29 23. Los procedimientos de la Conferencia se regirán por los siguientes en orden de precedencia:
30 el Libro de Disciplina, las Reglas Permanentes, cualquier regla especial aprobada por la
31 Conferencia Anual y la edición actual de las Reglas de Orden Roberts.

32 24. El Secretario de la Conferencia deberá establecer la barra de la Conferencia. El Secretario de
33 la Conferencia nombrará y la Conferencia Anual elegirá a las personas necesarias para ayudar en
34 los procedimientos de la Conferencia. Estos incluyen el guardador de tiempo, los cajeros,
35 secretarios/as asociados/as y el Comité de Minutas.

36 25. Todos los oradores deben identificarse, dando su nombre y nombre de su iglesia, y decir si
37 son miembros del clero o laicos de la Conferencia.

38 26. Cada discurso desde el piso o en contra de una moción estará limitada a tres minutos. El
39 guardador de tiempo informará al Obispo cuando se ha expirado el tiempo.

40 27. El Consentimiento de Agenda 1 consiste en informes de agencias de la Conferencia que no
41 son de acción, sino "Únicamente para Información." La Conferencia actúa sólo para recibir estos
42 informes y para imprimirlos en el Diario. La Agenda de Consentimiento 2 consiste en informes de
43 acción sobre los cuales se cree que habrá poca o ninguna disidencia. Los elementos incluidos en
44 el Consentimiento de Agenda 2 están determinados por un grupo de trabajo compuesto por
45 miembros del Comité de Agenda y Adoración. Cualquier miembro de la Conferencia Anual puede

47 de un segundo y una explicación de un minuto por el creador de la propuesta, se tomará el voto

53 dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia Anual y puestos en efecto inmediatamente después
54 de su adopción, a menos que se indique lo contrario en la legislación. Las Reglas Permanentes

1 podrán ser suspendidas en cualquier momento por dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia
2 Anual.

3 29. El informe preliminar del Comité de Nominaciones se presentará a temprana hora en la agenda
4 de los procedimientos de la Conferencia Anual, incluyendo el proceso de nominaciones desde el
5 piso de la Conferencia. El informe final del Comité de Nominaciones será presentado y puesto en
6 acción durante una sesión posterior a esa Conferencia Anual.

7 30. Cualquier informe o resolución que requiera la acción de la Conferencia debe estar en manos
8 de la Secretaria de la Conferencia a la más temprana hora posible para permitir su impresión y
9 distribución a la Conferencia; es decir, veinticuatro (24) horas antes de que el informe sea
10 considerado por la Conferencia. Mociones del piso de la Conferencia deben presentarse por
11 escrito al Presidente y al Secretario de la Conferencia en el momento que la propuesta se presente.

12 31. El líder laico de la Conferencia presidirá la Comité de Resoluciones y Cortesías y será
13 responsable de nombrar a otras personas para ayudar en la preparación del informe.

14 32. Los únicos materiales que pueden ser colocados en las mesas del piso de la conferencia son
15 los materiales oficiales distribuidos por el Secretario de la Conferencia y su personal.

16 33. Las actas estarán disponibles en línea a no más tardar de sesenta (60) días después de la
17 clausura de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual.

18 OTROS

19 34. El informe de la Iglesia Local a la Conferencia Anual (Informe Anual de Estadísticas) requerido
20 por la Iglesia General será completado y presentado ante la Conferencia no más tarde del 30 de
21 enero, como se indica en ¶ 606.7 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Esto puede hacerse utilizando el
22 método determinado ser más fácil y efectivo por el/la estadístico/a de la Conferencia.

23 35. Habrá un Manual de Política que contiene las políticas adoptadas por la Conferencia Anual.
24 Cambios a estas políticas deben ser aprobados por la Conferencia Anual. El Secretario de la
25 Conferencia hará posible que éstas estén disponibles como documentos electrónicos y en forma
26 impresa.

27 36. Cualquier ministro de la Conferencia Anual que lleva a cabo un servicio funeral o memorial de

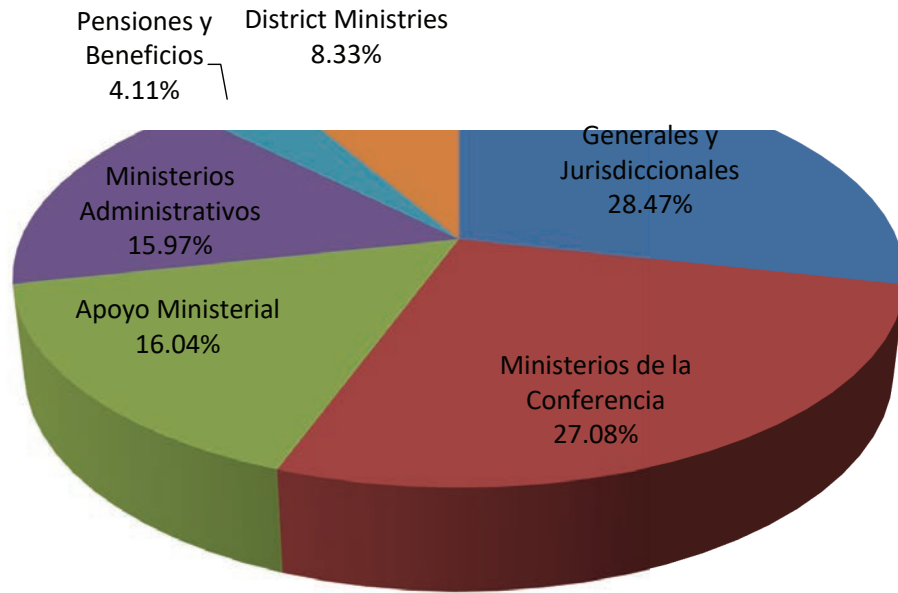

PARA INFORMACIÓN SOLAMENTE

El propósito de la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) es "desarrollar, mantener y administrar un plan integral y coordinado de servicios de políticas, procedimientos y gestión fiscales y administrativas para la Conferencia Anual" (¶611.1 *El Libro de Disciplina 2016*).

De acuerdo con el propósito disciplinario, la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) se ve propiamente como una parte integral de la misión y el ministerio de la Conferencia. Estamos trabajando para mejorar las comunicaciones con las otras agencias de la Conferencia para asegurarnos de que nuestro trabajo respalde los ministerios y las metas de La Mesa Unida y el Mission Field Ministry office.

Los recibos de todos los fondos para el año 2020 por la Conferencia Río Texas fueron de \$\$8,365,822, o 85.46% de la cantidad asignada. La Mesa de Finanzas propone el presupuesto para 2021. El presupuesto total asignado para todos los fondos asciende a \$8,245,384.

Sobre la base de ingresos del año anterior de estos fondos, la Mesa de Finanzas entonces determinará un porcentaje del presupuesto aprobado que debe ser autorizado para gastos en el resto de los artículos de cada presupuesto, para que los gastos no excedan los ingresos.
 - a. Cada iglesia se espera apoyar todos los fondos al 100% de la cantidad asignada. (¶247.14 *Libro de Disciplina 2016*)
 - b. Las iglesias deberán someter los pagos respectivamente, con el entendimiento que el Tesorero de la Conferencia destinará dichos pagos según el porcentaje correspondiente al fondo según el presupuesto de la Conferencia.
3. Una Cuenta de Balance de Fondos sin Restricción se mantendrá por la Conferencia Anual a un nivel mínimo del 20% del total actual de los fondos de la Conferencia. Cualquier ingreso de interés no designado se transferirá al saldo del fondo no designado al final del año fiscal.
4. Todos los costos asignados a fondos, pensiones y beneficios de salud, ambos ingresos y desembolsos, se gestionarán a través de la oficina del Tesorero de la Conferencia. Todas las juntas, agencias, comités y comisiones utilizarán el Tesorero de la Conferencia como agente fiscal.
5. El salario (incluida la vivienda y los servicios públicos) para los superintendentes de los distritos será recomienda a la Conferencia Anual por la Meza de Finanzas (CF&A), utilizando una fórmula directriz adoptada por el Comité de Personal de 1.85 veces la media de Compensación Conferencia (CAC). El propósito de la fórmula es de relacionar la Compensación del SD a la Compensación Clero de Tiempo Completo. Recomendamos que el cálculo del salario también se aplique a otros miembros del clero nombrados al personal de la conferencia a nivel de Gabinete. Para el año 2022, el gabinete a solicitado que esta formula se ponga a un lado dejando sus salarios congelados a la taza mas baja del 2020/2021.
6. Todas las agencias que reciben fondos del presupuesto de la Conferencia afirmararán que los fondos no serán gastados para usos no compatibles con ¶613.18-19 del *Libro de Disciplina 2016*.
7. El importe de compensación señalado como subsidio de vivienda para miembros ordenados y superintendentes de distrito de la Conferencia se establecerá por medio de una resolución anual de la Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A) después de la consideración de una declaración de las cantidades que se utilizarán durante el año.
8. Las juntas directivas de entidades Metodistas Unidas relacionadas deben aplicar a la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) la cual concederá el privilegio de solicitar y recibir fondos de las iglesias, individuos y otras fuentes (pero no de todas las ofrendas de la Conferencia, excepto como se indica en la lista que sigue) en conformidad con ¶262 *Libro de Disciplina 2016*; no hay campañas de capital que han sido aprobadas para el año 2018; y solamente las siguientes ofrendas de toda la Conferencia se aprueban para 2019:

9. El Presidente, el Vicepresidente y el Secretario de la Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A), el Presidente del Comité de Auditoría y el Tesorero de la Conferencia y el Director de Servicios

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3 10. La Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) está autorizada a nombrar a un Auditor de la Conferencia.
4 11. A un Fondo de la Conferencia no se le permite llevar adelante las asignaciones del presupuesto de un
5 año de la Conferencia a otro año a menos que específicamente se autorice por la Mesa de Finanzas
6 (CF&A). Agencias que reciben fondos de otras fuentes que no sean fondos asignados pueden avanzar
7 dichos fondos no gastados al año siguiente. Cualquiera asignación del presupuesto no autorizada para
8 ser avanzada se añadirá al saldo de Fondos no Designados de la Conferencia Anual.
9 12. Cada año, el Contador de la Conferencia establecerá una fecha de corte para todos los pagos del
10 presupuesto al Tesorero de la Conferencia que se aplicará al año anterior. Esta fecha se comunicará a
11 las iglesias locales a no más tardar del 1 de diciembre de cada año.
12 13. Cada junta de conferencia, agencia o institución en recepción o desembolso de fondos no manejados
13 por el Tesorero de la Conferencia deberá mantener registros financieros adecuados y preparar y
14 presentar informes anuales de auditoría al Tesorero de la Conferencia y la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A).
15 Todos los Tesoreros todos deberán tener fianzas apropiadas.
16 14. El Año de la Conferencia principia el 1 de enero de cada año y termina el 31 de diciembre de cada año.
17 15. La Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A) es responsable de designar depositarios de fondos de
18 la Conferencia.
19 16. La Conferencia incluirá en cada presupuesto anual una línea apropiada para cada Ministerio autorizado
20 como se define en el *Libro de Disciplina*.

INFORME VI

POLÍTICAS DE COMPENSACIÓN EQUITATIVA PARA ACCIÓN DE LA CONFERENCIA

21 La Política de Compensación Equitativa de la Conferencia Río Texas fue adoptada en la Sesión Especial de
22 las Conferencias del Suroeste de Texas y Río Grande, en 8 de febrero de 2014. La Comisión de
23 Compensación Equitativa propone varias actualizaciones a estas políticas.
24

POLÍTICAS DE COMPENSACIÓN EQUITATIVA

25 El grupo al que se le asignó la responsabilidad de estas políticas en ¶625.1 del Libro de Disciplina de la
26 Iglesia Metodista Unida de 2016 se denomina Comisión en este informe.

POLÍTICAS DE APOYO MÍNIMO

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28 A. Se entiende que la **Compensación mínima** es el Salario pagado por la Iglesia como se indica en la
29 parte dos, línea diez del Formulario de Compensación Pastoral 2023. Los siguientes niveles
30 mínimos de compensación para 2023 serán:
31 1. Para un miembro en Plena Conexión o en Prueba \$44,200.
32 2. Para un miembro Asociado \$41,100.
33 3. Para un Pastor Local Aprobado o miembro de otra denominación \$37,700.
34 **B. Ajustes a la Base de Compensación Mínima:** la compensación mínima total es igual a la
35 compensación base mínima, más la asignación por años de servicio, más la asignación por el
36 número de iglesias atendidas en un cargo.
37 • La asignación por años de servicio equivale a \$75 por año y se agregará a la compensación por
38 cada año de servicio bajo nombramiento episcopal en la Iglesia Metodista Unida, comenzando
39 con el segundo año de servicio hasta el vigésimo año por un máximo de \$1,425.
40 • La asignación para el número de iglesias equivale a \$200 adicionales por año que se pagará
41 por la segunda iglesia, y \$100 adicionales por año por cada otra iglesia servida por el pastor.
42 • Un participante no recibirá más del 30% del apoyo de compensación mínimo total aprobado
43 de la Comisión. Esa cantidad se reducirá por el porcentaje de las asignaciones de Servicio
44 Mundial/Iglesia General no pagadas para el año inmediatamente anterior.
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1 **C. Pastor Asociado:** Para avanzar en la misión específica de crecimiento de la Iglesia y proporcionar
 2 el uso más efectivo del apoyo de compensación, la Comisión considerará (pero no está obligada a)
 3 financiar un pastor asociado, si se cumplen las siguientes condiciones:

- 4 • Se cumplen todos los requisitos enumerados anteriormente para la compensación equitativa.
- 5 **(Nota editorial: En lo entero de este documento, el masculino también implica el femenino.)*
- 6 • Debe haber una indicación de que la iglesia local podrá sostener esta posición después de tres
 7 años de conferencia. La iniciativa puede provenir de la iglesia local o de los superintendentes
 8 de distrito. En una carta de solicitud, la iglesia local debe declarar sus necesidades de misión y
 9 ministerio. Los procedimientos siguen el proceso regular de la Comisión.
- 10 • La regla del 30%: no se otorgará más del 30% de la compensación mínima. (Ver regla #B)
- 11 • Estos son fondos iniciales únicamente y deben solicitarse para un primer pastor asociado en el
 12 cargo. Los fondos estarían disponibles durante tres años en la siguiente escala:
- 13 ➤ 1er Año - 30% de compensación pastoral
- 14 ➤ 2do Año - 20% de compensación pastoral
- 15 ➤ 3er Año - 10% de compensación pastoral
- 16 • No más del 20% del presupuesto de apoyo de compensación mínimo total para los Fondos de
 17 la Comisión se puede utilizar para pastores asociados.
- 18 • Se dará prioridad a las iglesias con potencial de crecimiento de acuerdo con las directrices de
 19 la Oficina de Desarrollo y Transformación de Nuevas Iglesias como recurso.
- 20 • Todas las solicitudes deben llegar a la Comisión de parte del Gabinete después de su
 21 aprobación.
- 22 • El apoyo se considerará solo para las iglesias que están pagando sus contribuciones en su
 23 totalidad.

24 **D. Apoyo para la transición:** Ocasionalmente, la Comisión de Compensación Equitativa se
 25 enfrenta a solicitudes inusuales de apoyo para la transición de los miembros de la Conferencia que
 26 están rompiendo su relación con la Conferencia Anual. En tal circunstancia, el apoyo de transición
 27 asociado con la terminación puede otorgarse como se muestra a continuación.

- 28 ▪ Miembros en Plena Conexión: El equivalente a dos meses de compensación mínima y \$100 por
 29 cada año de servicio en esta Conferencia o cada conferencia heredada.
- 30 ▪ Provisionales: El equivalente a un mes de indemnización mínima.
- 31 ▪ Pastor Local: \$500. Debe tener al menos tres años continuos de servicio en esta Conferencia
 32 Anual o en cada conferencia heredada.

33 El apoyo no es automático y el Gabinete debe solicitar el monto específico.

34 **REQUISITOS DE SALARIO MÍNIMO DE LOS PASTORES**

- 35 A. Un miembro de la Conferencia o pastor local aprobado que esté en buena conexión y que esté
 36 nombrado ael servicio de tiempo completo, tendrá derecho al Fondo de Compensación
 37 Equitativa. (Ver ¶342.1 y ¶625.12 del Libro de Disciplina de la Iglesia Metodista Unida de
 38 2016)
- 39 B. Un miembro de la Conferencia puede ser considerado para un reclamo de Compensación
 40 Equitativa prorrateada por servicio a tiempo parcial según lo estipulado en ¶342.2 y 645.12 del
 41 Libro de Disciplina de 2016.
- 42 C. Pastores jubilados o ministros laicos certificados no podrán reclamar los beneficios del Fondo
 43 de Compensación Equitativa. (Ver ¶268.6 y ¶357.6 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016).
- 44 D. Los nombramientos especiales y cualquier otro nombramiento fuera de los límites de la
 45 Conferencia Anual no serán elegibles para el apoyo de la Comisión. Ningún nombramiento
 46 excepto una iglesia o cargo local será elegible para apoyo.

47 **REQUISITOS DE SALARIO MÍNIMO DE IGLESIAS Y CARGOS**

- 48 A. Para ser elegible a participar, cada cargo debe mostrar señas de viabilidad, inclusive, entre
 49 otros:
- 50 • Se recomienda un promedio de asistencia al culto de por lo menos 45. Para las
 51 iglesias con menor asistencia, el superintendente de distrito presentará por escrito su
 52 entendimiento de las razones de la viabilidad del cargo.
- 53 • • Llevar a cabo un programa de administración para todos los miembros cada año.

- 1 • • Aumentar la cantidad que la iglesia local está pagando por la compensación del
- 2 pastor en al menos un 10 % por año
- 3 • • Adoptar un plan de reembolso responsable para los gastos profesionales de un
- 4 pastor que sea al menos el 13% de la compensación total
- 5 • • Se espera que cada iglesia pague las asignaciones de Servicio Mundial/Conferencia
- 6 en su totalidad. Se espera que cualquier iglesia que pague menos del 100% aumente
- 7 la cantidad de asignaciones de Servicio Mundial/Conferencia en no menos del 10%
- 8 por año mientras recibe asistencia.
- 9 • • Pagar el seguro de salud del pastor y la facturación directa de la pensión según la
- 10 política de la Conferencia Anual
- 11 • • El superintendente de distrito debe explicar por escrito el incumplimiento de
- 12 cualquiera de estas condiciones.
- 13 B. El apoyo de la Comisión de Compensación Equitativa no deberá exceder el 50% del monto de
- 14 la Compensación Mínima aprobada. Esta financiación máxima se reducirá por el porcentaje
- 15 de las asignaciones de Servicio Mundial o la Iglesia General no pagadas por el cargo del año
- 16 inmediatamente anterior.
- 17 C. Las solicitudes de compensación equitativa deberán presentarse de acuerdo con el siguiente
- 18 formato estandarizado establecido por la Comisión:
- 19 • Una carta de presentación del superintendente de distrito, que explique cualquier
- 20 circunstancia atenuante, especialmente para solicitudes más allá de la política
- 21 máxima de 3 años y/o para cargos que están disminuyendo en membresía. La carta
- 22 de presentación tendrá cuatro (4) anexos:
- 23 ○ Formulario de solicitud con las iniciales de(los) presidente(s) de PPRC y
- 24 firmado por el(los) presidente(s) de Finanzas, el pastor y el SD.
- 25 ○ Una copia del estado financiero del año anterior del cargo que incluya ingresos
- 26 y gastos y todos los fondos disponibles al final del año.
- 27 ○ Un breve resumen de la visión o las metas del cargo para el próximo año.
- 28 ○ Una copia del presupuesto del próximo año.
- 29 • Las solicitudes que no se presenten de acuerdo con las instrucciones anteriores serán
- 30 devueltas para que se completen correctamente.
- 31 D. Se podrá otorgar apoyo en la cantidad programada o en una cantidad menor a un cargo que no
- 32 cumpla con cualquiera de los anteriores, solo cuando sea aprobado por dos tercios de la
- 33 Comisión en una reunión ordinaria.

34 **PLAN DE REEMBOLSO CONTABLE**

35 El Plan de Reembolso Responsable es el método preferido por el cual se reembolsan los gastos que incurre
 36 el Pastor Metodista Unido al proporcionar servicios ministeriales. Se insta a cada Iglesia Metodista Unida en
 37 la conferencia a incluir una cantidad en su presupuesto anual de al menos el 13% de la compensación (línea
 38 10 en el formulario de compensación de 2023), como partida presupuestaria para estos gastos. El monto real
 39 adoptado debe ser recomendado a la conferencia de cargo por el Comité de Relaciones Pastor y Personal
 40 Pastoral después de revisar la necesidad. La cantidad podrá ser superior al 13% de la compensación. El monto
 41 presupuestado debe incluirse en el formulario de compensación en la línea 25.

42 Cuando se adopta este formulario de compensación en la conferencia de cargo, se están adoptando para el
 43 pastor las políticas relacionadas con el plan de reembolso responsable en este informe.

44 El pastor de la iglesia cuya compensación y gastos sean adoptados en el Formulario de Compensación del
 45 Pastor por el cargo o la conferencia de la iglesia, será reembolsado por los gastos comerciales ordinarios y
 46 necesarios incurridos en el desempeño de sus responsabilidades cuando justifiquen la cantidad, el propósito
 47 comercial, la fecha y el lugar del gasto Esta justificación debe proporcionarse al presidente del Comité de
 48 Relaciones Pastor y Personal Pastoral (o al tesorero de la iglesia) dentro de los sesenta (60) días de haber
 49 incurrido en el gasto. El individuo debe devolver a la iglesia cualquier cantidad recibida en exceso de los
 50 gastos comprobados dentro de los ciento veinte (120) días de haberla recibido.

51 El alcance de los deberes ministeriales incluidos en esta política involucra todos los deberes descritos en el
 52 Libro de Disciplina de 2016 y las políticas de la Conferencia Anual, inclusive la participación en los
 53 Ministerios Conexionales de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

54 Los gastos que normalmente se consideran razonables y necesarios para un pastor metodista unido incluyen:

- 1 • Gastos de viaje reembolsados a la tarifa federal estándar por milla, estacionamiento y
- 2 peajes
- 3 • Suministros de oficina y timbre
- 4 • Equipo de oficina, computadora y software
- 5 • Libros, suscripciones y publicaciones periódicas como diarios
- 6 • Cuotas profesionales
- 7 • Materiales religiosos, vestimentas y obsequios empresariales
- 8 • Educación continua y seminarios
- 9 • Entretenimiento requerido para los asuntos de la iglesia
- 10 • Pasajes de viaje, alojamiento y comidas durante los negocios de la iglesia (inclusive
- 11 la conferencia anual y otras reuniones de conexión)
- 12 • Teléfono celular en la medida en que se utilice con fines de negocios.
- 13 • Otros gastos comerciales razonables y habituales (según lo aprobado por el Comité
- 14 de RELaciones Pastor y Personal Pastoral y/o el comité de finanzas)
- 15

16 La propiedad comprada bajo un plan de reembolso responsable es propiedad de la iglesia que proporcionó
 17 el reembolso. Esto no es un problema para la mayoría de los artículos porque tienen un valor insignificante
 18 después de su uso o son de una naturaleza tan personal como las túnicas suyos artículos no son apropiados
 19 para dejar en la iglesia cuando el pastor se muda. El único artículo que se convierte en un problema es una
 20 computadora comprada bajo un plan de reembolso responsable para el uso comercial del pastor. Cuando un
 21 pastor pasa de otro nombramiento, la iglesia le dará al pastor la opción de comprar la computadora a su
 22 valor justo de mercado actual. Si la iglesia le da la computadora al pastor, entonces el obsequio es un
 23 evento sujeto a impuestos y el pastor debe informar el valor justo de mercado como ingreso sujeto a
 24 impuestos.

25 A ningún pastor se le debe reembolsar más de la mitad del monto total presupuestado antes de la
 26 conferencia anual cada año.

27 Cualquier reembolso de gastos de otras fuentes debe ser informado por el pastor y reducido a la cantidad
 28 del gasto sujeto a reembolso. En ningún caso el pastor debe recibir un reembolso total por todas las fuentes
 29 que exceda el costo real y/o la tarifa aprobada por el IRS para el reembolso del millaje.

30 Los gastos de asistencia a la conferencia anual de un pastor que se muda deben ser reembolsados del Plan
 31 de Reembolso Responsable del Cargo para el cual se nombra al pastor antes de la sesión de la conferencia
 32 anual.

33 Para mantener la confidencialidad de los llamados pastorales, está permitido que el pastor reporte un
 34 llamado pastoral en términos generales sin mencionar el nombre de la persona o personas llamadas, o la
 35 naturaleza del llamado.

36 La iglesia no informará ningún pago de reembolso debidamente justificado como ingreso en ningún
 37 Formulario W-2.

38 Esta política se aplica a los miembros del clero de la conferencia anual. Las iglesias con empleados laicos
 39 deben considerar adoptar una política que sea aplicable al personal laico.

40 **VACACIONES Y EDUCACIÓN CONTINUA**

41 A. La Conferencia Anual recomienda que a cada ministro en la Conferencia se le permita el
 42 siguiente tiempo mínimo de vacaciones: (todas las semanas incluyen los domingos)

43 0-7 años bajo nombramiento episcopal

44 (excluyendo el tiempo pasado en la escuela): dos semanas

45 8-12 años de servicio: tres semanas

46 13+ años de servicio: cuatro semanas

47 La Comisión recomienda que cada iglesia local y pastor tome en serio las políticas de educación
 48 continua adoptadas por la Conferencia General que se establecen en el ¶350 del Libro de Disciplina de
 49 2016, de y que se encuentran impresas a continuación para conveniencia de la Conferencia Anual.

50 ¶350. “Educación continua y Crecimiento Espiritual—1. A lo largo de sus carreras, el
 51 clero deberá participar en la educación continua para el ministerio, el desarrollo
 52 profesional y la formación y el crecimiento espiritual a fin de guiar a la iglesia en el
 53 cumplimiento de la misión de hacer discípulos para Jesucristo. Esto incluirá programas
 54 de estudio personales cuidadosamente desarrollados aumentados periódicamente por la
 55 participación en actividades educativas y de crecimiento espiritual organizadas”.

