

HISTORICAL SESSIONS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCES

Rio Grande Conference

El ministerio de La Iglesia Metodista Unida a través de la Conferencia Río Grande, tuvo sus precursores ya desde 1815, tanto en ministros de las fronteras como en los Colportores de las Sociedades Bíblicas y en algunas de las comunidades de fe de los Colonos de Texas. Los esfuerzos ya más instituidos, empero, trazan su historial a dos de los ramos del metodismo: La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal y La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal del Sur.

La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal principia en 1850 con nombramientos a Nuevo México, a través de la Conferencia de Oregón y California y de la Sociedad Misionera, y posteriormente, a través de varias otras Conferencias. Estos primeros esfuerzos, si bien terminan en 1856, darán como fruto una Misión en Peralta. Dicha Misión continuaría por sí misma, bajo liderazgo fiel de algunos laicos, hasta 1871 que es cuando se prosigue ya en forma de un Distrito parte de la Conferencia de Colorado. En 1876 este Distrito, bilingüe por cierto, se constituye en la Misión de Nuevo México la cual continúa siendo parte, hasta 1884, de la Conferencia de Colorado. La obra toma nuevo curso, manteniendo aún su relación con la Conferencia de Colorado hasta 1891, pero reorganizándose en 1885 para dar lugar a la Misión Española de Nuevo México la cual posteriormente, al verse fortalecida se convierte, en 1892, en Conferencia Misionera Española de Nuevo México. En 1915 y hasta 1924, las obras de habla española y habla inglesa se vuelven a unir, formándose la bilingüe Conferencia de Nuevo México. En 1924 otra reorganización se hace necesaria y de ella nos viene la Misión Española del Suroeste la cual, en 1932, se hace Misión Latino Americana, continuando así hasta 1936. Finalmente, de 1937 a 1939, la obra se organiza como Misión de Nuevo México. Durante este periodo la mayoría de los obreros mantienen su membresía clerical en la Conferencia de Nuevo México de 1924 a 1927, en la Conferencia Misionera de Nuevo México en 1928 y en varias otras Conferencias, hasta la unificación de los metodismos de 1939.

La Iglesia Metodista Episcopal del Sur, por su parte, principia en 1859 con nombramientos a El Paso y a San Antonio, a través de la Conferencia Misionera del Río Grande, los que durarían uno y dos años respectivamente. En 1871 se reanudan los esfuerzos con un nombramiento a Corpus Christi, a través de la Conferencia del Oeste de Texas, que da como fruto un Distrito. La obra crece y en 1885 se establece como Conferencia Fronteriza Misionera Mexicana. En 1890 dicha Conferencia se divide en dos, naciendo la Conferencia Noroeste Misionera Mexicana. En los años 1914-1915 se da la primera reorganización en base a obra en Estados Unidos y obra en México, por lo que se forma la Misión Mexicana de Texas en 1914 y al Conferencia Fronteriza Mexicana en 1915. La Misión Mexicana de Texas, sin embargo, mantiene la mayoría de su membresía clerical en México en la Conferencia Fronteriza Misionera Mexicana en 1914 y en la Conferencia Fronteriza Mexicana hasta 1918. Por otro lado, en 1918 se da la reorganización de la obra occidental y se forma, con ello, la Conferencia Mexicana y la Misión Mexicana del Occidente Es así que a partir de 1918 y hasta 1930 la Misión Mexicana de Texas y la Misión Mexicana del Occidente mantiene la mayoría de su membresía clerical en la Conferencia Mexicana. En 1930 se da la separación definitiva de la obra mexicana y estadounidense y ambas Misiones pasan a ser Conferencia Mexicana de Texas y Conferencia Mexicana del Occidente, respectivamente, continuando así hasta la mencionada unificación del 1939.

En 1939, con la formación de La Iglesia Metodista, se dio también la unificación de la Misión de Nuevo México, la Conferencia Mexicana de Texas y la Conferencia Mexicana del Occidente, formándose la Conferencia Mexicana del Suroeste, la cual cambia de nombre en 1947 a Conferencia del Río Grande.

El Primero de Enero del 2015, La Conferencia Río Grande de la Iglesia Unida Metodista y La Conferencia Southwest Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida se unificaron para formar un sola conferencia; La Conferencia Rio Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

SOUTHWEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

The History of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference began in 1858, when the Rio Grande Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South was organized. This became the Rio Grande Annual Conference in 1864, and the name was changed to the West Texas Conference in 1866. In 1918, the German Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South (all except three charges in East Bernard and Houston) merged with the West Texas Conference. The German Mission Conference had been organized in 1874, when the German Charges, which had been at one time or another in the Louisiana, Texas and Rio Grande Conference, were organized into a Conference.

In 1874, the Southern German Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized, and this became the Southern Conference (German) in 1918. The Gulf Mission, which held its first session in 1893, became the Gulf Mission Conference in 1897, and the Gulf Annual Conference in 1904. In 1912, the Southern Swedish Mission Conference was organized. In 1926, the three Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Gulf Annual Conference, the Southern Swedish Mission Conference, and the Southern Conference (German), were united in the Southern Conference.

In 1939, the Southwest Texas Conference boundaries were established and all of the charges of the former West Texas Conference and of the Southern Conference within its boundaries were united into the Southwest Texas Conference.

On May 27, 1970, a certain portion of the West Texas Conference of the former Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church and the Southwest Texas Conference merged into one new conference now know as the Southwest Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church.

On January 1, 2015, The Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church and The Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church unified into one conference to become The Rio Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church.

FIRST PLENARY SESSION

Welcome

Call to Order: Bishop Robert Schnase presiding. Music provided by Rev. Colleen Haley. Theme "Even So It is Well with My Soul."

Conference opens with Remembrance of Baptism Service at 8:00 am. Scripture Reading Isaiah 61:1-4; read in Spanish by Rev. Robert Ortiz and in English by Rev. Janet Larson. Bishop Robert Schnase introduces a series of videos sharing reflections of experiences during these past few months: "What is breaking your heart and what gives you hope". (Gabriela Lopez, Stan Whites, Robert Elizondo and Pamela Benson Owens). Music provided by Simpson UMC, Valley Praise UMC and Alamo Heights UMC.

Bishop Robert Schnase welcomes all attendees to the first virtual Rio Texas Annual Conference.

Introductions

Bishop Schnase outlines the processes for conducting the Plenary Sessions of the 2020 Rio Texas Annual Conference Special Called Session: Rio Texas Standing Rules, Robert's Rules of Order and the 2016 United Methodist Book of Discipline. Can business be conducted online even though Rio Texas Conference Standing Rules do not explicitly mention it? The legal counsel of the General Council on Finance & Administration and the National Association of Chancellors have agreed that this is in order. To assure that we comply with State law, the actions taken at this Special Session will be confirmed at the next in-person physical gathering of the Rio Texas Annual Conference by the adoption of a statement of affirmation.

Bishop Schnase calls the virtual Special Session to order. He invites Rev. Mickey McCandless, Conference Secretary, to present the organization of the Conference. Jozlin Parker, Director of Communications and Technical Ministries, shares how the Conference will be conducted electronically, how to be recognized for questions, the voting process and a test vote takes place.

Bishop's Message

Bishop Robert Schnase lifts up three challenges that those in the Rio Texas Conference have faced together this year as United Methodists: the pandemic; the urgency to address systemic racism in all aspects of our society including in our churches and our conference; the postponement of General Conference and how this has delayed resolution about the future of our denomination.

It has never been more important to offer witness to the power of God's grace than now. The persistence of God's love, the unceasing quality of God's call for justice and for peace. Bishop Schnase prays

that this will become a season of constructive discomfort for the Rio Texas Conference. This is a time to follow Christ into those difficult places. This is the work of the Holy Spirit nudging us. This is a season for each of us to ask ourselves: What kind of disciple of Christ will I be? What kind of a church are we? What witness will we bear? Where will we find the courage and the energy to remain faithful? We will find that courage and that hope because on the other side of the cross is the resurrection.

Just as we see the resilience of our churches, we continue to see signs of new life, new ways to offer our best and our highest to a world that is hurting and stands in need of healing. We rely not on our own strength but on the promise revealed to us in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Life is worth living; people are worth loving; and God is worth trusting even in these difficult times. This is a time to pour into the task with every ounce of energy that we have to stay in relationship with the one who said, "I came that they might have life and have it abundantly." Jesus said, "Come to me, all of you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me for I am gentle and humble of heart and you will find rest for your souls." We face significant challenges, even so, it is well with my soul.

Lay Leader Message

Conference Lay Leader Ralph Thompson, Grape Creek UMC, San Angelo, addresses the Annual Conference.

Establishing the Bar, Organization of the Conference and Adoption of the Agenda

Rev. Mickey McCandless, Conference Secretary, explains that those who were named and elected by their churches or districts are credentialed to vote as delegates using Election Buddy. Normally delegate names are due in the conference office by February. This year as conference was postponed, delays and changes have been accommodated through mid-September, giving us time to enter the information into the system and send out the proper links. That credential system is what allows us to have an effective voting system with links provided only to delegates.

Jozlin Parker states that Ralph Thompson's address was cut short; the full address will be posted on the website.

Several practice votes take place through Election Buddy. It is decided that Zoom Polling will be used instead of Election Buddy. A Zoom practice poll is launched.

Report on the Postponed 2020 General Conference

Rio Texas General Conference Delegates Rev. Laura Merrill, Assistant to the Bishop; Mr. Jay Brim, Conference Chancellor; Rev. James Amerson, Senior Pastor of St. Paul UMC, San Antonio; and Ms. Rachel Wright, member of Tarrytown UMC, report on the postponed General Conference. General Conference was scheduled to take place in May of 2020; it was postponed and is now scheduled to take place. August 29

through September 7, 2021 in Minneapolis, MN. The work of the postponed General Conference will be the same as it was before it was postponed. This includes consideration of the agreement called the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation. General Conference is a global gathering. There are many considerations for a global gathering that need to be resolved including travel access, Internet access, and time zones. The Commission on General Conference is looking at options for meeting in ways that will allow the business of the church to go forward even in the midst of this pandemic. Jurisdictional Conference is scheduled for November 10 through 12, 2021 in The Woodlands, TX. Three bishops who would have retired in 2020 have been extended to the next Jurisdictional Conference meeting.

Rev. Laura Merrill sums up requesting prayers for the delegation and for the church; prayer for the church to act in ways that put our hands and our feet and our hearts into action. That is the commitment of the delegation to the Rio Texas Conference.

Report of Standing Rules

Bishop Schnase introduces Mrs. Barbara Mobley, Chair of the Committee on Standing Rules, member of First UMC in Portland. Mrs. Mobley presents two changes to the Standing Rules. The first change is eliminating all references to the Administration Team and instead having each of those persons who were a part of the Administration Team listed in Rule 6, be members of the Uniting Table. The second change involves further simplifying the section of the Standing Rules on the conference staff and resources. This allows flexibility to develop creative ministry in this continually changing environment. It also eliminates the need for a change in Standing Rules every time conference leadership positions change in order to support our mission. Motion is brought to the floor by Mrs. Mobley on behalf of the Committee on Standing Rules to adopt Report II as amended in the Pre-Conference Report. **VOTE Results: Approved by poll**

Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry

Bishop Schnase introduces Rev. Adam Knight, Chair of Board of Ordained Ministry, Senior Pastor of Coker UMC, San Antonio. The Administration Team has no function which cannot be done within the Uniting Table structure.

The second change involves further simplification of the Conference Staff and Resources section by eliminating Rule #15, re-numbering Rules #16 and #17, and adding Rule #17. Rationale: This allows the flexibility needed to develop creative ministry in an ever-changing environment, and eliminates the need for a change to the Standing Rules every time the conference leadership positions change to support our mission.

REPORT II STANDING RULES FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

The **Mission** of the Río Texas Conference: to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The **Vision** of the Río Texas Conference: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, Transforming Communities.

STRUCTURE AND AGENCIES

Uniting Table

- 1. There shall be a Uniting Table whose function is to coordinate mission and ministry in the Río Texas Conference through the four Vision Teams focused on the four pillars of the conference Vision: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, and Transforming Communities. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams are responsible for focusing on the Mission Field. The membership of the Uniting Table shall be: the Bishop (ex officio without vote); the dean of the cabinet; the lay leader; the chairpersons of the Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders and Transforming Communities Vision Teams; the chairperson of the Administration Team or a representative of each administrative agency in Rule #6; one representative each from the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on the Episcopacy, and the Council on Children's Ministries; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; and the chairperson. There shall also be seven (7) members at large and a Mission Field Advocate, nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. All references in the Book of Discipline to a conference council on ministries will be fulfilled by the Uniting Table. The Uniting Table is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
- a. There shall be a Mission Field Advocate whose responsibility is to help the Uniting Table and the Vision Teams remain focused on the mission field by advocating for the people who are not in our churches, including those who are in poverty, those who are young, those who are marginalized, and those who are disempowered by our culture and society.
- b. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams will be expected to recruit and engage lay and clergy persons across the conference to serve on task forces to assist in their responsibilities.
- c. Each Vision Team will have funding through the Annual Conference budget. Meetings of the Team will be funded through the amount budgeted to that Team. Appointed task forces also will be funded through the amount provided in the Annual Conference budget assigned to that Team.
- d. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference shall elect, the chairpersons of the Uniting Table and each of the four Vision Teams, and the Administration Team. None of these chairpersons shall have any other specific ministry responsibilities on the Uniting Table or any of the Vision Teams, nor shall they be chairperson of any other conference agency.
- e. The Constitutions for United Methodist Women (¶ 647) and United Methodist Men (¶ 648) are included in the 2016 Book of Discipline. United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men are independent organizations which nominate and elect their own leaders. Each of these organizations is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. United Methodist Women relates to the national organization of United Methodist Women. United Methodist Men relates to the General Commission on United Methodist Men.

Uniting Peoples Vision Team

2. There shall be a Uniting Peoples Vision Team whose function is to facilitate unity, witness, communication and justice, and to work toward intercultural competency in all areas of conference life. The membership of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, two persons whose specific responsibility is

Religion and Race, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, two persons whose specific responsibility is Communications, two persons whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team relates to the Council of Bishops, the General Commission on Religion and Race, the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the Uniting Table. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

- a. There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 642 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Council of Bishops, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 643 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Religion and Race, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Commission on Religion and Race, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Commission on the Status and Role of Women (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 644 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The chairperson of this commission shall be a woman, and a majority of its members shall be women. The commission relates to the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- d. There shall be a Commission on Communications (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 646 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Communications, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Disability Concerns (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 653 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. Membership shall include persons with physical disabilities and persons with mental disabilities. The committee relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team

- 3. There shall be a Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team whose function is to discern, develop and deploy resources pertinent to the fulfillment of the mission and purpose of the local church, and to support the restoring of vitality to the local church. The membership of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, two persons whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development & Revitalization, two persons whose specific responsibility is Ethnic Local Church Concerns, two persons whose specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Small Membership Church, two persons whose specific responsibility is New Church Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is Children's Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team relates to the General Board of Discipleship, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
- a. There shall be a Board of Discipleship (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 630 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Committee on Congregational Development and Revitalization (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5e of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development and Revitalization, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 632 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific

responsibility is Ethnic Local Church Concerns, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

- d. There shall be a Committee on Parish and Community Development (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Commission on the Small Membership Church (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 645 and ¶ 633.5i of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is the Small Membership Church, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- f. There shall be a Committee on New Church Development (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5e-h and ¶ 630.3 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is New Church Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- g. There shall be a Council on Children's Ministries (the council) whose function is to plan, vision and advocate for children within the conference. The membership of the council shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Children's Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- h. There shall be a Council on Older Adult Ministries (the council) whose function is defined in ¶ 651 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the council shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- i. There shall be a Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 655 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. At least one-third of the members shall be Hispanic/Latino persons. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- j. There shall be a Youth Ministries Council (the council), whose function is defined in ¶ 649 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Youth Ministries. The council will support, encourage and equip youth leaders in the church. The council will consist of 3-5 youth from each district, and will represent the diversity of the conference. No more than one-third of the members of the council will be adults. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- k. There shall be a Young Adult Ministry Council (the council) whose function is defined in ¶ 650 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Young Adult Ministries. The council will provide voice and support for all young adults in the conference. The council will be a group of diverse young adults called to ministry and service as modeled by Jesus Christ. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

Developing Leaders Vision Team

4. There shall be a Developing Leaders Vision Team whose function is to call and equip both lay and clergy leaders for the mission field, and to especially encourage younger leaders. The membership of the Developing Leaders Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; two representatives from the Board of Ordained Ministry; the conference lay leader and the seven (7) district lay leaders. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. The Developing Leaders Vision Team relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry and its Division of Higher Education, the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Uniting Table. The Developing Leaders Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

- a. There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 634 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and its Division of Higher Education, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Developing Leaders Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Board of Ordained Ministry (the board) whose function, membership and organization are defined in ¶ 635 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the board shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. The board shall relate to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. The board is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Lay Leadership Team whose function is defined in ¶ 631 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Board of Laity. The membership of the Lay Leadership Team shall be the conference lay leader as chairperson and the district lay leaders, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is represented by one or more of its members on various agencies of the Annual Conference. The Lay Leadership Team relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

TRANSFORMING COMMUNITIES VISION TEAM

- 5. There shall be a Transforming Communities Vision Team whose function is to equip, educate and support congregations around the areas of mission and The Advance, specific ethnic concerns, and justice issues. The membership of the Transforming Communities Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, two persons whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Native American Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is The Advance Program, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, the Secretary of Global Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Peace with Justice Coordinator shall also be a member. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Transforming Communities Vision Team relates to the General Board of Church and Society, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Transforming Communities Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
- a. There shall be a Board of Church and Society (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 629 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Church and Society, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget. The board shall name the Peace with Justice Coordinator.
- b. There shall be a Board of Global Ministries (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 633 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, including the Secretary of Global Ministries, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Committee on Native American Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 654 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Native American Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.
- d. There shall be a Committee on The Advance (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 656 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is The Advance, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 657 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.

Administration Team Administrative Agencies

6. There shall be an Administration Team Administrative Agencies whose function is functions are to provide ongoing administrative support to the conference through the agencies represented among its members. The membership of the Administration Team shall be one representative each from the Finance Table, the Board of Trustees, the Committee on Standing Rules, the Agenda and Worship Committee, the Committee on the Episcopacy, the Episcopal Residence Committee, the Board of Pensions, the Commission on Archives and History, and the Committee on Nominations, plus a chairperson. Each of these functions will be carried out by a separate and independent agency whose members are nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference,

unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies is directly accountable to the Annual Conference, reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the budget of the Annual Conference, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies shall have one representative on the Uniting Table for support of the missional emphases of the Uniting Table and Vision Teams.

- a. There shall be a Finance Table whose function is defined in ¶¶ 611-628 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Finance and Administration. The Finance Table will also fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Commission on Equitable Compensation, whose function is defined in ¶ 625 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Finance Table. The Finance Table relates to the General Council on Finance and Administration. There shall also be a Personnel Committee to carry out those functions of the Finance Table in ¶ 613.13 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be four (4) members of the Personnel Committee plus a representative of the Finance Table and a district superintendent.
- b. There shall be a Board of Trustees whose function is defined in ¶ 2512 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Board of Trustees, who will be elected in four classes of three members each. The first Board of Trustees will have three persons elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2015, three persons elected by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2016, three persons elected by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2017, and three persons elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2018. The members of the Board of Trustees are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Trustees corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation.
- c. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules whose function is to oversee the rules of the Annual Conference, as permitted in ¶ 604.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Committee on Standing Rules
- d. There shall be an Agenda and Worship Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 605.2 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the Agenda and Worship Committee shall be the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; the conference treasurer; the conference secretary; the chairperson of the Uniting Table; and a Worship Team Coordinator recruited by the committee.
- e. There shall be a Committee on the Episcopacy whose function is defined in ¶ 637 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Committee on the Episcopacy.
- f. There shall be an Episcopal Residence Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 638 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Episcopal Residence Committee.
- g. There shall be a Board of Pensions whose function is defined in ¶ 639 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Board of Pensions who will serve eight-year staggered terms, with four members being elected every other year. The first Board of Pensions will have four persons whose terms end in June 2016, four persons whose terms end in June 2018, four persons whose terms end in June 2020, and four persons whose terms end in June 2022 in order to establish the staggered terms. The 2014 conferences will each elect two persons for each class to make up the first Board of Pensions. The members of the Board of Pensions are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Pensions corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation. The Board of Pensions relates to the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.
- h. There shall be a Commission on Archives and History whose function is defined in ¶ 641 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be eight (8) members of the Commission on Archives and History. The Commission on Archives and History relates to the General Commission on Archives and History and to the Uniting Table through the chairperson of the Administration Team.
- i. There shall be a Committee on Nominations (the committee) whose function is to identify nominees for each elected leadership position for which the Book of Discipline does not specify another method of nomination. The members of the committee shall be the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; one person from each parent conference representing United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; and six (6) at large members nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference to ensure equal representation on the committee from each of the parent conferences. At least through 2024 the Committee on Nominations will consist of an equal number of members from each of the parent conferences.
- 7. There shall be an Administrative Review Committee (the committee) whose function and membership are defined in ¶ 636 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be three (3) members of the committee and two (2) alternates, nominated by the Bishop and elected by the clergy session of the Annual Conference. The committee is accountable to the clergy session of the Annual Conference. Applying to All Agencies
- 8. The Committee on Nominations shall work toward the goals of inclusiveness as set forth in ¶ 610.5 in the 2016 Book of Discipline which states: "...special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth (¶ 256.3), young adults, older adults, persons from churches with small memberships, people with disabilities, and racial and ethnic persons, in keeping with policies for general Church agencies. It is further recommended that the membership of such agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry, include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, who are professing members of local churches." The Committee on Nominations shall also strive for equal representation from the districts; and, to the extent possible, the diversity of those nominated should reflect the diversity of the Mission Field. It will be important at least through 2020 that both the parent conferences be equally represented on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Pensions, and that both be well represented on the Uniting Table and the Vision Teams.

- 9. The term of membership in any conference agency is quadrennial, except where the Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise. The maximum that a person can serve in an agency is two full terms, except where the Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise, or when he/she is filling a vacancy during the quadrennium. Filling a vacancy of an unexpired term of more than two years is considered to be a full term and shall count the same as four years.
- 10. Any elected position on a conference agency which is vacant at the end of the Annual Conference session or which becomes vacant during the conference year may be filled by the Committee on Nominations, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline.
- 11. Ex-officio members of an agency, including members of General and Jurisdictional Agencies who reside within the bounds of the conference, are in addition to the agency members named above.
- 12. Chairpersons of conference agencies should be sensitive to the work schedules of laity when setting meetings.
- 13. When a person is absent without notice from two consecutive conference agency meetings of which he/she is a member, such person shall be considered to have resigned such membership, and the Committee on Nominations shall be notified that another person can be nominated for the remainder of the term.
- 14. No district superintendent or conference staff person shall be eligible to serve as an elective member of any conference agency. If a member at the time of appointment or hire, he/she shall be considered to have resigned such membership.

CONFERENCE STAFF AND RESOURCES

15. There shall be a Mission Vitality Center to equip churches to reach the mission field to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The Mission Vitality Center relates to and supports the work of the four Vision Teams: to empower and equip all those working with existing congregations, and to assist and support those starting new faith communities; to offer leadership development to lay and clergy leaders; to mobilize all of us to transform communities through missional opportunities and engagement; and to support communications and lead the conference in using new and emerging technologies as tools for ministry. The Mission Vitality Center will seek to build capacity at the district level to better serve local churches in their mission. The Mission Vitality Center will also support the Board of Ordained Ministry and its clergy wellness initiatives, the conference centers offering retreats and learning experiences, youth and young adult ministries, and registration services for such events. The Mission Vitality Center shall be accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference. There shall be a director or equivalent position to oversee the functions of the Mission Vitality Center, filled by appointment or otherwise at the Bishop's discretion.

1615. There shall be an Administrative Services Center whose function is to manage the financial resources of the conference, and to develop alternative sources of funding for the conference. The Administrative Services Center will encourage collaboration and partnership among all program, administrative and financial entities of the conference. The Administrative Services Center relates to and supports the work of the Finance Table and the Commission on Equitable Compensation, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, the conference treasurer, and the office of New Resource Development, as well as the other non-program agencies as needed. The Administrative Services Center shall be accountable to the Finance Table and to the Annual Conference, and shall be funded by the Annual Conference. There shall be a director or equivalent position to oversee the functions of the Administrative Services Center, filled by appointment or otherwise at the Bishop's discretion.

<u>1716</u>. There shall be an Assistant to the Episcopal Office who will provide assistance with the administrative tasks of the Episcopal Office. This position may be filled, by appointment or otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

17. There shall be Directors who assist and coordinate with the ministries of the Vision Teams as determined by the Personnel Committee in consultation with the Bishop's discretion.

MEMBERSHIP OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE

18. The lay membership of the Annual Conference shall be:

LAY MEMBERS DEFINED BY THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE

- a. A professing member elected by each charge, as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;
- b. An additional lay member assigned to each charge for each additional clergy member who is appointed to the charge as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;
- c. Diaconal ministers, active deaconesses, home missioners under episcopal appointment within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the conference director of lay servant ministries, conference secretary of global ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the Annual Conference college student organization, one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17) and one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district to be selected in such a manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference, as provided in ¶ 602.4 and ¶ 32 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;

(The method for selecting the youth, college and young adult representatives to Annual Conference will be as follows: the conference youth organization will select one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17) from each district; the conference young adult organization will select one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district. In the absence of a college student organization, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry will select the college student to serve as a Lay Member of the Annual Conference. Each of the agencies is responsible for providing the names and contact information for these persons to the conference secretary no later than January 15 each year.)

Lay Members Defined by Annual Conference

- d. An additional lay member assigned to each church that does not have a lay member as provided for in 18a and 18b above; and
- e. Other members as defined by the Annual Conference to include: an additional representative of the executive committees of the conference organizations of United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, youth, and young adults; the president and one additional representative of the executive committees of the district organizations of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, youth, and young adults; the chancellor, the conference emmaus lay director (if any), the conference scouting coordinator (if any), conference associate lay leaders (if any), conference elected executive personnel (if any), the chairperson of any conference agency or standing committee that reports directly to the Annual Conference; lay members of the Uniting Table and Finance Table; and one lay member for each unchartered new church start elected by the district in which the new church start is located.
- f. Additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy membership shall be assigned to each district based upon district membership. The conference secretary shall notify each district superintendent of the number of additional lay members to be elected no later than sixty (60) days following Annual Conference. Each district will determine the method of election.
- g. Through 2024 the additional lay members elected shall include members of both parent conferences.
- h. At least 10% of these additional lay members shall be age 30 or under at the time of election.
- 19. In accordance with ¶ 659 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, the District Conferences will be composed of all members of Annual Conference as set forth in the Standing Rules who are related to churches within the bounds of their respective districts and currently elected to office. In addition, it shall include the chairperson of each district agency.

CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

- 20. Proposals and reports from conference agencies shall be compiled in a Pre-Conference Report that shall be made available as an electronic document or in printed form to all conference members at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Conference session. Each report shall be marked "For Conference Action" or "For Information Only."
- 21. The Annual Conference shall make available English and Spanish editions of all official correspondence, including but not limited to the contents of the Pre-Conference Report and the Conference Journal. The Annual Conference shall also provide oral translation between Spanish and English, and support for hearing and vision impaired persons, during the sessions of the Annual Conference.
- 22. Resolutions shall reach the floor of the conference only after consideration and action of the appropriate conference agency.
- 23. The conference procedures will be governed by the following in order of precedence: the Book of Discipline, the Standing Rules, any special rules adopted by the Annual Conference, and the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.
- 24. The conference secretary shall establish the bar of the conference. The conference secretary shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, the persons needed to assist in the proceedings of the conference. These include the timekeeper, tellers, associate secretaries, and the minutes committee.
- 25. Speakers should identify themselves, giving their name and church, and whether they are a clergy or lay member of the conference.
- 26. Each speech from the floor for or against a motion will be limited to three minutes. The timekeeper will inform the Bishop when the time has expired.
- 27. Consent Agenda 1 consists of reports from conference agencies which are not for action, but are "For Information Only." The conference acts only to receive these reports and print them in the journal. Consent Agenda 2 consists of action reports about which there is believed to be little or no dissent. The items included in Consent Agenda 2 are determined by a task force composed of members of the Agenda and Worship Committee. Any member of the Annual Conference may move the deletion of any of the items from Consent Agendas.

With a second, and a one-minute explanation by the maker of the motion, it will be voted on by the conference without debate.

If 20% of the members vote that the item be removed, it will be removed and brought to the floor as a non-consent item at a time to be determined by the Agenda and Worship Committee.

- 28. The Committee on Standing Rules shall report to the Annual Conference during the first business session of each Annual Conference. Revisions or amendments must be adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference, and become effective immediately upon their adoption, unless otherwise stated in the enabling legislation. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference.
- 29. The preliminary report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented early in the agenda of the Annual Conference proceedings, including the process for nominations from the floor. The final report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented and acted upon at a later session of that Annual Conference.
- 30. Any report or resolution requiring action of the conference must be in the hands of the conference secretary early enough to allow for printing and distribution to the conference twenty-four (24) hours before the report is considered by the conference. Motions made from the floor must be presented in writing to the presiding officer and the conference secretary at the time the motion is made.
- 31. The conference lay leader will chair the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesies, and will be responsible for appointing additional persons to assist in preparation of the report.
- 32. The only materials that are allowed to be placed on the tables of the conference floor are those official materials distributed by the conference secretary and his/her staff.
- 33. The minutes shall be available online no later than sixty days after the closing of the Annual Conference session.

OTHER

- 34. The Local Church Report to the Annual Conference (Annual Statistical Report) required by the general church will be completed and filed with the conference no later than January 30, as stated in ¶ 606.7 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. This can be done using the method determined by the conference statistician to be the easiest and most effective manner.
- 35. There will be a Policy Manual containing policies adopted by the Annual Conference. Changes in these policies must be approved by the Annual Conference. The conference secretary will make these available as an electronic document and in printed form.
- 36. Any minister of the Annual Conference who conducts the funeral or memorial service of a fellow minister or a minister's spouse shall provide the conference secretary with a memorial for that person within one month, in accordance with the Guidelines on Memoirs to be furnished by the conference secretary.

FINANCE TABLE (CF&A)

REPORT I AUTHORITY OF THE FINANCE TABLE (CF&A) TO RESPOND TO UNFORESEEN FINANCIAL SITUATIONS FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

The Finance Table (CF&A) has the authority to adjust the budget implementation on the basis of changing economic conditions and unforeseen circumstances as authorized in ¶613.5 – 613.11 and ¶616 – 618 2016 Book of Discipline.

REPORT II SUPPORT FOR DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

The Finance Table (CF&A) is recommending that the salary and benefits for the Río Texas Conference District Superintendents for 2021 be set as follows:

Compensation

Cash salary for 2021 is set at \$99,760 per annum.

Clergy Retirement Security Plan, Comprehensive Protection Plan, Health Benefits, and utilities shall vary according to their actual cost.

Expenses to be Provided by the Districts

Office space, office telephone (including long distance), postage, secretarial service, printing, office utilities and insurance on furniture and equipment if applicable, library and periodical expenses, entertainment related to the district, and other normal expenses related to the superintendency not paid by the Annual Conference.

The district shall also provide a parsonage, parsonage utilities (not including personal long distance), parsonage maintenance and insurance on parsonage or an appropriate housing allowance.

REPORT III EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICY ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

Minimum Pastoral Support Policies

The minimum salary levels for 2021 shall be:


- For a Full or Probationary member \$42,300 per annum.
- For an Associate member \$39,300 per annum.
- For an Approved Local Pastor or member of another denomination \$36,100 per annum.

Plus \$75 for each year of service completed after 2^{nd} year with a maximum of \$1,425 Plus \$200 for 2^{nd} church in charge and \$100 for each additional church in the charge

REPORT V FINANCE TABLE (CF&A) OPERATIONS FOR INFORMATION ONLY

The purpose of the Finance Table (CF&A) is "to develop, maintain, and administer a comprehensive and coordinated plan of fiscal and administrative policies, procedures, and management services for the Annual Conference" (¶612.1 2016 Book of Discipline).

In keeping with the Disciplinary purpose, the Finance Table (CF&A) sees itself as an integral part of the mission and ministry of the Conference. We are working to improve communications with the other agencies of the Conference to ensure that our work is supportive of the ministries and goals of the Uniting Table and the Mission Field Ministry Offices.

Receipts on all funds for 2019 by the Río Texas Conference were \$9,267,260.99 or 88.90% of the apportioned amount. The Finance Table (CF&A) is proposing the budget for 2021. The overall apportioned budget for all funds totals \$8,439,072.

The Finance Table (CF&A) sees itself as joining with the local church in the work of the financial ministry of the Annual Conference. We commend the 2021 budget to the Conference. It represents the uniqueness and depth of ministries and missions provided by our church and economic realities of our Conference. The Finance Table (CF&A), along with the Conference Treasurer, has been monitoring membership and economic trends within the Conference, the Global Church, and society at large. We believe that the future health and vitality of our ministry will require that the amounts apportioned to the local churches will need to be significantly reduced over the next few years. As the goals and direction of the Conference become clearer, we will be working with the Bishop, the Uniting Table, and Mission Field Ministries to ensure that the budget and apportionments accurately reflect those goals and support those ministries. At the same time, we will continue to work with our Conference Treasurer, the Personnel Committee and other Conference leaders to improve communications, systems and efficiency.

Operating Policies of the Finance Table (CF&A):

1. The compensation (including housing and utilities) for District Superintendents shall be recommended to the Annual Conference by the Finance Table (CF&A), using a guideline formula adopted by the Personnel Committee of 1.85 times the Conference Average Compensation (CAC). The purpose of the formula is to relate DS Compensation to Full Time Clergy Compensation. We recommend that the salary computation should also be applied to other clergy appointed to the conference staff at Cabinet level. For the year 2021, the Cabinet has requested that this formula be set aside leaving their salaries frozen at the lower 2020 rate

The decimal formula shall be based on the two year average of local church operating expenses divided by two years of conference-wide local church operating expenses times each apportioned fund. Operating expenses include only these line items from the Local Church Report to the Annual Conference:

- Line 41 Pastor(s) Compensation
- Line 42 Utilities and Housing Paid to Pastor(s)
- Line 43 Accountable Reimbursement Paid to Pastor(s)
- Line 44 Non-Accountable Cash Allowances Paid to Pastor(s)
- Line 45 Staff & Diaconal Ministers Salary
- Line 46 Program Expenses
- Line 47 Current Operating Expenses other than Program

2 years of Local Church Operating Expenses X
2 Years of Conference-Wide Local Church Operating Expenses Apportioned Fund

If there are separate district apportionments determined by each district, they will be allocated according to the following formula.

2 years of Local Church Operating Expenses

X Each District Apportioned Fund

2 Years of District-Wide Local Church Operating Expenses

- 2. At the beginning of the calendar year, the Finance Table (CF&A) shall determine which portions of the Conference Ministries and Administrative Ministries are "fixed costs" (salaries, benefits, etc.) and shall thus be authorized to be paid at 100% of the approved budget. On the basis of prior-year receipts to these funds, the Finance Table (CF&A) shall then determine a percentage of the approved budget to be authorized for expenditures in the remaining items of each budget, so that expenditures shall not exceed income.
 - a. Each church is expected to support all funds at 100% of the apportioned amount. (¶247.14 2016 Book of Discipline)
 - b. The churches are requested to make payments thereon aggregately, with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will allocate such payments according to the appropriate percentage due the fund according to the Conference Budget.
- 3. An Unrestricted Fund Balance Account will be maintained by the Annual Conference at a minimum level of 20% of the current total of the Conference Funds. Any undesignated interest income will be transferred to the undesignated fund balance at the end of the fiscal year.
- 4. All apportioned funds, pension and health benefits costs both receipts and disbursements, will be managed through the office of the Conference Treasurer. All boards, agencies, committees, and commissions shall use the Conference Treasurer as the fiscal agent.
- 5. The compensation (including housing and utilities) for District Superintendents shall be recommended to the Annual Conference by the Finance Table (CF&A), using a guideline formula adopted by the Personnel Committee of 1.85 times the Conference Average Compensation (CAC). Calculate the cash portion as follows: 2021 CAC x 1.85 = DS Plan Compensation. Then, (DS Plan Comp utilities) /1.25 = Cash Salary. Example: Where utilities are \$5,000 and housing is 25% of Cash Salary; \$71,791 x 1.85 = \$132,813. Then, (\$132,813 \$5,000) / 1.25 = \$102,250. The purpose of the formula is to relate DS Compensation to Full Time Clergy Compensation. We recommend that the salary computation should also be applied to other clergy appointed to the conference staff at Cabinet level.
- 6. All agencies receiving funds from the Conference budget shall affirm that funds will not be expended for uses not consistent with ¶613.18-19 2016 *Book of Discipline*.
- 7. The amount of compensation designated as housing allowance for ordained staff members and district superintendents of the Conference will be set by an annual resolution of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A) after consideration of a statement of amounts to be used during the year.
- 8. The governing boards of United Methodist related entities must apply to the Finance Table (CF&A) to be granted the privilege of soliciting and receiving funds from churches, individuals, and other sources (but not from conference-wide offerings except as indicated in the list

which follows) in keeping with ¶262 2016 Book of Discipline; no capital campaigns have been approved for 2020; and the following, and only the following, conference-wide offerings are approved for 2021:

- 9. The Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, and Secretary of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A), the Chairperson of the Audit Committee, the Chairperson of Equitable Compensation and the Conference Treasurer/Director of Administrative Ministries constitute the executive committee of the Conference Finance Table (CF&A).
- 10. The Finance Table (CF&A) is authorized to appoint a Conference auditor.
- 11. A Conference Fund will not be permitted to carry over unobligated budget allocations from one conference year to another unless specifically authorized by the Finance Table (CF&A). Agencies receiving funds from sources other than apportioned funds may carry over such unspent funds into the next year. Any unobligated budget allocations not authorized for carryover will be added to the undesignated Fund Balance of the Annual Conference.
- 12. Each year, the Conference Comptroller shall set a cutoff date for all apportionment payments to the Conference Treasurer to be applied to the preceding year. The cutoff date will be communicated to the local churches no later than December 1 each year.
- 13. Each Conference board, agency, or institution receiving or disbursing funds not managed by the Conference Treasurer shall maintain adequate financial records and prepare and submit annual audit reports to the Conference Treasurer and the Finance Table (CF&A). All treasurers shall be properly bonded.
- 14. The Conference fiscal year shall begin on January 1 each year, and end on December 31 each year.
- 15. The Conference Finance Table (CF&A) is responsible for designating depositories for Conference funds.
- 16. The Conference will include in each annual budget an appropriate line for each "shall" ministry as defined by The Book of Discipline

REPORT VII EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICY FOR THE USE OF HISPANIC MINISTRY FUND FOR INFORMATION ONLY

The Commission recommends the following strategic process to provide assistance for pastoral leadership to new and existing churches engaged in ministries with Hispanics/Latinos within the Río Texas Conference utilizing the Hispanic Ministry Fund. The process involves various local, district and conference entities in order to provide the most strategic use of these limited funds. The Commission shall be responsible for the following:

- 1. Collect and analyze data* pertaining to local churches engaged in or with potential to be in ministry with Hispanics/Latinos in communities of growth, in collaboration with the Mission Vitality Center;
- 2. Identify and list possible local churches that could benefit from these funds, in collaboration with the Mission Vitality Center;
- Share the data and list of local churches with the Bishop and Cabinet, district strategy teams, and key conference staff in order to discuss, negotiate, and prioritize potential local churches;
- In consultation with the district strategy teams, invite local churches to apply to the Commission's Hispanic Ministry Fund, review applications, and approve annual grants;
- Require the approved local churches to incorporate and utilize appropriate conference programs and tools, such as coaches, mentors, Healthy Church Initiative, etc., and monitor and celebrate progress in its development and accomplishments of ministry with Hispanics/Latinos;
- 6. Review and approve additional grants to same churches and others annually.
- * Data to be gathered and analyzed includes the following:

population growth (actual and projected)

profile of the area served or to be served

membership growth (trend) average worship attendance (trend) number of baptisms (trend) number of professions of faith (trend)

number of years of existence outreach programs ethnicity of congregation (trend) age profile of members

language(s) utilized by congregation building size: sanctuary, educational bldg.

other key indicators

REPORT VIII MEETING EXPENSE REIMBURSEMENT FOR INFORMATION ONLY

All boards and agencies are urged to schedule meetings, as far as possible, on dates and places coinciding with other groups in order to affect economy in travel expenses. Travel Expense shall be paid to members going to official in-conference meetings (between Annual Conference Sessions) at the rate of 40¢ per mile. The allowance for meals shall be \$3.00 for breakfast; \$7.00 each for lunch and dinner necessitated by the meetings. Reimbursement of 100% of lodging expenses necessitated by meetings at contracted hotels through the Annual Conference will be made. Those who choose to stay elsewhere will be reimbursed at the lowest contracted rate. The Conference meeting organizer will provide contracted hotel information to participants. Original lodging receipts must accompany the Disbursement Request. These allowances are not to cover full cost at all times, simply to assist in the additional expense of attending meetings.

Childcare expenses per meeting day not to exceed \$30.00 for the first child, not to exceed \$20.00 for each additional child, shall be allowed and included in the meeting expense of the board or agency.

Travel for duly elected delegates or representatives of the Conference to meetings of other organizations or connectional agencies shall be paid as stated above. However, actual air travel, lodging, and other expenses may be paid if funds are available from the board or agency concerned.

When it is necessary to fly to a meeting, flight must be booked at least 14 days prior to the meeting. If flights are not booked 14 days prior to the meeting, the member booking the flight must pay the difference in the cost of the flight. This does not apply in the rare instances when the meeting is an emergency meeting that is not announced prior to 14 days.

Each local church is encouraged to undergird the meal, transportation, and lodging expenses of Annual Conference members in attending Annual Conference by adding a minimum of \$100 to the church budget for each lay and clergy delegate. The district superintendents are asked to encourage such support at each Charge Conference.

REPORT IX AUDIT COMMITTEE FOR INFORMATION ONLY

The Río Texas Conference Audit Committee is chartered and reports to the Finance Table (CF&A). The Audit Committee is in the process of reviewing audits of 2019 financial statements. BOARD OF PENSIONS

REPORT I PAST SERVICE RATE 2021 FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

The Past Service Rate for 2021 will be \$682 per year of annuity credit. This reflects an increase of \$10.00 or 1.5% over the 2020 Past Service Rate.

In 2016, the Board of Pensions adopted a long-term PSR strategy based on increases of 70% of the reported St. Louis Federal Reserve Cost of Living Index-Urban South Region to set the past service rate each year. The Board believes that this policy provides for the honor, support, and appreciation of our retired clergy while maintaining a sustainable plan to meet benefit liabilities.

Any change in the PSR also increases the Plan's liabilities and must be funded in the year adopted if necessary per the Plan asset level and Wespath funding requirements.

REPORT II RESOLUTIONS RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED CLERGY PERSONS OF THE RIO TEXAS CONFERENCE FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

The Río Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church adopts the following resolutions relating to rental/housing allowances for active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergypersons:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the church ("clergy persons");

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and this Conference was and is to provide active clergy persons with a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to active, retired, terminated, and disabled clergy persons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired, terminated, and disabled clergy persons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental/housing allowance for clergy persons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension, severance, or disability payments received from plans authorized under The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church (the "Discipline"), which includes all such payments from Wespath Benefits and Investments, during the years 2020 and 2021 by each active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergy person who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each such clergy person; and that the pension severance, or disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance applies will be any pension, severance, or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the Discipline, including such payments from Wespath Benefits and Investments "Wespath" and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a Wespath plan, pension, or fund authorized under the Discipline, that result

from any service a clergy person rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired, terminated, or disabled clergy person of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conferences of the church, general agency of the church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the church, or any other employer that employed the clergy person to perform services related to the ministry of the church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such active, retired, or disabled clergy person's pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a clergy person's gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations hereunder to the least of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the clergy person's employer or other appropriate body of the church (such as this Conference in the preceding resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount expended by the clergy person to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the house, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

REPORT IV REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT FOR INFORMATION ONLY

The Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions' mission is to "care for those who serve" by providing for the honor, support and appreciation of our clergy and lay participants. Our focus includes the administration of conference benefit plans both in the present and decades into the future for all plan beneficiaries. We endeavor to be good stewards of the resources we are entrusted with to implement denominational and Conference benefit policy in collaboration with our ministry partner Wespath Benefits and Investments.

For the first time in our history, the COVID-19 pandemic has brought an unprecedented time of challenge, suffering, and economic calamity in the world and our nation. Amid the crisis, we have seen resilience in the church and our communities as we continue to navigate and adjust to these uncertain times in ministry. The Board is adapting and remains devoted to its mission in serving the Conference and participants. Since the early days of the pandemic in March, Wespath in collaboration with GCFA has been providing and pandemic guidance on COVID-19 legislation, including the "CARES" Act – Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act and the FFCRA or Families First Coronavirus Response Act. This information can be found on the Conference website at www.riotexas.org/covidhrtoolkit and www.wespath.org. Prior to the pandemic, we awaited the outcome and impact of denominational changes to the United Methodist Church and our Conference. Along with the postponement of General Conference, the previously proposed pension legislation has been delayed for the next General Conference session in 2021. At the start of 2020,

the Pre-82 Plan, Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP), and Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP-DB) had no unfunded liabilities and we will continue to monitor market volatility to maintain a long term sustainable asset plan to meet benefit liabilities for all beneficiaries.

HealthFlex October Credit and 2021 Update

To assist churches with COVID-19 pandemic relief, churches with eligible full-time clergy and lay participants in Healthflex not in a delinquent status will receive a one-time HealthFlex credit in October resulting in no HealthFlex balance due for the month of October. This credit does not apply to any personal reimbursement accounts or pension plans.

To provide additional stability as a result of the apportionment phase-out and changes to the Healthflex Exchange multi Plan model:

- The 2021 CRSP-DB flat rate contribution of \$511 per month will remain the same as 2020.
- The 2021 HealthFlex Premium Credit (PC) will remain at \$900 per month the same as 2020.
- Effective January 1, 2021, we are pleased to announce the Rio Texas HealthFlex provider network will be the Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) national network. With this transition, will have a reduction in the 2021 medical rates with an average decrease of 2%. These savings will be passed along to our plan participants in their 2021 plan selections. Remaining in the United Healthcare Network would have resulted in an increase on average across all six plans of 4%.

After a difficult HealthFlex plan year 2018 with 23% higher claims, the plan stabilized in 2019 and we are monitoring any COVID related impact to the plan in 2020 claims and renewal for 2022. HealthFlex plan participants continue to utilize the various plan offerings in the Healthflex Exchange, selecting between six medical, three dental and vision plan offerings and participation in personal reimbursement accounts have increased since the transition to Exchange. This multi-plan model allows greater flexibility in choosing a plan combination that will better fit a participant's needs.

I would like to thank all of our churches, clergy and lay members in adapting and moving ahead with perseverance and hope in continuing to share the gospel. Our churches have remained committed in their contributions for benefits despite many new trials and we will continue to in our mission to care for you.

REPORT V PENSION PLANS FOR INFORMATION ONLY

2021 PENSION PLAN CHURCH DIRECT BILLING

Effective January 1, 2021, church direct invoicing by the Conference for clergy participants under appointment for current active service will include:

- Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP) Defined Benefit required annual contribution of \$6,132 for each eligible full-time clergy invoiced monthly.
- Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP) Defined required contribution of 3% of Plan Compensation for each eligible full-time clergy invoiced monthly.
- Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) required contribution 3% Plan Compensation for each eligible full-time clergy to a
 maximum of two times the 2021 denominational average compensation or DAC of \$74,199 in 2021 invoiced monthly.
- United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP-PT) required Contribution of 9% for each eligible part-time clergy (3/4 time appointment or less) invoiced monthly.
- United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) optional contributions as elected by clergy as a payroll deduction invoiced monthly.
- The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide contributions to eligible legacy churches for full-time clergy in the CRSP-Defined Benefit Plan, CRSP-Defined Contribution Plan, and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP).
- The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide a **9%** contributions to eligible part-time clergy appointed to a legacy church in the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan UMPIP-PT.

PRE-82 PENSION PLAN

The Pre-82 Pension Plan also known as Supplement One to the Clergy Retirement Security Plan (CRSP) is a defined benefit pension plan administered by Wespath and provides eligible clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church before 1982. The Pre-82 Pension Plan was replaced by the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) effective January 1, 1982. One of the responsibilities of the Board of Pensions is to recommend to the annual Conference the Past Service Rate or (PSR) to clergy for each year of eligible service in the Pre-82 Pension Plan.

As the need to provide adequate clergy pension benefits evolved with the establishment of the Pre-82 Pension Plan, contributions were not adequate to provide the benefits required for many participants during years of active service. Therefore, it became the responsibility of the Conference to ensure benefit obligations required by the plan would be provided by annual contributions in an amortization schedule through 2021. The goal for each Conference is for the Pre-82 Pension Plan is to be fully funded until all benefit obligations have been met. However, the assets of the Plan are not fixed with the potential of additional liabilities due to market volatility, Wespath policies, and the number of eligible beneficiaries. Further, any increase in the Past Service Rate (PSR) adopted by the Conference also increases the plan's liabilities.

In 2016, the Board of Pensions adopted a long-term PSR strategy based on increases of 70% of the reported St. Louis Federal Reserve Cost of Living Index-Urban South Region to set the past service rate each year. The Board believes that this policy provides for the honor, support, and appreciation to our retired clergy while maintaining a sustainable plan to meet benefit liabilities. Any change in the PSR also increases the Plan's liabilities and must be funded in the year adopted if necessary in accordance with the Plan asset level and funding requirements. As of December 31, 2019, no additional Pre-82 liabilities or Advance Contribution for 2021 to fund the Past Service Rate increase is due.

MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN (MPP)

The Ministerial Pension Plan, also known as Supplement Three to the Clergy Security Retirement Plan (CRSP), provides clergy with a pension benefit for their years of ministry with The United Methodist Church from 1982 through 2006. The MPP is an Internal Revenue Code Section 403(b) retirement plan. The Conference is required to fund any liability attributable to MPP annuities due to market fluctuations, mortality/demographic assumptions, and Wespath Plan policies. As of the January 1, 2019, actuarial valuation for 2021, the MPP and CRSP annuities funded ratio for the Rio Texas Conference is approximately 107.3%. No additional MPP contributions are required in 2020 and 2021 under Wespath's Corridor Funding methodology.

CLERGY SECURITY RETIREMENT PLAN (CRSP)

The current pension plan required for eligible full-time clergy is the Clergy Security Retirement Plan or CRSP administered by Wespath. This plan was effective January 1, 2007, and is comprised of both a defined contribution (DC) and defined benefit (DB) component.

DEFINED CONTRIBUTION (DC)

Provides a defined amount that is deposited into an active full-time clergyperson's account with monthly contributions. This benefit distributed at retirement is the accumulated amount plus earnings (or losses) in the individual's account. The defined contribution (DC) component of CRSP is 2% of Plan Compensation with a match for participant contributions to the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP) – up to 1% of Plan Compensation. Therefore, if a participant contributes at least 1% of compensation to UMPIP, the CRSP DC contributions will be 3%.

DEFINED BENEFIT (DB)

Provides a specific dollar amount at retirement regardless of market conditions or investment performance. The amount is based on a formula that specifies a monthly retirement benefit to eligible clergy and 70% for eligible contingent annuitants for the remainder of their lives. The CRSP-DB provides a monthly retirement benefit using 1.25% of the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC) at retirement multiplied by years of service from January 1, 2007, to December 31, 2013. The multiplier is reduced to 1% for years of service beginning January 1, 2014.

Both components are direct billed to each church for all eligible full-time clergy. The defined contribution (DC) billing is based on 3% of Plan Compensation. The annual defined benefit (DB) direct billing in 2020 to churches for each clergy appointed to full-time service is \$6,132. The annual defined benefit (DB) direct billing in 2021 to churches for each clergy appointed to full-time service will remain at \$6,132.

The annual DB contribution to Wespath is based on the number of eligible full-time clergy, clergy on Medical leave with CPP benefits on the actuarial valuation provided by Wespath. The contribution amount due in 2020 for the DB component is \$1,618,824 and \$1,559,225 in 2021. Any clergy serving less than full-time not eligible for the CRSP DB are eligible to participate in the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan with a required church contribution of 9% of Plan Compensation.

COMPREHENSIVE PROTECTION PLAN (CPP)

The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) is a welfare benefit plan administered by Wespath Benefits and Investments. The CPP includes long-term disability, death and other welfare benefits for eligible full-time clergy. The CPP plan is an Internal Revenue Code 414(e) "church plan" funded by plan sponsor contributions. The CPP required direct billing to churches is 3% of Plan Compensation for eligible full-time clergy up to two times the 2020 denominational average compensation or DAC of \$72,648 and \$74,199 in 2021.

UNITED METHODIST PERSONAL INVESTMENT PLAN (UMPIP) FOR LAY AND CLERGY

The United Methodist Investment Plan (UMPIP) is an Internal Revenue Code section 403(b) defined contribution retirement savings plan administered by Wespath for clergy and lay employees of The United Methodist Church and affiliated organizations. Eligible participants may make personal contributions through payroll deductions for before-tax, Roth or after-tax contributions in a flat dollar amount or percentage of eligible compensation, up to Internal Revenue Code limits. Churches are encouraged to offer the UMPIP to lay employees and may contact Wespath for additional plan provisions and sponsorship.

Any clergy appointed to a church for less than full-time service is eligible to participate in the UMPIP and receive a required church contribution of 9% of Plan Compensation. Also, all active clergy are encouraged to participate in the UMPIP with personal contributions. For clergy to receive the maximum church funded pension benefits in the CRSP (DC) Defined Contribution plan of 3%, they will need to contribute a minimum 1% match into the United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP).

REPORT VI 2021 HEALTHFLEX FOR INFORMATION ONLY

HEALTHFLEX BENEFITS

The Rio Texas Conference participates in the HealthFlex Plan administered by Wespath Benefits and Investments for eligible full-time clergy and Conference lay employees. The HealthFlex plan is also available to lay employees of churches who have adopted a HealthFlex Salary-Paying Unit Sub-Adoption Agreement meeting the eligibility requirements of the Plan. HealthFlex is an integrated, wellness-driven health program that supports healthier lifestyles. The HealthFlex plan is designed to provide eligible participants with a comprehensive plan including medical, prescription, and wellness benefits. HealthFlex uses incentives as part of its strategy to promote engagement in healthy behaviors and wellness programs. The 2021 strategy continues the focus on rewards both for measuring risks through Blueprint for Wellness Screening and Health Quotient (HQ), Diabetes Prevention program and for taking action toward better health and well-being. Rewards emphasize participating in programs that have shown to have a positive impact on health risk, including health coaching and the Virgin Pulse activity program. In addition, to the HealthFlex wellness benefits, the Conference also provides additional holistic wellness benefits for clergy and Conference lay employees including spiritual, mental, emotional and physical care components funded by grants from Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas. Effective 2021 the HealthFlex provider will be Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) National Network.

ESTABLISHMENT OF A HEALTH CARE ASSISTANCE FUND

The Board of Pensions recognizes that affordable health care coverage is an essential component of an attractive employee benefits package. In the current health care environment, it is evident that some clergy's health care premiums make up a significant portion of their salaries. To assist with this, the Board of Pensions will establish an endowment fund using the 2016 HealthFlex dividend to assist clergy whose salaries are near the minimum threshold with providing healthcare for their families. This fund will provide grants to align health care cost for the clergy with the 2020 current P+1 tier cost (up to \$6,000 in 2020). These grants will be coordinated through the District Superintendents.

2020 HEALTHFLEX PRIVATE EXCHANGE

To align with the changing health care landscape and significant increases in healthcare costs, the Board of Pensions adopted the HealthFlex Private Exchange multi-plan option effective January 1, 2019. The HealthFlex Private Exchange multi-plan option gives participants a greater choice across several HealthFlex plans with varying plan designs and the flexibility to choose the coverage that best fits the participant's health, financial and family needs. The multi-plan approach encourages greater accountability by participants for health care costs and utilization while retaining the valued HealthFlex Benefits and wellness opportunities that participants have come to expect from Wespath.

The current HealthFlex Private Exchange Multi-Plan offers six distinct plan choices for participants. Although HealthFlex has the discretion to modify the plan offerings in 2021, the 2020 plan design options include:

2021 HEALTHFLEX EXCHANGE INDIVIDUAL PREMIUM CREDIT (PC)

The 2021 HealthFlex Exchange design includes a non-taxable premium credit of \$900. The DC is a fixed dollar amount provided to each HealthFlex full-time clergy and Conference lay employee participant. Participants will use the allocated PC amount to select a health plan in the HealthFlex Exchange and pay for some or all premiums for the plan of their choice.

- The 2021 PC amount will be \$900 per month and direct invoiced.
- The PC will appear as a "credit toward purchase" when choosing a HealthFlex plan from all available HealthFlex Exchange plan options.
- Participants who choose plans costing less than their PC credit amount will "bank" the excess. The unspent PC balance will then be credited by HealthFlex to the participant's Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) or Health Savings Account (HSA), depending on the health plan selected or be used to offset dependent premiums. The excess annual amount (unspent PC balance) is not credited in a lump sum; rather it is available on a prorated, monthly basis over the plan year. Internal Revenue Code (IRC) limits for annual HSA contributions will apply.
- Participants who choose a plan costing more than the PC credit amount including the cost to cover dependents will contribute the
 additional amount by a payroll deduction from their church to cover the cost difference between the PC amount they receive and
 their higher cost for monthly premiums (the participant's share of the premium cost).

HEALTHFLEX DIRECT INVOICING FOR ALL FULL-TIME CLERGY

To ensure the Plan is efficient and sustainable for the benefit of all participants and churches with clergy appointed full-time, any church where a clergy has chosen to not participate in HealthFlex will continue to be invoiced the Premium Credit (PC) of \$900 per month through direct billing effective January 1, 2019 and will continue in 2021. The Board of Pensions believes that Health Benefits should not be a hindering factor on equipping a congregation with the excellent clergy it needs for ministry. The Board will establish a grant program with funds received from churches who have non HealthFlex participating clergy to help clergy with families' transition between churches. We recognize that this can be a financial burden for both the church and clergy and believe this assistance will help ease the transition. The program would, upon District Superintendent's approval, provide grants of up to \$5,000 for clergy assistance with six months of health care coverage as part of a clergy's transition to a new church when the sending and receiving church have adopted differing contributions for dependent coverage.

2021 CHURCH HEALTH BENEFITS DIRECT BILLING

Effective January 1, 2020, churches will be direct invoiced for eligible active clergy participants under full-time appointment and eligible enrolled lay employees:

- The HealthFlex 2021 Premium Credit (PC) of \$900 for each eligible full-time enrolled clergy or enrolled lay employee.
- The Rio Grande Legacy Fund will continue to provide contributions to eligible legacy churches for full-time clergy enrolled in the HealthFlex Plan (individual clergy premium).
- Additional contributions will be direct invoiced for benefits including any election above than the \$900 Premium Credit
 (PC), the cost of dependent coverage, Optional Term Life Insurance, Health Saving Account (HSA) personal contributions
 and the Flexible Benefits Plan funded by payroll deduction

Each eligible active full-time clergy will receive a monthly individual Premium Credit in the HealthFlex plan of \$900 (funded through their Rio Texas Conference church) and will choose from the six HealthFlex plan options.

Participants who choose a plan costing more than the PC credit amount or who choose to cover dependents will contribute the additional amount by a payroll deduction from their church to cover the cost difference between the PC amount they receive and their higher cost for monthly premiums (the participant's share of the premium cost). Covered dependents will be enrolled in the same plan selections chosen by the primary clergy or lay participant.

2021 DEFAULT PLANS

The HealthFlex exchange is a passive enrollment. Participants who are currently enrolled in the HealthFlex exchange for 2020 will automatically be enrolled in the same plan and coverages for 2021 if no elections are made during the Annual Election Period. Full-time clergy and Conference lay employees who are new to the Conference will be enrolled in the following default plans for all of 2021 if no elections are made. All participants are encouraged to annually evaluate their current and anticipated health care needs and enroll in the plan choices that best match their individual requirements.

HEALTHFLEX FLEXIBLE SPENDING ACCOUNTS

Eligible full-time HealthFlex participants may participate in the optional Medical Reimbursement Account (MRA) and Dependent Care Reimbursement Account (DCA) offered as a benefit funded by participant payroll deductions and administered by HealthFlex and Wage Works.

ANCILLARY BENEFITS

Optional Term Life Insurance

The Conference provides an Optional Term Life Insurance for full-time clergy and conference lay employees subject to the underwriting guidelines of the Prudential Life Insurance Company. Eligible participants may elect group term life coverage as a payroll deduction.

Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA)

A Retiree Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) is provided by One Exchange for eligible retirees and funded by apportionments. The HRA is based on the stipend amount received by eligible retirees before December 31, 2013. As of January 1, 2018, there are 71 retirees eligible for an HRA. Eligible retirees must be enrolled in a Medicare Supplement or Advantage plan through Via Benefits (Formerly One Exchange) to receive the HRA. In order to provide sustainability of the HRA benefit and not increase conference benefit plan liabilities and apportionments, the HRA is a fixed amount per eligible retiree and does not increase from year to year.

Per the policy of the 2014 Unification Plan, the HRA stipend will not be offered to any other retiree not currently receiving an HRA. The HRA provides reimbursement for IRS eligible health care expenses such as Medicare Part B premiums, Medicare supplement plan premiums, and out of pocket expenses such as co-pay and deductibles. To receive HRA funds, eligible retirees must submit a claim form to Via Benefits annually for premium reimbursement or as needed for other IRS eligible expenses.

ar Brothers and Sisters of Christ,

m pleased to report to you on behalf of the Board of Trustees of the Rio Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. In cordance with Section 2512 of the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church 2016, the Conference Board of Trustees has responsibility to receive and hold in trust for the benefit of the Conference, donations, personal property and real property. In dition, the Board has the power to invest, transfer or convey the properties that it holds in trust. The Board takes its responsibility the oversight of Conference assets very seriously.

e assets held by the Board of Trustees include closed churches, unused parsonages and undeveloped land. The Board works closely the Conference staff and with recommendations from the Districts to oversee and manage the property entrusted to it. In the ent church property is no longer in use for a local church and the District believes there is no future worship or missional use for the operty, it may be sold.

- e Trustees have 10 to 20 properties under its review and management at any given time. These are both urban and rural and include uctures with some value and others in material disrepair. The Conference Staff under the direction of Kendall Waller and Tina litaker do an excellent job of managing the properties in transition. Many of these properties have limited value, either due to ation or condition, and take some time to sell. The intervening time between the Trustees taking control of the property and a sale be months or even years and the Conference can incur substantial costs maintaining and securing property prior to sale. The Board Trustees and Conference staff work diligently to minimize those costs and to maximize the return to the Conference from the sale real property.
- the period May 2019 through April 2020, a total of \$525,661,46 was received directly related to the sale of real property. In dition, the Board of Trustees had expenses related to both sold and unsold properties for the calendar year 2019 in the amount of 17,832.17 and for January through July 2020 the amount of 85,813.05.

furtherance of its role, of the Board of Trustees has begun to review options with particular attention to urban properties with tential economic value. The Trustees recognize that due to rising real estate values, a decision by the Conference to sell property in tain urban locations may hinder the Conference's ability to have a presence in that location in the future. One example is the former ker Lane United Methodist Church location in Austin. The Conference has worked closely with the Capital District to structure an ovative long-term lease of the Parker Lane property. The Conference currently has an option agreement in place with Foundation mmunities, a major provider of affordable housing in the Austin area. Upon closing, the agreement will result in a major new ordable housing addition, a material financial return to the Conference and provide the Capital District with permanent offices and Iltiuse space in the new structure at no material cost to the District. The Board of Trustees is committed to continuing to identify lovative options for the use of available real estate.

e Board of Trustees also continues to provide oversight over the Light on the Hill, formerly Mount Wesley in Kerrville, Texas in ociation with Kerrville First United Methodist. Under the leadership and vision of Kerrville FUMC, Light on the Hill has transformed of a vital community resource for the hill country with much needed food assistance and a variety of other community-based organs.

REPORT II BOARD OF TRUSTEE'S FUND FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

e Board of Trustees comes to the Annual Conference with one action item. The Board is currently authorized to withhold 20% of the property sale, up to a maximum of 250,000 for the purpose of maintaining and securing property held by the Board. The Board equesting that this be changed to increase the maximum withhold from \$250,000 to \$400,000.00 effective January 1, 2019. The roose of this request is to allow the Trustees to have sufficient funds to adequately manage the properties under its control. Past

experience has revealed the increasing cost of maintaining and securing property in the control of the Trustees. We believe that this change will enable us to better manage the properties entrusted to us and is prudent planning as we anticipate our future needs.

The Board of Trustees is composed of an excellent group of pastors and lay leaders from a variety of backgrounds and from all over the Conference. We gather with one goal, to be good stewards of the assets of the Conference as it works to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Over the past year, the Cabinet has enjoyed the continuation of our work as a consistent team, with no changes of personnel from last year. District superintendents carried the 2019 Annual Conference theme, "Walking Together," into the charge conference season, as local churches navigated the space following General Conference 2019. The bishop, superintendents, and directors alike worked actively to help leaders manage anxiety and focus on the local mission of the church in the midst of denominational discernment and decision-making. Also, over the course of the year, the Cabinet was grateful for generous contributions by churches across the conference to the capital campaign for Lydia Patterson Institute.

Since the spring of this year, the COVID-19 pandemic has marked the lives of our ministries and our people in a profound and extraordinary way. Lay and clergy leaders learned new technological skills for celebrating worship, maintaining relationships, and making new connections. Congregations stretched their understanding of purpose and identity, boldly claiming that while the building was closed, the church's ministry continued. Many found new participants and new vitality, no longer bound by geography. Others expanded their commitment to serving people hardest hit by the economic downturn.

Many laity and clergy from across the conference have also struggled to respond in faith and courage to the unrest that resulted from the killings of unarmed Black people, including Ahmaud Arbury, George Floyd, and Breonna Taylor. We encourage all Rio Texas United Methodists to find ways to engage in conversation, education, and action to address long-standing racial injustice in our communities and our church. We seek to respond faithfully to this crisis in light of the suffering and giftedness of Black Americans; the life of our majority Hispanic population and other people of color within conference bounds; and our current conference reality, five years into our life together as Rio Texas.

