## Rio Texas Holds Opening Session of Annual Conference at the American Bank Center in Corpus Christi, TX to Release 34 Churches

CORPUS CHRISTI – The Rio Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church (UMC) held its opening plenary session of Annual Conference in Corpus Christi to vote on the Board of Trustees' recommendation of the following United Methodist churches to disaffiliate from the conference and UMC.

Like the previously held special session May 6, 2023, the recommendation comes after Rio Texas implemented the Discerning Pathways Guidelines for Disaffiliation in Fall 2022 for churches to formally exit the denomination. This exodus of churches comes after several decades of conversation and ultimately impasse regarding the inclusion of and ministry with LGBTQIA+ people.

Robert Schnase is the current episcopal leader of the Rio Texas and New Mexico Conferences. Bishop Schnase commented, "During this season of transition, some have decided to walk a different path than the United Methodist Church. We are reminded and inspired by the promise of God that we are never alone. God is close and creating a path that is being formed even as we walk it. May God guide our future, one that is hopeful and filled with possibilities seen and unseen. We release the churches leaving with blessing."

The Discerning Pathways Guidelines for Rio Texas churches to separate from The UMC are in accordance with ¶ 2553 of the Book of Discipline, which allows for a local church to disaffiliate from the denomination "over issues related to human sexuality." Rio Texas requires churches to go through a discernment period of six months, contact their local District Superintendent, hold listening sessions, and consider practical concerns (incorporation, resolution of unpaid loans, employee health insurance, property & liability insurance, etc.). After the church's congregation approves disaffiliation with a 2/3 vote, the church must fulfill financial commitments:

- The previous years' 12 months of apportionments and the next year's 12 months of apportionments
- Full unfunded pension liability, as calculated by the Rio Texas Board of Pensions and Wespath Board of Pensions and Health Benefits

The last step in the process is the vote of the annual conference. The churches listed above completed these required steps and the vote of the conference that took place today at the convention center in Corpus Christi.

## About Rio Texas Conference:

There are roughly 700 clergy under appointment by the bishop.