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5 B. En la mayoría de los casos, el programa de crecimiento espiritual y formación continua del
6 miembro del clero debe permitir tales permisos por lo menos una semana cada año y por lo
7 menos un mes durante un año de cada cuatrienio. Dichos permisos no se considerarán como
8 parte de las vacaciones del ministro y se planificarán en consulta con sus cargos u otras
9 agencias a las que estén designados, así como con el obispo, el superintendente de distrito y el
10 Comité de Educación Continua de la conferencia anual.

11 **POLÍTICAS DE ATRASOS**

- 12 1. En caso de que el tesorero de la iglesia local se dé cuenta de que la iglesia no podrá proporcionar
13 al pastor el pago completo de una nómina programada regularmente o una cuota de asignación de
14 vivienda, o remitir al tesorero de la conferencia el pago completo de los pagos regulares de
15 beneficios facturados directamente como pensión y atención médica, el tesorero de la iglesia
16 deberá notificar de inmediato tanto verbalmente (dentro de las 24 horas) como por escrito (dentro
17 de los 3 días) de el atraso inminente al pastor, al líder laico y a los presidentes de PPRC/P,
18 finanzas, Síndicos y el Concilio de administración/iglesia. Una vez recibido dicho aviso, el
19 presidente de PPRC/P y/o el pastor notificarán inmediatamente (dentro de 3 días) al
20 superintendente de distrito de el atraso inminente. Es responsabilidad del pastor conservar copias
21 de todas las notificaciones escritas y proporcionar una confirmación adicional por escrito al
22 superintendente de distrito cuando se produzca un pago atrasado. La falta de documentación de
23 salarios o beneficios atrasados puede resultar en una pérdida de compensación y/o pérdida de
24 pensión y beneficios.
- 25 2. Al recibir la notificación de un atraso pendiente, el presidente del PPRC/P convocará
26 inmediatamente (dentro de las 24 horas) una reunión del pastor, el líder laico y los presidentes de
27 finanzas, Síndicos y el Concilio Administrativo/eclesiástico para discutir el situación financiera y
28 buscar remedios para evitar que ocurra un atraso. Dichos remedios pueden incluir:
29
30 a. extracción de fondos invertidos, incluido el préstamo a corto plazo de fondos designados,
31 b. un llamamiento de emergencia para donaciones especiales de la congregación,
32 c. subvenciones o préstamos de emergencia del distrito o conferencia.
- 33 De acuerdo con el Libro de Disciplina de 2016 ¶624, dichos remedios no pueden incluir una
34 reducción en la compensación del pastor hasta el comienzo del próximo año de la Conferencia.
- 35 3. Si, después de consultar entre el líder laico y los presidentes de PPRC/P, finanzas, Síndicos y el
36 Concilio Administrativo/eclesiástico, se hace evidente que la iglesia puede estar enfrentando una
37 crisis financiera a largo plazo, el presidente de PPRC/P deberá notificar por escrito al pastor y al
38 superintendente que:
39 a. puede ser necesaria una Subvención de Subsidio de Compensación Equitativa para
40 mantener la compensación por el resto del año de la Conferencia, o
41 b. puede ser necesario un cambio en la compensación o nombramiento pastoral al comienzo
42 del siguiente año de la Conferencia.
- 43 4. Si la iglesia local incurre en demora en la compensación del pastor (es decir, más de 30 días de
44 demora), entonces el superintendente de distrito notificará a la Comisión de Compensación
45 Equitativa (CCE), que por su propia iniciativa puede hacer cualquiera o todas las siguientes, pero
46 no limitado a:
47 a. enviar un representante de CCE para reunirse con la iglesia local y el pastor para buscar
48 una solución al problema,
49 b. desarrollar con la iglesia local un plan de pago para que el pastor reciba el pago total de la
50 compensación al final del año de la conferencia. El superintendente de distrito será
51 invitado a participar en este proceso.
- 52 5. Si un pastor nombrado a una iglesia local ya está recibiendo un subsidio de la Comisión de
53 Compensación Equitativa, la Comisión también puede:
54 a. examinar la solicitud original de concesión de la subvención para determinar si se redujo
55 el importe solicitado para satisfacer la compensación mínima,

- 1 b. exigir una auditoría externa de todos los fondos de la iglesia de conformidad con las
- 2 Directrices de GCFA,
- 3 c. notificar al superintendente de distrito de sus conclusiones y recomendaciones por
- 4 escrito.
- 5 6. Si una iglesia local se atrasa en el pago de la pensión y los beneficios facturados directamente del
- 6 pastor (es decir, más de 30 días de atraso), entonces el Tesorero de la Conferencia notificará al
- 7 Oficial de Beneficios de la Conferencia, al superintendente de distrito y a la Comisión de
- 8 Compensación Equitativa. En nombre de la conferencia, el oficial de beneficios y/o el
- 9 superintendente de distrito desarrollará un plan de pago por escrito con la iglesia local para que la
- 10 conferencia reciba el pago total de la pensión y los beneficios al final del año de la conferencia.
- 11 7. El ¶2543.1 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016 aclara que ningún bien inmueble en el que se ubique el
- 12 edificio de una iglesia o una casa pastoral se hipotecará para pagar los gastos actuales o
- 13 presupuestados de una iglesia local (incluidos los atrasos), ni los ingresos principales de una venta
- 14 de cualquier propiedad de este tipo. Esta disposición se aplicará por igual a las iglesias locales
- 15 incorporadas y no incorporadas.
- 16 8. En circunstancias extremas y no resueltas, la iglesia local y/o el pastor pueden solicitar a una sesión
- 17 de la conferencia anual, siguiendo los procedimientos apropiados, asistencia en el pago de los
- 18 atrasos que no excedan los estándares mínimos de compensación de la conferencia. Sin embargo,
- 19 es responsabilidad de la iglesia local proporcionar una compensación mínima para su clero
- 20 designado.
- 21 9. Es responsabilidad del pastor proporcionar evidencia de un pago atrasado proporcionando
- 22 documentación tal como: Informes del tesorero, informes de la conferencia de cargo sobre el
- 23 salario y la compensación adoptados, talones de cheques, formularios W-2 y un formulario de
- 24 certificación de pago firmado por el Pastor, el Presidente de S/PRC, el Presidente de Síndicos, el
- 25 Tesorero y el Presidente del Concilio Administrativo de la iglesia.
- 26 10. El plazo de prescripción para presentar una reclamación de fondos de la Conferencia Anual (es
- 27 decir, notificación al superintendente de distrito del atraso) por cualquier salario atrasado es de un
- 28 año a partir de la fecha del atraso inicial. Una vez que finaliza una cita, el pastor ya no tiene
- 29 derecho a reclamar fondos de compensación a la iglesia local.
- 30 11. Se puede presentar una queja administrativa contra un pastor que no informe un atraso de acuerdo
- 31 con los plazos establecidos en esta política.

ESTÁNDARES DE VIVIENDA

El sistema itinerante sigue siendo hoy tan central para el metodismo como lo fue en los días de los ambulantes de circuito (*circuit riders*). Sin embargo, junto con la itinerancia, la Iglesia exige que el clero también asuma roles tradicionales, como convertirse en pastores residentes y ciudadanos responsables en la comunidad en la que sirven. Con la expectativa de residencia ha surgido la necesidad de proporcionar vivienda adecuada para el clero y sus familias.

Para satisfacer estas necesidades sentidas y para llamar a hombres y mujeres a un ministerio dedicado, la iglesia debe proporcionar condiciones de vida que establezcan una base adecuada desde la cual operar; esto debe hacerse a través de una casa pastoral o un subsidio de vivienda. Es el privilegio y la responsabilidad de los miembros de la congregación hacer todo lo posible para proporcionar el entorno físico que brindará al pastor y a la familia la máxima comodidad y conveniencia. Esto permite que las energías del pastor se concentren más en su tarea y servicio voluntario en la Iglesia de Dios. Debido a que la casa pastoral, cuando se provee, como los edificios de la iglesia reflejan a la congregación y al pastor, debe estar en tal condición que todos los involucrados puedan estar justificadamente orgullosos. Los estándares para la Conferencia Anual son los siguientes:

NORMAS

- A. **Ubicación:** La vivienda debe estar ubicada en un entorno que permita la comodidad, seguridad y conveniencia de la familia del pastor. Se debe considerar el área en la que reside la congregación. Si se proporciona una casa pastoral, la mejor manera de obtener una privacidad razonable es colocar en un área que no junto a la iglesia.
- B. **Estructura de la Casa Pastoral:** Se requerirá no menos de lo siguiente.

1. Tres (3) habitaciones con espacio de guardarropas adecuado

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2. Dos (2) baños
 3. Sala familiar
 4. Comedor
 5. Cocina que incluya estufa de 4 elementos y horno, refrigerador con congelador
 6. Espacio de almacenamiento bien distribuido por toda la casa
 7. Área de lavado con lavadora y secadora
 8. Garaje o cochera para dos coches
 9. Zona segura de juegos al aire libre para niños
 10. Calentador de agua
 11. Aire y calefacción central
 12. Coberturas de ventanas
 13. Revestimientos de suelos

C. Casa pastoral Mobiliario: El pastor es responsable de proporcionar todo el mobiliario que no sea el establecido en (B) Estructura.

D. Obsequios:

1. Un obsequio de muebles o enseres por parte de un miembro del cargo se designará claramente como un obsequio a la familia del clero o un obsequio para uso en la casa pastoral.
2. Si una familia del clero usará cualquier obsequio pasado o presente (mobiliario) nombrado auso en la casa pastoral será enteramente a discreción de la persona del clero o de la familia.
3. Cualquier mueble o enseres donados para uso en la casa pastoral y no utilizados por la familia del clero que ocupa la casa pastoral serán almacenados o eliminados a expensas de la iglesia.
4. Todos los obsequios a la casa pastoral deben ser aprobados por el comité de la casa pastoral.

E. Subsidios de vivienda: Cuando la opción de subsidio de vivienda se toma por un cargo, el subsidio de vivienda deberá ser al menos igual al valor de alquiler de mercado justo de la comunidad para una casa que cumpla con los estándares mínimos de vivienda.

F. Seguridad: La casa deberá estar equipada con las siguientes características de seguridad:

1. Extinguidor en cocina con inspección anual
2. Iluminación exterior
3. Candados con pestillo
4. Detectores de humo y/o calor
5. Detectores de monóxido de carbono

G. Accesibilidad: ¶2544 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016 establece que todas las instalaciones de casas pastorales recién adquiridas o remodeladas deberán:

1. Cumplir con los códigos locales de construcción, incendios y accesibilidad.
2. Disponer en planta baja:
 - a. Una habitación que puede ser utilizada como dormitorio por una persona con discapacidad;
 - b. Un baño totalmente accesible.

Se entiende que las casas pastorales existentes que no son instalaciones alquiladas tienen derechos adquiridos

con respecto a la accesibilidad total. Cada iglesia hará esfuerzos razonables para brindar acceso y seguridad en

aquellas casas pastorales que no estarán involucradas en remodelaciones importantes. Esto ayudará a permitir la itinerancia abierta de todos los pastores y la comodidad de las familias de la casa pastoral.

H. Servicios públicos: La iglesia local pagará el costo de todos los servicios públicos. (El IRS define los servicios públicos como: gas, electricidad, agua, combustible para calefacción, recolección de basura, servicio telefónico residencial, servicio de teléfono celular, televisión por cable y servicio de Internet). La Conferencia Río Texas considera el servicio de teléfono celular como un elemento del Plan de Reembolso Respondiente y no como una utilidad.

I. Casa pastoral Mantenimiento:

1. El mantenimiento y la reparación son responsabilidad de la Iglesia:

- 1 a. La iglesia debe incluir anualmente en el presupuesto una cantidad para las
2 reparaciones de la casa pastoral. Una partida presupuestaria anual permitirá que los
3 Síndicos y el Comité de Casa Pastoral tengan un programa de mantenimiento y
4 mejora consistente, en lugar de desorden, que será menos costoso a largo plazo.
5 b. Se debe pintar el interior y el exterior de la casa pastoral con la frecuencia necesaria.
6 c. Todos los aparatos y equipos deben revisarse y ajustarse regularmente.
7 2. Las familias de la casa pastoral son responsables de las reparaciones necesarias por los daños
8 causados por los miembros de la familia de la casa pastoral o las mascotas.
9 3. Decoración: La iglesia debe mantener tanto el interior como el exterior de la casa pastoral en tal
10 estado de decoración que conserve su condición física y valor estético. La decoración debe
11 programarse con el pastor para la conveniencia de la familia.
12 4. Privacidad: La casa pastoral es el hogar del pastor. Todas las inspecciones y reparaciones deben
13 programarse con el pastor para la conveniencia de la familia, incluida la revisión anual de la
14 casa pastoral.
- 15 **J. Aseguranza de la Casa pastoral:**
16 1. La casa pastoral estará cubierta por el plan de seguro de la conferencia.
17 2. Es responsabilidad del pastor asegurar la propiedad personal perteneciente al pastor o a la
18 familia.
- 19 **K. Registros de garantías y reparaciones de la casa pastoral:** La casa pastoral debe tener un libro o
20 cuaderno que contenga todas las garantías y libros de instrucciones para los aparatos y equipos
21 propiedad de la iglesia. El cuaderno también debe contener un registro de compras y reparaciones.
- 22 **L. Propiedad de la Casa Pastoral:**
23 1. Puede ser propiedad de una iglesia local, cargo o distrito, y la escritura debe incluir una cláusula
24 de fideicomiso apropiada como se establece en ¶2503 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016.
25 2. Puede ser arrendado o alquilado por una iglesia, cargo o distrito.
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- 30 **M. Parejas de clérigos:** La Acción de la Conferencia General proporciona que vivienda no es una
31 compensación para los pastores designados para iglesias en la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Cuando dos
32 pastores que están casados entre sí son designados para cargos vecinos donde es razonable que vivan
33 en la misma casa pastoral, ninguno de los pastores tiene derecho a un subsidio de vivienda o alquiler
34 de la casa pastoral no utilizada. Sin embargo, esta situación puede ser considerada durante el
35 establecimiento de la compensación del pastor.
- 36 **N. Inventario de la Casa Pastoral:** El Comité de la Casa Pastoral y los Síndicos mantendrán un inventario
37 de los equipos y muebles que son propiedad de la iglesia y, cuando sea posible, mantendrán un registro
38 en video. Este inventario incluirá cualquier obsequio a la casa pastoral, que puede ser utilizado o no
39 por la familia del pastor. El inventario debe actualizarse para mostrar la disposición de estos obsequios
40 cuando no se usan en la casa pastoral. El inventario debe revisarse anualmente.
- 41 **O. Casa pastoral Procedimientos en el cambio pastoral:**
42 1. Al mudarse de la casa pastoral, el pastor se comunicará con el Comité de Casa Pastoral (o PPRC/P o
43 Síndicos si estos comités tienen la tarea de ese cargo en particular) para establecer una cita para
44 revisar la casa pastoral. Se debe tener cuidado en este momento para asegurarse de que la casa
45 pastoral se deje en orden en cuanto a reparación y limpieza.
46 2. Se debe revisar cuidadosamente un inventario de los equipos y muebles propiedad de la iglesia.
47 3. El(los) mismo(s) comité(s) establecerá(n) con el pastor entrante un tiempo para revisar la casa
48 pastoral de limpieza, reparación y el inventario del equipo y mobiliario que sea propiedad de la
49 iglesia.
50 4. Cualquier incumplimiento grave de limpieza adecuada, reparación o inventario inadecuado se
51 informará de inmediato al superintendente del distrito.
52 5. Se recomienda que las familias pastorales se muden de la antigua casa pastoral dos días antes de la
53 fecha oficial de mudanza. La iglesia que envía debe pagar por dos noches en un motel. Esto le
54 daría a la iglesia que envía por lo menos un día y medio para hacer cualquier reparación, pintura,
55 etc., en la casa pastoral antes de que se mude el nuevo pastor.

1 **P. Revisión anual de la casa pastoral:** Cada año, el pastor con el presidente de los comités
 2 correspondientes realizarán una revisión para garantizar el mantenimiento adecuado (§258.2g(16) y
 3 2533.4 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016). Esta revisión se completará en un formulario estandarizado
 4 proporcionado por el superintendente de distrito y se presentará como un informe de conferencia de
 5 cargos.

6 **Q.** Se permiten excepciones a estas políticas para pastores asociados, cargos de puntos múltiples y
 7 pastores a tiempo parcial con la concurrencia de todas las partes.
 8

9 **PÓLIZA DE GASTOS DE MUDANZA**

10 **A. Elegibilidad:** Son elegibles los clérigos que se trasladan a un nombramiento de tiempo completo a
 11 un cargo de conferencia y los clérigos que se trasladan a un nombramiento donde el salario lo paga
 12 directamente la conferencia (superintendentes de distrito y personal de la conferencia).
 13 Son elegibles los clérigos que ingresan al estado de jubilado o que se van de licencia por
 14 discapacidad de los nombramientos.

15 **B. Ley de Reforma Fiscal del IRS:** A partir del 1 de enero de 2018, la Ley de Empleos y Reducción
 16 de Impuestos hizo que los gastos de mudanza estén sujetos al impuesto sobre la renta del IRS para
 17 la persona que se muda. Debido a que los clérigos se mudan regularmente para cumplir sus
 18 nombramientos, este cambio tiene un impacto tangible.

- 19 1. Los pagos y reembolsos de gastos de mudanza hechos directamente desde la Conferencia
 20 de Río Texas a una empresa de mudanzas en su nombre o reembolsados a usted ahora
 21 deben incluirse en el ingreso bruto, lo que crea una obligación tributaria.
- 22 2. Además, estos pagos ahora están sujetos a los impuestos del Seguro Social y Medicare.
- 23 3. El clero es responsable de declarar estos montos imposables y debe planear realizar pagos
 24 de impuestos adicionales para cubrir la obligación. Se espera que esta política dure hasta
 25 el 31 de diciembre de 2025.
- 26 4. Todo el clero que se mude después de 2017, ya sea que se le pague directamente a la
 27 empresa de mudanzas o se le reembolse conforme a la Política de Gastos de Mudanza de
 28 la Conferencia, recibirá un Formulario 1099-Misc de la Conferencia el año siguiente.
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30 **C. Procedimientos de Mudanza**

31 **1. Proceso general:**

32 Tras la notificación del Obispo de que un clero se mudará, obtendrán presupuestos de dos
 33 compañías
 34 de mudanzas. Una estimación debe provenir de una lista de empresas de mudanza
 35 proporcionada por la
 36 Comisión de Compensación Equitativa y Gastos de Mudanza, o con quienes la Comisión haya
 37 negociado un contrato. Si dos ofertas no son factibles, comuníquese con la Comisión y se puede
 38 hacer una excepción.

39 Tan pronto como sea posible después de la notificación de la mudanza, el clero enviará
 40 estimaciones para su revisión a la Comisión a través del formulario de transmisión. Las
 41 empresas de mudanza deben enumerarse en orden de preferencia. Cuando la primera opción del
 42 clero es una empresa de mudanzas que es la alternativa más costosa, la Comisión puede limitar
 43 el pago al monto de la oferta más baja.

44 El pastor debe especificar a las empresas de mudanza que las ofertas deben incluir una
 45 inspección visual y que la oferta debe incluir las palabras "precio garantizado sin exceder".
 46 Cuando un pastor se muda sin la ayuda de profesionales de mudanza, se debe proporcionar a la
 47 Comisión una estimación de los gastos al menos tres semanas antes de la mudanza.
 48 Después de que se haya completado una mudanza, el clero completará el formulario de
 49 Encuesta de Gastos de Mudanza y lo enviará a la Comisión.

50 La Comisión verifica que la mudanza esté cubierta por las pólizas de mudanza y dirige
 51 cualquier pregunta al clero.

52 La Comisión luego notificará al clero de su aprobación para proceder.

53 Después de que se realiza la mudanza, la Oficina del Tesorero de la Conferencia manda el pago
 54 directamente a la empresa de mudanza al recibir la factura firmada por el pastor reubicado.

1 Se recomienda que las familias pastorales se muden de las anteriores casas pastorales dos días
 2 antes de la fecha oficial de mudanza. La iglesia anterior pagaría por dos noches en un motel.
 3 Esto le daría a la iglesia que envía por lo menos un día y medio para hacer cualquier trabajo de
 4 reparación, pintura, etc. en caso de que un nuevo pastor se va a mudar a esa casa pastoral.
 5 Si la iglesia receptora necesita tiempo adicional para realizar reparaciones en su casa pastoral,
 6 entonces la iglesia receptora es responsable de los gastos de mudanza adicionales incurridos y
 7 del alojamiento de la familia del clero que llega hasta que la casa pastoral esté lista para ser
 8 ocupada.

9 El Comité de Relaciones de Pastor y Personal de cada cargo que recibe un nuevo pastor
 10 designará a uno de sus miembros para servir como Coordinador de Mudanza, quien coordinará
 11 la mudanza con el pastor entrante y trabajará para facilitar la mudanza más fácil y placentera
 12 posible. En la reunión introductoria entre el Comité de Relaciones de Pastor y Personal de la
 13 Iglesia y el nuevo pastor, el Coordinador de Mudanza estará presente para ser presentado al
 14 pastor.
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16 2. Categorías de Mudanza

- 17 a. **Mudanzas locales:** son mudanzas en las que la empresa de mudanzas cobra una tarifa
 18 por hora por una mudanza a través de una ciudad o a un pueblo vecino. La asignación
 19 para dichas mudanzas será de hasta \$1,500 para la mudanza y \$850 para el embalaje.
 20 b. **Mudanzas de larga distancia:** todos los demás movimientos (excepto los movimientos
 21 propios). La asignación para este tipo de mudanzas es de hasta 14.000 libras, 17.000
 22 libras para parejas de clérigos.
 23 c. **Mudanza propia:** si el clero elige mudarse él mismo, debe proporcionar al menos un
 24 presupuesto profesional a la Comisión. Se reembolsará el costo real de la mudanza, hasta
 25 el monto en el que se incurriría si se utilizaran profesionales de la mudanza como se
 26 definió anteriormente.
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 31 3. El pastor puede solicitar el reembolso de la compra de materiales de embalaje, suministros de
 32 embalaje y/o servicios de embalaje hasta un límite de \$850. Si utiliza los servicios de una
 33 empresa de mudanzas para empacar, verifique con la empresa de mudanzas exactamente qué
 34 servicios se proporcionarán.
 35 4. Cambio de Nombramiento sin cambio de domicilio – El clero será reembolsado hasta \$200 para
 36 pagar el costo del traslado de material profesional.
 37

38 D. Limitaciones

- 39 1. Cuando una mudanza sea desde un punto fuera de los límites de la conferencia anual, la
 40 conferencia pagará según estas políticas con una limitación del costo total hasta \$5,000.
 41 2. Los clérigos que ingresan al estado de jubilado o que se van de licencia por discapacidad
 42 serán reubicados bajo estas políticas hasta un máximo de \$5,000.
 43 3. El clero designado o transferido a otra Conferencia buscará en la Conferencia receptora el
 44 reembolso de los gastos de mudanza.
 45 4. No se hará ningún reembolso excepto cuando haya un cambio de clasificación o
 46 nombramiento que realmente resulte en una mudanza.
 47 5. Cuando uno o ambos miembros de una pareja del clero estén involucrados en una
 48 mudanza, el límite de 14,000 libras se incrementará a 17,000 libras para incluir material
 49 profesional adicional. El límite de reembolso de embalaje de \$850 se aplica a toda la
 50 mudanza. Si hay dos casas involucradas en cualquiera de los extremos de la mudanza,
 51 cada mudanza califica para el reembolso de forma independiente. Cuando una mudanza
 52 incluye más de 17,000 libras, la cantidad que paga la Conferencia se reducirá a una
 53 cantidad que la Comisión determine que es apropiada.
 54 6. En ningún caso la Conferencia pagará más que el gasto real documentado de cualquier
 55 mudanza elegible.

1 7. No hay reembolso bajo esta política por gastos de automóvil, visitas a la nueva cita, o
2 comida y alojamiento.

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4 8. El pago total está limitado a:

- 5 a. Mudanza local - \$1,500 por mudanza, \$850 por empaque.
6 b. Mudanza de larga distancia: 14,000 libras, más hasta \$850 para materiales de embalaje
7 y/o servicios.
8 c. Propia mudanza: Se reembolsará el costo real de la mudanza, hasta el monto en el que
9 se incurriría si se utilizaran profesionales de la mudanza, más materiales de embalaje o
10 servicios que no excedan los \$850 por embalaje y mudanza.
11 d. Cobrar la mudanza sin cambiar la ubicación de la casa - \$200.

12 9. La Conferencia proporcionará cobertura de valor de reemplazo para artículos del hogar
13 mientras estén en tránsito hasta un límite de \$75,000. Si el valor de su contenido es
14 superior a \$75,000, el clérigo deberá obtener un seguro de forma independiente y a su
15 cargo.

16 10. Se aplica un deducible de \$1,000 en el seguro anterior. Si se sufre una pérdida, se puede pedir
17 ayuda a la Comisión con el deducible.

18
19 **E. Responsabilidad de la Comisión de Compensación Equitativa y Gastos de Mudanza**

- 20 1. La Comisión de Compensación Equitativa y Gastos de Mudanza tendrá la
21 responsabilidad de implementar y administrar esta política.
22 2. Si surgen circunstancias inusuales en relación con una mudanza, la Comisión puede votar
23 para conceder una excepción por una mayoría del 60%.
24 3. La Comisión será el árbitro final de cualquier disputa relacionada con la implementación
25 de esta política.
26 4. La Comisión está autorizada para celebrar contratos con empresas de mudanzas.
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30 5. La Comisión creará y mantendrá una lista de mudanzas que han respondido a las
31 necesidades de la Conferencia y las necesidades de los pastores de la Conferencia
32 involucrados en las mudanzas.