The Cabinet looks with anticipation and hope toward the future God is holding before the church. We serve with deep gratitude for the people of the Rio Texas Conference and for their creativity and faithfulness.

REPORT II FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

Transfer of Star and Center City UMCs to Central Texas Conference — West District Superintendent Andy Smith reports that the congregations of Star UMC and Center City UMC have requested to transfer from the Rio Texas Annual Conference (RTC) to the Central Texas Annual Conference (CTC) under the provisions of ¶260 of the 2016 Book of Discipline.

The two churches are located in Mills County, on the extreme eastern end of the RTC West District. Parts of Mills County, including one church, are within the CTC. Both congregations state that they are oriented toward communities in the CTC and are located much closer to the CTC West District office in Stephenville (72 miles) than to the RTC West District office in San Angelo (140 miles). Both congregations have met the disciplinary requirements of a two-thirds charge conference vote, held on February 16, 2020, and individual congregational meetings held on November 17, 2019.

All votes to transfer have been approved unanimously by all members present. ¶260 also requires that each of the two annual conferences approve the transfer by a two-thirds majority. If both vote to approve, the transfer would become effective on January 1, 2021.

- Discontinuation of Austwell UMC On March 25, 2020, the Cabinet approved this discontinuation, effective March 8, 2020.
- Discontinuation of Rock Island UMC On April 30, 2020, the Cabinet voted to approve the discontinuation of this congregation, effective on that date.

- Discontinuation of Divine Grace UMC in San Antonio On May 19, 2020, Cabinet approved this congregation's vote to discontinue, effective August 31, 2020.
- El Redentor UMC, Bishop The Cabinet voted to declare this church abandoned, effective August 13, 2020, given that the congregation no longer gathers for worship or ministry activities.

We give thanks to God for the faithful servants in these places and the legacy these churches have shared with the world.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

REPORT I FOR INFORMATION ONLY

This year, the Commission on Archives and History is submitting an application for the Jackson Ranch Church (JRC) and Cemetery; and the Eli Jackson Cemetery (EJC) to become a United Methodist Historic Site with the General Commission on Archives and History. To initiate the application process the Commission will be presenting its resolution at this year's annual conference. Both sites have deep roots that contribute to the rich history of Methodism and American history in South Texas.

Founders of the Jackson Ranch, Nathaniel Jackson and Matilda Hicks along with their adult children were an interracial family that fled the racism of the South to find freedom in Mexico. Stopping just short of the Mexican border, the family settled in Hidalgo County in 1857. It is now believed that the Jackson Ranch was part of the Underground Railroad that assisted escaped slaves in search of their freedom

At his ranch, Nathaniel Jackson built an adobe chapel that was the predecessor of the JRC. In 1874, Rev. A.H. Sutherland formally organized the JRC's congregation. Juan de la Viña, owner of the neighboring El Capote Ranch, became one of the first Methodist missionaries of Mexican descent for the JRC and MECS. His two sons later founded El Buen Pastor in Edinburg, which remains active today. In 1884, Nathaniel Jackson's son, Martin, donated one-fifth of an acre of the Jackson Ranch to the MECS and built a wooden church for regular worship. JRC and its members were the catalysts for several churches still active today. These include El Divino Redentor UMC in McAllen (1910), El Mesias UMC in Mission (1912), and La Trinidad UMC in Pharr (1913). The JRC has made a long lasting and significant contribution to these and other Spanish-speaking Methodist churches in deep South Texas.

The EJC was established as the first of two family cemeteries after Nathaniel Jackson's death in 1865. The EJC, as well as the cemetery on the JRC's grounds, are the final resting place for multicultural people, most prominently Mexican-Americans and African Americans. These cemeteries reflect the border's rich history.

The Texas Historical Commission has recognized both locations as historic sites. We hope to continue in the preservation of the Methodist history present at the Jackson Ranch Church and Cemetery and the Eli Jackson Cemetery for generations to come with a United Methodist historic site designation from the General Commission on Archive and History.

The conference archive continues to accept donated historical documents related to Methodist history. Items that are being received are church membership records that include baptism, marriage and death certificates. Local church records are very sought after especially those once belonging to the Rio Grande Conference.

Regular research requests are being conducted weekly by the conference archivist for church historians, retired clergy, and lay persons interested in the Methodist history of South Texas. These research requests have contributed to the local church and pastoral files in the conference archive to provide more historical information for future research.

REPORT II JACKSON RANCH CHURCH AND CEMETERY AND THE ELI JACKSON CEMETERY FOR CONFERENCE ACTION

Jackson Ranch Church and Cemetery and the Eli Jackson Cemetery

Whereas: In 1874, an interracial couple Nathaniel Jackson and Matilda Hicks, along with their adult children fled the racism in the South to find freedom. They stopped at the Rio Grande River in Hildalgo County where they established the Jackson Ranch.

Whereas: The Jackson Ranch was 5,535 acres purchased at a cost of 36¢ from E.D. Smith of Hidalgo, Texas. The Ranch is located five miles east of Hidalgo with a Rio Grande River frontage of 0.7 miles and extending north 13 miles between the present cities of Pharr, San Juan and Edinburg, Texas.

Whereas: The Jackson Ranch became a paradigm of Christian hospitality. There, Nathaniel developed a culture of complete acceptance of the stranger. The Jackson Ranch welcomed former slaves, Mexican natives, Anglo immigrants and all who came seeking freedom and belonging.

Whereas: The Jackson Ranch is now believed to have been a part of the Underground Railroad.

Whereas: In 1874, Rev. A.H. Sutherland formally organized the Jackson Ranch Church congregation on the El Capote Ranch.

Whereas: The owner of the neighboring El Capote Ranch, Juan Manuel de la Viña, became one of the first Methodist missionaries of Mexican descent for the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

Whereas: In, 1913 de la Viña's son's, Juan and Plutarco, founded El Buen Pastor Methodist Church in Edinburg.

Whereas: In 1884, Martin Jackson donated one-fifth of an acre of the Jackson Ranch to the MECS and built a wooden church for regular worship. This congregation was the first Spanish speaking, congregation in Hidalgo county. This was recognized by the State of Texas with an Historical Marker in 1982.

Whereas: The wooden church became known as the Jackson Ranch Church which was the catalyst to establishing several MECS churches still active today, including El Divino Redentor UMC in McAllen (1910), El Mesias UMC in Mission (1912), and La Trinidad UMC in Pharr (1913). Thus, making a long lasting and significant contribution to establishing these and other Spanish speaking Methodist churches in deep South Texas.

Whereas: The Eli Jackson Cemetery located on the Jackson Ranch grounds was established as the first of two family cemeteries after Nathaniel Jackson's death in 1865. The cemetery is the final resting place for multicultural people, most prominently Mexican Americans and African Americans. In these cemeteries rest the remains of many persons who were buried without charge and were denied other resting places because of race or creed or poverty. These cemeteries reflect the border's rich cultural history.

Whereas: The upper west section of the Eli Jackson Cemetery is distinguished by a unique wooden cross near a tree. The cross is believed to have been carved in a military style dissimilar to other hand carved wooden crosses in the cemetery.

Documentation of graves before 1896 does not exist, but possibly are the final resting place of soldiers.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Jackson Ranch Church and Cemetery and the Eli Jackson Cemetery be recognized for its significant place in the history of the Methodist Movement in the Rio Grande Valley as well as its significant place in the history of the development of interracial and intercultural ministry in the United Methodist Church. Both sites deserve to be recognized by the General Commission on Archives and History and designated as United Methodist Historic Sites.

OFFICE OF CONNECTIONAL MINISTRIES ANNUAL CONFERENCE YEAR 2020

The Office of Connectional Ministries has continued to expand in its resource capacities for the Rio Texas Conference and United Methodist connection over the last several years. As Director, I have found it important to continue to listen, discern, and build relationships within our annual conference as well as with our ecumenical partners and neighbors. In addition to strategically planning small and large scale events that support, educate and provides important and timely resources for our clergy, laity, local congregations and their mission fields, in 2018 this office acquired the supervisory oversight of the Rio Texas Disaster/Recovery Team. As we come to the three-year anniversary of Hurricane Harvey, and the close of this project, our conference celebrates the excellent work of this team and its partners. You will learn more of the work, dedication and celebrations in this team's pre-annual conference report as well as the video and magazine prepared for the AC 2020 called session scheduled for October 3, 2020.

Clergy Convocation – Due to the COVID-19 Pandemic (CDC and local government recommendations i.e. social distancing and reduced number of those who could gather) this year's in-person Convocation with guest speaker Rev. Susan Beaumont has been rescheduled for March 2021. Although postponing was a disappointment, the restrictions provided an opportunity to gather and support one another in new and creative ways through "Clergy Conversations", reflection, prayer and resources by utilizing a wide-range of technology i.e. Facebook Live, Webinars and Zoom Conferencing. Attendees left the conversations feeling heard, supported, encouraged and more hopeful during this difficult times.

Annual Conference (AC) Meeting — As with the Clergy Convocation, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic (CDC and local government recommendations i.e. social distancing and reduced number of those who could gather and decisions made by both the Rio Texas Conference and the City of Corpus Christi) the in-person AC Conference scheduled for June 10-13 was cancelled in its traditional format. After much discernment in moving forward, essential components of the Business of the Annual Conference (BAC) were either conducted via the use of technology i.e. the Clergy Session or will be conducted at a special called session of the AC scheduled for October 3, 2020.

The format of the October 3rd meeting has gone through several transitions as conference leadership continues to monitor the course of the pandemic and the recommendations offered by state and local government as well as the CDC.

At the time of this writing, the current format of the October 3rd gathering will be conducted virtually out of the Rio Texas Conference Office. Those individuals determined necessary to report and/or conduct business in person will be asked to follow all the safety protocol as established by the local government and our Rio Texas policies. A letter will be sent to conference delegates via the Bishop's office by September 3, 2020, outlining the essential business to be conducted as well as an opportunity for worship, reporting and celebration. In addition, registration will open following the release of this letter as well as instructions important to the accessing the meeting.

Nominations – The Rio Texas Annual Conference is deeply committed to excellence and diversity in leadership. Therefore the goal of the application-based Leadership Pool introduced early in 2020, is to build a pool of qualified, spiritually grounded, committed leaders who through the conference's nomination process will be matched with all leadership needs of the annual conference. As a note, although this is a quadrennial election year, per procedural guidelines presented in the UMC Book of Discipline, quadrennial nominations have been postponed until General Conference is able to meet and a special 2021 AC special called session is announced. Therefore, annual conference committee and team members have been asked to stay on in their positions if available to do so, until quadrennial voting can take place. In the meantime, the leadership pool nomination process, available on the conference website will remain open. Further questions on this process can be addressed to the Office of Connectional Ministries Rio Texas Conference.

THE OFFICE OF CREATING/VITALIZING CONGREGATIONS AND DEVELOPING LEADERS

FOR INFORMATION ONLY

What a joy this last year has been to work with so many congregations, pastors, laity, seminaries and Campus Ministers who love Jesus, those they serve and their community/mission field.

With the continued focus on fruitfulness both in congregational vitality and leadership development, it has been a busy year. Rio Texas has started 4 new faith communities and activating new ways to empower leadership development. I had the joy of walking and working with many congregational leaders and pastors, teaching at many of the District Professional's meetings, District Leadership workshops for laity, with the vitalized Lay Servant Conference and District Directors, as well as helping District Strategy teams think about how they could help encourage, teach, and lead congregations to be bold in reaching out into the community they serve. All of these are strategies so that churches can learn, grow, and reach new people for Christ.

Of course, at the writing of this pre-conference journal report, we have had "shelter in place" for just over 4 weeks and the ways we reach and connect with people have had to change. I am so proud of how many of the pastors and leaders of the church have taken some of the innovative exercises and put them into action. Congregations and pastors are trying new things boldly. Some are working really well and others are adapting, ideating and trying again. We have found the agility of learning and boldness we didn't have prior to this pandemic. God is moving and people both within the zip code of the church and beyond are hearing the Good News of Jesus from you. Thanks be to God!

Creating Congregations: the world is changing, and the church needs to look beyond the "traditional" ways of reaching new people for Christ and the attractional models of only expecting people to come to them. While traditional church starts and multi-site/satellite church plants are still very important (and we need more of them), they are also expensive and clergy centric as they start. We have begun teaching and dreaming about newer, more organic and less cost prohibitive ways to connect with those not attending local congregations like Fresh Expressions, Focused Worship in the community, and Intentional Faith Communities; while also leaving room for newer, not-yet-known ways we can join God in creative ways of reaching people. In October 2019, 24 of our clergy and laity teams attended the Exponential Conference in Houston, followed by a two day "Texas Planters" event co-sponsored by four UMC conferences in Texas. Out of that event, many of the churches are seeking new ways to collaborate and start new churches or new ministries in the community. The creating congregations office also held a Church Planting Discernment event where 10 folks explored their gifting and grit to start new congregations. I believe God will bless this time of discernment and we will see more seeking to plant in the future.

On a similar theme, Rev. Karen Horan was invited to teach a New Church Planting class in the fall at Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. This class was open to all APTS students and they allowed any clergy to audit the class. This time helps promote the need for planters to hear the call no matter the denomination.

I am excited that the 4 new church starts pastors appointed in June 2019 have now become 5 new congregations! FUMC Pflugerville will create a new congregation multiplying the Methodist witness in the East Pflugerville area. Rev. Aaron Carter will begin weekly worship for Assurance Church in the fall of 2020. Valley Praise UMC will also be launching a new satellite in McAllen in the fall of 2020 under the campus pastor, Rev. Kevin Hardin. This will be the third campus for Valley Praise UMC. Rev. Ray Altman (not pictured here) continues to do the deep work of creating intentional faith communities with New Wineskins in Leander. He is completing his first year of doing this ministry full time and has not only deepened AND expanded this work, but he has also found ways of sharing this edge ministry creatively across multiple platforms. Crestview UMC voted to become our first Legacy Church relinquishing responsibilities of leadership, property, and assets so that a church planter and team can transform the property, send an influx of people, reach the immediate community of the prior declining congregation, and start a new community. Rev. Jay Cooper and his team from Violet Crown City Church have begun both weekly worship (on-line) in April as well as the construction of the physical property. It is our prayer that most if not all of the legacy church faith community will choose to remain connected to the new faith community.

Finally, Austin New Church is also launching a new Hispanic Community called Amor Original with Pastor Cesar Soto. Cesar and his family moved here from Chile where had helped start new faith communities. We are excited that he began gathering so many people in February and started on line preview services in April.

Two more churches have chartered this annual Conference year: Hope Arise UMC in San Antonio chartered in June 2019 and Austin New Church chartered in February 2020.

Leadership Development:

There have been 4 seminaries visited to recruit interns to the Rio Texas Conference, followed by visits from the Bishop in many cases: Candler School of Theology, Wesley Theological Seminary, Perkins School of Theology and Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. From these continued relationships, we are planning (unless disrupted by covid19) to have 5 seminary interns: 1 from Perkins, 1 from Duke, 2 from Candler and 1 from Wesley Theological Seminary. These relationships have also produced short term classes (January term or spring break) being taught by Bishop Schnase and others from the Rio Texas Conference mainly at the border. Candler sent 24 in January 2020, APTS had a spring break trip planned, and Wesley and Perkins are planning a joint January 2021 class at the border. All of these connections help shape and develop future leaders of the United Methodist Church.

We also had 50 attend a preaching event in August 2019 with a second event scheduled in May 2020. These events were co-sponsored with Perkins School of Theology and Drs. Wes Allen and Alyce McKenzie. These events were open to all pastors as well as Lay Speakers/Servants and CLMs. Rio Texas also had two preaching cohorts who met for 10 months working on the craft of preaching. Dr. McKenzie worked with the bilingual cohort – both native Spanish speakers wanting to practice preaching more in English as well as native English speakers wanting to preach more in Spanish. Dr. Allen worked with the other cohort. Both groups studied together, preached for each other and shared life together. We hope to continue this model with Perkins next year (August-May).

Lay Servant Ministries: Scott Maderer is the Conference Lay Servant Ministry Director and offers this report.

Over the past several years the Lay Servant Ministries (LSM) program has, like so many of our church programs, had challenges and successes. Our current LSM conference committee has been active this year trying to identify new and different ways to work together so they can be the most effective and best laity training program in the Rio Texas Conference.

The Book of Discipline recognizes that to have effective ministry within our conference we must develop and encourage leadership from the laity; this is the explicit goal of LSM. The current district directors and conference lay director are working together with a focus on: Increasing communication and cooperation across all districts within the conference; Building effective tools that we can all utilize; Identifying new classes in both online and offline methodology; and Encouraging Lay Ministry, both in Lay Servants and Certified Lay Ministers, to be creative in identifying their own mission fields.

The District Directors are meeting regularly now via Zoom for a quarterly update so we can share effective methodology and information about upcoming courses and what we are all trying in our own districts. In this way we are seeing directors share information, learn best practices, and encourage and allow experimentation and new visions to arise in each district. We are still early in the process and have had many challenges and changes, but the team is committed to continuing in regular communication.

Each District continues to hold their own courses, but we are also working together to try to bring back effective conference lay ministry courses. At the same time, we are looking for what the needs of the laity are and identifying resources from a variety of sources that would fill those needs effectively. The focus is on building effective lay leadership, rather than just getting a "certification."

Within this larger picture we are anticipating an increased need for effective lay leadership within the conference. So, we are attempting to proactively work with those called to unique mission fields to provide the tools and resources that they need to be effective. This includes being more involved in the Certified Lay Ministry program and working closely across districts to effectively use limited resources to provide the needed support across the entire conference. In this way, districts don't have to reinvent the wheel or provide resources for a limited number of laity while they can still encourage the laity with support and training by working across districts within the full conference.

May God continue to bless and grow the lay leadership across the Rio Texas Conference.

College / Campus Ministry: Campus Ministry continues to thrive in the Rio Texas Conference. Eleven Campus Ministries are on ten campuses reaching almost one thousand students! Rev. Lizzie Wright and Rev. Wes Cain are coordinating the campus ministries along with Rev. Karen Horan in the conference center. Campus Ministers are connecting more regularly with each other, with their District Strategy Teams and submitting regular reports to the conference office. While this spring semester, with Covid19, threw all universities to online learning, your campus pastors have done a fantastic job staying connected in worship, prayer, study and even outreach as college students who don't all attend the same school can gather virtually to be connected to each other and Jesus Christ. There is still a need for individual churches to connect with students especially as they are home and going to school; so please stay connected to the campus ministers in your area. Rio Texas has campus ministry leadership at UT Austin – The Texas Wesley and University UMC Austin, UTSA via University UMC San Antonio, SAC and Trinity University via SA Campus Ministry staff and Rev. Valerie Vogt, TLU via FUMC Seguin, UTRGV Wesley Center, Texas State – United Campus Ministry, U of H Victoria, and Huston-Tillotson University. A slide show will be created and shared as we gather for Annual Conference.

Vitalizing Congregations:

Most of the work of vitalization has been via larger learning events at the district level as well as one-on-one work with congregations following up on what they learned in the last year or so. For example, after the initial Fresh Expressions Vision Day (Jan. 2019) and the Dinner Church Encounter (Oct. 2019) we have had some wonderful examples of new ways of reaching new people! While churches don't always report, the Las Misiones District has been gathering numbers and 20 churches have reported doing regular gatherings to connect relationally with new people in the last year. This includes Pub Theology, "Street Choir" gatherings (like a flash mob but of

singers who invite others to sing and pray with them), soccer camps for the community, and a variety of other events. FUMC Victoria started a dinner church and is rocking it.

Kyle UMC is also doing a great job with their dinner church.

Many other churches have also called upon Rev. Diana Phillips and Rev. Kendall Waller, in the conference office, to receive training on the Simplified Structure model of governance, on strategic planning for their boards, as well as having Rev. Karen Horan come and talk about how to reach new people.

Rev. Ray Altman started a cohort in the Capital District on reaching your neighbors and connecting in deep relational ways.

The Unstuck Group has also been working with some of our churches. To date we have had one church complete their Unstuck process (Pflugerville UMC) and one church in the midst of their process (Asbury UMC Corpus Christi) with one more church who will begin their process in August 2020 (St. John UMC Corpus Christi). The Unstuck Group does an intensive evaluation on why the church is "stuck" in a plateau or decline. Then they conduct a weekend training "on steroids" with clergy and 12 to 15 lay leaders. A quick paced timeline is created to jump start the church and move it over the next year into a church reaching new people in their immediate neighborhoods.

Finally, since Annual Conference last year, 11 churches were granted "New People, New Places" grants for a total of \$84,689. Of these 11 grants, 3 of the grants were for specifically reaching Latino Hispanic communities totaling \$31,000. Some of the grants were to reach new ways to serve the underserved; others were to reach apartment complexes and teach English. One grant was to a campus ministry teaching college students about leading worship in local congregations and on campus, others are bringing entire towns together ecumenically to a start a new worshiping community, while others reached out to the children in their mission field. What a joy to partner with this many churches as they reach new people to become more vital in their area! These grants are offered 3 times a year, we pray the funds can be used to the fullest.

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT FOR INFORMATION ONLY

Over 20 years ago Ron Heifetz and Donald Laurie wrote an article in *Harvard Business Review* titled "The Work of Leadership." I keep a one-page summary of this article posted near my desk as a reminder of "Technical Problems vs. Adaptive Challenges." It begins by saying that the single biggest failure of leadership is to treat adaptive challenges like technical problems. Let me repeat that: **The single biggest failure of leadership is to treat adaptive challenges like technical problems.** This, my friends, is one of the dangers we are facing in the world today. Let me explain.

Technical problems have these characteristics: 1) Easy to identify, 2) Often lend themselves to quick and easy solutions, 3) Often can be solved by an authority or expert, 4) Require change in just one or a few places – usually within organizational boundaries, 5) People are generally receptive to technical solutions, and 6) Solutions can often be implemented quickly – even by edict. However, on the other hand, Adaptive Challenges are a little more complex, with these characteristics: 1) Difficult to identify, yet easy to deny, 2) Requires changes in values, beliefs, roles, relationships, and approaches to work, 3) People with the problems do the work of solving it, 4) Require change in numerous places, usually crossing organizational boundaries, 5) People often resist even acknowledging adaptive challenges, and 6) "Solutions" require experiments and new discoveries; they can take a long time to implement and cannot be implemented by edict.

Yes, adaptive challenges take work, and cannot be treated like a technical problem. This year has been a year of adaptive challenges. COVID-19 shut down the world as it attacked our very soul. We mourn the loss of those that have died from this dreaded virus. We pray with those that have gotten sick and with families that are still grieving a loss because of the continued struggles with this pandemic. Addressing this situation is not a technical problem. It is one of the most complex adaptive challenges the church has ever faced. It has postponed Annual Conference meetings, General Conference, and Jurisdictional Conferences. Luckily it has not postponed ministry – for ministry has and will continue to happen – even flourish. Congregations have discovered new and innovative ways to worship and to reach out with the love of God. It has created new ways for congregations and the annual conference to conduct meetings. ZOOM meetings have become the norm, not the exception. I am encouraged at the various ways that ministries across our conference have expanded during this time. We had to become technically proficient almost overnight. Many congregations have adapted in how they live-stream their worship services. I am concerned that with all these changes some pastors are working in such a way that they are not taking time to recharge their soul. After all – "Dealing with a Pandemic 101" is not a seminary course. One of our adaptive challenges is finding new ways to care for and encourage each other – to reach out in love and ask Wesley's question "How is it with your soul?"

The Uniting Table met at the conference center on November 23, 2019, and via ZOOM on March 28, 2020 and May 6, 2020. At our November meeting we discussed and shared ways that Annual Conference would have a theme of "In Mission - In Loving: We Become the Word." We also wanted to do an on-site mission project. Well, one of our adaptive challenges is that those events were not able to happen as we had hoped, but we have still found ways throughout the conference to be in mission and to be loving, and in those actions we have become the Word. As our meetings progressed through the year, we discovered that we as an annual conference

were finding new ways to do and to be in ministry, and we were finding new ways to define faithfulness. Our congregations have remained faithful during this trying time.

As we continue to lead through this pandemic, I find the church to truly be loving and finding innovative ways to be in mission. During a time when we are divided on so many issues, from sexuality to race to politics, perhaps we can take an adaptive sigh or pause and remember these words in Jesus' prayer in John: "I will remain in the world no longer, but they are still in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them by the power of your name – the name you gave me – so that they may be one as we are one." (John 17:11, NIV) May we be one, that is my prayer.

DEPARTMENT OF TECHNICAL MINISTRIES

After years of dedicated service, Rev. Will Rice and Austin Newton left the Department of Communications and Media Ministries and the Rio Texas Conference office. Their dedication and service created the foundation of this department. It is a foundation that is respected, appreciated, and has allowed new staff members (supported by Sylvia Trevino) to pick up the important work that comes out of this department.

The conference office, like many churches, has departments focused on different areas of ministry and service. Each department serves an important purpose, connected to the overall mission of the conference, and yet working towards a specific aspect of that mission as defined by the department's scope of ministry. The Department of Communications and Media Ministries is unique in that a large part of its mission is to serve the departments within the conference office. This gives the department the privilege of being part of ministry done throughout the conference. The work done by the Department of Communications and Media ministries goes beyond communications work. To help share the full scope of the work done by this department, the department was renamed to the Department of Technical Ministries. The work of the department can be broken down into four sections. Communications, Technology, Design, & Audio/Video/Lighting (AVL).

In July of 2019, Jozlin Parker accepted the position of the Director of Communications and Media Ministries. This position was later renamed to Director of Technical Ministries. Andrew Bradley joined the department as the Assistant Director in October 2019. With two out of three Technical Ministries (TechMin) team members new to the conference office, a lot of time has been spent learning the ins and outs of conference work, but in the midst of getting settled, there have been various projects that have made significant contributions to the conference.

Technical Ministries has been tasked with the long-term goal of helping to consolidate and simplify the conference's hard and soft technological infrastructure. This long-term goal has been combined with movement towards a more collaborative environment both inside the conference office and with districts and churches. These goals have begun to touch everything from emails, to communications policy, to workflows, websites, databases, onsite hardware, user experience, and so on. Collaborative technologies allow churches to move their services online during a pandemic, allow clergy from all over the conference to join together and plan Annual Conference worship, and can help give a place at the table for people who might not have been heard before. While this work is just getting started, the TechMin Team has already saved thousands of dollars and countless hours of staff time.

The Technical Ministries Department has continued to maintain and facilitate the use of the Media Center, worked to help churches develop an online presence, and continues to run communications for the conference office. COVID-19 shifted 2020 plans for organizations all over the world. As the world returns to some semblance of normal, the TechMin Team hopes to create a network of Technical Ministers throughout the conference. This network's purpose would be to give space to technical ministers throughout the conference to share the creative ways they are using technology to serve their mission field. With connection and collaboration, technology can be used to further the mission of this conference.

RIO TEXAS CONFERENCE DISASTER RESPONSE COMMITTEE

The Disaster Response Committee continues to support the massive recovery effort remaining from Hurricane Harvey as well as flooding in the Rio Grande Valley but is committed to responding to new disasters that occur in the Conference. The past year has been relatively quiet but there was a major flood, for the second consecutive year, in the Rio Grande Valley and a small tornedo in San Angelo.

When disaster hits, Early Response Teams (ERT) are called to help with clean up. All ERT members are certified by UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) and must complete a day long training. This year 70 were trained bringing the total to 707. Many of these team members have received additional special training. These include: 78 chain saw operators, 43 skid steer operators, 83 site assessors, 45 team leaders, 12 advanced clean-up specialists and 15 on-site managers. The Rio Texas Conference is a national leader in on-line training making it more convenient for team members to get recertified (every three years) and to get specialized advanced training.

The Martinez Disaster Response Center continues to serve as a collection center for UMCOR kits assembled by churches in the Conference as well as storage for disaster response equipment. UMCOR now receives only school kits, hygiene kits, and cleaning kits

(flood buckets). The center serves as a collection site for all kits, but the main inventory is cleaning kits along with a small number of hygiene kits. In a turnaround from previous years, UMCOR shipped cleaning kits to the Kerrville facility because they were overstocked and we had space following shipments made to the valley flooding mentioned above. Limited volunteer opportunities are available at the center in Kerrville for groups to verify cleaning kits before they are delivered to flood survivors. Contact warehouse manager Jack Clarke at jack@jdc3.com for information about volunteer opportunities.

The Rio Grande Valley experienced major flooding in June 2018 and 2019. Through a \$500,000 grant from UMCOR, the Rio Texas Conference focused recovery efforts on mitigation for survivors of repeated flooding in colonias. Many homes have been flooded multiple times in the past ten years. Through the support of Roland Pecina, construction project manager, and Stephanie Villareal Gonzalez, disaster case manager, 57 survivors have been assisted, with ten survivors receiving commitments of financial support resulting in complete rebuilds of new homes that are raised above potential flood zones.

Through partnerships with AmeriCorps NCCC, Nomads RV Group, Mennonite Disaster Services, FUMC McAllen, the El Valle District and other volunteer groups significant rebuild progress has been made on nine of the ten homes. The Rio Texas Conference was also recognized as "Sponsor of the Round" by AmeriCorps due to the leadership and mentoring provided by Roland Pecina and the RTC staff. The impact of the Corona virus has severely impacted volunteer efforts and will impact the results of this grant scheduled to close in August 2020.

The Highland Lakes area of Burnet and Llano Counties experienced major flooding in October 2018. UMCOR made a \$100,000 grant to the Rio Texas Conference which allowed us to provide Case management services and financial support for repairs to damaged homes along the Llano and Colorado Rivers. This grant ended in January of 2020, impacting 63 survivors.

Hurricane Harvey recovery has been far and away the center piece of the Disaster Response Ministry since it struck in August 2017. Thanks to nearly five million dollars from UMCOR and participation in the FEMA funded Disaster Case Management Program (DCMP), the Conference has worked with over 1000 families living in 14 impacted counties in the Crossroads and Coastal Bend Districts. We are very proud and grateful for the locally hired case management and construction staff who have played a key role in serving and assisting so many hurricane survivors. As of April 1, 2020, the Conference has completed approximately 270 construction projects valued at \$5.6M that have included home repairs and replacements (mobile home, RV and complete rebuilds). It is noteworthy that Rio Texas Conference case managers have leveraged funding for repairs and home replacements from other funders for their clients in addition to the support provided by Rio Texas. Repairs and home replacements would not be possible if it were not for funds made available through Unmet Needs Tables sponsored by local long term recovery groups.

To date, the Rio Texas Conference has provided approximately \$4.6 Million dollars of financial assistance to meet the needs of Hurricane Harvey survivors case managed by Rio Texas, The Society of St Vincent De Paul, Victoria County Long Term Recovery Group, Coastal Bend Disaster Recovery Group, Catholic Charities, Lutheran Social Services and BCFS. Funds available at the tables are provided by gifts made to the Disaster Response Fund by individuals, churches, and UM Conferences. In addition, major gifts from UMCOR have been supplemented by grants to the Conference by the American Red Cross, Rebuild Texas, Bonneville Inc., and Kronkosky Foundation. Rio Texas case management and construction services will end May 31 with complete close out of the program by August 2020

UMCOR Sunday (formerly called One Great Hour of Sharing) is one of the six recognized church-wide Special Sundays with offerings of the United Methodist Church. Participation in the UMCOR Sunday offering is one of two basic requirements for Rio Texas Conference congregations wanting to achieve Five Star church status. (The other requirement is 100% payment of apportionments.) In 2019, the total UMCOR Sunday offering from Rio Texas churches was \$53,000.87, a decrease of \$14,594.66 from the amount collected in 2018.

TRANSFORMING COMMUNITIES VISION TEAM / OFFICE OF MISSION, SERVICE, AND JUSTICE MINISTRIES FOR INFORMATION ONLY

Since 2015, the Transforming Communities Vision Team has gathered twice annually striving to remember and rehearse the vision of the church's opportunity to transform communities. The vision team's charge is to support and learn from the ministries of mission, service, and justice within the Rio Texas Conference and as expressed through the UMC's 2016 Book of Discipline ministry portfolios of Global Ministries and Church & Society – paragraphs 629, 633, 654, 656, and 657 and outlined per Rule 5 RTC Standing Rules.

The vision team fosters relationships and dialogue with various entities reflecting the realms and ministries of mission such as Methodist Healthcare Ministries, Justice for Our Neighbors, Texas Impact, and Methodist Federation for Social Action.

Likewise, the Vision Team and the Office of Mission, Service, and Justice Ministries works with task teams and coordinators in the areas of:

- Processing of Mission Personnel and Itineration
- Conference Advance and the Five-Star Program
- Immigration / Migration Responses and Border Ministries
- Community Development through the Transformational Communities of Praxis Program
- Conference Disaster Response Committee

- Conference Volunteers-In-Mission Development Team
- Rio Texas Conference Harvest Sunday

CONNECTING TO THE MISSION FIELD

The conference 2019 statistical report reflects indicators of mission, service and justice ministries flowing from the local church. Below is reflection of these ministries conference-wide over the life of the Rio Texas Conference's five-year history.

Self-reported local church activity data reveal significant increase in the number of persons served by community ministries for outreach, justice, and mercy [Line 23] over the past five years from 677,004 in to 2015 to 986,992 in 2019. This possibly reflects the increased needs discovered in communities served through these critical ministries. To understand this specifically, the type of ministries and needs addressed would need to be qualified.

Regarding the number of persons from congregations serving in mission / community ministries [Line 22], we show an increase of 11,027 persons involved over five years. In 2017, 42,059 persons were involved, which is an increase of 16,801 persons from the prior year. Though not fully substantiated, it is believed that this dramatic spike in involvement could be due to volunteer response in various forms to Hurricane Harvey.

Increasingly, we are aware of the importance of being in ministry "with" the community versus carrying out ministry "to" the community and the importance of fostering ministry out of mutual relationships to transform communities and congregations respectively.

TRANSFORMATIONAL COMMUNITIES OF PRAXIS

Through continued funding from Methodist Healthcare Ministries of South Texas, Inc., the Transformational Communities of Praxis [TCOP] program, now in year 4, has trained ten church / community teams to engage in new methods and approaches for missional outreach leading to the development of community and congregation. During 2020, three more teams are being trained. TCOP is based on discovering, connecting, and building upon the gifts and assets that flow out of the relationships the church builds with its community neighbors – residents, organizations, and institutions; all working towards mutual transformation. Strategic learnings and early outcomes of TCOP garnered from interviews with 2017 and 2018 cohort participants indicated three early outcomes: 1.) changes within individuals, 2.) changes within congregations or partner ministries, and 3.) changes within the congregations' ministry context.

Regarding changes within individuals, several clergy reported changes in their own leadership that included an openness to partnerships with organizations outside the church, a mindset shift from seeing people-in-need as objects of mission work to seeing people as partners in mission, a new and deeper awareness of their ministry context, and a shift from a command-and-control style of leadership to a leader-as-facilitator style that releases gifts of congregants and community members and nurtures call. Several teams reported that new leaders have emerged as a result of TCOP participation. Most teams shared stories of connecting with new individuals and families in the community and providing concrete support. Story examples include: providing assistance with deferred yard maintenance and home painting, removal of head lice that was infesting a family and impacting the children's attendance at school, and hosting regularly scheduled times for the community to submit prayer requests. Most teams reported seeing an increase in the engagement of citizens in the well-being of their community. In one case, a person who had been the object of the church's charity was invited to join the mission team as a paid outreach person and now is the paid leader of a new project that grew out of TCOP participation called the Free Store.

Regarding changes within congregations or partner ministries, in several examples, the methods, practices and approaches of TCOP are being shared with others beyond the team that participated in the Learning Sessions. There are early efforts to equip congregants to be more relational, and less transactional, with neighbors of the church. An asset-based, relational approach is being shared with non-UMC churches, government, schools and nonprofits. In the large church setting, TCOP has been a catalyst for connecting the dots across ministries within the congregation, expanding existing ministries, and rethinking participation in community ministries that provide relief without a commitment to also address root causes. One church reported that the congregation had added members as a direct result of TCOP and the ways in which they have shifted from a needs-based mission approach to an assets-based approach in engaging with the community.

Regarding changes within the congregations' ministry context, every team reported a growing network of partnerships, an important driver of community well-being, that formed as a result of TCOP. The network of partners vary depending on context but include schools, police, health institutions, other churches, and social service agencies. Teams reported that their church is increasingly seen as a resource to the community. And, as the church is being called upon to be a partner in responding to local issues and concerns, the church is becoming more deeply imbedded in its community. Teams are seeing the behavior of some of their community partners change in positive and life-giving ways. For example, one small town reports that the police no longer issue citations to homeowners for blighted properties as their first response. Instead, they look to the church and its growing network of community partners to offer the homeowner assistance and a more restorative solution. In another town, a truant officer is connecting families to the church and its network of community partners to address some of the underlying household issues that prevent a child's attendance at school.

In summary, the key strategic learnings and outcomes are: identification of new leaders, new leadership skills and mindset shift for current leaders, existing transactional ministries are making efforts to become more relational, increased awareness of the church's ministry context that includes not just issues but also includes untapped community strengths, assets and resources, awareness of common ground (and a new common language) from which to build local partnerships for the well-being of the community.

Highlighted outcomes from Year 3 describes the findings from an end-of-year (2019) qualitative evaluation with TCOP Teams. The qualitative method used is based on the Most Significant Change story process. Members of the TCOP Design Team facilitated the interviews and analyzed the data. This same method was used in 2018 and results were noted across three domains: changes within individuals, changes within congregations, and changes within the community. The results of the 2018 evaluation led to the development of the Theory of Change. This Theory of Change is useful to for understanding the results of the 2019 evaluation. Much like 2018 and through the stories shared by the TCOP Teams in 2019, there continues to be evidence of the following outcomes: 1.) leadership capacity, 2.) relationships and collaborations, 3.) mindset shifts, and 4.) holistic care of neighbors.

Regarding <u>leadership capacity</u>, Bethel UMC - San Antonio (2019 Cohort) members reported growth in their own leadership abilities as a result of the TCOP core training. As they took their new skills and knowledge back to their church, they identified new leaders from

within the congregation (approximately 20) that had yet to be engaged with their church outside of Sunday morning worship. By the end of the year, these new individuals were participating in community outreach initiatives, and even starting a new one.

Regarding <u>relationships and collaborations</u>, First UMC - Poteet (2018 Cohort) reports a growing relationship with the City of Poteet. Monthly meetings have moved from church-sites to publicly owned spaces. The Mayor has participated in the meetings and one Asset-Based Community Development (ABCD) training. This has prompted the Mayor's interest in hosting a city-wide ABCD initiative in collaboration with the local TCOP Team. The city's new communications coordinator is actively building upon the assets and resources that the TCOP Team has been discovering and connecting by highlighting these in regular city-wide communications. Finally, several members of the growing TCOP initiative in Poteet have been asked to serve by the school superintendent on a school district committee.

Regarding mindset shifts, Gruene UMC - Gruene (2019 Cohort) reports a growing understanding of the difference between "doing ministry for" and "doing ministry with." They made a small change to an existing outreach ministry that has led to participants helping to deliver and shape the ministry in ways that are building community and creating a deeper sense of ownership in the ministry among the participants.

The fourth outcome that the TCOP initiative expects to see is holistic care of neighbors. Evidence of this outcome is strongest in stories shared by TCOP Teams that were part of the first cohort. It is perhaps because the first three outcomes (listed above) need to be in place before this fourth one is realized. First UMC - Eagle Pass (2017 Cohort) reports that in 2019 they were able to build upon their application of the principles and practices of TCOP during 2017-18. Using the assets they discovered, the gifts of the people in their community, and the relationships that they had nurtured, they built a holistic system of support and care for the asylum seekers coming to and through their community.

The TCOP Design Team expects to see evidence of the <u>Impacts</u> from the Theory of Change diagram (below) approximately 5-10 years after a team begins the TCOP core training. The stories shared in this year's evaluation show evidence that the first cohort is experiencing a more connected and cohesive community. "Connected" refers to social connections among residents, collaborating connections among institutions, and access to services that promote well-being. "Community Cohesion" refers to the social ties and community commitments that bind people together. The community feels a sense of interdependence and solidarity.

Regarding connected and cohesive communities, First UMC - Eagle Pass (2017 Cohort) cited as an example of holistic care of neighbors (above) was also a result of the cohesive community that is emerging in Eagle Pass as a result of responding to the rapidly growing need to care for the sojourning neighbors among them. This community used its strong social ties, its commitments to each other, and its shared commitment to a common goal to care for the sojourner and build the system of support mentioned above. Another example is First UMC - Brackettville (2017 Cohort) that shares stories of a growing neighborliness in the community. It is a neighborliness that grows out of the profound change in the quality of relationships in the community. The change in the quality of the relationships has been shifting alongside the growing sense of ownership the community has for a "third space" called Hope Center that is at the heart of the TCOP Team's work. The fact that the most significant change being recognized by this team is described as neighborliness is congruent with descriptions of a cohesive community.

Looking ahead to more impact, this year's evaluation illuminates a readiness among several of the teams to bring more intentionality to: 1.) more of the community in decision-making and 2.) creating a shared vision and plan for collective community action. In late 2019, the TCOP Design Team began to develop a new offering that will be used to support these teams in 2020 as they journey toward deeper community transformation. At the same time, the TCOP Design Team will continue to develop new TCOP Teams, coach existing teams, and offer customized on-sight support as needed. In concluding year 3, the TCOP program elements are in place, tested and refined. There is much excitement to move into the next phase of TCOP, supporting the TCOP Teams for greater impact in their communities.

Kinney County Coalition Initiative Emerges

Kinney County, Texas is a border county with 3,800 residents. Brackettville, the county seat town has 1,740 residents. Over the past six years or so, Hope Outreach Center, a community extension ministry of First UMC Brackettville has served as a connector of various social services to the needs of residents.

Prior to the birth of Hope Outreach, the church connected and worked with residents on improving and weatherizing their homes. It was through those interactions that the church began to hear their neighbors' and new-found friends' concerns. Over time, understanding the socio-economic, health, education, and employment concerns of the community, it has become increasingly apparent and pressing to work towards adequate responses.

In 2017, a team from FUMC / Hope Outreach became part of the initial learning cohort in the conference's community development program – *Transformational Communities of Praxis* www.tcopraxis.org. The deeper community development work is now in motion. Through the convening of the church, community residents, local government officials, and people of faith, residents are coming together to envision the transformational development of Kinney County.

In November 2019, about 30 residents came together to envision some actions they could take over time to strengthen their community as well as reflecting on what the holistic well-being of the community might look like [Shalom – Jeremiah 29:7]. The gathering was also a means of measuring the will of the community to embrace the development of a county-wide coalition to embrace the long-term sustainability of the vision.

Now in 2020, the Kinney County Coalition began gathering in January to garner the skill-set and mind-set of organizing and mobilizing the community for sustainable and measurable change. The coalition is conducting one to one listening conversations with 10% of the county's residents. The data gathered will determine the priorities, projects, immediate and long-term goals, and resident interests and commitments in participating and collaborating in seeking the Shalom of Kinney County.

IMMIGRATION RESPONSE AND BORDER MINISTRIES - 450 Miles of Border

2019 was a pivotal year for immigration response and border ministries within the Rio Texas Conference. Global migration and various push factors is an ever-present reality. Our mission context calls us to ministries of presence and relationships along 450 miles of the U.S. / Mexico border, and not solely as U.S. Methodist, but bi-nationally working with the Methodist Church of Mexico.

Migrants seeking asylum has been a growing reality in our midst since the arrival of unaccompanied minors in 2014 and our hospitality responses to Cubanos in Nuevo Laredo in 2017. During 2019, our humanitarian response and systems of support have grown sharper as the flow of migration increases. Ministries on the border are in conversation and in coordination with one another and with the ministry responses in San Antonio, the point of departure for migrants travelling to unite with family members in various parts of the country, where they will stay awaiting their asylum petition court date.

As the *Remain in Mexico* migrant response policy, also known as Migrant Protection Protocols [MPP], has now become fully enacted, this requires those seeking asylum to be in a holding pattern in makeshift camps on the Mexican side of the border. As this has resulted in low numbers of asylum seekers crossing into the U.S., the response and support systems that have evolved and strengthen throughout this year responding to and receiving migrants arriving in the U.S. is now finding ways to be supportive to response ministries on the border in Mexico providing food, clothing, and medical support there.

Now, COVID-19 poses another level of concern. U.S. persons helping in Mexican border migrant camps such as in Matamoros are now unable to cross over daily or weekly as doing so is considered to be non-essential.

Border Convocation...Continuing the Conversation

September 20 & 21, 2019, approximately 115 persons participated in this pivotal event designed as time and space for practitioners and learners involved in offering migrant humanitarian response and asylum seeker and immigration advocacy to connect and share concerns and practices.

Practitioners involved in direct responses to arriving migrants provided updates to what is happening at points of the 450 miles of border in our dual mission field – Acuña / Del Rio, Piedras Negras / Eagle Pass, Nuevo Laredo / Laredo, Reynosa / McAllen, and Matamoros / Brownsville. The legal challenges were presented by the Justice for Our Neighbors community, particularly the impacts of the Remain in Mexico policy on the asylum-seeking community. Church and Society mobilized the gathering community to on-the-spot writing of letters to be presented to legislators in Washington, D.C. expressing concerns for current policies impacting asylum-seekers seeking refuge from harsh and violent circumstances faced in their countries of origin.

The points of the border stories shared reflected how the roll out of the Remain in Mexico policy implementation took effect earlier in Brownsville, McAllen, and Laredo and later in Eagle Pass and Del Rio throughout 2019. The reports of response in the lower Rio Grande border points reflected ministry responding to migrant community needs in Matamoros and Nuevo Laredo, whereas in Eagle Pass and Del Rio, migrant / asylum seekers were still coming across having been processed by Customs and Border Patrol (CBP). Therefore, crossing numbers in the lower Rio Grande valley sector were dropping while the numbers in the Eagle Pass / Del Rio area were increasing.

In late March, a large influx of migrants / asylum seekers began arriving steadily to San Antonio, many coming from various countries other than Honduras, El Salvador, and Guatemala as the norm. This moved the City of San Antonio to establish the Migrant Resource Center to process the high increase of arriving sojourners. The resource center coordinated connections and travel fares for those processed by CBP while the Interfaith Welcome Coalition continued to offer hospitality and travel orientation to persons released by ICE from the Dilley, Pearsall, and Karnes detention centers. Travis Park provided overnight sheltering for persons needing more time to coordinate travel to their sponsoring destinations within the U.S. A well-coordinated threefold response emerged within two square blocks in downtown San Antonio.

During 2019, the Interfaith Welcome Coalition distributed 25,577 travelling backpacks. Over eight months, 22,053 persons slept at Travis Park Church. The Migrant Resource Center through coordinated city resources facilitated 83,336 meals served and 2,536 medical assessments. Likewise, countless resources have been expended through our hospitality points in Del Rio, Eagle Pass, Laredo, McAllen, and Brownsville.

The gathering diversely reflected the presence and input of various Rio Texas Conference leaders, direct response practitioners through the Methodist Border Friendship Commission reflecting leaders from the Rio Texas Conference and the Eastern Conference of the Methodist Church of Mexico, the Justice for Our Neighbors community, representatives from neighboring UMC conferences, and various agencies - Texas Methodist Foundation, Methodist Healthcare Ministries, Interfaith Welcome Coalition, City of San Antonio, Texas Impact, Texas American Civil Liberties Union, General Board of Global Ministries / UMCOR Global Migration, General Board of Church & Society, and National JFON.

Since the Border Convocation, the conversation has continued via monthly webinars and border update sessions conducted via ZOOM on the 3rd Tuesday monthly at 10:45 am Central. Next Steps

In December the <u>Texas Border Collaboration Network</u> was born out the Interfaith Welcome Coalition, Texas Impact, Rio Texas Conference border ministry leaders, Justice for Our Neighbors, and various ecumenical and community partners engaged in border responses coming together in conversation to envision a network that coalesces the efforts of ministries and organizations on both sides of the border from El Paso / Juarez to Brownsville / Matamoros supporting migrant / asylum seeker communities. The newly formed network seeks to coordinate efforts bi-nationally in the areas of direct services, legal support, hospitality connections, and advocacy for the migrant / asylum seeking community. Immediate goals are to develop a database of organizations connected to coordinate support responses.

GOLDEN AGE HOME CELEBRATES ITS 60TH ANNIVERSARY IN 2020

On November 15, 1960, Golden Age Home opened its doors to accept senior adults into the home. The home was a dream turned into realty for a group of men and women of the Methodist Churches of the Austin District. For four years this dedicated group worked to establish Golden Age Home not only as a physical structure and legal corporation but also as "the place for companionship, peace and comfort with independence."

Golden Age Home was one of many homes that were part of the Methodist program, Homes for Older Persons. To develop these homes, responsible, devoted individuals in church and community gave freely of their time and energy, through creative leadership, talent and money to these buildings and operations. Some were only lightly related to the Church but sponsorship by the Church assured stability, integrity, permanence, and responsible trusteeship.

One original brochure stated, "those without families will come and find those who care for them as though they were their own. Those who have few friends, are lonely or in sorrow, will find here sympathy and love." And so, more than 5,000 people have become part of the Golden Age Home family during the past 60 years. Some of those members where employees while others resided within the walls, but all found a place that has stayed true to its mission "to provide excellent, quality service to older adults in a Christian environment."

At the beginning of 2020, we began a program an intergenerational program. This program included hosting a Music Together class with preschool children, a reading mentorship program at one of the local elementary schools and volunteering at the local food pantry along with many more events planned. While those programs are currently on hold, they brought great joy to all involved and we look forward to restarting them in the fall.

Already this year of 2020, there have been increased costs and a decreased ability for normal resident activities. Social activity is very important for individuals who are isolated from friends and family. We have implemented 'outside the box' visitation procedures that not only provide protection, but also help our residents combat the added loneliness that has come with the current health crisis. It is always our goal to provide our residents with comfort and peace of mind. Our dedicated team has stepped-up to ensure our residents are receiving the extra care physically, mentally, socially and spiritually needed to de-stress during this time of decreased outings and visitation.

From Golden Age Home's conception, there was a giving fund set up to minister to people who are unable to pay the full cost of living in the Home. Golden Age Home received its nonprofit status in 1964 which it continues to operate under today. Golden Age Home is dedicated to keeping its cost affordable. In the late 90's, a grant from TDCHA was secured allowing GAH to designate 16 rooms of the Assisted Living to those needing subsidized housing. 20 years later, GAH continues to seek grants and donations through private foundations, churches, businesses and individuals to keep this program in operation.

Currently, the Board of Directors is comprised of 10 members. These members are men and women from Lockhart, Luling, Seguin, Kyle and Elgin area. This diverse group remains 90% from the Methodist churches. Our generous board members continually provide time, expertise, advice, and available donations to further our mission.

This fall, Golden Age Home will host a public celebration for its 60th anniversary. At this time, we are seeking stories, photos and other general information from the public of those who have been involved in any way with this ministry during the last 60 years. At that time, I received the privilege of leading an agency that was already strong in its governance, financial practices, outcome measurements, and overall transparency and accountability. Based on my experiences overseeing the MCH fundraising efforts for the past 17 years before becoming president, I know how important these things are for benefactors and supporting churches as they evaluate potential beneficiaries of their financial support.

As you read this report, our hope is that you will celebrate the proven ways MCH has positively influenced lives this past year. We also ask you to join with us in thinking about how we can continue to expand the impact of our ministry throughout Texas and New Mexico. I am grateful for the many prayers, gifts and actions that brought about these great accomplishments for those in our care.

These areas of strength speak to the current health of the organization and also provide MCH with the foundation to immediately begin exploring ways to increase the effectiveness and reach of services and programs that can make a difference in the lives of children, youth and families. I see the task of leading this effort as a personal calling and a responsibility of this ministry based on the level of faithful support we receive from our supporters. I commit to you that this endeavor will receive my best effort and involve many diverse voices, all of which will be committed to reaching the high standards of our legacy and mission.

This year, we launched a new strategic plan that is appropriately named, "Building on a Strong Foundation." I look forward to how this plan will affirm, challenge and move us forward. I know that it is possible because of the great work that has occurred at MCH since 1890 and because of the promise God offers to equip MCH to do more for those we serve in Texas and New Mexico.

Guided by our core values of Christian Principles, Relationships, Responsibility, Growth, Service, and Hope, MCH provides the care, programs and talented individuals needed to positively impact the lives of children, youth and families. This is happening every day in residential programs as well as through 13 MCH Family Outreach offices, including San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

Here are some of the things you helped MCH accomplish for God's glory and those we serve:

- Completed construction of the fourth and fifth new homes on our Waco campus as part of the Building Hope campaign. The Nancy R. Bowen and B.R. & Helen Greathouse homes are new state-of-the-art homes designed with the unique needs of the children we serve today in mind coupled with our trauma-informed research and modern efficiencies. Additionally, we have completed funding that will build the sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth homes.
- Served 205 children and youth through our campus programs in Waco; 5,684 children and their families through MCH Family Outreach programs; and 174 young adults through Transition Services.
- Students participated in multiple mission trips, including U.M. ARMY, leadership camps and other community service projects.
- Achieved designations of the Gold Seal of Transparency from Guidestar and a four-star charity rating from Charity Navigator.
 Less than 1 percent of nonprofits listed on Guidestar have achieved the Gold level. These designations recognize our commitment to excellence and efforts to conduct our work with the utmost integrity and transparency.
- Graduated 25 seniors from high school and supported 85 MCH alumni pursuing higher education at community colleges, trade schools or four-year institutions. At the writing of this report, we are preparing for seven MCH Alumni to graduate with a degree or certificate from an institute of higher learning in the spring of 2020.

The gracious support of the Rio Texas Conference resulted in an 87.52 percent investment of the asking to the Africa University Fund apportionment in 2019. Thank you for your ongoing prayers and gifts. They are seeds of hope and abundance sown close to home, in sub-Saharan Africa and around the world.

The generosity of the Rio Texas Conference enables Africa University to educate and nurture leaders who think for themselves, are contextually relevant and have a passion to serve. Since opening in 1992, Africa University has equipped more than 9,000 graduates who lead and serve across sub-Saharan Africa and beyond. These young people are creative and responsive in serving the needs of their communities.

Institutional Update:

- Africa University has an annual enrollment of more than 2,800 students, with 25-30 African nations represented in the student body each year.
- The university's three colleges operate as centers for teaching, research, innovation, community engagement and enterprise development. Africa University leads as the only university in Zimbabwe accredited to offer online degree programs.
- Students, faculty and alumni contribute ground-breaking solutions to Africa's current challenges with interventions that include

 military chaplains in Africa.
- Infrastructure improvements include increasing the use of solar energy on the university's main campus with the support of the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church. Both buildings are gifts to Africa University from the Dallas, Texas-based Highland Park United Methodist Church.

CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Since our founding in 1914, Candler School of Theology at Emory University has educated more than 10,000 students, shaping thoughtful, principled, and courageous leaders who are dedicated to transforming the world in the name of Jesus Christ.

This is especially important to note amid the current shifts in our denomination. It is an honor and a privilege for Candler to be one of 13 official seminaries of The United Methodist Church. Yet true to the Methodist tradition of ecumenical openness, Candler has enthusiastically welcomed the entire Wesleyan family to our community for generations. Faculty, staff, and students from the AME Church, the AMEZ Church, the CME Church, Free Methodists, Nazarenes, and others have worked, worshiped, learned, and prayed alongside United Methodists, and have been a vital part of shaping Candler and our mission. This diversity has been a wonderful gift and a rich blessing. As we move forward, we will continue to invite and welcome those from all expressions of the Wesleyan tradition. Indeed, we will continue to welcome all those who follow Jesus Christ.

This year, Candler has continued to strengthen our deep commitment to alleviating student debt and promoting financial literacy. In 2018-2019, we awarded \$6.3 million in financial aid, with 100 percent of master of divinity (MDiv) students receiving support and financial coaching.

In fall 2019, we announced a major expansion of our financial aid program to include full-tuition scholarships for all MDiv students who are certified candidates for ordained ministry in The United Methodist Church, and new merit scholarships covering 75% of tuition for qualifying MDiv students who identify as pan-Wesleyan, and those pursuing chaplaincy through Candler's new chaplaincy concentration. In addition, all incoming students in the master of divinity, master of theological studies, and master of religious leadership programs will receive awards covering at least 50% of tuition.

This year also saw the launch of two pilot "formation communities," off-campus student housing that focuses on intentional living and spiritual formation. Students from multiple degree programs applied to take part in these pilot groups. At the start of the year, the housemates created a "rule of life" to guide their days together, emphasizing prayer, fellowship, and celebration. A house chaplain—a Candler faculty member or church leader—supports them and shares in the journey. The ten students who took part this year describe feeling a richer sense of community and deeper connections to God and one another in the midst of their busy lives. It is clear that this fulfills a need for our seminarians, and we eagerly anticipate the program's growth in the coming years.

Candler's student body continues to reflect the diversity and breadth of the Christian faithful, with an enrollment of 470 from 12 countries and 38 states, with 40 percent people of color (U.S.) and a median age of 27 among MDivs. Students represent 42 denominations, with 45% of all students and 50% of MDivs coming from the Methodist family.

We offer six single degrees and ten dual degrees pairing theology with bioethics, business, international development, law, public health, and social work. Our Doctor of Ministry degree is 90 percent online, so students can remain in their places of ministry while completing their degrees.

Candler draws strength and inspiration from its relationship with The United Methodist Church. Our ability to fulfill our mission of educating faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries throughout the world depends upon your prayers, partnership, and support. DUKE UNIVERSITY DIVINITY SCHOOL

Dean L. Gregory Jones, Dean of the Divinity School and Ruth W. and A. Morris Williams Jr. Distinguished Professor of Theology and Christian Ministry, had his term as dean extended for a full five years through 2023.

The Duke Endowment awarded Duke Divinity School a \$12 million grant in support of DDS's three core priorities and traditions: Thriving communities enlivened by healthy congregations and gifted pastors, embodied wisdom through rigorous intellectual vitality, and creative institutions that inspire imaginative and transformative leadership including the Thriving Communities Fellowship program, which will provide 52 new full-tuition scholarships over the next four years.

Duke Divinity School launched the Duke Divinity: Black Pastoral Leadership Collaboration which will draw on original research in Black church traditions and historical examples of effective Black church leadership to train and build networks of effective leaders for the Black church of today and the future. The collaboration will be led by the Rev. David Emmanuel Goatley, research professor of theology and Black church studies and director of the Office of Black Church Studies at Duke Divinity School.

In 2019, Duke Divinity School welcomed 215 new students from 33 different states and seven other countries, including Canada, Malaysia, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand and Zimbabwe. The Master of Theological Studies (M.T.S.) and Master of Arts in Christian Practice (M.A.C.P.) degree programs received record enrollments of 35 students and 22 students respectively. The Master of Theology (Th.M., 14 students), Doctor of Ministry (D.Min., 20 students), and Doctor of Theology (Th.D., 4 students) all had strong enrollment. The D.Min. program was named the top online program by TheBestSchools.org. Duke Divinity's new Certificate in Theology and Health Care will enroll 8 students, all of whom are fellows with the Theology, Medicine, and Culture (T.M.C.) Initiative at the school. The M.T.S. program also includes 8 students who are T.M.C. fellows, for a record year of 16 total fellows. The M.Div. degree program gained 110 new students, with minority students comprising more than 32 percent of the incoming M.Div. class, and Black students comprising 18 percent of the incoming M.Div. class. Female students made up 44 percent of incoming M.Div. students, while males were 56 percent. There were 24 denominations represented in the M.Div. entering class, with 42 percent affiliated with The United Methodist Church.

Two new faculty members, Brent Strawn and Brett McCarty, joined the DDS faculty in July 2019. Strawn, Professor of Old Testament, is an ordained elder in the North Georgia Conference. Strawn has a secondary appointment as a Professor of Law at Duke University School of Law. Prior to joining the Duke faculty, Strawn taught at Candler School of Theology at Emory University for eighteen years.

McCarty, Assistant Research Professor of Theological Ethics, is a theological ethicist whose work centers on questions of faithful action within health care. He is associate director of the Theology, Medicine, and Culture Initiative at Duke Divinity School, and he holds a joint appointment in the School of Medicine's Department of Population Health Sciences.

Randy Maddox, William Kellon Quick Professor of Wesleyan and Methodist Studies, general editor of the Wesley Works Editorial Project, and elder in the Dakotas Conference, retires at the end of the 2019-2020 academic year.

United Methodist faculty member Brittany Wilson received tenure and promotion to the rank of Associate Professor.

Tito Madrazo joined the administrative leadership of the Divinity School as Senior Strategist for the Hispanic House of Studies. He will also serve as a consulting faculty member.

The Hispanic-Latino/a Preaching Initiative is currently in its fifth year of providing high quality theological education to current and aspiring Hispanic-Latino/a ministers. 21 students from multiple denominations are taking courses with us this year.

The Duke Endowment has also awarded Duke Divinity School a grant of \$5.5 million over five years to cultivate meaning and purpose across diverse professional schools at Duke. The Lilly Endowment has also awarded grants to Duke Divinity School to coordinate initiatives on "Thriving in Ministry" and "Thriving Congregations" across the United States.

Duke Divinity School has a partnership with Huntingdon College and Virginia Wesleyan University to create streamlined admissions process and private campus events in order to better equip students from those institutions with a calling to serve the church. In an effort to expand access for quality theological formation to students, pastors, and lay leaders in the Nashville Episcopal Area, DDS is also partnering with the Turner Center at Martin Methodist College to offer theological training for innovative and entrepreneurial ministries.

HUSTON-TILLOTSON UNIVERSITY MISSION

Huston-Tillotson University supports the Rio Texas Conference through our mission to provide the University's diverse student body with an exemplary education that is grounded in the liberal arts and sciences, balanced with professional development, and directed to public service and leadership through our mission of nurturing "a legacy of leadership and excellence in education, connecting knowledge, power, passion, and values."

HT transforms lives through a dynamic educational experience that values academic excellence and spiritual growth while cultivating democracy and community through outreach and engagement. HT leverages resources to enhance our competitive future in the areas of organizational effectiveness, funding, technology, and industry partnerships. We achieve our mission through the diversity of our student body, opportunities for spiritual growth and civic engagement, and the global perspective of our educational programs.

The core values of HT are represented by IDEAL: *Integrity* (we believe in honesty, sincerity, and responsibility), *Diversity* (we recognize and value the differences that enrich our educational environment), *Excellence* (we are committed to the highest standards of expectation and achievement), *Accountability* (we believe in taking responsibility for our actions and outcomes), *Leadership* (we set an example and provide an environment that cultivates tomorrow's leaders).

UNIVERSITY PROFILE

Enrollment

Huston-Tillotson University recorded 1121 students enrolling in the fall of 2019. Segmentation of our student population by gender reveals an important factor regarding male enrollment. Our overall student population consisted of 415 males (37%) and 706 females (63%). The first-year, first-time freshmen population consisted of 93 males (45.6%) and 111 females (54.4%). Segmentation of our student population by gender reveals an important factor regarding male enrollment. Many universities report fewer male student enrollments; our first-year, first-time freshmen population is continuing a nearly equally balanced population.

The racial/ethnic composition of our student population is as follows: Black, non-Hispanic – 64.6%.; Hispanic – 26.3%; White, non-Hispanic – 4.7%; Nonresident Alien – 2.1%; Native American – 0.5%; Asian/Pacific Islander – 0.5%; Multiracial – 0.6%; Unreported – 0.6%.

Faculty

The fall of 2019, the University employed 43 full-time faculty members and 46 part-time faculty members. The race/ethnic composition of the faculty is as follows: Hispanic -9.0%; White, non-Hispanic -24.7%; Asian/Pacific Islander -3.4%; Black, non-Hispanic -27.0%; Nonresident Alien -4.5%; unknown -31.5%. Thirty-three members of our full-time faculty, 76.7%, have a terminal degree in their teaching field.

PRESIDENTIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT ACTIVITIES

Huston-Tillotson University's success is a result of discoveries, visions, and insights made 145 years ago. When George W. Richardson founded Samuel Huston College in Dallas, Texas, at St. Paul's Methodist Church with six scholars; and Jeffrey Tillotson founded Tillotson Collegiate and Normal Institute in Austin, Texas, they could only imagine the possibilities. Today, Huston-Tillotson University takes pride in several accomplishments, including its leadership in sustainability efforts.

Huston-Tillotson University celebrated 145 years of providing access to higher education during the Charter Day Convocation celebrating the merger of Samuel Huston College and Tillotson College into Huston-Tillotson University. The program included alumnus Rev. G. V. Clark, the HT Concert Choir, the Elite Combo, and the recognition of top-ranking students.

Huston-Tillotson University Day at Wesley United Methodist Church was a day of discovery, recognition, and celebration for Huston-Tillotson University with music provided by the HT gospel choir. Members of Wesley United Methodist Church invited the community to their annual Huston-Tillotson University Day. The HT Concert Choir joined with the Church choir. Huston-Tillotson University was once housed in the basement of Wesley.

The HT student may be the first in his or her family to attend college, part of a legacy family with more than five generations of graduates, a local Austin resident, or a student who has traveled thousands of miles to reach the campus. That HT student was likely referred by alumni and had several college acceptances letters from which to choose. Internships or overseas travel are just two of the opportunities afforded students. Whether attending HT as part of the William Edward Burghardt DuBois Honors Program, Freshmen First Year Experience, as an athlete in one of the sports programs, or recruited as a musician for the jazz ensemble or vocalist with the concert choir, the HT experience is uniquely highlighted for success. Accountability, responsibility, spiritual development, service-learning and supportive relationships are the hallmarks of the HT experience.

Institutional Advancement

The Institutional Advancement Department has been actively involved in the following:

- Building a development plan that aligns with the transitions associated with COVID19 and filling the donor pipeline to eliminate the funding gap.
- · Implemented a billboard campaign to promote and support student enrollment
- Creation of a Virtual Book Club model for our major corporate donors to build community and create a shared responsibility model around social justice.
- Launching of a COVID19 Support Fund to encourage the community, stakeholders, and donor base to invest in the university
 whilst navigating a pandemic
- Creating a technology support campaign with the COVID19 Support Fund to obtain computers for new and returning students

Hiring new staff in key departmental positions to carry out the work the work of the department

Campus Improvements

Over the past five years, Huston-Tillotson University worked aggressively to achieve the goals of its Master Plan and to manage deferred maintenance issues throughout the campus. Specifically, the plan called for ensuring the safety, security, accessibility, and appeal of the campus and its facilities. The campus has completed the fencing project to ensure safety and security for faculty, staff, and students. New lighting and signage throughout the campus helps with the identification of the campus and its interior structures. Classrooms buildings have been painted, floors stripped and polished, seating and desk replaced and new whiteboards and audiovisual instructional equipment. Faculty have been equipped with 21st Century technology and instructional tools to manage the teaching and learning environment both face to face and online.

Classroom space and offices in the Branch Memorial Gymnasium has been renovated along with new fitness and instructional equipment. The main gymnasium floor was replaced, and a new roof has been installed on the building. New entrance doors and bathrooms along with a new score board and protective padding has given the building an updated presence on the campus.

There are two residential halls on the Huston-Tillotson campus. Both facilities had significant needs relative to repairs. Thanks to GHEMB funding, we were able to repair and upgrade showers and bathroom facilities in both buildings. These improvements lead to the Universities ability to fill both facilities for the first time in many years with student occupancy.

The King-Seabrook Chapel has been equipped with a state-of-the-art audio-visual system and furniture replaced on the stage. We are aggressively seeking support to replace seating in the chapel. Several buildings have been power-washed on the campus.

The student parking lot has been paved, painted and security gates installed. Numerous other upgrades to the campus including the student union, admissions office, and Institutional Technology Center. Entrance gates have been installed at all campus entrances. And a new marker identifying the campus has been built on the front side of the campus to increase recognition and visibility.

COVID-19 Impact

The University was and continues to manage the impact of COVID-19 on its students, faculty, staff, and overall operations. We have aggressively sort and received funds from various sources. We are particularly grateful for the support provided by the United Methodist Church, Division of Higher Education, Black College Fund, for the generous Emergency funds provided. We are so grateful and be it known that they were the first to step up to the plate to support the University.

Our administration, faculty and staff have worked diligently to seek out funding opportunities and make personal contributions to assist the university in this extremely critical period in our history. We were able to secure funds to provide laptops for each of our students enrolled in the Fall 2020 and all who indicated that they needed assistance during the Spring 2020. Not only were we able to provide laptops, but for those who had needs for Wi-Fi connections, we were able to assist. We continue to raise funds and to seek funding for continued needs as we are still operating remotely during the Fall 2020 academic semester.

Apple Partnership

The Office of the President and CEO has established a partnership with Apple, Inc. This partnership had generated significant resources for the University and is facilitated by Dr. Jennifer Miles, as the Grant Manager and Project Lead through the University's Center for Academic Innovation and Transformation (CAIT). The initiative consists of several components which are outlined below.

Professional Development

The HT Golden Apple Teachers initiative is a robust enrichment program, that aims to enhance the research, professional development, and innovative performance of forward-thinking undergraduate students. This program is designed to inspire and support innovation in teaching and learning, through the incorporation of Apple Teacher resources that impact instructional technology, research, service, and improvement in student engagement.

Nine faculty members were selected for the first cohort of Golden Apple Teachers. They are Mr. Tommy Mouton (English), Dr. Samuel Rowley (Music), Ms. Eileen Slaton (Mathematics), Ms. Shawanda Stewart (English), Mrs. Hoda Tavakoli (Mathematics), Dr. Wenxian Tan (biology). Eight of these Golden Apple Teachers had earned their Apple Teacher Certification.

Seven faculty submitted proposals and were accepted into the CAIT2 Coding Academy. The goal is to engage faculty to bring coding, creativity, and community connected learning experiences to Huston-Tillotson University. Through multiple training academies, these educators will receive support to guide a small student-group team to develop an app prototype to help solve a real-world issue. Each team will present their work during the CAIT2 Coding Academy Community App Showcase scheduled for April 8, 2021. Faculty will also work to implement a plan to integrate coding into their academic programs using Everyone Can Create and Everyone Can Code, and build curriculum based on iOS Intro to App Development and iOS App development with SWIFT. Faculty currently involved in this initiative are Mr. Dayron Bowers (Business), Dr. Carlos Cervantes (Kinesiology), Dr. Farzana Hussain (Mathematics), Dr. Amanda Masino (Biology) Dr. Karen Magid (Sustainability), Dr. Samuel Rowley (Music), Mrs. Shawanda Stewart (English), and Dr. Jennifer Miles, Director.

Technology & Innovation

Working to transform state-of-the-art technology both in and out of the classroom, Apple has provided hardware to support the creation of two new MAC Labs. This includes over 50 iMacs, 2 Apple TV's, and 60 iPads. These labs serve all students, with emphasis placed on two new academic programs: The African American Male Techer Initiative (Education reparation) and Green Apple Fellows Program (Environmental Justice). In addition, Apple donated Apple Watches and iPhone SE to support student research efforts housed within the Green Apple Fellows Program.

Capital Improvement

Through Apple's global initiative, MLK Day of Service, the company supported the renovation of five spaces on campus: The Business Office Suite, The Center for Academic Excellence (CAE Main Office, CAE Writer's Studio, CAE Math Lab, and the new Green Apple Fellows Lab. On January 20, over 121 Apple employee volunteers. Under the direction of Give to Get, made improvements to facilities, and installed new furniture.

Scholarships

Huston-Tillotson University has recently been awarded a Certificate of Commendation from the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for Exemplary Performance. This commendation from TEA highlights specifically the work the University has done related to preparing African American teacher candidates. African American males comprise less than 2% of all educators nationally. HT has a goal to certify at least 25 African American males as classroom teachers by the year 2025. This Apple partnerships provides funding to supports the institutions desire to achieve this goal with Scholarship to cover tuition, fees, room and board for these scholars.

The Apple Diversity & Inclusion Scholarship program was established to empower student of color to reach their career goals in the business, computer science, and mathematics fields. Selected HT students will receive up to \$5,000 in scholarship money from Apple, Inc. for the 2020-21academic year. These awards are granted based on the strength of each candidate's impact on diversity, demonstrated leadership, financial need. And academic background.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Student Development

The W.E.B. DuBois Honors Program experience is one that offers students both exceptional academic and extracurricular opportunities. These opportunities are designed for students (of all majors) who are intellectually curious, capable, and interested in making the most of their time at Huston-Tillotson University.

W.E.B. DuBois Honors Program managed and participated in the Third Annual Diversity Hackathon on HT's campus, come March 11 + March 12, 2017. The event's mission is to assist millennials of color in recognizing that they can be more than consumers of technology—they too can be creators, innovators, and disruptors of tomorrow's technology. The Hackathon served as an information and social capital conduit connecting talent-seeking companies to 75 phenomenal Millennials of Color.

The 14th Annual DuBois Lecture series is organized by Honors Program staff and students. The program brings outstanding and inspiring speakers to the HT campus.

The Center of Academic Excellence

In the Center for Academic Excellence (CAE), we are committed to the highest standard of expectation and achievement. We help create and sustain a clear, coherent, and engaging academic environment for first time freshmen, as well as assisting all students through to graduation.

Our mission is to provide thoughtful and quality guidance for students to cultivate effective learning paths, achieve academic goals and excel as productive global citizens.

The primary strategy is to use an intrusive academic advising model coupled with wrap around services, to achieve student success. Some of the wrap around services include tutoring, advising, first year experience course Rams Training Camp [orientation], attendance monitoring, and mentoring.

First Year Experience Course

The First Year Experience Course is designed to connect first year students to the university. FYE provides a wrap around, holistic experience that offers a broad grouping of inclusive educational opportunities coupled with student support services. FYE is a comprehensive educational support system designed to assist students in making a successful transition to Huston Tillotson. FYE course includes topics include- personal finances, tolerance, diversity, study skills, and career development.

FYE staff are committed to:

- Increasing student awareness of University policies and procedures
- Collaborating with faculty and staff to identify in pitfalls or roadblock students may encounter
- Prompting participation in campus and community engagement activities

Advising

Academic advising is a collaborative relationship between a student and an academic advisor to develop educational goals that are consistent with personal values and abilities. All students are assigned an academic advisor. Academic advisors are available to meet with students on an individual basis to review academic plans and explore careers.

Rams Training Camp

The primary purpose of the University orientation program is to help new freshmen and transfer students understand the nature of the University, the educational opportunities available to them, the values and functions of the University community, and the central objective of the University as an academic enterprise. It also permits students to participate in and to learn about matters relating to student registration, housing, campus activities, and other aspects of University life.

Writers Studio

The Writers Studio offers writing support to the HT community by providing tutoring and writing resources primarily to students, but also to staff and faculty. We assist faculty who assign writing, by offering supplemental materials and consultation. And we provide Instructional Assistants the opportunity to enjoy the personal, intellectual, academic and professional benefits that come from being tutors.

Student Success Workshops

Academic workshops are designed to provide students with an interactive experience to enhance learning. Workshops are designed to address academic rigor. All workshops are presented by professional staff and student instructional assistants.

Workshop topics are general and move to more specific, based on the needs of students and faculty. They include but are not limited to –Understanding SAP [satisfactory academic progress], Resume Writing, Developing Effective Relationships with Faculty, and Overcoming Procrastination.

The W.E.B. DuBois Honors Program

The DuBois Honors Program are scholarship recipients who experience is one that offers students both exceptional academic and extracurricular opportunities. These opportunities are designed for students of all majors, who are intellectually curious, capable, and interested in making the most of their university experience.

Students who have excelled academically in high school, are invited to learn more about the program. Students who would like to embrace the myriad of opportunities to challenge their intellect, to develop critical thinking and leadership skills. Academic standing must be maintained to remain in this program.

Summer All Star Academy

The All-Star Academy is a six-week summer program specially designed for first time freshmen who plan to attend and graduate from Huston Tillotson University. Graduating high school seniors who are accepted into the University, will have the opportunity to jump start their academic career with a bridge experience.

At the All-Star Academy, students will participate in college level English and math courses aligned with mentoring and community partner engagement activities. Traditionally, these activities take place in a residential setting on campus setting.

<u>Tutoring</u>

Tutoring services offer academic support in a variety of subjects to improve academic achievement. Tutoring is available free of charge to all HT students. We offer small group, drop in, or individual tutoring sessions. Tutoring is provided by student instructional assistants who are honor students who have been trained to provide support to instruction delivered by faculty.

Tutoring is confidential and non-intrusive. Students are asked to bring study materials and assignments to study sessions. The CAE has a few rules of services for students and tutors to adhere to. Students are also asked to complete a short survey of their experience with tutoring.

Additional tutorial services are provided through a 24/7 online tutoring platform called SmartThinking. This program is a professional tutoring service which offers tutoring in virtually every discipline area and at multiple levels. Each student also has access to this resource.

College of Arts and Sciences (CAS)

The College of Arts and Sciences is the largest academic unit at HT. There are 38 full time professors, 23 adjuncts and two administrative assistants. CAS has 14 majors and 17 minors.

CAS faculty members are professionals who are well-known in their field. Many have published during this period, have attended seminars/workshops and some have presented. Some have written major grants supporting their programs. Students are provided excellent education as is evident by the student-centered activities, their exposure to professionals at conferences and workshops, their participation in research activities and internships.

Four HT students (Lakeisha Ridgell, Jeremy Clemmons, Ilyahnee Brown, Kajuana Summons) along with University of Texas and Austin Community College students participated in the four-week LSAC PLUS driven Online Program at the University of Texas at Austin 20 July through 14 August 2020. Legal professionals served as judges for the students' oral arguments.

<u>Grants</u>

Natural Science

Faculty in the Division of Natural Science have been highly engaged in grant and proposal writing. Two faculty have earned successful grants during the 2019-20 academic year. After attending a Grant workshop sponsored by the Office of Sponsored program and Title III, Drs. Hussain, Tavakoi, and Slaton wrote and earned their first grant applications. All three faculty members are in the Mathematics Department. Hussain and Tavakoi won subawards with Occidental College through the National Science Foundation (NSF). Dr. Yalan Ning, Chemistry Professor, was awarded a Welch Foundation grant to support her work in "Polymerization by Metallosalen-Containing".

Dr. Amanda Masino has been very instrumental in securing funding for STEM student scholarships from St. David's Foundation, and Merck Foundation. She has also receive programmatic awards from Toyota - awarded 2020, Arthur Vining Davis - awarded 2019, Good Measure - awarded 2019, Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation - awarded 2020, National Science Foundation - awarded 2019, and St. David's Foundation - awarded 2020.

School of Business and Technology (SBT)

With support services provided by the faculty and staff, **fifty-nine** SBT students graduate in May 2020 (28 from the traditional program and 31 from the Adult Degree Program (ADP).

Dr. Steven Edmond, the inaugural dean of the School of Business and Technology, has retired. Edmond was instrumental in creating the SBT in 2005 when the University transitioned from a college to a university. Dr. Rohan Thompson, former Chair of the Business Department, was appointed Interim Dean of the SBT.

Dr. Primo was awarded a \$10,000 Innovation Grant from the FinTech Center at Morgan State University. The award is part of a competitive initiative to build awareness of and engagement with blockchain and FinTech at historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs).

In the summer of 2020, SBT students had various internships with major national, state, and local organizations. Among employers where students engaged in internships were, Dell, Oracle, Apple, Merck, and Facebook.

The SBT was approved by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to offer the Master of Business Administration (MBA) program beginning Fall 2019. HT graduated its first class of MBA's in August 2020. Five students from **Cohort 1** were conferred with the MBA Degree in June 2020. One student received the high honors of "Passed with Distinction," which is reserved for MBA students graduating with a 3.8 GPA or higher.

On August 1, 2020, HT's MBA program held a virtual orientation for its thirteen new students – **Cohort 2**. At this orientation, the students learned about the program and met their classmates and faculty for the first time. Information sessions were presented on the registration processes, financial aid, support services such as the Writer's Studio, and networking opportunities. The Director of the University's Career Services and Graduate Development presented many jobs and professional development opportunities to MBA students

The graduates within the SBT were able to land jobs with major corporations around the country. Below is a list of some of the students and employers:

The University has established a Center for Entrepreneurship and Innovation (CEI). Located at the Center for Social Innovation (CSI) on Springdale Road in East Austin, HT's CEI will make dreams of starting a new business come true for more women and minority students and the community at large through education and partnerships. The institution has hosted numerous events over the past two years, among the most notable were the annual Austin Latino Conference and Austin's Chapter of the National Black MBA conference.

Center for Adult and Continuing Learning

Huston-Tillotson University has established a Center for Adult and Continuing Learning that will oversee the Adult Degree Program and the Alternative Certification Program. Dr. Delley joined HT from Austin Independent School District, a retiree after 20 years of services. She worked as Adjunct Instructor with the Education Preparation Program (EPP and later served as the EPP and the Adult Degree Program's Field Supervisor for the University's Clinical Teachers and the Alternative Teacher Certification program before joining the HT family fulltime.

Dr. Delley earned a Doctor of Education in higher education administration and teaching from Concordia University, Portland, Oregon. She earned a Master of Educational Leadership from Stephen F. Austin, Nacogdoches, Texas, and a Bachelor of Science in business management from LeTourneau University, Longview, Texas.

Dr. Delley is a Texas certified educator, Principal for the EC-12 grade level, and Secondary Basic Business for grades 6-12. A retiree from the Austin Independent School District after 20 years in public education where she also taught career and technology courses at the high school level (John Tyler High School, Tyler, Texas) and middle school (Paredes and Bedichek) for 15 years. She served as a middle school assistant principal for eight years (Burnet Middle School and Paredes Middle School).

Office of the Vice President and Chief Operating Officer

The Office of the Vice President and Chief Operating Officer was formed in August 2019, adding Campus Safety and Campus Dining to an existing team of Student Affairs, Enrollment Management, Intercollegiate Athletics and Information Technologies. The leadership team develops annual goals/projects that enable the university to achieve the mission of the 2015 – 2025 Strategic Plan.

Student Affairs

As a member division within the portfolio of the Office of the Vice President / Chief Operating Officer, the Student Affairs unit is the custodial division for all elements of student development outside of the classroom. Religious Life / Campus Ministries is an integral part of this unit.

Mission Statement: Our mission is to empower student persistence to graduation by promoting holistic growth, inspiring intellectual curiosity, and encouraging responsible and healthy behaviors in a safe and affirming environment towards a life of personal and professional service.

2019-2020 Division Goals:

- Use department pillars and incorporate the University's Core Value (IDEAL) into various aspects of programming to ensure student learning, engagement and development in all support areas of Student Affairs.
- Initiate and advance community partnerships to instill the value of service, experiential learning, and career readiness

- Implement and offer student development programming such as Student Leadership Academy, Student Leadership Retreat,
 IDEAL week through structured leadership programming, events, and the Men's and Women's Empowerment Conferences.

Religious Life and Campus Ministry

Through Religious Life and Campus Ministry (RLCM) students have an opportunity to develop their spiritual and moral compass in life. They do so through participation in weekly bible studies, the Thursday Chapel services, annual retreats, mission trips, lectures, game nights, and more. Highlights include:

- 16 students, composed of RLCM ministry leaders, members of registered student organizations for NAACP and Boss Up, and
 the HT Track Team, came together to paint the home of a family in need in partnership with our annual community service
 event supporting Interfaith Action of Central Texas (IACT).
- The MLK Service of Celebration allowed students to hear and experience persons from faith communities other than Christianity. Attendance for this service totaled 95 participants including students, faculty, and staff.
- The Ernest T. Dixon Lecture with Dr. Michael Brandon McCormack was titled "On Black Life Insisted from Death: A Critical Meditation on Queen and Slim". The lecture proved to be interesting, informative, and engaging. Attendance was 48 to include students, faculty, and staff.
- Launching the New Life Praise Team, which provides music for chapel services.
- Civility Week boasted its most successful events to date.
 - o "Table Talk", was led by an HT student in collaboration with peers from ACC, St. Edwards University and UT. Students were given current-event related topics to discuss, highlighting their implications for students of color.
 - Soul Café was also centered around current events and their impact on college students and communities of color.
 Students served as discussion hosts and the evening concluded with Spoken Word performance summarizing the evening.
 - The week concluded with the Annual Faculty/Staff Luncheon, welcoming 56 faculty and staff members. This well attended event is a RLCM staple that has occurred for 10 years.

Residence Life

The mission of the Office of Residence Life is to create educational environments emphasizing learning and developments. Our mission statement is supported by three department tenets: service, education, and leadership. These tenets echo the University's cores values and the span of functional responsibilities within the department.

Fall 2019 Highlights:

- Resident Assistant training for 15 students regarding the topics of conflict resolution, Title IX, active listening, etc.
- Fall move-in with both buildings at full capacity leading to the securing of off-campus Residence Halls at American Campus Communities.
- Residence Life Focus Groups- representatives of each floor in both halls will serve as a voice for the residents, advocating for the Residence Life community via monthly meetings with Residence Hall Coordinators, Lead RAs, and various representatives from departments across campus.
- Inaugural Beard-Burrowes King's Weekend
- Men's Week hosted by the Beard-Burrowes Residence Hall

Since 2016, there has been a 37% increase in fall residential student numbers, as illustrated in the chart below. Fall 2019 residents are comprised of 215 returning students and 218 new freshman or incoming transfer students. Additionally, the retention of student from fall to spring semesters is consistently increasing each school year.

Career Services

The Career Services Department provides comprehensive, lifelong career development assistance to present students and alumni regarding areas of self-assessment and career exploration, leading to personal success in part-time jobs, internships, and/or full-time employment. Highlights include:

- Implemented a curriculum and mandatory meetings for the senior class focused on job placement and future readiness.
- More intentional focus with faculty and academic advisors as it relates to student career readiness.
- Working with Career Pathways Initiatives (Sophomore Year Experience) participants through professional development/training courses that lead to summer placement opportunities.
- Discussions with St. Edward's University, School of Counseling to develop a Memorandum of Understanding.
- Launch of HT Spurs Week as a weeklong career exploration experience with the Spurs properties (Austin Spurs, San Antonio Spurs, and Spurs FC) in order to encourage student athlete participation in career readiness activities.
- Adoption of new Customer Relationship Management (CRM) tool called "Handshake" designed to make a more interactive career navigation experience for students and assist in the automation of the work study application process.

Counseling and Consultation Center

The Counseling and Consultation Center provides counseling and accommodation services to support students in their pursuit of academic and wholistic personal success. Highlights include:

- Increasing awareness and visibility of the CCC through event participation, tabling and increased awareness.
- Enhancing local resources available to students served by the clinic.
- Serving as the advisor for the Y.N.A. (You Are Not Alone) student organization, offering a self-care series of programs and events.
- Providing student mental health activities before final examinations through partnerships with the Downs-Jones Library for "Craft & Chill" and with Divine Canine to bring therapy dogs to campus.
- Partnered with Austin Public Health for "What The Health: Sex Edition" event.

- Development of additional therapy space.
- Office of Disability Services (ODS) is currently accommodating 23 students for the Spring 2020 semester.
- New Team Member: Disability Services Coordinator, David Houston, in February 2020.

LYDIA PATTERSON INSTITUTE

Lydia Patterson Institute, better known as "La Lydia", is an institution that has encountered and survived numerous challenges throughout its 107 years of its existence. In 1913, the school was established in part by Methodist ministers and missionaries fleeing from a Mexican revolution and answering their call to ministry on the US-Mexico border. Since its origin, the school has suffered the effects of two world wars, the great depression, numerous peso devaluations, and presently, the violence and drug wars on the border. La Lydia has survived and flourished in the midst of all.

On August 3, 2019, our faith was challenged when an outsider traveled more than 600 miles to El Paso to eradicate Mexicans in the worst massacre in modern history. El Paso is a city with a population of more than 80% Hispanics. That is not to mention the number of Mexicans that cross daily from our sister city of Juarez, Mexico. In the shooting, we lost the father of three of our former students.

For generations, Lydia Patterson has been committed to teach English to non-English speaking students predominately of Hispanic background. Obviously, the incident caused panic and stress in El Paso and Lydia Patterson was no exception. We were to start school the Monday following, and parents were apprehensive and scared. For the first time in the history of La Lydia, we were forced to hire security to patrol our campus. It was heartbreaking, but students and parents were assured that the evil actions of a demented racist would not define us. We reminded them that the power of prayer and the hand of God would not forsake us.

In a positive note, Lydia Patterson moves forward with its commitment to provide a quality education to its students and provide opportunities otherwise nonexistent. My appreciation goes out to the colleges and universities of the United Methodist Church for continuing our ministry by providing scholarships so that 100% of our students attend college.

As the church struggles with certain identities, Lydia Patterson remains faithful to all in its principles and journey to change lives regardless of color, national origin, economic positions, and any other God given preferences. We aim to be the bridge that unites all Methodists in ministry as mandated by our God and make disciples of every one of its students for the transformation of the world.

We appeal to every church in your conference and this jurisdiction to remain faithful to the ministry of Lydia Patterson, and continue to partner with us in doing the work of God at its best. Every day, the lives of young men and women are being changed. Perhaps in one of our classrooms is sitting that one person who will make the difference in our world.

Perkins celebrates our vital connections with the Rio Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church:

- Seven (7) students affiliated with the Rio Texas Annual Conference are enrolled at Perkins and all are in the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) program.
- Three (3) students from the Rio Texas Conference received funding from the PACE (Perkins Annual Conference Endowment) grant, with the average overall financial aid award per student totaling \$7,530.

Continued Enrollment Increase

Overall enrollment for 2019-20 at Perkins School of Theology reflects a 6.6% increase from 2018-19. The Office of Enrollment Management also reported three consecutive years of significant growth in *new student totals*—with 2019 reflecting a more than doubled increase over 2016—contrasting with the trend of decline in schools of theology nationally.

Enrollment at Perkins for the 2019-20 academic year totaled 343 students, including 27 enrolled in the Ph.D. program. Fall 2019 statistics reflect the following: 63.3% of the entire student population are United Methodist and 37% are ethnic minority students.

Master's degree programs comprise approximately 46% male and 54% female students. The Doctor of Pastoral Music (D.P.M.) program includes students from southern Asia taking classes in Dallas.

The hybrid Houston-Galveston Extension Program, in its third year of providing a combination of online and residential classes leading to the M.Div. and M.A.M. degrees, totaled 94 students during the 2019-20 academic year.

2019-20 Highlights

- "Reboot: The Congregation as Youth Worker," an initiative of Perkins School of Theology designed to equip entire congregations to serve in ministry with youth, held its first retreat in September 2019 with representatives of the 18 diverse congregations selected to form its initial (starter) cohort. They include two African Methodist Episcopal churches, three Baptist churches, two Presbyterian (PC USA) churches, an Episcopal church, and 10 United Methodist churches of varying ethnic backgrounds—including First United Methodist Church of Mont Belview, Texas (Texas Annual Conference)—all without a full-time, paid youth worker and within a 300-mile radius of Dallas. The initiative co-directed by the Rev. Bart Patton, Director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry Education and Dr. Priscilla Pope-Levison, Associate Dean, Office of External Programs, is funded by a five-year, \$1 million grant awarded to Perkins School of Theology in late 2018 by the Lilly Endowment Inc.
- The Certification in Spiritual Direction Program at Perkins, launched in 2010, welcomed its largest cohort to-date in August 2019. The 26th cohort, with 17 members, includes clergy and laity from across the U.S. During the three-year, noncredit continuing education course, participants are trained in the art of accompanying and guiding others in their spiritual journeys.
- In 2019, Perkins opened its new Baptist House of Studies (BHS) which fosters community for ministerial students, faculty and staff who identify with the Baptist and Free Church traditions. The BHS is a spiritual, rather than a physical, house that especially supports and encourages students as they pursue their academic and ecclesial training in an ecumenical and university-based seminary. In October of 2019, BHS hosted Amanda Tyler, Executive Director of the Baptist Joint Committee for Religious Liberty, for two events on the Perkins campus. And in March 2020, BHS—with the Baptist Joint Committee for Religious Liberty—cosponsored the Walter B. and Kay W. Shurden Lectures on Religious Liberty and Separation of Church and State with keynote speaker and national interfaith leader Eboo Patel.
- More than 200 theologians, artists, musicians, scholars and community members gathered for a two-day conference Sept. 20-21, 2019, entitled "The Art of Resilience Latinx Public Witness in Troubled Times." The sold-out event, sponsored by The Center for the Study of Latino/a Christianity and Religions at Perkins, Ignite/Arts Dallas: A Center for People, Purpose, Place at SMU Meadows School of the Arts and the SMU Meadows Division of Theatre, gave participants the opportunity to interact with outstanding Latinx scholars, local artists, and religious and community leaders to reflect deeply on race, gender and immigration as matters of moral and faith concerns. As part of the program, the Meadows School of the Arts hosted an art exhibit and a performance by New York Latina playwright Jessica Carmona of her original work, "Elvira: The Immigration Play." Special music performed during the weekend was composed by Ars lubilorum, a Latin-American collective of composers—including Marcell Silva Steuernagel, director of Perkins' Master of Sacred Music Program—who research the intersection of Christian liturgical traditions and new music.
- "Hong Kong Protests: A Messianic Movement?," a panel discussion focused on the 2019 Hong Kong student protests, drew participants from across SMU and the Dallas area on Oct. 22, 2019. Sponsored by SMU Perkins School of Theology, the Tower Center's Sun & Star Program on Japan and East Asia and SMU's Center for Faith and Learning and the Embrey Human Rights Program, the event—one of the first of its kind in the U.S. to examine the protests—featured Dr. Lap Yan Kung, professor of Theology, The Divinity School, The Chinese University of Hong Kong as the keynote speaker. A panel discussion—which examined the religious and secular issues underlying the protests and the implications for religious communities in Hong Kong and around the world—followed. The panel moderator was Dr. Sze-kar Wan, Professor of New Testament at Perkins, who organized the event.
- The globe came to Perkins during the 2019 Fall Convocation, held Nov. 12. "Mission Quest: Finding Your Place in God's World," featured travel guide and activist Rick Steves, who headlined an opening event with 1,200 participants at SMU's McFarlin Auditorium. Sharing the stage with Steves during the two-day event, also held at Highland Park United Methodist Church, were the Rev. Dr. Samira Izadi Page, a native of Iran who leads a ministry to refugees in Dallas, and the Reverend Dr. Célestin Musekura, a Rwandan and founder of African Leadership and Reconciliation Ministries (ALARM). In addition to hearing speakers from three continents, attendees heard praise music in 17 different languages and human stories of hope and struggle from around the world.
- The 2019 Advent Worship Service, held Dec. 5, marked three milestones: the 60th anniversary of Perkins' Master of Sacred Music (MSM) program, the 80th anniversary of the Seminary Singers, and the 60th anniversary of the Advent service itself. Advent was first celebrated in Perkins Chapel in 1959, a tradition continued every year since. Three guest choirs from Dallasarea churches, led by alumni of the M.S.M. program, performed an anthem, and all three choirs performed Jane Marshall's "Song of Simeon." Worship followed the classic "Lessons and Carols" format, plus a reading by Dr. Ted Campbell, Professor of Church History, of one of Martin Luther's sermons.
- Thanks to a partnership initiated with Cliff College in the U.K. and the Methodist Church of Great Britain, a Perkins intern was placed in England for the 2019-20 academic year. Third-year student Cori Clevenger—whose home church is First UMC in Liberty, Texas—interned in a three-point charge of Methodist churches in the Midlands area. Her internship is part of a pilot program that organizers hope will become ongoing. Internships give M.Div. students at Perkins an opportunity to integrate coursework of Bible, theology and ethics with ministry practice in the real world. Now, Perkins students have the chance to do this in another culture, broadening their understanding of Christian expressions from those found in the U.S.
- Two new Memoranda of Understanding (MOUs) were signed during 2019-20, including the first with an international school of theology, as part of the ongoing initiative to deepen relationships between Perkins and undergraduate colleges, universities and international seminaries. A formal agreement was reached with Project Transformation National, which sponsors a summer intensive for undergraduate college students who lead summer day camp programs for children and youth at urban United

Methodist churches across the U.S. and who also explore vocations in ministry and service. In addition, the agreement with Bishop Han Theological School (BHTS) in Mindanao, Philippines, will promote collaboration and intercultural activities among theology faculty and students from the two institutions. Previous MOUs have been formalized with historically United Methodist institutions including Centenary College in Shreveport, Louisiana; Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas; McMurry University in Abilene, Texas; Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas; Huston-Tillotson University in Austin, Texas; Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas; Texas Wesleyan University in Fort Worth, Texas; Wylie College in Marshall, Texas; and Presbyterian-related Austin College in Sherman, Texas.

- The Bolin Family 2020 Perkins Scholarship Luncheon was held Wednesday, February 5, 2020, with New York Times columnist and best-selling author, David Brooks as guest speaker. The luncheon, inaugurated in 2010, serves as a major fundraiser for student scholarships. This year's luncheon, which highlighted the 2019-20 Perkins Scholars, netted approximately \$75,000 for new scholarships.
- A two-day conference, "In the Face of Barbarism:" Dietrich Bonhoeffer on Culture, Humanity and the Importance of Ordinary Life," was held Feb. 13-14, 2020, and included noted lecturers Victoria Barnett, Michael DeJonge, and Natalie Carnes.

 Supported by the Robinson Fund at Perkins, which encourages work at the intersection of theology and the arts, the event focused on the importance of everyday life in Bonhoeffer's theology and ethics. The conference concluded with a one-person play on the legacy of Dietrich Bonhoeffer as adapted and performed by Al Staggs.
- Dr. Theodore Walker, Associate Professor of Ethics and Society at Perkins, discovered a lost manuscript—written 77 years ago by Ernest E. Just, with an important message for modern readers. The unpublished book presents a cell biology-rooted theory of the origin and evolution of ethical behaviors. Dr. Walker and his team are now in the process of editing the manuscript to submit for publication.
- Dr. Evelyn Parker, Susanna Wesley Centennial Professor of Practical Theology, was in South Africa as a 2019-2020 U.S. Fulbright Scholar. Based at the Desmond Tutu Centre for Religion and Social Justice and the Department of Theology and Religion at the University of Western Cape in Cape Town, she worked on a project titled "Role of Religious Leaders in Preventing and Intervening in Teen Dating Violence in South Africa."
- The Rev. Dr. Rebekah Miles, Professor of Ethics and Practical Theology at Perkins, was named one of three Odyssey Medal Recipients by Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas. The medals are presented annually by the Hendrix College Board of Trustees to individuals whose life achievements exemplify the Hendrix Odyssey Program. Miles, a 1982 Hendrix graduate, was honored for her research. A reception and medal presentation with Hendrix President William M. Tsutsui took place on November 14 in the Great Hall of the Clinton Presidential Center in Little Rock.
- Dr. Ángel J. Gallardo joined the Perkins faculty and staff as Associate Director of the Intern Program in summer 2019. Dr. Gallardo, who earned the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the Graduate Program in Religious Studies at SMU in 2018, previously served as a teaching assistant at Perkins and taught in the Regional Course of Study School. He holds leadership positions in various professional and Latino/a organizations, and has worked with faith-leaders, activists, and scholars both locally and internationally, including during an internship in Brazil.
- The Rev. Katherine Glaze Lyle of Dallas was named recipient of the 2019 Perkins Distinguished Alumnus/a Award by the Perkins School of Theology Alumni/ae Council. She was honored during a special banquet held Nov. 12 at Perkins or her effectiveness and integrity in service to the church, continuing support for the goals of Perkins and Southern Methodist University, outstanding service to the community and exemplary character.
- The Houston-Galveston Extension Program will celebrate its 25th anniversary in 2020. The original program, which launched in fall 1995, enabled students to take initial portions of their work toward Perkins degrees in Houston-Galveston and to complete their work on the Dallas campus. Key leadership (in their roles at that time) included Perkins Dean Robin Lovin, Dr. James Moore, pastor of St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Houston and Dr. Charles Millikan, pastor of Moody Memorial United Methodist Church in Galveston, in addition to other leaders within the Texas Annual Conference. Over the years, many outstanding students, including Bishop Cynthia Fierro Harvey, have attended Perkins through the Houston-Galveston Extension Program—also known as "Perkins South."

The highlights listed above are reflective of the vibrant engagement of Perkins faculty, staff and students during the 2019-20 academic year.

Perkins School of Theology is committed to those *called to serve* so that they might be *empowered to lead*. Since its founding in 1911 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Southern Methodist University has served as a nonsectarian institution of higher learning. Our mission is to expand knowledge through research and teaching and serve as a powerful catalyst for the growth and development of Dallas and the broader North Texas region. With continued representation from The United Methodist Church, and welcoming students of all faiths, the University is reaching a higher level of accomplishment and global recognition in our second century of shaping world changers – for today and tomorrow.

SMU Update

Students, Faculty and Staff

Fall 2019 enrollment totaled 11,824, including 6,710 undergraduates and 5,114 graduates. Ethnic minority students made up 29 percent of total enrollment. An international enrollment of 1,417 (approximately 12 percent of total enrollment) represented 84 countries. Our impressive class of 2023 was chosen from a pool of more than 15,000 applicants. This cohort's average ACT score is 30.8, and the average SAT score is 1377 – both an increase from last year – making it the most academically qualified and diverse in SMU history.

Rankings

The University's reputation is strong and growing. SMU is ranked No. 64 among national universities by *U.S. News & World Report*. We are pleased that presidents, provosts and chief admissions officers at the nation's universities are beginning to recognize our strengths, as evidenced by two consecutive years of rising expert opinion scores within the *U.S. News* rankings.

- The Cox School of Business full-time M.B.A. ranks No. 43, according to *U.S. News & World Report*'s 2020 Best Business Schools, up from 48th in the previous year's rankings; the SMU Cox Executive M.B.A. ranks No. 23 in the nation.
- Dedman School of Law was ranked No. 52 nationally by U.S. News & World Report.
- The Center for World University Rankings 2019 placed SMU at No. 315 out of 20,000 universities worldwide, No. 133 nationally and No. 27 for alumni employment, placing the institution in the top 1.6% worldwide. Universities are ranked for their quality of education, alumni employment, quality of faculty and research performance.
- SMU ranked No. 16 in a Forbes list of top Southern colleges and universities.
- College Factual rankings (published by USA Today), highly focused on outcomes, including graduation rates, high salaries for
 graduates and low student loan default rates, ranked SMU at No. 3 among Best Texas Colleges; No. 92 among Best Nationwide
 Colleges; and No. 1 in its list of "Highest Paid Music Graduates" in 2019.
- The Princeton Review ranks SMU Guildhall No. 2 for the best graduate game-design program.

Funding

In FY 2019, SMU received \$31.8 million in external funding for research conducted in the United States and worldwide, representing a \$5.2 million increase over the previous year. Current funding agencies include National Science Foundation, U.S. Department of Education, U.S. Department of Defense and Toyota Foundation.

Regarding private fundraising, SMU finished FY 2019 strong, thanks to the generosity of our entire donor family who made more than \$118 million in gifts, making it a record year for giving. That generosity includes exceeding our second-year *Pony Power* goal by \$2 million with \$52 million in gifts received to fund our most pressing current needs.

2019 Highlights

Significant Gifts and Grants

\$100 Million Gift Establishes New Graduate School

In 2019 SMU celebrated the largest gift in its history – an unprecedented investment of \$100 million from the Moody Foundation to create the eighth named school at SMU: the Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies. This new school supports the University's graduate programs in education, engineering, the arts, humanities, sciences and social studies, as well as faculty research and interdisciplinary programs across the University. It will enable SMU to graduate higher numbers of doctoral students and strengthen collaborations with other universities, major corporations and other entities in producing high-impact research projects.

Visionary Impact With Miller Family \$50 Million Gift

Carolyn and David Miller '72, '73 made the largest single gift by an alumnus and his family in SMU's 108-year history. The Millers' latest \$50 million commitment will support the Edwin L. Cox School of Business' strategic plan to modernize its curriculum; offer more and broader scholarships to attract the world's best business students; collaborate across the SMU campus on new interdisciplinary programs and enhance the school's facilities. It also aspires for the school to extend community outreach to develop corporate partnerships and expand inclusivity.

Owen Arts Center Renovation Kickoff Inspires a New Challenge and Additional Gifts

Last fall, as the Meadows School of the Arts celebrated the 50th anniversary of its naming, we kicked off the renovation of Owen Arts Center, a \$34 million initiative to improve academic spaces in the north wing for visual arts, art history and creative computation, while creating welcoming and accessible entrances to the building. During the celebration, we announced a new \$1.8 million challenge gift from Indianapolis philanthropist and former Meadows School parent G. Marlyne Sexton. This latest gift brings her total commitment to OAC to \$5 million and creates an incentive for others to join in and help the Meadows School reach the remaining \$4 million needed to revitalize the arts hub.

A \$5 million gift from Dallas art collectors and patrons Nancy C. and Richard R. Rogers extends their long-standing support of artists by establishing a vibrant hub for the visual arts at SMU. The new Nancy C. and Richard R. Rogers Center for Visual Arts in the Owen Arts Center will provide a physical space that expands academic and artistic opportunities for students and faculty to propel them to the forefront of their fields. It is part of a \$34 million initiative to modernize the 250,000-square-foot building's north wing. Gifts to the project are supported by a grant from The Meadows Foundation.

Game Changer Opens on the Boulevard

Last year, we celebrated the dedication of the Indoor Performance Center, featuring Armstrong Fieldhouse, which marked a new era in athletics preparation and training for SMU Mustangs. The technologically equipped, multiuse facility also offers a significant expansion of possibilities for campus and community participation. Many generous donors made the Indoor Performance Center

possible. In addition to Liz Armstrong '82 and Bill Armstrong '82, donors of more than \$1 million are Gary T. Crum '69 and Sylvie P. Crum; Paul B. Loyd, Jr. '68 and Penny R. Loyd; David B. Miller '72, '73 and Carolyn L. Miller and the David B. Miller Family Foundation; and Garry A. Weber '58. There were also 17 donors of \$100,000 and higher, with eight making gifts of \$1 million each and nine making six-figure commitments.

New Home For Digital Explorers

SMU took a giant leap forward in the rapidly shifting digital frontier with the groundbreaking of the Gerald J. Ford Hall for Research and Innovation at the corner of McFarlin Boulevard and Airline Road. SMU Trustee Gerald J. Ford '66, '69, his wife, Kelli O. Ford, and the Gerald J. Ford Family Foundation provided a \$15 million lead gift to help fund construction of the building. The new 50,000-square-foot interdisciplinary research hub will serve as home to SMU's AT&T Center for Virtualization, the Dedman College Interdisciplinary Institute, high-performance computing and data science, the new Visualization Lab and the Guildhall, the Hart eCenter's top-ranked digital game-design program.

High Tech, High Impact from Bobby B. Lyle

Dallas entrepreneur, industry leader and educator Bobby B. Lyle '67 built on the farsighted generosity that named the Lyle School of Engineering 11 years ago by designating \$10 million to power a new strategic vision for the school. The future-focused model will combine innovation, agility and swift responses to shifts in technological capabilities with enduring institutional support. His investment will support the school's Future Fund by establishing endowments for Accelerating Emerging Research and Accelerating High Tech Business Innovations. The fund also will support two additional strategic portfolios: Transforming the Engineering Education Experience and Transformative Technology for Social Good.

Linda and Mitch Hart Institute for Technology, Innovation and Entrepreneurship

Prominent Dallas business leaders Linda Wertheimer Hart '65 and Milledge (Mitch) A. Hart, III are among SMU's most generous donors, and they made another major investment. The Linda and Mitch Hart Institute for Technology, Innovation and Entrepreneurship merges the wisdom of the Cox School of Business with the knowledge of the Lyle School of Engineering to develop the tools entrepreneurs need to bring their concepts to life. In addition, Mrs. Hart honored her husband on his 85th birthday with the Milledge A. Hart, III Scholarship Fund for Veterans of the U.S. Marine Corps.

Program Highlights

Elizabeth Loboa named Provost

Elizabeth Loboa, appointed as SMU's provost and vice president for academic affairs in December, will join the University on July 6, 2020. As chief academic officer for SMU, she will be responsible for the overall quality of teaching, scholarship and research and all aspects of academic life, ranging from admissions and faculty development to supervision of SMU's eight schools, library system, and international programs. Loboa, a biomedical engineer, is currently vice chancellor for strategic partnerships and dean and Ketchum Professor of the College of Engineering at the University of Missouri. She brings to SMU a distinguished academic record and broad university leadership experience.

Academic Deans Reappointed

The academic deans leading SMU's Lyle School of Engineering, Dedman School of Law and Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences have been reappointed to serve in their positions for an additional five years: Marc Christensen, dean of the Lyle School and Lyle Professor of Engineering Innovation, who has served as dean since 2013; Jennifer Collins, Judge James Noel Dean and professor of law at Dedman Law, who has served as dean since 2014; and Thomas DiPiero, dean of Dedman College and professor in the departments of English and World Languages and Literatures, who has served as dean since 2014.

Meadows School of the Arts celebrates 50th Anniversary

Meadows School kicked off a yearlong celebration of the 50th anniversary of its naming, staging three premieres by internationally recognized choreographers at its 26th annual benefit concert, "Meadows at the Winspear." The concert featured the critically acclaimed Meadows Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of conductor Paul Phillips, and the students of the Meadows Dance Ensemble. It also honored community leader The Meadows Foundation, which has supported SMU and Dallas for more than five decades. It was in 1969 that SMU's School of the Arts was renamed Meadows School of the Arts in honor of Algur H. Meadows.

Gift Expands Dedman Law's Tsai Center for Law, Science and Innovation

The Tsai Center for Law, Science and Innovation, launched in 2015 in Dedman Law, received an additional \$2 million gift to expand its profile as a leader in multidisciplinary research and scholarly debate surrounding new technologies. The academic center brings together experts from the legal, scientific and business communities to explore the complex challenges presented by the evolving innovation ecosystem. Current research projects supported by the Tsai Center include studies of fingerprint technology and tax implications of artificial intelligence, as well as a digital tool for keeping track of litigation involving government watch lists.

The Tsai Center also has funded new courses, including one in which law students create web-based legal apps for Texas legal-aid organizations.

\$1.5 Million NSF Grant Helps Fund Minecraft

SMU's Lyle School, Guildhall and the Simmons School of Education and Human Development will use a \$1,521,615 grant from the National Science Foundation to research teaching computer science and computational thinking through the popular video game Minecraft. Research will span the fields of game design, human-computer interaction, machine learning, curriculum design and education assessment by integrating STEM+C (computing) curriculum directly into Minecraft. The game and infrastructure produced through the research will serve as a vital computing resource for middle and high school educators. The grant was awarded to Corey Clark, deputy director of research at SMU Guildhall and an assistant professor of Computer Science at Lyle School; Eric Larson,

associate professor in Computer Science at Lyle School; and Leanne Ketterlin Geller, professor and Texas Instrument Endowed Chair in Education at Simmons School.

Professor Brings People Together for Conversations on Tough Topics

Jill DeTemple, associate professor of religious studies in Dedman College, has developed a discussion tool – reflective structured dialogue – that she is using in her own classrooms and sharing with professors at SMU and nationwide. The idea is to take topics that drive people apart – gun rights, abortion, the death penalty, the existence of God – and reframe the conversation around personal experiences. At its core is curiosity about another person's life and values.

SMU Scientists Identify New Texas Dinosaur

SMU postdoctoral fellow Kate Andrzejewski, along with University paleontologists Dale Winkler and Louis Jacobs, have identified *Convolosaurus marri* from fossils collected at Proctor Lake, southwest of Fort Worth. Remnants of several dinosaurs were first found at the Comanche County lake site in 1985, and most of the fossils had been stored for years in the Shuler Museum of Paleontology at SMU. But it wasn't until Andrzejewski, Winkler and Jacobs examined the fossils more recently that the new dinosaur was identified. *Convolosaurus marri* is on view at the Perot Museum of Nature and Science in the T. Boone Pickens Life Then and Now Hall as "Proctor Lake Ornithopod." The newly identified dinosaur was named in honor of Ray H. Marr '51, an SMU alumnus who is president of Marr Oil & Gas LTD and a strong supporter of SMU students.

SMU Study Finds Possible New Way to Treat Virus "Cousin" of HIV

A study led by SMU suggests that oleandrin – a drug derived from the Nerium oleander plant – could prevent the HTLV-1 virus from spreading by targeting a stage of the reproduction process that is not currently targeted by existing drugs. That is significant because there is currently no cure or treatment for the virus – a lesser-known "cousin" of HIV that affects an estimated 10 to 15 million people worldwide. "Our research findings suggest that oleandrin could possibly limit the transmission and spread of HTLV-1 by targeting a unique stage in the retroviral life cycle," said Robert Harrod, associate professor and director of graduate studies in SMU's Department of Biological Sciences. Harrod is a co-author of the study, published in the *Journal of Antivirals & Antiretrovirals*.

DART Station Renamed SMU/Mockingbird Station

Dallas Area Rapid Transit's (DART) Mockingbird Station was renamed SMU/Mockingbird Station after the DART Board approved a naming-rights agreement with SMU, making it easier for visitors to find the campus and cementing the rail station's role as a gateway to the University. Opened in 1997, Mockingbird Station quickly became an important transportation resource for SMU students, faculty, staff and visitors. The Mustang Express shuttle service connects the DART station to the University campus a short distance away.

We are excited about the impact our University and its programs continue to have on the world around us, and we are grateful to continue our work through the Perkins School of Theology in the education and training of all branches of the Wesleyan Tradition. Southwestern University celebrated a number of notable achievements this past year. For the third year in a row, a record-breaking number of students applied for admission, and in August, we welcomed 444 first-year and 56 transfer students, the second largest class in our institution's history. We implemented the Residential Experience Initiative, in which university staff bring resources directly to the students, thereby raising the intellectual climate of the residence halls. And the university celebrated the grand opening of the new Fondren–Jones Science Center—our commitment in stone to interdisciplinary collaboration, learning, and research. With an unprecedented commitment to inquiry- and discovery-based learning, Southwestern continues to craft distinctive programming that focuses on the life of the mind.

Our 2019 accolades include Forbes ranking Southwestern the #1 small private nonprofit liberal arts and sciences college in Texas and #1 in that category in the Grateful Graduates Index (#86 nationally). U.S. News and World Report and Washington Monthly both rank Southwestern as the top national liberal arts college in Texas. The University's Center for Career & Professional Development ranks #6 in the nation and #1 in Texas, according to The Princeton Review, which also ranked Southwestern third in the nation and first in Texas among its Impact Schools for the second year in a row.

In academics, for the 19th consecutive year, the King Creativity Fund supported significant, innovative, and visionary student projects across the disciplines. Thirty-one students participated in 13 different SCOPE research projects as part of a student–faculty collaborative summer program. Southwestern added one new major, financial economics, and one new minor, early modern studies, in fall 2019. These additions bring the total number of majors and minors offered to 37 and 41, respectively.

Among our internationally recognized scholar—teachers, three faculty and one coach published books. Dr. Erika Berroth (German) was honored with the Outstanding German Educator Award, her field's most prestigious form of recognition. Dr. Lois Ferrari (music) was awarded second place for the 2019 American Prize in community orchestra conducting for her work with the Austin Civic Orchestra. Dr. Barbara Anthony (computer science) was awarded a \$5,000 grant from the National Science Foundation—supported Center for Parallel and Distributed Computing Curriculum Development and Educational Resources. Jethro Hernández Berrones (history) was one of the 11% of applicants awarded a prestigious summer stipend by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). Katherine

Grooms received a competitive National Institutes of Health (NIH) two-year grant for her research titled "Drinking Water and Infant Health: Evidence from Contaminant Levels in California."

Among student achievements, 31 students were inducted into Southwestern's chapter of the Phi Beta Kappa honor society. Caroline Haywood '18, Camille Martin '19, Teresa Cropper '20, and Laura Rativa '20 developed and implemented get-out-the-vote programming that helped boost Southwestern's voting rate 33% since 2014. Madeline Carrola '19 won the Mid-South Sociological Association's Undergraduate Paper Competition for her capstone project, "Performing the *Handmaid's Tale*: The Use of Dystopian Literature at Political Protests." Five environmental studies and feminist studies students, along with Dr. Joshua Long (environmental studies), published an article in the *Journal of Education, Citizenship, and Social Justice* titled "Intersectional Sustainability and Student Activism: A Framework for Achieving Social Sustainability on University Campuses." Eight biology and molecular ecology students presented their research at the annual Texas Academy of Science meeting. Computer science major Sara Boyd '20 was selected as a finalist for the Computing Research Association's (CRA) Outstanding Undergraduate Researcher Award for 2020.

In athletics, Southwestern finished second for the SCAC President's Trophy and garnered 112 All-Conference honors, including 46 First Team selections, 30 Second Team selections, 8 Third Team selections, and 28 Honorable Mention selections. Seven different teams advanced in the SCAC Tournament to the championship, two teams won SCAC Championships, and one team won the SCAC regular season title. Two teams and one player earned NCAA Tournament berths. Southwestern coaches earned four SCAC Coach of the Year awards, and seven Pirates earned SCAC Player of the Year awards. In 2018–2019, Southwestern was home to four All-Americans and 12 All-Region selections. Five programs entered the national rankings, with one team breaking into the top 10.

In 2019, Southwestern hosted renowned political strategists Donna Brazile and Mary Matalin as guest speakers at the biennial Roy and Margaret Shilling Lecture. The University's biennial Brown Symposium featured experts on the Anthropocene, including Andrew Revkin, strategic adviser for environmental and science journalism at the National Geographic Society; Carol Adams, author of *The Sexual Politics of Meat*; Dr. Robert Bullard, the father of environmental justice; and Dr. Christopher Carter, a theology professor specializing in environmental ethics. The 20th annual Research and Creative Works Symposium took place on April 10, 2019, and featured more than 230 student presenters mentored by 43 faculty and staff from across the University. Southwestern celebrated its 175th Commencement Convocation in May 2019, with Dr. Tim Boone, professor and chair of the Urology Department and codirector of the Institute for Academic Medicine at Houston Methodist Hospital, as the keynote speaker. Throughout fall 2019, the President's Thinking Symposium on Living, Learning, and Leading hosted eight guests from various fields.

Similarly new this year, Dr. Melissa Pearce along with Dr. Walker hosted Listening Sessions to learn more about the challenges pastoral leaders face and dream together about how theological education might meet the changing demands of their ministry.

This March, Saint Paul marked its 60th anniversary with a celebration featuring keynote speaker Past President Dr. Lovett H. Weems, Jr. honoring 60+ years of theological education. Students, alumni, faculty, and the entire Saint Paul community came together for dinner, reminiscing and looking towards the future. During the celebration, Rev. Dr. Lois V. Glory-Neal was recognized as the 2020 Distinguished Graduate Award winner. In 1989, Rev. Dr. Glory-Neal of the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference became the first Native American woman to be ordained elder. She became the first Native American district superintendent in 1992. Saint Paul also presented Ms. Sally Firestone with the Board Lifetime Achievement award for her years of service.

Saint Paul's staff and faculty continue to contribute to the academy, church, and society. Dr. Anne Walker worked along with co-writer Dori Grinenko Baker on *Tru Colors*, a guide for assisting young adults in exploring ministry as a career. *Tru Colors*, from Discipleship Ministry, was published in March 2020. Dr. Casey Sigmon wrote the sermon "The Fruit of Self-Control" in the published book, *Preaching to Teach: Inspire People to Think and Act.* Additionally, as part of the 2019 Lectionary Commentaries on the website workingpreacher.org, Dr. Sigmon and Dr. Israel Kamudzandu contributed commentaries. In addition, Dr. Sigmon recently published "Homiletical Possibilities and Challenges in Colossians" in *The Review & Expositor* journal from November 2019.

In September 2019, Saint Paul Board of Trustees added four new members to their ranks: alumna Rev. Jennifer Ahrens-Sims of St. Stephen's UMC, Mrs. Dana Aldridge of SS&C Technologies, Mrs. Linda Shipman with Dairy Famers of America Inc., and alumnus Rev. David Wiggs with Boston Avenue UMC. In addition, earlier in the year faculty emeritus Rev. Dr. Tex Sample became Board Chair. Saint Paul is financially sound and is operating with a balanced budget. The changes made throughout the past few years have established a solid financial foundation for years of sustainability. With the Board's assistance, the seminary continues to focus on its mission and works to continuously enhance and evaluate the strategic plans in place to guide us into the future.

Saint Paul held several events and forums this year beginning with hosting an Overland Park Chamber of Commerce Wednesday Wake-up where Overland Park business members and community leaders started their day on the Kansas Campus with coffee, networking, and learning more about the seminary's mission. In November, Saint Paul was the host location for the Metro Organization for Racial and Economic Equity (MORE²) Faith and Democracy Prayer Breakfast. MORE² and Church of the Resurrection are partnering with Saint Paul in the recently launched Doctor of Ministry focus, "Spiritual Leadership in Unsettled Times." Throughout the year, students on both campuses participated in educational forums with discussions on a myriad of topics such as, "Sustaining Pastoral Leadership Through Personal Wellness", "Transgender Day of Remembrance", and "The Enneagram and Your Spiritual Growth." Saint Paul was blessed to have many alumni return to lead worship in the weekly chapel services. Rev. Shannon Hancock, alumna and Director of Admissions, brought the message on the Kansas Campus during the MLK Jr Worship Celebration while alumnus Rev. Bryan Lampkins preached on the Oklahoma Campus. This past January, Saint Paul was proud to host the United Methodist Theological Field Educators Meeting on the Kansas Campus. This year's theme was "Vicissitude: Navigating Call and Mission as Contextual Educators in 2020. In April, the Evangelical Society hosted a lecture featuring Dr. Kimberly Alexander, author of *Pentecostal Healing: Models of Theology and Practice* and co-author of *Women in Leadership: A Pentecostal Perspective* and *What Women Want: Pentecostal Women Ministers Speak for Themselves*.

Honoring Saint Paul's longstanding commitment to praxis learning and ministry, part of the 2019-2020 curriculum included practicums which are workshop-style seminars that teach ministry skills. For Spring 2020 FOCUS Week, Alumnus Rev. Dr. Emanuel Cleaver III, Senior Pastor of St. James UMC, taught the course Urban Church in the 21st century which explores the Urban Church and its context in relation to ministerial practices and theological understandings.

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, Saint Paul Course of Study (COS) School educated 265 individual students with a total registration of 650 classes; offering a total of 53 courses located in Leawood, KS; Hays, KS; Oklahoma City, OK; Columbia, MO; and Springfield, MO. Saint Paul is in the second year of offering a hybrid (online and on-campus) schedule for six courses during the Winter term. Plans to increase the number of hybrid course offerings are in development. Saint Paul launched a part-time, accelerated pilot COS satellite program (PML) in Columbia, MO in 2018 and added a second track in 2019. Comprised of nine courses in practical theology, this COS option is designed specifically for part-time local pastors or certified lay ministers entering ministry following completion of the Missouri Conference Licensing School. The PML satellite program is a collaborative program of Saint Paul Course of Study Regional School with the Missouri Conference. Since September 2018, COS has offered six courses and enrolled 30 individual students in the PML satellite program.

Saint Paul School of Theology is blessed to be in ministry in the name of Jesus Christ and to help others respond to God's call. We are a seminary that offers classes and experiences to folks from many denominations and faith walks. Our work as faculty and staff is to provide excellence in theological and practical education for ALL persons called and capable to attend. Remember: "Where two or more are gathered" Christ is there with us. President Neil Blair, Saint Paul trustees, faculty, staff, alumni, and students thank you for your interest, prayers, and support.

During this time of significant change in our church, the Texas United Methodist College Association continues on its more than seventy-year course of serving the scholarship needs of Methodist students who wish to attend one of our Methodist institutions of higher learning in Texas. We continue to believe that the support of our churches and conferences is essential in continuing the Wesleyan tradition of education. It is an education well suited to the challenges and changes in modern life.

The TUMCA funds granted to Southwestern University, Southern Methodist University, McMurry University, and Texas Wesleyan University are restricted to scholarships for deserving students from United Methodist congregations in Texas. During the fall of their academic year, students representing all five of the Texas United Methodist Conferences have received TUMCA scholarships this academic year (2019-2020). They join thousands of others who have been helped through the years by the support of our United Methodist family. As always, funds cannot be used for endowment or capital projects. All support goes to fund scholarships at our Texas United Methodist colleges.

TUMCA scholars, both past and present, receive both intellectual and spiritual development that prepares them to address the important issues of both church and society. We believe that those who become clergy, laity, teachers and societal leaders will help chart the course of our church.

We are both proud and humbled by our partnership that reflects the great commission and helps create disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

For nearly 150 years, United Theological Seminary in Dayton, OH, has been preparing faithful, fruitful leaders to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Students

In the Fall 2019 semester, United equipped **459** women and men for leadership in the Church, including **272** masters' students and **187** doctoral students. An ecumenical community of many denominations, races and nationalities, United welcomed students from **11** countries, **42** states, and **37** denominations, with the student body comprised of **49%** African American, **42%** Caucasian, and **10%** ethnic/racial minorities. The Seminary prepared **165** Course of Study students and served **36** students through the Hispanic Christian Academy, a 3-year Spanish online course of ministry program for Hispanic/Latino lay pastors and leaders. Altogether, approximately 660 students followed God's call through United Theological Seminary.

Alumni/ae

United graduates are making an impact in their communities as they spread the Good News.

- 88% of alumni/ae are currently employed in or retired from ministryiii
- 70% serve in local parishes^{iv}
- Rev. Dr. Brad Kalajainen (DMin '99) received the 2019 Effective Ministry Award for his transformative leadership of Cornerstone UMC in Grand Rapids, MI.
- Rev. Dr. James Bushfield (MDiv '79, DMin '92) received the 2019 Distinguished Alumnus Award for his leadership and ministry in the Indiana Conference of The UMC.
- Rev. Dr. Sandra Coley (DMin '14) received the Outstanding Doctor of Ministry Award for her advocacy of organ donation among African American communities.

New at United

United introduced a 36-hour Master of Arts (MA) degree, designed for those who wish to earn a degree while completing the requirements for Advanced Course of Study in pursuit of ordination in The United Methodist Church. The MA program is available fully online, on-campus or in a combination.

United continues to offer innovative learning through its Live Interactive Virtual Education (LIVE) environment introduced in 2018. In the first year, 59 students participated in LIVE courses, connecting with classmates on campus in Dayton, OH, and across the country by attending classes in real-time via simultaneous webcast.

Becoming Debt-Free

United remains committed to becoming debt-free by the seminary's 150th anniversary on October 11, 2021. Thanks to the support of generous donors, United has received more than \$2.5 million toward its goal of raising \$4 million to "burn the mortgage." Becoming debt-free as an institution will enable United to focus on generating income for scholarships that lighten the load of student debt for seminarians.

In Romans 10:14, St. Paul writes: "How shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? And how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? AND HOW SHALL THEY HEAR WITHOUT A PREACHER?" For 150 years, United has been preparing faithful and fruitful Christian preachers and leaders who proclaim the Good News of God's unconditional love which has come to us in Jesus Christ. Relationships are at the center of TMF's ministry. Whether we are gathering resources through philanthropy and investments or stewarding resources though loans, grants, leadership ministry, or Holy Conversations discernment, we believe the relationships we form are transformational for all involved – and lead to purposeful change. During 2019, TMF continued to build relationships with former Heartspring constituents, United Methodist Development Fund constituents, and new clergy and lay leaders participating in our Courageous Leadership Imperative initiative. We are committed to building new partnerships, collaborations, and connections to support our goal of helping congregations unite their leadership and financial resources into a purposeful plan for living out God's unique call for them to serve their communities

Tom Stanton, TMF Senior Area Representative for the Rio Texas Conference, is the primary point of engagement between congregations (clergy and laity) and TMF. He connects Rio Texas Conference constituents to resources relevant to their unique goals for missional growth in their congregations and communities.

TMF, headquartered in Austin, serves United Methodist individuals, churches and agencies within the six annual conferences in Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we served United Methodists last year.

Within the Rio Texas Conference:

- Loans to churches in the Rio Texas Conference totaled \$52.5 million at the end of 2019.
- Churches and agencies, not including individuals, within the Rio Texas Conference had \$49.8 million invested in the Methodist Loan Fund.

Throughout Texas and New Mexico:

- As of December 31, 2019, total assets under management by TMF were \$672.9 million.
- Methodist Loan Fund investments ended the year at \$340.1 million, and our loan portfolio at \$317.7 million.
- TMF's **Undesignated Endowment** ended the year at \$58.1 million.
- Our Leadership Ministry Endowment was \$9.1 million at the close of 2019.
- Highlighting a significant year of financial support for TMF was a gift of \$6 million from the Estate of Lemuel Richard Keller: \$500,000 of the estate gift was directed to TMF's Leadership Ministry Endowment, a portion fully funded Launch 2.0, a joint clergy and laity learning forum in Little Rock, AR, and the balance was directed to TMF's Undesignated Endowment. Additionally, TMF received a \$250,000 challenge grant to endow the John Thornburg Innovation Fund. The fund was created to help launch new ministries emerging from the hearts and minds of clergy participating in TMF's Leadership Ministry. As of 12/31/19, TMF had received \$225K in gifts and pledges towards the challenge grant.
- During 2019, the TMF Grants Ministry awarded \$1.4 million in support of 28 churches and not-for-profits. Of that total, an estimated \$704,000 came from restricted endowments, and \$725,000 from TMF operations. We awarded approximately \$125,000 to churches and non-profits providing relief to those impacted by Tropical Storm Imelda, immigration and fires. The Grants Committee of the TMF Board of Directors determines distribution decisions for the discretionary funds. In 2019, grant funds were distributed as follows: 48% to outreach ministries and evangelism targeting systemic change; 37% to ministries which systemically benefit families living in poverty; 15% for scholarships.
- TMF continued its work with individuals and families to support their philanthropic goals. In 2019, TMF received \$4.2 million in
 gifts (endowments, donor-advised funds, charitable gift annuities, and trusts) to support ministries and causes.
- TMF distributed approximately \$2.4 million from 405 permanent endowments during 2019.
- During 2019, TMF's Leadership Ministry hosted 14 peer-learning groups and a large innovation gathering, involving nearly 300 clergy and lay leaders from across Texas and New Mexico as well as drawing from the other conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction and beyond. TMF remains deeply committed to creating space for leaders to discover, explore, question and learn with peers so that they might expand their capacity to lead in this time of deep change. Among those groups were two new cohorts launched through the Courageous Leadership Imperative (CLI). CLI seeks to gather courageous leaders from throughout the SCJ for the sake of networking these courageous leaders, strengthening their leadership, and building on their capacity for courage, resilience, adaptive leadership, learning agility and innovation. CLI also hosted Launch 2.0 in Little Rock which offered teams of leaders, lay and clergy, the space and tools to take an idea from the brainstorm stage to an actual prototype which had form and plans for initial steps to implementation.
- Throughout this year of change in the denomination, the TMF Area Representative team maintained focus on their central purpose: empowering congregations to claim and live into their distinctive, God-appointed missions. The eight representatives traveled Texas and New Mexico, making over 2500 visits. The team does the work of both improvement and innovation. The improvement work includes financial best practices, developing year-round stewardship plans, and end-of-life generosity planning. The innovation work centers on the question, "God, what difference are you calling us to make in the coming season of the church's life?" They explore that question with clergy and lay leaders, both in informal conversation, and in contracted services called Holy Conversations (6-9 months with a team of 7-9) and Holy Excavations (one-day workshop with 20-25 people).

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Rio Texas Conference United Methodist Church (the Conference), a non-profit organization, which comprise the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the related statements of activities (with comparative totals for 2018), functional expenses (with comparative totals for 2018), and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ORGANIZATION

The Rio Texas Conference United Methodist Church (the Conference) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization associated with the General Council on Finance and Administration of the United Methodist Church. The mission of the Conference is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The Conference is empowered by the Holy Spirit to reach out, in the name of God, to the people of South Texas in the name of Jesus Christ. The Conference is committed to providing vital missions, vital congregations, and strong leaders to connect their churches to the people within their area. The Conference's mission field spans South Texas, with churches in large cities and small towns from Austin to McAllen, from San Angelo to Victoria, in vibrant cities, historic small towns and struggling communities.

All assets of the Conference reported in the accompanying financial statements are held in trust by the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Trustees (the Board) incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas effective January 1, 2015.