**POLÍTICA DE COMPENSACIÓN EQUITATIVA

- 34 1. El Fondo del Ministerio Hispano de Compensación Equitativa se utilizará para propósitos
35 misionales en el desarrollo y compensación básica de pastores y laicos en liderazgo pastoral
36 comprometidos en el ministerio hispano/latino dentro de la Conferencia Rio Texas.
37 2. Se dará prioridad a los pastores y laicos de tiempo completo o de tiempo parcial en el liderazgo
38 pastoral que participen en el ministerio hispano/latino en las colonias a lo largo de la frontera de
39 EE. UU. y México y/o en el desarrollo de nuevas comunidades de fe y nuevas congregaciones con
40 hispanos o enfoque latino, particularmente donde hay un crecimiento significativo en la población
41 hispana/latina y potencial para alcanzar nuevas personas para Cristo.
42 3. Los pastores o laicos en el liderazgo pastoral que reciban estas subvenciones estarán vinculados
43 administrativamente para el apoyo, la responsabilidad y el financiamiento de una congregación o
44 grupo de iglesias locales o distritos misionales existentes y en crecimiento.
45 4. El superintendente de distrito respectivo deberá demostrar cómo el financiamiento de dichos
46 pastores o laicos en el liderazgo pastoral es una parte integral de la estrategia misional general del
47 distrito, promueve las metas específicas del distrito misional y enumerará fuentes de
48 financiamiento adicionales para apoyar este ministerio.
49 5. Las subvenciones se aprobarán anualmente y podrán renovarse para pastores de tiempo completo
50 y/o laicos en liderazgo pastoral hasta por tres años o para aquellos que sirvan a tiempo parcial

- 1 hasta por seis años. La Comisión esperará que las congregaciones o grupo de iglesias o distrito o
 2 "partes interesadas" "patrocinadoras" asuman gradualmente el apoyo financiero del ministerio
 3 específico.
- 4 6. La solicitud de subvención incluirá:
 5 a. un plan de acción del ministerio
 6 b. una lista de representantes de las "congregaciones patrocinadoras" o "partes interesadas" que
 7 brindan apoyo, dirección, responsabilidad y apoyo financiero
 8 c. un presupuesto anual y las fuentes de ingresos del ministerio
 9 d. una recomendación por escrito y aprobación de la solicitud del superintendente de distrito y la
 10 entidad de estrategia de misión del distrito
- 11 8. El importe por subvención se determinará caso por caso pero procurará estar dentro de los límites
 12 fijados por la Comisión.
- 13 9. Las solicitudes posteriores del mismo ministerio requerirán un informe de progreso a tiempo, un
 14 informe financiero detallado sobre gastos e ingresos, una cantidad proporcionalmente menor
 15 solicitada, la recomendación del superintendente de distrito y el comité de estrategia de misión del
 16 distrito, un progreso claro en la obtención de otras fuentes de financiamiento y otra información
 17 pertinente que pueda ayudar a la Comisión a evaluar el ministerio.

- 19 Se insta a todas las juntas y agencias a considerar las opciones de reuniones digitales; esto permite tanto la
 20 economía de viajes como una mayor participación de toda la conferencia. Cuando la conexión digital no sea
 21 posible o efectiva, se insta a todas las juntas y agencias a programar reuniones, en la medida de lo posible, en
 22 fechas y lugares coincidentes con otros grupos con el fin de incidir en la economía en los gastos de viaje. Los
 23 gastos de viaje se pagarán a los miembros que asisten a reuniones oficiales de la Conferencia (entre períodos
 24 de sesiones anuales de la conferencia) a base de 40 centavos por milla. La asignación para las comidas será
 25 de \$3.00 para el desayuno; \$7.00 para ambos el almuerzo y la cena por las reuniones. Se hará el reembolso
 26 del 100% de gastos de alojamiento durante reuniones en hoteles contratados a través de la Conferencia Anual.
 27 Quienes optan por quedarse en otros lugares se les reembolsarán a la tarifa contratada más baja. El organizador
 28 de la reunión de conferencia proporcionará información de hoteles contratados a los participantes. Los recibos
 29 de alojamiento deberán acompañar la solicitud de desembolso. Estos subsidios no cubrirán el costo completo
 30 en cada caso, pues son simplemente para ayudar en el gasto adicional de asistir a reuniones.
- 31 Gastos de cuidado de niños por día de la reunión no deben exceder \$30.00 por el primer niño y \$20.00 por
 32 cada niño adicional, y estos gastos serán permitidos e incluidos en el costo de la reunión de la Junta o la
 33 Agencia.
- 34 Viajes de delegados debidamente elegidos o representantes de la Conferencia a las reuniones de otras
 35 organizaciones o agencias de conexión se pagarán como se indicó anteriormente. Sin embargo, gastos de viaje
 36 aéreo, hospedaje y otros gastos pueden pagarse si los fondos están disponibles por la junta o agencia
 37 correspondiente.
- 38 Cuando sea necesario volar a una reunión, el vuelo debe ser reservado al menos 14 días antes de la reunión.
 39 Si los vuelos no se reservan 14 días antes de la reunión, el miembro que reserva el vuelo deberá pagar la
 40 diferencia del costo del vuelo. Esto no se aplica en los casos raros cuando la reunión es una reunión de
 41 emergencia que no se anuncia antes de 14 días.
- 42 A cada iglesia local se le sugiere que respalde los gastos de la comida, el transporte, y el alojamiento de
 43 Conferencia Anual de los miembros asistiendo a la Conferencia Anual por medio de la adición de un mínimo
 44 de \$100 al presupuesto de la iglesia para delegados laicos y del clero. Los superintendentes de distrito deberán
 45 fomentar este apoyo en cada Conferencia de Cargo.

1 La Tasa de Servicio Pasado para 2023 será de **\$710** por año de crédito de anualidad para el Plan de
 2 Pensión Pre-82. Esto representa un aumento del 3 % con respecto a 2022. Esto refleja un aumento del
 3 1 % con respecto a la tasa de servicio anterior de 2021. El Plan de Pensión Pre-82, también conocido
 4 como el Suplemento Uno del Plan de Seguridad de Jubilación para el Clero (CRSP), es un plan de
 5 pensión de beneficios definidos administrado por Wespeth y brinda a los clérigos elegibles un
 6 beneficio de pensión por sus años de ministerio con la Iglesia Metodista Unida antes de 1982.

7 La Conferencia Río Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida adopta las siguientes resoluciones relacionadas
 8 con asignaciones de alquiler o vivienda para clérigos activos, jubilados, despedidos o discapacitados:
 9 POR CUANTO, la denominación religiosa conocida como La Iglesia Metodista Unida (la "Iglesia"), de la
 10 cual forma parte esta Conferencia, ha funcionado en el pasado y continúa funcionando a través de
 11 ministros del evangelio (dentro del significado de la sección 107 del Código de Rentas Internas) que
 12 fueron o son ministros de la iglesia debidamente ordenados, comisionados o autorizados ("personas
 13 del clero");
 14 POR CUANTO, la práctica de la Iglesia y de esta Conferencia fue y es proporcionar a los clérigos activos
 15 una casa pastoral o un subsidio de alquiler o vivienda como parte de su compensación bruta;
 16 POR CUANTO, las pensiones u otros montos pagados a clérigos activos, jubilados, despedidos y
 17 discapacitados se consideran compensación diferida y se pagan a clérigos activos, jubilados,
 18 despedidos o discapacitados en consideración del servicio activo anterior; y
 19 POR CUANTO, el Servicio de Impuestos Internos ha reconocido a la Conferencia (o sus predecesores)
 20 como la organización apropiada para designar un subsidio de alquiler o vivienda para los clérigos que
 21 son o fueron miembros de esta Conferencia y son elegibles para recibir dicha compensación diferida;
 22 AHORA, POR LO TANTO, SE RESUELVE QUE un monto equivalente al 100 % de los pagos de pensión,
 23 indemnización por despido o discapacidad recibidos de planes autorizados conforme al Libro de
 24 Disciplina de la Iglesia Metodista Unida (la "Disciplina"), que incluye todos esos pagos de Beneficios e
 25 inversiones de Wespeth, durante los años 2022 y 2023 por cada clérigo activo, jubilado, despedido o
 26 discapacitado que sea o haya sido miembro de la Conferencia, o sus predecesores, sea y por el
 27 presente sea designado como un subsidio de alquiler o vivienda para cada tal persona del clero; y que
 28 los pagos de pensión por despido o por discapacidad a los que se aplica este subsidio de alquiler o
 29 vivienda serán cualquier pago de pensión, despido o por discapacidad de planes, anualidades o fondos
 30 autorizados conforme a la Disciplina, incluidos dichos pagos de Wespeth Benefits and Investments
 31 "Wespeth" y de una compañía comercial de anualidades que proporciona una anualidad que surge de
 32 los beneficios acumulados bajo un plan, pensión o fondo de Wespeth autorizado bajo la Disciplina,

1 eligió hacer contribuciones o acumular un beneficio bajo , dicho plan, anualidad o fondo para la
 2 pensión o discapacidad de dicho clérigo activo, jubilado o discapacitado como parte de su

4 NOTA: La asignación de alquiler o vivienda que puede excluirse del ingreso bruto de un miembro del
 5 clero en cualquier año para fines del impuesto federal sobre la renta está limitada por la sección 107(2)
 6 del Código de Rentas Internas y las reglamentaciones a continuación al menor de (1) el monto del
 7 subsidio de alquiler o vivienda designado por el empleador del clérigo u otro organismo apropiado de
 8 la iglesia (como esta Conferencia en las resoluciones anteriores) para dicho año; (2) la cantidad gastada
 9 por el clérigo para alquilar o proporcionar una vivienda en dicho año; o (3) el valor justo de alquiler de
 10 la casa, incluidos los muebles y accesorios (como un garaje), más el costo de los servicios públicos en
 11 dicho año.

16 La Junta de Pensiones de la Conferencia Río Texas está dedicada a su misión de cuidar a aquellos que
 17 sirven en el ministerio con honor, apoyo y aprecio. Agradecemos a todas las congregaciones y
 18 miembros de la conferencia anual que se han mantenido firmes en su compromiso y apoyo a los
 19 beneficios de los participantes clérigos y laicos. Las principales preocupaciones son la alta inflación, la
 20 volatilidad del mercado, la "recuperación de la atención médica" y el impacto de la desafiliación en
 21 nuestra denominación. Los jubilados actuales y futuros han hecho preguntas sobre la solvencia de los
 22 beneficios en medio de la reestructuración denominacional. Wespeth proporciona recursos, incluidas
 23 preguntas frecuentes y responde a estas preguntas sobre los beneficios. La posición financiera y el
 24 objetivo de la Junta de Pensiones continúan siendo de estabilidad general con respecto a los beneficios
 25 y los activos del plan. La Junta continúa siendo una asociación estratégica con Wespeth en la
 26 administración de pensiones, bienestar, salud y beneficios auxiliares para garantizar que nuestro clero,
 27 participantes laicos e iglesias tengan los recursos y el apoyo que valora la Iglesia Metodista Unida.
 28 Además, Wespeth continúa brindando orientación en legislación, servicios actuariales y política
 29 denominacional.

30 Para 2023, se propone un aumento del 3% en la tasa de servicio pasado (PSR) anterior a 1982 para la
 31 acción de la conferencia, que es el aumento más grande en varios años. A partir del 1 de enero de
 32 2022, el plan de pensiones Pre-82, las anualidades del Plan de Pensiones Ministeriales (MPP) y el Plan
 33 de Seguridad de Jubilación para el Clero (CRSP-DB) están totalmente financiados y no se esperan
 34 pasivos adicionales en 2022 y 2023. Seguimos monitoreando la volatilidad del mercado para mantener
 35 un plan de activos sostenible a largo plazo para cumplir con los pasivos por beneficios para los
 36 beneficiarios. Con el aplazamiento de la Conferencia General hasta 2024, la legislación de pensiones
 37 propuesta por Wespeth para el nuevo plan Compass Defined Contribution (DC) se ha retrasado para
 38 su consideración junto con el potencial anticipado previamente de ahorros en costos del plan DC. Si
 39 se adopta en 2024, la implementación más temprana del Plan Compass es probablemente en 2026, lo
 40 que reduciría los costos de pensiones congregacionales del plan híbrido de Beneficio Definido (DB)
 41 actual.
 42

1 La supervisión del plan de pensiones de DB requiere una supervisión estratégica y una planificación de
 2 décadas en el futuro, ya que los niveles de financiación están sujetos a fluctuaciones. Varios factores
 3 afectan el estado de la financiación, inclusive la volatilidad del mercado, la legislación, los aumentos
 4 en la tasa de servicio anterior, el cumplimiento y los cambios en los supuestos actuariales. Más
 5 recientemente, la Junta realizó un estudio actuarial de 20 años para nuestros planes de pensión para
 6 ayudar en la planificación de los aumentos de PSR anteriores a 82 y desarrollar un plan de reserva para
 7 mantener la estabilidad, captar los ciclos económicos y cumplir con las obligaciones futuras para
 8 garantizar que todos los planes de beneficios de DB se financian para los beneficiarios.

9 **Beneficios de la salud**

10 Los participantes del plan HealthFlex continúan participando en el modelo de planes múltiples, lo que
 11 permite una mayor flexibilidad para elegir una combinación de planes que se ajuste a las necesidades
 12 de cada participante. Las preocupaciones actuales en el cuidado de la salud incluyen una mayor
 13 inflación, una mayor utilización debido a la atención de "puesta al día", reclamos por COVID
 14 prolongado, terapias con medicamentos genéticos y celulares de costo extremadamente alto e
 15 inflación en los precios del cuidado de la salud. No hubo cambios significativos en los planes HealthFlex
 16 en 2022 y Wespeth no prevé realizar ningún cambio en el diseño del plan para 2023. Agradecemos a
 17 todos los participantes por tomar medidas importantes para mantener una buena salud y usar los
 18 beneficios de manera adecuada.

- 20 ■ 2021 terminó con un índice de siniestralidad del 102,4 % en comparación con el 108,2 % en 2020 y el
 21 82 % en 2019. Históricamente, nuestro objetivo está entre un índice de siniestralidad del 80 % hasta el
 22 nivel de financiación del plan/siniestros.
- 23 ■ La renovación de tarifas para 2023 incluye un promedio de aumento del 6,1 % en los planes médicos y
 24 un promedio de aumento del 6,5 % en los planes dentales, lo que está en línea con las tendencias de
 25 los planes médicos nacionales. No se anunciaron aumentos para los planes de visión.
- 26 ■ El CDHP continúa teniendo la mayor utilización de reclamos de 2020 a 2021, finalizando con un índice
 27 de siniestralidad del 148 % a pesar de una disminución en los participantes. A continuación, se muestra
 28 el PPO con un índice de siniestralidad del 110 % y el HDHP con mejor desempeño de 77 %.

29 **Iniciativas de salud conductual**

30 En respuesta a la encuesta anual del clero y los nuevos desafíos que trajo la pandemia, Wespeth ha
 31 mejorado enormemente las iniciativas de salud mental en 2022. Apoyamos la salud mental, emocional y
 32 conductual de nuestros participantes como un imperativo para el ministerio y el bienestar. Esto incluye la
 33 expansión de la atención con visitas virtuales que también mejoraron el acceso a proveedores en geografías
 34 desatendidas. Estas iniciativas incluyen:

- 36 ■ *Primeros auxilios en salud mental*: un nuevo programa de capacitación de seminario web virtual abierto
 37 a todos los de la UMC con la intención de enseñar a los asistentes a identificar y comprender los
 38 desafíos de salud mental con empatía y sin juzgar. Además de aprender a ayudar a los demás, los
 39 asistentes aprenderán a aceptar y comprender sus propias necesidades de salud mental sin vergüenza.
- 40 ■ *EAP proporcionado por Optum Health* - Los participantes y dependientes pueden acceder al EAP
 41 Optum® Live and Work Well a través de la aplicación Virgin Pulse, por teléfono y en persona. HealthFlex
 42 ofrece ocho sesiones gratuitas por número por miembro de la familia por año.
- 43 ■ *Talkspace*: brinda apoyo de un terapeuta autorizado a través de mensajes de texto o chat de video.
- 44 ■ *MDLive*: ahora incluye visitas de videoterapeuta y psiquiatra junto con consultas médicas.

47 Como muchos de ustedes, durante la pandemia, hemos determinado cómo realizar reuniones virtuales de
 48 manera efectiva para realizar el trabajo asignado a nuestra Junta. El personal continuó brindando a los
 49 miembros de la Junta información financiera y administrativa sobre sus operaciones diarias. Estoy
 50 agradecido por la capacidad de nuestros miembros de adaptarse a un entorno virtual mientras continuamos
 51 siendo diligentes en la administración de los fondos para pensiones y seguros de salud.

1 FACTURACIÓN DIRECTA DE LA IGLESIA DEL PLAN DE PENSIÓN 2023

2 A partir del 1 de enero de 2023, la facturación directa de la iglesia por parte de la Conferencia para los
 3 clérigos participantes bajo nombramiento para el servicio activo actual incluirá:

- 4 ▪ El beneficio definido del Plan de Seguridad para la Jubilación del Clero (CRSP, por sus siglas en inglés)
 5 requiere una contribución anual de **\$6,132** por cada clérigo elegible de tiempo completo facturado
 6 mensualmente.
- 7 ▪ Plan de Seguridad para la Jubilación del Clero (CRSP) Contribución requerida definida del **3%** de la
 8 Compensación del Plan para cada clérigo elegible de tiempo completo facturado mensualmente.
- 9 ▪ El Plan de Protección Integral (CPP) requiere una contribución del **3%** de la Compensación del Plan para
 10 cada clérigo de tiempo completo elegible hasta un máximo de dos veces la compensación promedio
 11 denominacional de 2023 o DAC de \$76,221 en 2023 facturado mensualmente.
- 12 ▪ El Plan de Inversión Personal de los Metodistas Unidos (UMPIP-PT) requiere una Contribución del **9%**
 13 por cada clérigo de tiempo parcial elegible (3/4 de la cita de tiempo o menos) facturado mensualmente.
- 14 ▪ Contribuciones opcionales del Plan de Inversión Personal de los Metodistas Unidos (UMPIP) según lo
 15 elija el clero como una deducción de nómina facturada mensualmente.
- 16 ▪ El fondo de Rio Grande Legacy continuará brindando contribuciones a las iglesias heredadas elegibles
 17 para el clero de tiempo completo en el Plan de beneficios definidos por CRSP, el Plan de contribuciones
 18 definidas por CRSP y el Plan de protección integral (CPP).
- 19 ▪ El fondo de Rio Grande Legacy continuará brindando una contribución del **9%** al clero de tiempo
 20 parcialegible designado a una iglesia heredada en el Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido
 21 UMPIP-PT.

22 PLAN DE PENSIONES PRE-82

23 El Plan de Pensión Pre-82, también conocido como el Suplemento Uno del Plan de Seguridad de Jubilación
 24 para el Clérigo (CRSP), es un plan de pensión de beneficios definidos administrado por Wespath y brinda a
 25 los clérigos elegibles un beneficio de pensión por sus años de ministerio con la Iglesia Metodista Unida antes
 26 de 1982. El Plan de Pensiones Pre-82 fue reemplazado por el Plan de Pensiones Ministeriales (MPP) a partir
 27 del 1 de enero de 1982. Una de las responsabilidades de la Junta de Pensiones es recomendar a la
 28 Conferencia anual la Tasa de Servicio Pasado o (PSR) al clero por cada año de servicio elegible en el Plan de
 29 Pensión Pre-82.

30
 31 A medida que la necesidad de brindar beneficios de pensión adecuados para el clero evolucionó con el
 32 establecimiento del Plan de Pensiones Pre-82, las contribuciones fueron insuficientes para proporcionar los
 33 beneficios requeridos para muchos participantes durante los años de servicio activo. Por lo tanto, se
 34 convirtió en responsabilidad de la Conferencia garantizar que las contribuciones anuales en un programa
 35 de amortización proporcionaran las obligaciones de beneficios requeridas por el plan. El objetivo de cada
 36 Conferencia es que el Plan de Pensión Pre-82 esté completamente financiado hasta que se hayan cumplido
 37 todas las obligaciones de beneficios. Sin embargo, los activos del Plan no son fijos con el potencial de pasivos
 38 adicionales debido a la volatilidad del mercado, las pólizas de Wespath y la cantidad de beneficiarios
 39 elegibles. Además, cualquier aumento en la Tasa de Servicio Pasado (PSR) adoptado por la Conferencia
 40 también aumenta las obligaciones del plan. Cualquier cambio en el PSR también aumenta los pasivos del
 41 Plan y debe financiarse en el año adoptado si es necesario de acuerdo con el nivel de activos del Plan y los
 42 requisitos de financiación. A partir del 31 de diciembre de 2021, no se adeudan pasivos adicionales Pre-82
 43 ni aportes anticipados para 2023 para financiar el aumento de la Tarifa de servicio anterior.

1 **PLAN DE PENSIONES MINISTERIAL (MPP)**

2 El Plan de Pensiones Ministeriales, también conocido como el Suplemento Tres del Plan de Retiro de
3 Seguridad para el Clero (CRSP, por sus siglas en inglés), proporciona al clero un beneficio de pensión
4 por sus años de ministerio con la Iglesia Metodista Unida desde 1982 hasta 2006. El MPP es una
5 Sección 403 del Código de Rentas Internas (b) plan de jubilación. La Conferencia debe financiar
6 cualquier responsabilidad atribuible a las anualidades del MPP debido a las fluctuaciones del mercado,
7 las suposiciones demográficas/de mortalidad y las pólizas del Plan Wespath. A partir del 1 de enero de
8 2020, valoración actuarial para 2023, para el plan MPP y CRSP, las rentas vitalicias no requieren
9 aportes adicionales en 2021 y 2022 según la metodología de financiamiento del corredor de Wespath.

10 **PLAN DE JUBILACIÓN DE SEGURIDAD DEL CLERO (CRSP)**

11 El plan de pensión actual requerido para el clero elegible de tiempo completo es el Plan de Retiro de
12 Seguridad para el Clérigo o CRSP administrado por Wespath. Este plan entró en vigencia el 1 de enero
13 de 2007 y comprende tanto un componente de contribución definida (DC) como un componente de
14 beneficio definido (DB).

15

16 **Contribución definida (DC, por sus siglas en inglés):** proporciona una cantidad definida depositada en
17 la cuenta de un clérigo activo de tiempo completo con contribuciones mensuales. Este beneficio que
18 se distribuye al momento del retiro es el monto acumulado más las ganancias (o pérdidas) en la cuenta
19 del individuo. El componente de contribución definida (DC) de CRSP es el 2 % de la Compensación del
20 Plan con una contrapartida para las contribuciones de los participantes al Plan de Inversión Personal
21 de los Metodistas Unidos (UMPIP, por sus siglas en inglés), hasta el 1 % de la Compensación del Plan.
22 Por lo tanto, si un participante aporta al menos el 1% de la compensación a la UMPIP, los aportes de
23 CRSP DC serán del 3%.

24

25 **Beneficio definido (DB, por sus siglas en inglés):** proporciona una cantidad específica en dólares al
26 momento de la jubilación, independientemente de las condiciones del mercado o el rendimiento de
27 la inversión. El monto se basa en una fórmula que especifica un beneficio de jubilación mensual para
28 el clero elegible y el 70% para los beneficiarios contingentes elegibles por el resto de sus vidas. El CRSP-
29 DB proporciona un beneficio de jubilación mensual utilizando el 1,25% de la Remuneración Promedio
30 Denominacional (DAC) al momento de la jubilación multiplicado por los años de servicio desde el 1 de
31 enero de 2007 hasta el 31 de diciembre de 2013. El multiplicador se reduce al 1% por años de servicio,
32 a partir del 1 de enero de 2014.

33

34 Ambos componentes se facturan directamente a cada iglesia para el clero elegible de tiempo
35 completo. La facturación de contribuciones definidas (DC) se basa en el 3% de la Compensación del
36 Plan. La facturación directa
37 anual de beneficios definidos (DB) en 2022 a las iglesias por cada clérigo designado para el servicio de
38 tiempo completo es de \$6,132. La facturación directa anual de beneficios definidos (DB) en 2023 a las
39 iglesias por cada clérigo designado para el servicio de tiempo completo se mantendrá en \$6,132.

40

41 La contribución anual de DB a Wespath se basa en la cantidad de clérigos activos de tiempo completo
42 elegibles y clérigos con licencia médica con beneficios de CPP en la valoración actuarial proporcionada
43 por Wespath. El monto de la contribución adeudada en 2022 para el componente DB es \$1,443,250 y
44 \$1,343,309 en 2022. Cualquier clero que sirva menos de tiempo completo que no sea elegible para
45 CRSP DB es elegible para participar en el Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido con una
46 contribución de la iglesia requerida del 9% del Plan de Compensación.

47 **PLAN DE PROTECCIÓN INTEGRAL (PPC)**

48 El Plan de Protección Integral (CPP) es un plan de beneficios de bienestar administrado por Wespath
49 Benefits and Investments. El CPP incluye discapacidad a largo plazo, muerte y otros beneficios de
50 asistencia social para clérigos de tiempo completo elegibles. El plan CPP es un “plan de iglesia” del
51 Código de Rentas Internas 414(e) financiado por las contribuciones del patrocinador del plan. La

1 facturación directa requerida por el CPP a las iglesias es el 3% de la Compensación del Plan para el

4 **PLAN DE INVERSIÓN PERSONAL METODISTA UNIDO (UMPIP) PARA LAICOS Y CLEROS**

5 El Plan de Inversión Metodista Unido (UMPIP, por sus siglas en inglés) es un plan de ahorro de
 6 jubilación de contribución definida de la sección 403(b) del Código de Impuestos Internos
 7 administrado por Wespeth para empleados clérigos y laicos de la Iglesia Metodista Unida y
 8 organizaciones afiliadas. Los participantes elegibles pueden hacer contribuciones personales a través
 9 de deducciones de nómina para contribuciones antes de impuestos, Roth o después de impuestos en
 10 una cantidad fija en dólares o un porcentaje de la compensación elegible, hasta los límites del Código

20 **BENEFICIOS DE HEALTHFLEX**

21 La Conferencia Rio Texas participa en el Plan HealthFlex administrado por Wespeth Benefits and
 22 Investments para clérigos y empleados laicos de la Conferencia elegibles a tiempo completo. El plan
 23 HealthFlex también está disponible para empleados laicos de iglesias que han adoptado un Acuerdo
 24 de subadopción de unidad de pago de salarios de HealthFlex que cumple con los requisitos de

8 **SUBVENCIÓN DE TRANSICIÓN DE HEALTHFLEX**

9 La Junta de Pensiones cree que los Beneficios de Salud no deben ser un factor que obstaculice el
10 equipar a una congregación con el clero excelente que necesita para el ministerio. La Junta estableció
11 un programa de subvenciones en 2019 con fondos recibidos de iglesias con clérigos que no participan
12 en HealthFlex para ayudar a los clérigos en la transición entre iglesias. Reconocemos que esto puede
13 ser una carga financiera tanto para la iglesia como para el clero y creemos que esta asistencia ayudará
14 a facilitar la transición. Con la aprobación del Superintendente de Distrito, el programa puede otorgar

34 Estas subvenciones requieren la aprobación de un superintendente de distrito y una solicitud de
35 subvención que demuestre la elegibilidad basada en la necesidad.