The Conference is affiliated with The United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions, The United Methodist Church Rio Texas Conference Las Misiones District, and United Methodist Mission Board of Metropolitan San Antonio. Each of these organizations are separately incorporated with their own governing boards but share office space, office-related expenses, and accounting functions.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, the accounts of the Conference are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is a procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified into each fund. Each fund is established by a separate trust as designated by the donors.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The Conference is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

• Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions – Net assets available for use in the general operations and not subject to donor restrictions. Grants and contributions gifted for recurring programs of the Conference generally are not considered "restricted" under GAAP, though for internal reporting the Conference tracks grants and contributions to verify the disbursements match the intent. Assets restricted solely through the actions of the Board are reported as net assets without donor restrictions, board-designated.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION (continued)

• Net Assets With Donor Restrictions – Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that are more restrictive than the Conference's mission and purpose. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity.

CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the statements of cash flows and the statements of financial position, the Conference considers all investments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are recorded at cost when acquired by purchase and at fair market value when acquired by gifts. The Conference capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value over \$2,500. Cost and associated reserve are written off when the asset is fully depreciated.

Automobiles - recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation computed on a straight-line basis over 3 to 5 years.

Furnishings and Equipment - recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation computed on a straight-line basis over 3 to 5 years.

Mt. Wesley Buildings - where historical cost or fair market value at the date of the gift was not available, the assets were recorded at 50% of their insured value as of December 31, 1985. These assets are being depreciated on a straight-line basis over 40 years.

Mt. Wesley land is recorded at the appraised value based on a 1985 appraisal by a firm of real estate appraisers.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions and other support that are restricted by the donor are recorded as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions until the restriction expires or the Conference disburses the funds in accordance with the restriction. Designated funds are internally restricted by the Conference and have no external legal restrictions.

ESTIMATES

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the reported revenues and expenses.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

GRANTS AND CONTRACTS

The Conference considers all grants and contracts as contributions based upon the terms of the grant. The Conference recognizes revenue and related receivables from reimbursement grants as services are rendered and eligible expenditures incurred. The Conference recognizes revenue and related receivables from non-reimbursement grants upon execution of the grant. The Conference considers all grant receivables to be fully collectible; therefore, no allowance is considered necessary.

FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSE

The costs of providing the services and other activities of the Conference have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. These expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include payroll expenses which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort, as well as utilities, rent, and repairs and maintenance which are allocated on the basis of square footage or some other reasonable basis.

NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding lease accounting for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2020. A lessee will be required to recognize on the statement of financial position the assets and liabilities for leases with terms of more than twelve months. Management is currently evaluating the effect this pronouncement will have on the financial statements and related disclosures.

RECENTLY ADOPTED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standard Update (ASU) 2016-01, Financial Instruments—Overall (Subtopic 825-10): Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities. This update was followed up in 2018 by ASU 2018-03, Technical Corrections and Improvements to Financial Instruments—Overall (Subtopic 825-10): Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities and ASU 2018-09, Codification Improvements. These pronouncements provide guidance regarding the reporting and disclosure requirements of investments, effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2018. The Conference adopted these new pronouncements effective January 1, 2019. The change was applied retrospectively, but there is no cumulative effect on beginning net assets as of this date.

In 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-08, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. This pronouncement clarifies and improves the scope and the accounting guidance for contributions received and contributions made in order to assist entities in (1) evaluating whether transactions should be accounted for as contributions (nonreciprocal transactions) within the scope of Topic 958, Not-for-Profit Entities, or as exchange (reciprocal) transactions subject to other guidance and (2) determining whether a contribution is conditional. The Conference adopted this new pronouncement effective January 1, 2019. The change was applied retrospectively, but there is no cumulative effect on beginning net assets as of this date.

In May 2014, the FASB issued ASU 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606). This pronouncement provides guidance regarding revenue recognition effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2018. The pronouncement affects contracts with customers to transfer goods or services and contracts for the transfer of non-financial assets. The core principle of this update is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods or services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for the goods or services. The Conference adopted this new pronouncement effective January 1, 2019. The change was applied retrospectively, but there is no cumulative effect on beginning net assets as of this date.

EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

The Conference records revenues from exchange transactions as increases in net assets without donor restrictions to the extent that the earnings process is complete. These transactions primarily include property sales and participation fees for programs and events, and are classified as other special causes support and service fee income in the statement of activities. These types of revenues are reported on an accrual basis in the period in which the sale occurs and fees are earned. Property sales amounts are variable depending on the value of the property. Participant fees are variable depending on the event. Performance obligations are satisfied when the sale, event, or program occurs, at which time the revenue is recognized. There are no amounts in excess of the benefit provided. Additionally, there are no receivables, contract assets, or contract liabilities related to these exchange transactions at December 31, 2019 and 2018.

INCOME TAX STATUS

The Conference qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes.

NOTE 2 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE - APPORTIONMENTS AND OTHER GIVING

The accounts receivable for apportionments and other giving are adjusted to reflect the amounts actually received by the second week of January of the following year; therefore, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not required. The accounts receivable - apportionments and other giving balance was \$739,937 and \$852,519 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 3 - GRANTS RECEIVABLE

The Conference has several program-related and disaster recovery grants receivable at December 31, 2019 and 2018. These grants receivable are due from various organizations and will be distributed in the coming year. The Conference considers these receivables to be fully collectible. Therefore, no allowance for doubtful accounts is deemed necessary by management. The grants receivable balance was \$1,185,848 and \$4,461,110 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 4 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE - OTHER, NET

Accounts receivable - other, net consist of amounts due to the Conference from churches and other entities related to insurance billings and other miscellaneous charges. An allowance for doubtful accounts has been determined based upon a review of outstanding insurance billings and totaled \$118,000 and \$-0- at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively The accounts receivable - other, net balance was \$50,876 and \$62,512 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS

The Conference holds investments with the TMF. These investments are measured at net asset value. There were no investment fees for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018. All dividends, interest, realized and unrealized gains and losses, and other investment income are reported in the statement of activities as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions, unless their use is restricted by explicit donor stipulations. These funds had \$52,160 in gains and \$23,061 in losses for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 6 - OTHER ASSETS

The Conference has had numerous churches close or combine with other congregations in the last few years. The Conference has assumed responsibility for the churches' properties pending their sale. These churches were recorded at estimated fair market value on the date of receipt. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, the remaining churches assumed by the Conference totaled \$10,390,161 and \$7,786,888, respectively, and are included in other assets in the statements of financial position.

NOTE 8 - NOTE PAYABLE

In October 2016, the Conference entered into a note agreement with the Texas Methodist Foundation for the purchase of a caretaker's house for the Mt. Wesley Retreat Center. Under the loan agreement, monthly payments of \$815, including accrued interest at prime plus .25%, were due and payable commencing December 7, 2016 through November 7, 2021, with the remaining principal and unpaid interest due at that time. In September 2019, the Conference sold the caretaker's house and paid off the note. The note payable was \$-0- and \$100,108 as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

Interest expense was \$3,113 and \$3,875 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 10 - ACCOUNTS PAYABLE - APPORTIONMENTS AND OTHER GIVING

The accounts payable for apportionments and other giving are amounts due to various agencies for the amounts received from the churches for apportionments and other giving. The Conference acts as a pass through for these items. The accounts payable - apportionments and other giving balance was \$912,797 and \$958,477 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 11 - ACCRUED BENEFITS

The Conference entered into a settlement agreement in 2018 and made the second of three \$250,000 payments as of December 31, 2019. The remaining amount will be paid in 2020. Additionally, the Conference received grants of \$90,000 and \$235,000 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively, to assist in the payment of this settlement.

NOTE 12 - PENSION PLAN

The Conference is responsible for pensions for two classes of persons - clergy appointed to the Conference and lay employees.

The Pension Plan for clergy appointed to the Conference is administered by the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions (the Board of Pensions). The Conference's contribution to the cost of that plan for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$137,508 and \$144,933, respectively.

The Pension Plan for lay employees is funded through the purchase of annuity contracts. Employee contributions are voluntary and are made on a pre-tax basis. Employer contributions are a percentage of wages and are defined in the Master Agreement between the Conference and the Board of Pensions. The contribution for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$126,326 and \$73,881, respectively.

The above plans are both "church plans" as that term is defined in section 414(e) of the Internal Revenue Code and are administered pursuant to the retirement income account provisions of section 403(b)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 13 - FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The requirements of Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures of the FASB Accounting Standards Codification apply to all financial instruments and all nonfinancial assets and nonfinancial liabilities that are being measured and reported on a fair value basis. Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market of the investment at the measurement date. The Conference has elected to report the fair value of certain net asset value instruments, those included in investments, using the practical expedient. The practical expedient allows for the use of NAV, either as reported by the investee fund based upon various factors, to be used to determine fair value, under certain conditions. The fair value of the investment is based on a combination of audited financial statements of the investees and monthly or quarterly statements received by the investee. In accordance with the guidance, the Conference has categorized its assets, based on the priority of inputs to the valuation technique, which give the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs, into a three-level fair value hierarchy. These levels are as follows:

- Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and have the highest priority.
- Level 2 valuations are based on quoted prices in markets that are not active.
- Level 3 valuations are based on inputs that are unobservable and supported by little or no market activity.

The Conference's current assets and liabilities as presented in the statements of financial position are Level 1. The Conference has no Level 2 or Level 3 assets or liabilities. The carrying amounts reported in the statements of financial position approximate fair values because of the short maturities of those instruments.

NOTE 14 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY FOR UNFUNDED POST-RETIREMENT BENEFITS

Prior to 1982, the Southwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church (Conference's predecessor organizations) participated in a defined benefit program for clergy appointed to the local churches of the Conference. The financial liability for that service still exists for the Conference and will for several decades. In 2019 and 2018, the Board of Pensions had assets in excess of its liabilities, and, therefore, no unrecorded liability exists for that fiscal year. The plan is fully funded according to the terms and conditions of the program, and the Board of Pensions has fully reserved an amount greater than the current actuarial obligation.

NOTE 15 - LEASES

The Conference leases copiers and other office equipment under various operating leases. The leases vary in expiration dates from July 2020 to January 2023. In addition, the Conference has a support agreement for IT services related to equipment and software. This agreement expires in December 2020. Equipment lease expenses and IT service agreement expenses amounted to \$136,017 and \$98,207 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 16 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY ENERGY CONTRACT

In May 2017, the Conference entered into a contract to purchase a set amount of electricity at a fixed rate price from an energy company for 48 months. The Conference is contingently liable to purchase the full amount of electricity agreed to in the contract and is also contingently liable if one of the churches is unable to pay for the electricity used. It is the opinion of management that all electricity will be fully utilized and the participating churches will be able to pay their bills; therefore, no amounts have been accrued for related to this contract.

NOTE 17 - ENDOWMENT

The Conference's endowment consists of an individual fund established by the former Rio Grande Conference. The Endowment Fund (the Fund) was established to help meet the challenge to become self-sufficient in ministerial support, program, and administration; focusing on the areas of evangelism, stewardship, and leadership development. As required by GAAP, net assets associated with endowment funds, including funds designated by the Board to function as endowments, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

NOTE 17 - ENDOWMENT (continued)

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of the Conference has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Conference classifies as net assets with restrictions (a) the original value of gifts donated to the endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the endowment, and (c) accumulations to the endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the Fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund is released when the time restriction has expired or when those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Conference in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA.

In accordance with UPMIFA, the Conference considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted funds:

- 1. The duration and preservation of the Fund;
- 2. The purpose of the Conference and the donor-restricted endowment fund;
- 3. General economic conditions;
- 4. The possible effect of inflation and deflation;
- 5. The expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments;
- 6. Other resources of the Conference; and
- 7. The investment policies of the Conference.

All endowment net assets are comprised of donor funds without restrictions. Total donor endowment funds without restrictions were \$179,760 and \$177,204 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

There were no endowment net assets classified as "with donor restrictions" at December 31, 2019 and 2018.

Funds With Deficiencies

The fair value of assets associated with individual donor-restricted endowment funds may fall below the level that the donor or UPMIFA requires the Conference to retain as a fund of perpetual duration. In accordance with GAAP, deficiencies of this nature are reported in net assets without donor restrictions. There were no such deficiencies as of December 31, 2019 and 2018.

NOTE 17 - ENDOWMENT (continued)

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Board has adopted investment and spending policies for the Endowment Fund assets that attempt to fulfill the purpose of the Fund and also protect the principal of the Fund.

The objectives of the Fund's investment policy are:

- 1. To conserve principal for the effective maintenance of purchasing power.
- 2. To provide regular income at a reasonable rate.
- To expand income and principal over and above that necessary to offset rises in the cost of living.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Conference relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through current yield (interest and dividends). The Fund is designed to offer a portfolio balanced through a diversified group of quality securities.

NOTE 18 - LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF FINANCIAL RESOURCES

The following reflects the Conference's financial assets as of the statement of financial position date, reduced by amounts not available for general use because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations that are amounts set aside for operating and other reserves that could be drawn upon if the Conference Committees/Tables approve that action.

The Conference has multiple sources of cash flows during the year from church remittances, insurance program income, other special causes support, and grants. These revenue sources provide the Conference with a consistent inflow of cash throughout the year to cover normal operating expenses.

NOTE 19 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Conference maintains cash accounts at several financial institutions. The Conference also maintains multiple cash accounts and an investment account with the Texas Methodist Foundation (the TMF). The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (the FDIC) insures the balances in the cash accounts up to \$250,000. The funds at the TMF are not insured by the FDIC or the Securities Investor Protection Corporation. At December 2019 and 2018, the Conference had uninsured cash balances of \$12,170,632 and \$13,572,417, respectively, without consideration for reconciling items. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, the Conference had uninsured investment balances of \$304,250 and \$252,090, respectively, without consideration for reconciling items.

NOTE 20 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Since March 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption through mandated closings of churches within the Rio Texas Conference region. While the disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration of the closings. Therefore, the Conference expects this matter to negatively impact its operating results for the year ended December 31, 2020. However, the related financial impact and duration cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

On April 17, 2020, the Conference was granted a loan from Frost Bank in the aggregate amount of \$432,100 pursuant to the Paycheck Protection Program loan (the PPP) under Division A, Title 1 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Securities Act (the CARES Act), which was enacted March 27, 2020. Funds from the PPP may only be used for payroll costs, costs used to continue group health care benefits, mortgage payments, rent, utilities, and interest on other debt obligations incurred before February 15, 2020. The Conference intends to use the entire PPP amount for qualifying expenses. Under the terms of the PPP, certain amounts of the loan may be forgiven if they are used for qualifying expenses as described in the CARES Act.

The Conference evaluates subsequent events in accordance with ASC Topic No. 855, "Subsequent Events" (formally SFAS No. 165). The guidance requires an entity to disclose the date through which subsequent events have been evaluated, as well as whether that date is the date the financial statements were issued or the date the financial statements were available to be issued. In preparing these financial statements, the Conference has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through May 20, 2020, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

The United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions (the Board) is a Texas 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. The Board began operations as the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions on January 1, 2015, resulting from unification of the Board of Pensions of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Rio Grande Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The Board's purpose is to determine and report to the Annual Conference the names of retired ministers and the widows and children of the deceased ministers of the Rio Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference) who are entitled to annuities, pensions, or special relief; to set, subject to the approval of the Annual Conference, the appropriation necessary to be made to meet such charges; and to perform such other acts and discharge such other duties as may be prescribed by the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

The Board is not involved in the actual administration of the pension program which is the responsibility of Wespath Benefits and Investments (Wespath). The Board is responsible for collecting and remitting the pension funds to Wespath. The Board also administers other funds that have been contributed to provide income that is to be used for funding pension and health insurance benefits. The Board can direct Wespath as to which type of investment account it wants the funds invested in, but Wespath selects the individual investments to be made from each investment account. The Board has the authority to select investments outside of Wespath. As of December 31, 2019 and 2018, approximately 98% and 97%, respectively, of all the Board's investment assets were placed with Wespath. Wespath maintains all members' accounts related to balances and vesting.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Board, the accounts of the Board are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into each fund; each fund being established by separate trusts as designated by the donors.

CASH EQUIVALENTS

For purposes of the statements of cash flows and the statements of financial position, the Board considers all investments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

INVESTMENTS

Investments are carried at market, and realized and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the statement of activities. Investments acquired by gift are valued at amounts representing estimated fair market value at the date of the gift. No investment fees were incurred for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment are recorded at cost when acquired by purchase and at fair market value when acquired by gifts. The Board capitalizes property and equipment with a cost or fair market value over \$2,500. Cost and associated reserve are written off when the asset is fully depreciated.

Operating assets consist of furniture and equipment, stated at cost less allowances for depreciation. Provisions for depreciation of these fixed assets are computed on the straight-line method over five years.

The retirees house was donated to the Board in 2015 and held by the Conference until its transfer to the Board in 2017. The house is to be used by a retired minister per the donor's stipulation. Depreciation is computed on the straight-line method over fifteen years.

CONTRIBUTIONS

The Board reports gifts of cash and other assets as donor restricted support if they are received with donor restrictions as to period of availability or use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is fulfilled, donor restricted net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restriction.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

The Board is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets:

- Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions Net assets available for use in the general operations
 and not subject to donor restrictions. Grants and contributions gifted for recurring programs of
 the Board generally are not considered "restricted" under GAAP, though for internal reporting
 the Board tracks grants and contributions to verify the disbursements match the intent. Assets
 restricted solely through the actions of the Board are reported as net assets without donor
 restrictions, designated.
- Net Assets With Donor Restrictions Net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that are more restrictive than the Board's mission and purpose. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity.

ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires the Board administrator to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

FUNCTIONAL ALLOCATION OF EXPENSE

The costs of providing the services and other activities of the Board have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. These expenses require allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. The expenses that are allocated include staff expenses which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort, as well as office expenses, maintenance expenses, and travel and meeting expenses which are allocated on the basis of square footage or some other reasonable basis.

NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In May 2014, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding revenue recognition, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* (ASC 606), effective for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2019. Management is currently evaluating the effect this new standard will have on its financial position, results of operations and related disclosures.

In February 2016, the FASB issued a new accounting pronouncement regarding lease accounting for reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2021. A lessee will be required to recognize on the statement of financial position the assets and liabilities for leases with terms of more than twelve months. Management is currently evaluating the effect this pronouncement will have on the financial statements and related disclosures.

RECENTLY ADOPTED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2016-01, Financial Instruments—Overall (Subtopic 825-10): Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities. This update was followed up in 2018 by ASU 2018-03, Technical Corrections and Improvements to Financial Instruments—Overall (Subtopic 825-10): Recognition and Measurement of Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities and ASU 2018-09, Codification Improvements. These pronouncements provide guidance regarding the reporting and disclosure requirements of investments, effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2018. The Board adopted these new pronouncements effective January 1, 2019. The change was applied retrospectively, but there is no cumulative effect on beginning net assets as of this date.

In 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-08, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made, effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2018. This pronouncement clarifies and improves the scope and the accounting guidance for contributions received and contributions made in order to assist entities in (1) evaluating whether transactions should be accounted for as contributions (nonreciprocal transactions) within the scope of Topic 958, Not-for-Profit Entities, or as exchange (reciprocal) transactions subject to other guidance and (2) determining whether a contribution is conditional. The Board adopted this new pronouncement effective January 1, 2019. The change was applied retrospectively, but there is no cumulative effect on beginning net assets as of this date.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

INCOME TAX STATUS

The Board qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, therefore, has no provision for federal income taxes. The Board's management believes it has no material uncertain tax positions, and, accordingly, it will not recognize any liabilities.

NOTE 3 - DESCRIPTION OF PLANS

The following description of the Board's health insurance and pension plans provides only general information. Participants should refer to the plan agreements for a complete description of provisions. The Pension Plan is a separate entity maintained by Wespath, and the results of its financial activities are reported on by other auditors.

The Board administers the following plans provided by the Conference:

- · Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) effective January 1, 2007, and restated as of January 1, 2017, reflecting revisions approved at General Conference 2016, the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) was converted over to the CRSP plan. The plan is funded by a 3% contribution to the CRSP Defined Contribution Plan (DC) made by the Board. In addition to the 3% contribution, the Board will also fund the CRSP Defined Benefit Plan (DB). The DB contribution will equal the amount it takes to fund the employees' retirement benefit. The CRSP payment made based upon actuarial cost for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$1,642,443 and \$1,635,344, respectively.
- · Defined Contribution Pension Plan Post 1982 service, fully funded each year by deposits from employer (church) and employee to Wespath. Retirement benefits are dependent on the balance in the individual's account on date of retirement.
- Defined Benefit Pension Plan Prior to 1982, the Conference participated in a defined benefit program for clergy appointed to the local churches of the Conference. The financial liability for that service still exists for the Conference and will for several decades. The cost of providing the defined benefits earned prior to 1982 is viewed by the Conference as an annual expense and is funded each year by the local churches through the Board.
- · Health Insurance Plan Clergy and lay employees are eligible to participate in this plan if they are regular, full-time employees of the Conference or one of the local churches of the Conference. All full-time employees must be regularly scheduled to work a minimum of 30 hours per week. Also, eligible to participate in this plan are full, probationary, associate members, and full-time local pastors.

For the year ended December 31, 2013, the retired pastors were covered under the Health Insurance Plan described above by the Board's predecessor organization, the Board of Pensions of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. This coverage was discontinued effective March 31, 2014, and the retired pastors previously in the Conference's Health Insurance Plan were transitioned to one of the health benefit plans offered by a third party, Towers Watson (Note 9).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 3 - DESCRIPTION OF PLANS (continued)

The pension plans are considered church plans as defined in section 414(e) of the Internal Revenue Code and are administered pursuant to the retirement income account provisions of section 403(b)(9) of the Internal Revenue Code.

NOTE 4 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Board maintains cash and investment accounts at various financial institutions and investment companies. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (the FDIC) insures the balances in the cash accounts up to \$250,000, while the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (the SIPC) insures the balances in investment accounts up to \$500,000. The Board also has investment accounts that are not insured by the FDIC or the SIPC. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, the Board's uninsured cash balances totaled \$949,847 and \$913,026, respectively, without regard to reconciling items. At December 31, 2019 and 2018, the Board's uninsured investment balances totaled \$14,750,682 and \$11,790,471, respectively.

NOTE 5 - INVESTMENTS

At December 31, 2019 and 2018, investments consisted primarily of units in Wespath Investment Management, which are pooled investment accounts. Dividends and gains (losses) are allocated to the Board based on its interest in the unitized value of its investments on a monthly basis.

The funds had gains of \$2,443,481 and losses of \$724,430 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively. Dividends and interest earned and reinvested in these funds were \$22,410 and \$14,183 for the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 6 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable consists primarily of amounts due from churches and individuals for pension and health insurance billings. The Board considers all of these receivables to be fully collectible; therefore, an allowance for doubtful accounts is not required. Accounts receivable was \$101,872 and \$127,352 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 7 - PRE-82 PENSION ASSET

The Pension Plan with Wespath was changed effective January 1, 1982. The Plan has separate pension assets available of \$2,817,412 and \$1,747,590 as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively, which is adequate to fully fund the past service liability. The actuary has projected that the past service liability is fully funded with a surplus of \$2,374,048 and \$531,578 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively. There were no past service funding deposits for the years ending December 31, 2019 and 2018. The fair value of the plan assets was \$2,405,077 and \$3,033,390 at December 31, 2019 and 2018, respectively.

NOTE 8 - PRE-82 POST-RETIREMENT PENSION BENEFITS

The post-retirement benefit obligation represents the actuarial present value of those estimated future benefits that are attributed to employee service rendered prior to January 1, 1982. Post-retirement benefits include future benefits expected to be paid to or for 1) currently retired employees and their spouse and 2) active employees and their spouse after retirement from service.

The actuarial present value of the expected post-retirement benefit obligation is determined by an actuary of Wespath and is the amount that results from applying actuarial assumptions to historical data to estimate the present value of future annual incurred benefits. The significant actuarial assumptions used in the valuations were:

- a) Mortality will occur in accordance with RP-2014 White Collar Mortality Table with generational projection using Scale MP-2014 for calculating impact on pension plans due to increased longevity.
- b) Contributions for increases in Past Service Rate or Contingent Annuitant % benefit increases are required to be made in advance of the increase's effective date.
- c) The actuarial reserve and accumulations before retirement will be credited with interest at the rate of 6.625%.
- d) Surviving spouses receive 70% of the ministerial pension rate.
- e) Retirement has been assumed to occur at the age of 65 or in one year, if age 65 or older.

The valuations included assume average rates of return of 6.625% in 2019 and 2018 for the pension plan and expected benefit increases of 2.00% for 2019 and 2018. The foregoing actuarial assumptions are based on the presumption the plan will continue. Were the plan to terminate, different actuarial assumptions and other factors might be applicable in determining the actuarial present value of accumulated plan benefits.

The Pre-82 Funding Plan is under review by the Actuarial Department at Wespath.

NOTE 9 - POST-RETIREMENT HEALTH BENEFITS

The post-retirement health benefit plan of the United Methodist Rio Texas Conference Board of Pensions is a closed plan. Participants in the plan are limited to those who were participating in the post-retirement health benefit plans of the Southwest Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference. No new participants can be added. The annual benefit amount is fixed at the dollar value of the annualized benefit paid during December 2014.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2019 and 2018

NOTE 9 - POST-RETIREMENT HEALTH BENEFITS (continued)

This benefit is only available with participation in one of the health benefit plans offered by a third party, Towers Watson. The benefit is provided in the form of funding a Health Reimbursement Account (HRA). Upon the death of the participant, the termination of the plan, or the decision of the participant to no longer continue to participate in the plan, the benefit ends. The health reimbursement benefit amount is fixed and will not increase regardless of the cost of the health benefit plan. This plan is funded by apportionments collected by the Board; as such, the plan participants do not make contributions to this plan.

The actuarial present value of the expected post-retirement benefit obligation at December 31, 2019 and 2018 was \$641,093 and \$722,548, respectively, and is the amount that results from applying actuarial assumptions to a census of participants on December 31, 2014.

NOTE 10 - PENSION PARTICIPANT CONTRIBUTIONS AND PAYMENTS

The Board is the plan sponsor for several qualified benefit plans of Wespath. These plans are the Clergy Retirement Security Program – Defined Contribution (CRSP-DC), Clergy Retirement Security Program – Defined Benefit (CRSP-DB), Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP), and United Methodist Personal Investment Plan (UMPIP). The Board invoices the local churches for the cost of these plans on a monthly basis and then makes a single payment to Wespath either monthly or annually, depending upon the plan design.

NOTE 11 - LEGACY FUNDS

On January 1, 2015, the Rio Grande Conference pension assets of \$6,922,748 were transferred into the Board's investment accounts. Based on the Rio Texas Unification Plan that was approved by both the Rio Grande Conference and Southwest Texas Conference, the transferred funds which were restricted for clergy benefits of the former Rio Grande Conference will continue to be used to fund clergy benefits of legacy churches of the Rio Grande Conference. During the year ended December 31, 2019, the Board awarded \$322,807 in grants to legacy churches and incurred investment gains of \$1,449,182. At December 31, 2019, the legacy fund balance was \$8,398,105. During the year ended December 31, 2018, the Board awarded \$265,561 in grants to legacy churches and incurred investment losses of \$471,316. At December 31, 2018, the legacy fund balance was \$7,221,730.

The Board's primary sources of cash flows during the year are participant contributions for insurance and pension. These revenue sources provide a consistent inflow of cash throughout the year to cover normal operating expenses.

NOTE 15 - FAIR VALUE OF FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Board adopted the provisions of ASC 820, "Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures" (formerly SFAS 157). ASC 820 defines fair value as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market, and establishes a framework for measuring fair value in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The Board has elected to report the fair value of certain net asset value (NAV) instruments, primarily those included in investments and mutual funds, using the practical expedient. The practical expedient allows for the use of NAV, either as reported by the investee fund or as adjusted by the Board based on various factors, to be used to determine fair value, under certain conditions. The fair value of the investment is based on a combination of audited financial statements of the investees and monthly or quarterly statements received from the investees. In accordance with the guidance, the Board has categorized its investments based upon the priority of inputs to the valuation technique, which gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs, into a three-level fair value hierarchy.

These levels are as follows:

NOTE 16 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Board is located in the building owned by the Conference. The accounting department of the Conference performs some of the accounting functions of the Board; therefore, certain expense allocations have been made for office-related expenses incurred in the normal course of business operations. For the years ended December 31, 2019 and 2018, these expenses totaled \$38,000 and \$43,302, respectively.

NOTE 17 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Since March 2020, the COVID-19 outbreak in the United States has caused business disruption through mandated closings of organizations within the state of Texas. While the disruption is currently expected to be temporary, there is considerable uncertainty around the duration of the closings. Therefore, the Board expects this matter to negatively impact its operating results for the year ended December 31, 2020. However, the related financial impact and duration cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

- i. Habrá un Comité de Ministerios Hispano/Latino (el Comité), cuya función se define en ¶ 655 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Hispano/Latino, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Vitalizando Congregaciones. Por lo menos un tercio de los miembros serán personas Hispanos/Latinas. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Vitalizando Congregaciones y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Vitalizando Congregaciones.
- j. Habrá un Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud (el Concilio) cuya función se define en ¶ 649 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. El Concilio apoyará, animará y equipará a los lideres de la juventud en la iglesia. El Concilio estará formado por 3 a 5 jóvenes de cada distrito, y representará la diversidad de la conferencia. No más de un tercio de los miembros del Concilio serán adultos. El Concilio será representado por el Presidente y/u otra persona designada en diversas agencias de la Conferencia Anual, inclusive la Mesa Unida. El Concilio se relaciona con la División de la Junta General de Discipulado de Ministerios de la Juventud. - k. Habrá un Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos (el Concilio) cuya función se define en ¶ 650 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, y que cumplirá todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina al Concilio de Ministerios de Jóvenes Adultos. El Concilio proveerá voz y apoyo a todos los jóvenes adultos en la conferencia. El Concilio será un grupo diverso de jóvenes adultos que son llamados al ministerio y servicio modelado por Jesucristo. El Concilio será representado por el Presidente y/u otra persona designada en diversas agencias de la Conferencia Anual, inclusive la Mesa Unida. El Concilio se relaciona con la División de la Junta General de Discipulado de Ministerios de la Juventud. Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes

4. Habrá un Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes cuya función es llamar a equipar a líderes laicos y del clero en el campo misionero y para animar especialmente a líderes más jóvenes. Los miembros del Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes serán: dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es Educación Superior y la Ministerio Universitario y un Presidente; todos designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual. Miembros adicionales serán los presidentes o representantes de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud y el Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos; dos representantes de la Junta del Ministerio Ordenado; el/la Líder Laico/a Conferencial y siete (7) líderes laicos distritales.

La Junta se relaciona con la Junta General de Educación Superior y Ministerio y su División de Educación Superior y el Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes. La Junta es responsable al Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes.

b. Habrá una Junta de Ministerio Ordenado (la Junta) cuya función, composición y organización se definen en ¶ 635 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Junta serán nombrados por el Obispo y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual. La Junta se relacionará con la Junta General de Educación Superior y Ministerio. La Junta es responsable a la Conferencia Anual e informa a ella y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes.

c. Habrá una Equipo de Liderazgo de Laicos cuya función se define en ¶ 631 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, y que cumplirá todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina al Junta de Laicos. Los miembros del Equipo de Liderazgo de Laicos serán el Líder Laico Conferencia como Presidente y los Líderes Laicos de los Distritos, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes. El Equipo de Liderazgo de Laicos está representada por uno o más de sus miembros en diversas agencias de la Conferencia Anual. El Equipo de Liderazgo de Laicos se relaciona con la Junta General de Discipulado y el Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes. El Equipo de Liderazgo de Laicos es responsable e informa a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Desarrollando Líderes.

Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades

5. Habrá un Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades cuya función es de equipar, educar y apoyar a las congregaciones alrededor de las áreas de misión y el Avance, problemas étnicos específicos y asuntos de justicia. Los miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades serán: dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es la Iglesia y Sociedad, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Globales, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Nativo-Americanos, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es el programa de Avance, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es la Justicia y Misericordia, el Secretario de Ministerios Globales y un Presidente; todos designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegido por la Conferencia Anual. El Coordinador de Paz con Justicia también será miembro. Todo el Equipo de Visión tiene toda la responsabilidad para cada una de las áreas de enfoque representadas por sus miembros. El Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades se relaciona con la Junta General de la Iglesia y Sociedad, la Junta General de Ministerios Globales y a la Mesa Unida. El Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades rinde cuentas a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado por ella.

a. Habrá una Junta de Iglesia y Sociedad (la Junta) cuya función se define en ¶ 629 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Junta serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es la Iglesia y la Sociedad, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades, además de un miembro nombrado por la Conferencia de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas. La Junta se relaciona con la Junta General de la Iglesia y Sociedad y el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta nombrará al Coordinador de Paz con Justicia.

b. Habrá una Junta de Ministerios Globales (la Junta) cuya función se define en ¶ 633 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Junta serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Globales, además de todos los otros miembros de Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades, incluyendo el Secretario de Ministerios Globales, además de un miembro nombrado por la Conferencia de Mujeres Metodistas Unidas. La Junta se la Junta General de Ministerios Globales y el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta es responsable al Equipo de Visión de Transformar Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.

c. Habrá un Comité de Ministerios de Nativos Americanos (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 654 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Nativo-Americanos, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.

d. Habrá un Comité en el Avance (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 656 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es el Avance, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.

e. Habrá un Comité de Justicia y Misericordia (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 657 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es justicia y misericordia, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.

Equipo de Administración Agencias Administrativas

6. Habrá un Equipo de Administración Agencias Administrativas cuyas función es funciones sera proporcionar apoyo administrativo en curso a la Conferencia a través de las agencias representadas entre sus miembros. Los miembros del Equipo de Administración serán un representante de la Mesa de Finanzas, la Junta de Síndicos, el Comité de Reglas Permanentes, el Comité de Agenda y Adoración, el Comité del Episcopado, el Comité de Residencia Episcopal, la Junta de Pensiones, la Comisión de Archivos e Historia y el Comité de Nominaciones, además de un Presidente. Cada una de estas funciones se llevará a cabo por una agencia separada e independiente cuyos miembros son designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual, a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina. Cada una de estas agencias es directamente responsable a la Conferencia Anual, informa a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado del presupuesto de la Conferencia Anual, a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina. Cada una de estas agencias tendrá un representate en la Mesa Unida para apoyar los enfasis misionales de la Mesa Unida y los Equipos de Visión.

a. Habrá una Mesa de Finanzas cuya función se define en ¶¶ 611-628 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, y que cumplirá con todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina ante el Concilio de Finanzas y Administración. La Mesa de Finanzas también cumplirá con todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina a la Comisión de Compensación Equitativa, cuya función se define en ¶ 625 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá dieciséis (16) miembros en la Mesa de Finanzas. La Mesa de Finanzas se relaciona con el Concilio General de Finanzas y Administración. También habrá un Comité de Personal para llevar a cabo las funciones de la Mesa de Finanzas en ¶ 613.13 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá cuatro (4) miembros de la Comisión de Personal además de un representante de la Mesa de Finanzas y un Superintendente del Distrito.

b. Habrá una Junta de Síndicos, cuya función se define en ¶ 2512 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá doce (12) miembros de la Junta de Síndicos, que serán elegidos en cuatro clases de tres miembros cada una. La primera Junta de Síndicos tendrá tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia de Southwest Texas cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2015, tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Río Grande cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2016, tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Río Grande cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2017 y tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Southwest Texas cuyos fin de término es en junio de 2018. Los miembros de la Junta de Síndicos serán también miembros de la Junta de Directores de la corporación denominada Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia Metodista Unida Río Texas, y su eleccíon deberá concordar con el Certificado de Formación y con los Estatutos de tal corporación.

c. Habrá un Comité sobre Reglas Permanentes cuya función es supervisar las reglas de la Conferencia Anual, a la medida permitida en ¶ 604.1 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá seis (6) miembros del Comité de Reglas Permanentes.

d. Habrá un Comité de Agenda y Adoración cuya función se define en ¶ 605.2 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Comité de Agenda y Adoración será el Obispo y el Asistente de la oficina Episcopal; los superintendentes de siete distritos; los presidentes de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud; el Líder Laico Conferencial; el Tesorero de la Conferencia; el Secretario de la Conferencia; el Presidente de la Mesa Unida; y un coordinador del Equipo de Adoración reclutado por el Comité.

e. Habrá un Comité del Episcopado cuya función se define en ¶ 637 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá doce (12) miembros del Comité del Episcopado.

f. Habrá un Comité de Residencia Episcopal cuya función se define en ¶ 638 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá seis (6) miembros del Comité de Residencia Episcopal.

g. Habrá una Junta de Pensiones, cuya función se define en ¶ 639 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá dieciséis (16) miembros de la Junta de Pensiones que servirán términos escalonados de ocho años, con cuatro miembros siendo elegidos cada dos años. La primera Junta de Pensiones tendrá cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2016, cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2020, y cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2020, y cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2022 con el fin de establecer los términos escalonados. Las conferencias 2014 cada una elegirá a dos personas por cada clase que conforma a la primera Junta de Pensiones. Los miembros de la Junta de Pensiones serán también miembros de la Junta de Directores de la corporación denominada Junta de Pensiones de la Conferencia Metodista Unida Río Texas, y su eleccíon deberá concordar con el Certificado de Formación y con los Estatutos de tal corporación. La Junta de Pensiones se relaciona con la Junta General de Pensiones y Beneficios de Salud.

h. Habrá una Comisión de Archivos e Historia cuya función se define en ¶ 641 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá ocho (8) miembros en la Comisión de Archivos e Historia. La Comisión de Archivos e Historia se relaciona con la Comisión General de Archivos e Historia y a la Mesa Unida a través de la Presidenta del Equipo de Administración.

i. Habrá un Comité de Nominaciones (el Comité), cuya función es identificar a candidatos para cada posición de lideres elegidos ya que El Libro de Disciplina no especifica otro método de nominación. Los miembros del Comité serán el Obispo y el Asistente de la Oficina Episcopal; los Superintendentes de siete Distritos; una persona de cada conferencia patrocinadora que representan las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud; el Líder Laico Conferencial; y seis (6) prófugos miembros designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual para garantizar una representación equitativa en el Comité de cada una de las conferencias patrocinadoras. Por lo menos a través de 2024 el Comité de Nominaciones constará de un número igual de miembros de cada una de las conferencias patrocinadoras.

7. Habrá un Comité de Revisión Administrativa (el Comité) cuya función y membresía se definen en ¶ 636 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá tres (3) miembros del Comité y dos (2) suplentes, nombrados por el Obispo y elegidos por la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual. El Comité es responsable ante la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual.

Aplicante a Todas las Agencias

- 8. El Comité de Nominaciones deberá trabajar hacia los objetivos de inclusión como dispuestos en ¶ 610.5 en el Libro de Disciplina 2016 que establece: "...atención especial debe darse a la inclusión de mujeres del clero, la juventud (¶ 256.3), jóvenes adultos, adultos mayores, personas de iglesias con membresía pequeñas, personas con discapacidad y personas de minorías raciales y étnicas, en consonancia con las políticas de las agencias generales de la Iglesia. También se recomienda que los miembros de dichas agencias, salvo la Junta de Ministerio Ordenado, incluyan un tercio de clero, un tercio laicas y un tercio laicos que profesan ser miembros de las iglesias locales." El Comité de Nominaciones también se esforzará por tener igual representación de los distritos; y, a la medida que sea posible, la diversidad de los nombrados debe reflejar la diversidad de las misiones. Será importante por lo menos hasta el 2020 que las conferencias patrocinadoras sean igualmente representadas en la Junta de Síndicos y la Junta de Pensiones, y que ambas sean bien representados en la Mesa Unida y en los Equipos de Visión.
- 9. El término de membresía en cualquier agencia de la Conferencia es cuadrienal, excepto donde el Libro de Disciplina estipula lo contrario. Lo máximo que una persona puede servir en una agencia es de dos términos, excepto donde el Libro de Disciplina estipula lo contrario, o cuando él o ella llena una vacante durante el cuadrienio. Llenar un vacante de un período restante de más de dos años se considera ser un término completo y se cuenta lo mismo que cuatro años.
- 10. Cualquier posición elegida en una agencia de la Conferencia que esté vacante al final de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual o que se convierte en vacante durante el año de la Conferencia puede ser suplido por el Comité de Nominaciones a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina.
- 11. Ex-oficio miembros de una agencia, incluyendo a miembros de Agencias Generales o Jurisdiccionales, que residen dentro de los límites de la Conferencia, son además miembros de Agencia arriba mencionados.
- 12. Presidentes de los agencias de la Conferencia deberían ser sensibles a los horarios de trabajo de los laicos al establecer horarios de reuniones.
- 13. Cuando una persona esté ausente sin previo aviso de dos reuniones consecutivas de agencias de conferencia del cual él o ella es miembro, dicha persona se considerará que ha renunciado dicha afiliación, y la Comisión de Nombramientos se notificará que otra persona puede ser nombrada por el resto del término.
- 14. Ningún personal de la Oficina del Superintendente o conferencia de distrito será elegible para servir como miembro electivo de cualquier agencia de la Conferencia. Si fuese miembro en el momento de nombramiento o por sueldo, él o ella se considerarán haber renunciado dicha afiliación.

Personal y Recursos de la Conferencia

15. Habrá un Centro de Vitalidad de Misión que equipe a las iglesias a alcanzar el campo de misión para hacer discípulos de Jesucristo para la transformación del mundo. El Centro de Vitalidad de Misión se relaciona y apoya el trabajo de los cuatro Equipos de Visión; para capacitar y equipar a todos los que trabajan con las congregaciones actuales, y a ayudar y apoyar a ésos en las nuevas comunidades de fe; para ofrecer desarrollo de liderazgo para líderes laicos y del clero; para movilizar a todos para transformar las comunidades a través de participación y oportunidades misionales; y para apoyar la comunicación y a dirigir la Conferencia en el uso de nuevas y emergentes tecnologías como herramientas para el Ministerio. El Centro de Vitalidad de Misión intentará construir capacidad a nivel de distrito para servir mejor a las iglesias locales en su misión. El Centro de Vitalidad de Misión también apoyará la Junta de Ministerio Ordenado y sus iniciativas de bienestar del clero, los centros de conferencias que ofrecen retiros y entrenamiento, jóvenes y ministerios de adultos jóvenes, y servicios de registro para este tipo de eventos. El Centro de Vitalidad de Misión será responsable ante la Conferencia Anual y financiado por la misma. Habrá un director o posición equivalente para supervisar las funciónes del Centro de Vitalidad de Misión, llenado por nombramiento o de otra manera a discreción del Obispo.

4615. Habrá un Centro de Servicios Administrativos cuya función es administrar los recursos financieros de la Conferencia y desarrollar fuentes alternativas de financiación para la Conferencia. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos fomentará colaboración y asociación entre todos los programas, entidades administrativas y financieras de la Conferencia. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos se refiere a la Mesa de Finanzas y apoya el trabajo de la misma, así como el de la Comisión de Compensaciones Equitativas, la Junta de Síndicos, la Junta de Pensiones, el Tesorero de la Conferencia y la Oficina de Desarrollo de Nuevos Recursos, así como a otras agencias no programadas, como sea necesario. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos será responsable a la Mesa de Finanzas y a la Conferencia Anual y será financiado por la Conferencia Anual. Habrá un director o posición equivalente para supervisar las funciónes del Centro de Servicios Administrativos, llenado por nombramiento o de otra manera a discreción del Obispo.

4716. Habrá un Asistente a la Oficina Episcopal que proporcionará ayuda con las tareas administrativas de la oficina Episcopal. Esta posición puede llenarse por nombramiento, o de lo contrario, a discreción del Obispo.

17. Habrá Directores que ayuden y coordinen con los ministerios de los Equipos de Visión según lo determine el Comité de Personal en consulta con el Obispo. Estas posiciones pueden ser llenadas, por nombramiento o de lo contrario, a la discreción del Obispo.

(El método de selección de los representantes jóvenes, universitarios y jóvenes adultos a Conferencia Anual será como el siguiente: la organización de la Conferencia de la Juventud seleccionará una persona joven entre las edades de doce (12) a diecisiete (17) años de cada distrito, la organización de adultos jóvenes de la Conferencia seleccionará una persona joven entre las edades de dieciocho (18) y treinta (30) años de cada distrito. En ausencia de una organización estudiantil de la Universidad, el Concilio de Educación Superior y Ministerio del Campo Universitario seleccionará un estudiante universitario como miembro laico de la Conferencia Anual. Cada una de las agencias es responsable de proporcionar los nombres y la información de contacto de estas personas a la Secretaria de la Conferencia no más tardar del 15 de enero de cada año).

Miembros laicos definidos por la conferencia anual

- d. Un miembro laico adicional asignado a cada iglesia que no tiene miembro laico como previsto en 18a y 18b arriba; y
- e. Otros miembros según lo definido por la Conferencia Anual que incluya: un representante adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones de la Conferencia de Hombres Metodistas Unidos, las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el Presidente y un representante adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones del distrito de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Hombres Metodistas Unidos, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el Canciller, el director laico a la Conferencia de Emaús (si existe), el Coordinador de Reclutadores a la Conferencia (si existe), los líderes laicos asociados a la Conferencia (si existen), el elegido personal ejecutivo de la Conferencia (si existe), el Presidente de cualquier agencia de la Conferencia o Comisión permanente que informa directamente a la Conferencia Anual; miembros laicos de la Mesa Unida y la Mesa de Finanzas; y uno de los miembros laicos de cada iglesia de nuevo comienzo no incorporada elegido por el distrito donde se encuentra la iglesia de nuevo comienzo.
- f. Adicionales laicos necesarios para igualar a los laicos y miembros del clero se asignarán a cada distrito, basado en la membresía del distrito. La Secretaria de la Conferencia notificará a cada Superintendente del número de miembros laicos adicionales por ser elegidos no más tarde de sesenta (60) días después de la Conferencia Anual. Cada distrito determinará el método de elección.
- g. A través de 2024 el número de miembros laicos adicionales elegidos deberá incluir a miembros de ambas conferencias patrocinadoras.
- h. Por lo menos el 10% de estos laicos adicionales será de treinta (30) años de edad o menos en el momento de la elección.
- 19. De acuerdo con ¶ 659 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, las conferencias de distrito se compondrán de todos los miembros de la Conferencia Anual como previsto por las reglas permanentes relacionadas a las iglesias dentro de los límites de sus respectivos distritos y actualmente elegidos. Además, se incluirá al Presidente de cada agencia del distrito.

PROCEDIMIENTOS CONFERENCIALES

- 20. Las propuestas e informes de agencias de la Conferencia se compilarán en un Informe de Pre-Conferencia que se hará disponible como documento electrónico o en forma impresa a todos los miembros de la Conferencia, por lo menos treinta (30) días antes de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual. Cada informe deberá indicarse "Para Acción de la Conferencia" o " Únicamente para Información."
- 21. La Conferencia Anual deberá hacer disponibles ediciones en inglés y en español de toda la correspondencia oficial, incluyendo pero no limitado a los contenidos del Informe de Pre-Conferencia y las Actas de la Conferencia. La Conferencia Anual también deberá presentar una traducción oral entre el español e inglés, y también proveerá apoyo para personas con discapacidades de audita y visión, durante las sesiones de la Conferencia Anual.
- 22. Las Resoluciones deberán llegar al piso de la Conferencia sólo después de consideración y acción de la agencia apropiada de la Conferencia.
- 23. Los procedimientos de la Conferencia se regirán por los siguientes en orden de precedencia: el Libro de Disciplina, las Reglas Permanentes, cualquier regla especial aprobada por la Conferencia Anual y la edición actual de las Reglas de Orden Roberts.
- 24. El Secretario de la Conferencia deberá establecer la barra de la Conferencia. El Secretario de la Conferencia nombrará y la Conferencia Anual elegirá a las personas necesarias para ayudar en los procedimientos de la Conferencia. Estos incluyen el guardador de tiempo, los cajeros, secretarios/as asociados/as y el Comité de Minutas.
- 25. Todos los oradores deben identificarse, dando su nombre y nombre de su iglesia, y decir si son miembros del clero o laicos de la Conferencia.
- 26. Cada discurso desde el piso o en contra de una moción estará limitada a tres minutos. El guardador de tiempo informará al Obispo cuando se ha expirado el tiempo.
- 27. El Consentimiento de Agenda 1 consiste en informes de agencias de la Conferencia que no son de acción, sino "Únicamente para Información." La Conferencia actúa sólo para recibir estos informes y para imprimirlos en el Diario. La Agenda de Consentimiento 2 consiste en informes de acción sobre los cuales se cree que habrá poca o ninguna disidencia. Los elementos incluidos en el Consentimiento de Agenda 2 están determinados por un grupo de trabajo compuesto por miembros del Comité de Agenda y Adoración. Cualquier miembro de la Conferencia Anual puede proponer la supresión de cualquiera de los elementos del Consentimiento de Agendas. Después de un secundo y una explicación de un minuto por el creador de la propuesta, se tomará el voto por la Conferencia sin debate.

- Si el 20% de los miembros votan que el elemento se quite, se quita y se trae al piso de la Conferencia como un elemento de no consentimiento en un momento determinado por el Comité de Agenda y Adoración.
- 28. El Comité de Reglas Permanentes informará a la Conferencia Anual durante la primera sesión de negocios de cada Conferencia Anual. Las revisiones o enmiendas deben ser adoptadas por dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia Anual y puestos en efecto inmediatamente después de su adopción, a menos que se indique lo contrario en la legislación. Las Reglas Permanentes podrán ser suspendidas en cualquier momento por dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia Anual.
- 29. El informe preliminar del Comité de Nominaciones se presentará a temprana hora en la agenda de los procedimientos de la Conferencia Anual, incluyendo el proceso de nominaciones desde el piso de la Conferencia. El informe final del Comité de Nominaciones será presentado y puesto en acción durante una sesión posterior a esa Conferencia Anual.
- 30. Cualquier informe o resolución que requiera la acción de la Conferencia debe estar en manos de la Secretaria de la Conferencia a la más temprana hora posible para permitir su impresión y distribución a la Conferencia; es decir, veinticuatro (24) horas antes de que el informe sea considerado por la Conferencia. Mociones del piso de la Conferencia deben presentarse por escrito al Presidente y al Secretario de la Conferencia en el momento que la propuesta se presente.
- 31. El líder laico de la Conferencia presidirá la Comité de Resoluciones y Cortesías y será responsable de nombrar a otras personas para ayudar en la preparación del informe.
- 32. Los únicos materiales que pueden ser colocados en las mesas del piso de la conferencia son los materiales oficiales distribuidos por el Secretario de la Conferencia y su personal.
- 33. Las actas estarán disponibles en línea a no más tardar de sesenta (60) días después de la clausura de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual.

OTROS

- 34. El informe de la Iglesia Local a la Conferencia Anual (Informe Anual de Estadísticas) requerido por la Iglesia General será completado y presentado ante la Conferencia no más tarde del 30 de enero, como se indica en ¶ 606.7 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Esto puede hacerse utilizando el método determinado ser más fácil y efectivo por el/la estadístico/a de la Conferencia.
- 35. Habrá un Manual de Política que contiene las políticas adoptadas por la Conferencia Anual. Cambios a estas políticas deben ser aprobados por la Conferencia Anual. El Secretario de la Conferencia hará posible que éstas estén disponibles como documentos electrónicos y en forma impresa.
- 36. Cualquier ministro de la Conferencia Anual que lleva a cabo un servicio funeral o memorial de un ministro compañero o cónyuge de un ministro deberá presentar al Secretario de la Conferencia un documento memorial de esa persona dentro de un mes del memorial, en conformidad con las Directivas de Memoriales que serán hechas disponibles por el Secretario de la Conferencia.



INFORME V PARA INFORMACIÓN SOLAMENTE

El propósito de la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) es "desarrollar, mantener y administrar un plan integral y coordinado de servicios de políticas, procedimientos y gestión fiscales y administrativas para la Conferencia Anual" (¶611.1 El Libro de Disciplina 2016).

De acuerdo con el propósito disciplinario, la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) se ve propiamente como una parte integral de la misión y el ministerio de la Conferencia. Estamos trabajando para mejorar las comunicaciones con las otras agencias de la Conferencia para asegurarnos de que nuestro trabajo respalde los ministerios y las metas de La Mesa Unida y el Mission Field Ministry office.

Los recibos de todos los fondos para el año 2019 por la Conferencia Río Texas fueron de \$9,267,260.99 o 88.90% de la cantidad asignada. La Mesa de Finanzas propone el presupuesto para 2021. El presupuesto total asignado para todos los fondos asciende a \$8,439,072.

La Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) se considera ser socio de la iglesia local en el trabajo del ministerio financiero de la Conferencia Anual. Alagamos el presupuesto de 2021 a la Conferencia. Representa la originalidad y la profundidad de los ministerios y misiones de nuestra iglesia y realidades económicas de nuestra Conferencia. La Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A), junto con el Tesorero de la Conferencia, ha estado monitoreando la membresía y las tendencias económicas dentro de la Conferencia, la Iglesia Global y la sociedad en general. Creemos que la salud y la vitalidad futuras de nuestro ministerio requerirán que las cantidades asignadas a las iglesias locales se reduzcan significativamente en los próximos años. A medida que las metas y la dirección de la Conferencia se vuelvan más claras, trabajaremos con el Obispo, la Mesa Unida y el Mission Field Ministry office para garantizar que el presupuesto y las asignaciones reflejen con precisión esos objetivos y apoyen a esos ministerios. Al mismo tiempo, continuaremos trabajando con nuestro Tesorero de la Conferencia, el Comité de Personal y otros líderes de la Conferencia para mejorar las comunicaciones, los sistemas y la eficiencia.

Políticas de funcionamiento de la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A):

5. El salario (incluida la vivienda y los servicios públicos) para los superintendentes de los distritos será recomienda a la Conferencia Anual por la Meza de Finanzas (CF&A), utilizando una fórmula directriz adoptada por el Comité de Personal de 1.85 veces la media de Compensación Conferencia (CAC). El propósito de la fórmula es de relacionar la Compensación del SD a la Compensación Clero de Tiempo Completo. Recomendamos que el cálculo del salario también se aplique a otros miembros del clero nombrados al personal de la conferencia a nivel de Gabinete. Para el año 2021, el cabinete a solicitado que esta formula se ponga a un lado dejando sus salarios congelados a la taza mas baja del 2020.

La fórmula decimal se basa en el promedio de dos años los gastos de operación de la iglesia local dividido por dos años a nivel gastos de la iglesia local a lo largo de la conferencia por cada fondo prorrateado. - 4. Todos los costos asignados a fondos, pensiones y beneficios de salud, ambos ingresos y desembolsos, se gestionarán a través de la oficina del Tesorero de la Conferencia. Todas las juntas, agencias, comités y comisiones utilizarán el Tesorero de la Conferencia como agente fiscal.
- 5. El salario (incluida la vivienda y los servicios públicos) para los superintendentes de los distritos será recomienda a la Conferencia Anual por la Meza de Finanzas (CF&A), utilizando una fórmula directriz adoptada por el Comité de Personal de 1.85 veces la media de Compensación Conferencia (CAC). - 7. El importe de compensación señalado como subsidio de vivienda para miembros ordenados y superintendentes de distrito de la Conferencia se establecerá por medio de una resolución anual de la Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A) después de la consideración de una declaración de las cantidades que se utilizarán durante el año.
- 8. - 9. El Presidente, el Vicepresidente y el Secretario de la Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A), el Presidente del Comité de Auditoría y el Tesorero de la Conferencia y el Director de Servicios Administrativos constituyen el Comité Ejecutivo de la Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia.
- 10. La Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A) está autorizada a nombrar a un Auditor de la Conferencia.
- 11. A un Fondo de la Conferencia no se le permite llevar adelante las asignaciones del presupuesto de un año de la Conferencia a otro año a menos que específicamente se autorice por la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A). Agencias que reciben fondos de otras fuentes que no sean fondos asignados pueden avanzar dichos fondos no gastados al año siguiente. Cualquiera asignación del presupuesto no autorizada para ser avanzada se añadirá al saldo de Fondos no Designados de la Conferencia Anual.
- 12. Cada año, el Contador de la Conferencia establecerá una fecha de corte para todos los pagos del presupuesto al Tesorero de la Conferencia que se aplicará al año anterior. Esta fecha se comunicará a las iglesias locales a no más tardar del 1 de diciembre de cada año.
- 13. Cada junta de conferencia, agencia o institución en recepción o desembolso de fondos no manejados por el Tesorero de la Conferencia deberá mantener registros financieros adecuados y preparar y presentar informes anuales de auditoría al Tesorero de la Conferencia y la Mesa de Finanzas (CF&A). Todos los Tesoreros todos deberán tener fianzas apropiadas.
- 14. El Año de la Conferencia principia el 1 de enero de cada año y termina el 31 de diciembre de cada año.
- 15. La Mesa de Finanzas de la Conferencia (CF&A) es responsable de designar depositarios de fondos de la Conferencia.
- 16. La Conferencia incluirá en cada presupuesto anual una línea apropiada para cada Ministerio autorizado como se define en el *Libro de Disciplina*.

INFORME VII POLÍTICA DE COMPENSACIÓN EQUITATIVA PARA EL USO DEL FONDO DE MINISTERIOS HISPANOS PARA INFORMACIÓN SOLAMENTE

La Comisión recomienda el siguiente proceso estratégico que provee ayuda para liderato pastoral a iglesias nuevas y existentes trabajando en ministerios con Hispanos/Latinos dentro de la Conferencia Río Texas utilizando el Fondo de Ministerios Hispanos. El proceso involucra varias entidades locales, distritales, y conferénciales para proveer el mejor uso estratégico de estos fondos limitados. La Comisión será responsable por lo siguiente:

- 3. Compartir la data y la lista con el Obispo y su Gabinete, los equipos distritales de estrategia, y personal clave conferéncial para discutir, negociar, y hacer prioridades de iglesias potenciales;
- 4. En consulta con los equipos distritales de estrategia, invitar a iglesias locales para aplicar al Fondo de Ministerios Hispanos de la Comisión, repasar las solicitudes, y aprobar anualmente donativos;
- 5. Requerir con los equipos distritales de estrategia a incorporar y utilizar programas conferénciales y herramienta apropiada, tales como mentores, asesores, la Iniciativa de Iglesia Saludable, etc., y monitorear y celebrar el progreso de su desarrollo y logros de ministerio con Hispanos/Latinos;
- 6. Repasar y aprobar donativos adicionales anualmente a las mismas iglesias (si es necesario).

INFORME VIII REEMBOLSO DE GASTOS DE REUNIÓN PARA INFORMACIÓN SOLAMENTE

tamaño de edificios: santuario, edificio educacional

A todas las juntas y agencias se les insta a programar sus reuniones, en lo que sea posible, en fechas y lugares coincidiendo con otros grupos para afectar la economía de gastos de viaje. Los gastos de viaje se pagarán a los miembros que asisten a reuniones oficiales de la Conferencia (entre períodos de sesiones anuales de la conferencia) a base de 40 centavos por milla. La asignación para las comidas será de \$3.00 para el desayuno; \$7.00 para ambos el almuerzo y la cena por las reuniones. Se hará el reembolso del 100% de gastos de alojamiento durante reuniones en hoteles contratados a través de la Conferencia Anual. Quienes optan por quedarse en otros lugares se les reembolsarán a la tarifa contratada más baja. El organizador de la reunión de conferencia proporcionará información de hoteles contratados a los participantes. Los recibos de alojamiento deberán acompañar la solicitud de desembolso. Estos subsidios no cubrirán el costo completo en cada caso, pues son simplemente para ayudar en el gasto adicional de asistir a reuniones.

Gastos de cuidado de niños por día de la reunión no deben exceder \$30.00 por el primer niño y \$20.00 por cada niño adicional, y estos gastos serán permitidos e incluidos en el costo de la reunión de la Junta o la Agencia.

Viajes de delegados debidamente elegidos o representantes de la Conferencia a las reuniones de otras organizaciones o agencias de conexión se pagarán como se indicó anteriormente. Sin embargo, gastos de viaje aéreo, hospedaje y otros gastos pueden pagarse si los fondos están disponibles por la junta o agencia correspondiente.

Cuando sea necesario volar a una reunión, el vuelo debe ser reservado al menos 14 días antes de la reunión. Si los vuelos no se reservan 14 días antes de la reunión, el miembro que reserva el vuelo deberá pagar la diferencia del costo del vuelo. Esto no se aplica en los casos raros cuando la reunión es una reunión de emergencia que no se anuncia antes de 14 días.

A cada iglesia local se le sugiere que respalde los gastos de la comida, el transporte, y el alojamiento de Conferencia Anual de los miembros asistiendo a la Conferencia Anual por medio de la adición de un mínimo de \$100 al presupuesto de la iglesia para delegados laicos y del clero. Los superintendentes de distrito deberán fomentar este apoyo en cada Conferencia de Cargo.

INFORME I TARIFA DE SERVICIO ANTERIOR A 2021 PARA LA ACCIÓN DE LA CONFERENCIA

La Tasa de Servicios Anteriores para 2021 será de \$ 682 por año de crédito de anualidad. Esto refleja un aumento de \$ 10,00 o 1,5% sobre la tarifa de servicio anterior de 2020.

En 2016, la Junta de Pensiones adoptó una estrategia de PSR a largo plazo basada en aumentos del 70% del índice de costo de vida de la Reserva Federal de St. Louis Región Sur Urbana para establecer la tasa de servicio anterior cada año. La Junta cree que esta política brinda honor, apoyo y aprecio a nuestro clero jubilado mientras mantiene un plan sostenible para cumplir con las obligaciones por beneficios. Cualquier cambio en el PSR también aumenta las responsabilidades del Plan y debe ser financiado en el año adoptado si es necesario de acuerdo con el nivel de activos del Plan y los requisitos de financiamiento de Wespath.

INFORME II RESOLUCIONES RELATIVAS A SUBSIDIOS DE ALQUILER / VIVIENDA PARA CLERES JUBILADOS O DISCAPACITADOS DE LA CONFERENCIA RIO TEXAS PARA LA ACCIÓN DE LA CONFERENCIA

La Conferencia Río Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida adopta las siguientes resoluciones relacionadas con las asignaciones de alquiler / vivienda para clérigos activos, jubilados, despedidos o discapacitados:

CONSIDERANDO QUE, la denominación religiosa conocida como La Iglesia Metodista Unida (de aquí, la "Iglesia"), de la cual esta Conferencia es parte, ha funcionado en el anterior y continúa funcionando a través de ministros del evangelio (dentro del significado de la sección 107 del Código de Rentas Internas) que fueron o son ministros de la Iglesia debidamente ordenados, comisionados o autorizados ("clérigos");

CONSIDERANDO que la práctica de la Iglesia y esta Conferencia fue y es de proporcionar a los clérigos activos una casa pastoral o un subsidio de alquiler / vivienda como parte de su compensación bruta;

CONSIDERANDO QUE, las pensiones u otras cantidades pagadas a clérigos activos, jubilados, cesados y discapacitados se consideran compensación diferida y se pagan a clérigos activos, jubilados, cesados y discapacitados en consideración del servicio activo anterior; y

CONSIDERANDO que el Servicio de Impuestos Internos (IRS) ha reconocido a la Conferencia (o sus predecesoras) como la organización apropiada para designar un subsidio de alquiler / vivienda para las personas del clero que son o fueron miembros de esta Conferencia y son elegibles para recibir dicha compensación diferida;

AHORA, POR LO TANTO, SE RESUELVE QUE una cantidad equivalente al 100% de los pagos de pensión, indemnización o discapacidad recibidos de planes autorizados bajo el Libro de Disciplina de la Iglesia Metodista Unida (de aquí, la "Disciplina"), que incluye todos los pagos de Los Beneficios e Inversiones de Wespath, durante los años 2020 y 2021 por cada clérigo activo, jubilado, despedido o discapacitado que sea o haya sido miembro de la Conferencia, o sus predecesores, se designe y por la presente se designa como una asignación de alquiler / vivienda para cada tal clérigo; y que los pagos de pensión por despido o discapacidad a los que se aplica este subsidio de alquiler / vivienda serán cualquier pago de pensión, despido o discapacidad de planes, anualidades o fondos autorizados por la Disciplina, incluidos dichos pagos de Wespath Benefits and Investments "Wespath" y de una compañía de anualidades comerciales que proporcione una anualidad que surja de beneficios acumulados bajo un plan, anualidad o fondo Wespath autorizado bajo la Disciplina, que resulten de cualquier servicio que un clérigo prestó a esta Conferencia o que un miembro activo, jubilado, terminado o clérigo discapacitado de esta Conferencia prestado a cualquier iglesia local, conferencias anuales de la Iglesia, agencia general de la Iglesia, otra institución de la Iglesia, denominación anterior que ahora es parte de la Iglesia, o cualquier otro empleador que empleara al clérigo para realizar servicios relacionados con el ministerio de la Iglesia, o sus predecesores, y que eligió hacer contribuciones o acumular un beneficio bajo, dicho plan, anualidad o fondo para la pensión o discapacidad de dicho clérigo activo, jubilado o discapacitado como parte de su compensación bruta.

NOTA: La asignación de alquiler / vivienda que puede excluirse de los ingresos brutos de una persona del clero en cualquier año para fines de impuestos federales sobre la renta está limitada según la sección 107 (2) del Código de Rentas Internas y las regulaciones a continuación al mínimo de: (1) la cantidad de el subsidio de alquiler / vivienda designado por el empleador del clérigo u otro organismo

apropiado de la Iglesia (como esta Conferencia en las resoluciones anteriores) para ese año; (2) la cantidad realmente gastada por el clérigo para alquilar o proporcionar una vivienda en dicho año; o (3) el valor justo de alquiler de la casa, incluidos los muebles y accesorios (como un garaje), más el costo de los servicios públicos en dicho año.

INFORME III PLAN INTEGRAL DE FINANCIACIÓN 2020 SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

El Plan Integral de Financiamiento está siendo revisado por Wespath Benefits and Investments y estará disponible en la sesión anual de la conferencia y se incluirá en el Diario de la Conferencia Río Texas 2020.

INFORME IV INFORME DEL PRESIDENTE SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

La misión de la Junta de Pensiones de la Conferencia de Río Texas es "cuidar a los que sirven" proporcionando el honor, el apoyo y el aprecio de nuestro clero y participantes laicos. Nuestro enfoque incluye la administración de planes de beneficios de conferencias tanto en el presente como en las décadas futuras para todos los beneficiarios del plan. Nos esforzamos por ser buenos administradores de los recursos que se nos han confiado para implementar la política de beneficios denominacionales y de la Conferencia en colaboración con nuestro socio ministerial Wespath Beneficios e Inversiones.

Por primera vez en nuestra historia, la pandemia de COVID-19 ha traído una época de desafíos, sufrimiento y calamidad económica sin precedentes en el mundo y en nuestra nación. En medio de la crisis, hemos visto resiliencia en la iglesia y nuestras comunidades a medida que continuamos navegando y ajustándonos a estos tiempos inciertos en el ministerio. La Junta se está adaptando y sigue dedicada a su misión de servir a la Conferencia y a los participantes. Desde los primeros días de la pandemia en marzo, Wespath, en colaboración con GCFA, ha estado proporcionando una guía pandémica sobre la legislación COVID-19, incluida la Ley "CARES" - Ley de Ayuda, Alivio y Seguridad Económica por Coronavirus y la FFCRA o Respuesta de Familias Primero al Coronavirus. Actuar. Esta información se puede encontrar en el sitio web de la Conferencia en www.riotexas.org/covidhrtoolkit y www.wespath.org. Antes de la pandemia, esperábamos el resultado y el impacto de los cambios denominacionales en la Iglesia Metodista Unida y nuestra Conferencia. Junto con el aplazamiento de la Conferencia General, la legislación de pensiones propuesta anteriormente se retrasó para la próxima sesión de la Conferencia General en 2021. A principios de 2020, el Plan Pre-82, el Plan de Pensión Ministerial (MPP) y el Plan de Seguridad de Jubilación del Clero (CRSP-DB) no tenía pasivos no financiados y continuaremos monitoreando la volatilidad del mercado para mantener un plan de activos sostenible a largo plazo para cumplir con los pasivos por beneficios para todos los beneficiarios.

Crédito de octubre de HealthFlex y actualización de 2021

Para ayudar a las iglesias con el alivio de la pandemia de COVID-19, las iglesias con clérigos elegibles de tiempo completo y participantes laicos en Healthflex que no se encuentren en situación de morosidad recibirán un crédito único de HealthFlex en octubre, lo que dará como resultado que no se adeude el saldo de HealthFlex para el mes de octubre. Este crédito no se aplica a ninguna cuenta de reembolso personal ni a planes de pensión.

Para proporcionar estabilidad adicional como resultado de la eliminación gradual de la distribución y los cambios en el modelo de planes múltiples de Healthflex Exchange:

- La contribución de tasa fija de CRSP-DB de 2021 de \$511 por mes seguirá siendo la misma que en 2020.
- El Crédito Premium HealthFlex (PC) 2021 permanecerá en \$ 900 por mes al igual que en 2020.
- A partir del 1 de enero de 2021, nos complace anunciar que la red de proveedores de Rio Texas HealthFlex será la red nacional de Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS). Con esta transición, habrá una reducción en las tarifas médicas de 2021 con una disminución promedio del 2%. Estos ahorros se transferirán a los participantes de nuestro plan en sus selecciones de planes 2021. Permanecer en United Healthcare Network habría resultado en un aumento promedio del 4% en los seis planes.

Después de un difícil año del plan HealthFlex 2018 con reclamos un 23% más altos, el plan se estabilizó en 2019 y estamos monitoreando cualquier impacto relacionado con COVID en el plan en los reclamos de 2020 y la renovación para 2022. Los participantes del plan HealthFlex continúan utilizando las diversas ofertas de planes en HealthFlex El intercambio, la selección entre seis ofertas de planes médicos, tres dentales y de la vista y la participación en cuentas de reembolso personal han aumentado desde la transición a Exchange. Este modelo de planes múltiples permite una mayor flexibilidad para elegir una combinación de planes que se adapte mejor a las necesidades de un participante.

Me gustaría agradecer a todas nuestras iglesias, clérigos y miembros laicos por adaptarse y seguir adelante con perseverancia y esperanza para continuar compartiendo el evangelio. Nuestras iglesias se han mantenido comprometidas en sus contribuciones para los beneficios a pesar de muchas pruebas nuevas y continuaremos en nuestra misión de cuidar de usted.

INFORME V PLANES DE PENSIONES SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

PLAN DE PENSIONES 2021 FACTURACIÓN DIRECTA A IGLESIA

A partir del 1 de enero de 2021, la facturación directa de la iglesia por parte de la conferencia para los miembros del clero con nombramiento para el servicio activo actual incluirá:

- El Beneficio Definido del Plan de Seguridad para la Jubilación del Clero (CRSP) requería una contribución anual de \$ 6,132 por cada clero elegible a tiempo completo facturado mensualmente.
- El Plan de Seguridad para la Jubilación del Clérigo (de aquí, CRSP) Contribución requerida definida del 3% de la compensación del plan por cada clérigo de tiempo completo elegible, facturado mensualmente.
- El Plan de Protección Integral (de aquí, CPP) requería una contribución del 3% de Compensación del Plan para cada clérigo elegible a tiempo completo hasta un máximo de dos veces la compensación promedio denominacional de 2021 o el DAC de \$ 74,199 en 2021 facturado mensualmente.
- Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido (de aquí, UMPIP-PT) requerida Contribución del 9% por cada clérigo de medio tiempo elegible (cita de 3/4 de tiempo o menos), facturada mensualmente.
- Contribuciones opcionales del Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido (de aquí, UMPIP) elegidas por el clero como una deducción de la nómina facturada mensualmente.
- El Fondo de Legacía Río Grande (Rio Grande Legacy Fund) continuará proporcionando contribuciones a las iglesias heredadas elegibles para el clero de tiempo completo en el Plan de Beneficios Definido por CRSP, el Plan de Contribución Definido por CRSP y el Plan de Protección Integral (CPP).
- El Fondo de Legacía Río Grande continuará proporcionando contribuciones del 9% al clero elegible a tiempo parcial designado para una iglesia heredada en el Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido UMPIP-PT.

PLAN DE PENSIONES PRE-82

El Plan de Pensión Pre-82, también conocido como Suplemento Uno del Plan de Seguridad de Jubilación para Clérigos (CRSP), es un plan de pensión de beneficios definidos administrado por Wespath y proporciona al clero elegible un beneficio de pensión por sus años de ministerio con la Iglesia Metodista Unida antes de 1982. El Plan de Pensión Pre-82 fue reemplazado por el Plan de Pensión Ministerial (MPP) a partir del 1 de enero de 1982. Una de las responsabilidades de la Junta de Pensiones es recomendar a la conferencia anual la Tasa de Servicios Anteriores o (PSR) al clero para cada año de servicio elegible en el Plan de Pensión Pre-82.

A medida que la necesidad de proporcionar beneficios de pensión al clero adecuados evolucionó con el establecimiento del Plan de Pensión Pre-82, las contribuciones no fueron suficientes para proporcionar los beneficios requeridos para muchos participantes durante los años de servicio activo. Por lo tanto, se convirtió en responsabilidad de la conferencia garantizar que las obligaciones de beneficios requeridas por el plan se proporcionen mediante contribuciones anuales en un calendario de amortización hasta el 2021. El objetivo de cada conferencia es que el Plan de Pensiones Pre-82 esté completamente financiado hasta que se hayan cumplido las obligaciones de beneficios. Sin embargo, los activos del Plan no están fijos con el potencial de pasivos adicionales debido a la volatilidad del mercado, las políticas de Wespath y el número de beneficiarios elegibles. Además, cualquier aumento en la Tasa de Servicios Anteriores (PSR) adoptada por la Conferencia también aumenta las obligaciones del plan.

En 2016, la Junta de Pensiones adoptó una estrategia de PSR a largo plazo basada en aumentos del 70% del índice de costo de vida de la Reserva Federal de St. Louis en la Región Sur Urbana para establecer la tasa de servicio anterior cada año. La Junta cree que esta política brinda honor, apoyo y aprecio a nuestro clero jubilado mientras mantiene un plan sostenible para cumplir con las obligaciones por beneficios. Cualquier cambio en el PSR también aumenta las responsabilidades del Plan y debe financiarse en el año adoptado si es necesario de acuerdo con el nivel de activos del Plan y los requisitos de financiamiento. Al 31 de diciembre de 2019, no se adeuda ningún pasivo Pre-82 adicional o Contribución Anticipada para 2021 para financiar el aumento de la Tasa de Servicios Anteriores.

PLAN MINISTERIAL DE PENSIONES (MPP)

El Plan de Pensión Ministerial, también conocido como Suplemento Tres del Plan de Jubilación de la Seguridad del Clero (CRSP), proporciona al clero un beneficio de pensión por sus años de ministerio con la Iglesia Metodista Unida desde 1982 hasta 2006. El MPP es un Código de Rentas Internas Sección 403 (b) plan de jubilación. Se requiere que la Conferencia respalde cualquier responsabilidad atribuible a las anualidades del MPP debido a las fluctuaciones del mercado, supuestos demográficos / de mortalidad y las políticas del Plan Wespath. A partir del 1 de enero de 2019, la valoración actuarial para 2021, el índice de fondos de anualidades MPP y CRSP para la Conferencia de Río Texas es de aproximadamente 107,3%. No se requieren contribuciones adicionales al MPP en 2020 y 2021 bajo la metodología de Financiamiento del Corredor de Wespath.

PLAN DE JUBILACIÓN DE SEGURIDAD CLERGY (CRSP)

El plan de pensión actual requerido para los clérigos elegibles de tiempo completo es el Plan de Jubilación de Seguridad del Clero o CRSP administrado por Wespath. Este plan entró en vigencia el 1 de enero de 2007 y se compone de un componente de contribución definida (CD) y de beneficio definido (DB).

CONTRIBUCIÓN DEFINIDA (DC)

proporciona una cantidad definida que se deposita en la cuenta de un clérigo activo a tiempo completo con contribuciones mensuales. Este beneficio distribuido al jubilarse es el monto acumulado más las ganancias (o pérdidas) en la cuenta del individuo. El componente de contribución definida (DC) de CRSP es el 2% de la Compensación del Plan con una igualación de las contribuciones de los

participantes al Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido (UMPIP) - hasta el 1% de la Compensación del Plan. Por lo tanto, si un participante aporta al menos el 1% de la compensación a UMPIP, las contribuciones de CRSP DC serán del 3%.

BENEFICIO DEFINIDO (DB)

proporciona una cantidad específica en dólares al momento de la jubilación, independientemente de las condiciones del mercado o el rendimiento de la inversión. La cantidad se basa en una fórmula que especifica un beneficio de jubilación mensual para el clero elegible y el 70% para los pensionistas contingentes elegibles por el resto de sus vidas. El CRSP-DB proporciona un beneficio de jubilación mensual utilizando el 1.25% de la Compensación Promedio Denominacional (DAC) al momento de la jubilación multiplicado por los años de servicio desde el 1 de enero de 2007 hasta el 31 de diciembre de 2013. El multiplicador se reduce al 1% por años de servicio a partir del 1 de enero de 2014.

Ambos componentes se facturan directamente a cada iglesia para todos los clérigos elegibles de tiempo completo. La facturación de contribución definida (DC) se basa en el 3% de la compensación del plan. La facturación directa anual de beneficios definidos (DB) en 2020 a las iglesias por cada clérigo designado para el servicio de tiempo completo es de \$ 6,132. La facturación directa anual del beneficio definido (DB) en 2021 a las iglesias por cada clérigo designado para el servicio de tiempo completo se mantendrá en \$ 6,132. La contribución anual de DB a Wespath se basa en el número de clérigos de tiempo completo elegibles, clérigos con ausencia médica

con beneficios de CPP en la valoración actuarial proporcionada por Wespath. El monto de la contribución adeudado en 2020 para el componente DB es \$ 1,618,824 y \$ 1,559,225 en 2021. Cualquier clérigo que sirva menos de tiempo completo que no sea elegible para el CRSP DB es elegible para participar en el Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido con una contribución de la iglesia requerida del 9% de la compensación del plan.

PLAN DE PROTECCIÓN INTEGRAL (CPP)

El Plan de Protección Integral (CPP) es un plan de beneficios sociales administrado por Wespath Benefits and Investments. El CPP incluye beneficios por discapacidad a largo plazo, muerte y otros beneficios sociales para el clero elegible a tiempo completo. El plan CPP es un "plan de iglesia" del Código de Rentas Internas 414 (e) financiado por las contribuciones de los patrocinadores del plan. El CPP exige que la facturación directa a las iglesias sea el 3% de la Compensación del Plan para el clero elegible a tiempo completo hasta dos veces de la compensación del promedio denominacional de 2020 o DAC de \$ 72,648 y \$ 74,199 en 2021.

PLAN DE INVERSIÓN PERSONAL METODISTA UNIDO (UMPIP) PARA LAICOS Y CLERO

El Plan de Inversión Metodista Unida (UMPIP) es un plan de ahorros para la jubilación de contribución definida, sección 403 (b), del Código de Rentas Internas administrado por Wespath para el clero y empleados laicos de la Iglesia Metodista Unida y organizaciones afiliadas. Los participantes elegibles pueden hacer contribuciones personales a través de deducciones de nómina para contribuciones antes de impuestos, Roth o después de impuestos en una cantidad fija en dólares o un porcentaje de la compensación elegible, hasta los límites del Código de Rentas Internas. Se anima a las iglesias a ofrecer el UMPIP a los empleados laicos y pueden comunicarse con Wespath para obtener disposiciones adicionales del plan y patrocinio.

Cualquier clérigo designado a una iglesia por menos de un servicio de tiempo completo es elegible para participar en el UMPIP y recibir una contribución de la iglesia requerida del 9% de la Compensación del Plan. Además, se anima a todo el clero activo a participar en el UMPIP con contribuciones personales. Para que el clero reciba los beneficios máximos de pensión financiada por la iglesia en el plan de contribución definida de CRSP (DC) del 3%, tal deberá contribuir con un mínimo del 1% al Plan de Inversión Personal Metodista Unido (UMPIP).

INFORME VI 2021 HEALTHFLEX SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

BENEFICIOS HEALTHFLEX

La Conferencia Río Texas participa en el Plan HealthFlex administrado por Wespath Benefits and Investments para clérigos elegibles de tiempo completo y empleados laicos de la Conferencia. El plan HealthFlex también está disponible para los empleados laicos de las iglesias que han adoptado un Acuerdo de subadopción de unidad de pago de salario de HealthFlex que cumple con los requisitos de elegibilidad del Plan. HealthFlex es un programa de salud integrado y orientado al bienestar que respalda estilos de vida más saludables. El plan HealthFlex está diseñado para brindar a los participantes elegibles un plan integral que incluye beneficios médicos, de medicamentos recetados y de bienestar. HealthFlex utiliza incentivos como parte de su estrategia para promover la participación en conductas saludables y programas de bienestar. La estrategia 2021 continúa enfocándose en las recompensas tanto por medir los riesgos a través de Blueprint for Wellness Screening and Health Quotient (HQ), el programa de prevención de la diabetes como por tomar en cuenta medidas para mejorar la salud y el bienestar. Las recompensas enfatizan la participación en programas que han demostrado tener un impacto positivo en los riesgos de salud, incluido el asesoramiento sobre salud y el programa de actividades Virgin Pulse. Además, de los beneficios de bienestar de HealthFlex, la Conferencia también ofrece beneficios de bienestar holísticos adicionales para el clero y los empleados laicos de la Conferencia, incluidos componentes de atención espiritual, mental, emocional y física financiados por subvenciones de los Ministerios Metodistas de Salud del Sur de Texas. A partir de 2021, el proveedor de HealthFlex será la Red Nacional de Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS).

ESTABLECIMIENTO DE UN FONDO DE ASISTENCIA DE ATENCIÓN MÉDICA

La Junta de Pensiones reconoce que la cobertura de atención médica asequible es un componente esencial de un paquete atractivo de beneficios para empleados. En el entorno actual de la atención médica, es evidente que las primas de atención médica de algunos

clérigos constituyen una parte importante de sus salarios. Para ayudar con esto, la Junta de Pensiones establecerá un fondo de dotación utilizando el dividendo de HealthFlex de 2016 para ayudar al clero cuyos salarios estén cerca del umbral mínimo a brindar atención médica a sus familias. Este fondo proporcionará subvenciones para alinear el costo de la atención médica para el clero con el costo del nivel P + 1 actual de 2020 (hasta \$ 6,000 en 2020). Estas subvenciones se coordinarán a través de los superintendentes de distrito

INTERCAMBIO PRIVADO HEALTHFLEX 2020

Para alinearse con el panorama cambiante de la atención médica y los aumentos significativos en los costos de atención médica, la Junta de Pensiones adoptó la opción de planes múltiples de HealthFlex Private Exchange a partir del 1 de enero de 2019. La opción de planes múltiples de HealthFlex Private Exchange les brinda a los participantes una mayor elección en varios HealthFlex planes con diferentes diseños de planes y la flexibilidad para elegir la cobertura que mejor se adapte a las necesidades familiares, financieras y de salud del participante. El enfoque de planes múltiples fomenta una mayor responsabilidad de los participantes por los costos y la utilización de la atención médica, al tiempo que conserva los valiosos beneficios de HealthFlex y las oportunidades de bienestar que los participantes esperan de Wespath.

El Multi-Plan de Intercambio Privado de HealthFlex actual ofrece seis opciones de planes distintos para los participantes. Aunque HealthFlex tiene la discreción de modificar las ofertas del plan en 2021, las opciones de diseño del plan 2020 incluyen:

CONTRIBUCIÓN INDIVIDUAL DEFINIDA DEL INTERCAMBIO HEALTHFLEX 2021 (PC)

El diseño de HealthFlex Exchange 2021 incluye una contribución definida no imponible de \$ 900. El DC es una cantidad fija en dólares que se proporciona a cada miembro del clero de tiempo completo y empleado laico de la Conferencia de HealthFlex. Los participantes utilizarán la cantidad de DC asignada para seleccionar un plan de salud en HealthFlex Exchange y pagarán algunas o todas las primas del plan de su elección.

- El monto de 2021 DC será de \$ 900 por mes y se facturará directamente.
- El DC aparecerá como un "crédito hacia la compra" al elegir un plan HealthFlex entre todas las opciones de planes HealthFlex Exchange disponibles.
- Los participantes que elijan planes que cuesten menos que el monto de su crédito de DC "depositarán" el exceso. HealthFlex acreditará el saldo de DC no utilizado en la Cuenta de reembolso de gastos médicos (HRA) o Cuenta de ahorros para gastos médicos (HSA) del participante, según el plan de salud seleccionado. La cantidad anual excedente (saldo de CD no gastado) no

FACTURACIÓN DIRECTA HEALTHFLEX PARA TODO EL CLERO DE TIEMPO COMPLETO

Para garantizar que el Plan sea eficiente y sostenible para el beneficio de todos los participantes e iglesias con clérigos designados a tiempo completo, cualquier iglesia en la que un clérigo haya elegido no participar en HealthFlex se seguirá facturando la Contribución definida (DC) de \$ 900 por mes a través de facturación directa a partir del 1 de enero de 2019 y continuará en 2021. La Junta de Pensiones cree que los Beneficios de Salud no deberían ser un factor que obstaculice el equipamiento de una congregación con un clero excelente que se necesita para el ministerio. La Junta establecerá un programa de subvenciones con fondos recibidos de iglesias que tienen clérigos que no participan en HealthFlex para ayudar al clero con familias en la **transición** entre iglesias. Reconocemos que esto puede ser una carga financiera tanto para la iglesia como para el clero y creemos que esta asistencia ayudará a facilitar la transición. El programa, con la aprobación del superintendente de distrito, otorgaría subvenciones de hasta \$ 5,000 para asistencia del clero con seis meses de cobertura de atención médica como parte de la transición del clero a una nueva iglesia cuando la iglesia remitente y receptora hayan adoptado contribuciones diferentes para la cobertura de dependientes.

BENEFICIOS ADICIONALES

Seguro de vida a término opcional

La Conferencia ofrece un seguro de vida a término opcional para clérigos a tiempo completo y empleados laicos de conferencias sujetos a las pautas de suscripción de Prudential Life Insurance Company. Los participantes elegibles pueden elegir la cobertura de vida a término grupal como una deducción de nómina.

Cuenta de reembolso de salud para jubilados (HRA)

One Exchange proporciona una Cuenta de Reembolso de Salud para Jubilados (HRA) para jubilados elegibles y se financia mediante asignaciones. La HRA se basa en el monto del estipendio recibido por los jubilados elegibles antes del 31 de diciembre de 2013. Al 1 de enero de 2018, hay 71 jubilados elegibles para una HRA. Los jubilados elegibles deben estar inscritos en un plan Advantage o Suplementario de Medicare a través de Via Benefits (anteriormente One Exchange) para recibir la HRA. Con el fin de brindar sostenibilidad al beneficio de la HRA y no aumentar las obligaciones y distribuciones del plan de beneficios de la conferencia, la HRA es una cantidad fija por jubilado elegible y no aumenta de un año a otro.

De acuerdo con la política del Plan de Unificación de 2014, el estipendio de la HRA no se ofrecerá a ningún otro jubilado que actualmente no reciba una HRA. La HRA proporciona reembolso por los gastos de atención médica elegibles del IRS, como las primas de la Parte B de Medicare, las primas de los planes complementarios de Medicare y los gastos de bolsillo, como copagos y deducibles. Para recibir fondos de la HRA, los jubilados elegibles deben enviar un formulario de reclamo a Via Benefits anualmente para el reembolso de la prima o según sea necesario para otros gastos elegibles del IRS.

INFORME DE LA JUNTA DE SÍNDICOS

INFORME NO. I INFORME DEL PRESIDENTE SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo:

Me complace informarles en nombre de la Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia Río Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida. De acuerdo con la Sección 2512 del Libro de Disciplina de la Iglesia Metodista Unida 2016, la Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia tiene la responsabilidad de recibir y mantener en fideicomiso para el beneficio de la Conferencia, donaciones, propiedad personal y bienes inmuebles. Además, la Junta tiene la facultad de invertir, transferir o traspasar las propiedades que tiene en fideicomiso. La Junta se toma muy en serio su responsabilidad de supervisar los activos de la Conferencia.

Los activos que posee la Junta de Síndicos incluyen iglesias cerradas, casas parroquiales no utilizadas y terrenos sin urbanizar. La Junta trabaja en estrecha colaboración con el personal de la Conferencia y con las recomendaciones de los Distritos para supervisar y administrar la propiedad que se le ha confiado. En el caso de que la propiedad de la iglesia ya no esté en uso para una iglesia local y el Distrito crea que no habrá un culto de adoración o uso misional futuro para la propiedad, puede venderse.

Los Síndicos tienen de 10 a 20 propiedades bajo su revisión y administración en un momento dado. Estos son tanto urbanos como rurales e incluyen estructuras con algún valor y otras en mal estado material. El personal de la conferencia, bajo la dirección de Kendall Waller y Tina Whitaker, hace un excelente trabajo administrando las propiedades en transición. Muchas de estas propiedades tienen un valor limitado, ya sea debido a su ubicación o condición, y tardan algún tiempo en venderse. El tiempo que transcurre entre que los Síndicos toman el control de la propiedad y su venta puede ser de meses o incluso años y la Conferencia puede incurrir costos sustanciales para mantener y asegurar la propiedad antes de la venta. La Junta de Síndicos y el personal de la Conferencia trabajan diligentemente para minimizar esos costos y maximizar el retorno a la Conferencia de la venta de bienes inmuebles.

Para el período de mayo de 2019 a abril de 2020, se recibió un total de \$525,661.46 directamente relacionados con la venta de bienes inmuebles. Además, la Junta de Síndicos tuvo gastos relacionados con propiedades vendidas y no vendidas para el año calendario 2019 por la cantidad de \$217,832.17 y de enero a julio de 2020 la cantidad de \$85,813.05.

Durante 2020, se han producido los siguientes cierres de iglesias:

- Austwell discontinuada el 25 de marzo de 2020
- Rock Island IMU discontinuada el 30 de abril de 2020
- Divine Grace discontinuada el 31 de agosto de 2020
- Bishop El Redentor IMU, abandonada el 13 de agosto de 2020

En cumplimiento de su función, la Junta de Síndicos ha comenzado a revisar opciones con especial atención a las propiedades urbanas con potencial valor económico. Los Síndicos reconocen que debido al aumento de los valores inmobiliarios, la decisión de la Conferencia de vender una propiedad en determinadas ubicaciones urbanas puede obstaculizar la capacidad de la Conferencia de tener presencia en esa ubicación en el futuro. Un ejemplo es la antigua ubicación de la Iglesia Metodista Unida Parker Lane en Austin. La Conferencia ha trabajado en estrecha colaboración con el Distrito Capital para estructurar un arrendamiento innovador a largo plazo de la propiedad de Parker Lane. Actualmente, la Conferencia tiene un acuerdo de opción con Foundation Communities, un importante proveedor de viviendas asequibles en el área de Austin. Una vez cerrado, el acuerdo resultará en una nueva adición importante de viviendas asequibles, un retorno financiero material para la Conferencia y proporcionará al Distrito Capital oficinas permanentes y espacio de usos múltiples en la nueva estructura sin costo material para el Distrito. La Junta de Síndicos se compromete a seguir identificando opciones innovadoras para el uso de los bienes inmuebles disponibles.

La Junta de Síndicos también continúa supervisando Light on the Hill, anteriormente Mount Wesley en Kerrville, Texas, en asociación con Kerrville First United Methodist. Bajo el liderazgo y la visión de Kerrville FUMC, Light on the Hill se ha transformado en un recurso comunitario vital para la región montañosa con asistencia alimentaria muy necesaria y una variedad de otros programas comunitarios.

Informe del Gabinete de la Conferencia Río Texas a la Conferencia Anual 2020 Report I

Durante el año pasado, el Gabinete disfrutó de la continuación de nuestro trabajo como un equipo consistente, sin cambios de personal con respecto al año pasado. Animamos a todos los metodistas unidos de Río Texas a encontrar formas de participar en la conversación, la educación y la acción para abordar la injusticia racial de largo plazo en nuestras comunidades y nuestra iglesia. Buscamos responder fielmente a esta crisis a la luz del sufrimiento y el talento de los ciudadanos afroamericanos; la vida de nuestra población mayormente hispana y otras personas de color dentro los límites de la conferencia, y nuestra realidad actual de la conferencia, después de cinco años de nuestra vida como Conferencia Río Texas.

INFORME II PARA LA ACCIÓN DE LA CONFERENCIA

Transferencia de las Iglesias MU Star y Center City a la Conferencia Central de Texas - El superintendente del Distrito Oeste Andy Smith informa que las congregaciones de Star IMU y Center City IMU han solicitado la transferencia de la Conferencia Anual de Río Texas (RTC) a la Conferencia Anual de Central Texas (CTC)) según las disposiciones del ¶260 del Libro de Disciplina de 2016.

Las dos iglesias están ubicadas en el condado de Mills, en el extremo este del Distrito Oeste de RTC. Partes del condado de Mills, inclusive una iglesia, están dentro del CTC. Ambas congregaciones afirman que están orientadas hacia las comunidades en el CTC y están ubicadas mucho más cerca de la oficina del Distrito Oeste de CTC en Stephenville (a 72 millas) que de la oficina del Distrito Oeste de RTC en San Angelo (a 140 millas). Ambas congregaciones han cumplido con los requisitos disciplinarios de dos tercios de votación de la conferencia de cargo, celebrada el 16 de febrero de 2020, y en las reuniones congregacionales individuales celebradas el 17 de noviembre de 2019. Todos los votos para transferir han sido aprobados por unanimidad por todos los miembros presentes. ¶260 también requiere que cada una de las dos conferencias anuales apruebe la transferencia por una mayoría de voto de dos tercios. Si ambas votan para aprobar, la transferencia entraría en efecto el 1 de enero de 2021.

- Discontinuación de Austwell IMU: el 25 de marzo de 2020, el Gabinete aprobó esta suspensión, efectiva a partir del 8 de marzo de 2020.
- Discontinuación de Rock Island IMU El 30 de abril de 2020, el Gabinete votó para aprobar la descontinuación de esta congregación, efectiva a partir de esa fecha.
- Discontinuación de Divine Grace IMU en San Antonio: el 19 de mayo de 2020, el Gabinete aprobó el voto de esta congregación para descontinuar, efectiva a partir del 31 de agosto de 2020.
- El Redentor IMU El Gabinete votó a favor de abandonar el uso de esta iglesia, efectivo el 13 de agosto de 2020, ya que la congregación ha dejado de reunirse o conducir actividades de ministerio.

Damos gracias a Dios por los siervos fieles en estos lugares y el legado que estas iglesias han compartido con el mundo.

COMISIÓN EN ARCHIVOS E HISTORIA

INFORME I PARA INFORMACIÓN SOLAMENTE

Este año, la Comisión de Archivos e Historia presenta una solicitud para la Iglesia Jackson Ranch (JRC) y el Cementerio; y el cementerio Eli Jackson (EJC) para convertirse en un sitio histórico metodista unido con la Comisión General de Archivos e Historia. Para iniciar el proceso de solicitud, la Comisión presentará su resolución en la conferencia anual de este año. Ambos sitios tienen raíces profundas que contribuyen a la rica historia del metodismo y la historia estadounidense en el sur de Texas.

Los fundadores de Jackson Ranch, Nathaniel Jackson y Matilda Hicks junto con sus hijos adultos fueron una familia interracial que huyó del racismo del Sur para encontrar la libertad en México. Al detenerse justo antes de la frontera mexicana, la familia se estableció en el condado de Hidalgo en 1857. Ahora se cree que Jackson Ranch era parte del ferrocarril subterráneo que ayudaba a los esclavos escapados en busca de su libertad.

En su rancho, Nathaniel Jackson construyó una capilla de adobe que fue la predecesora del JRC. En 1874, el reverendo A.H. Sutherland organizó formalmente la congregación del JRC. Juan de la Viña, propietario del vecino Rancho El Capote, se convirtió en uno de los primeros misioneros metodistas de ascendencia mexicana para el JRC y el MECS. Más tarde, sus dos hijos fundaron la Iglesia El Buen Pastor en Edinburg, que permanece activa hoy. En 1884, el hijo de Nathaniel Jackson, Martin, donó una quinta parte de un acre del rancho Jackson al MECS y construyó una iglesia de madera para el culto regular. El JRC y sus miembros fueron los catalizadores de varias iglesias aún activas hoy. Estos incluyen El Divino Redentor IMU en McAllen (1910), El Mesias IMU en Mission (1912) y La Trinidad UMC en Pharr (1913). El JRC ha hecho una contribución duradera y significativa a estas y otras iglesias metodistas de habla hispana en el sur de Texas.

El EJC se estableció como el primero de los dos cementerios familiares después de la muerte de Nathaniel Jackson en 1865. El EJC, así como el cementerio en los terrenos del JRC, son el lugar de descanso final para las personas multiculturales, principalmente los mexicoamericanos y los afroamericanos. Estos cementerios reflejan la rica historia de la frontera.

La Comisión Histórica de Texas ha reconocido ambos lugares como sitios históricos. Esperamos continuar preservando la historia metodista presente en la Iglesia y Cementerio Jackson Ranch y el Cementerio Eli Jackson para las generaciones venideras con una designación de sitio histórico Metodista Unido por parte de la Comisión General de Archivo e Historia.

El archivo de la conferencia continúa aceptando documentos históricos donados relacionados con la historia metodista. Los artículos que se reciben son registros de membresía de la iglesia que incluyen certificados de bautismo, matrimonio y defunción. Los registros de la iglesia local son muy buscados, especialmente aquellos que alguna vez pertenecieron a la Conferencia de Río Grande.

El archivo de la conferencia periódicamente lleva a cabo solicitudes de investigación para historiadores de la iglesia, clérigos retirados y laicos interesados en la historia metodista del sur de Texas. Estas solicitudes de investigación han contribuido a la iglesia local y a los archivos pastorales en el archivo de la conferencia para proporcionar más información histórica para futuras investigaciones.

IGLESIA Y CEMENTERIO RANCHO JACKSON Y EL CEMENTERIO ELI JACKSON INFORME II

PARA ACCIÓN DE LA CONFERENCIA

Iglesia y Cementerio Rancho Jackson y el Cementerio Eli Jackson

Considerando que: en 1874, la pareja interracial de Nathaniel Jackson y Matilda Hicks, junto con sus hijos adultos, huyeron del racismo en el Sur en busca de la libertad. Se detuvieron en el Río Grande en el condado de Hildalgo, donde establecieron el Rancho Jackson.

Considerando que: el Rancho Jackson de 5,535 acres fue comprado a un costo de 36¢ de E.D. Smith de Hidalgo, Texas. El rancho está ubicado a cinco millas al este de Hidalgo con una fachada de 0.7 millas al Río Grande de y se extiende al norte 13 millas entre las ciudades actuales de Pharr, San Juan y Edinburg, Texas.

Considerando que: El Rancho Jackson se convirtió en un paradigma de hospitalidad cristiana. Allí, Nathaniel desarrolló una cultura de aceptación completa al extranjero. Rancho Jackson dio la bienvenida a ex esclavos, nativos mexicanos, inmigrantes anglos y todos los que vinieron en busca de libertad y pertenencia.

Considerando que: ahora se cree que Rancho Jackson fue parte del Ferrocarril Subterráneo.

Considerando que: en 1874, el Reverendo A.H. Sutherland organizó formalmente la congregación de la Iglesia Rancho Jackson en Rancho El Capote.

Considerando que: El dueño del vecino Rancho El Capote, Juan Manuel de la Viña, se convirtió en uno de los primeros misioneros metodistas de ascendencia mexicana en la Iglesia Metodista Episcopal del Sur.

Considerando que: en 1913, los hijos del Sr. de la Viña, Juan y Plutarco, fundaron la Iglesia Metodista El Buen Pastor en Edinburg.

Considerando que: en 1884, Martin Jackson donó una quinta parte de un acre del Rancho Jackson al IMES y construyó una iglesia de madera para el culto regular. Esta congregación fue la primera congregación de habla hispana en el condado de Hidalgo. Esto fue reconocido por el Estado de Texas con un marcador histórico en 1982.

Considerando que: La iglesia de madera se hizo conocida como la Iglesia Rancho Jackson, que fue el catalizador para establecer varias iglesias IMES que todavía están activas hoy, incluyendo El Divino Redentor IMU en McAllen (1910), El Mesias IMU en Mission (1912) y La Trinidad IMU en Pharr (1913). Por lo tanto, creando una contribución duradera y significativa para establecer estas y otras iglesias metodistas de habla hispana en el sur de Texas.

Considerando que: El cementerio Eli Jackson, ubicado en los terrenos de Rancho Jackson se estableció como el primero de los dos cementerios familiares después de la muerte de Nathaniel Jackson en 1865. El cementerio es el lugar de descanso final para personas multiculturales, principalmente mexicoamericanos y afroamericanos. En estos cementerios descansan los restos de muchas personas que fueron enterradas sin cargos y a quien se les había negado otros lugares de descanso debido a su raza, su credo o su pobreza. Estos cementerios reflejan la rica historia cultural de la frontera.

Considerando que: La sección superior oeste del cementerio Eli Jackson se distingue por una cruz de madera única cerca de un árbol. Se cree que la cruz fue tallada en un estilo militar diferente a otras cruces de madera talladas a mano en el cementerio. La documentación de las tumbas antes de 1896 no existe, pero son posiblemente los lugares de descanso final de soldados.

Por lo tanto, sea resuelto que la Iglesia y el Cementerio Rancho Jackson y el Cementerio Eli Jackson sean reconocidos por su lugar significativo en la historia del Movimiento Metodista en el Valle del Río Grande, así como por su lugar significativo en la historia del desarrollo del ministerio interracial e intercultural en la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Ambos sitios merecen ser reconocidos por la Comisión General de Archivos e Historia y designados como Sitios Históricos Metodistas Unidos.

La Oficina de Ministerios Conexionales ha seguido ampliando sus capacidades de recursos para la Conferencia de Río Texas y la conexión Metodista Unida durante los últimos años. Como director, he encontrado importante seguir escuchando, discerniendo y construyendo relaciones dentro de nuestra conferencia anual, así como con nuestros socios y vecinos ecuménicos. Además de planificar estratégicamente eventos a pequeña y gran escala que apoyan, educan y brindan recursos importantes y oportunos para nuestro clero, laicos, congregaciones locales y sus campos misioneros, en 2018 esta oficina adquirió la supervisión de supervisión del Equipo de Desastre / Recuperación de Río Texas. A medida que nos acercamos al tercer aniversario del huracán Harvey y al cierre de este proyecto, nuestra conferencia celebra el excelente trabajo de este equipo y sus socios. Aprenderá más sobre el trabajo, la dedicación y las celebraciones en el informe de la conferencia pre-anual de este equipo, así como en el video y la revista preparados para la sesión del llamado AC 2020 programada para el 3 de octubre de 2020.

Convocatoria del clero: debido a la pandemia de COVID-19 (recomendaciones de los CDC y del gobierno local, es decir, distanciamiento social y número reducido de personas que podrían reunirse), la convocatoria en persona de este año con la oradora invitada Rev. Susan Beaumont se ha reprogramado para marzo de 2021. Aunque se pospone Fue una decepción, las restricciones brindaron la oportunidad de reunirse y apoyarse unos a otros de formas nuevas y creativas a través de "Conversaciones con el clero", reflexión, oración y recursos utilizando una amplia gama de tecnología, como Facebook Live, Webinars y Zoom Conferencing. Los asistentes dejaron las conversaciones sintiéndose escuchados, apoyados, animados y más esperanzados durante estos tiempos difíciles. Reunión de la Conferencia Anual (AC) - Al igual que con la Convocatoria del Clero, debido a la pandemia de COVID-19 (recomendaciones de los CDC y del gobierno local, es decir, distanciamiento social y número reducido de personas que pudieron reunirse y decisiones tomadas tanto por la Conferencia de Río Texas como por la Ciudad de Corpus Christi), la Conferencia AC en persona programada para el 10 y 13 de junio se canceló en su formato tradicional. Después de mucho discernimiento para avanzar, los componentes esenciales de los Negocios de la Conferencia Anual (BAC) se llevaron a cabo mediante el uso de tecnología, es decir, la Sesión del Clero o se llevarán a cabo en una sesión especial del AC programada para el 3 de octubre de 2020. El formato de la reunión del 3 de octubre ha pasado por varias transiciones a medida que el liderazgo de la conferencia continúa monitoreando el curso de la pandemia y las recomendaciones ofrecidas por el gobierno estatal y local, así como por los CDC. En el momento de escribir este artículo, el formato actual de la reunión del 3 de octubre se llevará a cabo virtualmente desde la Oficina de la Conferencia de Río Texas. A aquellas personas que se determine que son necesarias para informar y / o realizar negocios en persona, se les pedirá que sigan todo el protocolo de seguridad establecido por el gobierno local y nuestras políticas de Rio Texas. Se enviará una carta a los delegados de la conferencia a través de la oficina del obispo antes del 3 de septiembre de 2020, en la que se describirán los asuntos esenciales que se llevarán a cabo, así como una oportunidad para adorar, informar y celebrar. Además, el registro se abrirá tras la publicación de esta carta, así como las instrucciones importantes para acceder a la reunión.

Nominaciones: la Conferencia Anual de Río Texas está profundamente comprometida con la excelencia y la diversidad en el liderazgo. Por lo tanto, el objetivo del Grupo de Liderazgo basado en aplicaciones presentado a principios de 2020 es crear un grupo de líderes calificados, con una base espiritual y comprometidos que a través del proceso de nominación de la conferencia se corresponderán con todas las necesidades de liderazgo de la conferencia anual. Como nota, aunque este es un año de elección cuatrienal, según las pautas de procedimiento presentadas en el Libro de Disciplina de la UMC, las nominaciones cuatrienales se han pospuesto hasta que la Conferencia General pueda reunirse y se anuncie una sesión especial del 2021 AC. Por lo tanto, se ha pedido a los miembros del comité y del equipo de la conferencia anual que permanezcan en sus puestos si están disponibles para hacerlo, hasta que se pueda realizar la votación cuatrienal. LA OFICINA DE CREAR Y VITALIZAR CONGREGACIONES Y DESARROLLAR LÍDERES

SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

Qué gozo ha sido trabajar este año pasado con tantas congregaciones, pastores, laicos, seminarios y ministros del campo educativo que aman a Jesús, con aquellos a quienes sirven en su comunidad o campo misionero.

Con el enfoque continuo en la productividad tanto en la vitalidad congregacional como en el desarrollo del liderazgo, ha sido un año muy laboroso. Río Texas ha iniciado 4 nuevas comunidades de fe y ha activado nuevas formas de potenciar el desarrollo de liderazgo. Tuve la alegría de caminar y trabajar con muchos líderes y pastores congregacionales, enseñando en muchas de las reuniones de profesionales del distrito, talleres de liderazgo distrital para laicos, con la vitalizada Conferencia de Siervos Laicos y Directores de Distrito, así como ayudar a los Equipos de Estrategia del distrito a idear cómo ellos podrían ayudar a alentar, enseñar y dirigir a las congregaciones a ser valerosos para alcanzar a la comunidad a la que sirven. Todas estas son estrategias por las cuales las iglesias podrán aprender, crecer y alcanzar a nuevas personas para Cristo.

Por supuesto, al escribir este informe del informe previo a la conferencia, hemos tenido que "refugiarnos en sitio" durante algo más de 4 semanas y hemos tenido que cambiar las formas en que alcanzamos y nos conectamos con las personas. Estoy muy orgullosa de que cuántos pastores y líderes de la iglesia han tomado algunos de los ejercicios innovadores y los han puesto en acción. Las congregaciones y los pastores están intentando usar cosas nuevas con valentía. Algunos funcionan muy bien y otros se están adaptando, ideando e intentando nuevamente. Hemos encontrado la agilidad de aprendizaje y la audacia que no teníamos antes de esta pandemia. Dios se está moviendo y las personas tanto dentro del código postal de la iglesia y más allá están escuchando las Buenas Nuevas de Jesús por medio de ustedes. ¡Gracias a Dios!

Creando Congregaciones: el mundo está cambiando y la iglesia necesita visualizar más allá de las formas "tradicionales" de alcanzar a nuevas personas para Cristo y los modelos a veces más atractivos de esperar a que las personas vengan de por sí. Mientras que las iglesias tradicionales nuevas y las iglesias de varios sitios y satélites siguen siendo muy importantes (y necesitamos más de ellas), también estas formas son costosas ya que están centradas en el clero cuando se inician. Hemos comenzado a enseñar e imaginar formas nuevas, más orgánicas y menos costosas para atraer aquellos que no asisten a congregaciones locales, con tales estrategias como Fresh Expressions (Nuevas Expresiones), Focused Worship (Adoración Enfocada) en la comunidad e Intentional Faith Community (Comunidad de Fe Intencional); al mismo tiempo que creamos espacio para nuevas formas aún no conocidas, de unirnos a Dios en formas creativas para alcanzar a las personas. En octubre de 2019, 24 de nuestros equipos de clérigos y laicos asistieron a la Conferencia Exponencial en Houston, seguida por un evento de dos días "Sembradores de Texas" patrocinado por un conjunto de cuatro conferencias de la IMU en Texas. Por resultado de ese evento, muchas de las iglesias están buscando nuevas formas de colaborar y comenzar nuevas iglesias o nuevos ministerios en la comunidad. La oficina de creación de congregaciones también llevó a cabo un evento de Discernimiento de Siembra de Iglesias donde 10 personas exploraron sus dones y valor para comenzar nuevas congregaciones. Creo que Dios bendecirá este tiempo de discernimiento y veremos más intentos de sembrar en el futuro.

Sobre un tema parecido, la Rda. Karen Horan fue invitada a dar una clase de Nueva Siembra de Iglesias en el otoño en el Seminario Teológico Presbiteriano de Austin (APTS). Esta clase estuvo disponible para todos los estudiantes de APTS y permitieron que cualquier otro clero auditara la clase. Este evento ayuda a promover la necesidad de que los sembradores escuchen la llamada sin importar su denominación.

iEstoy emocionada de que en las 4 nuevas iglesias que comiencen los pastores nombrados en junio de 2019 se hayan convertido en 5 nuevas congregaciones! FUMC Pflugerville creará una nueva congregación que multiplicará al testimonio metodista en el área de East Pflugerville. El Rdo. Aarón Carter principiará una adoración semanal en la Iglesia Assurance en el otoño de 2020. Valley Praise IMU también lanzará un nuevo satélite en McAllen en el otoño de 2020 bajo el pastor del campo educativo, el Rdo. Kevin Hardin. Este será el tercer rebaño de Valley Praise IMU. El Rdo. Ray Altman (no se muestra en la foto aquí) continúa haciendo el profundo trabajo de crear comunidades de fe intencionales con New Wineskins (Nuevos Odres) en Leander. El completa su primer año de este ministerio a tiempo completo y no solo profundiza y amplía este trabajo, sino que también ha encontrado formas de compartir este ministerio de vanguardia de manera creativa a través de múltiples formas. Crestview IMU votó para convertirse en nuestra primera Iglesia de Legado, renunciando a las responsabilidades de liderazgo, propiedad y activos para que un sembrador de iglesias y su equipo puedan transformar la propiedad, enviar una afluencia de personas, para poder alcanzar a la comunidad inmediata de la congregación que estaba en declive anteriormente y comenzar una nueva comunidad. El Rdo. Jay Cooper y su equipo de la Iglesia Violet Crown City han comenzado tanto la adoración semanal (en línea) en abril como la construcción de la propiedad física. Es nuestra oración que no solo la mayoría, si no toda la comunidad de fe de la iglesia legada elija permanecer en conexión con la nueva comunidad de fe.

Finalmente, Austin New Church también está lanzando una nueva comunidad hispana llamada Amor Original con el pastor César Soto. César y su familia se mudaron aquí de Chile, donde ellos habían ayudado a comenzar nuevas comunidades de fe. Estamos

entusiasmados de que haya comenzado a reunirse tanta gente en febrero y hayan principiado sus servicios de vista previa en línea en abril

Dos iglesias más se han formado en este año anual de la Conferencia: Hope Arise IMU en San Antonio, en junio de 2019, y Austin New Church, en febrero de 2020.

Desarrollo de Liderazgo:

Se han visitado 4 seminarios para reclutar internados a la Conferencia Río Texas, seguido por visitas del Obispo en muchas ocasiones, entre ellos: la Escuela de Teología Candler, el Seminario Teológico Wesley, la Escuela de Teología Perkins y el Seminario Teológico Presbiteriano Austin. A partir de estas relaciones continuas, estamos planeando (a menos que sea interrumpido por Covid19) tener 5 internados en el seminario: 1 de Perkins, 1 de Duke, 2 de Candler y 1 del Seminario Teológico Wesley. Estas relaciones también han producido clases a corto plazo (en el término de enero o durante las vacaciones de primavera) presentadas por el obispo Schnase y otros de la Conferencia Río Texas, principalmente en la frontera. Candler envió 24 en enero de 2020, APTS tenía planeado un viaje de vacaciones de primavera, y Wesley y Perkins están planeando una clase conjunta en enero de 2021 en la frontera. Todas estas conexiones esperamos ayuden a formar y desarrollar futuros líderes de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

También 50 personas asistieron a un evento de predicación en agosto de 2019 con un segundo evento programado en mayo de 2020. Estos eventos fueron patrocinados en par con la Escuela de Teología de Perkins y los Drs. Wes Allen y Alyce McKenzie. Estos eventos estuvieron disponibles a todos los pastores, así como a Obreros Laicos / Siervos y CLM's. Río Texas también tuvo dos cohortes de predicación que se reunieron durante 10 meses, obrando en el oficio de la predicación. El Dr. McKenzie trabajó con la cohorte bilingüe: tanto los hablantes nativos de español que desean practicar predicar más en inglés como los hablantes nativos de inglés que desean predicar más en español. El Dr. Allen trabajó con la otra cohorte. Ambos grupos estudiaron juntos, predicaron el uno para el otro y compartieron su vida de fe juntos. Esperamos continuar este modelo con Perkins el próximo año (agosto a mayo).

Ministerios de Siervos Laicos: Scott Maderer es el Director del Ministerio de Siervos Laicos de la Conferencia y ofrece este informe.

En los últimos años, el programa de Ministerios de Siervos Laicos (LSM) ha tenido, como muchos de los programas de nuestra iglesia, desafíos y éxitos. Nuestro comité actual LSM de la conferencia ha estado activo este año, intentando identificar nuevas y diferentes formas de trabajar juntos para poder ser el programa de capacitación más eficaz y mejor para los laicos en la Conferencia Río Texas. El Libro de Disciplina reconoce que para tener un Ministerio efectivo dentro de nuestra conferencia debemos desarrollar y alentar el liderazgo de los laicos; Este es el objetivo explícito del LSM. Los actuales Directores de Distrito y el Director Laico de la conferencia están trabajando juntos con un enfoque en: aumentar la comunicación y la cooperación en todos los distritos dentro de la conferencia; Desarrollar herramientas efectivas que todos podamos utilizar; Identificar nuevas clases en metodología en línea y fuera de línea; y alentar al Ministerio Laico, tanto a los Siervos Laicos como en Ministros Laicos Certificados, a ser creativos en la identificación de sus propios campos misioneros.

Los Directores de Distrito se reúnen regularmente ahora a través de Zoom en una actualización trimestral para poder compartir una metodología efectiva e información sobre los próximos cursos y lo que todos estamos intentando en nuestros propios distritos. De esta manera, vemos a los directores compartir información, aprender las mejores prácticas y alentar y permitir que surjan experimentos y nuevas visiones en cada distrito. Todavía estamos a principios del proceso y hemos tenido muchos desafíos y cambios, pero el equipo está comprometido a continuar en comunicación regular.

Cada distrito continúa llevando a cabo sus propios cursos, pero también estamos trabajando juntos para intentar a recuperar cursos efectivos del Ministerio laico de la conferencia. Al mismo tiempo, buscamos cuáles son las necesidades de los laicos e identificamos recursos de una variedad de fuentes que cubran esas necesidades en manera efectiva. El objetivo es desarrollar un liderazgo laico efectivo, en lugar de solo obtener una "certificación". Dentro de este panorama más amplio, anticipamos una mayor necesidad de un liderazgo laico efectivo dentro de la conferencia. Por lo tanto, estamos intentando trabajar proactivamente con aquellos llamados a los campos de misión únicos para proporcionar las herramientas y los recursos que ellos/as necesitan para ser más efectivos. Esto incluye estar más involucrado en el programa de Ministerio Laico Certificado y trabajar de cerca en todos los distritos para utilizar de manera efectiva los recursos limitados que proporcionen el apoyo necesario en toda la conferencia. De esta manera, los distritos no necesitarán inventar de nuevo la rueda o proporcionar recursos para un número limitado de laicos, mientras que aún pueden alentar a los laicos con apoyo y capacitación, trabajando en todos los distritos dentro de toda la conferencia. Que Dios continúe bendiciendo y haciendo crecer el liderazgo laico en la Conferencia Río Texas.

Ministerio de Universidad y Campo Educativo: El Ministerio del Campo Educativo continúa prosperando en la Conferencia Río Texas. ¡Once Ministerios del campo están en diez campos y llegan a casi mil estudiantes! La Rda. Lizzie Wright y el Rdo. Wes Cain están coordinando los Ministerios del campo junto con la Rda. Karen Horan en el centro de la conferencia. Los ministros del campo se unen en línea más regularmente entre sí, con sus equipos de estrategia del distrito y presentan informes periódicos a la oficina de la conferencia. De cierto, este semestre de primavera, con el Covid19, lanzó a todas las universidades a la enseñanza en línea, los pastores en sus propios campos han hecho un trabajo fantástico al mantenerse conectados en la adoración, la oración, el estudio e incluso la divulgación, ya que los estudiantes universitarios que no asisten a la misma escuela pueden reunirse virtualmente y seguir conectados entre sí y con Jesucristo. Todavía existe la necesidad de que las iglesias individuales se pongan en contacto con los estudiantes, especialmente cuando están en casa y van a la escuela; así que manténgase en contacto con los ministros del campus en su área. Río Texas mantiene liderazgo en el Ministerio del campo en UT Austin: The Texas Wesley y University IMU de Austin, UTSA por medio de la University IMU de San Antonio, SAC y Trinity University a través del personal del Ministerio del Campus SA y la Rda. Valerie Vogt, TLU a través de FUMC Seguin, UTRGV Wesley Center, Texas State: United Campus Anual Ministry, U of H en Victoria y Huston-Tillotson University. Se creará y se compartirá una presentación de diapositivas cuando nos reunamos en la

Conferencia.

Congregaciones Vitalizantes:

La mayor parte del trabajo de vitalización ha sido a través de eventos de aprendizaje más grandes a nivel de distrito, así como el trabajo individual con congregaciones que repasan lo que aprendieron en el último año. Por ejemplo, después del Día de Visión de Fresh Expressions (Expresiones Nuevas) inicial (enero de 2019) y el Encuentro de Cena de la Iglesia (octubre de 2019), hemos tenido algunos ejemplos maravillosos de nuevas formas de alcanzar a nuevas personas. Aunque las iglesias no siempre informan, el Distrito de Las Misiones ha estado reuniendo números y 20 iglesias han informado que llevan a cabo reuniones regulares, estas para relacionarse con nuevas personas en el año próximo pasado. Esto incluye Teología de Cantina, reuniones de "Coro en la Calle" (como grupo extemporáneo pero de cantantes que invitan a otros a cantar y orar juntos), campamentos de fútbol para la comunidad y una variedad de otros eventos. FUMC Victoria comenzó una cena en la iglesia con gran éxito.

Kyle IMU también está haciendo un gran trabajo con su cena en la iglesia.

Muchas otras iglesias también han pedido a la Rda. Diana Phillips y al Rdo. Kendall Waller, de la oficina de la conferencia, que reciban capacitación sobre el modelo de gobierno de Estructura Simplificada, sobre la planificación estratégica de sus juntas, así como la visita de la Rda. Karen Horan en la que hable sobre cómo alcanzar a nuevas personas.

El Rdo. Ray Altman comenzó una cohorte en el Distrito Capital para alcanzar a sus vecinos e involucrarse de una manera profundamente relacional.

El Grupo Unstuck (Despegado) también ha estado trabajando con algunas de nuestras iglesias. Hasta la fecha, una iglesia ha completado su proceso Unstuck (Pflugerville IMU) y una iglesia está por completar su proceso (Asbury UMC Corpus Christi) con una iglesia más, la cual comenzará su proceso en agosto de 2020 (es decir, St. John IMU de Corpus Christi). El Grupo Unstuck lleva a cabo una evaluación intensiva de por qué la iglesia está "estancada" a nivel o en declive. Luego tienen un entrenamiento de fin de semana "con esteroides" con el clero y de 12 a 15 líderes laicos. Se crea una línea de tiempo de ritmo rápido para impulsar a la iglesia y movilizarla durante el siguiente año hasta llegar a el nivel de una iglesia que alcance a nuevas personas en sus vecindarios propios.

Finalmente, desde vísperas de la Conferencia Anual del año pasado, 11 iglesias recibieron subvenciones para el ministerio "Pueblo Nuevo, Lugares Nuevos" en un total de \$ 84,689. De estas 11 subvenciones, 3 de las subvenciones de un total de \$ 31,000 fueron asignadas para alcanzar específicamente a comunidades hispanas latinas. Algunas de las subvenciones eran para alcanzar nuevas formas de servir a los marginados; otros para alcanzar a unidades de apartamentos y enseñar inglés. Una subvención fue para un Ministerio de campo que enseña a los estudiantes universitarios el orden del culto principal en las congregaciones locales y en el campo, mientras que otros están reuniendo a pueblos enteros ecuménicamente para principiar una nueva comunidad de adoración,. Aún mientras que otros se acercaron a los niños en su campo misionero. ¡Qué alegría fue asociarse con tantas iglesias al alcanzar a nuevas personas para poder hacerlas más vitales en su área! Estas subvenciones se ofrecen 3 veces al año y esperamos que los fondos se puedan utilizar a lo máximo.

INFORME DEL PRESIDENTE SOLAMENTE PARA INFORMACIÓN

Hace más de 20 años, Ron Heifetz y Donald Laurie escribieron un artículo en el *Harvard Business Review* titulado "El Trabajo del Liderazgo". Mantengo un resumen de una página de este artículo cerca de mi escritorio como un recordatorio de "Problemas Técnicos Frente a Desafíos Adaptativos". Comienza el artículo diciendo que el mayor fracaso del liderazgo es tratar los desafíos de adaptación como problemas técnicos. Permítanme repetirlo: **El mayor fracaso del liderazgo es tratar los desafíos de adaptación como problemas técnicos.** Este, mis amigos, es uno de los peligros que enfrentamos en el mundo de hoy. Permítanme explicar.

Los problemas técnicos tienen estas características: 1) Son fácil de identificar, 2) A menudo, se prestan a soluciones rápidas y fáciles, 3) A menudo, pueden ser resueltos por una autoridad o un experto, 4) Requieren cambios en solo uno o pocos lugares, generalmente dentro de los límites de la organización, 5) La gente es receptiva generalmente a las soluciones técnicas, y 6) Las soluciones a menudo se pueden implementar rápidamente, incluso por edicto. Sin embargo, por otro lado, los desafíos adaptativos son un poco más complejos, con estas características: 1) Difícil de identificar, pero fácil de negar, 2) Requieren cambios en los valores, creencias, roles, relaciones y enfoques del trabajo, 3) Las personas con los problemas en mano hacen el trabajo de resolverlos, 4) Requieren cambios en numerosos lugares, generalmente cruzando los límites organizacionales, 5) La gente a menudo se resisten incluso a reconocer los desafíos adaptativos, y 6) Las "soluciones" requieren experimentos y nuevos descubrimientos; su implementación puede llevar mucho tiempo y no se pueden implementar por edicto.

Sí, los desafíos de adaptación requieren trabajo y no pueden tratarse como un problema técnico. Este año ha sido un año de desafíos adaptativos. COVID-19 encerró al mundo mientras atacaba nuestra propia alma. Lamentamos la pérdida de aquellos que han muerto a causa de este temido virus. Oramos con aquellos que se han enfermado y con las familias que todavía están sufriendo una pérdida debido a las continuas luchas con esta pandemia. Abordar esta situación no es un problema técnico. Es uno de los desafíos de adaptación más complejos que jamás haya enfrentado la iglesia. Hemos pospuesto las reuniones de la Conferencia Anual, la Conferencia General y las Conferencias Jurisdiccionales. Afortunadamente, no se ha pospuesto el ministerio, porque el ministerio se ha llevado a cabo y continuará adelante, e incluso florecerá. Las congregaciones han descubierto nuevas maneras e innovadoras de adorar y alcanzar a otros con el amor de Dios. Ha creado nuevas formas para que las congregaciones y la conferencia anual conduzcan sus reuniones. Las reuniones de ZOOM se han convertido en la norma, no en la excepción. Me alientan las diversas maneras en que los ministerios de nuestra conferencia se han extendido durante esta temporada. Tuvimos que convertirnos en competentes técnicos casi de la noche a la mañana. Muchas congregaciones se han adaptado a la forma en que transmiten en vivo sus servicios de adoración. Lo que me preocupa es que con todos estos cambios, algunos pastores estén trabajando tan arduamente que no toman el tiempo para reanimar el alma. Después de todo, "Lidiar con una pandemia, 101" no es un curso de seminario. Uno de nuestros desafíos de adaptación es encontrar nuevas maneras de cuidarnos y animarnos los unos a otros: de tender la mano con amor y hacer la pregunta de Wesley: "¿Cómo se encuentra tu alma?"

La Mesa Unida se reunió en el centro de conferencias el 23 de noviembre de 2019, y a través de ZOOM el 28 de marzo de 2020 y el 6 de mayo de 2020. En nuestra reunión de noviembre discernimos y compartimos las formas en que la Conferencia Anual contendría con el tema de "En misión - En Amar: Nos Convertimos en la Palabra ". También deseábamos hacer una obra misionera in situ. Bueno, uno de nuestros desafíos de adaptación es que esos eventos no pudieron suceder como lo deseábamos, pero todavía hemos encontrado maneras en la conferencia para continuar en misión y ser amorosos y en esas acciones nos hemos convertido en la Palabra. A medida que nuestras reuniones progresaron durante el año, descubrimos que nosotros, como conferencia anual, estábamos encontrando nuevas maneras de ejercer y de permanecer en el ministerio, y encontramos nuevas formas de definir la fidelidad. Nuestras congregaciones se han mantenido fieles durante este tiempo de prueba.

Mientras continuamos liderando en esta pandemia, he descubierto que la iglesia es verdaderamente amorosa y encuentra maneras innovadoras de continuar en misión. Durante un tiempo en el que estamos divididos en tantos temas, desde la sexualidad hasta la raza y la política, tal vez podamos hacer una pausa o exhalar un suspiro de adaptación y recordar las palabras en la oración de Jesús en Juan: Y ya no estoy en el mundo; mas éstos están en el mundo, y yo voy a ti. Padre santo, a los que me has dado, guárdalos en tu nombre, para que sean uno. "(Juan 17:11, RVR 1960) Que seamos uno, esa es mi oración.

DEPARTAMENTO DE MINISTERIOS TÉCNICOS

SOLAMENTE PARA INFORMACION

Después de varios años de dedicado servicio, el Rdo. Will Rice y Austin Newton han dejado el Departamento de Comunicaciones y Medios de Ministerios y la oficina de la Conferencia Río Texas. Su dedicación y servicio crearon la base de este departamento. Es una fundación muy respetada y apreciada que ha permitido que los nuevos miembros del personal (apoyados por Sylvia Treviño) asuman el importante trabajo que surge de este departamento.

La oficina de la conferencia, como muchas iglesias, tiene departamentos enfocados en diferentes áreas de ministerio y servicio. Cada departamento tiene un propósito importante en conexión a la misión general de la conferencia y, siendo así, trabajan hacia un aspecto específico de esa misión según lo define el ministerio de alcance del departamento. El Departamento de Comunicaciones y Medios de Ministerios es único en el sentido de que gran parte de su misión es servir a los departamentos dentro de la oficina de la conferencia. Esto le da al departamento el privilegio de ser parte del ministerio que se lleva a cabo en toda la conferencia. El trabajo ejecutado por los ministerios del Departamento de Comunicaciones y Medios de Ministerios se extiende más allá del trabajo de comunicaciones. Para poder ayudar a compartir el alcance completo del trabajo que desarrolla este departamento, el departamento pasó a llamarse el Departamento de Ministerios Técnicos. El trabajo del departamento se puede dividir en cuatro secciones. Comunicaciones, Tecnología, Diseño y Audio / Video / Iluminación (AVL).

En julio de 2019, Jozlin Parker aceptó el cargo de Directora de Departamento de Comunicaciones y Medios de Ministerios. Posteriormente, este puesto se nombraba Director de Ministerios Técnicos. Andrew Bradley se unió al departamento como subdirector en octubre de 2019. Con los dos de los tres nuevos miembros del equipo de Ministerios Técnicos (TechMin) en la oficina de la conferencia, se ha dedicado mucho tiempo a aprender los entresijos del trabajo de la conferencia. Durante su instalación, han habido varios proyectos que han hecho contribuciones significativas a la conferencia.

A Ministerios Técnicos se le ha encomendado la meta a largo plazo de ayudar a consolidar y simplificar la infraestructura tecnológica dura y blanda de la conferencia. Este objetivo a largo plazo se ha combinado con el movimiento hacia un entorno más colaborativo

tanto dentro de la oficina de la conferencia como con los distritos e iglesias. Estos objetivos han comenzado a afectar todo, desde correos electrónicos hasta políticas de comunicaciones, flujos de trabajo, sitios web, bases de datos, *hardware* en sitio, experiencia del usuario, etc. Las tecnologías colaborativas permiten que las iglesias trasladen sus servicios en línea durante una pandemia, permiten que el clero de toda la conferencia se una y planifique el culto de adoración de la Conferencia Anual, y pueda ayudar a brindar un lugar en la mesa a personas que quizás no hayan sido escuchadas antes. Aunque este trabajo ha apenas comenzado recientemente, el equipo de TechMin ya ha ahorrado miles de dólares e innumerables horas de tiempo del personal.

El Departamento de Ministerios Técnicos ha continuado a mantener y facilitar el uso del Centro de Medios, ha trabajado para ayudar a las iglesias a desarrollar una presencia en línea y continúa dirigiendo comunicaciones de la oficina de la conferencia. COVID-19 cambió los planes de 2020 en organizaciones de todo el mundo. Mientras que el mundo vuelve a algo parecido a la normalidad, el equipo de TechMin espera crear una red de Ministros Técnicos en toda la conferencia. El propósito de esta red sería dar ayuda a los ministros técnicos a través de la conferencia a compartir las formas creativas que están usando en la tecnología para servir en su campo misional. Por medio de conexión y colaboración, la tecnología se puede utilizar para promover la misión de esta conferencia.

COMITÉ DE RESPUESTA A DESASTRES DE LA CONFERENCIA RIO TEXAS SOLO PARA INFORMACIÓN

El Comité de Respuesta a Desastres continúa apoyando el esfuerzo de recuperación masivo que queda del huracán Harvey, así como las inundaciones en el Valle del Río Grande, pero sigue comprometido a responder a los nuevos desastres que ocurran en la Conferencia. El año pasado fue relativamente tranquilo, pero hubo una gran inundación, por el segundo año consecutivo, en el Valle del Río Grande y un pequeño tornado en San Angelo.

Cuando ocurre un desastre, se le llama a los Equipos de Respuesta Temprana (ERT) para ayudar con la limpieza. Todos los miembros del ERT están certificados por el UMCOR (Comité Metodista Unido de Socorro) (United Methodist Committee on Relief) y deben completar un día de capacitación. Este año se capacitó a 70 personas, lo cual llega a un total de 707. Muchos de estos miembros del equipo han recibido capacitación especial adicional. Estos incluyen: 78 operadores de motosierras, 43 operadores de mini cargadoras, 83 evaluadores de sitio, 45 líderes de equipo, 12 especialistas avanzados de limpieza y 15 gerentes en sitio. La Conferencia Río Texas es un líder nacional en capacitación en línea, lo cual permite que sea más conveniente volver a certificarse a los miembros del equipo (cada tres años) y recibir capacitación avanzada especializada.