 28 normalidad”, nos damos cuenta que Dios tiene planes para un futuro que tal vez no podamos anticipar. En
 29 esta temporada liminal, nuestras iglesias, pastores, estudiantes y laicos han seguido fieles a doquier Dios
 30 los guía, y continúan siendo creativos e innovadores a medida que alcanzan a nuevas personas por causa
 31 de Cristo. Gracias a Dios.

32 Creando Congregaciones

33 El mundo está cambiando, y la iglesia necesita fijar la vista más allá de las formas “tradicionales” de alcanzar
 34 nuevas personas para Cristo y de los modelos de atracción que solo aspiran que la gente venga a ellos. Si
 35 bien, los inicios de iglesias tradicionales y las inicias de iglesias en sitios múltiples y satélites siguen siendo
 36 muy importantes (y necesitamos más), pero también son costosos y se centran en la participación del clero
 37 cuando comienzan. Hemos comenzado a enseñar y a figurar formas más nuevas, más orgánicas y de costo
 38 no prohibitivas para conectar con aquellos que no asisten a congregaciones locales tales como Fresh
 39 Expressions (Nuevas Expresiones), Focused Worship (Adoración Enfocada) en la comunidad, y también
 40 estamos explorando formas de capacitar a los laicos y a otros para atraer a las personas a reuniones de
 41 vecindario vivas.

42 No plantamos ni una nueva congregación en 2021. Esta es la primera vez en 4 años que no hubo un
 43 nombramiento del comienzo de una nueva iglesia. Tuvimos 5 clérigos que asistieron al Discernimiento de
 44 Plantación de Iglesias en noviembre y 2 expresaron interés en plantar en el futuro. Dos ya habían
 45 comenzado nuevos servicios de adoración en sus iglesias en nuevos espacios. Toda evidencia apunta al

1 movimiento del Espíritu Santo que continúa obrando en iglesias listas para alcanzar a nuevas personas.
 2 Únanse conmigo a orar por las personas que están siendo llamadas a plantar. Sin los plantadores, no
 3 podemos obtener nuevas iglesias.
 4 Estoy emocionado por nuestras 5 nuevas iglesias (desde 2018) que han seguido trabajando y creando
 5 nuevas conexiones: entre ellas, Impacto Comunitario ha trasladado muchos de sus ministerios comunitarios
 6 a Divine Grace en asociación con las cuatro iglesias locales y la IMU University. Las Pastoras Liliana Padilla,
 7 Maribel Vázquez, Laura Dorantes y Daisy San Jorge trabajan juntas en el culto en línea, el culto en persona,
 8 sirviendo a la comunidad con distribución de alimentos, acceso al Internet y computadoras, lecciones de
 9 guitarra y en otros programas de enriquecimiento, como clases de ESL, acceso a lavandería, conexión a
 10 recursos de la ciudad y la comunidad y aun más. Valley Praise UMC Mc Allen, bajo el liderazgo del Rdo.
 11 Kevin Hardin, ha continuado adoración en línea y en persona mientras continúa innovando, buscando un
 12 nuevo espacio y nuevos medios para satisfacer las necesidades de la comunidad a través de una cafetería.
 13 Al momento de redactar este informe (8 de abril) se espera una maravillosa asistencia de Pascua. Este es el
 14 tercer campo de Valley Praise UMC. El Rdo. Ray Altman continúa haciendo el profundo trabajo de crear
 15 comunidades de fe intencionales con New Wineskins, y ya había ampliado su alcance durante la pandemia
 16 con un grupo en Leander y ahora está creando un grupo en San Antonio, a donde él y su familia se mudaron.
 17 El Rdo. Altman también está liderando cohortes de clérigos enseñando a otros cómo acceder a lo más
 18 profundo de sus vecindarios. Este trabajo de cohortes ha multiplicado los barrios a los que llegan. El Rdo.
 19 Jay Cooper y su equipo en Violet Crown City Church han completado la construcción de la propiedad física
 20 de la antigua propiedad de Crestview. ¡La energía y el entusiasmo de la adoración, el sitio preescolar y otros
 21 ministerios y conexiones comunitarias son hermosos! La iglesia cambió oficialmente su estado desde su
 22 inicio de iglesia el 10 de abril de 2022 con una carta renovada con su nuevo nombre. Son un hermoso legado
 23 y un fiel uso de ese don. Finalmente, la comunidad hispana Amor Original de Austin New Church continúa
 24 bajo el liderazgo del Pastor César Soto. Desde su comienzo en abril de 2020, solo tuvieron adoración y
 25 conversaciones significativas en línea. Ahora, el Pastor Soto y su equipo están trabajando para llegar a
 26 nuevas personas en Austin mientras mantienen estas conversaciones importantes y significativas con las
 27 personas alcanzadas en muchos países centroamericanos.
 28 Otras tres iglesias que aún no están autorizadas, ¡The Rock UMC está muy cerca de mudarse a su primer
 29 edificio! Esperan mudarse a fines de abril con una serie de inauguraciones gratas y grandiosas. The Rock
 30 está perfectamente ubicada para alcanzar a todo el nuevo crecimiento en el área 1604 y I-10. The Journey
 31 UMC se ha mudado a su espacio más permanente y ha seguido creciendo. Se han hecho planes para
 32 incorporarse por completo en el otoño de 2022. Windsong UMC continúa recaudando fondos para
 33 completar un edificio sin deudas. La pandemia ha afectado a esta pequeña pero importante iglesia. Tienen
 34 una buena conexión con la gente de la zona, pero luchan por crecer y satisfacer sus necesidades financieras.

35 ***Desarrollo de Liderazgo para Laicos y Cleros***

36 Las becas de seminarios se han reducido considerablemente. Con los campos casi cerrados durante gran
 37 parte del otoño, será necesario reavivar relaciones. Sin embargo, hemos continuado ofreciendo con gran
 38 placer una beca en el seminario con un estudiante del Seminario Teológico Wesley.

39 En noviembre de 2021, completamos nuestras cohortes de predicación de segundo año con un evento
 40 dirigido por el Dr. Wes Allen de la Escuela de Teología Perkins. 43 pastores y oradores laicos asistieron al
 41 evento virtual. 21 pastores en las 2 cohortes (todos en inglés y bilingües) completaron su trabajo.

42 Una nueva cohorte de predicación de Perkins para pastores afroamericanos comenzó en septiembre de
 43 2021, dirigida por el Rdo. Zan Holmes y la Rda. Edlen Cowley, el cual se centró en la predicación
 44 afroamericana tradicional y la predicación entre razas y culturas. De los 21 pastores invitados, 12 pudieron
 45 completar la cohorte de 7 meses.

46 **Ministerios de Siervos Laicos**

47 Scott Maderer es el Directo de Ministerios de Siervos Laicos de la Conferencia y ofrece este informe.

48 Durante 2021, el programa Lay Servant Ministries (LSM) ha seguido encontrando nuevas y creando formas
 49 de alcanzar a los Siervos Laicos actuales y potenciales. Este año, los distritos y la conferencia llevaron a cabo
 50 por primera vez varias capacitaciones en línea con éxito para varios de los cursos de Ministerios de Siervos
 51 Laicos. Cada uno ha tenido más de 50 asistentes que se reunieron para capacitarse y aprender los unos de
 52 los otros y apoyarse mutuamente en su desarrollo de liderazgo.

1 El Libro de Disciplina reconoce que para efectuar un ministerio efectivo dentro de nuestra conferencia
 2 debemos desarrollar y alentar el liderazgo de los laicos, y este es el objetivo explícito de LSM. Los directores
 3 distritales actuales y el director laico de la conferencia están trabajando juntos con un enfoque en:
 4 aumentar la comunicación y la cooperación entre todos los distritos dentro de la conferencia, construir
 5 herramientas efectivas que todos podamos utilizar, identificar nuevas clases en metodología tanto en línea
 6 como fuera de línea, y fomentar el ministerio laico tanto en Siervos Laicos como entre Ministros Laicos
 7 Certificados para poder ser creativos en la identificación de sus propios campos misioneros.

8 Los directores de distrito continúan reuniéndose regularmente ahora a través de Zoom para actualizarse
 9 trimestralmente y poder compartir una metodología e información efectiva sobre los próximos cursos, y lo
 10 cual todos estamos intentando llevar a cabo en nuestros propios distritos. De esta manera los directores
 11 comparten información, reconociendo mejores prácticas; es decir, fomentando y permitiendo que surja la
 12 experimentación de nuevas visiones en cada distrito.

13 Cada distrito continúa llevando a cabo sus propios cursos, inclusive varios compartidos a través de zoom, y
 14 algunos otros, en persona. La conferencia también continúa organizando cursos en línea. Al mismo tiempo,
 15 estamos identificando las necesidades de los laicos y proporcionando recursos de una variedad de fuentes
 16 que satisfagan esas necesidades de manera efectiva. El enfoque está en construir un liderazgo laico efectivo,
 17 en lugar de simplemente obtener una "certificación". Dentro de este panorama más amplio, anticipamos
 18 una mayor necesidad de un liderazgo laico efectivo dentro de la conferencia. Por lo tanto, estamos tratando
 19 de trabajar de manera proactiva con aquellos llamados a campos misioneros únicos para brindarles las
 20 herramientas y los recursos que necesitan para ser efectivos. Esto incluye estar más involucrados en el
 21 programa de Ministerio Laico Certificado y trabajar de cerca en todos los distritos para usar de manera
 22 efectiva los recursos limitados que brindan el apoyo necesario en toda la conferencia. De esta manera, los
 23 distritos no tienen que reinventar la rueda ni proporcionar recursos para un número limitado de laicos,
 24 mientras que aún se pueden alentar a los laicos con apoyo y capacitación y trabajando en todos los distritos
 25 dentro de la conferencia completa.

26 Si Ud. está interesado en involucrarse como Siervo Laico o simplemente ayudar, comuníquese primero con
 27 el director de Ministerios de Siervos Laicos de su distrito o con el director de la conferencia que se indica a
 28 continuación. Que Dios continúe bendiciendo y haciendo crecer el liderazgo laico en la Conferencia Río
 29 Texas.

1 **Ministerio de Universidad y Colegio:**

2 Al igual que nuestras iglesias, el Ministerio de Universidad y Colegio luchó en pos durante la pandemia. A
3 medida que los estudiantes comenzaron a asistir a clases en persona, Dios continuó moviéndose y
4 manteniendo a nuestros estudiantes universitarios conectados y creciendo como discípulos de Jesucristo.
5 Los diez Ministerios Universitarios en nueve campos están activos. Estos campus y líderes son: UT Austin:
6 The Texas Wesley (Rdo. David McMinn) y University UMC Austin (Megan Otto), UTSA por medio de
7 University UMC San Antonio (Sarah Reiter), SAC y Trinity University (personal del Ministerio del campo de
8 SA y un nuevo vacante), TLU a través de FUMC Seguin (Rda. Melissa Lind), UTRGV Wesley Center a través
9 de FUMC Edinburg (estudiantes en prácticas y Rda. Michelle Vernon), Texas State – United Campus Ministry
10 (Rda. Todd Salmi), U of H Victoria por medio de FUMC Victoria, (Rda. Amanda Banda) y Houston-Tillotson
11 University (Rdo. Don Brewington).

12 Nos complacemos en ofrecer becas para estudiantes para que trabajen directamente con el ministerio del
13 campo en su sitios (Huston-Tillotson, UTRGV y Texas State), y en el verano de 2022, la Junta del Ministerio
14 Ordenado estará financiando a 4 estudiantes de Houston-Tilltson para crear internados pastorales en
15 congregaciones locales en Austin. Esta es otra forma de aumentar el ministerio vocacional en el futuro,
16 especialmente con estudiantes de color.

17 La Rda. Lizzie Wright y el Rdo. Wes Cain han hecho buen trabajo coordinando los ministerios del campo
18 junto con la Rda. Karen Horan en el centro de conferencias. El Rdo. Wes Cain dejará su cargo y por lo tanto,
19 se necesitará un nuevo coordinador. Todavía existe la necesidad de que las iglesias individuales se pongan
20 en contacto con los estudiantes y los ministerios universitarios en sus áreas. Considere en oración cómo su
21 iglesia pueda apoyar este importante trabajo. Se creará y se compartirá un video en la Conferencia Anual
22 para celebrar este ministerio.

23 Las becas TUMCA y Houston-Tillitson también son asignaciones de apoyo y una parte de nuestro
24 presupuesto del Ministerios de Universidad y Colegios.

25 **Vitalización de Congregaciones:**

26 La mayor parte del trabajo de vitalización se ha llevado a cabo por medio de eventos de aprendizaje más
27 amplios y algunos trabajos grupales. Hemos aprendido que muchas de nuestras iglesias simplemente
28 necesitan enfocarse en abrir sus espacios y encontrar su paso de nuevo. Si bien hubo eventos en línea
29 sobre Fresh Expressions con Luke Bryan en el otoño, a principios de abril la mayoría de las iglesias están
30 fijándose hacia el verano y el otoño para comenzar nuevos ministerios. Las Subvenciones New People New
31 Places continúan en 2022 y esperamos una mayor solicitud de fondos en el otoño. Desde el 1 de julio de
32 2021 hasta diciembre del 2021, 14 iglesias recibieron

33 \$ 70,000 para tecnología y alcance para alcanzar nuevas personas para Cristo. De estas 14 iglesias que
34 recibieron fondos: 3 fueron congregaciones hispanas, 4 congregaciones históricamente Africoamericanas,
35 y 2 ministerios universitarios.

36 ¡Qué alegría nos da asociarnos con tantas iglesias en alcanzar a nuevas personas para capacitarlas a ser más
37 vitales en sus áreas respectivas! Estas subvenciones se ofrecen 3 veces al año y oramos para que los fondos
38 se puedan utilizar a lo máximo.

40 **LA ASOCIACIÓN DE UNIVERSIDADES METODISTAS UNIDAS DE TEXAS**

41 ***SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN***

42 La Asociación de Universidades Metodistas Unidas de Texas existe para abogar por nuestros estudiantes
43 universitarios Metodistas de Texas asistiendo a una de las seis instituciones de enseñanza superior en Texas.
44 Las donaciones que recibimos de nuestros socios en la Conferencia General pasan directamente a los
45 estudiantes merecidos por medio del Programa de Becas Metodistas de Texas. Durante el año escolar de
46 2021-2022, conferimos más de \$200,000 en soporte académico para los estudiantes de Huston-Tillitson
47 University, McMurray University, Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University Texas Wesleyan
48 University, y Wiley College. Estas becas son concedidas a base de ayuda financiera. A menudo, estos
49 obsequios ofrecen a los estudiantes universitarios una oportunidad de persistir en sus estudios y graduarse
50 de la universidad. La disrupción causada por el pándemico ha ejercido más presión financiera en nuestras

53 amplio de intereses vocacionales. Los estudiantes que asisten a las instituciones Metodistas Unidas tienen

1 la oportunidad de desarrollar su fe y a lo mejor, encontrar un curso de carrera que le enseñe el camino a
 2 uno de servicio y contribución al bien de todos. Es nuestra esperanza que al apoyar nuestros estudiantes
 3 Metodistas en nuestras propias instituciones, estos estudiantes contribuirán al crecimiento de la Iglesia, si
 4 es como un ministro ordenado, en otra posición relacionada con la iglesia, o laicado activo. Al fomentar su
 5 exploración de la fe, es obvio que algunos entrarán en el ministerio- si es una trayectoria directa al
 6 seminario después de graduarse de la universidad o como ministerios de segunda carrera, que hoy en día
 7 parece ser la norma.

17 La Oficina de Ministerios Conexionales ha continuado extendiéndose en sus capacidades de recursos de la
 18 Conferencia Río Texas y la Conexión Metodista Unida desde que comencé mi nombramiento como
 19 Directora de esta oficina hace cinco años. En mi papel de directora, me ha parecido importante seguir
 20 escuchando, discerniendo y elaborando relaciones dentro de nuestra conferencia anual, así como con
 21 nuestros socios ecuménicos y vecinos. Esta oficina continúa ofreciendo una diversa cantidad de recursos.

22 Como **Entrenadora Certificada de Simplificada Estructura Responsable de la Junta (SAS)**, he tenido la
 23 oportunidad de capacitar y/o entrenar a muchas juntas de liderazgo de varios tamaños en congregaciones
 24 locales. Me comprometo a continuar ofreciendo esta capacitación y los recursos proporcionados de manera
 25 continua. Además, varias de estas congregaciones locales también deseaban recibir asesoramiento sobre
 26 la creación de la visión, la misión, los temas críticos y los objetivos de su iglesia para enfocar más claramente
 27 sus esfuerzos.

28 En 2018 esta oficina adquirió la supervisión del **Equipo de Recuperación y Desastres de Río Texas**. A medida
 29 que nos acercamos a la temporada de huracanes de 2022 y al quinto aniversario del huracán Harvey, y
 30 aunque no deseamos otro desastre natural de la magnitud de Harvey, la oficina de Ministerios
 31 Conexionales, junto con nuestro equipo de conferencias y socios, estamos bien preparados en caso de que
 32 ocurra otro desastre natural y que sea necesario llamar al equipo de Recuperación y Desastres de Río Texas,
 33 para que el mismo entre en acción.

34 Esta oficina planifica eventos estratégicamente a pequeña y gran escala que apoyen, eduquen y brinden
 35 recursos importantes y oportunos para nuestro clero, laicos, organizaciones metodistas unidas,
 36 congregaciones locales y sus campos misioneros. Convocatoria del Clero: Debido a la pandemia de COVID-
 37 19 (con recomendaciones de la CDC y del gobierno local, es decir, a distanciamiento social y número
 38 reducido de personas que podrían reunirse) La Convocatoria y Retiro en persona de este año fue la primera
 39 vez desde 2019 que muchos de nuestros clérigos se reunieron en un solo lugar para adorar, compartir y
 40 aprender. La convocatoria de este año, a la que asistieron más de 200 clérigos, se llevó a cabo en Mo Ranch,
 41 en Hunt, Texas, y fue diseñada para ofrecer un tiempo de refrigerio, retiro y descargo a través de diversas
 42 conversaciones de adoración, compañerismo, comidas comunitarias y fogatas, así como muchas
 43 actividades opcionales (adoración, senderismo, yoga, tirolesa, canotaje/kayak), todo sin costo adicional, y
 44 explorar el hermoso entorno montañoso, e incluso un masaje en silla, para descubrir a Dios a través de la
 45 naturaleza. ¡El equipo de planificación de la convocatoria del clero y Mo Ranch pusieron la meta muy en
 46 alta! Nuestro clero se fue espiritualmente renovado y descansado, física y mentalmente, al entrar a la
 47 temporada de Cuaresma y la jornada de la Semana Santa hasta la Pascua.

48 Reunión de la Conferencia Anual (CA): Al igual que con la Convocatoria del Clero, debido a la pandemia de
 49 COVID-19, la CA en McAllen 2022 (originalmente programada para llevarse a cabo en McAllen en 2021) será
 50 la primera reunión de la Conferencia Anual totalmente en persona desde junio de 2019. ¡El clero y los laicos

1 del Valle de Río Grande están emocionados y ansiosos por dar la bienvenida a los delegados e invitados al
 2 Centro de Convenciones de McAllen para la CA 2022! Además de los negocios que se llevarán a cabo, la
 3 adoración, los informes y la celebración, los delegados e invitados, como una forma de experimentar la
 4 misión, los ministerios y las complejidades únicas del ministerio en el Valle, tendrán la oportunidad de
 5 participar en una amplia gama de Oportunidades Misionales para Aprender y Servir. La CA 2022 concluirá
 6 con una celebración de aquellos que serán comisionados y ordenados.

7 **Presupuesto de Equidad:** Evaluando con la conferencia anual de este año la idea de aplicar un lente de
 8 equidad a nuestros gastos. Aplicando una línea de base, en Conferencia Anual 2022 en McAllen, cómo los
 9 gastos benefician a las comunidades de color y de bajos ingresos. Descubriendo, si es posible, si se puede
 10 aplicar un lente de equidad a los gastos futuros.

11 **Nominaciones:** La Conferencia Anual Rio Texas está profundamente comprometida con la excelencia y la
 12 diversidad en el liderazgo. Por lo tanto, el objetivo del Grupo de Liderazgo, basado en aplicaciones y
 13 presentada por primera vez a principios de 2020, es de crear un grupo de líderes comprometidos,
 14 espiritualmente arraigados y calificados que, a través del proceso de nominación de la conferencia, se
 15 adaptarán a todas las necesidades de liderazgo de la conferencia anual. Como nota, debido a la pospuesta
 16 Conferencia General de 2020 y, más recientemente, al anuncio del aplazamiento de la Conferencia General
 17 hasta 2024, muchos de los comités conservarán a los miembros actuales. Si hay vacantes, se seguirán los

28 Cuando se formó la Conferencia Río Texas, los documentos de unificación declararon “La nueva la
 29 conferencia se organiza a través de una estructura y procesos para enfocarse en el campo misionero. La
 30 Mesa Unida coordinará la misión y el ministerio en la Conferencia Río Texas. La Mesa Unida está
 31 formada para ser inclusiva y colaborativa, para incluir diversas voces y promover la unidad y reconciliación
 32 en la conferencia y la comunidad.” (Página 49, Plan de Unificación de Río Texas)

33 Durante mis seis años como presidente de la Mesa Unida, marqué esas oraciones en mi copia del Plan de
 34 Unificación. Además, en esos seis años hemos tenido que lidiar con múltiples asuntos que han puesto a
 35 prueba nuestra capacidad de ser colaborativos e inclusivos. Han habido momentos en que nosotros como
 36 conferencia anual hemos luchado para promover la unidad y la reconciliación. El reciente receso de la
 37 pospuesta Conferencia General de 2020 ha aumentado esa tensión. Nuestro deber primordial es centrarnos
 38 en el campo misionero; sin embargo, hay muchas otras cosas que nos han desviado la atención. ¿Entonces,
 39 que debemos hacer? Creo que sabemos la respuesta.

40 Esta Conferencia Anual y sus predecesoras tienen una rica historia de misión y ministerio a un área
 41 geográfica que realmente necesita ser impactada por el amor y la misericordia de Dios. Durante los años
 42 hemos hecho nuestro mejor trabajo cuando hemos tenido cuidado de aquellos que necesitan el amor de

38 ***Thriving Congregations (Congregaciones prósperas)***

39 La Conferencia Río Texas tiene tres iglesias que participan en un proyecto de congregaciones prósperas de
40 4 años patrocinado por una Beca Lily otorgada a Vibrant Faith. Estas iglesias incluyen: Iglesia Metodista
41 Unida de Colonial Hills en San Antonio, Iglesia Metodista Unida de Floresville y Primera Iglesia Metodista
42 Unida, Victoria. Cada iglesia trabaja con su equipo y se une en una reunión mensual del grupo Río Texas
43 Cohort. Estas iglesias son dirigidas por la Rda. Dra. Campen y cuentan con los recursos del personal de
44 Vibrant Faith. El año pasado, los equipos avanzaron hacia su visión de lo que significa prosperar
45 identificando nuevos ministerios que querían probar durante la Cuaresma del 2022. Estos experimentos
46 ministeriales incluyen: Conectarse a los miembros a través de pequeños grupos en los hogares de los

10 Organizamos nuestra cuarta capacitación para facilitadores en febrero y marzo de 2022. La Rda. Joy Melton,

12 de la Conferencia Anual, los facilitadores han dirigido un total de 56 sesiones facilitadas. Se puede encontrar

33 ***(Desarrollo de Líderes en Ministerio Juvenil)***

3 Muchas de nosotras también asistimos al Evento Legislativo Anual de Texas en Enero de 2022 a través de
4 Zoom o en persona en Austin. Todo este trabajo nos ayudó a cimentarnos espiritualmente y a prepararnos
5 para nuestra misión principal de servir a las mujeres, los niños y los jóvenes.

6 Estamos planeando varios eventos para la segunda mitad de 2022.

MINISTERIO DE RESPUESTA A DESASTRES DE LA CONFERENCIA RÍO TEXAS

10 La misión del Ministerio de Respuesta a Desastres Metodista Unida en la conferencia Río Texas es
 11 brindar una presencia cristiana solidaria después de un desastre. No experimentamos grandes desastres
 12 durante el año pasado, pero aún hubo actividad sustancial. Los equipos de respuesta temprana
 13 ayudaron a las familias devastadas por una gran tormenta de granizo centrada en D'Hanis en el condado
 14 de Medina y también ayudaron a las familias en Somerset, Nixon, Georgetown y Elgin. El trabajo de
 15 recuperación continuó en el Valle para ayudar a las familias afectadas por el huracán Hanna y otras
 16 inundaciones durante los últimos tres años. Algunos trabajos en los proyectos del huracán Harvey
 17 continuaron mientras las organizaciones de recuperación a largo plazo concluyeron su trabajo.

18 El Comité de Respuesta a Desastres ha hecho cambios de política que afectarán la respuesta futura a
 19 desastres. En el pasado, las personas solo podían responder durante la fase de respuesta (justo después
 20 del desastre) como parte de un Equipo de Respuesta Temprana, que requiere ocho horas de
 21 capacitación y la aprobación de UMCOR. En el futuro, los voluntarios espontáneos serán aceptados en
 22 equipos encabezados por voluntarios capacitados en Respuesta Temprana. Los voluntarios
 23 espontáneos deberán completar una breve capacitación que se dará en la comunidad donde ocurrió el
 24 desastre. Una segunda iniciativa nueva incluye planes para implementar un centro de recursos
 25 inmediatamente después de que ocurra un desastre. Este centro proporcionará literatura de "cómo
 26 hacer" para ayudar a las familias que tienen los recursos para hacer su propia limpieza. El centro también
 27 se utilizará para distribuir mochilas de limpieza de UMCOR y otros materiales necesarios para responder
 28 a la situación en el período inmediatamente posterior al desastre.