El Centro de Respuesta a Desastres Martínez continúa sirviendo como un centro de recolección de estuches UMCOR reunidos por las iglesias en la Conferencia, así como el almacenamiento de equipos de respuesta a desastres. UMCOR ahora recibe solo estuches escolares, estuches de higiene y estuches de limpieza (cubos de inundación). El centro sirve como sitio de recolección para todos los estuches, pero el inventario principal es de estuches de limpieza junto con una pequeña cantidad de estuches de higiene. En un cambio de lo de años anteriores, UMCOR envió estuches de limpieza a las instalaciones de Kerrville porque estábamos sobrecargados de ellos y teníamos espacio después de los envíos hechos a las inundaciones del Valle anteriormente mencionadas. Hay oportunidades limitadas de voluntariado en el centro de Kerrville, para que los grupos examinen los estuches de limpieza antes de entregarlos a los sobrevivientes de las inundaciones. Póngase en contacto con el gerente de almacén Jack Clarke en jack@jdc3.com para obtener información sobre oportunidades de voluntariado.

El Valle del Río Grande experimentó grandes inundaciones en junio de 2018 y 2019. Por medio de una subvención de \$ 500,000 de UMCOR, la Conferencia Río Texas enfocó sus esfuerzos de recuperación en la mitigación para los sobrevivientes de repetidas inundaciones en las colonias. Muchas casas se han inundado varias veces en los últimos diez años. Con el apoyo de Roland Pecina, gerente de proyectos de construcción, y Stephanie Villareal González, gerente de casos de desastre, 57 sobrevivientes han recibido asistencia, y diez sobrevivientes recibieron compromisos de apoyo financiero, lo cual resultó en la reconstrucción completa de nuevas viviendas que se construyeron a elevación por encima de las posibles zonas de inundación. Por medio de asociaciones con AmeriCorps NCCC, Nomads RV Group, Mennonite Disaster Services, FUMC McAllen, el Distrito El Valle y otros grupos de voluntarios, se ha logrado un progreso significativo en la reconstrucción de nueve de las diez casas. La Conferencia Río Texas también fue reconocida como "Patrocinadora de la Ronda" por AmeriCorps debido al liderazgo y la tutoría brindados por Roland Pecina y el personal de la CRT. El impacto del virus Corona ha impactado severamente los esfuerzos de los voluntarios y afectará los resultados de este subsidio programado a clausurar en agosto de 2020.

El área de Highland Lakes de los condados de Burnet y Llano experimentó grandes inundaciones en octubre de 2018. UMCOR otorgó una subvención de \$ 100,000 a la Conferencia Río Texas que nos permitió proporcionar servicios de administración de casos y apoyo financiero para reparaciones de viviendas dañadas a bordo de los ríos Llano y Colorado.

Esta subvención se finalizó en enero de 2020, apoyando a 63 sobrevivientes.

La recuperación del huracán Harvey, que azotó en agosto de 2017, ha sido de cierto la pieza central del Ministerio de Respuesta a Desastres. Gracias a casi cinco millones de dólares de UMCOR y la participación en el Programa de Manejo de Casos de Desastres

(DCMP) financiado por FEMA, la Conferencia ha trabajado con más de 1000 familias que viven en 14 condados afectados en los distritos de Crossroads y Coastal Bend. Estamos muy orgullosos y agradecidos por el personal de construcción y administración de casos contratados localmente los cuales han desempeñado un papel clave en el servicio y la asistencia a tantos sobrevivientes de huracanes.

A partir del 1 de abril de 2020, la Conferencia ha completado aproximadamente 270 proyectos de construcción valorados en \$ 5.6M que han incluido reparaciones y reemplazos de casas (casas móviles, casas rodantes y reconstrucciones completas). Cabe mencionar que los administradores de casos de la Conferencia Rio Texas han aprovechado los fondos para sus clientes para reparaciones y reemplazos de viviendas de otros financiadores, además del apoyo brindado por Rio Texas. Las reparaciones y los reemplazos de viviendas no serían posibles si no fuera por los fondos disponibles a través de las Tablas de Necesidades Insatisfechas patrocinadas por grupos locales de recuperación a largo plazo. Hasta la fecha, la Conferencia Río Texas ha brindado aproximadamente \$ 4.6 millones de dólares de asistencia financiera para satisfacer las necesidades de los sobrevivientes del huracán Harvey, administrados por Río Texas, la Sociedad de San Vicente de Paul, el Grupo de Recuperación a Largo Plazo del condado de Victoria, el Grupo de Recuperación de Desastres de Coastal Bend, Caridades Católicas, Servicios Sociales Luteranos y BCFS. Los fondos disponibles en las mesas son proporcionados por obsequios hechos al Fondo de Respuesta a Desastres por individuos, iglesias y conferencias de la IMU. Además, los principales obsequios de UMCOR se han complementado con subvenciones a la Conferencia de la Cruz Roja Americana, Reconstrucción Texas, Bonneville Inc. y la Fundación Kronkosky. Los servicios de administración y construcción de casos de Río Texas se finalizarán el 31 de mayo con el cierre total del programa en agosto de 2020.

El Equipo de Visión fomenta las relaciones y el diálogo con diversas entidades que reflejan los alcances y ministerios de misión, como Ministerios de Salud Metodistas, Justicia para Nuestros Vecinos, Impacto de Texas y Federación Metodista

para la Acción Social. Asimismo, el Equipo de Visión y la Oficina de Misión, Servicio y Ministerios de Justicia trabajan con equipos de tareas y coordinadores en las áreas de:

- Procesamiento del personal de la misión e itinerario
- Avance de la Conferencia y el Programa de Cinco Estrellas
- Respuestas de inmigración / migración y ministerios fronterizos
- Desarrollo comunitario a través del Programa de Praxis de Comunidades Transformadoras

- Comité de Respuesta a Desastres de la Conferencia
- Equipo de Desarrollo de Voluntarios en Misión de la Conferencia

CONECTANDO AL CAMPO DE LA MISIÓN

El informe estadístico de la conferencia 2019 refleja indicadores de los ministerios de misión, servicio y justicia que fluyen de la iglesia local. A continuación se muestra una reflexión sobre estos ministerios en toda la conferencia sobre la vida de los cinco años de historia de la Conferencia Río Texas.

Los datos autoinformados de la actividad de la iglesia local revelan un aumento significativo en el número de personas servidas por los ministerios comunitarios para divulgación, justicia y misericordia [Línea 23] en los últimos cinco años, de 677,004 en 2015 a 986,992 en 2019. Esto posiblemente refleja el aumento necesidades descubiertas en comunidades servidas a través de estos ministerios críticos. Para comprender esto específicamente, el tipo de ministerios y las necesidades abordadas necesitarían ser calificados.

Con respecto al número de personas de las congregaciones que sirven en los ministerios de misión y comunidad [Línea 22], mostramos un aumento de 11,027 personas involucradas durante cinco años. En 2017, 42,059 personas estuvieron involucradas, lo que representa un aumento de 16,801 personas respecto al año anterior. Aunque no está completamente justificado, se cree que este aumento dramático en la participación podría deberse a la respuesta voluntaria en diversas formas al alivio del huracán Harvey.

Cada vez más, estamos conscientes de la importancia de participar en el ministerio "con" la comunidad en lugar de llevar a cabo el ministerio "a" la comunidad y la importancia de fomentar el ministerio por medio de relaciones mutuas para transformar comunidades y congregaciones, respectivamente.

Los aprendizajes estratégicos y los primeros resultados del TCOP obtenidos de las entrevistas con los participantes de la cohorte 2017 y 2018 indicaron tres resultados iniciales: 1.) cambios dentro de las personas, 2.) cambios dentro de las congregaciones o ministerios asociados, y 3.) cambios dentro del contexto del ministerio de las congregaciones.

Con respecto a los <u>cambios dentro de las personas</u>, varios clérigos informaron cambios en su propio liderazgo que incluyeron una nueva apertura a las asociaciones con organizaciones fuera de la iglesia, un cambio de mentalidad de ver a las personas necesitadas como objetos del trabajo misionero a ver a las personas como socios en la misión, una nueva conciencia más profunda del contexto de su ministerio, y un cambio de estilo de liderazgo de comando y control a un estilo de líder como facilitador que libera los dones de congregantes y miembros de la comunidad y fomenta el llamado. Varios equipos informaron que surgieron nuevos líderes como resultado de la participación del TCOP. La mayoría de los equipos compartieron historias de unirse con nuevos individuos y familias en la comunidad y brindar apoyo concreto. Los ejemplos de la historia incluyen: ayudar a los vecinos con el mantenimiento diferido de jardín y la pintura de la casa, la eliminación de los piojos que infestaban a una familia y afectaban la asistencia de los niños a la escuela, y organizar horarios regularmente programados para que la comunidad envíe solicitudes de oración. La mayoría de los equipos informaron haber visto un aumento en la participación de los ciudadanos en el bienestar de su comunidad. En un caso, una persona que había sido objeto de la organización benéfica de la iglesia

fue invitada a unirse al equipo de la misión como una persona de divulgación remunerada y ahora es el líder remunerado de un nuevo proyecto que surgió de la participación del TCOP llamada Tienda Gratis.

Con respecto a los <u>cambios dentro de las congregaciones o los ministerios asociados</u>, en varios ejemplos, los métodos, prácticas y enfoques del TCOP se comparten con otros más allá del equipo que participó en las sesiones de aprendizaje. Hay nuevos esfuerzos para equipar a los feligreses para que sean más relacionales y menos transaccionales con los vecinos de la iglesia. Se está compartiendo un enfoque relacional basado en activos con iglesias, gobiernos, escuelas y organizaciones sin fines de lucro que no pertenecen a la IMU. En el entorno grande de la iglesia, TCOP ha sido un catalizador para conectar los puntos entre los ministerios dentro de la congregación, expandir los ministerios existentes y recrear la participación en los ministerios comunitarios que brindan alivio sin el compromiso de abordar también las causas fundamentales. Una iglesia informó que la congregación había agregado miembros como resultado directo del TCOP y ha cambiado de un enfoque de misión basado en las necesidades a un enfoque basado en los activos para involucrarse con la comunidad.

Con respecto a los <u>cambios dentro del contexto del ministerio de las congregaciones</u>, cada equipo informó una creciente red de asociaciones, un importante impulsor del bienestar de la comunidad, que se formó como resultado del TCOP. La red de socios varía según el contexto, pero incluye escuelas, policía, instituciones de salud, otras iglesias y agencias de servicios sociales. Los equipos informaron que su iglesia es vista cada vez más como un recurso para la comunidad. Y, a medida que se le pide a la iglesia que se asocie para responder a los problemas y preocupaciones locales, la iglesia se está incrustando más profundamente en su comunidad. Los equipos están viendo cambio en el comportamiento de algunos de sus socios comunitarios de manera positiva y vital. Por ejemplo, una pequeña ciudad informa que la policía ya no cita infracciones a los propietarios de propiedades arruinadas como su primera

respuesta. En cambio, esperan que la iglesia y su creciente red de socios comunitarios ofrezcan asistencia al propietario y una solución más reparadora. En otra ciudad, un oficial ausente está conectando a las familias con la iglesia y su red de socios comunitarios para abordar algunos de los problemas subyacentes del hogar que impiden la asistencia de un niño a la escuela.

En resumen, los aprendizajes y resultados estratégicos clave son: identificación de nuevos líderes, nuevas habilidades de liderazgo y cambio de mentalidad para los líderes actuales; los ministerios transaccionales existentes están haciendo esfuerzos para ser más relacionales; mayor conciencia del contexto del ministerio de la iglesia que incluye no solo problemas, sino que también incluye fortalezas, activos y recursos no explorados de la comunidad; y conciencia de un terreno común (y un nuevo lenguaje común) con el cual construir asociaciones locales para el bienestar de la comunidad.

Los resultados destacados del Año 3 describen los hallazgos de una evaluación cualitativa de fin de año (2019) con los equipos de TCOP. El método cualitativo utilizado se basa en el proceso de la historia del cambio más significativo. Los miembros del equipo de diseño de TCOP facilitaron las entrevistas y analizaron los datos. Este mismo método se utilizó en 2018 y los resultados se observaron en tres dominios: cambios dentro de los individuos, cambios dentro de las congregaciones y cambios dentro de la comunidad. Los resultados de la evaluación de 2018 condujeron al desarrollo de la Teoría de Cambio. Esta Teoría de Cambio es útil para comprender los resultados de la evaluación de 2019. Al igual que 2018 y a través de las historias compartidas por los equipos de TCOP en 2019, se sigue viendo evidencia de los siguientes resultados: 1.) capacidad de liderazgo, 2.) relaciones y colaboraciones, 3.) cambios de mentalidad y 4.) atención integral de vecinos.

Con respecto a la <u>capacidad de liderazgo</u>, los miembros de Bethel IMU - San Antonio (Cohorte 2019) informaron un crecimiento en sus propias habilidades de liderazgo como resultado de la capacitación básica de TCOP. Cuando llevaron sus nuevas habilidades y conocimientos a su iglesia, identificaron nuevos líderes dentro de la congregación (aproximadamente 20) que aún no se habían comprometido con su iglesia fuera del culto del domingo por la mañana. A finales de año, estas nuevas personas estaban participando en iniciativas de alcance comunitario, e incluso comenzando una nueva.

Con respecto a las <u>relaciones</u> y <u>colaboraciones</u>, First IMU - Poteet (Cohorte 2018) informa una relación creciente con la Ciudad de Poteet. Las reuniones mensuales se han trasladado de los sitios de la iglesia a los espacios de propiedad pública. El alcalde ha participado en las reuniones y en una capacitación sobre desarrollo comunitario basado en activos (ABCD). Esto ha despertado el interés del alcalde en organizar una iniciativa ABCD en toda la ciudad en colaboración con el equipo local de TCOP. El nuevo coordinador de comunicaciones de la ciudad está aprovechando activamente los activos y recursos que el equipo de TCOP ha estado descubriendo y conectando al destacarlos en las comunicaciones regulares de toda la ciudad. Finalmente, el superintendente escolar ha pedido a varios miembros de la creciente iniciativa TCOP en Poteet que sirvan en un comité del distrito escolar. Con respecto a los <u>cambios de mentalidad</u>, Gruene IMU - Gruene (Cohorte 2019) informa una comprensión cada vez mayor de la diferencia entre "hacer ministerio para" y "hacer ministerio con". Hicieron un pequeño cambio en un ministerio de extensión existente que ha llevado a los participantes a ayudar a entregar y dar forma al ministerio de manera que se construya comunidad y se cree un sentido más profundo de pertenencia en el ministerio entre los participantes.

El cuarto resultado que la iniciativa TCOP espera ver es la <u>atención integral de los vecinos</u>. La evidencia de este resultado es más fuerte en las historias compartidas por los equipos del TCOP que formaron parte de la primera cohorte. Tal vez sea porque los primeros tres resultados (enumerados anteriormente) deben estar en su lugar antes de que se realice este cuarto. First IMU - Eagle Pass (2017 Cohort) informa que en 2019 pudieron aprovechar la aplicación de los principios y prácticas del TCOP durante 2017-18. Utilizando los activos que descubrieron, los dones de las personas en su comunidad y las relaciones que habían fomentado, crearon un sistema holístico de apoyo y cuidado para los solicitantes de asilo que llegan a su comunidad y a través de ella.

El Equipo de Diseño de TCOP espera ver evidencia de los Impactos del diagrama de la Teoría del Cambio (abajo) aproximadamente 5-10 años después de que un equipo comience la capacitación básica de TCOP. Las historias compartidas en la evaluación de este año muestran evidencia de que la primera cohorte está experimentando una comunidad más conectada y cohesionada. "Conectado" se refiere a conexiones sociales entre residentes, conexiones de colaboración entre instituciones y acceso a servicios que promueven el bienestar. La "cohesión comunitaria" se refiere a los lazos sociales y los compromisos comunitarios que unen a las personas. La comunidad ya siente un sentido de interdependencia y solidaridad. Con respecto a las comunidades conectadas y cohesivas, First IMU - Eagle Pass (Cohorte 2017), citado como un ejemplo de cuidado integral de los vecinos (arriba), también fue el resultado de la comunidad cohesiva que está surgiendo en Eagle Pass como resultado de responder a la creciente necesidad de cuidar a los vecinos residentes entre ellos. Esta comunidad usó sus fuertes lazos sociales, sus compromisos mutuos y su compromiso compartido con un objetivo común de cuidar al extranjero y construir el sistema de apoyo mencionado anteriormente. Otro ejemplo es First IMU - Brackettville (Cohorte 2017) que comparte historias de una creciente vecindad en la comunidad. Es una vecindad que surge del profundo cambio en la calidad de las relaciones en la comunidad. El cambio en la calidad de las relaciones ha estado cambiando junto con el creciente sentido de propiedad que tiene la comunidad para un "tercer espacio" llamado Hope Outreach Center que está en el corazón del trabajo del Equipo TCOP. El hecho de que el cambio más significativo reconocido por este equipo se describe como vecindad es congruente con las descripciones de una comunidad unida.

Mirando hacia el futuro para un mayor impacto, la evaluación de este año ilumina la preparación entre varios de los equipos para traer más intencionalidad a: 1.) más de la comunidad en la toma de decisiones y 2.) crear una visión y un plan compartidos para la acción colectiva de la comunidad. A fines de 2019, el equipo de diseño de TCOP comenzó a desarrollar una nueva oferta que se utilizará para apoyar a estos equipos en 2020 a medida que avanzan hacia una transformación más profunda de la comunidad. Al

mismo tiempo, el equipo de diseño de TCOP continuará desarrollando nuevos equipos de TCOP, formará a los equipos existentes y ofrecerá asistencia personalizada en el sitio según sea necesario. Al concluir el año 3, los elementos del programa TCOP están en su lugar, comprobados y refinados (ver Estrategias sobre la teoría del cambio). Hay mucha emoción para pasar a la siguiente fase de TCOP, apoyando a los equipos de TCOP para un mayor impacto en sus comunidades

Iniciativa de Coalición del Condado de Kinney emerge

El condado de Kinney, Texas, es un condado fronterizo con 3,800 residentes. Brackettville, la ciudad sede del condado, tiene 1.740 residentes. Durante los últimos seis años más o menos, Hope Outreach Center, un ministerio de extensión comunitaria de First IMU de Brackettville, ha servido como un conector de varios servicios sociales para las necesidades de los residentes.

Antes del nacimiento de Hope Outreach, la iglesia se conectó y trabajó con los residentes para mejorar y climatizar sus hogares. Fue a través de esas interacciones que la iglesia comenzó a escuchar las preocupaciones de sus vecinos y nuevos amigos. Con el tiempo, al comprender las preocupaciones socioeconómicas, de salud, educación y empleo de la comunidad, se ha vuelto cada vez más evidente y urgente trabajar para obtener respuestas adecuadas.

En 2017, un equipo de FUMC / Hope Outreach se convirtió en parte de la cohorte de aprendizaje inicial en el programa de desarrollo comunitario de la conferencia. - Comunidades Transformacionales de Praxis (www.tcopraxis.org). El trabajo más profundo de desarrollo comunitario está ahora en movimiento. Mediante la convocatoria de la iglesia, los residentes de la comunidad, los funcionarios del gobierno local y las personas de fe, los residentes se unen para imaginar el desarrollo transformador del condado de Kinney.

En noviembre de 2019, unos 30 residentes se reunieron para imaginar algunas acciones que podrían tomar con el tiempo para fortalecer su comunidad, así como reflexionar sobre cómo podría ser el bienestar holístico de la comunidad [Shalom - Jeremías 29: 7]. La reunión también fue un medio de medir la voluntad de la comunidad para adoptar el desarrollo de una coalición en todo el condado para adoptar la sostenibilidad a largo plazo de la visión.

Ahora en 2020, la Coalición del Condado de Kinney comenzó a reunirse en enero para obtener las habilidades y la mentalidad de organizar y movilizar a la comunidad para un cambio sostenible y medido. La coalición está llevando a cabo conversaciones individuales con el 10% de los residentes del condado. Los datos recopilados determinarán las prioridades, los proyectos, las metas inmediatas y a largo plazo, y los intereses y compromisos de los residentes para participar y colaborar en la búsqueda del Shalom del Condado de Kinney.

RESPUESTA A LA INMIGRACIÓN Y MINISTERIOS FRONTERIZOS: 450 millas de frontera

2019 fue un año crucial para la respuesta de inmigración y los ministerios de fronteras dentro de la Conferencia Río Texas. La migración global y diversos factores de impulso son una realidad siempre presente. El contexto de nuestra misión nos llama a los ministerios de presencia y relaciones a lo largo de 450 millas de la frontera entre EE. UU. Y México, y no solo como metodistas de EE. UU., sino también trabajando binacionalmente con la Iglesia Metodista de México.

Los migrantes que buscan asilo han sido una realidad creciente en nuestro medio desde la llegada de menores no acompañados en 2014 y nuestras respuestas de hospitalidad a Cubanos en Nuevo Laredo en 2017. Durante 2019, nuestra respuesta humanitaria y sistemas de apoyo se han agudizado a medida que aumenta el flujo de migración. Los ministerios en la frontera están conversando y coordinando entre sí y con las respuestas del ministerio en San Antonio, el punto de partida para los migrantes que viajan para unirse con miembros de la familia en varias partes del país, donde se quedarán esperando su fecha en la corte de solicitud de asilo. A medida que la política de respuesta a los migrantes Permanecer en México, también conocida como Protocolos de Protección de Migrantes [MPP], se ha implementado completamente, esto requiere que aquellos que buscan asilo estén en un medio de espera en campamentos improvisados en el lado mexicano de la frontera. Como esto ha resultado en un menor número de solicitantes de asilo que cruzan a los EE. UU., los sistemas de respuesta y apoyo que han evolucionado y fortalecido a lo largo de este año respondiendo y recibiendo migrantes que llegan a los EE. UU. ahora están encontrando formas de apoyar a los ministerios de respuesta en la frontera en México, proporcionando comida, ropa y asistencia médica allí.

Ahora, COVID-19 plantea otro nivel de preocupación. Las personas estadounidenses que ayudan en los campos de migrantes fronterizos mexicanos, como en Matamoros, ahora no pueden cruzar diariamente o semanalmente, ya que hacerlo se considera no esencial.

Convocatoria Fronteriza ... Continuando la Conversación

Durante los días 20 y 21 de septiembre de 2019, aproximadamente 115 personas participaron en este evento crucial diseñado como tiempo y espacio para los profesionales y estudiantes involucrados en ofrecer respuestas humanitarias para migrantes y solicitantes de asilo y defensa de la inmigración para conectarse y compartir preocupaciones y prácticas.

Los practicantes involucrados en las respuestas directas a los migrantes que ya llegaron proporcionaron actualizaciones sobre lo que está sucediendo en los puntos a lo largo de las 450 millas de la frontera en nuestro campo de doble misión: Acuña / Del Rio, Piedras Negras / Eagle Pass, Nuevo Laredo / Laredo, Reynosa / McAllen y Matamoros / Brownsville. Los desafíos legales fueron presentados por la comunidad de Justicia para Nuestros Vecinos, particularmente los impactos de la política de Permanecer en México en la comunidad que busca asilo. La Iglesia y la Sociedad movilizaron a la comunidad reunida para escribir cartas sobre el terreno para presentarlas a los legisladores en Washington, D.C., expresando preocupación por las políticas actuales que afectan a los solicitantes de asilo que buscan refugio de las circunstancias duras y violentas que enfrentan en sus países de origen.

Las historias fronterizas compartidas reflejaron cómo el despliegue de la implementación de la política Permanecer en México entró en vigencia antes en Brownsville, McAllen y Laredo y más tarde en Eagle Pass y Del Río a lo largo de 2019. Los informes de respuesta en la frontera inferior del Río Grande reflejaron la respuesta del ministerio a las necesidades de la comunidad de migrantes en Matamoros y Nuevo Laredo, mientras que en Eagle Pass y Del Rio, los solicitantes de asilo / migrantes aún cruzaban la frontera después de haber sido procesados por la Aduana y la Patrulla Fronteriza (CBP). Por lo tanto, los números de cruce en el sector inferior del valle del Río Grande disminuyeron mientras que los números en el área de Eagle Pass / Del Rio aumentaron.

A fines de marzo, una gran entrada de migrantes / solicitantes de asilo comenzó a llegar de manera constante a San Antonio, muchos de ellos procedentes de varios países además de Honduras, El Salvador y Guatemala, como era la norma. Esto conmovió a la Ciudad de San Antonio a establecer el Centro de Recursos para Migrantes para procesar el alto aumento de los extranjeros que llegan. El centro de recursos coordinó las conexiones y las tarifas de viaje para los procesados por CBP, mientras que la Interfaith Welcome Coalition (Coalición de Bienvenida de la Interfé) continuó ofreciendo hospitalidad y orientación de viaje a las personas liberadas por ICE de los centros de detención de Dilley, Pearsall y Karnes City. Travis Park IMU proporcionó refugio nocturno para personas que necesitan más tiempo para coordinar viajes a sus destinos patrocinadores dentro de los EE. UU. Una respuesta triple bien coordinada surgió dentro de dos cuadras cuadradas en el centro de San Antonio.

Durante 2019, la Interfaith Welcome Coalition distribuyó 25,577 mochilas de viaje. Durante ocho meses, 22.053 personas durmieron en la iglesia de Travis Park. El Centro de Recursos para Migrantes, a través de los recursos coordinados de la ciudad, facilitó 83,336 comidas servidas y 2,536 evaluaciones médicas. Del mismo modo, se han gastado innumerables recursos a través de nuestros puntos de hospitalidad en Del Río, Eagle Pass, Laredo, McAllen y Brownsville. La Convocatoria Fronteriza reflejó la presencia y el aporte de varios líderes de la Conferencia Río Texas, profesionales de respuesta directa a través de la Comisión Metodista de Amistad Fronteriza (líderes de la Conferencia Río Texas y la Conferencia Este de la Iglesia Metodista de México), la comunidad de Justicia para Nuestros Vecinos, representantes de las conferencias vecinas de la IMU y varias agencias: Texas Methodist Foundation, Methodist Healthcare Ministries, Interfaith Welcome Coalition, City of San Antonio, Texas Impact, Texas American Civil Liberties Union, Junta General de Ministerios Globales / UMCOR Global Migration, Junta General de la Iglesia y Sociedad, y National

Desde la Convocatoria Fronteriza, la conversación ha continuado por medio de seminarios web mensuales y sesiones de actualización fronteriza realizadas a través de ZOOM el tercer martes mensual a las 10:45 am Central. Próximos pasos

En diciembre, la Red de Colaboración Fronteriza de Texas nació de la Coalición de Bienvenida Interreligiosa, el Impacto de Texas, los líderes del ministerio fronterizo de la Conferencia Río Texas, Justicia para Nuestros Vecinos y varios socios ecuménicos y comunitarios involucrados en respuestas fronterizas. Se reunieron en una conversación para visualizar una red que combina los esfuerzos de los ministerios y organizaciones en ambos lados de la frontera, desde El Paso / Juárez hasta Brownsville / Matamoros, apoyando a las comunidades de migrantes / solicitantes de asilo. La red recién formada intenta coordinar esfuerzos binacionalmente en las áreas de servicios directos, apoyo legal, conexiones de hospitalidad y defensa de la comunidad de migrantes y solicitantes de asilo. Los objetivos inmediatos son desarrollar una base de datos de organizaciones para coordinar las respuestas de apoyo.

GOLDEN AGE HOME CELEBRA SU 60TH ANIVERSARIO EN 2020

El 15 de noviembre de 1960, Golden Age Home abrió sus puertas para aceptar a los adultos mayores en el hogar. El hogar era un sueño convertido en realidad para un grupo de hombres y mujeres de las Iglesias Metodistas del Distrito de Austin. Durante cuatro años, este grupo dedicado trabajó para establecer el Hogar de la Edad de Oro no sólo como una estructura física y corporación legal, sino también como "el lugar para el compañerismo, la paz y la comodidad con la independencia".

Golden Age Home fue uno de los muchos hogares que formaban parte del programa Metodista, Homes for Older Persons. Para desarrollar estos hogares, personas responsables y devotas en la iglesia y la comunidad dieron libremente de su tiempo y energía, a través del liderazgo creativo, el talento y el dinero a estos edificios y operaciones. Algunos sólo estaban ligeramente relacionados con la Iglesia, pero el patrocinio de la Iglesia aseguró estabilidad, integridad, permanencia y fideicomisario responsable.

Un folleto original decía: "Aquellos sin familia vendrán y encontrarán a aquellos que los cuidan como si fueran suyos. Aquellos que tienen pocos amigos, están solos o en pena, encontrarán aquí simpatía y amor". Y así, más de 5.000 personas se han convertido en parte de la familia Golden Age Home durante los últimos 60 años. Algunos de esos miembros donde los empleados, mientras que otros residían dentro de las paredes, pero todos encontraron un lugar que se ha mantenido fiel a su misión de "proporcionar un servicio excelente y de calidad a los adultos mayores en un ambiente cristiano".

A principios de 2020, iniciamos un programa intergeneracional. Este programa incluyó la organización de una clase de Music Together con niños en edad preescolar, un programa de mentoría de lectura en una de las escuelas primarias locales y el voluntariado en la despensa de alimentos local junto con muchos más eventos planeados. Mientras esos programas están actualmente en espera, trajeron gran alegría a todos los involucrados y esperamos reiniciarlos en el otoño.

Ya este año de 2020, ha habido un aumento de los costos y una menor capacidad para las actividades normales de los residentes. La actividad social es muy importante para las personas que están aisladas de amigos y familiares. Hemos implementado procedimientos de visita "fuera de la caja" que no sólo proporcionan protección, sino que también ayudan a nuestros residentes a combatir la soledad añadida que ha venido con la crisis de salud actual. Siempre es nuestro objetivo para proporcionar a nuestros residentes con comodidad y tranquilidad. Nuestro dedicado equipo ha intensificado para asegurar que nuestros residentes están recibiendo el cuidado adicional física, mental, social y espiritualmente necesario para desestresarse durante este tiempo de descenso de salidas y visitas.

Golden Age Home recibió su estatus sin fines de lucro en 1964 que continúa operando bajo la actualidad. Golden Age Home se dedica a mantener su costo asequible. A finales de los años 90, se aseguró una subvención del TDCHA que permitía a GAH designar 16 habitaciones de la Vida Asistida para aquellos que necesitaban vivienda subsidiada. 20 años más tarde, GAH continúa buscando subvenciones y donaciones a través de fundaciones privadas, iglesias, empresas e individuos para mantener este programa en funcionamiento.

Actualmente, el Consejo de Administración está compuesto por 10 miembros. Estos miembros son hombres y mujeres de la zona de Lockhart, Luling, Seguin, Kyle y Elgin. Este grupo diverso sigue siendo el 90% de las iglesias metodistas. Nuestros generosos miembros de la junta proporcionan continuamente tiempo, experiencia, asesoramiento y donaciones disponibles para promover nuestra misión.

Este otoño, Golden Age Home acogerá una celebración pública por su 60th aniversario. Invito a cada miembro de la conferencia anual a visitar nuestro sitio web en MCH.org. Ahi puede explorar con más detalle los servicios que ofrecemos. - Se completó la construcción de las cuarta y quinta casas nuevas en nuestro campus de Waco como parte de la campaña Building Hope. Las Casas Nancy R. Bowen y B.R. & Helen Greathouse son nuevas casas de vanguardia diseñadas con las necesidades únicas de los niños que atendemos actualmente, junto con nuestra investigación basada en el trauma y residencias de eficiencia modernas. Además, hemos completado de recaudir fondos que construirán las casas sexta, séptima, octava y novena.
- Se sirvieron a 205 niños y jóvenes a través de nuestros programas del campus en Waco; a 5,684 niños y a sus familias a través de los programas MCH Family Outreach (Alcance Faminilar del MCH); y a 174 jóvenes adultos a través de servicios de transición.
- Nuestros estudiantes participaron en múltiples viajes misioneros, incluido el EJÉRCITO M.U., en campamentos de liderazgo y otros proyectos de servicio comunitario.
- Se obtuvieron designaciones del Sello de Oro de Transparencia de Guidestar y una calificación de caridad de Cuatro Estrellas del Charity Navigator. Menos del 1 por ciento de las organizaciones sin fines de lucro incluidas en Guidestar han alcanzado el nivel de Oro.
 - Estas designaciones reconocen nuestro compromiso con la excelencia y los esfuerzos para llevar a cabo nuestro trabajo con la máxima integridad y transparencia.
- Se graduaron 25 estudiantes de último año de la escuela secundaria y se apoyaron a 85 alumnos del MCH que cursan estudios superiores en colegios comunitarios, escuelas profesionales o instituciones de cuatro años. Al escribir este informe, nos estamos preparando para que siete alumnos del MCH se gradúen con un título o certificado de un instituto de educación superior en la primavera de 2020.

El apoyo gentil de la Conferencia Río Texas dio como resultado una inversión del 87,52 % de la solicitud de prorrateo del Fondo de la Universidad de África en 2019. Gracias por sus constantes oraciones y regalos. Son semillas de esperanza y abundancia sembradas cerca del hogar, en África subsahariana y en todo el mundo.

La generosidad de la Conferencia Río Texas le permite a la Universidad de África educar y nutrir a líderes que piensan por sí mismos, son contextualmente relevantes y tienen pasión por servir. Desde su inauguración en 1992, la Universidad de África ha formado a más de 9000 graduados que lideran y sirven en África subsahariana y más allá. Estos jóvenes son creativos y receptivos para satisfacer las necesidades de sus comunidades.

Actualización institucional:

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Desde nuestra fundación en el año 1914, la **Facultad de Teología de Candler en la Universidad de Emory** ha educado más de 10.000 estudiantes, formando líderes cristianos atentos, de principios y valientes, dedicados a transformar el mundo en el nombre de Jesucristo.

Esto es especialmente importante notar entre la incertitud actual en nuestra denominación. Es un honor y un privilegio para Candler ser uno de los 13 seminarios oficiales de la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Fiel a la tradición metodista de apertura ecuménica, Candler ha dado una bienvenida entusiástica a toda la familia Wesleyana en nuestra comunidad por generaciones. La facultad, el personal y los estudiantes de la Iglesia AME, la Iglesia AME Sion, la Iglesia CME, los Metodistas Libres, los nazarenos y otros han trabajado, alabado, aprendido y orado junto con los Metodistas Unidos, y han sido una parte vital de formar a Candler y nuestra misión. Esta diversidad ha sido un regalo maravilloso y una bendición rica. Mientras avanzamos, continuaremos invitando y dando la bienvenida sin reservas a la gente de toda expresión de la tradición Wesleyana. De verdad, continuaremos dando la bienvenida a todos que siguen Jesucristo.

Este año, Candler ha continuado fortalecer nuestro compromiso profundo al alivio de la deuda estudiantil y la promoción de los conocimientos financieros. En el año 2018-2019, dimos \$6.3 millones en apoyo financiero, con el 100 por ciento de los estudiantes de la Maestría en Divinidad (MDiv) recibiendo apoyo y entrenamiento financiero. El otoño 2019, anunciamos una gran expansión de nuestro programa de apoyo financiero para incluir becas de matrícula completa para todos los estudiantes MDiv quienes son candidatos certificados para el ministerio ordenado en La Iglesia Metodista Unida, y nuevas becas de mérito cubriendo el 75% de la matrícula para estudiantes MDiv cualificados quienes identifican como parte de la tradición Wesleyana, y los que persiguen la capellanía a través de la concentración nueva de Candler de capellanía. Además, todos los estudiantes entrantes en los programas de la Maestría en Divinidad, la Maestría en Estudios Teológicos, y la Maestría en Liderazgo Religioso recibirán becas cubriendo al menos el 50% de la matrícula.

Este año también se lanzaron dos "comunidades de formación" piloto, viviendas estudiantiles fuera del campus que se centran en la vida intencional y la formación espiritual. Estudiantes de varios programas solicitaron participar en estos grupos piloto. Al principio del año, los compañeros de casa crearon una "regla de vida" para guiar sus días juntos, enfatizando la oración, el compañerismo y la celebración. Un capellán – un miembro de la facultad de Candler o un líder de la iglesia – les apoya y comparte el viaje. Los diez estudiantes quienes participaron este año describen un sentido más rico de comunidad y connecciones más profundas con Dios y entre sí en medio de sus vidas ocupadas. Es claro que este satisface una necesidad para nuestros seminarianos, y anticipamos con entusiásmo el crecimiento del programa en los años venideros.

Nuestro alumnado sigue reflejando la diversidad y amplitud de los fieles cristianos, con 470 estudiantes inscritos de 12 países y 38 estados, con el 40 por ciento de personas de color (EE.UU.) y una edad mediana de 27 años entre los estudiantes MDiv. Los estudiantes representan 42 denominaciones, con el 45% de todos los estudiantes y el 50% de los estudiantes MDiv viniendo de la familia metodista.

Candler ofrece seis titulaciones simples y diez titulaciones dobles que se combinan la teología con la bioética, los negocios, la práctica del desarrollo, el derecho, la salud pública, y el trabajo social. Nuestro título del Doctorado en Ministerio se cumple el 90 por ciento en línea, así que los estudiantes puedan quedarse en sus lugares del ministerio mientras que completen sus títulos.

Candler adquiere su fortaleza e inspiración en gran parte por su relación con la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Nuestra capacidad para cumplir con nuestra misión de formar líderes fieles y creativos por los ministerios de la iglesia en el mundo depende de su apoyo, dones, y oraciones. DUKE UNIVERSITY DIVINITY SCHOOL

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

L. Gregory Jones, Decano de Duke Divinity School y Profesor de Teología y Ministerio, servirá en su puesto de decano por cinco años hasta el 2023.

El Duke Endowment otorgó una donación de \$12 millones para apoyar tres prioridades de Duke Divinity School (DDS): Comunidades florecientes vivificadas por congregaciones saludables y pastores talentosos, sabiduría encarnada por medio de una vida intelectual rigurosa, e instituciones creativas que inspiran un liderazgo transformativo como el programa de becados para Comunidades Florecientes. Durante los próximos cuatro años, este programa proveerá 52 becas para cubrir el costo total de la matrícula de DDS.

Duke Divinity inició La Colaboración para Liderazgo Pastoral Afro-americano. Ésta utilizará los resultados de investigaciones académicas en las tradiciones eclesiales afro-americanas y ejemplos históricos de liderazgo pastoral efectivo afro-americano para entrenar y construir redes de líderes efectivos para la iglesia afro-americana de hoy y del futuro. La colaboración será dirigida por el Reverendo David Emmanuel Goatley, profesor de teología y estudios afro-americanos y director de la Oficina de Estudios Afro-americanos en Duke Divinity School.

En el 2019, Duke Divinity School recibió 215 nuevos alumnos de 33 estados y siete países: Canadá, Malasia, Singapur, Corea del Sur, Taiwán, Tailandia, y Zimbabue. El programa de Maestría en Estudios Teológicos (M.T.S) ingresó a 35 alumnos, el de Maestría de Artes en Práctica Cristiana (M.A.C.P.) a 22. Otros programas también ingresaron un buen número de nuevos alumnos: el de Maestría en Teología (Th.M., 14 alumnos), el de Doctorado en Ministerio (D.Min., 22 alumnos), y el de Doctorado en Teología (Th.D., 4). El D.Min fue nombrado el mejor programa en línea por TheBestSchools.org. Un nuevo programa, el Certificado en Teología y Medicina ingresará a 8 alumnos. Estos participaran en la iniciativa de Duke Divinity en Teología, Medicina, y Cultura (T.M.C.).

El programa de M.T.S. incluye a 8 alumnos que también son miembros del T.M.C. para un record de 16 miembros ("fellows"). El programa de Maestría en Divinidad (M.Div.) recibió 110 alumnos nuevos. Más del 32% de estos provienen de grupos minoritarios. En el cuerpo estudiantil de este nuevo grupo de alumnos, 18% son Afro-americanos, 44% son mujeres. Entre los nuevos alumnos hay 24 denominaciones cristianas representadas, 42% de estos estudiantes se identifican como miembros de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

Dos catedráticos, Brent Straw y Brett McCarty, ingresaron en el cuerpo docente de DDS en julio 2019. Strawn es Profesor de Antiguo Testamento, y es un ministro ordenado de la Conferencia Anual de North Georgia de la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Strawn tiene un nombramiento secundario como Profesor de Derechos en la Escuela de Derechos de la Universidad de Duke. Previo a su llegado a Duke, Strawn dio clases por 18 años en la Escuela de Teología de Candler en la Universidad de Emory.

McCarty es un profesor de ética teológica cuyo trabajo se enfoca en cómo actuar con fe cristiana en el mundo de la medicina. Él es también director asociado del T.M.C. y tiene también un nombramiento dentro del Departamento de Estudios de Salud Poblacional de la Escuela de Medicinas.

Randy Maddox, profesor de estudios metodistas y wesleyanos, editor general del proyecto de las Obras de Wesley, y presbítero en la Conferencia Anual de Dakota, se jubila al final del año académico 2019-2020.

Brittany Wilson, profesara metodista unida de Nuevo Testamento fue avanzada al rango de profesora asociada.

Tito Madrazo se unió al equipo de liderazgo administrativo de Duke Divinity como Estratega Principal de Misión para la Casa de Estudios Hispanos. También servirá como miembro suplente para la facultad.

La Iniciativa de Predicación Hispano/Latina cumple cinco años de ofrecer instrucción teológica de alta calidad a hispano/latinos que ejercen o aspiran al ministerio. 21 estudiantes de diversas denominaciones participan en nuestro programa este año.

El Duke Endowment ha otorgado una beca a Duke Divinity de \$5.5 millones por los próximos cinco años para fomentar carácter y propósito en las diversas escuelas profesionales de Duke. El fondo de Lilly también ha dado becas a Duke Divinity para coordinar iniciativas sobre "Florecimiento en el Ministerio" y "Congregaciones florecientes" a través de los Estados Unidos.

Duke Divinity ha desarrollado un pacto con Huntingdon College y Virginia Wesleyan University para crear un proceso de admisión fluido con eventos especiales para equipar mejor a los estudiantes de estas instituciones para el ministerio en la iglesia. Como parte de nuestro esfuerzo en difundir formación teológica de alta calidad para estudiantes, pastores, y líderes laicos en el área episcopal de Nashville, DDS está desarrollando un convenio con el Turner Center en Martin Methodist College para ofrecer un entrenamiento teológico para un ministerio innovador y empresarial.

HT aprovecha los recursos para mejorar nuestro futuro competitivo en las áreas de eficacia organizacional, financiamiento, tecnología y asociaciones industriales. Logramos nuestra misión a través de la diversidad de nuestro cuerpo estudiantil, las oportunidades de crecimiento espiritual y compromiso cívico, y la perspectiva global de nuestros programas educativos.

PERFIL UNIVERSITARIO

Inscripción

La Universidad Huston-Tillotson registró 1121 estudiantes inscribiéndose en el otoño de 2019. La segmentación de nuestra población estudiantil por género revela un factor importante con respecto a la inscripción masculina. Nuestra población estudiantil general consistía en 415 varones (37%) y 706 mujeres (63%). La población de primer año y primer año consistía en 93 hombres (45,6%) y 111 mujeres (54,4%). La segmentación de nuestra población estudiantil por género revela un factor importante con respecto a la inscripción masculina. Muchas universidades reportan menos inscripciones de estudiantes varones; nuestra población de primer año, por primera vez, continúa con una población casi igual de equilibrada.

La composición racial/étnica de nuestra población estudiantil es la siguiente: Negro, no hispano – 64.6%.; Hispano – 26.3%; Blanco, no hispano – 4.7%; Extranjero no residente – 2.1%; Nativo Americano – 0.5%; Asiático/Isla del Pacífico – 0.5%; Multirracial – 0.6%; No reportado – 0.6%.

Facultad

El otoño de 2019, la Universidad empleó a 43 profesores a tiempo completo y 46 miembros de la facultad a tiempo parcial. La composición racial/étnica de la facultad es la siguiente: Hispana – 9.0%; Blanco, no hispano – 24.7%; Asiático/Isla del Pacífico – 3.4%; Negro, no hispano – 27.0%; Extranjero no residente – 4.5%; desconocido – 31,5%. Treinta y tres miembros de nuestra facultad de tiempo completo, el 76,7%, tienen un título terminal en su campo de la enseñanza.

ACTIVIDADES DE PROMOCIÓN PRESIDENCIAL E INSTITUCIONAL

El éxito de la Universidad Huston-Tillotson es el resultado de descubrimientos, visiones e ideas realizadas hace 145 años. Cuando George W. Richardson fundó Samuel Huston College en Dallas, Texas, en la Iglesia Metodista de St. Paul con seis eruditos; y Jeffrey Tillotson fundó Tillotson Collegiate y Normal Institute en Austin, Texas, sólo podían imaginar las posibilidades. Hoy en día, la Universidad Huston-Tillotson se enorgullece de varios logros, incluyendo su liderazgo en los esfuerzos de sostenibilidad.

Huston-Tillotson University celebró 145 años de proporcionar acceso a la educación superior durante la Convocación del Día del Charter celebrando la fusión de Samuel Huston College y Tillotson College en la Universidad Huston-Tillotson. El programa incluyó al ex alumno Rev. G. V. Clark, el Coro de Conciertos de HT, el Elite Combo, y el reconocimiento de estudiantes de alto rango. El Día de la Universidad Huston-Tillotson en wesley United Methodist Church fue un día de descubrimiento, reconocimiento y celebración para la Universidad Huston-Tillotson con música proporcionada por el coro de gospel HT. Los miembros de Wesley United Methodist Church invitaron a la comunidad a su Día anual de la Universidad Huston-Tillotson. El Coro de Conciertos HT se unió al coro de la Iglesia. La Universidad Huston-Tillotson fue una vez alojada en el sótano de Wesley.

El estudiante de HT puede ser el primero de su familia en asistir a la universidad, parte de una familia heredada con más de cinco generaciones de graduados, un residente local de Austin o un estudiante que ha viajado miles de millas para llegar al campus. Ese estudiante de HT probablemente fue referido por ex alumnos y tuvo varias cartas de aceptación de la universidad entre las que elegir. Las pasantías o los viajes al extranjero son solo dos de las oportunidades que ofrecen los estudiantes. Ya sea asistiendo a HT como parte del Programa de Honores de William Edward Burghardt DuBois, Freshmen First Year Experience, como atleta en uno de los programas deportivos, o reclutado como músico para el conjunto de jazz o vocalista con el coro de conciertos, la experiencia HT se destaca de manera única para el éxito. La responsabilidad, la responsabilidad, el desarrollo espiritual, el servicio-aprendizaje y las relaciones de apoyo son las señas de identidad de la experiencia HT.

Avance Institucional

El Departamento de Adelanto Institucional ha participado activamente en lo siguiente:

- Lanzamiento de un Fondo de Apoyo COVID19 para alentar a la comunidad, las partes interesadas y la base de donantes a invertir en la universidad mientras navegan por una pandemia
- Crear una campaña de apoyo tecnológico con el Fondo de Apoyo COVID19 para obtener computadoras para estudiantes nuevos y que regresan
- Contratar nuevo personal en puestos departamentales clave para llevar a cabo el trabajo del departamento

Mejoras en el campus

Durante los últimos cinco años, la Universidad Huston-Tillotson trabajó agresivamente para lograr los objetivos de su Plan Maestro y para manejar problemas de mantenimiento diferido en todo el campus. Específicamente, el plan requería garantizar la seguridad, la accesibilidad y el atractivo del campus y sus instalaciones. El campus ha completado el proyecto de esgrima para garantizar la seguridad de los profesores, el personal y los estudiantes. La nueva iluminación y señalización en todo el campus ayuda con la identificación del campus y sus estructuras interiores. Los edificios de las aulas han sido pintados, los pisos despojados y pulidos, los asientos y el escritorio reemplazados y las nuevas pizarras y el equipo de instrucción audiovisual. Los profesores han sido equipados con tecnología del siglo XXI y herramientas de instrucción para gestionar el ambiente de enseñanza y aprendizaje, tanto presencial

El espacio en el aula y las oficinas en el Branch Memorial Gymnasium han sido renovados junto con nuevos equipos de fitness e instrucción. El piso principal del gimnasio fue reemplazado, y se ha instalado un nuevo techo en el edificio. Nuevas puertas de entrada y baños junto con un nuevo cuadro de mando y acolchado protector ha dado al edificio una presencia actualizada en el

campus.

Hay dos salas residenciales en el campus de Huston-Tillotson. Ambas instalaciones tenían necesidades significativas en relación con las reparaciones. Gracias a la financiación de GHEMB, pudimos reparar y mejorar las duchas y las instalaciones de baño en ambos edificios. Estas mejoras conducen a la capacidad de las universidades para llenar ambas instalaciones por primera vez en muchos años con ocupación de los estudiantes.

La Capilla King-Seabrook ha sido equipada con un sistema audiovisual de última generación y muebles reemplazados en el escenario. Estamos buscando agresivamente apoyo para reemplazar los asientos en la capilla. Varios edificios han sido lavados de energía en el campus

otras mejoras al campus, incluyendo el sindicato de estudiantes, la oficina de admisiones y el Centro de Tecnología Institucional. Las puertas de entrada se han instalado en todas las entradas del campus. Y se ha construido un nuevo marcador que identifica el campus en la parte frontal del campus para aumentar el reconocimiento y la visibilidad.

COVID-19 Impacto

La Universidad fue y continúa gestionando el impacto de COVID-19 en sus estudiantes, profesores, personal, y operaciones generales. Hemos ordenado agresivamente y recibidos fondos de varias fuentes. Estamos particularmente agradecidos por el apoyo brindado por la Iglesia Metodista Unida, División de Educación Superior, Fondo de la Universidad Negra, por los generosos fondos de Emergencia proporcionados. Estamos muy agradecidos y ya sea que se sepa que fueron los primeros en subir al plato para apoyar a la Universidad.

Nuestra administración, profesores y personal han trabajado diligentemente para buscar oportunidades de financiación y hacer contribuciones personales para ayudar a la universidad en este período extremadamente crítico en nuestra historia. Pudimos obtener fondos para proporcionar computadoras portátiles para cada uno de nuestros estudiantes inscritos en el otoño de 2020 y todos los que indicaron que necesitaban ayuda durante la primavera de 2020. No sólo pudimos proporcionar computadoras portátiles, sino que para aquellos que tenían necesidades de conexiones Wi-Fi, pudimos ayudar. Seguimos recaudando fondos y buscando financiación para necesidades continuas, ya que seguimos operando a distancia durante el semestre académico de otoño de 2020.

Asociacion de Apple

La Oficina del Presidente y CEO ha establecido una asociación con Apple, Inc. Esta asociación había generado importantes recursos para la Universidad y es facilitada por la Dra. Jennifer Miles, como Gerente de Subvenciones y Líder de Proyectos a través del Centro de Innovación y Transformación Académica (CAIT) de la Universidad. La iniciativa consta de varios componentes que se describen a continuación.

Desarrollo Profesional

La iniciativa HT Golden Apple Teachers es un sólido programa de enriquecimiento, que tiene como objetivo mejorar la investigación, el desarrollo profesional y el rendimiento innovador de los estudiantes de pregrado con visión de futuro. Este programa está diseñado para inspirar y apoyar la innovación en la enseñanza y el aprendizaje, a través de la incorporación de recursos de Apple Teacher que afectan la tecnología de instrucción, la investigación, el servicio y la mejora en la participación de los estudiantes. Nueve miembros de la facultad fueron seleccionados para la primera cohorte de Maestros de Apple Dorado. Son el Sr. Tommy Mouton (Inglés), el Dr. Samuel Rowley (Música), la Sra. Eileen Slaton (Matemáticas), la Sra. Shawanda Stewart (Inglés), la Sra. Hoda Tavakoli (Matemáticas), la Dra. Wenxian Tan (biología). Ocho de estos maestros de Apple Dorado habían obtenido su Certificación de Profesor de Apple.

Siete profesores presentaron propuestas y fueron aceptados en la Academia de Codificación CAIT2. El objetivo es involucrar a los profesores para llevar la codificación, la creatividad y las experiencias de aprendizaje conectadas a la comunidad a la Universidad Huston-Tillotson. A través de múltiples academias de capacitación, estos educadores recibirán apoyo para guiar a un pequeño equipo de grupos de estudiantes para desarrollar un prototipo de aplicación para ayudar a resolver un problema del mundo real. Cada equipo presentará su trabajo durante el CAIT2 Coding Academy Community App Showcase programado para el 8 de abril de 2021. Los profesores también trabajarán para implementar un plan para integrar la codificación en sus programas académicos usando Todos pueden crear y Todos pueden código, y construir un plan de estudios basado en iOS Intro to App Development y el desarrollo de aplicaciones iOS con SWIFT. Los profesores que actualmente participan en esta iniciativa son el Sr. Dayron Bowers (Business), el Dr. Carlos Cervantes (Kinesiología), la Dra. Farzana Hussain (Matemáticas), la Dra. Mas Amandaino (Biología) Dra. Karen Magid (Sostenibilidad), el Dr. Samuel Rowley (Música), la Sra. Shawanda Stewart (Inglés), y la Dra. Jennifer Miles, Directora.

Tecnología e innovación

Trabajando para transformar la tecnología de vanguardia dentro y fuera del aula, Apple ha proporcionado hardware para apoyar la creación de dos nuevos laboratorios MAC. Esto incluye más de 50 iMacs, 2 Apple TV y 60 iPads. Estos laboratorios sirven a todos los estudiantes, con énfasis en dos nuevos programas académicos: The African American Male Techer Initiative (Education tion) y Green Apple Fellows Program (Environmental Justice). Además, Apple donó Apple Watches y iPhone SE para apoyar los esfuerzos de investigación de los estudiantes alojados en el Programa de Becarios de Apple Verde.

Mejora de capital

A través de la iniciativa global de Apple, MLK Day of Service, la compañía apoyó la renovación de cinco espacios en el campus: The Business Office Suite, The Center for Academic Excellence (CAE Main Office, CAE Writer's Studio, CAE Math Lab y el nuevo Green Apple Fellows Lab. El 20 de enero, más de 121 empleados voluntarios de Apple. Bajo la dirección de Give to Get, se realizaron mejoras en las instalaciones e instalaron nuevos muebles.

Becas

La Universidad Huston-Tillotson ha sido galardonada recientemente con un Certificado de Encomienda de la Agencia de Educación de Texas (TEA) por su desempeño ejemplar. Esta mención de TEA destaca específicamente el trabajo que la Universidad ha realizado relacionado con la preparación de candidatos a maestros afroamericanos. Los varones afroamericanos representan menos del 2% de todos los educadores a nivel nacional. HT tiene la meta de certificar al menos 25 hombres afroamericanos como maestros de aula para el año 2025. Esta asociación de Apple proporciona fondos para apoya el deseo de las instituciones de lograr este objetivo con la beca para cubrir la matrícula, las tasas, la habitación y la pensión para estos académicos.

El programa de Becas Apple Diversity & Inclusion se estableció para capacitar a los estudiantes de color para alcanzar sus metas profesionales en los campos de negocios, ciencias de la computación y matemáticas. Los estudiantes seleccionados de HT recibirán hasta \$5,000 en dinero para becas de Apple, Inc. para el año 2020-21academic. Estos premios se otorgan en base a la fortaleza del impacto de cada candidato en la diversidad, liderazgo demostrado, necesidad financiera. Y antecedentes académicos.

La misión del evento es ayudar a los millennials de color a reconocer que pueden ser más que consumidores de tecnología: también pueden ser creadores, innovadores y disruptores de la tecnología del mañana. El Hackathon sirvió como un conducto de información y capital social que conecta a las empresas que buscan talento con 75 fenomenales Millennials of Color.

La 14a serie anual de conferencias DuBois está organizada por personal del Programa de Honores y estudiantes. El programa trae oradores sobresalientes e inspiradores al campus de HT.

El Centro de Excelencia Académica

En el Centro para la Excelencia Académica (CAE), estamos comprometidos con el más alto nivel de expectativa y logro. Ayudamos a crear y mantener un ambiente académico claro, coherente y atractivo para los estudiantes de primer año, así como ayudar a todos los estudiantes a la graduación.

Nuestra misión es proporcionar orientación reflexiva y de calidad para que los estudiantes cultiven caminos de aprendizaje efectivos, alcancen metas académicas y sobresalgan como ciudadanos globales productivos.

La estrategia principal es utilizar un modelo de asesoramiento académico intrusivo junto con servicios envolventes, para lograr el éxito de los estudiantes. Algunos de los servicios envolventes incluyen tutoría, asesoramiento, curso de experiencia de primer año Rams Training Camp [orientación], monitoreo de asistencia y tutoría.

Curso de Experiencia de Primer Año

El curso de experiencia del primer año está diseñado para conectar a los estudiantes de primer año con la universidad. FYE ofrece una experiencia holística que ofrece una amplia agrupación de oportunidades educativas inclusivas junto con servicios de apoyo a los estudiantes. FYE es un sistema integral de apoyo educativo diseñado para ayudar a los estudiantes a hacer una transición exitosa a Huston Tillotson. El curso de FYE incluye temas que incluyen finanzas personales, tolerancia, diversidad, habilidades de estudio y desarrollo profesional.

El personal de FYE se compromete a:

Ayudamos a los profesores que asignan la escritura, ofreciendo materiales suplementarios y consulta. Y ofrecemos a los Asistentes Instructivos la oportunidad de disfrutar de los beneficios personales, intelectuales, académicos y profesionales que provienen de ser tutores.

Talleres de éxito estudiantil

El Programa de Honores W.E.B. DuBois

El Programa de Honores DuBois son becarios que experimentan una que ofrece a los estudiantes oportunidades académicas y extracurriculares excepcionales. Estas oportunidades están diseñadas para estudiantes de todas las especializaciones, que son intelectualmente curiosos, capaces y interesados en aprovechar al máximo su experiencia universitaria.

Los estudiantes que han sobresalido académicamente en la escuela secundaria, están invitados a aprender más sobre el programa. Estudiantes que desean abrazar la infinidad de oportunidades para desafiar su intelecto, desarrollar el pensamiento crítico y las habilidades de liderazgo. Se debe mantener el nivel académico para permanecer en este programa.

Summer All Star Academy

La All-Star Academy es un programa de verano de seis semanas especialmente diseñado para estudiantes de primer año que planean asistir y graduarse de la Universidad Huston Tillotson. Graduando los estudiantes de último año de secundaria que son aceptados en la Universidad, tendrán la oportunidad de comenzar su carrera académica con una experiencia puente.

En la All-Star Academy, los estudiantes participarán en cursos de inglés y matemáticas de nivel universitario alineados con actividades de tutoría y participación de socios comunitarios. Tradicionalmente, estas actividades tienen lugar en un entorno residencial en el entorno del campus.

Tutoría

Los servicios de tutoría ofrecen apoyo académico en una variedad de temas para mejorar el rendimiento académico. La tutoría está disponible de forma gratuita para todos los estudiantes de HT. Ofrecemos sesiones de tutoría individuales, de grupo pequeño o de entrega. La tutoría es proporcionada por asistentes de instrucción estudiantiles que son estudiantes de honor que han sido entrenados para proporcionar apoyo a la instrucción impartida por la facultad.

La tutoría es confidencial y no intrusiva. Se pide a los estudiantes que lleven materiales de estudio y tareas a las sesiones de estudio. El CAE tiene algunas reglas de servicios para que los estudiantes y tutores se adhieran. También se les pide a los estudiantes que completen una breve encuesta de su experiencia con la tutoría.

Se proporcionan servicios adicionales de tutoriales a través de una plataforma de tutoría en línea 24/7 llamada SmartThinking. Este programa es un servicio de tutoría profesional que ofrece tutoría en prácticamente todas las áreas disciplinarias y a múltiples niveles. Cada alumno también tiene acceso a este recurso.

Facultad de Artes y Ciencias (CAS)

La Facultad de Artes y Ciencias es la unidad académica más grande de HT. Hay 38 profesores a tiempo completo, 23 adjuntos y dos asistentes administrativos. CAS tiene 14 mayores y 17 menores.

Los miembros de la facultad de CAS son profesionales que son bien conocidos en su campo. Muchos han publicado durante este período, han asistido a seminarios/talleres y algunos han presentado. Algunos han escrito subvenciones importantes que apoyan sus programas. A los estudiantes se les proporciona una educación excelente como es evidente en las actividades centradas en el estudiante, su exposición a profesionales en conferencias y talleres, su participación en actividades de investigación y pasantías.

El objetivo es ofrecer un Programa de Ciencias de Datos Menores en HT a partir del próximo año escolar. El Dr. Ahmad también está trabajando para ofrecer un programa importante en Estadística que nos ayudaría con nuestros cursos de Ciencia de Datos, Aprendizaje Automático, Inteligencia Artificial.

El Dr. Kamalvand y el Profesor Slaton asistieron a la Cumbre Central de Texas E3 Alliance (Education Equals Economics) el 2 de noviembre de 2019 en Austin para discutir cómo preparar mejor a los estudiantes de secundaria para la experiencia colegial. El Dr. Primo recibió una Beca de Innovación de \$10,000 del Centro FinTech de la Universidad Estatal de Morgan. El premio es parte de una iniciativa competitiva para crear conciencia y compromiso con blockchain y FinTech en colegios y universidades históricamente negros (HBCU).

- La semana concluyó con la Facultad Anual/Almuerzo de Personal, dando la bienvenida a 56 docentes y miembros del personal. Este evento bien asistido es un elemento básico de RLCM que ha ocurrido durante 10 años.

Vida de residencia

La misión de la Oficina de Vida De Residencia es crear entornos educativos que haga hincapié en el aprendizaje y los desarrollos. Nuestra declaración de misión está respaldada por tres principios del departamento: servicio, educación y liderazgo. Estos principios se hacen eco de los valores fundamentales de la Universidad y el alcance de las responsabilidades funcionales dentro del departamento.

Aspectos destacados de otoño de 2019:

- Formación de Asistente Residente para 15 estudiantes sobre los temas de resolución de conflictos, Título IX, escucha activa, etc.
- La mudanza de otoño con ambos edificios a plena capacidad que conduce a la seguridad de las residencias fuera del campus en American Campus Communities.
- Residence Life Focus Groups- representantes de cada piso en ambos salones servirán como voz para los residentes, abogando
 por la comunidad de Residence Life a través de reuniones mensuales con coordinadores de residencias, líderes de la vida y
 varios representantes de departamentos de todo el campus.
- Fin de semana inaugural del rey Beard-Burrowes
- Semana de los Hombres organizada por el Beard-Burrowes Residence Hall

Desde 2016, ha habido un aumento del 37% en el número de estudiantes residenciales de otoño, como se ilustra en la siguiente tabla. Los residentes de otoño de 2019 están compuestos por 215 estudiantes que regresan y 218 nuevos estudiantes de primer año o de transferencia entrantes. Además, la retención de estudiantes de otoño a los semestres de primavera está aumentando constantemente cada año escolar.

Estudiantes Residenciales

La Universidad tiene dos salas residenciales, The Allen-Fraizer y Beard- Burrows. Por primera vez cada sala residencial estaba a su capacidad. Con más de 400 estudiantes viviendo en residencias, la institución aseguró viviendas fuera del campus para más de 50 estudiantes.

Servicios profesionales

El Departamento de Servicios profesionales proporciona asistencia integral para el desarrollo profesional de por vida para presentar a los estudiantes y ex alumnos con respecto a áreas de autoevaluación y exploración profesional, lo que conduce al éxito personal en empleos a tiempo parcial, pasantías y/o empleo a tiempo completo. Destacan:

- Implementar un plan de estudios y reuniones obligatorias para la clase superior enfocadas en la colocación laboral y la preparación para el futuro.
- Enfoque más intencional con profesores y asesores académicos en lo que se refiere a la preparación para la carrera estudiantil
- Trabajar con participantes de Career Pathways Initiatives (Sophomore Year Experience) a través de cursos de desarrollo profesional/formación que conducen a oportunidades de colocación en verano.
- Discusiones con la Universidad de St. Edward, Escuela de Consejería para desarrollar un Memorándum de Entendimiento.
- Lanzamiento de HT Spurs Week como una experiencia de exploración profesional de una semana con las propiedades de los Spurs (Austin Spurs, San Antonio Spurs y Spurs FC) con el fin de fomentar la participación de los estudiantes atletas en actividades de preparación profesional.
- Adopción de la nueva herramienta de gestión de relaciones con el cliente (CRM) llamada "Handshake" diseñada para hacer una experiencia de navegación profesional más interactiva para los estudiantes y ayudar en la automatización del proceso de solicitud de estudio de trabajo.

Centro de Asesoramiento y Consulta

El Centro de Consejería y Consulta proporciona servicios de consejería y alojamiento para apoyar a los estudiantes en su búsqueda del éxito personal académico y wholista. Destacan:

- Aumentar la concienciación y visibilidad del CCC a través de la participación en eventos, presentaciones y mayor concienciación.
- Mejorar los recursos locales disponibles para los estudiantes atendidos por la clínica.
- Servir como asesor para la organización estudiantil Y.N.A. (You Are Not Alone), ofreciendo una serie de programas y eventos autóctil.

- Proporcionar actividades de salud mental de los estudiantes antes de los exámenes finales a través de asociaciones con la Biblioteca Downs-Jones para "Craft & Chill" y con Divine Canine para llevar perros de terapia al campus.
- Se asoció con Austin Public Health para el evento "What The Health: Sex Edition".

- La Oficina de Servicios para Discapacitados (ODS, por sus que se ofrece actualmente a 23 estudiantes) tiene capacidad para 23 estudiantes para el semestre de primavera de 2020.

INSTITUTO LYDIA PATTERSON

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

El Instituto Lydia Patterson, mejor conocido como "La Lydia", es una institución que ha enfrentado y sobrevivido a numerosos desafíos a lo largo de sus 107 años de existencia. En 1913, la escuela fue establecida en parte por ministros metodistas y misioneros que huían de la revolución mexicana y respondían a su llamado al ministerio en la frontera entre Estados Unidos y México. Desde su origen, la escuela ha sufrido los efectos de dos guerras mundiales, la gran depresión, numerosas devaluaciones del peso y actualmente, la violencia y las guerras de drogas en la frontera. La Lydia ha sobrevivido y florecido en medio de todo esto.

El 3 de agosto de 2019, nuestra fe se vio desafiada cuando un extraño viajó más de 600 millas a El Paso para erradicar a los mexicanos en la peor masacre de la historia moderna. El Paso es una ciudad con una población de más del 80% de hispanos. Eso sin mencionar la cantidad de mexicanos que cruzan diariamente desde nuestra ciudad hermana, Juárez, México. En el tiroteo, perdimos al padre de tres de nuestros exalumnos.