29 La necesidad de voluntarios es crítico para el éxito del ministerio de respuesta a desastres. Los
 30 individuos o los equipos pueden inscribirse en una clase de Respuesta Temprana, de modo que estén
 31 preparados para responder cuando ocurra un desastre. Las clases programadas se enumeran en
 32 riotexasresponse.org, pero se pueden organizar clases especiales para grupos de 10 o más. También se
 33 necesitan equipos para el trabajo de recuperación. No se necesita entrenamiento especial para estos
 34 equipos, pero existen requisitos especiales para los equipos juveniles. Al momento de escribir este
 35 artículo, se necesitan equipos en D'Hanis y en el Valle, pero surgen nuevas necesidades con cada
 36 desastre. Las necesidades se enumeran y el registro se puede completar en riotexasresponse.org. Las
 37 oportunidades limitadas de voluntariado están disponibles en el Almacén de Respuesta a Desastres
 38 Martínez en Kerrville. Se requiere la verificación de las mochilas de limpieza de UMCOR antes de que
 39 puedan distribuirse a los sobrevivientes de la tormenta. Cuando esté disponible, esta oportunidad está
 40 disponible para grupos que no tienen la habilidad o la capacidad física para ofrecerse como voluntarios
 41 para reparar casas.

16 Escuela de Teología Candler– Informe a las conferencias anuales de la UMC 2022

17 Desde 1914, la Escuela de Teología Candler de la Universidad de Emory ha vivido nuestra misión,
 18 educando líderes fieles y creativos para los ministerios de la iglesia en todo el mundo. Este año, a medida
 19 que nos inclinamos hacia este trabajo crítico y continuamos adaptándonos a un mundo cambiado por la
 20 pandemia del coronavirus, imaginamos nuevas posibilidades para los estudiantes llamados por Dios para
 21 realizar estudios teológicos serios y preparación para el ministerio. Para algunos, abrir vías para la
 22 educación teológica de posgrado requiere superar obstáculos financieros, y para otros, la geografía o las
 23 responsabilidades familiares pueden ser las barreras. Candler está comprometida a ayudar a los
 24 estudiantes a eliminar estas barreras y abrir nuevos caminos al ministerio.

25 Candler, seminario oficial de la Iglesia Metodista Unida, se mantiene fiel al valor metodista de la apertura
 26 ecuménica y da la bienvenida con entusiasmo a estudiantes de 43 denominaciones, con un 45 % de
 27 estudiantes de Maestría en Divinidades provenientes de la tradición wesleyana. Nuestro alumnado refleja
 28 la diversidad y amplitud de los cristianos fieles, con una inscripción de 466 de 16 países y 38 estados,
 29 45% personas de color (EE. UU.) y una edad promedio de 28 años entre los estudiantes de la Maestría en
 30 Divinidades. Esta diversidad es una bendición que enriquece a nuestros estudiantes y a nuestra comunidad
 31 en general y proporciona un "laboratorio de aprendizaje" para el ministerio en el siglo XXI: un ministerio
 32 que supera las diferencias, trabaja para resolver la injusticia y encarna el amor de Cristo en y entre
 33 nosotros.

34 Candler ofrece seis títulos individuales (MDiv, MTS, MRL MRPL, ThM, DMin) y diez títulos duales.

35 Nuestro Doctorado en Ministerios es 90% virtual, por lo que los estudiantes pueden permanecer en sus
 36 lugares de ministerio mientras obtienen sus títulos. Su alta tasa de culminación del 87 % ilustra tanto la
 37 calidad de nuestros estudiantes como el compromiso de Candler con su éxito. Este año, también
 38 aumentamos las ofertas en línea en otros títulos académicos. Ahora los estudiantes pueden completar la
 39 Maestría en Religión y Vida Pública completamente en línea; la Maestría en Liderazgo Religioso con
 40 concentración en Ministerio Juvenil, Justicia, Construcción de Paz y Transformación de Conflictos, o
 41 Liderazgo y Herencia Wesleyana en un formato híbrido; y los estudiantes de MDiv pueden completar las
 42 clases básicas en línea. Además, nuestro nuevo programa Remote Teaching Parish (RTP) permite a los
 43 estudiantes de MDiv que tienen trabajos en entornos eclesiales lejos de nuestro campus de Atlanta tomar
 44 clases básicas en línea y completar sus requisitos de educación contextual en su lugar de ministerio,
 45 participando en grupos en línea dirigidos por mentores con otros estudiantes de RTP.

46 Aliviar la deuda de los estudiantes a través de una generosa ayuda financiera es una de nuestras
 47 principales prioridades. En el año 2020-2021, otorgamos más de \$6,8 millones en ayuda financiera, y el
 48 100 % de MDiv y el 98,5 % de todos los estudiantes recibieron apoyo. Todos los estudiantes de MDiv que
 49 son candidatos certificados para el ministerio ordenado en la UMC reciben becas de matrícula completa, y
 50 todos los estudiantes de MDiv, MTS, MRL y ThM que están matriculados a tiempo parcial o más reciben

1 una beca que cubre al menos el 50% de la matrícula durante su programa.
 2 Cientos de estudiantes laicos y de teología por igual se han unido a las clases y eventos ofrecidos a través
 3 de The Candler Foundry, nuestro programa innovador para hacer que la educación teológica sea accesible
 4 para todos. A través de cursos cortos y semestrales impartidos por profesores de Candler, videos y guías
 5 de discusión para iniciar conversaciones en grupos o individualmente, y paneles de discusión en línea,
 6 aquellos que desean profundizar en la teología y la Biblia tienen la oportunidad de hacer solo eso. Vea las

 8 La Decana Asociada de Estudios Metodistas, la Rev. Dra. Anne Burkholder, se jubilará de Candler al final

11 En la primavera y el otoño de 2021, la Escuela Teológica de la Universidad Drew comenzó a retornar a su campus
 12 de Madison, Nueva Jersey, para algunas clases, reuniones y cultos. Al igual que en muchas iglesias, los eventos
 13 presenciales se realizaron en espacios equipados para la transmisión en directo o la participación por Zoom. El
 14 cambio al aprendizaje a distancia durante la pandemia de COVID-19 amplió significativamente nuestra oferta
 15 de cursos en línea y eventos comunitarios accesibles. Ahora, varios estudiantes de los programas de maestría
 16 de Drew avanzarán en sus programas en lugares de Estados Unidos y del mundo lejos de Nueva Jersey. Este año,
 17 hemos dado la bienvenida a 150 nuevos estudiantes, nuevamente la clase más grande en una década, y tenemos
 18 376 estudiantes matriculados actualmente.
 19 Drew cultiva pastores, predicadores, diáconos, activistas, profesores y líderes de pensamiento que están
 20 tomando su lugar como la próxima generación de líderes religiosos y agentes de cambio. La diversidad es un
 21 sello distintivo de nuestro cuerpo estudiantil, incluyendo la diversidad teológica, vocacional, de edad y
 22 especialmente la diversidad racial y nacional, tanto de estudiantes internacionales -asiáticos, africanos y
 23 sudamericanos- como de estudiantes estadounidenses -negros, blancos, latinos y asiáticos-. Nuestro alumnado
 24 es verdaderamente global, con un 35% de estudiantes procedentes de 21 países diferentes. Por primera vez en
 25 su historia, Drew cuenta con una Asociación de Estudiantes Africanos, iniciada por estudiantes de la Escuela
 26 Teológica de Drew de 14 países de África, que está contribuyendo en gran medida a la comunidad de Drew tanto
 27 en el campus como en línea. Hemos dado la bienvenida a nuevos profesores en Ministerios Latinx y en
 28 Cristianismo Global. También hemos visto un aumento en los estudiantes metodistas unidos interesados en las
 29 tradiciones de la escuela inspiradas en el Evangelio de la defensa de la justicia social y el ministerio ampliamente
 30 inclusivo. Estamos orgullosos de que muchos participantes del programa Compañeros en la Misión Global de la
 31 Iglesia Metodista hayan elegido recientemente continuar su camino en el ministerio en Drew. Nuestros
 32 graduados de la Iglesia Metodista Unida están sirviendo en las conferencias de Greater New Jersey, Eastern
 33 Pennsylvania y Nueva York, así como en conferencias de todo el país.
 34 El profesorado está comprometido a seguir desarrollando el plan de estudios de manera que se tome en serio
 35 la amplia gama de experiencias vividas y los llamados al ministerio de los estudiantes que se reúnen en nuestras
 36 aulas globales. Todos los programas de la Escuela de Teología incluyen cursos interdisciplinarios que exigen un
 37 pensamiento innovador, una formación de aprendizaje que aborda cuestiones del mundo real y modos de
 38 aprendizaje que promueven la adaptabilidad y la innovación. Nuestros programas de MDiv y MATM incluyen un
 39 año de entrada con cursos introductorios o prerrequisitos, caminos vocacionales, y un aprendizaje vivencial
 40 que desarrolla y profundiza las habilidades de liderazgo adaptativo. El plan de estudios presenta una secuencia
 41 de cursos básicos diseñados e impartidos por un equipo interdisciplinario que refleja la integración de las

31 Me siento honrado de que el Fondo de Dotación de Becas Permanentes Dr. Socorro de Anda se haya establecido
 32 para proporcionar becas a los estudiantes de LPI, indefinidamente. Desde el fondo de mi corazón, deseo
 33 agradecer a todos aquellos que contribuyeron. Nuestros alumnos se lo merecen.

34 En el futuro, Lydia Patterson está viva y vibrante. Todo lo que queda de este informe es para agradecer a todos
 35 mis amigos de esta conferencia y la cantidad de obispos con los que he trabajado. Ofrezco mi profundo aprecio
 36 por caminar conmigo, de la mano, a lo largo de mi viaje. Juntos, hemos cambiado miles de vidas y formado

43 Mediante la educación de los líderes del futuro a través de la oferta de cursos de aprendizaje en el campus, en
 44 línea e híbridos en un horario FLEXible, Saint Paul School of Theology es un seminario de la Iglesia Metodista
 45 Unida que se compromete con la formación de personas para un ministerio innovador y creativo. Centrada en

1 el estudio académico de la fe y el ministerio, la teología se practica en un aula tradicional y con un plan de
2 estudios contextual.

3 A medida que la pandemia continúa trayendo desafíos a nuestras vidas diarias, la Saint Paul School of Theology
4 comenzó el año académico 2021-2022, y les ofrece nuevamente a los estudiantes la opción para asistir a los
5 cursos a través de Zoom o en el campus, al mismo tiempo que mantiene los protocolos de seguridad. Nuestro
6 servicio de capilla semanal sigue estando disponible en línea, lo que les permite al personal y a los estudiantes
7 reunirse como una sola institución en la que todos están invitados a crear una atmósfera sagrada desde
8 dondequiera que estén. Además del cuerpo docente y el personal que participaron como oradores en la capilla,

27 más de una década de trabajo, forma parte del Comité de Impactos Sociales más Amplios del Museo
28 Nacional de Historia Natural del Smithsonian.
- 29 ■ La Dra. Casey Sigmon, Profesora Adjunta de Predicación y Culto y Directora de Educación Contextual, fue
30 invitada a que escriba para *"Lent Another Way"*, un curso en línea, con The Plural Guild y The Many, y
31 ofreció el discurso de convocatoria para Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School en otoño de
32 2021. También solicitó y recibió una subvención del Wabash Center for Teaching para apoyar el proyecto
33 titulado: *"Resisting the Plagiarized Pulpit: Helping Students and the Professor to Find trust their voice
34 through Artistic Instructional Design"* [La Resistencia a la vocación plagiada: La ayuda a los estudiantes y
35 profesores a encontrar la confianza en su voz a través del diseño instructivo artístico].
- 36 ■ Este enero, el Dr. Joshua Bartholomew, profesor asistente de Ética, Iglesia y Sociedad fue el orador
37 invitado en un evento en Kansas City, denominado *"Black Theology and the Black Panthers: A
38 Conversation with Dr. Joshua Bartholomew"* [Teología Negra y las Panteras Negras: Una conversación
39 con el Dr. Joshua Bartholomew]. Además, recientemente fue entrevistado por Climate Central para el
40 artículo *"A moral imperative: Monastic sisters in rural Midwest make faith-based case for climate
41 action"*. ["Un imperativo moral: Las hermanas monásticas del medio oeste rural defienden la acción
42 climática desde la fe"].

43 Saint Paul dio la bienvenida a 45 estudiantes nuevos para el año académico 2021-2022. Las inscripciones de
44 estudiantes nuevos para el semestre de otoño aumentaron un 44 % (34 estudiantes nuevos), con un aumento
45 general para el año del 73 %. Con la pandemia de COVID-19 todavía entre nosotros, los futuros estudiantes
46 tuvieron una vista previa de la comunidad y el plan de estudios de Saint Paul a través de las visitas en línea.
47 Los estudiantes se unieron al culto comunitario, asistieron a clases y participaron en debates en línea con
48 estudiantes actuales para discernir si Saint Paul era realmente su elección para la educación teológica. El
49 número de inscripciones se mantuvo alto en el programa de Maestría en Divinidad (MDiv), con un crecimiento
50 prometedor en nuestros programas recién creados de Maestría en Estudios Teológicos (MATS) y Maestría en
51 Ministerio Cristiano (MACM).

52 En septiembre, Saint Paul celebró la 2021 Harrington Lecture en línea con la participación del Dr. Eboo Patel. Su
53 conferencia, *"We Need to Build: Field Notes for Diverse Democracy"* ["Necesitamos construir: Notas de campo

1 para una democracia diversa”], amplió los conocimientos y construyó habilidades, al ayudar a las personas a
2 convertirse en el tipo de líderes que nuestra diversa democracia necesita. En el semestre de primavera, Saint
3 Paul Evangelical Society, dirigida por el Dr. Hal Knight, organizó un foro impartido por el Dr. Amos Yong, profesor
4 de Teología y Misión, y decano de la Escuela de Misión y Teología del Seminario Teológico Fuller, sobre “*The*
5 *Holy Spirit and People of other Faiths: Relational Christian Witness in the 2020s*”. [El Espíritu Santo y las personas
6 de otras religiones: El testimonio cristiano relacional en la década de 2020]. Más adelante en el semestre, la
7 Evangelical Society organizó una conferencia con la Dra. Joy Moore, Profesora de Predicación Bíblica y
8 Vicepresidenta de Asuntos Académicos y Decana Académica del Seminario de Lutero. Y, por primera vez, el 13
9 de mayo, Saint Paul organizó una celebración de graduación híbrida a través de Zoom, lo que permitió reunir a
10 los graduados de los campus de Kansas y Oklahoma con asistentes de todo el país. Durante la ceremonia
11 honramos al Dr. Stan Copeland, ganador del Premio al Graduado Distinguido 2022 y Orador de la Graduación.
12 Para el año fiscal 2021-2022, la escuela Saint Paul Course of Study (COS) impartió educación a 228 estudiantes
13 de forma individual, 49 de los cuales eran estudiantes nuevos, con aproximadamente 550 inscripciones y al
14 ofrecer un total de 50 cursos. Al servir a 32 Conferencias, lo que incluyó 94 Distritos, 121 Pastores Locales con
15 licencia a tiempo completo y 106 a tiempo parcial comprendieron estas inscripciones. Saint Paul Course of Study
16 School le dio la bienvenida al nuevo Director Regional, el Dr. Lucas Endicott. El Dr. Endicott trabajó como
17 Director Asociado de la Oficina de Misión, Servicio y Justicia en la Conferencia Anual de Missouri y dio clases en
18 la Universidad Metodista Central. Debido a la continuidad de la pandemia, la escuela continuó con su oferta de
19 cursos en formato asíncrono y síncrono en línea. Con este formato en línea, logramos llegar a estudiantes de
20 24 estados. Los planes incluyen un aumento en la cantidad de ofertas de cursos híbridos. Este año fiscal también
21 introdujo la nueva posibilidad de inscripción en línea realizada por el estudiante y el acceso a su cuenta de
22 estudiante a través de Populi, tal como lo utilizan los estudiantes del Seminario. Todos nuestros estudiantes
23 comparten los mismos beneficios al integrar la Escuela de Estudios en Populi, lo que los hace una parte más
24 integrada de la experiencia de Saint Paul.

25 El Consejo Directivo de Saint Paul añadió a dos miembros nuevos a sus filas: La Sra. Debra “Debbie” Buzard,
26 Directora del Ministerio de Extensión de la Primera Iglesia Metodista Unida de Kearney; y el reverendo Martín
27 “Tino” Herrera, Pastor de Cuidado Congregacional de la Iglesia de la Resurrección. A través de una iniciativa
28 de la Junta Directiva relacionada con la diversidad y la inclusión, el Consejo de Administración de Saint Paul
29 dedicó una parte importante de las reuniones del último año a los líderes de la iglesia con experiencia y
30 conocimientos en la creación de comunidades y organizaciones más diversas e inclusivas. Para ayudar a los
31 miembros del consejo de Saint Paul a comprender mejor estas cuestiones, el Consejo recibió al reverendo Dr.
32 Benjamin Boswell en abril de 2021. El Dr. Boswell, pastor principal de la iglesia baptista Myers Park de
33 Charlotte (Carolina del Norte), describió la labor antirracista que dirigió en esa comunidad. La ciudad de
34 Charlotte le concedió al Dr. Boswell una Medalla Martin Luther King, Jr. por su labor. En julio de 2021, el
35 congresista Emanuel Cleaver II, de Kansas City, compartió su perspectiva sobre los problemas de justicia racial
36 y social a los que se enfrenta nuestra nación y los esfuerzos que él y sus colegas de la Cámara de
37 Representantes esperan emprender en respuesta. Con la ayuda del Consejo, dirigido por su Presidente, el
38 reverendo Dr. Tex Sample, el seminario se centra en su misión. Los miembros de nuestro Consejo Directivo
39 mejoran y evalúan continuamente los planes estratégicos para guiarnos hacia el futuro.

40 Tal como gustosamente lo hemos reportado en los últimos años, Saint Paul se encuentra financieramente sólido
41 y mantiene un presupuesto equilibrado. Estos cambios de los últimos años establecieron una base financiera
42 sólida para años de sostenibilidad. Como siempre, seguimos agradecidos por las donaciones de la comunidad
43 que proporcionan tecnología, becas y programas académicos en evolución para los estudiantes. Nuestras
44 importantes inversiones en tecnología nos permitieron mantener un modelo de enseñanza híbrido que
45 proporciona un entorno de aprendizaje seguro durante la continuación de la pandemia.

46 Nuestro objetivo siempre fue utilizar la tecnología como un conducto para reunir al cuerpo docente y a los
47 estudiantes, independientemente de que estén en el campus o se unan de forma remota a través de Zoom.
48 Durante la pandemia, analizamos a fondo el panorama de la enseñanza a distancia para ver cómo podíamos
49 mejorar sustancialmente la experiencia en el aula. Después de realizar importantes pruebas, optamos por
50 sustituir nuestra tecnología de enseñanza a distancia en el aula por la oferta de Neat, incluida la tecnología aún
51 en desarrollo. Todas nuestras aulas comenzaron a actualizarse en otoño de 2021 con ofertas de Neat. Cada
52 aula más pequeña añadió un neat.board de 65”, una pantalla independiente que funciona como una sala de
53 Zoom completa, así como una pizarra electrónica. Todo lo que se escribe o dibuja en estas pizarras se transmite

1 a través de Zoom a las pantallas del aula y a los participantes remotos de Zoom. Este contenido también se
 2 puede guardar y enviar por correo electrónico a todos los participantes. Implementamos neat.bars en otras
 3 aulas que se conectan a las pantallas existentes de nuestras aulas. Actualmente, implantamos neat.bar pros,
 4 recién lanzado a finales de 2021, en cada una de nuestras aulas grandes. En Saint Paul School of Theology
 5 siempre tratamos de ser pioneros con las tecnologías de aprendizaje a distancia. Nos encontramos en una fase
 6 muy temprana del ciclo de vida de esta tecnología estimulante y revolucionaria. Estamos encantados de
 7 asociarnos con Neat y Zoom para revolucionar la experiencia en el aula.

8 Saint Paul School of Theology tiene la bendición de ser su socio en el ministerio y de ayudar a quienes buscan
 9 descubrir más y responder al llamado. Nosotros estamos agradecidos por su apoyo a nuestros estudiantes y a
 10 nuestro seminario. Ojalá sigamos viviendo en el llamado de Jesucristo a ser testigos fieles de la sanación en
 11 estos tiempos inestables y para las generaciones venideras.

12 El presidente Neil Blair, los miembros del Consejo Directivo de Saint Paul, el cuerpo docente, el personal
 13 administrativo, los egresados y estudiantes le damos las gracias por sus oraciones y por su apoyo.

15 Por 150 años, el United Theological Seminary ha educado hombres y mujeres para ministerio cristiano en las
 16 tradiciones históricas de las iglesias Hermanos Unidos, Hermanos Unidos Evangélicos, y Metodista Unida. En el
 17 11 de octubre 1871, el United Theological Seminary, antes Union Bíblica Seminary, tuvo sus primeras clases en
 18 Dayton, OH. Comenzando de una clase de 11 estudiantes, el seminario ha crecido a 488 estudiantes en su año
 19 académico más reciente,* representando 39 denominaciones, 11 países, y 39 estados. El seminario de hoy sirva
 20 a un cuerpo estudiantil diverso que es 53% afroamericano.**

21 El 10 de octubre 2021 el seminario celebró su aniversario 150 y quemó la hipoteca de sus instalaciones del
 22 campus actual, liberando \$400,000 anuales para apoyar becas estudiantiles. En 2021, United recibió una beca
 23 de \$1 millón de Pathways para Mañana de Lilly Endowment Inc. Para expandir las Casas de Estudios del
 24 seminario, que ofrecen programas especializados de la maestría para equipar estudiantes para las necesidades
 25 únicas de ministerio de las comunidades, movimientos, y denominaciones que sirvan. El seminario ha
 26 presentado seis **Casas de Estudios**, actualmente matriculando para 2022-2023:

- 27 ▪ Fresh Expressions, dirigido por Dr. Michael Beck;
- 28 ▪ Mosaix, en asociación con Mosaix Global Network y dirigido por Rev. Chip Freed;
- 29 ▪ Metodista Unida Negra, dirigido por Dr. Vance Ross;
- 30 ▪ Hispana, 100% en español para líderes hispanohablante, dirigido por Dr. Jorge Ochoa;
- 31 ▪ Pentecostal Global, dirigido por Dr. Mark Chironna;
- 32 ▪ y Wesleyano Global, dirigido por Rev. Gregory Stover.

33 Porque United cree apasionadamente en esta iniciativa, el seminario ha dedicado recursos adicionales para
 34 ofrecer becas de 50% para los estudiantes inaugurales en los programas de las Casas de Estudios.

35 United también presentó la **Beca de Decano Académico**, que provee 50% de costos para la duración del
 36 programa de título maestría, y la **Beca Presidencial**, dando hasta \$5,000 cada año a nuevos estudiantes.

37 En honor del aniversario 150 de United, un donante generoso donó \$2 millón para ayudar a los estudiantes
 38 graduando en reducir su deuda educacional. Cada graduado del año académico 2021-2022 recibirá hasta
 39 \$20,000 para su deuda estudiantil de sus estudios académicos teológicos y sus estudios anteriores.

40 Mientras United anticipa los próximos 150 años con gratitud y esperanza, el seminario mantiene comprometido
 41 a la preparación de líderes cristianos fieles y fructíferos para hacer discípulos de Jesucristo.

36 Tom Stanton, Representante Mayor de Área de la TMF para la Conferencia de Río Texas, es el contacto principal
37 y el puente entre las congregaciones (clérigos y laicos) y la TMF. Como socio en el ministerio, el conecta a los
38 miembros de la Conferencia de Río Texas con recursos relevantes exclusivos para sus objetivos de crecimiento
39 misional dentro de las congregaciones y comunidades.

40 La TMF, con sede en Austin, sirve a personas, iglesias y agencias Metodistas Unidas dentro de las seis
41 conferencias anuales en Texas y Nuevo México. Agradecemos la oportunidad de informar de algunas de las
42 formas en que servimos a los Metodistas Unidos el año pasado.

43 **Dentro de la Conferencia de Río Texas:**

- 44 • Los préstamos a iglesias en la Conferencia de Río Texas totalizaron en \$51.5 millones a fines de 2021.
- 45 • Las iglesias y agencias, sin incluir a individuos, dentro de la Conferencia de Río Texas invirtieron \$47.45
- 46 millones en el Fondo de Préstamos Metodistas.

1 A lo largo de Texas y Nuevo México:

- 2 • Hasta el 31 de diciembre de 2021, los **activos totales** administrados por la TMF eran de \$734,9 millones.
- 3 • Las **inversiones del Fondo de Prestamos Metodistas** terminaron el año en \$273 millones y nuestra cartera
- 4 de préstamos en \$288 millones.
- 5 • **El total de donaciones** a los ministerios de la TMF fue de \$1,070,113.51. Esto incluye obsequios para el
- 6 Ministerio de Liderazgo, Subvenciones y las donaciones no designadas de la TMF.
- 7 • El total de donaciones a la TMF en beneficio de otros fue de casi \$1.3 millones. Esto incluye todas las
- 8 donaciones planificadas (Fundaciones, Anualidades de Donaciones Benéficas, Fideicomisos, Fondos
- 9 Asesorados por Donantes).
- 10 • En 2021, el **Ministerio de Subvenciones** de la TMF **financió aproximadamente \$2,8 millones en apoyo de**
- 11 **104 subvenciones** a iglesias y organizaciones sin fines de lucro. De ese total, la TMF otorgó \$2.3 millones
- 12 de sus fondos de fundaciones permanentes restringidas y el resto de su presupuesto operativo. Además, el
- 13 Comité de Subvenciones de la TMF otorgó más de \$73,000 en subvenciones de ayuda de emergencia de un
- 14 Fondo temporal de Ayuda de Emergencia COVID-19. El Comité de Subvenciones de la Junta Directiva de la

- 31 **han reforzado la necesidad de que la iglesia ejercite cinco músculos adaptativos para estar en forma, ágil**
- 32 **y lista hacia donde Dios la dirija.** Esos músculos se están afligiendo bien, discerniendo el propósito,
- 33 caminando lado a lado, distribuyendo el poder y expandiendo la imaginación. Aprenda más sobre el

- 35 • Impulsados por el deseo de animar y apoyar, el equipo de Representantes de Área de la TMF ha continuado
- 36 siendo firme y leal a aquellos a quienes sirven. Como socios acompañantes en el ministerio, **el equipo de**
- 37 **Representantes de Área equipa y empodera a las comunidades de fe mientras viven en su misión**
- 38 **designada por Dios.** Aunque detenidos por la pandemia, los ocho representantes, que normalmente viajan
- 39 por Texas y Nuevo México y realizan más de 2500 visitas, adoptaron la flexibilidad y encontraron una forma
- 40 de rotar. Una rotación que conduce al fomento de relaciones más profundas y la provisión de recursos y
- 41 servicios muy necesarios. Todo dentro del espacio virtual. Al proporcionar mejores prácticas financieras,
- 42 cultivar planes de legados de generosidad e inspirar culturas de generosidad, el trabajo de mejora floreció.