Durante generaciones, Lydia Patterson se ha comprometido a enseñar inglés a estudiantes que no hablan inglés, predominantemente de origen hispano. Obviamente, el incidente causó pánico y estrés en El Paso y Lydia Patterson no fue la excepción. Íbamos a comenzar clases el lunes siguiente, y los padres estaban preocupados y asustados. Por primera vez en la historia de La Lydia, nos vimos obligados a contratar seguridad para patrullar nuestro campus. Fue desgarrador, pero los estudiantes y los padres estaban seguros de que las acciones malvadas de un racista demente no nos definirían. Les recordamos que el poder de la oración y la mano de Dios no nos abandonarían.

En una nota positiva, Lydia Patterson avanza con su compromiso de proporcionar una educación de calidad a sus estudiantes y brinda oportunidades que de otro modo no existirían. Mi agradecimiento a los colegios y universidades de la Iglesia Metodista Unida por continuar nuestro ministerio al proporcionar becas para que el 100% de nuestros estudiantes asistan a la universidad.

A medida que la iglesia lucha con ciertas identidades, Lydia Patterson se mantiene fiel a todos en sus principios y trayecto para cambiar vidas, independientemente del color, el origen nacional, las posiciones económicas y cualquier otra preferencia dada por Dios. Nuestro objetivo es ser el puente que una a todos los metodistas en el ministerio según lo ordenado por nuestro Padre y hacer discípulos de cada uno de sus estudiantes para la transformación del mundo.

Hacemos un llamado a todas las iglesias en su conferencia y esta jurisdicción para que se mantengan fieles al ministerio de Lydia Patterson y sigan colaborando con nosotros para hacer lo mejor de la obra de Dios. Todos los días, las vidas de hombres y mujeres jóvenes están cambiando. Quizás en una de nuestras aulas esté sentada esa persona que marcará la diferencia en nuestro mundo.

ESCUELA DE TEOLOGIA PERKINS SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Perkins celebra nuestras conexiones vitales con la Conferencia Anual de Rio Texas de la Iglesia Metodista Unida.

- Siete (7) estudiantes afiliados a la Conferencia Anual de Rio Texas están inscritos en Perkins y todos están en el programa de Master of Divinity (M.Div.)
- Tres (3) estudiantes de la Conferencia de Rio Texas recibieron ayuda financiera del subsidio PACE (Perkins Annual Conference Endowment), con un promedio general de ayuda financiera por estudiante de un total de \$7,530.

Aumento Continuo de Inscripción

La inscripción general para 2019-20 en la Escuela de Teología de Perkins refleja un aumento del 6.6% comparado con 2018-19. La Oficina de Admisiones también informó tres años consecutivos de crecimiento significativo en el total de *estudiantes nuevos* – en 2019 se refleja un aumento de más del doble comparado con 2016 – en contraste con el declive que actualmente existe en las escuelas de teología a nivel nacional.

La inscripción en Perkins para el año académico 2019-20 muestran un total de 343 estudiantes, incluidos 27 inscritos en el programa de Ph.D. Las estadísticas del otoño de 2019 reflejan lo siguiente: 63.3% de toda la población estudiantil son metodistas unidos y 37% son estudiantes de minorías étnicas. Los programas de maestría comprenden aproximadamente 46% de estudiantes varones y 54% de mujeres. El programa de Doctorado de Música (D.P.M.) incluye estudiantes del sur de Asia que toman clases en Dallas.

El programa híbrido de extensión Houston-Galveston, en su tercer año de proporcionar una combinación de clases en línea y en residencia para obtener los títulos de M.Div y M.A.M, totalizaron 94 estudiantes durante el año académico 2019-20.

Lo más destacado de 2019-20

- "Reiniciar: La Congregación como Ministro de Jóvenes" una iniciativa de la Escuela de Teología de Perkins diseñada para equipar a congregaciones enteras para servir en el ministerio con los jóvenes, llevó a cabo su primer retiro en septiembre de 2019 con representantes de las 18 diversas congregaciones seleccionadas para formar su inicial cohorte. Incluyen dos iglesias Episcopales Metodistas Africanas, tres iglesias Bautistas, dos iglesias Presbiterianas (PC USA), una iglesia Episcopal, y 10 iglesias Metodistas Unidas de diversos grupos étnicos incluyendo la Primera Iglesia Metodista de Mont Belview, Texas (Conferencia Anual de Texas) todas sin un ministro de jóvenes remunerado a tiempo completo y dentro de un radio de 300 millas de Dallas. La iniciativa codirigida por el Rev. Bart Patton, Director de Educación del Ministerio para Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos y la Dra. Priscilla Pope-Levison, Decana Asociada, Oficina de Programas Externos, está financiada por un subsidio de cinco años de \$1 millón otorgado a la Escuela de Teología de Perkins a finales de 2018 por Lilly Endowment Inc.
- El Programa de Certificación en Formación Espiritual en Perkins, lanzado en 2010, dio la bienvenida a su cohorte más grande hasta la fecha en agosto 2019. La cohorte numero vigesimosexto, con 17 miembros, incluye clerigos y laicos de todo Estados Unidos. Durante los tres años de educación contínua sin crédito, los participantes son capacitados en el arte de acompañar y guiar a otros en su trayectoria espiritual.
- En 2019, Perkins abrió su nueva Casa Bautista de Estudios (BHS) que fomenta la comunidad para los estudiantes ministeriales, la facultad y el personal que se identifican con las tradiciones de la iglesia Bautista y Libre. La Casa Bautista de Estudios es una casa espiritual, mas que física, que apoya y alienta especialmente a los estudiantes mientras realizan su formación académica y eclesiástica en un seminario ecuménico y universitario. En octubre de 2019, BHS recibió a Amanda Tyler, Directora Ejecutiva del Comité Unido Bautista para Libertad Religiosa, para dos eventos en el campus de Perkins. Y en marzo de 2020, BHS junto con el Comité Unido Bautista para Libertad Religiosa patrocinaron las conferencias Walter B. Y Kay W. Shurden sobre la Libertad Religiosa y Separación de la Iglesia y el Estado con el orador principal y líder interreligioso nacional Eboo Patel.
- Mas de 200 teólogos, artistas, músicos, académicos y miembros de la comunidad se reunieron para una conferencia de dos días del 20 al 21 de septiembre de 2019, titulada "El Arte de la Resiliencia Proclamando Vida y Esperanza en tiempos de Agobio". El evento, con entradas agotadas, fue patrocinado por el Centro de Estudios de Religión y Cristianismo Latino/a de Perkins, Ignite/Arts Dallas: Un Centro para Gente, Propósito, Lugar y se llevó a cabo en la escuela de Arte Meadows de SMU y la División de Teatro de Meadows de SMU, brindó a los participantes la oportunidad de interactuar con destacados académicos Latinx, artistas locales, y líderes religiosos y comunitarios para reflexionar profundamente sobre la raza, el género y la inmigración como cuestiones concertantes de moral y fe. Como parte del programa, la Escuela de Arte Meadows organizó una exhibición de arte y una actuación de la dramaturga latina de Nueva York Jessica Carmona de su obra original, "Elvira: La Obra de Teatro Migración". La música especial presentada durante el fin de semana fue compuesta por Ars lubilorum, un grupo de compositores Latinos incluyendo Marcell Silva Steuernagel, director del Programa de Maestría en Música Sagrada de Perkins que investiga la intersección de las tradiciones litúrgicas cristianas y la nueva música.
- "Las protestas de Hong Kong: ¿un Movimiento Mesiánico?," es un panel de discusión centrado en las protestas estudiantiles de Hong Kong de 2019, atrajo a participantes de todo SMU y el área de Dallas el 22 de octubre de 2019. Fue patrocinado por la Escuela de Teología de Perkins, el Tower Center's Sun & Star Program en Japón y Asia oriental, el Centro para la Fe y Aprendizaje de SMU y el Programa de Embrey de Derechos Humanos, el evento uno de los primeros en su tipo en los Estados Unidos en examinar las protestas contó con el Dr. Lap Yan Kung, profesor de Teología de Divinity School, de la Universidad China en Hong Kong como el orador oficial. Siguió un panel de discusión el cual examinó los problemas religiosos y seculares que subyacen a las protestas y a las implicaciones para las comunidades religiosas en Hong Kong y en todo el mundo. El moderador del panel fue el Dr. Sze-kar Wan, profesor de Nuevo Testamento en Perkins, quien organizó el evento.

- El mundo llegó a Perkins durante la Convocatoria de Otoño de 2019, celebrada el 12 de noviembre. "Mission Quest: Finding Your Place in God's World," contó con el guía turístico y activista Rick Steves, quien encabezó un evento de apertura con 1,200 participantes en el auditorio Mc Farlin de SMU. Compartieron el escenario con Steves durante el evento de dos días, que también se celebró en la Iglesia Metodista Unida de Highland Park, fueron la Rev. Dr. Samira Izadi Page, nativa de Irán que dirige un ministerio para refugiados en Dallas, y el Reverendo Dr. Célestin Musekura, originario de Ruanda y fundador del Ministerio de Reconciliación y Liderazgo Africano (ALARM). Además de escuchar a oradores de tres continentes, los participantes escucharon música de alabanza en 17 idiomas diferentes e historias humanas de esperanza y lucha de todo el mundo.
- El Servicio de Adoración de Adviento de 2019, celebrado el 5 de diciembre, marcó tres aniversarios: el 60 aniversario del programa de Maestría en Música Sagrada (MSM), el 80 aniversario de los cantores del seminario, y el 60 aniversario del servicio de Adviento. El Adviento se celebró por primera vez en la Capilla de Perkins en 1959, una tradición que continua cada año desde entonces. Tres coros invitados de las iglesias del área de Dallas, dirigidos por exalumnos del programa de M.S.M, interpretaron un himno, y los tres coros interpretaron la "Canción de Simeón" de Jane Marshall. El culto siguió el formato clásico de "Lecciones y Villancicos", y la lectura de un sermón de Martin Lutero por el Dr. Ted Campbell, Profesor de Historia de la Iglesia.
- Gracias a una asociación iniciada con Cliff College en el Reino Unido y la Iglesia Metodista de Gran Bretaña, se colocó a un interno de Perkins en Inglaterra para el año académico 2019-20. La estudiante de tercer año Cori Clevenger cuya iglesia local es la Iglesia Metodista de Liberty, Texas fue designada a un cargo de tres puntos de las iglesias metodistas en el área de Midland. Su internado es parte de un programa piloto que los organizadores esperan que continúe. Los internados dan a los estudiantes de Perkins una oportunidad para integrar sus estudios de Biblia, teología y ética con la práctica ministerial en el mundo real. Ahora, los estudiantes de Perkins tienen la oportunidad de hacer esto en otra cultura, ampliando su comprensión de diferentes expresiones cristianas de las que se encuentran en los Estados Unidos.
- Se firmaron dos nuevos memorándums de entendimiento mutuo (MOU) durante 2019-20, incluyendo el primero con una escuela internacional de teología, como parte de la iniciativa en curso para profundizar las relaciones entre Perkins y las universidades y los seminarios internacionales. Se llegó a un acuerdo formal con Project Transformation National, que patrocina un curso intensivo de verano para estudiantes universitarios que dirigen programas de campamentos de verano para niños y jóvenes en las iglesias metodistas urbanas en los Estados Unidos y que también exploran vocaciones en el ministerio y servicio. Además, el acuerdo con La Escuela de Teología Bishop Han (BHTS) en Mindanao, Filipinas, fomentará la colaboración y las actividades interculturales entre la facultad de teología y los estudiantes de las dos instituciones. Los memorándums de común acuerdo previos se han formalizado con instituciones metodistas históricamente unidas, como Centenary College en Shreveport, Louisiana; Southwestern University en Georgetown, Texas; McMurry University en Abilene, Texas; Hendrix College en Conway, Arkansas; Huston-Tillotson University en Austin, Texas; Philander Smith College en Sherman, Texas.
- El Almuerzo de el programa de becas de Perkins de la familia Bolin en 2020 tuvo lugar el miércoles 5 de febrero de 2020, con el columnista y destacado autor del New York Times David Brooks como el orador oficial. El almuerzo, inaugurado en el 2010, sirve como un gran evento para recaudar fondos para las becas estudiantiles. El almuerzo de este año, que destacó a los becarios de Perkins de 2019-20, obtuvo aproximadamente \$75,000 para nuevas becas.
- Una conferencia de dos días, "In the Face of Barbarism:" Dietrich Bonhoeffer on Culture, Humanity and the Importance of Ordinary Life," se llevó a cabo los días 13 y 14 de febrero, 2020, e incluyó a los destacados conferencistas Victoria Barnett, Michael DeJonge, y Natalie Carnes. Patrocinado por la fundación Robinson de Perkins, la cual fomenta el trabajo de la intersección entre la teología y las artes, el evento se concentró en la importancia de la teología y la ética de Bonhoeffer en la vida cotidiana. La conferencia concluyó con una obra individual presentada basada en el legado de Dietrich y fue adaptada y presentada por Al Staggs.
- El Dr. Theodore Walker, Profesor Asociado de Ética y Sociedad en Perkins, descubrió un manuscrito perdido escrito hace 77 años por Ernest E. Just, con un mensaje importante para los lectores modernos. El libro inédito presenta una teoría arraigada en la Biología Celular del origen y la evolución del comportamiento ético. El Dr. Walker y su equipo están ahora en el proceso de editar el manuscrito y para enviarlo para su publicación.
- La Dra. Evelyn Parker, profesora de Teología Practica de la cátedra Centennial Susanna Wesley, fue a Sudáfrica como becaria de la U. S Fulbright Scholar de 2019-2020. Con base en el centro Desmond Tutu para la Religión y la Justicia Social y el Departamento de Teología y Religión de la Universidad de Western Cape en la ciudad del Cabo, allí ella trabajó en un proyecto titulado "Role of Religious Leaders in Preventing and Intervening in Teen Dating Violence in South Africa."
- La Rev. Dr. Rebekah Miles, Profesora de Ética y Teología Practica en Perkins, fue nombrada una de tres galardonadas de la medalla Odyssey otorgada por la Universidad Hendrix en Conway, Arkansas. Miles, graduada de Hendrix en 1982, fue honrada por su investigación. Tuvo lugar una recepción y entrega de medalla con el presidente de Hendrix William M. Tsutsui el día 14 de noviembre en el Gran Salón del Centro Presidencial Clinton en Little Rock.
- El Dr. Ángel J. Gallardo se unió a la facultad y al personal de Perkins como Director Asociado del Programa de Internos en el verano de 2019. El Dr. Gallardo, quien obtuvo un Doctorado en Filosofía en Estudios Religiosos del programa de Graduados de SMU en 2018, anteriormente se desempeñó como profesor asistente en Perkins y enseñó en el Curso de Estudios Regional. También tiene puestos de liderazgo en varias organizaciones profesionales y Latinos/as, y ha trabajado con líderes religiosos, activistas, y educadores en el ámbito local e internacional, incluyendo un internado en Brasil.
- La Rev. Katherine Glaze Lyle, de Dallas fue nombrada beneficiaria del premio de 2019 para Exalumnos Distinguidos que es otorgado por el Concilio de Exalumnos de la Escuela de Teología de Perkins. Ella fue condecorada por su eficacia e integridad en

- el servicio a la iglesia, su contínuo apoyo para los objetivos de Perkins y la Universidad de SMU, por su servicio excepcional a la comunidad y su carácter ejemplar. Celebrado durante un banquete que se llevo a cabo en Perkins el día 12 de noviembre.
- El programa de extensión de Houston-Galveston celebrará su 25 aniversario en 2020. El programa original que se inició en el otoño de 1995 permitió a los estudiantes a tomar porciones iniciales de su trabajo hacia los programas de Perkins en Houston-Galveston y completar su trabajo en el campus de Dallas. Líderes destacados (es sus roles en ese tiempo) incluyeron el decano de Perkins Robin Lovin, el Dr. James Moore, pastor de St. Luke's United Methodist Church en Houston y el Dr. Charles Millikan, pastor de Moody Memorial United Methodist Church en Galveston, además de otros líderes de la Conferencia Anual de Texas. A lo largo de los años, muchos estudiantes sobresalientes, incluyendo a la Obispo Cynthia Fierro Harvey, han estudiado en Perkins a través del Programa de Extensión Houston-Galveston también conocido como "Perkins South".

Los aspectos más destacados enumerados anteriormente reflejan el compromiso de la facultad de Perkins, el personal y los estudiantes de Perkins durante el año académico 2019-20.

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Desde su fundación en 1911, fundada por la Iglesia Metodista Episcopal de Sur, la Universidad Metodista del Sur ha servido como una institución no sectaria de educación superior. Nuestra misión es expander el conocimiento a través de la investigación y la docencia, y servir como un poderoso agente de cambio para el crecimiento y el desarrollo de Dallas y la región mas amplia del Norte de Texas. Con la representación contínua de la Iglesia Metodista Unida, dando la bienvenida a estudiantes de todas las religiones, la Universidad está alcanzando un nivel más alto de desempeño y reconocimiento global en nuestro segundo siglo formando a los agentes de cambio del mundo— para el día de hoy y el futuro.

SMU en la actualidad

Los Estudiantes, La Facultad y El Personal

La matrícula de otoño de 2019 ascendió a 11,824, incluyendo 6,710 estudiantes de licenciatura y 5,114 estudiantes de posgrado. Los estudiantes de minorías étnicas constituyeron el 29 por ciento de la matrícula total. Un total de 1,417 estudiantes internacionales inscritos (que es aproximadamente el 12 por ciento del total de los estudiantes matriculados) representando a 84 países. Nuestra impresionante clase de 2023 fue seleccionada de un grupo de más de 15,000 solicitantes. El puntaje promedio de ACT de este cohorte es de 30.8, y el puntaje promedio de SAT es 1377 – ambos muestran un incremento comparado al pasado – lo que lo convierte en el más calificado académicamente y diverso en la historia de SMU.

Rankings

La reputación de la Universidad es fuerte y en creciente. SMU ocupa el puesto número 64 entre las universidades nacionales según el U.S. News & World Report. Nos complace que los presidentes, decanos y directores de admisiones de las universidades de la nación estén comenzando a reconocer nuestros baluartes, y la evidencia de esto es que tenemos dos años consecutivos de puntajes crecientes en la opinión de los expertos según las clasificaciones de U.S. News.

- El M.B.A. de la Escuela de Negocios Cox de SMU ocupa el puesto número 43 según las Mejores Escuelas de Negocios 2020 de U.S. News & World Report's en comparación con el puesto 48 del ranking del año anterior; El M.B.A Executivo de la Escuela de Negocios Cox de SMU está en el puesto número 23 de la nación.
- La Escuela de Leyes Dedman fue clasificada número 52 a nivel nacional según el reporte de U.S. News & World Report.
- El Centro para el Ranking Mundial de Universidades 2019 colocó a SMU en el número 315 de 20,000 universidades en todo el mundo, en el número 315 a nivel nacional y el número 27 para el empleo de exalumnos, colocando a la institución en el 1.6% superior del mundo. Las Universidades son clasificadas por su calidad de educación, empleo de exalumnos, calidad de la facultad y el desempeño de la investigación.
- SMU ocupó el puesto número 16 en una lista de Forbes de los mejores colegios y universidades del Sur.
- Las clasificaciones de College Factual (publicadas por USA Today), se enfocan altamente en los resultados, incluyendo el índice de graduación, los salarios altos de los graduados y una baja tasa de interés en los prestamos estudiantiles, clasificaron a SMU como el número 3 entre las mejores Universidades de Texas; el número 92 entre las mejores universidades nacionales; y el número 1 en su lista de "Graduados de música mejor pagados" en 2019.
- The Princeton Review clasifica a SMU Guildhall el número 2 como el mejor programa de diseño de juegos para graduados.

Los Fondos

En el año fiscal 2019, SMU recibió \$31.8 millones en fondos externos para la investigación realizada en los Estados Unidos y en todo el mundo, lo que representa un aumento de \$5.2 millones con respecto al año anterior. Las agencias que proveen estos fondos en la actualidad incluyen la National Science Foundation, el Departamento de Educación de los EE. UU., El Departamento de Defensa de los EE. UU., y la Fundación Toyota. Con respecto a la recaudación de fondos privados, SMU terminó el año fiscal 2019, gracias a la

generosidad de toda nuestra familia de donantes que donaron mas de \$118 millones, por lo que fue un año record de donativos. Esa generosidad incluye superar nuestra meta de *Pony Power* por segunda ocasión de \$2 millones con \$52 millones en donativos recibidos para financiar nuestras necesidades mas apremiantes.

Aspectos Destacados de 2019

Donativos y Subsidios Significativos

Se instituye la Nueva Escuela de Graduados con un donativo de \$100 millones

En el año de 2019 SMU celebró el donativo mas grande de su historia – una inversión sin precedentes de \$100 millones de la Fundación Moody con el fin de crear la octava escuela en SMU: Moody School of Graduate and Advanced Studies. Esta nueva escuela apoya los programas de posgrado de la Universidad en educación, ingeniería, las artes, humanidades, ciencias y ciencias sociales, así como la investigacion de la facultad y los programas interdisciplinarios en toda la Universidad. Permitirá a la Universidad de SMU graduar un mayor número de estudiantes de doctorado y fortalecer las colaboraciones con otras universidades, corporativos prominentes, y otras instituciones que realizan proyectos de investigación de alto impacto.

Un impacto visionario con el donativo de \$50 millones de la Familia Miller

Carolyn y David Miller '72, '73 hicieron el donativo individual mas grande hecho por un exalumno y su familia en los 108 años de historia de SMU. El donativo de \$50 millones respaldará el plan estratégico de la Escuela de Negocios Cox para actualizar su plan de estudios; ofrecer más y más amplias becas para atraer a los mejores estudiantes de negocios del mundo; colaborar con todo el campus de la universidad SMU a crear nuevos programas interdisciplinarios y mejorar las instalaciones de la escuela. También aspira a que la escuela extienda el alcance comunitario para desarrollar asociaciones corporativas y expander la inclusividad.

El Inicio de la Renovación del Centro de Artes Owen inspira un nuevo desafío y donativos adicionales

El otoño pasado, cuando la Escuela de Artes Meadows celebró el 50 aniversario de su nombramiento, iniciamos la renovación del Centro de Artes Owen, con una iniciativa de \$34 millones para mejorar los espacios académicos en el ala norte para las artes visuales, la historia del arte y la computación creativa, y crear una entrada accesible y acogedora al edificio. Durante la celebración, anunciamos un nuevo regalo de desafío de \$1.8 millones de la filántropa y ex-padre de familia de la escuela de Meadows, G. Marlyne Sexton, originaria de Indianápolis. Este ultimo donativo eleva su compromiso total con OAC a \$5 millones y crea un incentivo para que otros se unan y ayuden a la Escuela Meadows a alcanzar los \$4 millones restantes necesarios para la renovación de el centro de artes.

Un donativo de \$5 millones dado por los patrocinadores y coleccionistas del arte de Dallas Nancy C. and Richard R. Rogers extiende su contínuo apoyo de muchos años a los artistas al establecer un centro vibrante para las artes visuales en SMU. El nuevo Centro de Artes Visuales Nancy C. y Richard R. Rogers localizado en el Centro de Artes Owen proporcionará un espacio físico que expande las oportunidades académicas y artísticas para que los estudiantes y la facultad los impulsen a la vanguardia de sus campos. Todo esto es parte de una iniciativa de \$34 millones para modernizar los 250,000 pies cuadrados del ala norte del edificio. Todos los donativos para el proyecto están respaldados por un subsidio de la Fundación de Meadows.

Un Cambio de Juego Inicia en el Bulevar

El año pasado, celebramos la dedicación del Centro de Rendimiento Deportivo Interior, destacando el Armstrong Fieldhouse, que marcó una nueva era en la preparación y entrenamiento del departamento atlético para los Mustangs de SMU. Las instalaciones multiuso, tecnológicamente equipadas, también ofrecen una expansión significativa de posibilidades para la participación en el campus y la comunidad. Muchos donativos generosos hicieron posible el Centro de Rendimiento Deportivo. Además del donativo de Liz Armstrong '82 y Bill Armstrong '82, otros que contribuyeron con más de \$1 millón son Gary T. Crum '69 y Sylvie P. Crum; Paul B. Loyd, Jr. '68 y Penny R. Loyd; David B. Miller '72, '73 y Carolyn L. Miller y la Fundación de la Familia David B. Miller; y Garry A. Weber '58. También hubo 17 donantes de \$100,000 o más, con ocho donaciones de \$1 millón cada uno y nueve promesas de seis cifras.

Un Nuevo Hogar para los Exploradores Digitales

SMU tomó un gran paso adelante en el cambio acelerado de la frontera digital con una ceremonia de inauguración de el Gerald J. Ford Hall for Research and Innovation localizado en la esquina de McFarlin Boulevard y Airline Road. El administrador de SMU Gerald J. Ford '66, '69, su esposa, Kelli O. Ford, y la Fundación de la Familia Gerald J. Ford hicieron un donativo de \$15 millones que ayudará a financiar la construcción del edificio. El nuevo centro de investigacion interdisciplinaria de 50,000 pies cuadrados servirá como sede del Centro de Virtualización AT&T de SMU, el Instituto Interdisciplinario de la Escuela de Dedman, la informática de alto rendimiento y la ciencia de datos, el nuevo laboratorio de Visualización y el Guildhall, el Centro electrónico de Hart, el programa digital de diseño de juegos mejor clasificado.

Alta Tecnología, Alto Impacto de Bobby B. Lyle

El empresario, líder de la industria y educador de Dallas, Bobby B. Lyle '67, se basó en la generosidad previsora que nombró a la Escuela de Ingeniería Lyle hace 11 años al designar \$10 millones para impulsar una nueva visión estratégica para la escuela. El modelo, centrado en el futuro, combinará innovación, agilidad y respuestas rápidas a los cambios en las capacidades tecnológicas con un apoyo institucional duradero. Su inversión apoyara el Fondo Futuro de la escuela al establecer donativos para Acelerar la Investigación Emergente y Acelerar las Innovaciones Comerciales de Alta Tecnología. El fondo también apoyará dos expedientes estratégicos adicionales: Transforming the Engineering Education Experience y Transformative Technology for Social Good.

Elizabeth Loboa nombrada Rectora

Elizabeth Loboa, nombrada rectora y vicepresidenta de asuntos académicos de SMU en diciembre, se unirá a la Universidad el día 6 de julio del 2020. Como directora académica de SMU, ella será responsable de la calidad general de la educación, de las becas y la investigación y todos los aspectos de la vida académica, abarcando desde las admisiones y el desarrollo de la facultad hasta la supervisión de las ocho escuelas de SMU, el sistema de la biblioteca, y los programas internacionales. Loboa, una ingeniera biomédica, es actualmente vice rectora de asociaciones estratégicas y decana y catedrática de la Escuela de Ingeniería Ketchum de la Universidad de Missouri. Loboa traerá a SMU un historial académico distinguido y una amplia experiencia de liderazgo universitario.

Los decanos académicos de SMU que dirigen la Escuela de Ingeniería Lyle, la Facultad de Derecho Dedman y la Facultad de Ciencias y Humanidades Dedman han sido reelegidos para ocupar sus cargos por cinco años adicionales: Marc Christensen, decano de la Escuela Lyle y catedrático de Innovación en Ingeniería de la escuela de Lyle, quien ha servido como decano desde el año 2013; Jennifer Collins, la juez James Noel decana y catedrática de derecho en la Escuela de Dedman, quien se desempeñó como decana desde el año 2014: y Thomas DiPiero, decano de el Colegio de Dedman y catedrático de los departamentos de Ingles y Lenguas y Literaturas Mundiales, quien ha servido como decano desde el año de 2014.

El Centro de Artes Meadows celebra su 50 Aniversario

La Escuela de Meadows inició una celebración de un año del 50 aniversario de su nombramiento, montando tres estrenos de coreógrafos reconocidos internacionalmente en su vigésimo sexto concierto anual de beneficencia, "Meadows at the Winspear." El concierto conto con la aclamada Orquesta Sinfónica de Meadows, bajo la dirección del director Paul Phillips, y los estudiantes del grupo de Danza de Meadows. Tambien honró al líder comunitario La Fundación Meadows, que ha apoyado a la universidad de SMU y a la ciudad de Dallas por más de cinco décadas. Fue en el año de 1969 que la Escuela de Artes de SMU pasó a llamarse Meadows School of the Arts en honor de Algur H. Meadows.

Regalo amplio el Centro de Derecho, Ciencias e Innovación Tsai de Dedman

El centro Tsai de Derecho, Ciencia e Innovación, iniciado en el año de 2015 en la Escuela de Leyes Dedman, recibió un regalo adicional de \$2 millones para ampliar su perfil como líder en investigación multidisciplinaria y debate académico en torno a las nuevas tecnologías. El centro académico reúne a expertos de las comunidades legal, científica y empresarial para explorar los complejos desafíos presentados por el variable ecosistema de innovación. Los proyectos actuales de investigacion apoyados por el Centro Tsai incluyen estudios de la tecnología de impresión digital y las implicaciones fiscales de la inteligencia artificial, así como una herramienta digital para seguir el curso de la acción judicial relacionados con las listas de vigilancia del gobierno. El Centro Tsai también ha financiado nuevos cursos, incluyendo uno en el cual los estudiantes de derecho crean aplicaciones legales basadas en la red para organizaciones de ayuda legal de Texas.

El subsidio NSF de \$1.5 Millones ayuda a financiar Minecraft

La Escuela de Lyle de SMU, Guildhall y la Escuela de Educación y Desarrollo Humano Simmons utilizarán un subsidio \$1,521,615 de la National Science Foundation para investigar la enseñanza de las ciencias de la computación y el pensamiento computacional a través del popular videojuego Minecraft. La investigación abarcara los campos de diseño de juegos, interacción humano-computadora, aprendizaje mecánico, diseño curricular y evaluación educativa integrando el plan de estudios STEM+C (computación) directamente en Minecraft. El juego y la infraestructura producidos a través de la investigación servirán como un recurso informático vital para los educadores de secundaria y preparatoria. La beca fue otorgada a Corey Clark, subdirector de investigacion en SMU Guildhall y profesor asistente de Ciencias Computacionales en la Escuela Lyle; Eric Larson, profesor asociado en Ciencias de la Computación en la Escuela Lyle; y Leanne Ketterlin Geller, profesora y catedra en Educación subsidiada por Texas Instruments en la Escuela de Simmons.

Profesora Reúne a las personas para Conversar sobre Temas Difíciles

Jill DeTemple, profesora asociada de estudios religiosos en Dedman College, ha desarrollado una herramienta de discusión – diálogo estructurado reflexivo – que esta utilizando en su propio salón de clases y compartiendo con profesores de SMU y de la toda la nación. La idea es tomar temas que separan a la gente – derecho a portar armas, aborto, pena de muerte, y la existencia de Dios – y replantear la conversación en torno a experiencias personales. En esencia, estas conversaciones, están centradas en la curiosidad de las vidas de otros y sus valores.

Científicos de SMU Identifican un Nuevo Dinosaurio en Texas

La becaria postdoctoral Kate Andrzejewski, junto con los paleontólogos de la Universidad Dale Winkler y Louis Jacobs, han identificado *Convolosaurus marri* de fósiles recolectados en el Lago de Proctor, al suroeste de Fort Worth. Los restos de varios dinosaurios se encontraron por primera vez en el lago del Condado de Comanche en 1985, y la mayoría de los fósiles han estado almacenados por años en el Museo de Paleontología Shuler en SMU. Pero no fue hasta que Andrzejewski, Winkler y Jacobs examinaron los fósiles mas recientemente que se identificó el nuevo dinosaurio. *Convolosaurus marri* está en exhibición en el Museo de Naturaleza y Ciencia Perot en la galería de T. Boone Pickens Life Then and Now como "Proctor Lake Ornithopod." El dinosaurio recientemente identificado fue nombrado en honor a Ray H. Marr '51, un ex alumno de SMU que es presidente de Marr Oil & Gas LTD y un firme defensor de los estudiantes de SMU.

Estudio de SMU Encuentra Posible Nueva Forma de Curar el Virus "primo" del HIV Un estudio dirigido por SMU sugiere que la oleandrina – un medicamento derivado de la planta de Nerium oleander – podría evitar que el virus HTLV-1 se propague al enfocarse en una etapa del proceso de reproducción que actualmente no es el enfoque de los medicamentos existentes. Eso es significativo porque actualmente no existe una cura o tratamiento para el virus – un "primo" del HIV menos conocido que afecta a entre 10 y 15 millones de personas en todo el mundo. "Los resultados de nuestra investigación sugieren que la oleandrina podría limitar la transmisión y propagación del HTLV-1 al enfocarse en una etapa única en el ciclo de la vida retroviral", dijo Robert Harrod, profesor asociado y director de estudios de posgrado en el Departamento de Ciencias Biológicas de SMU. Harrod es coautor del estudio publicado en el *Journal of Antivirals & Antiretrovirals*.

La Estación de DART renombrada La Estación de SMU/Mockingbird

La Estación de Mockingbird de Dallas Área Rapid Transit's (DART) fue renombrada la Estación SMU/Mockingbird después de que el Consejo de DART aprobó un acuerdo de derechos de nombres con SMU, lo que facilita a los visitantes a encontrar el campus y consolidando el papel de la estación como puerta de entrada a la Universidad de SMU. Inaugurada en 1997, la Estación Mockingbird se convirtió rápidamente en un importante recurso de transporte para estudiantes, profesores, personal y visitantes de SMU.

El servicio de transporte Mustang Express conecta la estación DART con el campus Universitario en una poca distancia.

Estamos entusiasmados con el impacto que nuestra Universidad y sus programas continúan teniendo en el mundo que nos rodea, y estamos agradecidos de continuar nuestro trabajo a través de la Escuela de Teología Perkins en la educación y capacitación de todas las ramas de la Tradición Wesleyana. INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Southwestern University celebró una serie de logros notables el año pasado. Por tercer año consecutivo, un número récord de estudiantes solicitó la admisión, y en agosto, recibimos a 444 estudiantes de primer año y 56 estudiantes transferidos, la segunda clase más grande en la historia de nuestra institución. Implementamos la Iniciativa de Experiencia Residencial, en la cual el personal universitario brinda recursos directamente a los estudiantes, elevando así el clima intelectual de las residencias. Y la universidad celebró la gran inauguración del nuevo Centro de Ciencias Fondren-Jones, nuestro compromiso en piedra con la colaboración interdisciplinaria, el aprendizaje y la investigación. Con un compromiso sin precedentes con el aprendizaje basado en la investigación y el descubrimiento, Southwestern continúa creando una programación distintiva que se centra en la vida de la mente.

Nuestros galardones de 2019 incluyen a Forbes clasificando a Southwestern como la universidad privada de ciencias y artes liberales sin fines de lucro número 1 en Texas y la número 1 en esa categoría en el Grateful Graduates Index (número 86 a nivel nacional). U.S.News and World Report y Washington Monthly clasifican a Southwestern como la mejor universidad nacional de artes liberales de Texas. El Centro para el Desarrollo Profesional y Profesional de la Universidad ocupa el puesto número 6 en la nación y el número 1 en Texas, según The Princeton Review, que también clasificó a Southwestern en tercer lugar en la nación y primero en Texas entre sus Escuelas de Impacto por segundo año consecutivo.

En lo académico, por 19º año consecutivo, el King Creativity Fund apoyó proyectos estudiantiles significativos, innovadores y visionarios en todas las disciplinas. Treinta y un estudiantes participaron en 13 proyectos diferentes de investigación SCOPE como parte de un programa colaborativo de verano para estudiantes y profesores. Southwestern agregó una nueva especialización, economía financiera, y una nueva menor, estudios modernos tempranos, en el otoño de 2019. Estas adiciones elevan el número total de especializaciones y menores a 37 y 41, respectivamente.

Entre nuestros académicos y maestros reconocidos internacionalmente, tres profesores y un entrenador publicaron libros. La Dra. Erika Berroth (alemana) fue honrada con el Premio al Mejor Educador Alemán, la forma de reconocimiento más prestigiosa de su campo. La Dra. Lois Ferrari (música) recibió el segundo lugar para el Premio Americano 2019 en orquesta comunitaria que dirige su trabajo con la Orquesta Cívica de Austin. La Dra. Barbara Anthony (informática) recibió una subvención de \$ 5,000 del Centro para el Desarrollo del Currículo de Computación Paralela y Distribuida, apoyado por la Fundación Nacional de Ciencias y Recursos Educativos. Jethro Hernández Berrones (historia) fue uno de los 11% de los solicitantes que recibió un prestigioso estipendio de verano de National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). Katherine Grooms recibió una beca competitiva de dos años del Instituto Nacional de Salud (NIH) para su investigación titulada "Agua potable y salud infantil: evidencia de niveles de contaminantes en California".

Entre los logros de los estudiantes, 31 estudiantes fueron incluidos en el capítulo de Southwestern de la sociedad de honor Phi Beta Kappa. Caroline Haywood '18, Camille Martin '19, Teresa Cropper '20 y Laura Rativa '20 desarrollaron e implementaron programas de votación que ayudaron a aumentar la tasa de votación de Southwestern en un 33% desde 2014. Madeline Carrola '19 ganó el Mid-Concurso de papel de pregrado de la South Sociological Association por su proyecto final, "Performing the Handmaid's Tale: The Use of Dystopian Literature at Political Protests". Cinco estudiantes de estudios ambientales y feministas, junto con el Dr. Joshua Long (estudios ambientales), publicaron un artículo en la Revista de Educación, Ciudadanía y Justicia Social titulada "Sostenibilidad interseccional y activismo estudiantil: un marco para lograr la sostenibilidad social en los campus universitarios". Ocho estudiantes de biología y ecología molecular presentaron su investigación en la reunión anual de la Academia de Ciencias de Texas. La especialidad en informática Sara Boyd '20 fue seleccionado como finalista para el Premio al Investigador Destacado de Pregrado de la Asociación de Investigación de Computación (CRA) para 2020.

En atletismo, Southwestern terminó en segundo lugar por el Trofeo del Presidente de SCAC y obtuvo 112 honores de todas las conferencias, incluidas 46 selecciones de primer equipo, 30 selecciones de segundo equipo, 8 selecciones de tercer equipo y 28 selecciones de menciones honoríficas. Siete equipos diferentes avanzaron en el Torneo SCAC al campeonato, dos equipos ganaron Campeonatos SCAC y un equipo ganó el título de la temporada regular de SCAC. Dos equipos y un jugador ganaron puestos en el Torneo NCAA. Los entrenadores de Southwestern obtuvieron cuatro premios de Entrenador del Año de SCAC, y siete Piratas obtuvieron premios de Jugador del Año de SCAC. En 2018-2019, Southwestern fue el hogar de cuatro selecciones All-Americans y 12 All-Region. Cinco programas ingresaron a la clasificación nacional, con un equipo entrando en el top 10.

En 2019, Southwestern recibió a los reconocidos estrategas políticos Donna Brazile y Mary Matalin como oradores invitados en la conferencia bienal Roy y Margaret Shilling. El Simposio bienal Brown de la Universidad contó con expertos en el Antropoceno, incluido Andrew Revkin, asesor estratégico para periodismo ambiental y científico de la National Geographic Society; Carol Adams, autora de La política sexual de la carne; Dr. Robert Bullard, el padre de la justicia ambiental; y el Dr. Christopher Carter, profesor de teología especializado en ética ambiental. El vigésimo Simposio anual de Investigación y Obras Creativas tuvo lugar el 10 de abril de 2019 y contó con más de 230 presentadores estudiantiles asesorados por 43 profesores y personal de toda la Universidad. Southwestern celebró su 175 ° Convocación de Inicio en mayo de 2019, con el Dr. Tim Boone, profesor y presidente del Departamento de Urología y codirector del Instituto de Medicina Académica del Hospital Metodista de Houston, como el orador principal. Durante el otoño de 2019, el Simposio de reflexión del presidente sobre vida, aprendizaje y liderazgo acogió a ocho invitados de diversos campos.

En conclusiór

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Saint Paul School of Theology, un seminario de la United Methodist Church, está comprometida con la formación de personas para un ministerio innovador y creativo. Somos una institución con recintos en Kansas y Oklahoma. Durante el año académico 2019-2020, la inscripción en el seminario en programas de maestría y doctorado aumentó un 11%.

Saint Paul School of Theology comenzó el año académico 2019-2020 con la incorporación del Dr. Casey Sigmon en su nueva función como Profesor Asistente de Predicación y Culto, y Director de Educación Contextual. El Dr. Sigmon también ha hecho cambios innovadores en el servicio de adoración semanal como Coordinador de Capilla. Saint Paul también dio la bienvenida a la Dra. Anne Walker como la nueva Directora Ejecutiva del Campus de Oklahoma.

Con la adición de la Dra. Walker a Saint Paul llegó un nuevo webinario que titulado "Explorar el Llamado: Una Guía para Ayudar a Otros a Responder al Llamado". Ofrecido gratuitamente, el webinar proporciona un recurso para todo aquel que le interese crear una cultura de llamado en su congregación; incluyendo el encuentro uno a uno con las congregaciones que buscan llegar a su comunidad. La Dra. Walker también puso en marcha el Comité Asesor de Vision OK con el propósito de obtener apoyo y asistencia para el desarrollo del Recinto de Oklahoma. Similarmente nueva este año, la Dra. Melissa Pearce junto con la Dra. Walker organizaron Sesiones de Escucha para aprender más sobre los desafíos que enfrentan los líderes pastorales y soñar juntos sobre cómo la educación teológica podría satisfacer las demandas cambiantes de su ministerio.

Este mes de marzo, Saint Paul conmemoró su 60 aniversario con una celebración en la que intervino el ex Presidente Dr. Lovett H. Weems, Jr. honrando más de 60 años de educación teológica. Estudiantes, antiguos alumnos, profesores y toda la comunidad de Saint Paul se reunieron para cenar, recordar y mirar hacia el futuro. Durante la celebración, la Rev. Dra. Lois V. Glory-Neal fue reconocida como la Ganadora Distinguida del Premio de Posgrado 2020. En 1989, la Rev. Dra. Glory-Neal de la Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference se convirtió en la primera mujer indígena americana en ser ordenada mayor. Se convirtió en la primera superintendente de distrito de Native American en 1992. Saint Paul también entregó a la Sra. Sally Firestone el premio Board Lifetime Achievement por sus años de servicio.

El personal y la facultad de Saint Paul continúan contribuyendo a la academia, la iglesia y la sociedad. La Dra. Anne Walker creó junto con la co-escritora Dori Grinenko Baker, *Tru Colors*, una guía para ayudar a adultos jóvenes a explorar el ministerio como una carrera. *Tru Colors*, del Ministerio de Discipulado, fue publicado en marzo de 2020. El Dr. Casey Sigmon escribió el sermón "El Fruto del Autocontrol" en el libro publicado, *Predicando Para Enseñar: Inspire a la Gente a Pensar y Actuar*. Adicionalmente, como parte de los Comentarios del Leccionario 2019 en el sitio web workingpreacher.org, el Dr. Sigmon y el Dr. Israel Kamudzandu aportaron comentarios. Además, el Dr. Sigmon publicó recientemente "Posibilidades y Desafíos Homilícos en Colosenses" en *The Review & Expositor Journal* a partir de noviembre de 2019.

En septiembre de 2019, la Junta de Síndicos de Saint Paul agregó los siguientes cuatro nuevos miembros: la ex alumna Rev. Jennifer Ahrens-Sims de St. Stephen's UMC, la Sra. Dana Aldridge de SS&C Technologies, la Sra. Linda Shipman de Dairy Famers of America Inc., y ex alumno Rev. David Wiggs de Boston Avenue UMC. Además, a principios de año la facultad emérita Rev. Dr. Tex Sample se convirtió en Presidente de la Junta. Saint Paul es financieramente sólido y funciona con un presupuesto equilibrado. Los cambios realizados en los últimos años han establecido una base financiera sólida para años de sostenibilidad. Con la ayuda de la Junta, el

seminario continúa centrándose en su misión y trabaja para mejorar y evaluar continuamente los planes estratégicos existentes para guiarnos hacia el futuro.

Saint Paul celebró varios eventos y foros este año comenzando con la celebración de un Miércoles de Despertar de la Cámara de Comercio de Overland Park donde los miembros comerciales y líderes comunitarios de Overland Park comenzaron su día en el Recinto de Kansas con café, y aprendiendo más sobre la misión del seminario. En noviembre, Saint Paul fue el anfitrion del Desayuno de Oracion Democratica del Metro Organization for Racial and Economic Equity (MORE²). MORE² y Church of the Resurrection están asociándose con Saint Paul en el recientemente lanzado enfoque del Doctor del Ministerio, "Liderazgo Espiritual en Tiempos Inestables." A lo largo del año, los estudiantes de ambos recintos participaron en educativos con discusiones sobre una miríada de temas como "Sostener el Liderazgo Pastoral a Través del Bienestar Personal", "Día de Recuerdo Transgénero", y "El Agraennem y su Crecimiento Espiritual." Saint Paul fue bendecido por tener muchos ex alumnos que regresaron para dirigir la adoración en los servicios semanales de la capilla. El Rev. Shannon Hancock, ex alumno y Director de Admisiones, trajo el mensaje en el Recinto de Kansas durante la Celebración de Adoración MLK Jr mientras el Rev. Bryan Lampkins predicó en el Recinto de Oklahoma. El pasado enero, Saint Paul se enorgulleció de acoger la Reunión de Educadores Teológicos Metodistas Unidos en el Recinto de Kansas. El tema de este año fue "Vicisitud: Navegando el Llamado y Misión como Educadores Contextuales en el 2020. En abril, la Sociedad Evangélica organizó una conferencia con la Dra. Kimberly Alexander, autora de *Pentecostal Healing: Models of Theology and Practice y coautor de Women in Leadership: A Pentecostal Perspective and What Women Want: Pentecostal Women Ministers Speak for Themselves*

Honrando el largo compromiso de Saint Paul con el aprendizaje de la praxis y el ministerio, parte del plan de estudios 2019-2020 incluyó prácticas que son seminarios de estilo taller que enseñan habilidades ministeriales. Para la Semana FOCUS Week de primavera del 2020, el ex alumno Rev. Dr. Emanuel Cleaver III, Pastor General de St. James UMC, enseñó el curso Iglesia Urbana en el Siglo XXI que explora la Iglesia Urbana y su contexto en relación con prácticas ministeriales y entendimientos teológicos.

Para el año fiscal 2019-2020, Saint Paul Course of Study (COS) School educó a 265 estudiantes individuales con un total de 650 clases; ofreciendo un total de 53 cursos ubicados en Leawood, KS; Hays, KS; Oklahoma City, OK; Columbia, MO; y Springfield, MO. Saint Paul está en el segundo año de ofrecer un programa híbrido (en línea y en el recinto) de seis cursos durante el período de invierno. Se están elaborando planes para aumentar el número de cursos híbridos. Saint Paul inauguró un programa piloto acelerado a tiempo parcial del satélite COS (PML, por sus siglas en ingles) en Colombia, MO en el 2018 y agregó una segunda pista en el 2019. Compuesta por nueve cursos de teología práctica, esta opción COS está diseñada específicamente para pastores locales a tiempo parcial o ministros laicos certificados que entran en el ministerio después que completen la Missouri Conference Licensing School. El programa de satélite PML es un programa colaborativo del Saint Paul Course of Study Regional School con la Conferencia de Missouri. Desde septiembre de 2018, COS ha ofrecido seis cursos y matriculado a 30 estudiantes individuales en el programa satélite PML.

Saint Paul School of Theology tiene la bendicion de estar en el ministerio en el nombre de Jesucristo y para ayudar a otros a responder a la llamada de Dios. Somos un seminario que ofrece clases y experiencias a personas de varias denominaciones y caminatas de fe. Nuestro trabajo como facultad y personal es proporcionar excelencia en la educación y práctica teológica para TODAS las personas llamadas y capaces de asistir. Recuerde "Donde se reúnen dos o más", Cristo está con nosotros. SEMINARIO TEOLÓGICO DE UNITED

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Por casi 150 años, el Seminario Teológico de United en Dayton, OH, ha estado preparando líderes fieles y fructíferos para hacer discípulos de Jesucristo.

Los estudiantes

En el semestre del Otoño 2019, United equipó 459 mujeres y hombres para liderazgo en la Iglesia, incluso 272 estudiantes de maestría y 187 estudiantes doctorales. Una comunidad ecuménica de muchas denominaciones, raíces, y nacionalidades, United recibió estudiantes de 11 países, 42 estados, y 37 denominaciones con el alumnado compuesto de 49% afro-americano, 42% caucásico, y 10% minoridades étnicas/raciales.ⁱ El Seminario preparó 165 estudiantes de Curso de Estudio y sirvió 36 estudiantes por la Academia Cristiana Hispana, un programa de curso de ministerio de 3 años, en línea y en español para líderes y pastores laicos hispano-latinos.ⁱⁱ En total, aproximadamente 660 estudiantes respondieron al llamado de Dios por el Seminario Teológico de United.

Los graduados

Los graduados de United hacen un impacto en sus comunidades mientras comparten el Evangelio:

- 88% de los graduados están empleados en o retirados de ministerioⁱⁱⁱ
- 70% sirven en iglesias locales^{iv}
- Rev. Dr. Brad Kalajainen (DMin '99) recibió el premio de Ministerio Efectivo para 2019 para su liderazgo transformativo de la IMU Cornerstone en Grand Rapids, MI.
- Rev. Dr. James Bushfield (MDiv '79, DMin '92) recibió el premio de Graduado Distinguido para 2019 para su liderazgo y
 ministerio en la Conferencia de Indiana de la IMU.
- Rev. Dr. Sandra Coley (DMin '14) recibió el premio de Doctor de Ministerio Excepcional para 2019 para su abogacía de la donación de órganos en las comunidades afroamericanas.

Nuevo en United

United comenzó una licenciatura de 36 horas **la Maestría de Artes (MA)**, diseñada para aquellos quienes quieren completar una licenciatura mientras cumplen con los requisitos del **Curso de Estudio Avanzado** en busca de ordenación en la Iglesia Metodista Unida. El programa MA está disponible en línea, en campus, o en una combinación.

United continua en ofrecer aprendizaje innovador por su **ambiente de Educación Virtual Interactiva y Viva (LIVE)** que comenzó en 2018. En el primer año, 59 estudiantes participaron en los cursos LIVE, conectando con compañeros de clase en el campus en Dayton, OH, y alrededor del país, en asistir a la clase en tiempo real por webcast simultáneo.

Hacernos libre de deudas

United sigue en nuestro compromiso de hacernos libre de deudas para el 150 aniversario del seminario el 11 de octubre 2021. Gracias al apoyo de donantes generosos, United ha recibido más que \$2.5 millones para su meta de recaudar \$4 millón para poder "quemar la hipoteca." Hacernos libre de deudas como una institución nos podrá enfocar en generar ingresos para las becas que ayudan aligerar la carga financiera para los seminaristas.

REPORTE 2020 DE LA TMF (FUNDACIÓN METODISTA DE TEXAS POR SUS SIGLAS EN INGLÉS)

INFORME ANUAL A LA CONFERENCIA

Las relaciones son el centro del ministerio de la TMF. Ya sea que estemos reuniendo recursos a través de filantropía e inversiones o administrando recursos a través de préstamos, subvenciones, ministerio de liderazgo o discernimiento de Conversaciones Santas, creemos que las relaciones que formamos son transformadoras para todos los involucrados y conducen a un cambio intencionado.

Durante el 2019, la TMF continuó construyendo relaciones con ex constituyentes de Heartspring, constituyentes del Fondo de Desarrollo Metodista Unido y nuevos clérigos y líderes laicos que participan en nuestra iniciativa de Liderazgo Imperativo Valiente. Estamos comprometidos en construir nuevas asociaciones, colaboraciones y conexiones para apoyar nuestro objetivo de ayudar a las congregaciones a unir sus recursos financieros y de liderazgo en un plan con propósito para vivir el llamado único de Dios en ellos para servir a sus comunidades.

Tom Stanton, Representante Principal de Área de la TMF para la Conferencia de Rio Texas, es el principal punto de encuentro entre las congregaciones (clérigos y laicos) y la TMF. El conecta a los constituyentes de la Conferencia Rio Texas con recursos relevantes para sus metas únicas de crecimiento misional en sus congregaciones y comunidades.

La TMF, con sede en Austin, sirve a individuos, iglesias y agencias Metodistas Unidas dentro de las seis conferencias anuales en Texas y Nuevo México. Agradecemos la oportunidad de reportarles algunas de las formas en las que en el transcurso del año pasado servimos a los Metodistas Unidos.

Dentro de la Conferencia Rio Texas:

- Préstamos a iglesias en la Conferencia Río Texas totalizaron en \$52.5 millones a fines de 2019.
- Iglesias y agencias, sin incluir individuos, dentro de la Conferencia Río Texas tuvieron \$49.8 millones invertidos en el Fondo de Préstamos Metodistas.

A lo largo de Texas y Nuevo México:

- Al 31 de diciembre de 2019, el total de activos administrados por la TMF fueron aproximadamente \$672.9 millones.
- Las inversiones de la Methodist Loan Fund (Fondos de Prestamos Metodistas) terminaron el año en \$340.1 millones, y nuestra cartera de préstamos en \$317.7 millones.
- Las Fundaciones No Designadas de la TMF terminaron el año en \$58.1 millones.
- Nuestra **Fundación al Ministerio de Liderazgo** fue de \$9.1 millones al cierre de 2019.
- Destacando un año significativo de apoyo financiero para la TMF fue una donación de \$ 6 millones del Patrimonio de Lemuel Richard Keller: \$500,000 de la donación del patrimonio se dirigió al Fondo del Ministerio de Liderazgo de la TMF, una porción totalmente financio Launch 2.0, un foro conjunto de aprendizaje para clérigos y laicos en Little Rock, AR, y el saldo se dirigió a la Fundación No Designada de la TMF. Adicionalmente, la TMF recibió una desafiante donación de \$250,000 para fundar al Fondo de Innovación John Thornburg. El fondo fue creado para ayudar a lanzar nuevos ministerios que emerjan de los corazones y mentes de clérigos que participan en el Ministerio de Liderazgo de la TMF. Hasta el 12/31/19, la TMF había recibido \$225 mil en regalos y promesas para las donaciones de desafío.
- Durante el 2019, el Ministerio de Donaciones de la TMF otorgó \$1.4 millones en apoyo de 28 iglesias y organizaciones sin fines de lucro. De ese total, un estimado de \$704,000 proviene de fundaciones restringidas y \$725,000 de operaciones de la TMF. Otorgamos aproximadamente \$125,000 a iglesias y organizaciones sin fines de lucro que brindan ayuda a los afectados por la tormenta tropical lmelda, la inmigración y los incendios. El Comité de Donaciones de la Junta Directiva de la TMF determina las decisiones de distribución de los fondos discrecionales. En el 2019, los fondos de donaciones se distribuyeron de la siguiente manera: 48% a ministerios de alcance y evangelismo dirigidos al cambio sistémico; 37% a ministerios que benefician sistemáticamente a familias que viven en la pobreza; 15% para becas.
- La TMF continua su trabajo con individuos y familias para apoyar sus objetivos filantrópicos. En el 2019, la TMF recibió \$4.2 millones en
 obsequios (donaciones, fondos asesorados por donantes, anualidades de donaciones benéficas y fideicomisos) para apoyar a los
 ministerios y causas.
- La TMF distribuyó aproximadamente \$2.4 millones de 405 fondos permanentes durante el 2019.
- Durante el 2019, el Ministerio de Liderazgo de la TMF organizó 14 grupos de aprendizaje entre colegas y una gran reunión de innovación, que involucró a casi 300 clérigos y líderes laicos de todo Texas y Nuevo México, como así también de las otras conferencias de la Jurisdicción Sur Central y más allá. La TMF sigue profundamente comprometida en crear espacios para que líderes descubran, exploren, cuestionen y aprendan con sus colegas para así poder ampliar su capacidad de liderar en este momento de profundo cambio. Entre estos grupos hubo dos nuevas unidades lanzadas a través del Liderazgo Imperativo Valiente (CLI). EL CLI busca reunir líderes valientes en toda la SCJ (Jurisdicción Sur Central) con el fin de establecer una red de contactos entre estos líderes valientes, fortalecer su liderazgo y desarrollar su capacidad de valentía, resiliencia, liderazgo adaptativo, agilidad de aprendizaje e innovación. El CLI también organizó Launch 2.0 en Little Rock, que ofreció a equipos de líderes, laicos y clérigos, el espacio y las herramientas para llevar una idea desde la etapa de lluvia de ideas a un prototipo real que tenga forma y planes para los pasos iniciales en la implementación.
- A lo largo de este año de cambio en la denominación, el equipo de Representantes de Área de la TMF mantuvo el enfoque en su propósito central: capacitar a las congregaciones para reclamar y vivir en sus misiones distintivas designadas por Dios. Los ocho representantes viajaron por Texas y Nuevo México, realizando más de 2500 visitas. El equipo hace el doble trabajo de mejoramiento e innovación. El trabajo de mejoraramiento incluye las mejores prácticas financieras, el desarrollo de planes de administración para todo el año y la planificación de generosidad para el final de la vida. El trabajo de innovación se centra en la pregunta: "Dios, ¿qué diferencia nos llamas a hacer en la próxima temporada de vida de la iglesia?" Ellos exploran esa pregunta con el clero y líderes laicos, tanto en conversaciones informales como en servicios contratados llamadas Conversaciones Santas (de 6-9 meses con un equipo de 7-9) y Excavaciones Santas (taller de un día con 20-25 personas).

MEMOIRS

GUIDELINES FOR MEMOIRS

In the Rio Texas Conference it is the responsibility of the minister who conducts the funeral of a deceased minister, or spouse of a minister, to write the memoir for the conference journal. The memoir is not designed to be either a eulogy or a memorial sermon, and is not the place for sentimentality; but this brief and specialized biographical account can be a document suitable as a historical record and a portrayal of personality and spirit.

Certain facts are basic and essential for inclusion in a memoir. The style of writing and the method and order of presentation may differ but a memoir should contain the following information, either within the body of the memoir or listed at the end:

- 1. Personal life, early period: complete name of the deceased; date and place of birth; names of parents, including mother's maiden name.
- 2. Educational background: schools and colleges attended, with years noted; degrees and honors received, with dates.
- 3. Ecclesiastical data: first church membership (name of church, location, date); dates of ordination and admission to annual conference; appointments served; special areas of service on conference boards and agencies; retirement date; residence following retirement; and any service after retirement. (This paragraph is to be adapted to the spouse.)
- 4. Personal life, late period: date of marriage and name of spouse (including maiden name of wife); full names of children (including married names); date and circumstances of death; date and place of funeral and burial; names of officiating clergy; and address of surviving partner or nearest relative.

It shall be the responsibility of the annual conference secretary, as editor of the journal, to see that this basic biographical information is contained in the memoirs that are printed in the conference journal. When the conference secretary is informed as to who will write a memoir, he/she will send to the writer of the memoir a copy of these guidelines, and instruct the writer to make sure that the memoir that is written is complete with the necessary biographical information. It should not be more than 300 words in length.

Writers of memoirs should present a copy of the memoir to a member or members of the family of the deceased so that it may be checked for accuracy before it is sent to the conference secretary. Memoirs should be received by the conference secretary within one month after the death of the person who has served the conference as minister or minister's spouse.

A glossy photograph, preferably black and white, secured if possible from the family, should be made available for publication with the memoir.

INSTRUCCIONES PARA MEMORIALES

En la Conferencia Río Texas, es la responsabilidad del Ministro quien lleva a cabo el funeral de un difunto Ministro, o cónyuge de un ministro, escribir un memorial para el diario de la Conferencia. El memorial no está diseñado para ser un elogio o un sermón conmemorativo y no es el lugar para sentimentalismo; pero este relato biográfico breve y especializado puede ser un documento adecuado como un registro histórico y un retrato de la personalidad y espíritu del difunto.

Hay ciertos datos básicos y esenciales para inclusión en un memorial. El estilo de escritura y el método y orden de presentación pueden variar pero deben contener la siguiente información, ya sea dentro del cuerpo del memorial o al final:

- 1. Vida personal, nombre completo del difunto, datos del período de edad temprana; fecha y lugar de nacimiento; nombres de sus padres, incluyendo el apellido soltero de la madre.
- 2. Educación: escuelas y colegios atendidos, con años señalados; diplomas y honores recibidos, con las fechas.
- 3. Datos eclesiásticos: Membresía de primera iglesia (nombre de la iglesia, lugar, fecha); fechas de ordenación y de admisión a la conferencia anual; nombramientos servidos; áreas especiales de servicio en juntas y agencias de la conferencia; fecha de retiro; residencia después de su retiro; y cualquier servicio después de jubilación. (Este párrafo debe ser adaptado para el/la cónyuge).
- 4. Datos de vida personal posterior: fecha del matrimonio y nombre del cónyuge (incluyendo el apellido de la esposa o el esposo); nombres y apellidos de los niños (incluyendo apellidos de los casados); fecha y circunstancias de fallecimiento; fecha y lugar del funeral y entierro; nombres del clero que oficiaron; y dirección del cónyuge sobreviviente o el pariente más cercano.

Será la responsabilidad del Secretario de la conferencia anual, como editor del diario, ver que esta información biográfica básica esté contenida en los memoriales que se imprimen en el diario de la Conferencia. Cuando el Secretario de la Conferencia se informe de quién va a escribir un memorial, debe enviar al escritor del memorial una copia de estas instrucciones e indicar el escritor que se asegure que en el memorial escrito está completa la información biográfica. No debe ser más de 300 palabras en su total.

Los escritores de memoriales deben presentar una copia del memorial a un miembro o a miembros de la familia de los difuntos para que ellos puedan verificar su exactitud antes de enviarlo al Secretario de la Conferencia. Memoriales deben ser recibidos por el Secretario de la Conferencia dentro de un mes después de la muerte de la persona que sirvió en la Conferencia como ministro o esposa/o del ministro.

Una fotografía brillosa, preferiblemente en blanco y negro, donada si es posible por la familia, debe ponerse a disposición para su publicación con el libro de memoriales.

A memorial service will be held at Getsemani United Methodist Church of Port Arthur on Saturday, November 30, 2019 at 2:00 p.m.




Wan Gul Cho was born January 28, 1932 and passed away April 19, 2020.

The Reverend Don Louis Delaplain, born December 27, 1930, in Seminole, Oklahoma, received his final call on October 3, 2019, and "crossed the river" to the Promised Land where he was welcomed by his Lord and Savior and reunited with his beloved wife and daughter, parents and siblings, and a host of family and friends.

Don, the fifth of seven children born to James Lisle and Zuleme Gragson Delaplain, attended McLish Public Schools near Fittstown, Oklahoma, and graduated from East Central State University in 1953. He served one year as a local pastor in the Oklahoma Conference of the United Methodist Church, then enlisted in the United States Air Force in May 1955. Delaplain, Carol Delaplain Bennett, and Linda Delaplain Stephens. He is survived by his sons Neal (Tammy) Delaplain of Sinton, Texas, and David Delaplain (Lezah Palanuk) of Loon Lake, Washington, daughter Gail (Stu) McCleese of Ingleside, Texas, grandchildren Amanda (Dublin) Evans, Sherry McCleese, Melissa (Scott) Bartee, Shaun McCleese, Bryanna Delaplain, Allison Hille, and 9 great-grandchildren. He is also survived by his twin sister Dorothy Delaplain Escamilla, and her husband Roberto, brother Paul Delaplain, brother-in-law Ray Stephens, sister-in-law Jan Gard, and a host of nieces and nephews.

Visitation held Saturday, October 12, 2019, at the Charlie Marshall Funeral Home in Aransas Pass, with family present from 5:00 – 8:00 p.m. A Celebration of Life honoring Don's legacy were held on Sunday, October 13, at 4:00 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church of Aransas Pass. A fellowship dinner was served immediately following the service in the Activities Building. Interment was held in the family portion of the Highland Cemetery in Stonewall, Oklahoma, on November 24, 2019.

CLIFFORD CHARLES EDGE, JR.

FEBRUARY 20, 1933 - AUGUST 12, 2020



Clifford Charles Edge, Jr. should have written his own obituary. He was one of the finest writers I have known. He was born to Clifford Charles Edge, Sr. and Grace Brown Edge in Bryan, Texas on February 20th, 1933. He was their only child, and I won't say he was spoiled, but he told me once that he cried when his mother took down the Christmas Tree so she left it up and just re-decorated it every month with themed ornaments. His mother also wrote and self-published two books filled with her son's precocious witticisms called "Let there Be Laughter" and "Let There Be Laughter 2". He was a cherished and beloved child.

As a young man, Clifford found that his writing talent and capacity to learn served him well in pursuit of his career choice, a Methodist pastor. He achieved two Master's degrees and a Doctorate of Philosophy from University of Texas.

He always had a plan for his life which included meeting and marrying a lovely Methodist woman, who turned out to be a superb pianist as well: Carla Ehlers. They were a handsome young couple ready to serve in the Methodist church wherever God sent them.

Clifford and Carla were told they would not be able to have children, but the children apparently thought otherwise. I can honestly say Clifford's children were the light of his life. They came in rapid succession: Clifford Charles (Kippy) in 1962, David Carl in 1963, Craig Martin in 1967, James Christian in 1969 and Cara Diane in 1972. He was a dad who played with his kids, loved to travel to amusement parks with them, enjoyed cooking for them, loved to plan parties for them and just loved being with them.

Being a Methodist pastor meant moving many times; Clifford served in many Methodist churches including appointments in: Alvin, Bryan, Utopia, Houston, Fredericksburg, Brownsville, Llano, and Robstown until 1979 when he took sabbatical so that his kids could complete high school without having to move. He worked at Del Mar College, Texas A & I Kingsville, Robstown High School and the Robstown Record using his writing skills and his penchant for history in his new careers. He later rejoined the ministry and commuted to smaller rural Methodist churches so that his family could stay put.

Clifford loved historical buildings; his specialty was old movie theaters, particularly those which still housed pipe organs. He belonged to the national historical theater society and often used his planning skills to set up trips for the group's summer conventions. He coordinated and made agendas for the hundreds of members with ease. And he had a map in his head of the entire U.S. including where the historic theaters were in the cities. I know his kids and even his grandkids liked to "test" this map with: "What street is the theater in Lexington Kentucky located on, Daddy?" His reply: "You mean the one downtown, or the one on the east side?" This type of exchange happened many, many times in the course of our conversations with Clifford.