Informe de la Junta de Síndicos
Informe I
Informe del Presidente
Solo para Información

1 Queridos hermanos y hermanas de Cristo,

2
3 Les informo en nombre de la Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia de la Iglesia Metodista Unida
4 Río Texas. A medida que salimos de la pandemia y la adoración virtual, los últimos dos años han
5 sido una época de desafíos para las iglesias de la Conferencia Río Texas. A pesar de los desafíos,
6 nuestras iglesias han respondido con resiliencia para continuar haciendo discípulos de Jesucristo
7 para la transformación del mundo. Es un momento difícil pero emocionante para ser la iglesia.

8
9 De acuerdo con la Sección 2512 del Libro de Disciplina de la Iglesia Metodista Unida 2016, la
10 Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia tiene la responsabilidad de recibir y mantener en seguridad
11 para el beneficio de la Conferencia, donaciones, bienes muebles e inmuebles. Además, la Junta
12 tiene la facultad de invertir, enajenar o traspasar los bienes que tenga en seguridad. Los activos en
13 poder de la Junta de Síndicos incluyen iglesias cerradas, casas pastorales no utilizadas y terrenos
14 no urbanizados. La Junta trabaja en estrecha colaboración con el personal de la Conferencia y con
15 las recomendaciones de los Distritos para supervisar y administrar la propiedad que se le ha
16 confiado. En el caso de que la propiedad de la iglesia ya no esté en uso por una iglesia local y el
17 Distrito crea que no hay uso futuro para adoración o misión de la propiedad, se puede vender o
18 arrendar.

19
20 Como les describí en mi informe del año pasado, los Síndicos tienen múltiples propiedades bajo
21 su revisión y administración en cualquier momento durante el año. Estos son tanto urbanos como
22 rurales e incluyen estructuras con valor inmobiliario material y otras en mal estado sustancial.
23 Muchas de estas propiedades tienen un valor limitado, ya sea por ubicación o condición. El tiempo
24 que transcurre entre que los Síndicos toman el control de la propiedad y la venta puede ser de
25 meses o años y la Conferencia continúa incurriendo costos sustanciales para mantener y asegurar
26 la propiedad antes de la venta. Los Síndicos actualmente tienen aproximadamente 10 propiedades
27 en arrendamiento a corto o largo plazo y aproximadamente 10 propiedades en espera de venta u
28 otra disposición.

29
30 La Junta de Síndicos actualmente está autorizada a retener el 20% de cada venta de propiedad,
31 hasta un máximo de \$400,000 con el fin de mantener y asegurar la propiedad en poder de la Junta.
32 Este fondo permite que los Síndicos tengan fondos suficientes para administrar adecuadamente las
33 propiedades bajo su control.

34
35 La Junta de Síndicos tuvo gastos relacionados con propiedades no vendidas por un monto de
36 \$182,824 para el año 2021 y \$43,036 para el 2022, hasta la fecha. Muchos gastos se reembolsan
37 al momento de la venta de la propiedad inmueble, y para el 2021 la Junta de Síndicos tuvo \$35,701
38 en gastos los cuales fueron reembolsados por la venta de una propiedad específica.

39
40 En la Conferencia Anual anterior informamos sobre los cierres en San Diego: First UMC, El
41 Campo: St. Paul, Austwell, Rock Island UMC, Divine Grace y Bishop: El Redentor.
42 Este año informamos los cierres de Robstown: El Redentor, Hebbroville: First UMC, Donna:
43 First UMC, Raymondville: Bethel, Austin Servant Church y Bay City: Nazareth.

1 La Junta ha transferido recientemente la propiedad cerrada de San Angelo: Lakeview UMC a San
2 Angelo: First UMC para su uso en la comunidad.

3
4 Durante 2021, la Junta de Síndicos, junto con el Comité de Gestión de Riesgos, iniciaron una
5 encuesta sobre las opciones de seguro de propiedad para la Conferencia. Muchas iglesias de la
6 Conferencia han expresado las dificultades causadas por el aumento de los costos de los seguros
7 de propiedad a través de la Conferencia. Entendemos el problema y activamente continuaremos
8 buscando soluciones.

9
10 La Junta de Síndicos está trabajando diligentemente para identificar opciones innovadoras para el
11 uso de los bienes inmuebles disponibles. Hemos prestado atención a las propiedades urbanas con
12 valor económico potencial y reconocemos que el aumento de los valores inmobiliarios requiere
13 enfoques nuevos e innovadores para el uso y la gestión de la propiedad. También hemos trabajado
14 para localizar usos misionales alternativos para las propiedades rurales.

15
16 La Junta, junto con el Distrito Capital, en negociación activa con un desarrollador sobre el antiguo
17 sitio Faith UMC en Austin, que es el hogar actual del Centro O4 de Austin New Church. Las
18 estructuras actuales se encuentran en mal estado. El Centro O4 es un lugar vibrante de adoración
19 y música en vivo y esperamos que pueda ser un modelo para una remodelación exitosa en el futuro.

20
21 En la antigua Iglesia Metodista Unida de Parker Lane en Austin, la Conferencia ha trabajado en
22 estrecha colaboración con el Distrito Capital para estructurar un arrendamiento innovador a largo
23 plazo de la propiedad de Parker Lane con Foundation Communities, un importante proveedor de
24 viviendas asequibles en el área de Austin. Este proyecto propuesto se cerró en septiembre de 2021
25 y se espera que Foundation Communities comience a construir pronto una nueva comunidad de
26 viviendas asequibles muy necesaria en Austin. El proyecto también ha proporcionado un
27 rendimiento financiero material a la Conferencia y proporcionará al Distrito Capital oficinas
28 permanentes y espacio de usos múltiples en la nueva estructura sin costo alguno para el Distrito.

29
30 Los Síndicos están trabajando actualmente con varios otros lugares donde las congregaciones
31 buscan reevaluar sus instalaciones actuales. Tenemos congregaciones ubicadas en instalaciones
32 más grandes de lo que pueden soportar o que ya no satisfacen sus necesidades y los Síndicos
33 ayudarán a esas iglesias a evaluar sus opciones.

34
35 La Junta Directiva también continúa participando con Light on the Hill, anteriormente Mount
36 Wesley en Kerrville, Texas, en asociación con Kerrville: First United Methodist. Light on the Hill,
37 bajo el liderazgo de Kerrville: FUMC, continúa su extraordinaria misión como recurso comunitario
38 cristiano.

39
40 La Junta de Síndicos reconoce el potencial de las iglesias para considerar la desafiliación de la
41 denominación por cuestiones relacionadas con la sexualidad humana. En este sentido, la Junta, en
42 consulta con el Obispo y el Gabinete, ha adoptado el documento “Discerning Pathways: Guidelines
43 for disaffiliation under ¶2553” (Discerniendo Sendas: Guías para desafiliación bajo el ¶2553”). La
44 intención es proporcionar a las iglesias que están considerando la desafiliación una guía reflexiva
45 y práctica, que incluye un período de discernimiento y oración. El documento está disponible si se
46 solicita a su Superintendente de Distrito.

Informe II
Para acción de la Conferencia

1 La Junta de Síndicos viene a la Conferencia Anual solicitando acción sobre la IMU Jefferson este
2 año. A partir del 28 de febrero de 2021, Jefferson, la Iglesia Metodista Unida de San Antonio votó
3 para desafiliarse de la Conferencia Rio Texas. La Junta de Síndicos participó en negociaciones
4 prolongadas con Jefferson UMC con respecto a los términos de su desafiliación. Estas
5 negociaciones dieron como resultado un acuerdo para arrendar las instalaciones existentes a la
6 nueva Iglesia Comunitaria de Jefferson sin denominación a partir del 1 de julio de 2022. El contrato
7 de arrendamiento requerirá que la Iglesia Comunitaria de Jefferson pague una renta anual,
8 mantenga la propiedad y la mantenga debidamente asegurada. La transacción también incluye una
9 liberación mutua que dará por terminado un litigio actualmente pendiente en este asunto. La Junta
10 de Síndicos solicita que la Conferencia Anual apruebe la desafiliación de la IMU Jefferson en los
11 términos y condiciones que la Junta de Síndicos determine que son en el mejor interés de la
12 Conferencia.

Conclusión

13 Los Síndicos continúan comprometidos con la administración prudente de las propiedades que nos
14 han sido confiadas. La Junta de Síndicos y el personal de la Conferencia trabajan diligentemente
15 para minimizar los costos y maximizar el retorno a la Conferencia de la administración de nuestros
16 bienes inmuebles. El personal de la conferencia hace un excelente trabajo apoyando a la Junta de
17 Síndicos y administrando las propiedades en transición. El año pasado, Tina Whitaker, miembro
18 del personal de mucho tiempo, se mudó para estar más cerca de su familia en Colorado y Nan Pyle
19 ha hecho un trabajo ejemplar al asumir las responsabilidades de Tina. Kendall Waller y Adria
20 Gómez continúan apoyando a los Síndicos y son de gran ayuda. Además, Karen Horan y nuestro
21 superintendente de enlace de distrito, Andy Smith, fueron recursos valiosos durante todo el año.

MEMOIRS

GUIDELINES FOR MEMOIRS

In the Rio Texas Conference it is the responsibility of the minister who conducts the funeral of a deceased minister, or spouse of a minister, to write the memoir for the conference journal. The memoir is not designed to be either a eulogy or a memorial sermon, and is not the place for sentimentality; but this brief and specialized biographical account can be a document suitable as a historical record and a portrayal of personality and spirit.

Certain facts are basic and essential for inclusion in a memoir. The style of writing and the method and order of presentation may differ but a memoir should contain the following information, either within the body of the memoir or listed at the end:

1. Personal life, early period: complete name of the deceased; date and place of birth; names of parents, including mother's maiden name.
2. Educational background: schools and colleges attended, with years noted; degrees and honors received, with dates.
3. Ecclesiastical data: first church membership (name of church, location, date); dates of ordination and admission to annual conference; appointments served; special areas of service on conference boards and agencies; retirement date; residence following retirement; and any service after retirement. (This paragraph is to be adapted to the spouse.)
4. Personal life, late period: date of marriage and name of spouse (including maiden name of wife); full names of children (including married names); date and circumstances of death; date and place of funeral and burial; names of officiating clergy; and address of surviving partner or nearest relative.

It shall be the responsibility of the annual conference secretary, as editor of the journal, to see that this basic biographical information is contained in the memoirs that are printed in the conference journal. When the conference secretary is informed as to who will write a memoir, he/she will send to the writer of the memoir a copy of these guidelines, and instruct the writer to make sure that the memoir that is written is complete with the necessary biographical information. It should not be more than 300 words in length.

Writers of memoirs should present a copy of the memoir to a member or members of the family of the deceased so that it may be checked for accuracy before it is sent to the conference secretary. Memoirs should be received by the conference secretary within one month after the death of the person who has served the conference as minister or minister's spouse.

A glossy photograph, preferably black and white, secured if possible from the family, should be made available for publication with the memoir.

INSTRUCCIONES PARA MEMORIALES

En la Conferencia Río Texas, es la responsabilidad del Ministro quien lleva a cabo el funeral de un difunto Ministro, o cónyuge de un ministro, escribir un memorial para el diario de la Conferencia. El memorial no está diseñado para ser un elogio o un sermón conmemorativo y no es el lugar para sentimentalismo; pero este relato biográfico breve y especializado puede ser un documento adecuado como un registro histórico y un retrato de la personalidad y espíritu del difunto.

Hay ciertos datos básicos y esenciales para inclusión en un memorial. El estilo de escritura y el método y orden de presentación pueden variar pero deben contener la siguiente información, ya sea dentro del cuerpo del memorial o al final:

1. Vida personal, nombre completo del difunto, datos del periodo de edad temprana; fecha y lugar de nacimiento; nombres de sus padres, incluyendo el apellido soltero de la madre.
2. Educación: escuelas y colegios atendidos, con años señalados; diplomas y honores recibidos, con las fechas.
3. Datos eclesiásticos: Membresía de primera iglesia (nombre de la iglesia, lugar, fecha); fechas de ordenación y de admisión a la conferencia anual; nombramientos servidos; áreas especiales de servicio en juntas y agencias de la conferencia; fecha de retiro; residencia después de su retiro; y cualquier servicio después de jubilación. (Este párrafo debe ser adaptado para el/la cónyuge).
4. Datos de vida personal posterior: fecha del matrimonio y nombre del cónyuge (incluyendo el apellido de la esposa o el esposo); nombres y apellidos de los niños (incluyendo apellidos de los casados); fecha y circunstancias de fallecimiento; fecha y lugar del funeral y entierro; nombres del clero que oficiaron; y dirección del cónyuge sobreviviente o el pariente más cercano.

Será la responsabilidad del Secretario de la conferencia anual, como editor del diario, ver que esta información biográfica básica esté contenida en los memoriales que se imprimen en el diario de la Conferencia. Cuando el Secretario de la Conferencia se informe de quién va a escribir un memorial, debe enviar al escritor del memorial una copia de estas instrucciones e indicar el escritor que se asegure que en el memorial escrito está completa la información biográfica. No debe ser más de 300 palabras en su total.

Los escritores de memoriales deben presentar una copia del memorial a un miembro o a miembros de la familia de los difuntos para que ellos puedan verificar su exactitud antes de enviarlo al Secretario de la Conferencia. Memoriales deben ser recibidos por el Secretario de la Conferencia dentro de un mes después de la muerte de la persona que sirvió en la Conferencia como ministro o esposa/o del ministro.

Una fotografía brillante, preferiblemente en blanco y negro, donada si es posible por la familia, debe ponerse a disposición para su publicación con el libro de memoriales.

WILLIAM JAMES ABRAHAM

DECEMBER 19, 1947 – OCTOBER 7, 2021



Rev. William J. Abraham, 73, died on Thursday, October 7, 2021. A memorial service was held at Highland Park United Methodist Church, 3300 Mockingbird Lane, Dallas, Texas 75205 on Saturday, October 30, 2021.

Billy Abraham was born on December 19, 1947 to Irvine and Isabella Abraham in Enniskillen, Northern Ireland (United Kingdom). His father died in an accident in 1951, leaving his mother with six boys. His earliest childhood memory is of Irish Methodist ministers praying with the family and bringing “orphan money” on Sundays. An academically gifted child, in 1955 Billy was selected to matriculate into Portora Royal School in his hometown from which he graduated in 1966.

He went on to pursue an honors degree in philosophy and psychology at Queen’s University in Belfast (1966-1970). As an undergraduate student, he was awarded the Peele Prize in Philosophy for an essay on the concept of human action. His love of philosophy was surpassed only by his deep conversion to the Christian faith, which he underwent in his late teens. He met his future wife, Muriel Elizabeth Charles at a youth group meeting of the Sandy Row Methodist Church

in Belfast and the two were married on August 2, 1969. They had three children, all born in Belfast: Timothy Fletcher (1971-2012), Siobhan Elizabeth (b. 1973), and Shaun Wesley (b. 1978).

Following his calling, in 1970, Billy Abraham crossed the ocean to continue his education at Asbury Theological Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky. At Asbury, he was particularly shaped by Robert Traina’s inductive method of Bible study. While studying at the seminary, Billy was elected President of Student Body and Council in 1971-1972. For his academic achievements he became a member (1972) and president (1973) of Theta Phi Honors Society and received his Master of Divinity degree in 1973. The same year he returned to Great Britain in order to pursue a doctorate in philosophical theology at the University of Oxford under the direction of a prominent philosopher of the Christian religion, Basil Mitchell (1917-2011). Abraham was awarded a D.Phil. at Oxford in 1977 with a dissertation on divine action and history, a topic that continued to be of focal significance in his scholarly career.

During his studies at Oxford, Abraham taught philosophy at Culham College of Education, Culham, Abingdon, UK (1975-1977). Upon graduating from Oxford, he was a minister in the Methodist Church in Ireland serving St Andrew’s Church in Belfast (1977-1978), Irvinestown Methodist Church in Irvinestown (1978-1980), and Cullybackey Methodist Church, Village of Cullybackey, County Antrim, N. Ireland (1982-1984). His scholarly career continued at Seattle Pacific University, where he taught theology in 1980-1982 and 1984-1985. While teaching at SPU, Abraham published his first books: *The Divine Inspiration of Holy Scripture* (1981), *Divine Revelation and the Limits of Historical Criticism* (1982, reprinted in 2000 as Oxford Scholarly Classic), and *The Coming Great Revival: Recovering the Full Evangelical Tradition* (1984). These works began to establish Abraham’s reputation as a leading theological authority within Methodism and beyond.

In 1985, he joined the faculty of Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University (SMU) first as Professor of Philosophy of Religion and McCreless Professor of Evangelism (1985-1995) and later as Albert Cook Outler Professor of Theology and Wesley Studies (1995-2020). At Perkins, his teaching spanned the disciplines of systematic theology, philosophy of religion, evangelism, and Wesley studies. For three decades, Abraham taught courses in systematic theology that were important for defining the character and depth of theological education received at Perkins. He also taught and supervised numerous doctoral students at the Graduate Program in Religious Studies at SMU. Under the auspices of the Center for Evangelism and Church Mission Studies, in 2000, Abraham founded the Polycarp Community consisting of graduate students and pastors who wished to continue their postgraduate research in theology on a British model. With his general supervision, many members of the Polycarp Community defended their doctoral dissertations at Durham University, the University of Manchester, the University of South Africa, and others. As an inspiring teacher and caring mentor, he made a lasting impact upon a generation of future pastors and university instructors. In 2003, he received the highest award for teaching at SMU and was appointed Altshuler University Distinguished Teacher.

A prolific scholar during his tenure at SMU, Abraham authored or edited over twenty-five books including: *An Introduction to the Philosophy of Religion* (1985), *The Rationality of Religious Belief: Essays in Honor of Basil Mitchell* (edited with Stephen W. Holtzer, 1987), *How to Play Theological Ping-Pong: Essays by Basil Mitchell* (edited with Robert Prevost, 1989), *The Logic of Evangelism* (1989), *The Art of Evangelism: Evangelism Carefully Crafted into the Life of the Local Church* (1993), *Waking from Doctrinal Amnesia* (1995), *Unity, Charity and Liberty: Building Bridges Under Icy Waters* (edited with Donald Messer, 1996), *Canon and Criterion in Christian Theology: From the Fathers to Feminists* (1997, received Best Book Faculty Award at SMU and Joint Book of the Year Award from Institute of Christian Studies in 1999), *Can United Methodists Stay United?* (1998), *Evangelism: Essays by Albert Cook Outler* (edited with Albert Outler, 1998), *The Logic of Renewal* (2003), *Saving Souls in the Twenty-First Century: A Missiological Midrash on John Wesley* (2003), *John Wesley for Armchair Theologians* (2005), *Crossing the Threshold of Divine Revelation* (2006), *Canonical Theism: A Proposal for Theology and the Church* (edited with Jason E. Vickers and Natalie B. Van Kirk, 2008), *The Oxford Handbook of Methodist Studies* (edited with James E. Kirby, 2009), *Aldersgate and Athens: John Wesley and the Foundations of Christian Belief* (2010), *Key United Methodist Beliefs* (with David F. Watson, 2013), *Among the Ashes: On Death, Grief, and Hope* (2017), *The Oxford Handbook of the Epistemology of Theology* (edited with Frederick D. Aquino, 2017), *Divine Agency and Divine Action* (vols. 1 and 2: 2017, vol. 3: 2018, vol. 4: 2021), *Methodism: A Very Short Introduction* (2019), *John Wesley’s Sermons on Various Occasions* (3 vols., 2021, edited with a commentary).

Abraham also founded Highland Loch Press in Dallas, Texas, in which he self-published four titles: *Celtic Fire: Evangelism in the Wisdom and Power of the Spirit* (2012), *The Bible: Beyond the Impasse* (2012), *Analytic Theology: A Bibliography* (2012); *Shaking Hands with the Devil: The Intersection of Terrorism and Theology* (2013). In addition, he published over a hundred scholarly and popular articles, as well as produced audio-visual resources on the basics of the Christian faith, Bible study, Methodism, and church renewal. In 2012, he was awarded the Ford Fellowship, which is the highest award for scholarship at SMU. In 2013, Abraham also received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Wesleyan Theological Society (WTS).

The WTS award recognized Abraham's wide-ranging contributions to Wesleyan and Methodist Studies over the decades. His work on John Wesley aimed to paint a nuanced picture of the eighteenth-century figure as evangelist, as theologian, as preacher, and as spiritual father. While Abraham offered cutting-edge scholarly insights—his treatment of Wesley's theological epistemology is a prime example—he took great care to make his work on Wesley accessible to a general audience. He also published numerous books, chapters, and articles in *Methodist Studies*, continually emphasizing the importance of sound doctrine to the health of the church.

Evangelism and mission held a prominent place in his own calling, and this included significant scholarly work in this territory. Abraham's exploration of the place of evangelism within the life of the church was marked by theological depth and pastoral concern. He developed a holistic conception of evangelism as a process of initiation into the life of the church and into the kingdom of God. Pressing back against reductionist accounts of what evangelism is, he called for immersion of new believers into the full riches of the Christian faith.

In creative and fruitful ways, he showed the relevance of philosophy of religion for theology. He sought to demonstrate the vitality of philosophy of religion as a discipline within both philosophy and religion. In extraordinary ways he acknowledged the distinction between these disciplines while exploring how they intersect and inform one another. Some of his research interests included the nature and scope of divine revelation, divine action, the rationality of religious belief, the relationship between theology and epistemology, and the meaning and nature of canon. His ability to see through problems and offer fresh insights is deeply relevant for the ongoing engagement between philosophy and religion.

In addition to his service to SMU, his visiting appointments included Visiting Professor at Central Asian Evangelical School of Theology, Karaganda, Kazakhstan (1998), Visiting Professor of Evangelical Theology at Harvard Divinity School, Harvard University (1999), Visiting Scholar at Trinity Theological School, Sibul, Malaysia (2006, 2008), Visiting Professor at Bishram School of Ministry, Kathmandu, Nepal (2006), and Visiting Professor at Evangelical Methodist Seminary, San Jose, Costa Rica (2007, 2008, 2021). The appointments in Kazakhstan, Malaysia, Nepal, and Costa Rica are indicators of Abraham's indefatigable missionary efforts and his burning desire to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with people around the world. In addition, his missionary work in Turda, Romania (2010-2021) involved evangelism and church-building. Abraham is the founder and president of Oasis International Missions (1999-2021) also known as Salt and Light European Ministries, a non-profit organization that supports Christian missions worldwide.

Upon his retirement from SMU in 2020, Abraham taught part-time at Dallas Baptist University. He also became the founding director of the Wesley House of Studies at Baylor University's George W. Truett Theological Seminary, Waco, Texas. In grateful acknowledgement and joyful recognition of Professor Abraham's outstanding, lifelong contribution to scholarship in service of the church in general and to Wesleyan Studies in particular, in September 2021, through the generous gifts of donors, Truett Seminary established in his honor The William J. Abraham Chair of the Wesley House of Studies.

A renowned speaker, Abraham gave public lectures at numerous educational institutions, societies, and churches, including: University of Edinburgh (1975), University of Lancaster (1976), Origen Society, Oxford (1976), Irish Baptist College (1977), Union Theological College, Belfast (1979), Wesleyan Theological Society (1981, 1984), Western Evangelical Seminary (1982), Oxford Institute of Methodist Theological Studies (1982, 1987, 1992, 2006), Methodist Bicentennial Theological Consultation, Emory University (1983), Edgehill Theological College, Belfast (1984, 1996), National Meetings of the American Academy of Religion (1984, 2007, 2008, 2013), Regional Meetings of the American Academy of Religion (1986, 1987), Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans (1985), Bethel College (1987), Messiah College (1988), McMurry College (1989, 1991), American Jewish Committee, Dallas (1989), Duke University (1989), Southern Nazarene University (1990), Wesley Seminary (1990), University of London (1991), Pacific School of Evangelism, Sydney (1993), United Theological College, Sydney (1993), St John's College, Auckland (1993), Onel College, Oxford (1994), Candler School of Theology (1997), Iliff School of Theology (1997), Korean Consultation, Honolulu (1998), Harvard University (1998), University of Illinois (1998), Cliff College (1999), Calvin College (2000, 2014), Washington National Cathedral (2000), Baylor University (2000, 2003, 2006, 2007), Canadian Methodist Historical Association (2000), Harvard Divinity School (2001), Point Loma Nazarene University (2002), Abilene Christian University (2002, 2003), Cliff College (2003), Downpatrick Cathedral, N. Ireland (2003), British Methodist Conference (2003), Duke Divinity School (2003), Wesleyan Theological Society (2004), Wheaton College (2004), Central Asian Evangelical School of Theology (2004), Singapore Methodist Church (2005), United Theological Seminary (2007), American Philosophical Association (2007), Lipscomb University (2008), Houghton College (2008), Denman Lectures, Nashville (2009), Mere Anglicanism Conference, Charleston (2009), World Universities Forum, Davos, Switzerland (2009), Community College, Corsicana (2010), Rutgers University (2010), Indiana Wesleyan University (2010), Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest (2010), University of Notre Dame (2011, 2013, 2014), University of St. Thomas (2013, 2015), Winget Lecture, Spring Arbor University (2014), Trinity Theological College, Singapore (2015), Colgate University (2018), Jesuit School of Theology, Paris (2019), Los Angeles Theology Conference (2019), Meetings of the International Orthodox Theological Association (Jerusalem, Israel, 2018 and Iasi, Romania 2019), and others.