Clifford loved to have his family all together. When his kids started marrying and having kids, he was a very happy man. He was Granddaddy to his grandkids. They knew he would sit with them for hours reading a book or playing Pick a Patch, Uncle Wiggly or Candyland without losing patience. When the grandkids were old enough, he loved to take them to movies, plays and concerts. A particular favorite activity was taking the family out to a restaurant. He loved seeing a table of 16 to 20 people including his kids, grandkids and friends who tagged along sitting in a restaurant at several tables pushed together. And he always footed the bill; no question that he'd do so.

Family Christmas-tide was full of fun "traditions" that Clifford created; for years he would bring a full-size advent wreath with candles and an advent calendar to every family meal during the time of Advent. Those at other tables in restaurants may have looked sideways as he lit the candles, but he didn't care. He loved reading from the prayer book or having one of the kids do it and then passing out treats to everyone after the ceremony.

Clifford also kept track of birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, and any other notable milestones and always made a point to send a card or treat a group to dinner to honor those special occasions in our lives. For him, any excuse to get together as a family was important.

His intelligence was astounding, but you would only find that out if you took the time to ask him something. If you had

interest in: movies, historic buildings, downtown revitalization, politics, history, rock music, electricity, or most any topic, you could easily write a school essay on the information you gleaned from a conversation with Clifford. In fact, some kids may have done just that...But, he was always humble in his interactions with others and never belittled anyone in any way. He loved learning new things and often commented that something was "interesting" or "highly entertaining" if he particularly liked it.

Clifford, we know you had no allergies or ailments and you never complained about being uncomfortable. We know your family was your joy in life. We just wish you were here to write this and then join us for dinner after the service. We will miss you so much.

Clifford is now with his wife of 59 years, Carla Diane Ehlers Edge as well as his loving parents, uncles and aunts; he is survived by his five kids: Kippy (Debbie) of Portland, Texas; Carl of San Luis Obispo California; Craig (Michelle) of Andover, Kansas; Chris (Mimi) of Los Fresnos, Texas; Cara (Louis) of Cedar Park, Texas. He is also survived by his twelve grandkids: Chelsea, Caitlin (Hunter), Courtny, Camber, Caven, Cora, Cenna, Camie, Carly, Casey, Jacques and Emile.

Clifford Charles Edge, Jr. debería haber escrito su propio obituario. Fue uno de los mejores escritores que he conocido. Sus padres son Clifford Charles Edge, Sr. y Grace Brown Edge y nació en Bryan, Texas, el 20 de febrero de 1933. Era su único hijo, y no diré que fue malcriado, pero me dijo una vez que lloró cuando su madre quitó el árbol de Navidad, así que lo dejó y lo volvió a decorar todos los meses con adornos temáticos. Sé que a sus hijos e incluso a sus nietos les gustaba "probar" este mapa mental con: "¿En qué calle está ubicado el teatro en Lexington Kentucky, papá?" Su respuesta: "¿Te refieres al del centro o al del lado este?" Este tipo de intercambio ocurrió muchas, muchas veces en el curso de nuestras conversaciones con Clifford. A Clifford le encantaba tener toda su familia junta. Cuando sus hijos comenzaron a casarse y a tener hijos, él era un hombre muy feliz. Era el abuelo de sus nietos. Sabían que se sentaría con ellos durante horas leyendo un libro o jugando Pick a Patch, Uncle Wiggly o Candyland sin perder la paciencia. Cuando los nietos tuvieron la edad suficiente, le encantaba llevarlos al cine, a obras de teatro y a conciertos. Una actividad favorita en particular fue llevar a la familia a un restaurante. Others regarded Ken as winsome, fun, thoughtful, an outstanding leader, passionate and gift for ministry, practical, relatable and likeable, a wonderful pastoral presence, sensible, and a gentleman with a great personality. He had a remarkable gift of making things happen—no task ever seemed too great. He fulfilled his work and life with thanksgiving and gratitude. In Ken's retirement years, he dedicated all that he did to support Margot in her work at SMU|Perkins School of Theology; they were hardly ever apart. Ken graduated from Grand Rapids Bible College and Seminary. Ken leaves behind his sweetheart, Margot; daughter, Kelly Romirowsky (Scott); son, Lance Martin (Shanda); sisters and a brother; grandchildren, nieces, and nephews. We will never be the same as we were before this loss but are ever so much better for having had something so great to lose.



Charles Frederick Hahn, 89, of Bloomington, Indiana, completed his journey on earth on Friday, March 27, 2020, at Richland Bean-Blossom Healthcare Center. He was born on September 9, 1930, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, the son of Nell (King) Hahn and Fred W. Hahn.

From his earliest days as president of his Oklahoma City District Methodist Youth Fellowship, Charles's life was defined by his calling as a pastor. Charles received his undergraduate degree from Southern Methodist University and his Master of Divinity from Perkins School of Theology at SMU, and was ordained in 1956. 
Charles was a gracious man who loved humanity, family, community, the United Methodist Church, the planet, music of all kinds, all creatures (especially dogs), and pancakes.

I met Mal in 1976 when my family moved to San Antonio. As soon as we found St. Matthews UMC and Mal Hierholzer, we knew we had found a church home. Mal was unlike any pastor we had ever known. There was no false piety, no pretense, nor posturing. Mal was the kind of preacher who's soul rested with God yet his heart and eyes were fixed on life in the real world. Mal lived between the ground and God. Though full of faith and heaven's hope Mal kept his feet fixed firmly on earth. He spoke of a hope that can be found in God and in Christian community as well as the heartaches, thorns and thistles that are common to all made of flesh and bone. Mal was the first preacher we ever heard who shared his own life's struggles, even struggles with faith. This truth-telling brought comfort and hope to us all.

If you knew Mal and were blessed to also experience his preaching, you surely noticed this willingness to share his own foibles. Mal had a strong sense of self and a healthy ego, yet as one of my collogues noted "Outside the pulpit Mal could

tell a story where he was the hero, yet in his preaching he was more than willing to be the goat!"

There's no doubt that I would not have become a pastor had I not known Mal, Caroline, and their sons Rob and John. The meals they fed me and the love they demonstrated, all helped me answer the call to ministry. As pastor at Canyon Lake I was happy to bring Mal on as associate and just as happy to know that he would allow me to lead as senior pastor.

Together, pushed by the engine of Mal's evangelistic tendencies and natural tenacity, Canyon Lake was able to birth the North Shore UMC. Without Mal and Caroline, that would have never happened as quickly and gracefully as it did.

Life without him will never be the same. I miss my friend.

Even in grief I smile when I remember Natalie Sleeth's "Hymn of Promise"

which Mal often quoted when preaching funerals. "In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed an apple tree; in cocoons, a hidden promise, butterflies will soon be free!" Mal is free. Imagine his adventures!

Rev. Malford Cotham Hierholzer served in the Southwest Texas Conference after he completed his studies at Perkins School of Theology. He became an Elder in 1961 and served in many churches: Paint Rock/Eola/Millersview, Woodsboro, CC: Trinity, Fredericksburg, Lockhart, St. Matthews SA, St. John's Austin, SWTX Conference as District Superintendent, Canyon Lake. After his retirement in 2002 he continued his ministry at Canyon Lake North Shore, Hilda, Jefferson San Antonio and Pettus/Pawnee. He served in these churches from 1959 – 2017, also serving at Rio Texas Conference upon transition from SWTX Conference.

"Pastor, guerrero, evangelista y amigo" Conocí a Mal en 1976 cuando mi familia se mudó a San Antonio. CHARLES D. McCullough December 21, 1931 - June 9, 2019



Charles D. "Chuck" McCullough, a retired clergyman of the United Methodist Church, died Sunday, June 9, 2019 following a lengthy illness. Born in Central, Indiana his boyhood was in Alexandria, Indiana where he graduated from High School in 1949. He experienced his home as being loving and God-fearing, with a heavy emphasis on God's judgement and the need for one to find "the will of God" and fulfill it in every phase of life. The pursuit of knowledge being an important part in Chuck's life he attended college at Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, Illinois; the Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Missouri; Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee; Kansas State University in Manhattan, Kansas; Central Missouri State in Warrensburg, Missouri; the University of California Santa Barbara; and Kent State University in Kent, Ohio. Reverend McCullough's ordained ministry began in Kansas where he served the

Camp Creek Emmanuel United Methodist Church near Atchison, Kansas, 1957-63; and the College Avenue United Methodist Church in Manhattan, Kansas 1963-67. After a number of years in ecumenical campus ministry chaplain's posts he returned to the parish, pastoring at First United Methodist Church in Mission, Texas from 1985-95 and Oxford United Methodist Church in San Antonio, Texas, from 1994-95. In the same month of his retirement (June '95), Rev. McCullough entered the Clinical pastoral Education (C.P.E) program in the Baptist Hospital System in San Antonio. A year and a half later, when he turned 65, he fully retired. Though his love of sports was not encouraged during his boyhood, it continued throughout his adult life. Daniel Rodríguez left legacy of servant leadership

The Rev. Daniel Z. Rodríguez, a widely known and beloved United Methodist Hispanic/Latino leader, died July 19 in San Antonio. With his passing, The United Methodist Church lost a caring pastor, advocate for justice and facilitator of dialogue.

I was blessed to work closely with Dan as we shared in ministry within our conference and in the wider church for over 40 years. He was a good friend, a thoughtful mentor and a wise counselor to me throughout my ministry.

Dan, who was 88, had a 50-year ministry as a pastor, district superintendent, conference council director and executive director of MARCHA, the Hispanic/Latino caucus in The United Methodist Church. He influenced three generations of lay and clergy leaders in mission with Hispanic/Latino communities in the United States and Puerto Rico.

A lifelong clergy member of the Rio Grande Conference, he was a graduate of Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, and the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Southwestern conferred the honorary doctor of divinity degree in recognition of outstanding leadership as a pastor and denominational leader.

Dan's voice and advocacy for the mission of United Methodism with the growing Hispanic/Latino community were key in the denominational effort to develop and approve the Ethnic Local Church Missional Priority in the 1980s.

As a director on the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries in the late 1970s and early 1980s, he worked for the support of a stronger commitment to congregational development in Hispanic/Latino communities and the implementing of financial stewardship development programs in the missionary and ethnic language conferences.

While serving as council director of the Rio Grande Conference, he made a commitment to participate in the ongoing work of MARCHA. His ability as a facilitator and his relational style led the caucus board to invite him to serve as executive director from 1980-83. His three-year tenure helped MARCHA to regain momentum as it advocated for a more inclusive United Methodism and for the strengthening of the Ethnic Minority Local Church. The caucus also advocated for more Hispanic/Latino staff in the general agencies, for the election of Hispanic/Latino leaders to the Council of Bishops and for cultivating closer relationships with the Methodist Churches in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Dan once told me that "for me the annual conference comes first." So, while he answered the call to wider service in the general church, he was most devoted to serving as a pastor and other appointments in his beloved home conference of Rio Grande. This helps explain his return to the pastorate in 1983, when he was appointed to the historic La Trinidad United Methodist Church in San Antonio. He would serve the longest tenure – 19 years – as pastor in the 144-year history of the congregation. He came from a family of preachers, preceded by his father, Amado, and several cousins. This was part of his spiritual legacy.

Laity that he pastored appreciated his warm and caring approach to ministry with the flock. He also encouraged younger laity to embrace and affirm their roles as leaders of the present and the future. Youth ministry was important in his work.

His preaching was informed by his involvement in community and the social teachings of The United Methodist Church. As pastor in the Rio Grande Valley at Mission in 1966, he walked with and supported the striking farmworkers of the valley in their 400-mile march to the state capitol in Austin seeking justice, fair wages and improved working conditions.

At La Trinidad, he engaged in community organizing efforts in the heavily Mexican American west and south sides of San Antonio. He supported the work of Communities Organized for Public Service and The Metro Alliance, two groups affiliated with the Industrial Areas Network of Community Organizations. Transformative efforts by these organizations corrected some of the decades-old discriminatory practices of the San Antonio power structure toward these areas of the city.

Jesus sent out the disciples two by two. Ministry is always a team ministry. Dan's spouse, Evelí Rodríguez, was a caring and supportive team member in their ministry. Her own labors as staff in the conference council office, including serving as associate council director, and her work as a certified Christian educator, left a lasting imprint on the lives of countless persons in the conference and local churches where they served. Her 34-year tenure on the conference office staff is also a record.

For many of us who were privileged to share in ministry with the Rev. Daniel Z. Rodríguez, our fondest memory of him is as a caring mentor and role model. His good counsel, his honest feedback, and his smiles and laughter were gifts we can never repay.

Estaba realmente agradecido por esta bendición de Dios. Daniel Rodríguez dejó un legado de liderazgo de servicio.

Por medio del Obispo Joel N. Martinez: El Reverendo Daniel Z. Rodríguez, un líder hispano / latino metodista unido ampliamente conocido y querido, murió el 19 de julio en San Antonio. Con su fallecimiento, la Iglesia Metodista Unida perdió a un pastor cariñoso, defensor de la justicia y facilitador del diálogo. Tuve la fortuna de trabajar estrechamente con Dan mientras compartíamos el ministerio dentro de nuestra conferencia y en la iglesia en general durante más de 40 años. Fue un buen amigo, un mentor atento y un consejero sabio para mí durante todo mi ministerio. Dan, que tenía 88 años, tuvo un ministerio de 50 años como pastor, superintendente de distrito, director del concilio de conferencias y director ejecutivo de MARCHA, el grupo hispano / latino de la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Influyó a tres generaciones de líderes laicos y del clero en misión con comunidades hispanas / latinas en los Estados Unidos y Puerto Rico. Un miembro del clero de toda la vida en la Conferencia Río Grande, Dan se graduó de la Universidad Southwestern en Georgetown, Texas, y de la Escuela de Teología Perkins de la Universidad Metodista del Sur en Dallas. Southwestern le otorgó el título de doctor honorario en teología en reconocimiento de su liderazgo sobresaliente como pastor y líder denominacional.

La voz de Dan y su defensa de la misión del Metodismo Unido con la creciente comunidad hispana / latina fueron clave en el esfuerzo denominacional para desarrollar y aprobar la Prioridad Misional de la Iglesia Local Étnica en la década de 1980. Como director de la Junta Metodista Unida de Ministerios Globales a fines de la década de 1970 y principios de la de 1980, trabajó para el apoyo de un compromiso más fuerte con el desarrollo congregacional en las comunidades hispanas / latinas y la implementación de programas de desarrollo de mayordomía financiera en el idioma misionero y étnico. conferencias. Mientras se desempeñaba como director del consejo de la Conferencia de Río Grande, se comprometió a participar en el trabajo continuo de MARCHA. Su habilidad como facilitador y su estilo relacional llevaron a la junta del caucus a invitarlo a servir como director ejecutivo de 1980 a 1983. Su mandato de tres años ayudó a MARCHA a recuperar el impulso mientras abogaba por un Metodismo Unido más inclusivo y por el fortalecimiento de la Iglesia Local de Minorías Étnicas. El caucus también abogó por más personal hispano / latino en las agencias generales, por la elección de líderes hispanos / latinos para el Concilio de Obispos y por cultivar relaciones más estrechas con las Iglesias Metodistas en América Latina y el Caribe. Dan me dijo una vez que "para mí, la conferencia anual es lo primero". Entonces, aunque respondió al llamado a un servicio más amplio en la iglesia en general, estaba más dedicado a servir como pastor y otros nombramientos en su amada Conferencia local de Río Grande. Esto ayuda a explicar su regreso al pastorado en 1983, cuando fue nombrado miembro de la histórica Iglesia Metodista Unida La Trinidad en San Antonio. Serviría el mandato más largo - 19 años - como pastor en los 144 años de historia de la congregación. Provenía de una familia de predicadores, precedido por su padre, Amado, y varios primos. Esto fue parte de su legado espiritual. Los laicos que pastoreaba apreciaban su enfoque cálido y cariñoso del ministerio con el rebaño. También animó a los laicos más jóvenes a abrazar y afirmar sus roles como líderes del presente y del futuro. El ministerio juvenil fue importante en su trabajo. Su predicación fue informada por su participación en la comunidad y las enseñanzas sociales de la Iglesia Metodista Unida. Como pastor en el Valle del Río Grande en Mission en 1966, caminó y apoyó a los trabajadores agrícolas en huelga del Valle en su marcha de 400 millas hacia el capitolio estatal en Austin en busca de justicia, salarios justos y mejores condiciones laborales. En La Trinidad, participó en esfuerzos de organización comunitaria en los lados oeste y sur de San Antonio, predominantemente mexicano-americanos. Apoyó el trabajo de Comunidades Organizadas para el Servicio Público y The Metro Alliance, dos grupos afiliados a la Red de Organizaciones Comunitarias de Áreas Industriales. Los esfuerzos transformadores de estas organizaciones corrigieron algunas de las prácticas discriminatorias de décadas de la estructura de poder de San Antonio hacia estas áreas de la ciudad. Jesús envió a los discípulos de dos en dos. El ministerio es siempre un ministerio en equipo. La esposa de Dan, Evelí Rodríguez, fue un miembro del equipo cariñoso y comprensivo en su ministerio. Su propio trabajo como personal en la oficina del consejo de la conferencia, incluida su labor como directora asociada del consejo, y su trabajo como educadora cristiana certificada, dejaron una huella duradera en las vidas de innumerables personas en la conferencia y en las iglesias locales donde sirvieron. Su permanencia de 34 años en el personal de la oficina de conferencias también es un récord. Para muchos de nosotros que tuvimos el privilegio de compartir el ministerio con el Rdo. Daniel Z. Rodríguez, nuestro recuerdo más entrañable de él es como un mentor cariñoso y un modelo por seguir. Su buen consejo, sus comentarios honestos y sus sonrisas y risas fueron regalos que nunca podremos pagarle.





Dr. Kelly Rush Tucker December 16, 1955 – June 7, 2019



Dr. Kelly Rush Tucker, 63, died Friday June 7, 2019, from stage four renal cell carcinoma. Kelly was born December 16, 1955 to Rev. Lewis Edwin Tucker and Ethel Kring Godbey Tucker (Rosie) in Orange, Texas. The family lived in several different east Texas towns during Kelly's childhood as Rev. Tucker, a United Methodist preacher, served churches in Dickenson, Center and others. Kelly played the trumpet in the marching band at Pearland High School, graduated in 1974, and went to the University of Houston where he also was a member of the marching band. He graduated from UH with a Bachelor of Science in Biology. After working in a research laboratory at the University of Texas Health Science Center (UTHSC) in Houston for a while, Kelly applied to and was accepted into the University of Texas Medical School in Houston. During the summer between first and second years in medical school, Kelly continued to work in the lab of physiologist Dr. Frank

Booth. It was in 1981 that he met his life's love, Jenny Lynn Cravey, a research technologist in another lab. They married June 17, 1983 in Houston, Texas and honeymooned in Grande Teton and Yellowstone National Parks. Shortly before his graduation from medical school in 1985, their first child, Kristopher, was born. Kelly and Jenny stayed in Houston while Kelly completed a Family Medicine Residency Program through Southwest Memorial Hospital. In February of 1988 their second child, Heather, was born. That summer Kelly's residency was complete and the family packed up to move to

Llano, Texas. Kelly, and close friends Dr. John Frederick and Dr. Janice Pruessner, joined the Hoerster Clinic partnership of family medicine doctors. In December of 1991 Jenny gave birth to their third child, Clare. Immediately upon moving to Llano, the Tuckers joined Lutie Watkins Memorial United Methodist Church. The kids (and Jenny) were active in the Logos program, and Kelly began his lifetime participation in the church choir. He loved music and enjoyed singing, especially in the Christmas Cantatas and Concerts for Epiphany. Kelly and Jenny both enjoyed the outdoors and took the family camping and hiking as often as they could, often with their longtime friends Mark and Sheryl Millsap and kids, or Janice Pruessner and John Frederick and their kids. Kelly was also a rocketry and NASA space program enthusiast, collecting and building model rockets in his spare time. In addition, he loved fireworks and started making his own several years ago. He looked forward to indulging his hobbies further in retirement. Kelly continued to practice medicine over 30 years, as the Hoerster Clinic became the Scott & White Hoerster Clinic, and eventually the Baylor Scott & White Hoerster Clinic. Kelly is pre-deceased by his parents, Lewis and Rosie, and by his older brother Lewis Edwin Tucker Jr., known to family as Bo. Kelly is survived by his wife of 36 years, Jenny, and his children: son Kristopher Tucker of Austin, daughter Heather Tucker and daughter-in-law Ruby Tucker of Portland, Oregon, and daughter Clare Tucker Bretton and son-in-law Will Bretton of Austin, as well as his sister Claudia Mansbridge of Llano. Between Kelly and Jenny there are many nieces and nephews and family members on both sides whom they love and treasure. A memorial service for Dr. Kelly Rush Tucker was held Monday June 17, 2019 at 2:00 p.m. at Lutie Watkins Memorial United Methodist Church, 800 Wright St., Llano, Texas 78643, presided over by Rev. Leslie Tomlinson.

La Dra. Kelly Rush Tucker, de 63 años, murió el viernes 7 de junio de 2019 de un carcinoma de células renales en etapa cuatro. Kelly nació el 16 de diciembre de 1955 del Reverendo Lewis Edwin Tucker y la Sra. Ethel Kring Godbey Tucker (Rosie) en Orange, Texas. La familia vivió en varios pueblos del este de Texas durante la infancia de Kelly, ya que el Reverendo Tucker, un predicador metodista unido, servía en iglesias en Dickenson, Center y otras. Durante el verano entre el primer y segundo año de la escuela de medicina, Kelly continuó trabajando en el laboratorio del fisiólogo Dr. Frank Booth. Fue en 1981 cuando conoció al amor de su vida, Jenny Lynn Cravey, una tecnóloga de investigación en otro laboratorio. Se casaron el 17 de junio de 1983 en Houston, Texas y pasaron su luna de miel en los parques nacionales de Grande Teton y Yellowstone. Poco antes de graduarse de la escuela de medicina en 1985, nació su primer hijo, Kristopher. Kelly y Jenny se quedaron en Houston mientras Kelly completaba un programa de residencia en medicina familiar en el Southwest Memorial Hospital. En febrero de 1988 nació su segunda hija, Heather. Ese verano, la residencia de Kelly se completó y la familia empacó para mudarse a Llano, Texas. Kelly y sus amigos cercanos, el Dr. John Frederick y la Dra. Janice Pruessner, se unieron a la asociación de médicos de medicina familiar de la Clínica Hoerster. En diciembre de 1991 Jenny dio a luz a su tercer hija, Clare. Inmediatamente después de mudarse a Llano, los Tucker se unieron a la Iglesia Metodista Unida Lutie Watkins Memorial. Los hijos (y Jenny) participaron activamente en el programa Logos y Kelly comenzó su participación de por vida en el coro de la iglesia. Amaba la música y se disfrutaba cantando, especialmente en las Cantatas de Navidad y Conciertos para la Epifanía. Kelly y Jenny disfrutaron del aire libre y llevaron a la familia a acampar y hacer caminatas tan a menudo como pudieron, a menudo con sus amigos de toda la vida Mark y Sheryl Millsap y sus hijos, o Janice Pruessner y John Frederick y sus hijos. Kelly también era un entusiasta de los cohetes y los programas espaciales de la NASA, y coleccionaba y construía modelos de cohetes en su tiempo libre. Además, amaba los cohetes y comenzó a hacer los suyos desde hacía varios años. Esperaba poder seguir disfrutando de sus pasatiempos en la jubilación. Kelly continuó practicando la medicina durante 30 años, cuando la Clínica Hoerster se convirtió en la Clínica Scott & White Hoerster y, finalmente, en la Clínica Baylor Scott & White Hoerster. Kelly fue precidido en muerte por sus padres, Lewis y Rosie, y por su hermano mayor Lewis Edwin Tucker Jr., conocido en la familia como Bo. A Kelly le sobreviven su esposa de 36 años, Jenny, y sus hijos: su hijo Kristopher Tucker de Austin, su hija Heather Tucker y su nuera Ruby Tucker de Portland, Oregon, su hija Clare Tucker Bretton y su yerno Will Bretton de Austin, así como su hermana Claudia Mansbridge de Llano. 

RÍO TEXAS CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

The **Mission** of the Río Texas Conference: to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The **Vision** of the Río Texas Conference: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, Transforming Communities.

STRUCTURE AND AGENCIES

Uniting Table

- 1. There shall be a Uniting Table whose function is to coordinate mission and ministry in the Río Texas Conference through the four Vision Teams focused on the four pillars of the conference Vision: Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders, and Transforming Communities. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams are responsible for focusing on the Mission Field. The membership of the Uniting Table shall be: the Bishop (ex officio without vote); the dean of the cabinet; the lay leader; the chairpersons of the Uniting Peoples, Vitalizing Congregations, Developing Leaders and Transforming Communities Vision Teams; the chairperson or a representative of each administrative agency in Rule #6; one representative each from the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on the Episcopacy, and the Council on Children's Ministries; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; and the chairperson. There shall also be seven (7) members at large and a Mission Field Advocate, nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. All references in the Book of Discipline to a conference council on ministries will be fulfilled by the Uniting Table. The Uniting Table is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
 - a. There shall be a Mission Field Advocate whose responsibility is to help the Uniting Table and the Vision Teams remain focused on the mission field by advocating for the people who are not in our churches, including those who are in poverty, those who are young, those who are marginalized, and those who are disempowered by our culture and society.
 - b. The Uniting Table and the four Vision Teams will be expected to recruit and engage lay and clergy persons across the conference to serve on task forces to assist in their responsibilities.
 - c. Each Vision Team will have funding through the Annual Conference budget. Meetings of the Team will be funded through the amount budgeted to that Team. Appointed task forces also will be funded through the amount provided in the Annual Conference budget assigned to that Team.
 - d. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate, and the Annual Conference shall elect, the chairpersons of the Uniting Table and each of the four Vision Teams. None of these chairpersons shall have any other specific ministry responsibilities on the Uniting Table or any of the Vision Teams, nor shall they be chairperson of any other conference agency.
 - e. The Constitutions for United Methodist Women (¶ 647) and United Methodist Men (¶ 648) are included in the 2016 Book of Discipline. United Methodist Women and United Methodist Men are independent organizations which nominate and elect their own leaders. Each of these organizations is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. United Methodist Women relates to the national organization of United Methodist Women. United Methodist Men relates to the General Commission on United Methodist Men.

Uniting Peoples Vision Team

2. There shall be a Uniting Peoples Vision Team whose function is to facilitate unity, witness, communication and justice, and to work toward intercultural competency in all areas of conference life. The membership of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, two persons whose specific responsibility is Religion and Race, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, two persons whose specific responsibility is Communications, two persons whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual

Conference. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team relates to the Council of Bishops, the General Commission on Religion and Race, the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the Uniting Table. The Uniting Peoples Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

- a. There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 642 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Christian Unity and Interreligious Relationships, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Council of Bishops, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 643 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Religion and Race, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Commission on Religion and Race, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Commission on the Status and Role of Women (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 644 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is the Status and Role of Women, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The chairperson of this commission shall be a woman, and a majority of its members shall be women. The commission relates to the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women, and to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- d. There shall be a Commission on Communications (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 646 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Communications, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The commission relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Disability Concerns (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 653 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Disability Concerns, plus all the other members of the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. Membership shall include persons with physical disabilities and persons with mental disabilities. The committee relates to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Uniting Peoples Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Uniting Peoples Vision Team portion of the budget.

Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team

3. There shall be a Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team whose function is to discern, develop and deploy resources pertinent to the fulfillment of the mission and purpose of the local church, and to support the restoring of vitality to the local church. The membership of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, two persons whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development & Revitalization, two persons whose specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Small Membership Church, two persons whose specific responsibility is New Church Development, two persons whose specific responsibility is

Children's Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team relates to the General Board of Discipleship, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

- a. There shall be a Board of Discipleship (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 630 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Discipleship, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Committee on Congregational Development and Revitalization (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5e of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Congregational Development and Revitalization, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 632 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Ethnic Local Church Concerns, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- d. There shall be a Committee on Parish and Community Development (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 633.5 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Parish and Community Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Commission on the Small Membership Church (the commission) whose function is defined in ¶ 645 and ¶ 633.5i of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the commission shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is the Small Membership Church, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The commission relates to the General Board of Global Ministries and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- f. There shall be a Committee on New Church Development (the committee) whose function is defined in \P 633.5e-h and \P 630.3 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is New Church Development, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The

committee relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

- g. There shall be a Council on Children's Ministries (the council) whose function is to plan, vision and advocate for children within the conference. The membership of the council shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Children's Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- h. There shall be a Council on Older Adult Ministries (the council) whose function is defined in ¶ 651 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the council shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Older Adult Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. The council is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- i. There shall be a Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 655 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Hispanic/Latino Ministries, plus all the other members of the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team. At least one-third of the members shall be Hispanic/Latino persons. The committee is accountable to the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- j. There shall be a Youth Ministries Council (the council), whose function is defined in ¶ 649 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Youth Ministries. The council will support, encourage and equip youth leaders in the church. The council will consist of 3-5 youth from each district, and will represent the diversity of the conference. No more than one-third of the members of the council will be adults. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.
- k. There shall be a Young Adult Ministry Council (the council) whose function is defined in ¶ 650 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Young Adult Ministries. The council will provide voice and support for all young adults in the conference. The council will be a group of diverse young adults called to ministry and service as modeled by Jesus Christ. The council is represented by the president and/or another designated person on various agencies of the Annual Conference, including the Uniting Table. The council relates to the General Board of Discipleship's Division on Ministries with Young People. The council is accountable to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Vitalizing Congregations Vision Team portion of the budget.

Developing Leaders Vision Team

4. There shall be a Developing Leaders Vision Team whose function is to call and equip both lay and clergy leaders for the mission field, and to especially encourage younger leaders. The membership of the Developing Leaders Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. Additional members shall be the presidents or designees of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Youth Ministries Council, and the Young Adult Ministry Council; two

representatives from the Board of Ordained Ministry; the conference lay leader and the seven (7) district lay leaders. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. The Developing Leaders Vision Team relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry and its Division of Higher Education, the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Uniting Table. The Developing Leaders Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.

- a. There shall be a Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 634 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Higher Education and Campus Ministry, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board relates to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, and its Division of Higher Education, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Developing Leaders Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.
- b. There shall be a Board of Ordained Ministry (the board) whose function, membership and organization are defined in ¶ 635 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the board shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. The board shall relate to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. The board is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.
- c. There shall be a Lay Leadership Team whose function is defined in ¶ 631 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Board of Laity. The membership of the Lay Leadership Team shall be the conference lay leader as chairperson and the district lay leaders, plus all the other members of the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is represented by one or more of its members on various agencies of the Annual Conference. The Lay Leadership Team relates to the General Board of Discipleship, and to the Developing Leaders Vision Team. The Lay Leadership Team is accountable to and reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Developing Leaders Vision Team portion of the budget.

Transforming Communities Vision Team

- 5. There shall be a Transforming Communities Vision Team whose function is to equip, educate and support congregations around the areas of mission and The Advance, specific ethnic concerns, and justice issues. The membership of the Transforming Communities Vision Team shall be: two persons whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, two persons whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is Native American Ministries, two persons whose specific responsibility is The Advance Program, two persons whose specific responsibility is the Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, the Secretary of Global Ministries, and a chairperson; all nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Peace with Justice Coordinator shall also be a member. The entire Vision Team has the full responsibility for each of the areas of focus represented by its members. The Transforming Communities Vision Team relates to the General Board of Church and Society, the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Uniting Table. The Transforming Communities Vision Team is accountable to, and funded by, the Annual Conference.
 - a. There shall be a Board of Church and Society (the board) whose function is defined in ¶ 629 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Church and Society, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Church and Society, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget. The board shall name the Peace with Justice Coordinator.
 - b. There shall be a Board of Global Ministries (the board) whose function is defined in \P 633 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the board shall be the two persons elected by the

Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Global Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team, including the Secretary of Global Ministries, plus a member named by the conference United Methodist Women. The board relates to the General Board of Global Ministries, and to the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The board is accountable to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.

- c. There shall be a Committee on Native American Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 654 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Native American Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.
- d. There shall be a Committee on The Advance (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 656 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is The Advance, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.
- e. There shall be a Committee on Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries (the committee) whose function is defined in ¶ 657 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The membership of the committee shall be the two persons elected by the Annual Conference whose specific responsibility is Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries, plus all the other members of the Transforming Communities Vision Team. The committee relates to the Transforming Communities Vision Team and to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the Transforming Communities Vision Team portion of the budget.

Administrative Agencies

- 6. There shall be Administrative Agencies whose functions are to provide ongoing administrative support to the conference. Each of these functions will be carried out by a separate and independent agency whose members are nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies is directly accountable to the Annual Conference, reports to the Annual Conference, and is funded through the budget of the Annual Conference, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline. Each of these agencies shall have one representative on the Uniting Table for support of the missional emphases of the Uniting Table and Vision Teams.
 - a. There shall be a Finance Table whose function is defined in ¶¶ 611-628 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, and which will fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Council on Finance and Administration. The Finance Table will also fulfill all references in the Book of Discipline to the Commission on Equitable Compensation, whose function is defined in ¶ 625 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Finance Table. The Finance Table relates to the General Council on Finance and Administration. There shall also be a Personnel Committee to carry out those functions of the Finance Table in ¶ 613.13 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be four (4) members of the Personnel Committee plus a representative of the Finance Table and a district superintendent.
 - b. There shall be a Board of Trustees whose function is defined in ¶ 2512 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Board of Trustees, who will be elected in four classes of three members each. The first Board of Trustees will have three persons elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2015, three persons elected by the Río Grande Conference whose terms end in June 2016, three persons elected by the Río Grande

Conference whose terms end in June 2017, and three persons elected by the Southwest Texas Conference whose terms end in June 2018. The members of the Board of Trustees are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Trustees corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation.

- c. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules whose function is to oversee the rules of the Annual Conference, as permitted in \P 604.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Committee on Standing Rules.
- d. There shall be an Agenda and Worship Committee whose function is defined in ¶ 605.2 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. The members of the Agenda and Worship Committee shall be the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; the presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; the conference treasurer; the conference secretary; the chairperson of the Uniting Table; and a Worship Team Coordinator recruited by the committee.
- e. There shall be a Committee on the Episcopacy whose function is defined in \P 637 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be twelve (12) members of the Committee on the Episcopacy.
- f. There shall be an Episcopal Residence Committee whose function is defined in \P 638 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be six (6) members of the Episcopal Residence Committee.
- g. There shall be a Board of Pensions whose function is defined in ¶ 639 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be sixteen (16) members of the Board of Pensions who will serve eight-year staggered terms, with four members being elected every other year. The first Board of Pensions will have four persons whose terms end in June 2016, four persons whose terms end in June 2018, four persons whose terms end in June 2020, and four persons whose terms end in June 2022 in order to establish the staggered terms. The 2014 conferences will each elect two persons for each class to make up the first Board of Pensions. The members of the Board of Pensions are also members of the Board of Directors of the United Methodist Río Texas Conference Board of Pensions corporation, and their election shall be consistent with the Certificate of Formation and the Bylaws of that corporation. The Board of Pensions relates to the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.
- h. There shall be a Commission on Archives and History whose function is defined in \P 641 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be eight (8) members of the Commission on Archives and History. The Commission on Archives and History relates to the General Commission on Archives and History.
- i. There shall be a Committee on Nominations (the committee) whose function is to identify nominees for each elected leadership position for which the Book of Discipline does not specify another method of nomination. The members of the committee shall be the Bishop and the Assistant to the Episcopal Office; the seven district superintendents; one person from each parent conference representing United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Young Adult Ministry Council, and the Youth Ministries Council; the conference lay leader; and six (6) at large members nominated by the Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference to ensure equal representation on the committee from each of the parent conferences. At least through 2024 the Committee on Nominations will consist of an equal number of members from each of the parent conferences.
- 7. There shall be an Administrative Review Committee (the committee) whose function and membership are defined in ¶ 636 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. There shall be three (3) members of the committee and two (2) alternates, nominated by the Bishop and elected by the clergy session of the Annual Conference. The committee is accountable to the clergy session of the Annual Conference.

Applying to All Agencies

- 8. The Committee on Nominations shall work toward the goals of inclusiveness as set forth in ¶ 610.5 in the 2016 Book of Discipline which states: "...special attention shall be given to the inclusion of clergywomen, youth (¶ 256.3), young adults, older adults, persons from churches with small memberships, people with disabilities, and racial and ethnic persons, in keeping with policies for general Church agencies. It is further recommended that the membership of such agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry, include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, who are professing members of local churches." The Committee on Nominations shall also strive for equal representation from the districts; and, to the extent possible, the diversity of those nominated should reflect the diversity of the Mission Field. It will be important at least through 2020 that both the parent conferences be equally represented on the Board of Trustees and the Board of Pensions, and that both be well represented on the Uniting Table and the Vision Teams.
- 9. The term of membership in any conference agency is quadrennial, except where the Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise. The maximum that a person can serve in an agency is two full terms, except where the Book of Discipline stipulates otherwise, or when he/she is filling a vacancy during the quadrennium. Filling a vacancy of an unexpired term of more than two years is considered to be a full term and shall count the same as four years.
- 10. Any elected position on a conference agency which is vacant at the end of the Annual Conference session or which becomes vacant during the conference year may be filled by the Committee on Nominations, unless otherwise specified by the Book of Discipline.
- 11. Ex-officio members of an agency, including members of General and Jurisdictional Agencies who reside within the bounds of the conference, are in addition to the agency members named above.
- 12. Chairpersons of conference agencies should be sensitive to the work schedules of laity when setting meetings.
- 13. When a person is absent without notice from two consecutive conference agency meetings of which he/she is a member, such person shall be considered to have resigned such membership, and the Committee on Nominations shall be notified that another person can be nominated for the remainder of the term.
- 14. No district superintendent or conference staff person shall be eligible to serve as an elective member of any conference agency. If a member at the time of appointment or hire, he/she shall be considered to have resigned such membership.

Conference Staff and Resources

- 15. There shall be an Administrative Services Center whose function is to manage the financial resources of the conference, and to develop alternative sources of funding for the conference. The Administrative Services Center will encourage collaboration and partnership among all program, administrative and financial entities of the conference. The Administrative Services Center relates to and supports the work of the Finance Table and the Commission on Equitable Compensation, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Pensions, the conference treasurer, and the office of New Resource Development, as well as the other non-program agencies as needed. The Administrative Services Center shall be accountable to the Finance Table and to the Annual Conference, and shall be funded by the Annual Conference. There shall be a director or equivalent position to oversee the functions of the Administrative Services Center, filled by appointment or otherwise at the Bishop's discretion.
- 16. There shall be an Assistant to the Episcopal Office who will provide assistance with the administrative tasks of the Episcopal Office. This position may be filled, by appointment or otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

17. There shall be Directors who assist and coordinate with the ministries of the Vision Teams as determined by the Personnel Committee in consultation with the Bishop. These positions may be filled, by appointment or otherwise, at the Bishop's discretion.

MEMBERSHIP OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE

18. The lay membership of the Annual Conference shall be:

Lay Members Defined by the Book of Discipline

- a. A professing member elected by each charge, as provided for in \P 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;
- b. An additional lay member assigned to each charge for each additional clergy member who is appointed to the charge as provided for in ¶ 602.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;
- c. Diaconal ministers, active deaconesses, home missioners under episcopal appointment within the bounds of the Annual Conference, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the conference director of lay servant ministries, conference secretary of global ministries (if lay), the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, the chair of the Annual Conference college student organization, one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17) and one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district to be selected in such a manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference, as provided in ¶ 602.4 and ¶ 32 of the 2016 Book of Discipline;

(The method for selecting the youth, college and young adult representatives to Annual Conference will be as follows: the conference youth organization will select one young person between the ages of twelve (12) and seventeen (17) from each district; the conference young adult organization will select one young person between the ages of eighteen (18) and thirty (30) from each district. In the absence of a college student organization, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry will select the college student to serve as a Lay Member of the Annual Conference. Each of the agencies is responsible for providing the names and contact information for these persons to the conference secretary no later than January 15 each year.)

Lay Members Defined by Annual Conference

- d. An additional lay member assigned to each church that does not have a lay member as provided for in 18a and 18b above; and
- e. Other members as defined by the Annual Conference to include: an additional representative of the executive committees of the conference organizations of United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, youth, and young adults; the president and one additional representative of the executive committees of the district organizations of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, youth, and young adults; the chancellor, the conference emmaus lay director (if any), the conference scouting coordinator (if any), conference associate lay leaders (if any), conference elected executive personnel (if any), the chairperson of any conference agency or standing committee that reports directly to the Annual Conference; lay members of the Uniting Table and Finance Table; and one lay member for each unchartered new church start elected by the district in which the new church start is located.
- f. Additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy membership shall be assigned to each district based upon district membership. The conference secretary shall notify each district superintendent of the number of additional lay members to be elected no later than sixty (60) days following Annual Conference. Each district will determine the method of election.
- g. Through 2024 the additional lay members elected shall include members of both parent conferences.
- h. At least 10% of these additional lay members shall be age 30 or under at the time of election.
- 19. In accordance with \P 659 of the 2016 Book of Discipline, the District Conferences will be composed of all members of Annual Conference as set forth in the Standing Rules who are related to churches within the bounds of their respective districts and currently elected to office. In addition, it shall include the chairperson of each district agency.

CONFERENCE PROCEDURES

- 20. Proposals and reports from conference agencies shall be compiled in a Pre-Conference Report that shall be made available as an electronic document or in printed form to all conference members at least thirty (30) days prior to the Annual Conference session. Each report shall be marked "For Conference Action" or "For Information Only."
- 21. The Annual Conference shall make available English and Spanish editions of all official correspondence, including but not limited to the contents of the Pre-Conference Report and the Conference Journal. The Annual Conference shall also provide oral translation between Spanish and English, and support for hearing and vision impaired persons, during the sessions of the Annual Conference.
- 22. Resolutions shall reach the floor of the conference only after consideration and action of the appropriate conference agency.
- 23. The conference procedures will be governed by the following in order of precedence: the Book of Discipline, the Standing Rules, any special rules adopted by the Annual Conference, and the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.
- 24. The conference secretary shall establish the bar of the conference. The conference secretary shall nominate, and the Annual Conference elect, the persons needed to assist in the proceedings of the conference. These include the timekeeper, tellers, associate secretaries, and the minutes committee.
- 25. Speakers should identify themselves, giving their name and church, and whether they are a clergy or lay member of the conference.
- 26. Each speech from the floor for or against a motion will be limited to three minutes. The timekeeper will inform the Bishop when the time has expired.
- 27. Consent Agenda 1 consists of reports from conference agencies which are not for action, but are "For Information Only." The conference acts only to receive these reports and print them in the journal. Consent Agenda 2 consists of action reports about which there is believed to be little or no dissent. The items included in Consent Agenda 2 are determined by a task force composed of members of the Agenda and Worship Committee. Any member of the Annual Conference may move the deletion of any of the items from Consent Agendas. With a second, and a one-minute explanation by the maker of the motion, it will be voted on by the conference without debate. If 20% of the members vote that the item be removed, it will be removed and brought to the floor as a non-consent item at a time to be determined by the Agenda and Worship Committee.
- 28. The Committee on Standing Rules shall report to the Annual Conference during the first business session of each Annual Conference. Revisions or amendments must be adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference, and become effective immediately upon their adoption, unless otherwise stated in the enabling legislation. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Annual Conference.
- 29. The preliminary report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented early in the agenda of the Annual Conference proceedings, including the process for nominations from the floor. The final report of the Committee on Nominations will be presented and acted upon at a later session of that Annual Conference.
- 30. Any report or resolution requiring action of the conference must be in the hands of the conference secretary early enough to allow for printing and distribution to the conference twenty-four (24) hours before the report is considered by the conference. Motions made from the floor must be presented in writing to the presiding officer and the conference secretary at the time the motion is made.

- 31. The conference lay leader will chair the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesies, and will be responsible for appointing additional persons to assist in preparation of the report.
- 32. The only materials that are allowed to be placed on the tables of the conference floor are those official materials distributed by the conference secretary and his/her staff.
- 33. The minutes shall be available online no later than sixty days after the closing of the Annual Conference session.

OTHER

- 34. The Local Church Report to the Annual Conference (Annual Statistical Report) required by the general church will be completed and filed with the conference no later than January 30, as stated in ¶ 606.7 of the 2016 Book of Discipline. This can be done using the method determined by the conference statistician to be the easiest and most effective manner.
- 35. There will be a Policy Manual containing policies adopted by the Annual Conference. Changes in these policies must be approved by the Annual Conference. The conference secretary will make these available as an electronic document and in printed form.
- 36. Any minister of the Annual Conference who conducts the funeral or memorial service of a fellow minister or a minister's spouse shall provide the conference secretary with a memorial for that person within one month, in accordance with the Guidelines on Memoirs to be furnished by the conference secretary.

ESTRUCTURA Y AGENCIAS

Mesa Unida

- 1. También habrá siete (7) miembros en general y un defensor del Campo de Misión, nombrados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegido por la Conferencia Anual.  - a. Habrá un defensor del Campo de Misión cuya responsabilidad es ayudar a la Mesa Unida y a los Equipos de Visión seguir enfocados en el campo misionero, abogando por las personas que no están en nuestras iglesias, incluyendo los que están en la pobreza, aquellos que son jóvenes, aquellos que son marginados y aquellos desapoderados por nuestra cultura y sociedad.
 - b. La Mesa Unida y los cuatro Equipos de Visión reclutarán la participación de las personas del laicaso y clérigo a través de la Conferencia para servir en los grupos de tarea y ayudarles en sus responsabilidades.
 - c. Cada Equipo de Visión tendrá será apoyado financieramente del presupuesto de la Conferencia Anual. Las reuniones del Equipo se financiarán de la cantidad presupuestada para ese Equipo. Designadas tareas también se financiarán a través de la cantidad proporcionada en el presupuesto anual de la Conferencia y asignado a ese equipo.

2. Los miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades serán: dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es la Iglesia y Sociedad, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Globales, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Nativo-Americanos, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es el programa de Avance, dos personas cuya responsabilidad específica es la Justicia y Misericordia, el Secretario de Ministerios Globales y un Presidente; todos designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegido por la Conferencia Anual. El Coordinador de Paz con Justicia también será miembro. Todo el Equipo de Visión tiene toda la responsabilidad para cada una de las áreas de enfoque representadas por sus miembros. El Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades se relaciona con la Junta General de la Iglesia y Sociedad, la Junta General de Ministerios Globales y a la Mesa Unida. El Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades rinde cuentas a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado por ella.
 - a. Habrá una Junta de Iglesia y Sociedad (la Junta) cuya función se define en ¶ 629 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Junta serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es la Iglesia y la Sociedad, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades, además de un miembro nombrado por la

Conferencia de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas. La Junta se relaciona con la Junta General de la Iglesia y Sociedad y el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta nombrará al Coordinador de Paz con Justicia.

- b. Habrá una Junta de Ministerios Globales (la Junta) cuya función se define en ¶ 633 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Junta serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Globales, además de todos los otros miembros de Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades, incluyendo el Secretario de Ministerios Globales, además de un miembro nombrado por la Conferencia de Mujeres Metodistas Unidas. La Junta se la Junta General de Ministerios Globales y el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. La Junta es responsable al Equipo de Visión de Transformar Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.
- c. Habrá un Comité de Ministerios de Nativos Americanos (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 654 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es Ministerios Nativo-Americanos, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.
- d. Habrá un Comité en el Avance (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 656 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es el Avance, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiada de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.
- e. Habrá un Comité de Justicia y Misericordia (el Comité) cuya función se define en ¶ 657 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros del Comité serán las dos personas elegidas por la Conferencia Anual cuya responsabilidad específica es justicia y misericordia, además de todos los otros miembros del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité se relaciona con el Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades. El Comité es responsable al Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades y a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado de la porción del presupuesto del Equipo de Visión Transformando Comunidades.

Agencias Administrativas

- 6. Habrá Agencias Administrativas cuyas funciones sera proporcionar apoyo administrativo en curso a la Conferencia. Cada una de estas funciones se llevará a cabo por una agencia separada e independiente cuyos miembros son designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual, a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina. Cada una de estas agencias es directamente responsable a la Conferencia Anual, informa a la Conferencia Anual y es financiado del presupuesto de la Conferencia Anual, a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina. Cada una de estas agencias tendrá un representate en la Mesa Unida para apoyar los enfasis misionales de la Mesa Unida y los Equipos de Visión.
 - a. Habrá una Mesa de Finanzas cuya función se define en ¶¶ 611-628 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, y que cumplirá con todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina ante el Concilio de Finanzas y Administración. La Mesa de Finanzas también cumplirá con todas las referencias en el Libro de Disciplina a la Comisión de Compensación Equitativa, cuya función se define en ¶ 625 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá dieciséis (16) miembros en la Mesa de Finanzas. La Mesa de Finanzas se relaciona con el Concilio General de Finanzas y Administración. También habrá un Comité de Personal para llevar a cabo las funciones de la Mesa de Finanzas en ¶ 613.13 del Libro de

Disciplina 2016. Habrá cuatro (4) miembros de la Comisión de Personal además de un representante de la Mesa de Finanzas y un Superintendente del Distrito.

- b. Habrá una Junta de Síndicos, cuya función se define en ¶ 2512 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá doce (12) miembros de la Junta de Síndicos, que serán elegidos en cuatro clases de tres miembros cada una. La primera Junta de Síndicos tendrá tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia de Southwest Texas cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2015, tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Río Grande cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2016, tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Río Grande cuyo fin de término es en junio de 2017 y tres personas elegidas por la Conferencia Southwest Texas cuyos fin de término es en junio de 2018. Los miembros de la Junta de Síndicos serán también miembros de la Junta de Directores de la corporación denominada Junta de Síndicos de la Conferencia Metodista Unida Río Texas, y su eleccíon deberá concordar con el Certificado de Formación y con los Estatutos de tal corporación.
- c. Habrá un Comité sobre Reglas Permanentes cuya función es supervisar las reglas de la Conferencia Anual, a la medida permitida en ¶ 604.1 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá seis (6) miembros del Comité de Reglas Permanentes.
- d. Habrá un Comité de Agenda y Adoración cuya función se define en ¶ 605.2 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Los miembros de la Comité de Agenda y Adoración será el Obispo y el Asistente de la oficina Episcopal; los superintendentes de siete distritos; los presidentes de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud; el Líder Laico Conferencial; el Tesorero de la Conferencia; el Secretario de la Conferencia; el Presidente de la Mesa Unida; y un coordinador del Equipo de Adoración reclutado por el Comité.
- e. Habrá un Comité del Episcopado cuya función se define en ¶ 637 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá doce (12) miembros del Comité del Episcopado.
- f. Habrá un Comité de Residencia Episcopal cuya función se define en ¶ 638 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá seis (6) miembros del Comité de Residencia Episcopal.
- g. Habrá una Junta de Pensiones, cuya función se define en ¶ 639 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá dieciséis (16) miembros de la Junta de Pensiones que servirán términos escalonados de ocho años, con cuatro miembros siendo elegidos cada dos años. La primera Junta de Pensiones tendrá cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2016, cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2020, y cuatro personas cuyos nombramientos terminan en junio de 2022 con el fin de establecer los términos escalonados. Las conferencias 2014 cada una elegirá a dos personas por cada clase que conforma a la primera Junta de Pensiones. Los miembros de la Junta de Pensiones serán también miembros de la Junta de Directores de la corporación denominada Junta de Pensiones de la Conferencia Metodista Unida Río Texas, y su eleccíon deberá concordar con el Certificado de Formación y con los Estatutos de tal corporación. La Junta de Pensiones se relaciona con la Junta General de Pensiones y Beneficios de Salud.
- h. Habrá una Comisión de Archivos e Historia cuya función se define en ¶ 641 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá ocho (8) miembros en la Comisión de Archivos e Historia. La Comisión de Archivos e Historia se relaciona con la Comisión General de Archivos e Historia.
- i. Habrá un Comité de Nominaciones (el Comité), cuya función es identificar a candidatos para cada posición de lideres elegidos ya que El Libro de Disciplina no especifica otro método de nominación. Los miembros del Comité serán el Obispo y el Asistente de la Oficina Episcopal; los Superintendentes de siete Distritos; una persona de cada conferencia patrocinadora que representan las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, los Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Concilio de Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y el Concilio de Ministerios de la Juventud; el Líder Laico Conferencial; y seis (6) prófugos miembros designados por el Comité de Nominaciones y elegidos por la Conferencia Anual para

garantizar una representación equitativa en el Comité de cada una de las conferencias patrocinadoras. Por lo menos a través de 2024 el Comité de Nominaciones constará de un número igual de miembros de cada una de las conferencias patrocinadoras.

7. Habrá un Comité de Revisión Administrativa (el Comité) cuya función y membresía se definen en ¶ 636 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Habrá tres (3) miembros del Comité y dos (2) suplentes, nombrados por el Obispo y elegidos por la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual. El Comité es responsable ante la sesión de cleros de la Conferencia Anual.

Aplicante a Todas las Agencias

- 8. El Comité de Nominaciones deberá trabajar hacia los objetivos de inclusión como dispuestos en ¶ 610.5 en el Libro de Disciplina 2016 que establece: "...atención especial debe darse a la inclusión de mujeres del clero, la juventud (¶ 256.3), jóvenes adultos, adultos mayores, personas de iglesias con membresía pequeñas, personas con discapacidad y personas de minorías raciales y étnicas, en consonancia con las políticas de las agencias generales de la Iglesia. También se recomienda que los miembros de dichas agencias, salvo la Junta de Ministerio Ordenado, incluyan un tercio de clero, un tercio laicas y un tercio laicos que profesan ser miembros de las iglesias locales." El Comité de Nominaciones también se esforzará por tener igual representación de los distritos; y, a la medida que sea posible, la diversidad de los nombrados debe reflejar la diversidad de las misiones. Será importante por lo menos hasta el 2020 que las conferencias patrocinadoras sean igualmente representadas en la Junta de Síndicos y la Junta de Pensiones, y que ambas sean bien representados en la Mesa Unida y en los Equipos de Visión.
- 9. El término de membresía en cualquier agencia de la Conferencia es cuadrienal, excepto donde el Libro de Disciplina estipula lo contrario. Lo máximo que una persona puede servir en una agencia es de dos términos, excepto donde el Libro de Disciplina estipula lo contrario, o cuando él o ella llena una vacante durante el cuadrienio. Llenar un vacante de un período restante de más de dos años se considera ser un término completo y se cuenta lo mismo que cuatro años.
- 10. Cualquier posición elegida en una agencia de la Conferencia que esté vacante al final de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual o que se convierte en vacante durante el año de la Conferencia puede ser suplido por el Comité de Nominaciones a menos que se especifique lo contrario por el Libro de Disciplina.
- 11. Ex-oficio miembros de una agencia, incluyendo a miembros de Agencias Generales o Jurisdiccionales, que residen dentro de los límites de la Conferencia, son además miembros de Agencia arriba mencionados.
- 12. Presidentes de los agencias de la Conferencia deberían ser sensibles a los horarios de trabajo de los laicos al establecer horarios de reuniones.
- 13. Cuando una persona esté ausente sin previo aviso de dos reuniones consecutivas de agencias de conferencia del cual él o ella es miembro, dicha persona se considerará que ha renunciado dicha afiliación, y la Comisión de Nombramientos se notificará que otra persona puede ser nombrada por el resto del término.
- 14. Ningún personal de la Oficina del Superintendente o conferencia de distrito será elegible para servir como miembro electivo de cualquier agencia de la Conferencia. Si fuese miembro en el momento de nombramiento o por sueldo, él o ella se considerarán haber renunciado dicha afiliación.

Personal y Recursos de la Conferencia

15. Habrá un Centro de Servicios Administrativos cuya función es administrar los recursos financieros de la Conferencia y desarrollar fuentes alternativas de financiación para la Conferencia. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos fomentará colaboración y asociación entre todos los programas, entidades administrativas y financieras de la Conferencia. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos se refiere a la Mesa de Finanzas y apoya el trabajo de la misma, así como el de la Comisión de Compensaciones Equitativas, la Junta de Síndicos, la Junta de Pensiones, el Tesorero de la Conferencia y la Oficina de

Desarrollo de Nuevos Recursos, así como a otras agencias no programadas, como sea necesario. El Centro de Servicios Administrativos será responsable a la Mesa de Finanzas y a la Conferencia Anual y será financiado por la Conferencia Anual. Habrá un director o posición equivalente para supervisar las funciónes del Centro de Servicios Administrativos, llenado por nombramiento o de otra manera a discreción del Obispo.

- 16. Habrá un Asistente a la Oficina Episcopal que proporcionará ayuda con las tareas administrativas de la oficina Episcopal. Esta posición puede llenarse por nombramiento, o de lo contrario, a discreción del Obispo.
- 17. Habrá Directores que ayuden y coordinen con los ministerios de los Equipos de Visión según lo determine el Comité de Personal en consulta con el Obispo. Estas posiciones pueden ser llenadas, por nombramiento o de lo contrario, a la discreción del Obispo.

MEMBRESÍA DE LA CONFERENCIA ANUAL

18. Los miembros laicos de la Conferencia Anual serán:

Miembros Laicos Definidos por el Libro de Disciplina

- a. Un miembro profesante elegido por cada cargo, como provisto por el ¶ 602.4 del Libro de Disciplina 2016;
- b. Otro miembro laico adicional asignado a cada cargo para cada miembro del clero adicional que es nombrado para el cargo como previsto en ¶ 602.4 del Libro de Disciplina 2016;
- c. Ministros Diaconales, Diaconisas activas, Misioneros Locales bajo nombramiento Episcopal dentro de los límites de la Conferencia, la Presidente de la Conferencia de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, el Presidente de la Conferencia de Hombres Metodistas Unidos, el Líder Laico de la Conferencia, los Líderes Laicos de los Distritos, el Director de Siervos Ministeriales Laicos de la Conferencia, el Secretario de la Conferencia de Ministerios Globales (si es laico), el Presidente oficial o equivalente de la Organización de Jóvenes Adultos de la Conferencia, el Presidente de la Organización de Juventud de la Conferencia, el Presidente de la Organización de Estudiantes Universitarios de la Conferencia Anual, una persona joven entre las edades de doce (12) y diecisiete (17) años y un joven entre las edades de dieciocho (18) y treinta (30) años de cada Distrito quien serán seleccionados de tal forma como lo determine la Conferencia Anual, como provisto en ¶ 602.4 y ¶ 32 del Libro de Disciplina 2016;

(El método de selección de los representantes jóvenes, universitarios y jóvenes adultos a Conferencia Anual será como el siguiente: la organización de la Conferencia de la Juventud seleccionará una persona joven entre las edades de doce (12) a diecisiete (17) años de cada distrito, la organización de adultos jóvenes de la Conferencia seleccionará una persona joven entre las edades de dieciocho (18) y treinta (30) años de cada distrito. En ausencia de una organización estudiantil de la Universidad, el Concilio de Educación Superior y Ministerio del Campo Universitario seleccionará un estudiante universitario como miembro laico de la Conferencia Anual. Cada una de las agencias es responsable de proporcionar los nombres y la información de contacto de estas personas a la Secretaria de la Conferencia no más tardar del 15 de enero de cada año).

Miembros Laicos Definidos por la Conferencia Anual

- d. Un miembro laico adicional asignado a cada iglesia que no tiene miembro laico como previsto en 18a y 18b arriba; y
- e. Otros miembros según lo definido por la Conferencia Anual que incluya: un representante adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones de la Conferencia de Hombres Metodistas Unidos, las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el Presidente y un representante adicional de los comités ejecutivos de las organizaciones del distrito de las Mujeres Metodistas Unidas, Hombres Metodistas Unidos, Jóvenes y Jóvenes Adultos; el Canciller, el director laico a la Conferencia de Emaús (si existe), el Coordinador de Reclutadores a la Conferencia (si existe), los líderes laicos asociados a la Conferencia (si existen), el elegido personal ejecutivo de la Conferencia (si existe), el Presidente de cualquier agencia de la Conferencia o Comisión permanente que informa directamente a la Conferencia Anual; miembros laicos de la Mesa Unida y la Mesa de Finanzas; y

- uno de los miembros laicos de cada iglesia de nuevo comienzo no incorporada elegido por el distrito donde se encuentra la iglesia de nuevo comienzo.
- f. Adicionales laicos necesarios para igualar a los laicos y miembros del clero se asignarán a cada distrito, basado en la membresía del distrito. La Secretaria de la Conferencia notificará a cada Superintendente del número de miembros laicos adicionales por ser elegidos no más tarde de sesenta (60) días después de la Conferencia Anual. Cada distrito determinará el método de elección. g. A través de 2024 el número de miembros laicos adicionales elegidos deberá incluir a miembros de ambas conferencias patrocinadoras.
- h. Por lo menos el 10% de estos laicos adicionales será de treinta (30) años de edad o menos en el momento de la elección.
- 19. De acuerdo con ¶ 659 del Libro de Disciplina 2016, las conferencias de distrito se compondrán de todos los miembros de la Conferencia Anual como previsto por las reglas permanentes relacionadas a las iglesias dentro de los límites de sus respectivos distritos y actualmente elegidos. Además, se incluirá al Presidente de cada agencia del distrito.

PROCEDIMIENTOS CONFERENCIALES

- 20. Las propuestas e informes de agencias de la Conferencia se compilarán en un Informe de Pre-Conferencia que se hará disponible como documento electrónico o en forma impresa a todos los miembros de la Conferencia, por lo menos treinta (30) días antes de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual. Cada informe deberá indicarse "Para Acción de la Conferencia" o "Únicamente para Información."
- 21. La Conferencia Anual deberá hacer disponibles ediciones en inglés y en español de toda la correspondencia oficial, incluyendo pero no limitado a los contenidos del Informe de Pre-Conferencia y las Actas de la Conferencia. La Conferencia Anual también deberá presentar una traducción oral entre el español e inglés, y también proveerá apoyo para personas con discapacidades de audita y visión, durante las sesiones de la Conferencia Anual.
- 22. Las Resoluciones deberán llegar al piso de la Conferencia sólo después de consideración y acción de la agencia apropiada de la Conferencia.
- 23. Los procedimientos de la Conferencia se regirán por los siguientes en orden de precedencia: el Libro de Disciplina, las Reglas Permanentes, cualquier regla especial aprobada por la Conferencia Anual y la edición actual de las Reglas de Orden Roberts.
- 24. El Secretario de la Conferencia deberá establecer la barra de la Conferencia. El Secretario de la Conferencia nombrará y la Conferencia Anual elegirá a las personas necesarias para ayudar en los procedimientos de la Conferencia. Estos incluyen el guardador de tiempo, los cajeros, secretarios/as asociados/as y el Comité de Minutas.
- 25. Todos los oradores deben identificarse, dando su nombre y nombre de su iglesia, y decir si son miembros del clero o laicos de la Conferencia.
- 26. Cada discurso desde el piso o en contra de una moción estará limitada a tres minutos. El guardador de tiempo informará al Obispo cuando se ha expirado el tiempo.
- 27. El Consentimiento de Agenda 1 consiste en informes de agencias de la Conferencia que no son de acción, sino "Únicamente para Información." La Conferencia actúa sólo para recibir estos informes y para imprimirlos en el Diario. La Agenda de Consentimiento 2 consiste en informes de acción sobre los cuales se cree que habrá poca o ninguna disidencia. Los elementos incluidos en el Consentimiento de Agenda 2 están determinados por un grupo de trabajo compuesto por miembros del Comité de Agenda y Adoración. Cualquier miembro de la Conferencia Anual puede proponer la supresión de cualquiera de los elementos del Consentimiento de Agendas. Después de un secundo y una explicación de un minuto por el creador de la propuesta, se tomará el voto por la Conferencia sin debate. Si el 20% de los miembros

votan que el elemento se quite, se quita y se trae al piso de la Conferencia como un elemento de no consentimiento en un momento determinado por el Comité de Agenda y Adoración.

- 28. El Comité de Reglas Permanentes informará a la Conferencia Anual durante la primera sesión de negocios de cada Conferencia Anual. Las revisiones o enmiendas deben ser adoptadas por dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia Anual y puestos en efecto inmediatamente después de su adopción, a menos que se indique lo contrario en la legislación. Las Reglas Permanentes podrán ser suspendidas en cualquier momento por dos tercios (2/3) de votos de la Conferencia Anual.
- 29. El informe preliminar del Comité de Nominaciones se presentará a temprana hora en la agenda de los procedimientos de la Conferencia Anual, incluyendo el proceso de nominaciones desde el piso de la Conferencia. El informe final del Comité de Nominaciones será presentado y puesto en acción durante una sesión posterior a esa Conferencia Anual.
- 30. Cualquier informe o resolución que requiera la acción de la Conferencia debe estar en manos de la Secretaria de la Conferencia a la más temprana hora posible para permitir su impresión y distribución a la Conferencia; es decir, veinticuatro (24) horas antes de que el informe sea considerado por la Conferencia. Mociones del piso de la Conferencia deben presentarse por escrito al Presidente y al Secretario de la Conferencia en el momento que la propuesta se presente.
- 31. El líder laico de la Conferencia presidirá la Comité de Resoluciones y Cortesías y será responsable de nombrar a otras personas para ayudar en la preparación del informe.
- 32. Los únicos materiales que pueden ser colocados en las mesas del piso de la conferencia son los materiales oficiales distribuidos por el Secretario de la Conferencia y su personal.
- 33. Las actas estarán disponibles en línea a no más tardar de sesenta (60) días después de la clausura de la sesión de la Conferencia Anual.

OTROS

- 34. El informe de la Iglesia Local a la Conferencia Anual (Informe Anual de Estadísticas) requerido por la Iglesia General será completado y presentado ante la Conferencia no más tarde del 30 de enero, como se indica en ¶ 606.7 del Libro de Disciplina 2016. Esto puede hacerse utilizando el método determinado ser más fácil y efectivo por el/la estadístico/a de la Conferencia.
- 35. Habrá un Manual de Política que contiene las políticas adoptadas por la Conferencia Anual. Cambios a estas políticas deben ser aprobados por la Conferencia Anual. El Secretario de la Conferencia hará posible que éstas estén disponibles como documentos electrónicos y en forma impresa.
- 36. Cualquier ministro de la Conferencia Anual que lleva a cabo un servicio funeral o memorial de un ministro compañero o cónyuge de un ministro deberá presentar al Secretario de la Conferencia un documento memorial de esa persona dentro de un mes del memorial, en conformidad con las Directivas de Memoriales que serán hechas disponibles por el Secretario de la Conferencia.