He served as an advisor to the following presses: Oxford University Press, Cambridge University Press, Abingdon Press, Rowan and Littlefield Press, Wadsworth Press, and University of Notre Dame Press. He was an advisor to London Weekly Television (1988) and

served on the Editorial Board of Interpretation (1994-1997). A long-time friend of the Eastern Orthodox Church, Abraham was an Ecumenical Observer for the International Orthodox Theological Association.

A clergy member of Rio Texas Annual Conference (formerly the Southwest Texas Annual Conference), Dr. Abraham transferred his membership in 1990 from the Pacific Northwest Annual Conference, where he was ordained Deacon in 1979 and Elder in 1984. At the local level, he was regularly invited to preach, officiate at services, and teach Sunday school classes. He taught two Sunday School classes, *In His Steps* and *First Light*, at the Highland Park United Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas for nearly thirty years until the week he died. At the denominational level, he served as a delegate to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference and also on the United Methodist General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. He addressed numerous gatherings of United Methodists across the globe and helped to plant churches in many countries. For many years he was active in the Confessing Movement and participated in many official and unofficial conversations about the UMC's doctrinal commitments.

In 2014, Billy struggled with and successfully recovered from colon cancer. He also had sleep apnea but otherwise his health remained strong. He was full of plans for his future missionary and scholarly work when he died suddenly while visiting a friend at an assisted living facility. A loving husband and caring father, he was preceded in death by his son Timothy (d. 2012) and is survived by his wife Muriel, his children Siobhan and Shaun, as well as his brothers John, Ivan, Cecil, and Ken Abraham.

TAYLOR SCOTT BOONE

DECEMBER 27, 1948 – SEPTEMBER 15, 2021



Taylor Scott Boone, age 72, died on Wednesday, September 15, 2021, in San Antonio. Taylor was hospitalized for urgent surgeries that led to him becoming immunocompromised. Despite being fully vaccinated, he tested positive for Covid-19, and died from complications of Covid-19. He was born on December 27, 1948, in Houston, Texas, to Joyce Taylor and Berrill Harrison Boone. Taylor received the BBA degree from The University of Texas at Austin, the J.D. degree from St. Mary's University School of Law, and the M. Div. degree from Perkins School of Theology at SMU. He was a respected estate planning attorney, having earned board certification in this specialty; he was also a member of the American College of Trust and Estate Counsel. In 2008, Taylor was ordained a Deacon in the United Methodist Church. He served at Travis Park Church where his ministry focused on serving the unhoused, the poor, the marginalized, the lost and the least through Corazon Ministries. After his

retirement from active ministry, Taylor served the United Methodist Church on the District and Conference levels.

Taylor served on the boards of numerous organizations including the local chapter of the American Diabetes Association, Hospice San Antonio, Interfaith Alliance, and Clarity Child Guidance Center.

Taylor's greatest legacy is Methodist Healthcare Ministries and Methodist Healthcare System. By all accounts, he was the chief architect of the partnership that created these entities – the founding father of the Methodist Healthcare family in South Texas. He was justifiably proud of this achievement.

He was preceded in death by his parents and his brother, Stephen C. Boone. Taylor is survived by his wife, Alison Wenger Boone; daughters, Catherine de Marigny and her husband William, Virginia Hewlett and her husband Alex; four grandsons, Taylor de Marigny, Andrew de Marigny, James de Marigny, and Brodie Hewlett; his sisters-in-law, Susan Pate, Valerie Wenger, and Charlotte Wenger; his parents-in-law, Barbara and Paul C. Wenger, Jr.; and numerous nieces and nephews. Memorial Service was held October 2, 2021 at Travis Park UMC, San Antonio, TX. Bishop Robert Schnase and the Reverend Eric Vogt officiated. REV. DR. HAROLD DEAN BURKHARDT**(AKA BURKY)***SEPTEMBER 22, 1927 – APRIL 7, 2022*

Our dearly beloved Burky died peacefully at home surrounded by family on April 7, 2022 and into the arms of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ- now in his heavenly home -from complications due to a heart ailment. He was born on September 22, 1927, in Topeka, Kansas, as the son of Floyd B. and Aileen McPhail Burkhardt. He is preceded in death by his parents, sister Jean Berry and his first wife of 47 years, Myriam Louise Kelso Burkhardt- married on August 14, 1953- a loving wife and mother of their two daughters.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 20 years, Patricia Fullingim Handy Burkhardt- married on March 23, 2002. Also survived by his daughters Rebecca Louise Burkhardt (Cynthia Goatley), and Deanna Rochelle B. Weibel (Robert) their sons and his grandsons: Robert Jennings Weibel III (Caitlin), and Steven Dean Weibel (Nicole) as well as Patricia's children, Jonathan Handy (Leah) and Glee Katherine Handy and her children, Jeremiah R. Wilson, and Jessica Glee Wilson. Many other kin survive him as well.

Harold finished high school in Corpus Christi in 1945 and received from Southwestern University (Georgetown, Texas) a degree of Bachelor of Arts in 1949; from Duke Divinity School (Durham, North Carolina) a degree of Master of Christian Education in 1950.

In 1981 Harold received an honorary Doctor of Divinity from Southwestern University. In February 2022, he was given the Distinguished Humanitarian Award by the Alumni Association of Southwestern University.

The Rev. Dr. Harold Dean Burkhardt served sixty-four years as a member of the Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church.

1951-1954: He served as the first Associate Pastor at Alamo Heights United Methodist Church. During that time, he created their first Living Nativity Scene which continued until 2021- on the front lawn of the church on Broadway (including live animals!)- in 1994 moved to the new church on Basse Road.

1956-1973: Pastor for twenty-two years in four different churches.

After his Master of Theology at - SMU in 1956 he not only served as a spiritual leader for churches in Lytle, Kingsville, El Campo and Brownsville, but also brought his church community together to erect new buildings and build innovative programs in all four; and strengthened the ministry to youth in each congregation.

1973-1994: President and CEO of the Methodist Mission Home in San Antonio for twenty-one years- (renamed Providence Place).

Harold ministered over 2000 expectant single mothers and 1800 babies were placed for adoption into loving homes. Harold pioneered a second ministry at the Mission Home soon after he arrived in 1973, serving hundreds of hearing-impaired youth and guiding them to independent living. He also maintained his enthusiasm for learning and earning a Master of Science-Health Care Administration, Trinity University (San Antonio), in 1984. The Burkhardt Activity Center at MMH was dedicated and named in his honor in 1994. He was active in state and national groups dealing with childcare and rehabilitation of handicapped persons.

In 1994 he was given a "Resolution of Appreciation" by the Southwest Texas Conference of the UMC for his work at the Methodist Mission Home, and in 2000 awarded the "Servant Leadership Award" by the conference. Harold received the "Paul Harris Fellow Award for Service" during the years as member of San Antonio Rotary Club; also giving Invocations and Benedictions.

Serving the Church for twenty years in Retirement- 1994-2014

1994-1996: Director of the Capital Funds Campaign and served on the building committee for the construction of a new headquarters building for Southwest Texas Conference United Methodist Church (now known as the Rio Texas Conference), raising more than three-million-dollars. George first caught the attention of the FCC when he began broadcasting from his garage as a 12-year-old. Lacking the necessary permits, the FCC triangulated his signal and showed up to mete out fines

and penalties, but upon realizing it was a child that was broadcasting, let him off with a warning, shaking their heads in disbelief. Thus began the career in radio broadcasting that would see George erect numerous radio transmission towers and build and operate radio stations around the country, including KTPI in Tehachapi, CA, Lone Star 98 in Abilene, TX, KXIT in Dalhart, TX, among others. George also engineered and patented an electronic device. Entirely self-taught and lacking a formal degree, George was recognized as one of the leading experts in the industry, and often consulted as an engineer, troubleshooting radio broadcasting problems around the world. It was once said that George could build radio station out of a plate of spaghetti! In addition to finding his vocational fervor early in life, in his youth he also found the other two passions that defined his life. It was during their participation in a United Methodist Youth Group in Hollywood that George reconnected with the same Bonnie Randis with whom he had shared his maternity ward 15 years prior. George had found his lifetime soulmate, best friend, and future wife. George also realized his passion for the Lord and ministry. George and Bonnie married in Sep 1977 and together raised two lovely daughters, Kellie Lorraine and Alison Bridget.

In addition to working, owning, and operating radio stations throughout his life, George also followed his calling to ministry, serving as a United Methodist Church pastor for 32 years. Lois York and husband, Glen, of Lakehills, TX; David Ricker and wife Theresa, of Canyon Lake, Texas; and Philip Ricker and wife Anna, of Ropesville, TX; 6 grandchildren, 3 great-grandchildren, 3 nieces, 1 nephew and their families.

As a United Methodist clergy, Dr. Ricker served churches in Bertram, Frederickburg, Columbus, San Angelo, Edinburg, and Corpus Christi before moving to Austin. After his Austin pastorate, Dr. Ricker served a year as the Superintendent of the San Angelo District of the United Methodist Church before becoming Minister of Practical Theology and Ethical Concerns on the campus of Texas State University in San Marcos, an endowed chair at the Campus Christian Community. He served eight years in this capacity that involved, among other things, teaching religion courses and a Freshman Seminar at the University. In San Marcos, he changed his radio spots to newspaper columns in the "San Marcos Daily Record" twice a week from 1987 to 1995. As an author, Dr. Ricker has had sermons and featured articles published in several magazines. He has also published five different books on various religious topics. Dr. Ricker served as chair of the Higher Education Commission, The Board of Education, and the Board of Social Concerns of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference at three General Conferences and three Judicial Conferences. In Addition, he chaired the Peacemaking Workgroup of the Texas Conference of Churches for two years. After retirement from his San Marcos position in 1993, Dr. Ricker and his wife, Frances, moved to Austin to live in their home in the Tarrytown area. He was active as a teacher and lecturer. He continued to teach a course at Texas State, short term courses at a number of churches, and courses at SAGE, a continuing education program at UT. He taught courses on Lauren Eiseley, early Christian literature, and various religious topics. Dr. Ricker was involved in the formation of the Austin Peace and Justice Coalition and served with John Henry Faulk, Dr. Betty Sue Flowers, Dr. Wes Wallace and others in the group Called Professionals for Nuclear Arms Limitation with provided speakers for various community groups.

George Marvin Ricker was born in Boston, lived as a child in New Hampshire, matured as a teenager in Auburn, New York, where he graduated high school. He served in World War II in the Army Air Corps and was discharged after the war as a Captain. He enrolled in SMU and graduated with Honors in 1949. While at SMU, he lettered for two years on the tennis team. He was elected to several honor societies, one of which became SMU's Phi Beta Cappa chapter. In his sophomore year, he married Frances Ryden to form a compatible and loving relationship that continued for over 72 years. Who preceded him in death in 2020. From SMU, George Ricker enrolled in Union Theological Seminary where he studied under such noted theologians as Professors Paul Tillich and Reinhold Niebuhr and did major work in the New Testament under Dr. John Knox. He graduated in 1951 and with his wife Frances, returned to Texas to begin his pastoral ministry. Southwestern University honored him with a honorary Doctorate degree in 1980.

GORDON ALLEN ROE, JR
FEBRUARY 17, 1935 – OCTOBER 30, 2021



Turn off the marquee, close the choir loft, take down the lectern, and send the students home. Gordon Roe has died. Gordon was a teacher, preacher, choir director, singer, performer, husband, father, and a true individual. He died at age 86 in San Antonio, where he had moved with his wife, Patsy, just three months earlier. He was hoping to make it into his 90s.

Gordon had just finished watching a baseball game, was getting a bowl of ice cream and fell backwards — a symptom of Parkinson’s — and died of the subsequent complications.

“D as in dog” were his last words while he was losing consciousness, an irony considering his dislike of pets but perhaps indicative of his love for teaching. Gordon had many interests and passions; pets were not among them. Teaching and learning — and music — were his favorite pursuits.

Gordon loved the arts, music, reading, history, travel, and education. He sang at Carnegie Hall and visited all 50 state capitals and all 30 Major League Baseball stadiums. Rarely without his trusty tote bag of reading materials and crossword puzzles, he was a man who enjoyed cop shows and opera, books and barbershop quartets, and his wife and family, not necessarily in that order.

“Marrying Patsy was the best thing that ever happened to me,” he would tell anyone who would listen.

Two weeks before his fall, he and Patsy recruited residents of their senior living facility to put on a production of “The Road Not Taken: A Celebration of the Life and Works of Robert Frost,” a play Gordon had written. His family knew it was just a matter of time before Gordon’s new neighbors would fall under his “Let’s put on a show” enthusiasm, a trait he carried with him throughout his life.

“Gordon was such a unique and outstanding man,” said his sister, Glenda Seamons. “He stayed true to himself. He stayed ‘Gordon’ all the way through the end.”

Gordon was born in San Angelo, Texas, on February 17, 1935, to Jane and Allen Roe, who was a Methodist minister there. They moved to the Rio Grande Valley, living in places such as Weslaco and Mission, before moving to San Marcos, where Gordon graduated from high school, having been active in band, choir, and speech. At the Methodist churches they served, Allen preached and Jane often served as choir director. Both parents were strong influences on Gordon and his siblings, Norman, Glenda and Grady, and the church was the dominant force in their lives. As a result, all four Roe children went on to healing and helping professions. Gordon, Norman and Grady became Methodist ministers themselves, and Glenda worked as a teacher and counselor.

Gordon attended Southwestern University and graduated with a degree in history. He remained a loyal and persistent alumnus and often attended Southwestern homecoming in the fall. He was known for stopping random students on campus to ask them about their major and to regale them with his own Southwestern lore and family history (his siblings, mother, daughter, and niece also attended Southwestern). Go Pirates.

Gordon received his Master of Divinity from the SMU Perkins School of Theology. While there, an old friend of his dad’s recruited him to direct the choir at his church in Arlington. When Gordon arrived, he was smitten with an attractive young woman in the choir. Her name was Patsy. She sang alto. She was the preacher’s daughter. Could this be real? Gordon asked her out. He knew he had a chance when she asked him if he wanted to see her slides of Europe. Of course he did.

Gordon and Patsy were married on June 7, 1960. Gordon liked to say that he got a diploma, a wife, and his first church appointment all in the same month. He got a new suit, too.

His first church was in San Angelo, where Gordon and Patsy welcomed their first child, daughter Karen, just nine months after getting married. Gordon always said he was glad Karen wasn’t born any earlier.

Gordon and Patsy added to their family — son Russell was born in 1963, and son Roger was born in 1968. He told his children every time he saw them how proud he was of them and how grateful he was for them.

In the first years of his career, Gordon served Methodist churches in Central and South Texas towns, including Manchaca, Hunt, Burnet, and Sinton. He decided to leave the ministry in 1972 — a major turning point in his life.

Gordon always loved music and pursued a master's degree in music at the University of North Texas in Denton. Patsy got a job teaching in nearby Lewisville, where they lived for the next 48 years. Staying in one place so long was a surprising and welcome development for Gordon and Patsy, who had spent their youths moving from town to town as preacher's kids.

Gordon got a teaching certificate too, and found a new calling as a special education teacher. He said the best job he ever had was teaching juvenile offenders at Gainesville State School, which he did for over 10 years before retirement.

Music was a constant in his life. He believed deeply in the power of music to celebrate special occasions, stir souls, build community, and convey our deepest emotions.

He enjoyed the drama of a well-sung aria and the close harmonies of a barbershop quartet and, of course, the sound of his own voice lifted in song. His rich baritone filled churches and music halls across the state. He sang with the Fort Worth Opera Chorus, Plano Civic Chorus as well as many other choral groups. He was a charter member of the Dallas Symphony Chorus and was proud to have sung for the opening of the Meyerson Symphony Center.

Gordon served as choir director for several churches in the Dallas area, blessing sanctuaries with sacred music on Sundays and the occasional Broadway revue or talent show on a Saturday night in the Fellowship Hall.

He and Patsy were active at Horizon Unitarian Universalist Church in Carrollton, where Gordon organized and led a theater and performance group, the Horizon Players.

He brought sheet music to Thanksgiving and other gatherings to lead the family in song, a cherished Roe family tradition. His phone answering machine message was a litany of groaner musical puns ("I'll be 'Bach' in 'tenor' 12 minutes") ending in a plea to leave a message at the sound of the pitch pipe. Callers to his previous answering machine message heard him singing all four barbershop parts — tenor, lead, baritone and bass — on a tune no doubt recorded on a series of cassette recorders. This is a man who took his answering machine messages seriously.

Along the way, Gordon participated in many community theater productions in Lewisville, Denton and Dallas. His roles included Old Guy, Judge, Grandfather, Eccentric Old Guy, Distinguished Gentleman, Old Guy with a Hat, 12th Townsman — you get the idea.

Gordon was both generous and frugal. He embraced what he called the "Roe frugality" but gave away generous amounts of money to charity, and he endowed scholarships at Southwestern, North Texas, and Huston-Tillotson University in Austin.

A lifelong learner, he studied Spanish late in life and went on to lead classes in English as a Second Language and Spanish in Lewisville.

Also later in life, he taught himself how to play organ with the goal of being substitute organist for churches. On vacation, Gordon would pack his organ shoes and knock on church doors to see if he could play their organ, to try out the instrument and keep those fingers and feet in shape, should he be needed. He kept a running list of all the organs he played on, including many around the world.

In the same list-keeping way, Gordon managed to visit all state capitals and major-league ballparks. A student of history and believer in democracy, he visited not just the capitals but the capitol buildings themselves (often eating in the cafeteria if there was one). For Gordon's 80th birthday, his family took him to his 50th capital, Cheyenne, Wyoming, where he got to sit at the governor's desk.

If he kept a list of the books he read, it would be a long one. Gordon read an average of a book a week, devouring histories, mysteries and more.

As Gordon lay in his hospital room, his family gathered to tell him they loved him and were grateful for all he had done for them. Some thought they could see his lips try to move now and then as they sang hymns to him, including favorites such as "Standing on the Promises," "Trust and Obey" and "It Is Well With My Soul."

When peace like a river attendeth my way

When sorrows like sea billows roll

Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say

It is well, it is well with my soul.

John was a devoted Democrat. He had such a compassion for others, which led him to advocating for civil rights, equal rights, women's rights, and the LGBTQ community. These conversations were not intended to change opinions, but to exchange other perspectives. If they chose to change their opinion, so much the better!

He spent his last few months researching scriptures, writing, and imagining day to day activities Jesus might have done and thoughts He might have had as a very young man leading up to His ministry.

There are too many things to say about John...he loved his family, his church, music, the Word, military history, his alma

maters, and everything good about people.

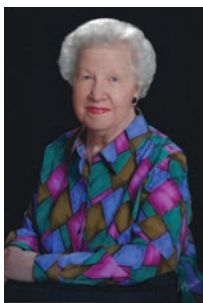

Norma Vera was 83 years old when she died on June 21, 2021, in Dallas, Texas. Born to a rancher and politician, (and later, Methodist Minister) Rev. Antonio Roberto Triana and her loving and doting mother, Gloria Marrero on September 13, 1937, in Holguin, Oriente, Cuba. Her maiden name was Norma Amada De Jesus Triana Marrero. Her parents, especially her father, envisioned a more conventional life as a wife and mother. Norma, at a very early age had other plans in mind. She had decided that she wanted to be a teacher and wanted to go on to receive more than an elementary education. Something a bit more challenging than home economics. She broached the teaching idea with her father, but her father was not too excited about the prospect. Then, stubborn headstrong person that she's always been, Norma, at that tender age of 14, convinced her father early one morning to take her to speak with the Directress of this girl's school in Holguin. The meeting clearly left an impression

on the Directress. Not only was Norma offered a seat in the school's next term; after passing her entrance exams on that very same day, she was granted a scholarship. Now, armed with not only an admission letter, but a scholarship to boot,

all she required now was her father's permission and written consent. Though we don't know the extent or details of the conversation, we do know the result. Norma graduated with a Teaching Certificate.

Right around this time, to her parent's horror, she met and caught the eye of an itinerant preacher of the gospel by the name of Brigido Vera-Perez. Preachers being preachers, he apparently knew the right thing to say because on June 7, 1958, four years after that first encounter, they were wed. Brigido's first pastoral mission assignment was off to the remote mountainous region of the Sierra Maestra of Eastern Cuba. The very same mountainous area in which a certain band of bearded ruffians led by some guy named Fidel Castro were out and about creating trouble. Undeterred, Norma as the dutiful preacher's wife followed along. Very soon the two used their respective talents to help their parishioners. Brigido tended to his parishioners' souls by preaching of God's good works and teaching the moral and ethical guidance as handed down from the Old and New Testament. Norma, teacher in her own right handled the more pragmatic down-to-earth part by teaching the local kids, and quite a few adults, basic reading, writing and arithmetic. The church got a dynamic duo. It was also in this mountainous and isolated wilderness that, to use a biblical term, they begat their first child, Joel. Turns out it was Norma who after their child's birth, urged Brigido to seriously consider a change of scenery since he was constantly speaking out against godless Communism. All that constant sermonizing about the evils of these non-believers was not only upsetting these bearded guys, it was also drawing undue attention to this little band of three. Which was now a problem, seeing how the bearded ones ("Los Barbudos") were now in charge of the country. Truth be told, it was actually more than "urging". It was more like, "I'm going to the United States with the kid, maybe you should come along."

Shortly thereafter the three ended up in the United States. Daughter Ruth, the talkative one, was born in the windy city of Chicago. But Chicago was also the place Norma managed to teach herself the basic fundamentals of the English language while living in a predominantly German neighborhood. This was right before the big move to Brigido's first appointment as a Methodist Pastor for the Rio Grande Conference in Kennedy, Texas. Then a posting to Kingsville, then on to Raymondville, a momentous place where son, Daniel was born days after Hurricane Buelah wreaked havoc on the nearby Texas coast. It was in Raymondville, where Norma also felt the tug to return to teaching. She delighted in taking on the task as the Director of the Headstart program there in Willacy County, Texas. She eagerly devoted herself to setting up a program to help lower income migrant latino farm worker children. There was no "English as a Second Language" program back then. There was however, a very effective "Sink or Swim" program in effect at the time that was successfully eliminating Spanish language dominant latino kids from the school rolls. Norma's focus became setting up a program to help these latino children firm up their grasp of English prior to beginning Kindergarten and 1st Grade. Brigido was transferred to El Buen Pastor in Corpus Christi, Texas in 1970. Norma then decided it was about time she got her teaching certificate here in the United States. She did so, earning a Bachelors in Education from Corpus Christi State University. She became busier than ever after that. Around the time she was pursuing that degree, she was a Mother of three rambunctious kids, a preacher's wife, involved in the Methodist Women's organization, (one year rising to President of the Rio Grande Conference's United Methodist Women's program, which covered all of Texas and New Mexico).

She loved to sing and was involved in the creation of the Church's Youth Choir. She was worried about the role of women in the secular and religious world and became a named delegate to the United Nations Year of the Women in 1975, and a Lay Leader in the United Methodist Church. All the while working as a teaching assistant with "Los Dos Mundos" school. The woman did not stop. Once Brigido was transferred in 1982 to Dallas, Texas to take on the parish at El Buen Samaritano United Methodist Church, Norma, with her freshly minted Degree and Teaching Certificate took on the task of teaching English as a Second Language. Her first "official" job was with the Carrollton-Farmers Branch School District. Then, Dallas I.S.D., then as an Adjunct Professor at Dallas County Community College teaching students both young and old, English and Spanish. However, she not only taught to Spanish-speaking immigrant children, but children from all parts of the world. Her bookcase brought to light the students from the varied language groups that walked through her class. From Asia, we found Korean, Laotian, Chinese, Vietnamese, Thai, Burmese, and Cambodian dictionaries. South America and Africa: Portuguese and Italian. Europe: German, Swedish, Danish. Her classroom was a veritable United Nations of students. Just how she managed to teach a class filled with such a diverse mix of languages we never understood. There were many occasions where former students would walk up to her, call her by her name, then say something along the line,.. "You may not remember me but, you were my teacher." And they would thank her for helping them begin their life here in the United States.

Norma was recognized for her contributions as an outstanding teacher when she was given an academic grant by then King Juan Carlos I, to engage in post graduate studies in Spanish Literature at the Universidad de Madrid, in Spain.

Brigido, now retired, happily went along in support, and to do field research into the lives of extended family members in the mother country. Brigido passed away in 2014, and although she mourned the loss of her lifetime partner, she continued to fill her time long after she had retired. When she wasn't assisting her son in the law office, she was working in the garden with her daughter. Or, she was volunteering to teach English and life skills to newly arrived adult immigrants with the Salvation Army and other organizations where she would read translated portions of her youngest son's poems.

Norma left children; Joel Vera, Anabel Echazarreta, Ruth Vera, Dan Vera, Peter Montgomery and Albert Luna. She was also survived by her sister, Daisy Triana de Puig and a brother Roberto Triana. Norma also leaves a surrogate family of sorts. All of the young girls and boys, now older men and women, who she helped by bettering their lives through education. All in all, Norma led an incredibly full life. A life lived well. A life lived in service to others.

One church asked him to help remodel their facilities in order to host a "Cold Weather Shelter" for the homeless. He was instrumental in developing the manuals for basic home repairs to be used by adults and youth attending UM-ARMY church work camps as well as providing the organization with office and financial support during the first 10 years of its 42 years of service to the elderly, an organization started by he and Jeannie. Upon retirement he started "Honey-Do Handyman" as a hobby as well as a full-time job.

He and Jeannie loved to travel around the world and camp in the U.S., with a goal of seeing all the National Parks. He sought factory tours wherever they traveled, always wanting to know "how things work." Jeannie said he was her best friend and soulmate who always took very good care of her every need throughout their marriage.

He was a gentleman - quiet, intelligent, upbeat, humble, and funny. Newbern was an encourager and always wanted to know what was going on in the daily lives of others. He was a very good listener and truly cared for others. He loved teaching Sunday School and Bible studies and participating in the Walk to Emmaus. He remained a good and faithful servant of God, throughout his life, but especially as he battled Parkinson's Disease.

Whitey is, and will continue, to be missed by all who knew and loved him. Newbern Henry "Whitey" Whitehurst, III is preceded in death by his parents and his brother-in-law, Bobby Hooper; in-laws, Reverend J. Paul Brown & Virginia K.

In addition to wife, Rev. Jeannie Whitehurst, Whitey is survived by son, Rev. Dr. John Newbern Whitehurst, his wife Jana, and grandson Russell Newbern; and son, Thomas "Tom" Scott Whitehurst, his wife Sabrina, and granddaughters Justice, Jasmine, Thailia, and Makayla; sister, Lynne Hooper; sister-in-law, Ruth Brown; and numerous nieces and nephews.

A Graveside Funeral was held Tuesday, May 10, 2022, at Memorial Oaks Cemetery in Houston, Texas, with Rev. Paitti Miller officiating. A Memorial Service was held Saturday, June 25, 2022, in Austin, Texas, at Bee Creek UMC in Spicewood, Texas, with Rev. Ray Kiser officiating.

11 **STRUCTURE AND AGENCIES**

12 **Uniting Table**

13 1. There shall be a Uniting Table whose function is to coordinate mission and ministry in the Río
 14 Texas Conference through the four Vision Teams focused on the four pillars of the conference
 15 Vision: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, and Transforming
 16 Communities. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams are responsible for focusing on the
 17 Mission Field. The membership of the Uniting Table shall be: the Bishop (ex officio without vote);
 18 the dean of the cabinet; the lay leader; the chairpersons of the Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing
 19 Congregations, Developing Leaders and Transforming Communities Vision Teams; the
 20 chairperson or a representative of each administrative agency in Rule #6; one representative
 21 each from the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on the Episcopacy, and the Council on
 22 Children's Ministries; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the
 23 Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; and the chairperson. There shall
 24 also be seven (7) members at large and a Mission Field Advocate, nominated by the Committee
 25 on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. All references in the Book of Discipline
 26 to a conference council on ministries will be fulfilled by the Uniting Table. The Uniting Table is
 27 accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

28 a. There shall be a Mission Field Advocate whose responsibility is to help the Uniting Table
 29 and the Vision Teams remain focused on the mission field by advocating for the people who
 30 are not in our churches, including those who are in poverty, those who are young, those who
 31 are marginalized, and those who are disempowered by our culture and society.

32 b. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams will be expected to recruit and engage lay
 33 and clergy persons across the conference to serve on task forces to assist in their
 34 responsibilities.

35 c. Each Vision Team will have funding through the Annual Conference budget. Meetings of
 36 the Team will be funded through the amount budgeted to that Team. Appointed task forces
 37 also will be funded through the amount provided in the Annual Conference budget assigned to
 38 that Team.

39 d. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference shall elect, the
 40 chairpersons of the Uniting Table and each of the four Vision Teams. None of these
 41 chairpersons shall have any other specific ministry responsibilities on the Uniting Table or any
 42 of the Vision Teams, nor shall they be chairperson of any other conference agency.

43 e. The Constitutions for United Methodist Women (§ 647) and United Methodist Men (§ 648)
 44 are included in

1 the 2016 Book of Discipline. United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men are
 2 independent organizations which nominate and elect their own leaders. Each of these
 3 organizations is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various
 4 agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. United Methodist Women
 5 relates to the national organization of United Methodist Women. United Methodist Men relates
 6 to the General Commission on United Methodist Men.

Uniting Peoples Vision Team

10 2. There shall be a Uniting Peoples Vision Team whose function is to facilitate unity, witness,
 11 communication and justice, and to work toward intercultural competency in all areas of
 12 conference life. The membership of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team shall be: two persons
 13 whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, two persons
 14 whose specific responsibility is Religion and Race, two persons whose specific responsibility is
 15 the Status and Role of Women, two persons whose specific responsibility is Communications,
 16 two persons whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, and a chairperson; all nominated
 17 by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The entire Vision
 18 Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The
 19 Uniting Peoples Vision Team relates to the Council of Bishops, the General Commission on
 20 Religion and Race, the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the
 21 Uniting Table. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual
 22 Conference.

23 a. There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships (the
 24 commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 642 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The
 25 membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference
 26 whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, plus all the
 27 other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Council of
 28 Bishops, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the
 29 Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 30 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

31 b. There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race (the commission) whose function is
 32 defined in ¶ 643 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be
 33 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Religion
 34 and Race, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission
 35 relates to the General Commission on Religion and Race, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision
 36 Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual
 37 Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

38 c. There shall be a Commission on the Status and Role of Women (the commission) whose
 39 function is defined in ¶ 644 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 40 commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 41 responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, plus all the other members of the Uniting
 42 Peoples Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women.
 43 The chairperson of this commission shall be a woman, and a majority of its members shall be
 44 women. The commission relates to the General Commission on the Status and Role of
 45 Women, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the
 46 Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 47 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

48 d. There shall be a Commission on Communications (the commission) whose function is
 49 defined in ¶ 646 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be
 50 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
 51 Communications, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The
 52 commission relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to
 53 the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the
 54 Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

55 e. There shall be a Committee on Disability Concerns (the committee) whose function is
 56 defined in ¶ 653 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be

1 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Disability
 2 Concerns, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. Membership shall
 3 include persons with physical disabilities and persons with mental disabilities. The committee
 4 relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Uniting
 5 Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting
 6 Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

 8 **Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team**

9 3. There shall be a Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team whose function is to discern, develop
 10 and deploy
 11 resources pertinent to the fulfillment of the mission and purpose of the local church, and to
 12 support the restoring of vitality to the local church. The membership of the Vitalizing
 13 Congregations Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Discipleship,
 14 two persons whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development & Revitalization, two
 15 persons whose specific responsibility is Ethnic Local Church Concerns, two persons whose
 16 specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, two persons whose specific
 17 responsibility is the Small Membership Church, two persons whose specific responsibility is New
 18 Church Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is Children's Ministries, two
 19 persons whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, two persons whose specific
 20 responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on
 21 Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents
 22 or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council,
 23 and the Young Adult Ministry Council. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each
 24 of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team
 25 relates to the General Board of Discipleship, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the
 26 Uniting Table. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the
 27 Annual Conference.

28
 29 a. There shall be a Board of Discipleship (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 630 of the
 30 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by
 31 the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, plus all the other
 32 members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board relates to the General
 33 Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board is
 34 accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and
 35 is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

36 b. There shall be a Committee on Congregational Development and Revitalization (the
 37 committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5e of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The
 38 membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference
 39 whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development and Revitalization, plus all the
 40 other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the
 41 General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
 42 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
 43 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 44 budget.

45 c. There shall be a Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns (the committee) whose
 46 function is defined in ¶ 632 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee
 47 shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
 48 Ethnic Local Church Concerns, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations
 49 Vision Team. The committee relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
 50 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
 51 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 52 budget.

53 d. There shall be a Committee on Parish and Community Development (the committee)
 54 whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 55 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 56 responsibility is Parish and Community Development, plus all the other members of the

1 Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global
2 Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to
3 the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
4 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

5 e. There shall be a Commission on the Small Membership Church (the commission) whose
6 function is defined in ¶ 645 and ¶ 633.5i of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of
7 the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
8 responsibility is the Small Membership Church, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing
9 Congregations Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Board of Global
10 Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The commission is accountable to
11 the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
12 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

13 f. There shall be a Committee on New Church Development (the committee) whose function
14 is defined in ¶ 633.5e-h and ¶ 630.3 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
15 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
16 responsibility is New Church Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing
17 Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries,
18 the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The
19 committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual
20 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
21 budget.

22 g. There shall be a Council on Children's Ministries (the council) whose function is to plan,
23 vision and advocate for children within the conference. The membership of the council shall
24 be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
25 Children's Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team.
26 The council relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council is accountable
27 to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
28 through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

29 h. There shall be a Council on Older Adult Ministries (the council) whose function is defined in
30 ¶ 651 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the council shall be the two persons
31 elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, plus
32 all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the
33 General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council
34 is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference,
35 and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

36
37 i. There shall be a Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries (the committee) whose function is
38 defined in ¶ 655 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be
39 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is
40 Hispanic/Latino Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision
41 Team. At least one-third of the members shall be Hispanic/Latino persons. The committee is
42 accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and
43 is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

44 j. There shall be a Youth Ministries Council (the council), whose function is defined in ¶ 649 of
45 the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the
46 Council on Youth Ministries. The council will support, encourage and equip youth leaders in
47 the church. The council will consist of 3-5 youth from each district, and will represent the
48 diversity of the conference. No more than one-third of the members of the council will be
49 adults. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on
50 various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates
51 to the General Board of Discipleship's Division on Ministries with Young People. The council
52 is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations
53 Vision Team portion of the budget.

54 k. There shall be a Young Adult Ministry Council (the council) whose function is defined in
55 ¶ 650 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of
56 Discipline to the Council on Young Adult Ministries. The council will provide voice and support

1 for all young adults in the conference. The council will be a group of diverse young adults
 2 called to ministry and service as modeled by Jesus Christ. The council is represented by the
 3 president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference,
 4 including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's
 5 Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual
 6 Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the
 7 budget.

8 **Developing Leaders Vision Team**

9 4. There shall be a Developing Leaders Vision Team whose function is to call and equip both lay
 10 and clergy leaders for the mission field, and to especially encourage younger leaders. The
 11 membership of the Developing Leaders Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific
 12 responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and a chairperson; all nominated by the
 13 Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be
 14 the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth
 15 Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; two representatives from the Board of
 16 Ordained Ministry; the conference lay leader and the seven (7) district lay leaders. The entire
 17 Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members,
 18 unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. The Developing Leaders Vision Team
 19 relates to the General Board of Higher
 20 Education and Ministry and its Division of Higher Education, the General Board of Discipleship,
 21 and to the Uniting Table. The Developing Leaders Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by,
 22 the Annual Conference.

23 a. There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (the board) whose
 24 function is defined in ¶ 634 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall
 25 be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Higher
 26 Education and Campus Ministry, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision
 27 Team. The board relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and its
 28 Division of Higher Education, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board is
 29 accountable to the Developing Leaders Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is
 30 funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

31 b. There shall be a Board of Ordained Ministry (the board) whose function, membership and
 32 organization are defined in ¶ 635 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the board
 33 shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. The board shall
 34 relate to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. The board is accountable to
 35 and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision
 36 Team portion of the budget.

37 c. There shall be a Lay Leadership Team whose function is defined in ¶ 631 of the 2016 Book
 38 of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Board of Laity.
 39 The membership of the Lay Leadership Team shall be the conference lay leader as
 40 chairperson and the district lay leaders, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders
 41 Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is represented by one or more of its members on
 42 various agencies of the Annual Conference. The Lay Leadership Team relates to the General
 43 Board of Discipleship, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership
 44 Team is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the
 45 Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

46 **Transforming Communities Vision Team**

47 5. There shall be a Transforming Communities Vision Team whose function is to equip, educate
 48 and support congregations around the areas of mission and The Advance, specific ethnic
 49 concerns, and justice issues. The membership of the Transforming Communities Vision Team
 50 shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, two persons whose
 51 specific responsibility is Global Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Native
 52 American Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is The Advance Program, two
 53 persons whose specific responsibility is the Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, the Secretary
 54 of Global Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and
 55 elected by the Annual Conference. The Peace with Justice Coordinator shall also be a member.
 56

1 The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its
 2 members. The Transforming Communities Vision Team relates to the General Board of Church
 3 and Society, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Transforming
 4 Communities Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

5
 6 a. There shall be a Board of Church and Society (the board) whose function is defined in
 7 ¶ 629 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons
 8 elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, plus all
 9 the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, plus a member named by
 10 the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Church
 11 and Society, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to
 12 the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded
 13 through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget. The board shall
 14 name the Peace with Justice Coordinator.

15 b. There shall be a Board of Global Ministries (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 633
 16 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected
 17 by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, plus all the other
 18 members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, including the Secretary of Global
 19 Ministries, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board
 20 relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Transforming Communities Vision
 21 Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the
 22 Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team
 23 portion of the budget.

24 c. There shall be a Committee on Native American Ministries (the committee) whose function
 25 is defined in ¶ 654 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be
 26 the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Native
 27 American Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision
 28 Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee
 29 is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual
 30 Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the
 31 budget.

32 d. There shall be a Committee on The Advance (the committee) whose function is defined in
 33 ¶ 656 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two
 34 persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is The Advance, plus
 35 all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates
 36 to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the
 37 Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through
 38 the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.

39 e. There shall be a Committee on Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries (the committee)
 40 whose function is defined in ¶ 657 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the
 41 committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific
 42 responsibility is Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, plus all the other members of the
 43 Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming
 44 Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Transforming Communities
 45 Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming
 46 Communities Vision Team portion of the budget

47 **Administrative Agencies**

48 6. There shall be Administrative Agencies whose functions are to provide ongoing administrative
 49 support to the conference. Each of these functions will be carried out by a separate and
 50 independent agency whose members are nominated by the Committee on Nominations and
 51 elected by the Annual Conference, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of
 52 these agencies is directly accountable to the Annual Conference, reports to the Annual
 53 Conference, and is funded through the budget of the Annual Conference, unless otherwise
 54 specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies shall have one representative on the
 55 Uniting Table for support of the missional emphases of the Uniting Table and Vision Teams.

- 1 a. There shall be a Finance Table whose function is defined in ¶¶ 611-628 of the 2016 Book
2 of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on
3 Finance and Administration. The Finance Table will also fulfill all references in the Book of
4 Discipline to the Commission on Equitable Compensation, whose function is defined in ¶ 625
5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Finance Table.
6 The Finance Table relates to the General Council on Finance and Administration. There shall
7 also be a Personnel Committee to carry out those functions of the Finance Table in ¶ 613.13
8 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be four (4) members of the Personnel Committee
9 plus a representative of the Finance Table and a district superintendent.
- 10 b. There shall be a Board of Trustees whose function is defined in ¶ 2512 of the 2016 Book of
11 Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Board of Trustees, who will be elected
12 in four classes of three members each. The first Board of Trustees will have three persons
13 elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2015, three persons
14 elected by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2016, three persons elected
15 by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2017, and three persons elected by
16 the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2018. The members of the Board
17 of Trustees are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas
18 Conference Board of Trustees corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the
19 Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation.
- 20
- 21 c. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules whose function is to oversee the rules of
22 the Annual Conference, as permitted in ¶ 604.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be
23 six (6) members of the Committee on Standing Rules.
- 24 d. There shall be an Agenda and Worship Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 605.2 of
25 the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the Agenda and Worship Committee shall be
26 the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; the
27 presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry
28 Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; the conference treasurer;
29 the conference secretary; the chairperson of the Uniting Table; and a Worship Team
30 Coordinator recruited by the committee.
- 31 e. There shall be a Committee on the Episcopacy whose function is defined in ¶ 637 of the
32 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Committee on the
33 Episcopacy.
- 34 f. There shall be an Episcopal Residence Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 638 of the
35 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Episcopal Residence
36 Committee.
- 37 g. There shall be a Board of Pensions whose function is defined in ¶ 639 of the 2016 Book of
38 Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Board of Pensions who will serve
39 eight-year staggered terms, with four members being elected every other year. The first
40 Board of Pensions will have four persons whose terms end in June 2016, four persons whose
41 terms end in June 2018, four persons whose terms end in June 2020, and four persons
42 whose terms end in June 2022 in order to establish the staggered terms. The 2014
43 conferences will each elect two persons for each class to make up the first Board of
44 Pensions. The members of the Board of Pensions are also members of the Board of
45 Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Pensions corporation, and
46 their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that
47 corporation. The Board of Pensions relates to the General Board of Pensions and Health
48 Benefits.
- 49
- 50 h. There shall be a Commission on Archives and History whose function is defined in ¶ 641 of
51 the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be eight (8) members of the Commission on Archives
52 and History. The Commission on Archives and History relates to the General Commission on
53 Archives and History.
- 54 i. There shall be a Committee on Nominations (the committee) whose function is to identify
55 nominees for each elected leadership position for which the Book of Discipline does not
56 specify another method of nomination. The members of the committee shall be the Bishop

1 and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; one person from
 2 each parent conference representing United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the
 3 Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; and
 4 six (6) at large members nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the
 5 Annual Conference to ensure equal representation on the committee from each of the parent
 6 conferences. At least through 2024 the Committee on Nominations will consist of an equal
 7 number of members from each of the parent conferences.

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 10 7. There shall be an Administrative Review Committee (the committee) whose function and
 11 membership are defined in ¶ 636 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be three (3)
 12 members of the committee and two (2) alternates, nominated by the Bishop and elected by the
 13 clergy session of the Annual Conference. The committee is accountable to the clergy session of
 14 the Annual Conference.

15 **Applying to All Agencies**

16 8. The Committee on Nominations shall work toward the goals of inclusiveness as set forth in
 17 ¶ 610.5 in the 2016 Book of Discipline which states: "...special attention shall be given to the
 18 inclusion of clergywomen, youth (¶ 256.3), young adults, older adults, persons from churches with
 19 small memberships, people with disabilities, and racial and ethnic persons, in keeping with
 20 policies for general Church agencies. It is further recommended that the membership of such
 21 agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry, include one-third clergy, one-third
 22 laywomen, and one-third laymen, who are professing members of local churches." The
 23 Committee on Nominations shall also strive for equal representation from the districts; and, to the
 24 extent possible, the diversity of those nominated should reflect the diversity of the Mission Field.
 25 It will be important at least through 2020 that both the parent conferences be equally represented
 26 on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Pensions, and that both be well represented on the
 27 Uniting Table and the Vision Teams.

28 9. The term of membership in any conference agency is quadrennial, except where the Book of
 29 Discipline stipulates otherwise. The maximum that a person can serve in an agency is two full
 30 terms, except where the
 31 Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise, or when he/she is filling a vacancy during the
 32 quadrennium. Filling a vacancy of an unexpired term of more than two years is considered to be
 33 a full term and shall count the same as four years.

34 10. Any elected position on a conference agency which is vacant at the end of the Annual
 35 Conference session or which becomes vacant during the conference year may be filled by the
 36 Committee on Nominations, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline.

37 11. Ex-officio members of an agency, including members of General and Jurisdictional Agencies
 38 who reside within the bounds of the conference, are in addition to the agency members named
 39 above.

40 12. Chairpersons of conference agencies should be sensitive to the work schedules of laity when
 41 setting meetings.

42 13. When a person is absent without notice from two consecutive conference agency meetings
 43 of which he/she is a member, such person shall be considered to have resigned such
 44 membership, and the Committee on Nominations shall be notified that another person can be
 45 nominated for the remainder of the term.

46 14. No district superintendent or conference staff person shall be eligible to serve as an elective
 47 member of any conference agency. If a member at the time of appointment or hire, he/she shall
 48 be considered to have resigned such membership.

49 **Conference Staff and Resources**

50 15. There shall be an Administrative Services Center whose function is to manage the financial
 51 resources of the conference, and to develop alternative sources of funding for the conference.
 52 The Administrative Services Center will encourage collaboration and partnership among all
 53 program, administrative and financial entities of the conference. The Administrative Services
 54 Center relates to and supports the work of the Finance Table and the Commission on Equitable
 55
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1 Compensation, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, the conference treasurer, and the
 2 office of New Resource Development, as well as the other non-program agencies as needed.
 3 The Administrative Services Center shall be accountable to the Finance Table and to the Annual
 4 Conference, and shall be funded by the Annual Conference. There shall be a director or
 5 equivalent position to oversee the functions of the Administrative Services Center, filled by
 6 appointment or otherwise at the Bishop's discretion.

7 16. There shall be an Assistant to the Episcopal Office who will provide assistance with the
 8 administrative tasks of the Episcopal Office. This position may be filled, by appointment or
 9 otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

10 17. There shall be Directors who assist and coordinate with the ministries of the Vision Teams as
 11 determined by the Personnel Committee in consultation with the Bishop. These positions may be
 12 filled, by appointment or otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

13 **MEMBERSHIP OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

14 18. The lay membership of the Annual Conference shall be:

15 **Lay Members Defined by the Book of Discipline**

- 16 a. A professing member elected by each charge, as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book
 17 of Discipline;
- 18 b. An additional lay member assigned to each charge for each additional clergy member who
 19 is appointed to the charge as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;
- 20 c. Diaconal ministers, active deaconesses, home missionaries under episcopal appointment
 21 within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the conference president of United Methodist
 22 Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district
 23 lay leaders, the conference director of lay servant ministries, conference secretary of global
 24 ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult
 25 organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the Annual
 26 Conference college student organization, one young person between the ages of twelve (12)
 27 and seventeen (17) and one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30)
 28 from each district to be selected in such a manner as may be determined by the Annual
 29 Conference, as provided in ¶ 602.4 and ¶ 32 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;

30 (The method for selecting the youth, college and young adult representatives to
 31 Annual Conference will be as follows: the conference youth organization will
 32 select one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17)
 33 from each district; the conference young adult organization will select one young
 34 person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district. In
 35 the absence of a college student organization, the Board of Higher Education
 36 and Campus Ministry will select the college student to serve as a Lay Member of
 37 the Annual Conference. Each of the agencies is responsible for providing the
 38 names and contact information for these persons to the conference secretary no
 39 later than January 15 each year.)
 40

41 **Lay Members Defined by Annual Conference**

- 42 d. An additional lay member assigned to each church that does not have a lay member as
 43 provided for in 18a and 18b above; and
- 44 e. Other members as defined by the Annual Conference to include: an additional
 45 representative of the executive committees of the conference organizations of United
 46 Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, youth, and young adults; the president and one
 47 additional representative of the executive committees of the district organizations of United
 48 Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, youth, and young adults; the chancellor, the
 49 conference emmaus lay director (if any), the conference scouting coordinator (if any),
 50 conference associate lay leaders (if any), conference elected executive personnel (if any), the
 51 chairperson of any conference agency or standing committee that reports directly to the
 52 Annual Conference; lay members of the Uniting Table and Finance Table; and one lay
 53 member for each unchartered new church start elected by the district in which the new church
 54 start is located.
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f. Additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy membership shall be assigned to each district based upon district membership. The conference secretary shall notify each district superintendent of the number of additional lay members to be elected no later than sixty (60) days following Annual Conference. Each district will determine the method of election.

g. Through 2024 the additional lay members elected shall include members of both parent conferences.

h. At least 10% of these additional lay members shall be age 30 or under at the time of election.

19. In accordance with ¶ 659 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, the District Conferences will be composed of all members of Annual Conference as set forth in the Standing Rules who are related to churches within the bounds of their respective districts and currently elected to office. In addition, it shall include the chairperson of each district agency.

CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

20. Proposals and reports from conference agencies shall be compiled in a Pre-Conference Report that shall be made available as an electronic document or in printed form to all conference members at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Conference session. Each report shall be marked "For Conference Action" or "For Information Only."

21. The Annual Conference shall make available English and Spanish editions of all official correspondence, including but not limited to the contents of the Pre-Conference Report and the Conference Journal. The Annual Conference shall also provide oral translation between Spanish and English, and support for hearing and vision impaired persons, during the sessions of the Annual Conference.

22. Resolutions shall reach the floor of the conference only after consideration and action of the appropriate conference agency.

23. The conference procedures will be governed by the following in order of precedence: the Book of Discipline, the Standing Rules, any special rules adopted by the Annual Conference, and the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.

24. The conference secretary shall establish the bar of the conference. The conference secretary shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, the persons needed to assist in the proceedings of the conference. These include the timekeeper, tellers, associate secretaries, and the minutes committee.

25. Speakers should identify themselves, giving their name and church, and whether they are a clergy or lay member of the conference.

26. Each speech from the floor for or against a motion will be limited to three minutes. The timekeeper will inform the Bishop when the time has expired.

27. Consent Agenda 1 consists of reports from conference agencies which are not for action, but are "For Information Only." The conference acts only to receive these reports and print them in the journal. Consent Agenda 2 consists of action reports about which there is believed to be little or no dissent. The items included in Consent Agenda 2 are determined by a task force composed of members of the Agenda and Worship Committee. Any member of the Annual Conference may move the deletion of any of the items from Consent Agendas. With a second, and a one-minute explanation by the maker of the motion, it will be voted on by the conference without debate. If 20% of the members vote that the item be removed, it will be removed and brought to the floor as a non-consent item at a time to be determined by the Agenda and Worship Committee.

28. The Committee on Standing Rules shall report to the Annual Conference during the first business session of each Annual Conference. Revisions or amendments must be adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference, and become effective immediately upon their adoption, unless otherwise stated in the enabling legislation. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference.

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29. The preliminary report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented early in the agenda of the Annual Conference proceedings, including the process for nominations from the floor. The final report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented and acted upon at a later session of that Annual Conference.

30. Any report or resolution requiring action of the conference must be in the hands of the conference secretary early enough to allow for printing and distribution to the conference twenty-four (24) hours before the report is considered by the conference. Motions made from the floor must be presented in writing to the presiding officer and the conference secretary at the time the motion is made.

31. The conference lay leader will chair the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesies, and will be responsible for appointing additional persons to assist in preparation of the report.

32. The only materials that are allowed to be placed on the tables of the conference floor are those official materials distributed by the conference secretary and his/her staff.

33. The minutes shall be available online no later than sixty days after the closing of the Annual Conference session.

OTHER

34. The Local Church Report to the Annual Conference (Annual Statistical Report) required by the general church will be completed and filed with the conference no later than January 30, as stated in ¶ 606.7 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. This can be done using the method determined by the conference statistician to be the easiest and most effective manner.

35. There will be a Policy Manual containing policies adopted by the Annual Conference. Changes in these policies must be approved by the Annual Conference. The conference secretary will make these available as an electronic document and in printed form.

36. Any minister of the Annual Conference who conducts the funeral or memorial service of a fellow minister or a minister's spouse shall provide the conference secretary with a memorial for that person within one month, in accordance with the Guidelines on Memoirs to be furnished by the conference secretary.
